

Craighead Windfarm

Slightly abridged copy of a letter sent to: Alex Gudgeon, Case Officer, Planning & Placemaking, PKC

DEAR SIR,

Erection of 8 turbine windfarm & associated works/land 1.5Km north east of Earnieside Farmhouse, Dunning Glen, DOLLAR FK14 7LB (Ref 11)

I write in the strongest terms to object to the above application (reduced from 12) in the Ochil Hills. The application address is slightly misleading as the site is commonly called the Craighead Windfarm in the developer's newsletters and is on the site of the previously refused Mellock Hill windfarm, objected to by PKC and refused by a Reporter on appeal when the turbines were smaller than those proposed here. The developer's newsletter of January 2024 was also misleading containing the comment 'no environmental designations for the site' which is inaccurate because it is within the Ochil Hills Local Landscape Area. Unlike the neighbouring Brunt Hill windfarm application before the ECU on mainly forested ground, Mellock hill is open shapely hillside, like the Greenknowes windfarm north of Castlehill Reservoir in Glendevon, regrettably approved by a Government Reporter despite PKC objection and which the Green MSP, Mark Ruskell said was in the 'in the right place'. I begged to differ and it is highly visible from the south, as will this application be, especially given the increased height of the

Locational Guidance& Landscape Capacity

In the earlier of days of on-shore windfarms when they were smaller in size than today's generation, SNH (now Nature Scot) produced strategic locational guidance in November 2000 for them and recognised the 'short-term' nature of onshore technology, stating that in the 'longer-term' offshore wind (more reliable), wave and water power generation has less overall impact on the environment and landscape! The Guidance re-inforced the need for care in location of windfarms because of their effect on landscape, habitat and species. It recognised the valuable role of landscape designations in protecting areas of important local natural heritage i.e. LLAs (which replaced AGLV's) SSSIs and wild land.

In June 2004, PKC's revised Wind Energy Policy & Guidelines referred to a Landscape Capacity Study commissioned by PKC, Clackmannan Council and SNH that looked in detail at the Ochil Hills west of the M90. It concluded that all the areas of higher potential for windfarms were the most sensitive from a visual landscape point of view and that commercial scale turbines were inappropriate and

only one should be permitted, if necessary, to avoid dwarfing the hills themselves.

In May 2005 the Ochil Hills west of the M90 were mapped as a sensitive area for windfarms. The above Landscape Capacity Study was updated in 2010 by David Tyldesley and is referenced in draft PKC guidance to support Policy 33 of LDP2. PKC established a Local Landscape Area in LDP2 and guidance therein suggests there is little capacity for further windfarms in the Ochils.

The turbines proposed run completely counter to the above.

As an aside, I thought I would mention that Scotland's Landscape Charter published in 2010 is the subject of a current review and I attended a spring '24 workshop on this. This review has the support of the Scottish Government and is due to be completed this autumn, which unfortunately is too late for this submission; unless PKC object to the application, which I understand could lead to a public local inquiry.

Cumulative, Environmental, Landscape & Visual Impact

Due to the size of the turbines proposed, which at around 200 metres are almost as high as the Queensferry Crossing's supporting towers (high tide level to uppermost point). I submit that the proposal should be refused because of the above impacts and I don't accept it is possible to appropriately mitigate those impacts in the location proposed.

We already have three large windfarms sited in the Ochils contrary to PKC policy and landscape guidance and three more potentially proposed, including Craighead, so the cumulative impact must be taken into account to prevent a windfarm landscape covering our hills between Glendevon and the M90, contrary to guidance already existing.

I note that some of the turbines will have perimeter aviation lighting in a currently 'dark sky' area.

This will impact on the Loch Leven Basin SSSI and the hugely popular Loch Leven Trail may be affected. There are also real concerns about potential risks to air sports (ballooning and gliding) operating from two nearby small airfields.

It is worth noting geese migration routes to Loch Leven pass over the Ochil Hills.

Conjoined Decisions Via Pli's

There is history of these in relation to windfarm proposals in the Ochils and I earlier noted that Craighead is on the site of the previously refused Mellock Hill (479 metres) application after a Reporter's decision. The application is relatively close to Brunt Hill proposal being considered by the ECU. In these circumstances, I strongly favour, if at all possible, a conjoined decision via a PLI when all issues can be discussed in public forum.

Regional Park Aspirations

Prior to 2012, in my submission to the Main Issues Report for PKC's Local Plan, I called for a Regional Park Status for the Ochil Hills, like the Lomonds of Fife. This was reinforced in April 2021 and January 2022 through the Shared Policy Programme of the Scottish Government and Green Party of August 2021 and at the first historic meeting of the Kinross-shire Local Committee of PKC which I chaired in January 2022 when all of the CCs in Kinross-shire unanimously supported work towards such status. It is my contention that further windfarms in the Ochils would weaken that aspiration.

Industrialisation Of Our Hill Landscape

The modern generation of on-shore turbines require significant infrastructure because of their size, involving the construction of access roads and additional pylons for transferring power to the national grid. These additional requirements affect the environment and landscaping, multiplying the impact of the turbines themselves. They are usually promoted by large companies, investors and landowners to the disadvantage of more localised schemes for smaller turbines, that I would sometimes support, which are placed at a disadvantage for grid connection.

Policy Framework

I note that NPF4 takes precedence where it is incompatible with PKC's LDP2. Also, that Policy 11 of NPF4 provides strong support for renewables and referred to in the Craighead application. I also note

that NPF4 contains no standalone policy on landscape, something I have made representation on at parliamentary level. However, policy 4 (Natural Places) references landscape impact on LLAs from inappropriate development. An LLA already exists for the Ochils and I suggest that Policy 4(d) is clear that Craighead breaches this on account of significant adverse impacts on our hill landscape, with mitigation not adequate to satisfy Policy 11(e). PKC LDP2 Policies 33 & 39 are of particular relevance where supplementary guidance specifically seeks to avoid proposals for turbines having an adverse impact on the special qualities of this sensitive environment. Cumulative impacts are highlighted and must be considered by PKC as statutory consultees.

Local Resident Concerns

I have noted concerns around loss of amenity and biodiversity, along with shadow 'flicker' and the possible effect on private water supplies, TV and telecom interference from local resident submissions that require to be addressed.

On-Shore Wind Claims & Alternatives

On-shore windfarms are an intermittent source of energy, especially on windless days and there is scepticism about some of the claims for such wind energy generation. I note that in the first four days of December '23 during a period of cold windless weather, wind energy provided about 3% of energy per day to the national grid, whilst oil and gas provided at least 60%.

Britain possesses significant reserves of coal, gas, hydro, oil, waste timber, wave and wind resource; we should not have currently an energy crisis if successive governments had followed a mixed-use energy policy with a gradual move to renewables, coupled with a greater focus on making existing and planned buildings more energy efficient, etc.

It is suggested that by February 2024 the proposed supply from renewable sources already in the queue for GB grid connection had already reached predicted maximum demand by 2050 and in fact exceeded it, which effectively means that all proposals for large scale windfarms in the Ochils can be rejected without any impact on government net zero targets.

Survey

Fossoway CC carried out a Windfarm Survey between November 2023 and January 2024 but I cautioned against reading too much into it or basing a planning stance on it on the basis of % responses and failure to mention some key facts when questions were devised. I understand Fossoway & Portmoak CCs have decided to object to the application and the former has been given a short extension to the deadline for comment. I note that both Dunning and Blackford CCs support the application because they would hardly see it, the greatest visual effect is to the south in Kinros-shire.

Planning Conditions

If, despite representation, you are minded to approve the Craighead application, without recourse to a PLI (dependent on PKC's position?), I seek clarity on conditions relating to de-commissioning the site (how green are turbines when they end up in landfill at the end of their life?); peat destruction (UK has around 80% of world's peat resource) that should be avoided; noise (current guidelines on measurement are outdated and called into question by the UK government, so how practical would a condition be on this, as suggested in the applicant's report). Should PKC not object to this application or the neighbouring Brunt Hill proposal, thereby preventing the PLI I seek, an opportunity may exist to enforce native woodland planting as a condition.

Community Benefit

Much has been made of this by Kinross-shire's CCs rather than concentrating on the planning issues around windfarm proposals and what appears to be offered sounds inviting to hard-pressed communities but as I understand it, this feature is not a condition of planning but subject to negotiation if a windfarm is given approval?

I apologise for the length of this submission but such a 'major' application has to be seen in the broader context of the protection of our local hill landscapes that surround Loch Leven basin and its multiple environmental designations balanced against the transition to renewable energy sources and the debate is complex. I would hope to be afforded the opportunity to address the Planning & Placemaking Committee should sufficient valid objections be lodged, which I expect.

'SPECIAL' CHAS VISIT FROM EWAN MCGREGOR

CHAS HAS THANKED EWAN McGregor after he paid a special visit to Rachel House with his wife. Ewan was given a tour of the hospice before meeting five children with life-shortening conditions. He spent time chatting to their parents to learn more about their illnesses and later treated families, staff and volunteers to an impromptu sing-song in the lounge area.

Giving thanks to Ewan, Mr Okasha said: 'We were delighted to welcome Ewan back to Rachel House. Ewan is a long-time friend of CHAS, having first established a relationship with us in the 90s when Rachel House first opened. We are truly grateful to him for his continued support and for making the time for this special visit this week.

'Demand for our services is growing. Over the course of the last year CHAS directly supported 419 babies, children and young people across the country, and hundreds more in hospital palliative care teams funded by CHAS. We provide support for the whole family – parents and siblings – and have supported nearly 2000 family members of seriously ill children this year.'

Speaking after the visit, Ewan said: 'I was delighted to return to Rachel House in

Kinross to meet some of the children and families supported by the charity and hear first-hand about the amazing work CHAS does to help families of children with life-shortening conditions. It was also a privilege to meet the wonderful staff and volunteers at the hospice."

CHAS has just launched a new fundraising campaign entitled 'The Way We Care Appeal' which celebrates the dedication of CHAS nurses who have contributed over 80,000 hours of specialist care over the last year (April 1 2023 to 31 March 2024).

During the same period, bed night provision at the charity's two hospices, Rachel House in Kinross and Robin House in Balloch has increased by 43% while the number of hours of

outreach nursing care, which is provided in the homes of families, also rose by 45% during the same period.

These trends highlight CHAS hospices' growing capacity to provide essential care

and support to more children and their families across Scotland and reflect the need for the charity to significantly grow its fundraising income to meet the demand for services.

MANAGEMENT ACCOUNTANT



ASSET (a Community Benefit Society with charitable status) has been steadily growing its STEM educational outreach programme while planning for the creation of a family-oriented aerospace discovery centre in Kinross-shire ("Aero Space Kinross"). www.aerospacekinross.com

In addition to its own income generation and fundraising for both day-to-day STEM outreach activities, the society has been allocated UK Government funding within the context of the Tay Cities Region Economic Deal and a capital project grant award from the Gannochy Trust for the creation of a venue.

The society employs a bookkeeper with day-to-day financial administration practices in routine operation through Xero accounting software and its intromissions are subject to independent audit.

Our management accountant is changing career direction at this time, and we seek a replacement. The role involves primary oversight responsibility for the maintenance, updating and reporting of our financial records through Xero, plus preparation of budgets, business case projections and subsequent reporting to the ASSET board and our funders.

It is anticipated that approx. 5-10 hours per week will be required initially and that the time commitment will grow steadily over the next 12-18 months towards the creation of a full-time role. This work pattern could suit someone who is either looking to build up to a full-time role, or possibly someone who is retired but would like to help the society grow through the next stage of its evolution.

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
TOY SALE FOR LIGHT UP KINROSS





A 63-year-old male has been reported for dangerous driving following a collision in the Kinross area on 2 September.



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

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HAPPY 150th TO ST PAUL'S!

WHERE IN KINROSS CAN you find two illuminated saints standing side by side, memorials to the fallen and a daughter who drowned saving the life of another girl guide?

In need of another clue?

It has a bell named Lydia which hangs in a tower and rings loud and clear close to the hour, to hasten folks' footsteps to worship.

By now some may guess this refers to St Paul's on Muirs at its junction with Springfield Road. This wee Scottish Episcopal Church has all this and a great deal more to discover and explore inside. On weekends when Arts @ St Paul's exhibitions take place, and its doors stand open with an invitation to enter the response from so many who wander that way is T've lived in Kinross a long time, but I have never been in this little church before, and it is really beautiful'.

Well, despite its peeling paintwork caused by relentless ingress of water we also think it is beautiful!

A little about its history. The earliest Minutes of the Episcopal congregation in Kinross date from 1869 when services had begun to be held in the Town Hall. The congregation was then encouraged by their

Bishop to build a church. A plot of land on Muirs feued by Sir Graham Montgomery of Kinross House became the site for a simple church designed by the architect John Lessels. Since it was built and opened in 1874 it has become a local landmark as the town of Kinross has grown over the years.

The church building is grade B listed and contains some stunning stained glass from the 19th and 20th centuries. It also has a rich variety of Vestments and Altar Fronts designed to mark the different seasons of the church year. These were often bequests and memorials to past generations and families who founded it and were major contributors to its life.

Today it still contains a small congregation of people who do their best to care for each other and for others.

The 150th anniversary of the first service held in the church will be celebrated with two services in the church, both to be held on Sunday 6 October.

At 10am there wil be a Sung Eucharist at which the Bishop of St Andrews, Dunkeld and Dunblane, the Rt. Rev. Ian Paton, will preach.



Later that day, at 6.30pm, there will be Songs of Praise with readings accompanied by The Tullis Russell Community Brass Band and the music of the bagpipes.

On this special occasion the church will be filled with singing,

after which there will be light refreshments and an opportunity to view a small display in the meeting room.

Please come and have a good sing and join with us in our celebrations.

Now, with funding from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, the Partnership is setting up the very first series of Biodiversity Villages and Towns in Scotland so that these projects and many new ones can be community-led.

Focusing a suite of projects in one place also has a much greater impact on the environment itself.

There is a very real urgency to all this – there is a twin global emergency of climate change and biodi-

versity loss. We can't leave either of these issues for others to solve. We can all make a difference – individually, in a group, or in a community. And that's where the mapping session comes in. Everyone is welcome to come along on **Saturday 5 October** at the Millbridge Hall, Kinross, to find out more. Bring a friend or your family to enjoy a cup of tea and explore the maps and questionnaires which will highlight what wildlife we have in Kinross and how we can go about safeguarding it!

Beyond this first get-together, you can help to decide which core projects can be brought to the fore – and of course which organ-



isations to involve. The funding will cover not just the projects themselves, but also help raise awareness of existing local and national citizen science surveys that everyone, whatever their scale of knowledge, can get involved in.

Some of the projects will include:

- Pollinator Stepping Stones creating colourful plantings across town to help our bumblebees, butterflies and other pollinators thrive
- Save our Swifts ensuring these endangered Scottish-born birds still have places to breed.
- Mind the Gap creating Hedgehog Highways across gardens and greenspace - and raising awareness about gardening with wildlife in mind
- BeeWild creating simple Action Plans for encouraging our pollinators into school grounds, care home grounds and sheltered housing gardens

- Homes for Wildlife helping the nature around us find a home: tree sparrows, bats, barn owls and others

There is only funding available until the end of March 2025 so it is urgent to begin the process. However, it is hoped further funding will be found so that the project can run for at least 3-5 years.

No expert on wildlife? Well, no previous skills are necessary. If you can't plant trees then baking biscuits for an event would be very welcome! Want to do something on your own? There are bumblebees, butterflies and birds to count, there are plants to grow on to share. Storytellers and artists, clearing out



a pond, planting wildflowers, nurturing a fruit tree, learning a new skill such as pruning or scything – or sharing your knitting or sewing expertise to make pennants or woolly wildlife characters to display! There's room for everyone, whatever age, whatever ability, whatever interest.

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THE BIGGEST TANK BATTLE IN HISTORY

Terrible Casualties In Kursk Region

UKRAINE'S INCURSION — or whatever you want to call it — into the Kursk region of Russia, prompts me to remind *Newsletter* readers what an enormous battle was once fought there, with huge losses of tanks and thousands of men on both sides. Now, 80 years later, the region has again become a focal point following the Ukrainian surprise offensive catching Russian forces off-guard.

The WWII battle of Kursk is still regarded as the biggest tank battle in history. It took place between 5 July – 23 August 1943, lasting one month, two weeks and four days.

It was seen as Germany's last chance to regain any dominance on the Eastern Front during the Second World War but, despite a huge planned assault on Soviet troops, using heavy tanks, artillery and air power, delays by German dictator Adolf Hitler presented the Soviets with ample time to prepare.

The Soviets became aware of the German plans after the British at Bletchley Park cracked the Lorenz cipher, allowing them to read secret high-level German communications. Overhead the Luftwaffe and the Soviet Air Force battled for control of the skies – it is believed that between 5 and 8 July, the Soviet Air Force lost more than 500 aircraft.



On the ground, fighting took place at close range with opposing tanks manoeuvring amongst each other. The German plan to wipe out the Red Army, once and for all, failed – but not before both sides experienced appalling casualties. Look at these numbers and be amazed and horrified in equal measure.

Overall during the various phases of the six-week battle of Kursk, the Germans are believed to have lost 165,000 men, between 760 to 1,200 tanks, and 680 aircraft. The Red Army lost in the region of 600,000 troops and between 6,000 to 7,000 tanks. Specific numbers are still debated, but it is estimated that the Battle of Kursk caused around 800,000 Soviet casualties and 200,000 German casualties.

Re-read those numbers – they are simply staggering!

The battle of Kursk is considered as the biggest battle in the history of warfare, with the opening day aerial battles also thought to be the greatest losses of aircraft in a single day in history.

Now 80 years later, the Ukrainian armed forces have carried out a lightning incursion into the Kursk region, claiming to have secured more than 1200 sq km of land in this action after taking Moscow by surprise. This latest military action has resulted in large numbers of Russian troops being captured — a good bargaining tool to get Ukrainian prisoners back — and provided a much-needed morale boost for the Ukrainian armed forces and the wider population.



It is believed that Ukraine exploited a weakness in Russia's electronic warfare coverage along this section of the border, deploying interceptor drones to knock out Russian reconnaissance capabilities, and using short-range jammers to cover the attack.

This in turn prevented Russian artillery from targeting approaching Ukrainian forces, who used a variety of fast vehicles. It is understood that British-donated Challenger 2 main battle tanks have been used by the Ukrainian armed forces inside Russia's border. The use of such weapons has helped the Ukrainian Armed Forces seize areas, including the town of Sudzha. six miles from the border.

The former Commander of US Army Europe says he is confident Ukraine can continue retaking territory in its counter-offensive. Retired Lieutenant General Ben Hodges said has been 'impressed' by the 'underestimated Ukrainians'.

He added: 'The Russians underestimated the Ukrainians. Their ability to marshal forces to protect the information, I can only guess, is part of the reason they were so successful in surprising the Russians. Where, when and how they launched this counter-offensive shows the level of discipline is very good.'

KURSK is, once again, an area of massive conflict, loss of life and material on both sides. Military history repeats itself, time and again.

JT AND KEEP

KEEP OUR COMMUNITY WARM



THE SEASONS ARE TURNING and most of us are contemplating putting the heating on again. As it grows colder, once more we face the prospect of gas price increases in October, as international factors sway both the cost of gas, but also the price of electricity, despite the fact much less gas is now used for its generation.

Each year we pay over £4m as a community (Kinross & Milnathort) for the basic requirement of staying warm though this has been very volatile in the past few years, as will likely be the case looking forwards too. Over 20 years that is some £80m, ignoring inflation, extracted from our community, giving a good return to the shareholders of remote energy companies.

PKC, following the policy from ScotGov, are planning how to migrate to a NetZero carbon economy. Some people choose to ignore the link from carbon to the climate and the future wellbeing of our planet, but the fact is that renewables do now provide the lowest cost forms of energy, and their generation capacity is expanding quickly.

PKC has published plans in their Local Heat and Energy Efficiency Strategy (LHEES), presenting how heating of council owned buildings will lead the way in the migration to low carbon heat sources. New buildings will require to have such solutions embedded to be granted planning permission.

A significant challenge, not just to the PKC LHEES but afflicting the plans of all councils, is that most of the housing to meet future need in Scotland is already built and is owned by private house-holders. This implies a substantial retrofit burden, especially to bring houses constructed last century up to modern standards and reach compatibility with the new renewable technologies. It also presents a dilemma for government and councils, who cannot just impose costly solutions on property owners.

The PKC LHEES attempts to quantify the cost of of these upgrades across the region and estimates that 70% of houses will require, on average, £20K investment to bring them up to EPC C rating – a reasonable energy-efficiency standard. That is another £70m. Kinross and Milnathort have more big and older houses, which are harder to insulate and heat, so this will be an underestimate. The running assumption is that individual house holders will pay for their part of this. Grants are available for now, but we must remember that we pay for these through our taxes anyway.

After these efficiency measures, to install a low carbon heat source like an Air Source Heat Pump will require a further £13K average per house, about £40m in total. Like insulation, the cost replacing the conventional gas boiler will vary widely, on a house- by-house basis.

Given this investment, the housing stock will gradually convert to running off electricity rather than gas, reducing both carbon emissions and energy needs. However, including the cost of that borrowing, the likely impact is that the cost of heating our homes over a 20-year period will be about double compared to today.

Those who have spare capital or can move quickly can grab an advantage. Those without will likely be left behind in the energy revolution that is coming.

As a result, it is likely that the ScotGov and PKC strategies will not achieve their NetZero ambitions in a timely manner. The cumulative impact on the climate will continue to grow. Rather than reducing fuel poverty, where too much of monthly income is spent on energy, the burden on some householders will be signficant with a real prospect of embedding further social injustice.

There are plenty of historical examples where monopoly rights associated with essential utilities have been granted to commercial enterprises for the benefit of a few and to the long-term disadvantage of many. The Gas network, the GPO, water, electricity, railways – it is an extensive list. Essential services, that everybody needs, are different to a company which exploits a great technology idea and creates a new market where consumers have real purchasing choice.

What Can Be Done?

THE COMMUNITY GROUP CATCH-LochLeven (Climate Action Through Community Heating), has been exploring options to provide low-cost, low-carbon energy for heating across our community, by working locally together. This is commonplace in Denmark where they are seeking to raise the number of houses connected to District Heating Networks (DHN) from 70% to 80%, where in this country the penetration is under 10%.

The Danes are clear about the benefits. Resilient energy can be provided, for use directly in existing house systems without substantial retrofit disruption or connection expense. Emissions are instantly reduced as each property connects. The latest technology can be adopted centrally keeping the entire network up to date and increasing reliability.

Perhaps the most important benefit is that by investing in infrastructure of scale, 'fuel' costs, whether gas or electricity, are replaced with fixed capital costs. This enables stability and predictability to be passed on in consumer pricing, and usefully removes the impact of inflation on much of the cost makeup. Over 20 years simple inflation might add 50% to fuel costs. Gradually as the 'mortgage' completes, assets become owned by the com-





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
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munity. The Danes have proven a modern DHN should provide the lowest cost of energy to a community.

The graph gives an indication of what is possible, dependent on accessing good long-term finance, where PKC has a strong track record. Interest rates, and security concerns, are higher for individual households – a clear advantage for working together.

DHNs require pipes in the ground to deliver heat to each house with energy centre(s) that provide that energy. Configured appropriately, connecting to the scheme is simple, with an existing household gas boiler being replaced with a similar sized heat exchange unit. Major insulation programmes and disruption to replace existing radiators can be avoided, along with the £100m plus expense to our community. Once built, the DHN will last many decades, long past the memory of any disruption as the pipes are installed.

The net result of this is that district heating, by keeping energy prices down, can provide a way of keeping substantial wealth within local households and businesses. There are subsequently beneficial knock-ons, as that wealth is then is spent in the local shops and leisure facilities – providing local jobs.

At CATCH, we are currently working with PKC to examine the best options for a DHN in Kinross and Milnathort. We have many good choices for energy sources. Our priority is clarifying how to best to invest and grow the scheme beyond just the High School, Swimming Pool and Health Centre, as identified in LHEES.

This would go a long way to help the Council to achieve its objectives, including poverty reduction, growing the economy and moving quickly on the necessary green transition.

NO DAHLIA-DALLYING FOR GEORGE!

SEPTEMBER IS ALWAYS a busy time for Milnathort's George Reid, who is quickly establishing a reputation as one of the UK's top dahlia exhibitors. George, who grows over 500 dahlia plants in his garden, is a regular competitor at the UK's top three dahlia competitions which are held at the National Show in London, the Scottish National in Leven and the Northern National at Newby Hall, near Harrogate, which all take place in the first two weeks of September every year.

We caught up with George as he was preparing for the more local Fife Flower Show, held in Leven on the 21 and 22 September.

George has been 'growing for exhibition' on and off since he was a boy, introduced to the hobby by his father. It was, however, when he settled in Milnathort in 2008 that his passion for exhibition dahlias really took off. He's been growing them seriously now for 15 years.

There are about ten forms of dahlia that are grown widely for exhibition across a spectrum of sizes – ranging from the giant flowered 'dinner plate' dahlias that can extend to over 14 inches in diameter all the way down to the 'dinky' pompoms that are only two inches across. George grows 'across the board' which allows him to enter what is referred to as the 'Individual' Championship class at the national shows, usually considered the pinnacle of the hobby and the most challenging and dif-

ficult class to enter. He still, though, has a bias towards 'miniature flowered' varieties which carry blooms that are up to four inches across. That is where he started his 'dahlia career' and they allow him to enter the championship classes for those types.

It has been a challenging year following the usually cool summer period, which meant his dahlias ran a bit later than normal. As a result, he was disappointed to miss out

on the London show this year where he was due to defend the national title class he won last year. However, George made up for this disappointment with very successful visits to the Scottish Championships and the Northern National Shows, coming second at both in the difficult Individual Championship class. The icing on the cake, however, came in the form of wins at both shows in the miniature flowered championship classes. George already has plans to tweak his growing plan to help improve his dahlias for next year.

As well as his own exhibition exploits, he is passionate about developing the next generation of exhibitors and working with the Scottish National Chrysanthemum and Dahlia Society, launched the Scottish Dahlia School in 2023. This initiative,

designed to encourage newcomers to the hobby and help existing novice growers develop to the next level, is already bearing fruit with a number of participants showing real promise.

George is indebted to his long-suffering wife for all her help in growing and showing his dahlias as well as his neighbours for putting up with the covers that protect his blooms from the inclement weather.

When we spoke to George, the 2024 season was almost at an end with only Fife and Grangemouth shows to come. We wish him well!

I HAVE been working with officers, Lynne McKay of Kinross CC and Eileen Thomas to get the upgrade work done at Davies Park. Below is an extract from an email I received from Nick Riley (PKC officer):

Lynne has been excellent in driving this project and introducing new members of the community that have provided valuable input into certain elements of the process. Eileen Thomas has provided every detail relating to the site history, even the specific trains that used to run on the lines that once passed through this site. Ultimately this gave us the theme for the new facility upgrade, that of a train play house and train track symbols with hopscotch and even a train-station themed sign with some old museum photos of the former station 'Kinross Junction' once on the very same site.

The community members involved have been very patient and provided valuable input into the scheme and we are very grateful for this.

Regarding Scotlandwell Play Park, I understand that the work is going out to tender week commencing 16 September, so hopefully we will see work starting here soon!

Perth Buildings and Parking

THE COUNCIL held a full-day meeting on 4 September. The main topics for discussion were a review of some of the public buildings in Perth.

Pullar House and Kinnoull Street Car Park.

PULLAR HOUSE (PH) sits on Kinnoull Street in Perth adjacent to the multi-storey car park. It houses many of the council departments and the customer service centre.

Both sites were secured using a Public Finance initiative contract

linked to inflation many years ago. This had meant the Council were paying up to £3 million a year to keep them.

A break clause in the contract allowed the Council to purchase the buildings outright.

A Council policy formalising hybrid-working requires staff to come into the office two days a week.

Previously this had been five days. This change has reduced office space needs. Councillors instructed officers to create a business case acquiring both Pullar House and Kinnoull Street car park. The guidance given to officers was to find other public services who would share the space and costs, thereby making the acquisition of the buildings affordable.

I am pleased to say that officers managed to sign up enough public bodies to take up all the space not required by the Council, so the unanimous decision was reached quickly.

The acquisition of Kinnoull Street car park should enable better use by PH users and also the public as fears of seemingly random parking tickets is removed.

Perth Leisure Pool and Dewars Centre

THE DEBATE on Perth Leisure Pool and the Dewars Centre was a more protracted and difficult debate. In essence the officer's proposal was to build a new, smaller pool in the Thimblerow car park, demolish the old pool and Dewars Centre and build affordable housing on the then vacant site. This would have removed 509 car parking spaces from Perth.

The SNP administration put in an amendment which effectively proposed leasing the Dewars Centre buildings and some of the existing car parking to the curling community, to allow them to run it as a curling facility, but still build the new, smaller pool at Thimblerow. The number of car parking spaces lost under this proposal reduced to approximately 330.

Throughout the debate, I was trying to establish whether this proposal would leave enough car parking in the centre of Perth. It turned out that a detailed car park analysis had not been done since 2017 and the assumption was that changing how Kinnoull Street car park worked would then provide enough parking for the City centre to thrive (including the £27 million museum).

I take the view that footfall is paramount to a city centre's survival and cutting out car parking gives people excuses to visit places for leisure and shopping with more and better parking. Cars have increased in size when many spaces have not and many people do not like using multi-storey car parks. I also take the view that Kinross folk have been travelling to the Perth Leisure Pool to give their kids a day out (I did this when my kids were younger). Providing a pool in Perth which offers similar facilities currently available at Loch Leven Leisure seems to duplicate what Kinross folks helped raise funds for, with no improved offering.

So I voted for the Labour amendment, which proposed building a new leisure pool and ice pad at the Glover Street site.

In the end, the SNP motion won with the support of the Liberal Democrats, so the new smaller pool will be built on the Thimblerow car park.

Bells Sports Centre

DURING LAST year's floods, Bells Sports centre was flooded, and a great deal of damage was caused. The Council took the view that the building was beyond repair and decided to demolish it. However, the powers that be decided that the building had architectural merit and should be listed. Given this new situation, officers recommended stripping the building back to the listed elements and to turn it into an unheated event space. This recommendation was carried.

Dentistry Provision

450550. They co-ordinate NHS dental care locally and often can provide details of dental surgeries who are accepting NHS patients.

I actually think that anyone who has a proven need for either dental care or medical care, such as a hip or knee replacement, and who can't get treatment on the NHS, should be able to have it done privately and reclaim the costs from the NHS. More and more people are being forced to pay for operations because of the pain they are in and just can't wait the two to three years to receive treatment.

Overgrown Bushes

THIS IS THE time of year to check that you don't have vegetation such as bushes and tree branches overgrowing on to pavements outside your house. Obstructed pavements can make life difficult for those who are visually impaired or who are pushing prams.


Leisure & Sports Facilities Perth

THERE WAS a very important paper discussed at last months' meeting of Perth and Kinross Council regarding the future of sports provision in Perth.

This at a time when funding for local government is reducing and the Council's capital budget is under great strain – there have been very big cost overruns on projects like the Cross Tay Link Road. To be brought up to modern standards Perth Leisure Pool was estimated to require a spend of £70 million over the next 40 years with a loan charge of £3.1 million per annum and an operating subsidy of £1.2 million per year. There are currently large parts of the facility that can't be used due to structural issues. It was decided therefore to build a completely new leisure pool on the site of the Thimblerow car park. This would require the same operating subsidy of £1.2 million, but the capital cost would reduce to £61 million and the repayment of the loan would be £2.7 million per annum. The more money that the Council pays out in operating subsidies and loan charges the less it has to employ teachers and social services staff. It was also agreed that a long term lease of the existing Dewars Centre be explored with the curling community to safeguard the future of ice sports in Perth.

The advantages of the options chosen were that neither Perth Leisure Pool or Dewars would need to be closed during the expected five years it will take to create the new facilities.

Sustainable Travel

I WAS DELIGHTED to join the first 'service 23' Glenfarg Community Transport Group bus running from Kinross to Tillicoultry and back, on the morning of Monday 2 September. I was joined by Cllr Dave



Cuthbert, GCTG Chair Drew Smart, Tony Lamb from Fossoway Community Council and most importantly Geoff Christie our driver. I would encourage people to try the new enhanced service.

Active Travel

I WAS ALSO delighted to see the Kinross-shire and Glenfarg Active Travel Masterplan adopted at the last Kinross-Shire Committee, there were two small amendments proposed, they were both accepted. One included the acceptance of a potential active travel route through the Glenfarg Tunnels.

As part of the masterplan there are several recommended interventions listed, these generally fall into a number of categories.

Kinross-Shire-Wide Interventions, such as

- Creating an active travel mapping tool.
- Design and development of safe routes to school.
- Improved signage for active travel routes.

Active Travel Routes

- Building high quality active travel routes between key settlements such as Kinross, Milnathort, Crook of Devon, Glenfarg and Kinnesswood.
- Cross-boundary routes have also been proposed between Kinross-shire and the neighbouring local authorities of Fife and Clackmannanshire.
- Connecting the potential network of active travel routes in Kinross-shire and Glenfarg to the Perthshire equivalent, through the Glenfarg Tunnels.

Active Travel Junction/ Crossing Improvements, including

- Improvements to existing junction and crossing facilities, including junction re-design at the Kinross M90 junction.
- Priority crossings for active travel users.
- Relocation of existing crossing points within key settlements and the identification of new crossing facilities.
- Controlled road crossings, dropped kerbs and tactile paving throughout key settlements.


Community Active Travel Facilities, including

- Mobility Hubs at key locations in the area, allowing seamless connections between active travel and local bus services.
- Cycle storage facilities in Kinross and other key locations throughout the area.

Travel Behaviour Change, including

• Cycle training events for adults and children.





- Bike buses for children getting to schools.
- The Heritage Trail around Loch Leven was highlighted as being an ideal asset in helping to deliver some of these interventions.

Parking and Road Network Improvement throughout the area including

- · Formalisation of parking areas.
- · Traffic calming measures.
- Improved road network that will benefit all road users.

The Masterplan looked at prioritising these interventions into three phases, with phase one creating a list of projects that could be termed as quick win. This shouldn't stop the Kinross-shire Committee asking for a project in Phase 2 or 3 to be progressed, if funding was available.

The progress that has been made with the Masterplan should put Kinross-shire in a strong position to access Active Travel funding going forward. However, there is still a lot of work to do to ensure the vision within the masterplan is achieved. This will require strong community involvement alongside Tactran and council involvement plus the political willpower to move the bigger projects forward.

Tactran are already considering the Kinross-shire masterplan alongside their Regional Active Travel Masterplan (ATM) and aligning this with the councils priorities, moves to include these projects in a proposed 'pipeline of active travel projects' within the council are already underway. These moves are key in ensuring that the Kinross-shire and Glenfarg projects are in the best position to bid for any Active Travel funding going forward.

and the devastation that this mindless act would cause the farmer. I understand that at some point between Monday, 8 July, and Wednesday, 31 July, 2024, 20 ewes and 20 lambs were taken from the area. Obviously moving 40 sheep is no quick task, so it may well have been witnessed locally. I would urge anyone with any information about this to come forward and contact Police Scotland on 101, quoting reference *CR/0329442/24*. Alternatively, you can call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

In slightly happier news, I was pleased to be able to attend the Fossoway Gathering once again this year. Community events like the Fossoway Gathering are rarer and rarer these days, so it is always great to see the community coming together and celebrating in this way. Also in attendance was Lord Lieutenant Stephen Leckie, who impressed locals in his full regalia. I am sure that all those in attendance will want to thank organisers for the significant effort that they put into ensuring a good day was had by all, and I already have the date for next year in my diary – 6 September 2025!

By the time you read this column, we will be well into autumn and the colours of our natural environment will be changing once again. I love this time of year around Loch Leven and enjoy the many species that this time of the year brings, particularly the expected nearly 20,000 pink-footed geese which call Loch Leven their home over the autumn and winter period. IT IS JUST OVER a year since the Scottish Government finally announced that a public inquiry would take place into the disgraced former neurosurgeon Sam Eljamel previously employed at NHS Tayside. This decision followed relentless



and inspiring campaigning from former patients for a period of over a decade. So, one year on, it is an appropriate time to provide readers with an update on where the case is at now.

Firstly, the dates of two meetings have been announced to allow victims the first opportunity to listen and raise questions about how the public inquiry will be conducted. Both the chair of the inquiry, Lord Weir, and senior counsel, Jamie Dawson KC, will be present at the in-person meeting on October 7 and the virtual meeting on October 10. These meetings are available for patients, their families, and interested parties, and I would encourage those with questions about the inquiry's proceedings to apply for tickets. I am relieved that patients finally have this opportunity, as so far the process has been slow, and given the nature of Eljamel's butchery, many of the patients worry that the longer the process drags on the more their health will decline.

Secondly, there are other key steps the Scottish Government needs to take while the inquiry is ongoing. It was revealed in the Courier newspaper that, to date, the Scottish Government has not had any engagement with the Libyan authorities despite the evidence we have which shows Eljamel is still practising on patients abroad. I raised this at First Minister's questions in September, and it is my understanding that the Health Secretary is now exploring options to open talks with Libyan authorities. It is important this is prioritised urgently as I cannot begin to imagine the frustration of former patients – whose lives were changed forever by Eljamel – to see that he is continuing to operate on even more patients unchecked.

At the recent Holyrood Political Awards 2024 I chose to dedicate my award as 'Political Hero of the Year' to the lead campaigners, Jules Rose and Pat Kelly, and the other former patients of Eljamel. Their unwavering drive to secure answers led us to where we are at present. This award is a strong reflection on just how seriously the public, particularly those living in the NHS Tayside area, take interest in this scandal. They expect answers as to why this health board failed to keep them safe and why at every turn they tried to sweep the whole saga under the rug.

As always, if you have not yet come forward, but believe you are a victim of Eljamel, then please contact my office and I can put you in touch with lead campaigner Jules Rose.

SINCE MY LAST COLUMN, I was delighted to see that the Glenfarg Community Transport Group (GCTG) have launched a new 23 bus service, connecting Kinross to Tillicoultry.



The 23 bus goes through the original

route — including Blairingone, Powmill and Crook of Devon — which served the community for over 90 years, before it was sadly withdrawn in 2021.

This follows on from the resounding success of GCTG's 55 bus service, which started off running between Glenfarg and Kinross, and has since been extended to Perth.

GCTG set an initial target of 250 passengers per week for the 55 service, which they quickly smashed, and the bus now carries roughly 1,000 passengers per week.

The service has been such a success that GCTG went on to win 'Best Bus Service' at this year's Scottish Transport Awards.

I was delighted to pay a visit to GCTG over the summer to congratulate them on this fantastic achievement, which is reconnecting communities and providing a lifeline service to residents living along the route, all whilst tackling social isolation and promoting sustainable travel.

The introduction of these routes has been in partnership with Perth and Kinross Council (PKC), which I believe we will see be used as a framework across other local authorities in Scotland to better connect rural areas.

In related news, I was pleased to see that PKC have renewed their initiative to allow shoppers and visitors to enjoy free bus travel on the first Saturday of every month.

People can take advantage of the offer for journeys within Perth and Kinross, provided by local bus operators, Stagecoach, Glenfarg Community Transport, Docherty Midland Coaches, Elizabeth Youth and Sweeney's minibuses on the following Saturdays:

- 5 October 2024
- 2 November 2024
- 7 December 2024
- 4 January 2025
- 1 February 2025
- 1 March 2025

Passengers who have a free U22, 60+ or disabled concessionary bus pass should use their bus pass as normal to travel.

In December alone last year, almost 22,000 people took advantage of free bus travel Saturday, which saved almost £54,000 in fares and potentially over 3500 car journeys.

Faced with the threat of the climate crisis, initiatives such as this play a vital role in ensuring Scotland reduces its vehicles emissions and reaches its net-zero targets.

Not to mention, it cuts travel costs for working people during what are undoubtedly financially challenging times. It really is a win-win, which I hope readers will enjoy making use of.

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AS THE SEASON is most definitely changing, I'm sharing a delicious autumnal recipe from my new cookbook, 'Kith – seasonal Scottish food for family and friends'. It's a showstopping dessert, with a fantastic sweet and savoury flavour.

It is deceptively simple to make and works really well if you can't decide between pudding and cheese. Anjou or Rocha pears work well, as does the very British Conference, although I find that their shape isn't quite so pleasingly plump and dense as



the others. Don't use very ripe pears, as they won't hold during the roasting. Use the best quality local runny honey for this (and all your recipes featuring honey): the flavour is all important, so a generic supermarket version, which is really just blended syrup, won't work.

Cloverlea Apiaries is stocked all over Kinross-shire and their wide range of honey will definitely have something delicious just perfect for this recipe.

PEARS WITH HONEY CARAMEL, OAT CRUMBLE AND BLUE CHEESE

SERVES 4

175g runny honey
300ml double cream
3 tbsp unsalted butter
1 tsp sea salt
100g rolled oats
70g walnuts, chopped
4 almost ripe pears
1 tbsp light soft brown sugar
75g blue cheese, like Strathdon
or Blue Murder

Preheat the oven to 200°C (fan). Make the caramel by adding the honey, double cream and 2 tbsp butter into a pan and cooking on a low heat for 10 minutes. Remove and add the sea salt. Warm the rest of the butter (you'll have 1 tbsp left) in a pan, add the oats and fully coat them with the butter. Cook them for a few minutes. When the oats are



crisp, add the chopped walnuts and toast for a few minutes.

Wash and cut the pears in half lengthwise and use a small teaspoon to remove the core and the stem. Then slice a little disc off the fattest edge of each to allow them to sit securely when baking. Place them in a roasting dish, sprinkled with the sugar, and bake for 12–15 minutes. Remove and cool for a couple of minutes before drizzling over the caramel and sprinkling with the oaty crumble, then breaking up the blue cheese over the top. Serve with another drizzle of honey and enjoy while still warm.

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

Fossoway Community Council News from the September Meeting

Present at the meeting on 3 September were CCIIrs A Carter, A Cheape, T Lamb, N Marchant, G Pye and K Williamson; CCIIr C Farquhar; CIIrs N Freshwater, W Robertson and R Watters and 12 MoP.

Apologies: CCllrs S Bruce-Jones & D Cuthbert; PC Samson. **Declarations of Interest**: CCllr Cheape declared an interest in Planning Application *24/01049/IPL*.

Community Police Report: From 6 August 2024 (last meeting) there have been approximately 41 calls to the Police from the Fossoway area and one crime recorded on Police systems. We are aware of missing sheep being reported from Middleton Farm – this is in the process of being reported as a theft.

Matters Arising:

ECU00004654 Brunt Hill Windfarm: The developers had asked to meet with the CC to respond to concerns raised in our objection and to discuss community benefit. The CC responded that community benefit discussions should be carried out with the joint CC Sustainability Group. PKC have advised that they expect to discuss this application at their Planning and Placemaking Committee meeting in October or November. We are still waiting to hear if the CC can make a deposition.

Craighead Windfarm (search for 24/01193/FLM at: https://planningapps.pkc.gov.uk/online-applications/)

The Craighead windfarm planning application has been submitted to PKC. Anyone wishing to comment should do so via the PKC planning portal before the 27 September. The CC has an agreed extension to 25 October and will consult with the community on our proposed response at 1 Oct CC meeting. It is the intention of the CC to object to this planning application along similar grounds as our objection to the Brunt Hill windfarm.

The responsible PKC Planning Officer has advised that the Planning and Placemaking Committee will consider the cumulative impact on the landscape of both applications, even if they are reviewed separately.

Community Development Trust

Trust members met on 20 August and minutes can be found on the Trust's website https://fossowaytrust.com/

The 'Your Voice Matters' community survey is active. Please take time to complete this as at least 400 responses are required to be able to say to funders that the Trust is the voice of the community. Results will be used to create the Community Action Plan and inform both LDP3 and our new Local Place Plan. The outcome of the survey will be shared at a Community Drop-in Event on 17 November between 2 and 5pm in Crook of Devon Village Hall.

Road Safety In FDCC Area Including A977 Mitigation Measures

Road Improvement Projects in Ward & Kinross-shire:

The proposed 20mph speed limits in our villages were discussed at the recent Kinross-shire Committee meeting. It was noted that we were the only Kinross-shire CC who had provided written feedback to PKC. In response to this the PKC Officer has driven through our villages to look again at the proposals, and we are awaiting their feedback.

There was a suggestion from a MoP that PKC should conduct a

survey of HGVs, and request updates to signage to encourage HGVs to use the M90 instead of the A977. There was agreement that drivers are normally led by their GPSs instead of signs, and in any case economics dictate shortest routes.

There is now Scottish Government legislation in force, which will allow Councils to implement bans on parking on pavements. PKC are planning a soft launch of sites where they are either putting in yellow lines to prevent on street parking or exemptions to the ban on parking on pavements. At the Kinross-shire Committee meeting it was agreed that PKC Officers will produce a similar schedule to the 20mph maps for review.

Some items on our priority list for road improvements are not yet implemented, particularly in Carnbo. The CC requested local Councillors to discuss this when they next meet the Highways Department.

MoP from Blairingone asked whether a bus shelter could be provided now that there is actually a bus service.

Fossoway Area Transport – 23 Bus Service & Community Bus

The new 23 bus service, run by Glenfarg Community Transport Group, began on 2 September. Timetables can be accessed at https://glenfargct.co.uk/timetable/ The 'Transit: Live Bus & Tube Times' app can be used to view the location of the buses.

Seamab School Construction Work

CCllr Marchant wrote to PKC's Planning Enforcement Officers and Safer Communities Department regarding the issues raised by residents.

Planning enforcement officers have advised that they have received an email which alleged that there was work ongoing after 1pm on a Saturday. They have responded to the enquirer to the effect that they didn't consider there to be sufficient evidence of a material breach of the condition yet, but to keep a log and pass it to them directly if there was a recurring breach or a recurring pattern. They have also spoken to Jean McKinnon and Stuart Provan at the school, as well as having received an email from the builder (ALGO) to the effect that they are aware of the restrictions on the development.

PKC Safer Communities have spoken to Police Scotland. CCIIr Marchant has agreed with Safer Communities that any issues relating to the residents and the school should be reported to the Safer Communities Team: SCT@pkc.gov.uk

Local residents met with the builders on 22 August. There were a number of people from Rumbling Bridge, but no one from the school was present. There was concern that locations of septic

tanks, or plans for surface water were not determined. These matters would normally have been agreed before Planning and/or Building Warrants were granted. It appears to the local residents that many of the Planning Conditions are not being enforced. Local Cllrs explained that SEPA would be responsible for approving drainage arrangements. CCllr Marchant stressed that SCT should be contacted with any concerns about safety of children, etc.

Crook Moss Travellers Site

Cllr Robertson will ask for a litter pick to be done at the site.

New Business

SSEN Fund: Has money available to 'green' Village Halls. Although applications are currently closed, they will open again in May. The CDT is going to construct an application in partnership with the Village Halls.

Warm Space Fund: Will be open again soon, it is proposed to hold a monthly Warm Space event in Moubray Hall.

PKC Maintenance of Open Spaces: Mowing and maintenance of our open spaces has come up on our agenda in the past and was discussed at the recent Kinross-shire committee meeting where the Officers referred to a location map which explains what maintenance there will be at each location. The Crook and Drum Growing Together group are in touch with PKC regarding rewilding and mowing areas. www.pkc.gov.uk/article/18659/Map-of-parks-and-open-spaces

CCIIr Bruce-Jones reported that there was a very good presentation from Kirsteen Ross of the Kinross-shire Trishaws and Community Cycling Charity https://www.facebook.com/KinrossTrishaws/ They have a number of initiatives that support active travel for all abilities including learn to ride, school bus bike, community cycling and cycle tourism, covering all of Kinross-shire. This fits in neatly with the launch of the Kinross-shire Active Travel Masterplan, see www.pkclimateaction.co.uk/active-travel

Road Gully Clearance: The CC has received a PKC report on past road gully cleansing which shows the challenges faced by PKC in maintaining 46,610 gullies. As targeted cleansing was not effective and global annual cleansing was not achievable, the following operational regime for cleaning was implemented in 2019: A Class and flood susceptible roads annually; Manholes every three years; 100% clean by ward biennially.

Ditch clearing was, until the early 2000s, carried out on an approximate 10-year cycle. Reductions in budget and staffing resource has resulted in no proactive ditch clearing taking place and limited reactive cleaning since 2008, with only problem locations cleared when resources are available.

Cllr Robertson suggested that the CC should write to the Kinross-Shire Committee saying that gully cleaning and ditch clearance, grit bins, gritting plan, grit spreaders and Powmill burn are very important to us. Cllr Watters added that the CC should ask for the gully paper to be put on the Kinross-shire committee agenda.

Consultations

The significant workload associated with the wind farm applications means that the CC will not be responding to any consultations until December 2024.

The CC did however respond to the consultation on the proposed felling of commercial woodlands at Middleton Farm, thanking them for consulting us and asking for confirmation that access for walkers will be maintained, biodiversity, historic environment and private water supplies protected.

CC Business - meetings attended

CCIIr Bruce-Jones 15 August Kinross-shire Committee.

CCIIr Lamb 27 August familiarisation run with bus drivers; 29 August Stronger Communities; 2 September Bus launch.

CCIIr Cheape Kinross Fund, there were no valid applications.

Councillors' Reports

Clir Robertson There will be a Full Council meeting on 4 September where two major papers will be discussed: Perth City future developments for the next 20 to 30 years; Future of Sports Facilities in Perth, there will be no facilities for curling and only a leisure pool when the current facilities close.

Clir Watters Pullar House is a PFI development and PKC can buy it back at market rates, so the proposal is to do that and then sub-let some of it to other organisations. There are now over 50 Resilience Groups in P&K and there are plans to create an organisation to help them share ideas.

Planning Matters

Local Place Plan

PKC have provided us with a link to the website for the local place plan toolkit which is free for the first 12 months. https://www.parish-online.co.uk/services/community-map-scotland
The CDT is leading on the Community Action Plan and the CC on the Local Place Plan which will be a map of the outcome of the Community Action Plan plus views from the community on areas suitable for development or areas to retain as open space. CCllr Williamson will be leading this project. Planning Aid Scotland has offered to help.

The CC has agreed with PKC that we will not discuss settlement boundaries as they will do this with developers once they have our plan. The aim is to showcase the mapping tool at the Trust Community Event on 17 November where the outcome of the Community Action Plan survey will be shared and the community will vote for priority projects. The CC will then host meetings in each settlement to discuss their individual maps.

Planning Applications

24/01294/FLL Extension to dwellinghouse at Craighead House Drum Kinross. No CC comment.

24/01049/IPL Mixed use development comprising erection of retail/manufacturing/warehouse, mixed use business/commercial units, community garden and hut, vehicular access and parking, SUDS pond and associated works (in principle) at Land 90 metres south-west of Garvellach Drum, Kinross. The CC will object on the grounds that although we are in favour of rural development, this is designated open space contrary to LDP2.

24/01194/IPL Renewal of permission 21/01177/IPL (residential development (in principle)) at Land 40 metres north-west of Ladieshall, Vicar's Bridge Road, Blairingone. No CC comment. 24/01193/FLM Erection of 8 turbine windfarm and associated

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works at Land 1.5Km north-east of Earnieside Farmhouse, Dunning Glen, Dollar.

The CC has sought an extension to 25 October to allow community engagement and time to read the 177 documents. It is proposed that our response to the Brunthill application will form the basis of our response. In addition the CC has requested that both applications are reviewed at the same PKC Planning and Placemaking Committee to ensure the overall impact on the landscape is carefully considered.

Planning Decisions

24/00597/FLL Change of use of agricultural land to storage yard (Class 6), erection of storage building and installation of shipping containers for temporary storage use, formation of vehicular access, erection of fencing and associated works at Land 60 metres north-west of Woodbine Cottage, Drum. The application was refused; the CC had made a neutral comment on grounds of insufficient information regarding use of the field and access from the B9097.

24/01027/FLL Extension to dwellinghouse at Glenside, Naemoor Road, Crook of Devon. The application was approved; the CC had made no comment.

24/00744/FLL Erection of a dwellinghouse and associated works at Land 250 Metres south-west of Broomhill House, Station Road, Crook of Devon. The appeal was refused on the grounds that it was not in character with the surroundings and did not meet criteria for building on a brown field site. The CC had objected.

The next meeting and AGM of Fossoway and District CC will be held on Tuesday 1 October at 7.30pm Crook of Devon Village Hall.

Police Report

Crimes of note (since last meeting)

05/08/2024 Theft of number plates for vehicle (Kinross Park and Ride).

10/08/2024 Dangerous driving (Station Road, Kinross) MO – Drive vehicle at excessively high speed with multiple pedestrians being present.

15/08/2024 - 19/08/2024 Theft of pedal cycle (Kinross Primary School).

Whilst on mobile patrol on the High Street, Kinross, on 12 August, traffic officers had cause to stop a vehicle which was found to have no insurance. The driver was also reported for driving whilst being disqualified and attempting to pervert the course of justice.



On Saturday 12 October 2024, Constables Samson and Duncan are holding a community drop-in session in their community van. The purpose is for people to drop in for a chat about any issues in the local area, what they wish from local Police or just a general chat. There are no appointments necessary. They will be based at the Campus with proposed times from 10am hours to 2pm. More details will be shared on their social media pages closer to the time.

On Saturday 10 August 2024, PC Ben Samson and Sgt Mark Craig from Kinross Community Policing Team were delighted to be out supporting the Kinross Show. The organisers put on a fantastic event which was well supported by the local community.

Matters Arising

Safety Concerns at La Casanova/The Tartan Kipper. No update was available due to CCllr Mckay's absence.

Community Action Plan

CCIIr Freeman advised that while he had contacted Laura Martin, he had not received a response. He will chase again for an update.

KCC Website

CCIIr Leslie advised that KCC had not finalised discussions so she will continue to email Mrs Phillips (*Newsletter* Editor) to make changes and continue as is.

BCA Site

It was noted that the site had been cleared temporarily with Cllr Watters advising that two objections to the flood works were still pending. This could mean that the case goes to a local hearing which could in turn add time to the process.

Community Investment Fund

CCIIr S Wells advised that she had forwarded the information to Millbridge Hall.

Double Yellow Lines at the Primary School

CCIIr Leslie advised that she had contacted the local MSP who had advised that the request was in the works plan and it was a matter of waiting. She will raise the issue at the next school meeting on 10 September.

A member of the public commented that double yellow lines would only be successful if they were monitored regularly and asked how often this would happen. CCllr Leslie advised that she had been informed that traffic wardens would visit regularly with Cllr D Cuthbert advising that the situation would be monitored if and when asked.

Community Council Boundaries Old Mart Lane/Old Mart Wynd

Members were advised that Milnathort and Orwell CC had been in touch to advise that both Old Mart Wynd and Old Mart Lane appeared to have been moved into the Kinross CC area in error, despite agreeing to this move some years ago.

MOCC advised they had requested that this be corrected with PKC but in order to ensure that they are not 'poaching' territory, it was required to be minuted and agreed by us at a KCC meeting. It was agreed that Old Mart Wynd and Old Mart Lane should be moved back into MOCC and CCIIr Mckay was asked to respond.

CCIIr Willsher asked if it were possible to get an up-to-date map showing the CC boundaries and CIIr R Watters advised that once the Milnathort situation was updated the maps should be automatically updated, however he would ask the Planning Department to update the map.

Kinross Town Centre

Parking At Tennis Courts/Station Road

It is hoped that the double yellow lines mentioned earlier in the meeting will help to resolve this issue, although it is unclear how far along Station Road these would go.

Community Council News

Old Cleish Road Development

Cllr W Robertson advised that there had been a meeting earlier that week to discuss the situation where the fence is blocking a right of way. It was noted that planners had classed the land as for employment use and therefore it is unlikely that they acted. Cllr Robertson advised that a special order against the developer to force them to act had been raised, and if the developer does not adhere to this, they could receive a substantial fine.

It is planned to meet with the land owner this week and whilst they had previously ignored PKC letters, they now realise the seriousness of the matter.

A member of the public commented that the planning enforcement notice had been raised because of the land use but it is now more than one year since work was done. They had been told that it was a complex case but no further information was available. Cllr Robertson commented that PKC were risk averse and that was why it had taken so long to get to this stage. Cllr N Freshwater advised that the special order had forced the landowner to apply for planning permission.

CCIIr Wilsher said that PKC had taken legal action which specified conditions that had to be met (Section 71 which protects the amenity and public access) and that the development itself is not something anything could be done about.

A member of the public raised concerns that there were three HGV companies on site, none of which had the appropriate licence, and work was taking place from early morning to late at night. Cllr Robertson advised the concerned residents to write to enforcement officers at PKC with a list of conditions and concerns.

A member of the public also enquired about the South Kinross flood defence scheme, which covers this area and asked if the work would have an impact and whether, at some point, the work could be joined up. Cllr Freshwater advised that the area would be excluded from the flood defence work.

Cllr Robertson reiterated that residents should write to enforcement officers (Sean Panton and Mark Dunlop), copying the Councillors, their MSP and MP into the correspondence. They should include conditions which need to be met including noise levels, working hours, licences, for example. CCllr Willsher agreed to share the correspondence he had received on this issue with the member of the public.

CCIIr Wells asked if there was anything KCC could do to help and CIIr Robertson advised that they should be copied into the letter to enforcement officers, which should state that KCC support the terms and conditions being requested.

Planning Applications Received

24/00886/LBC internal alterations at Mossgrove, 18 Muirs, Kinross

24/01116/IPL erection of replacement dwellinghouse (in principle) at Cavelstone, Kinross.

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24/01030/FLL installation of plant equipment at 65 Station Road, Kinross, (Sainsburys Supermarkets).

24/01139/LBC take down and reconstruction of chimney stack and part gable, including stone repairs and repointing at 10 Brewery Lane and 13 School Wynd, Kinross.

24/01163/FLL erection of agricultural building, formation of access track and associated works at land 30 metres south west of Leiland House, Balado.

Planning Applications Determined

24/00733/AML erection of a dwellinghouse (approval of matters specified in conditions of 23/01607/IPL) at land 45 metres north of Chance Inn Farm, Kinross, approved.

Other Planning Matters

24/01115/FLL alterations to dwelling house at 35 Simpson Wynd, Kinross.

CCIIr Freeman advised that a resident, in Simpson Wynd Ms Lisa Love, had contacted KCC to ask for this item to be discussed due to the concerns of a number of residents and invited her to speak to the meeting.

Ms Love advised that the planning application was submitted (in retrospect) for a garage conversion and that despite the application stating work had not commenced, it had, without approval being given prior to commencement.

While residents were happy for the conversion to go ahead, they wanted to raise a number of concerns relating to the property, which was sold as a 4-bedroom residential property. The owner is a business person, and as such is running his business (teaching the English language to non-speakers and mini tours of Scotland) from the property which results in a number of students paying a fee for learning and accommodation for a 4-day course. The property is in a residential and conservation area and has increased to a 6-bedroom property, following the conversion of the garage and also the dining room into another bedroom.

The owner is operating without the appropriate planning permission, change of use or safety certificates and is also breaking the burden in deeds by using the property as a profit-making, small hotel type business with a number of different people in and out of the property each and every week which is not in keeping with the estate, which is largely a quiet, family community. There are also safeguarding concerns.

Cllr Watters advised that the PKC policy is clear in that the property cannot be run as a short-term let (STL) and that planning does not allow STLs if there is no other STL in the area. Cllr Robertson advised that a STL can be applied for, without planning permission, but that it would not commence until planning had been approved. It was noted that a temporary STL is valid for six weeks.

CCIIr Willsher suggested that the residents needed to get legal advice and also suggested contacting Persimmon Homes solicitors to discuss the situation with them.

Cllr Cuthbert advised that as there were now six objections, this will trigger the system to highlight the application which will be discussed by the Planning Committee and as such, residents are able to go along and put their concerns to the Committee. Obviously, if the application were denied, work would need to stop immediately.

In response to a question from CCIIr Leslie as to whether there was anything KCC could do, she was advised that a letter of objection could be submitted. It was agreed that CCIIr Willsher would do this before the deadline of 6 September 2024.

Ms Love and the residents thanked the CC for their time.

Reports From PKC Councillors

Cllr Freshwater advised that the Craighead Wind Farm application had been submitted to PKC. He also advised that that rollout of the 20mph speed limits had commenced across the area.

Cllr Robertson advised that he was meeting with PKC officers soon to discuss what could be done to improve the Mill Street area which, he felt, was looking run down, with a lack of storage facilities for refuse bins and bicycles. There was also antisocial behaviour in the area. He had also asked officers to consider using the Area Based Fund as revenue for the costs. Cllr Robertson also advised that he and Cllr Freshwater had met the new owners of Todd and Duncan recently who intended to invest a substantial amount of money into the company (circa £30m).

Cllr Cuthbert advised that Community Investment Fund was now open for applications, with a panel meeting arranged for 18 September. KCC would be invited to attend the meeting.

He also advised that, following concerns being raised by three different people, he had asked PKC to contact the owner to discuss the situation with regard to the vehicles which sit on private land and for a resolution to be found.

Cllr Cuthbert also raised concerns with side drains which was encouraging drivers to drive closer to the pavements which was a safety concern for pedestrians.

He had also advised that PKC had contacted all councillors to advise that the roadworks in the Muirs would now be undertaken in 50m stretches as opposed to 100m stretches.

Cllr Watters advised that the active travel master plan had now been agreed but the challenge was now to deliver the plan. PKC would be joining up with other active travel groups and funding was awaited from Transport Scotland.

The ban on pavement parking has been rolled out across Scotland and would be implemented in Kinross shortly. It was also noted that all roads which were a 30mph limit would reduce to 20mph. Cllr Watters also advised that there had been an event last week with the Forth Rivers Trust with a view to improving the landscape around the loch as well as the water quality, with £260,000 funding available to improve the whole of River Leven. Volunteers were also required for this work.

Reports From CC Representatives

CCIIr P Chan asked where the straps for refuse bins could be obtained from, as a number of bins had blown over in the recent winds. Cllr Watters advised CCIIr Chan to contact the library, or the local councillors who will chase these up.

CCIIr Leslie enquired again about the VAS on Gallowhill Road, which was still not operational. Cllr Cuthbert advised that the VAS required to be connected to electricity and he had raised the issue again with Sean Panton earlier in the day.

CCIIr Freeman enquired who was responsible for the removal of the burned-out vehicle in Springfield Road, as he had been advised that PKC would only send a road sweeper. Those present were advised that it was the owner's responsibility. If the owner/insurer did not remove the vehicle, it would fall to PKC to do so but that could take a few months.

In CCIIr McKay's absence, CCIIr Freeman raised the following issues on her behalf:

High Street wall and subsidence at Greens, the damaged lamp post outside central chippy and the bus stop repair should all be uploaded to the myPKC portal (https://my.pkc.gov.uk/)

There is a meeting of the Kinross-shire local action partnership on 4 September at 6.30pm at LLCC but unfortunately no one was available to attend.

Hedges at the end of Springfield Road and Muirs (both sides) as well as overhanging hedges in Montgomery Way. Cllr Watters will take forward the issue with the hedges at Springfield Road, and CCllr Willsher has raised with PKC. Both issues should be added to the myPKC portal (https://my.pkc.gov.uk/)

Speeding in Gairneybank – as discussed under the Police Report, all areas experiencing issues with speeding have been added to the matrix.

Camping and damage to grass at Kirkgate park was also raised with CCllr S Wells reporting that she had seen a number of tents which had been pitched overnight, and which had left scorch marks in the grass due to fires/barbecues. She noted that there are signs prohibiting overnight parking and questioned whether there should be better enforcement. CCllr Leslie advised that the park is due to be upgraded and wondered whether charges should be brought in for parking, or height restriction barriers erected.

Community Investment Fund – there is a meeting arranged for 18 September and CCIIr Freeman will attend.

Concerns with Loch Leven Surgery statement on social media and possible removal of patients – a message had been posted on the KCC Facebook page regarding the removal of patients who had been abusive to staff. While KCC understood the action which may be taken by the surgery, it was agreed that this was not an issue for KCC.

Footpath between Lathro Lane and Dalwhamie – a message had been posted on the Facebook page looking for an update as traffic, particularly vans/minibuses are driving through gardens. Residents had asked for bollards to be erected but there appeared to have been no progress. Cllr Robertson advised that he would check on the progress as he believed that the bollard had been ordered.

It was noted that the roads were still the responsibility of the developers as they had not yet been adopted by PKC.

Correspondence

KCC Insurance: CCllr Leslie will deal with this.

Remembrance Parade: CCllr Freeman advised that there was a meeting arranged for 2 September (by Zoom) to discuss the arrangements for the Parade. CCllr Wells will attend the meeting along with CCllr Freeman. It was noted that the Masonic Lodge had offered the use of the Hall after the parade and CCllr Freeman asked for donations of food from the local community.

Kinross Boathouse Public Toilets: An email had been received from Historic Environment Scotland with regard to the requirement for a permanent building warrant for the public toilets at Kinross Boathouse and ongoing proposals for the Boathouse redevelopment. The current temporary building warrant for the public toilets expired on 21 August 2024 and while permanent planning permission has been granted for the toilets, the permanent building warrant application would (hopefully) be a formality. The existing statutory consents were submitted on behalf of the CC/Tracks with support from HES and NatureScot all of whom retain an interest.

Recent discussions with the architect have introduced the possibility of the toilets being moved to a new location on the same site, as part of the boathouse redevelopment and landscaping. If this is proposed, it would make sense for a new building warrant/planning application including the toilets

to be submitted by FSE as part of a revised scheme for the boathouse and as such HES have contacted KCC to ask whether they would agree with the re-siting of the toilets – this was agreed.

Temporary prohibition of driving, parking and loading at Sandport: Members were advised that in order to permit Scottish Water ironwork repairs on the above section of road, a temporary traffic regulation order will be in place from 11 December 2024 for a period of three days. The order will temporarily prohibit all vehicles from driving, parking and loading on Sandport, Kinross from its junction with private access to property known as Number 6 Sandport to its junction with the private access to property known as Number 15 Sandport. The alternative route for vehicles is via Sandport – Pier Road – Burns Begg Street - B996 High Street.

Kinross-shire & Glenfarg Stronger Communities Meeting: CCllr K Spain will be attending the meeting on 29 August and will provide an update at a future KCC meeting.

Craighead Wind Farm: it was noted that a planning application (24/01193/FLL) had been submitted to PKC.

AOCB

King's Portrait: It was agreed to ask the Lodge to display the portrait.

Milnathort and Orwell Community Council

News from the August Meeting

Present at the meeting on 8 August were N Bingham (chair), A Wanless, K Heneghan, A Macrae, Cllr R Watters, Cllr W Robertson and six MoP.

Apologies: PC Ben Samson, Cllrs N Freshwater and D Cuthbert. A MoP asked where residents can find the minutes of our previous meetings, and Neill responded that they are published in the *Kinross Newsletter*, posted on a number of the local noticeboards, shared with PKC for review and publication. The minutes would normally be published on the MOCC webpage but there have been some issues with this, and work is ongoing to resolve. The CC will also look at publishing on Facebook.

Police Matters

Replacement gate from Lathro park to South Street: The procurement for the replacement gate at the South Street entrance is still ongoing, however PKC will not progress until the path etc are adopted by PKC from the developer, Persimmons.

Cllr Watters will raise with PKC to understand the current status and commented that Persimmon are adding new paths that were additional to the original plan.

Roads

Back Loan Parking and Access

A number of residents, attending the meeting, raised their concerns regarding lorries that are too large for the narrow thoroughfare are travelling down Back Loan, and ignoring the current road signs. This has caused damage to parked cars and poses a threat to residential buildings and residents.

It was also raised that some drivers are speeding down Back Loan in excess of the current 30mph speed limit, which residents consider to be too high. It was asked whether the road could it be re-classed as 20mph as it is not safe for locals and their kids.

Cllr Robertson will arrange a site visit with Daryl McKeown from PKC to determine what options they have, he will invite MOCC and local residents to be part of the visit and subsequent discussion.

Milnathort Primary School

No update – a new Head Teacher will be starting as Laura Zamboni will be moving to Australia. MOCC wish to thank her for all her support and wish her and her husband the best of luck in their new venture.

Core Paths Update

Milnathort Core Paths Group have been busy over the past weeks, weekends and evenings. We've now flailed the Core Paths at: Hattonburn, Burleigh Castle, Paths through the woodlands at Burleigh, Paths from Crow Wood to Arlary, Arlary to the A911, Path at the side of Milnathort golf course leading up to the A911 including the short section to The Stackyard and the link Path between Arlary rail track and the start of the Core Path leading to Burleigh Castle.

We've also cut back branches that were dangerously overhanging the Paths. We used our own flail, that was funded by the Community Investment Fund last year. There will be two or three more cuts this year. We finished infilling most of the depressions on the Core Path from Auld Mart up to The Stackyard. For this work we used a total of 7.2 tonnes of infill. Type 1 stone (between 2 and 4 inches in size) was laid down first and then a layer of whin dust (looks like grit) was laid on top. This was then compressed using a whacker plate, a vibrating petrol-driven panel that compacted the aggregate. Rain and footfall will bed this in over time.

Huge thanks to Graham Paton for the use of his JCB, Milnathort Core Path Group volunteers and Alistair MacLeod and Chris Martin, (PKC Greenspace Rangers) for their help with this.

Large Planning Applications Golf Range at Burleigh

Kevin expressed his disappointment at the approval of this development, challenging the democratic process and made a statement on some of the supporting information and on some of the objects that appear to have been ignored. Cllr Watters refuted a number of these; as a member of the planning committee he was in attendance for the application review.

Windfarms

The Craighead windfarm development planning application has not yet been submitted, there was no further discussion, questions or concerns by anyone in attendance.

Brunt Hill Farm Consultation

A member of the public challenged that this windfarm development had not been discussed or was not mentioned in previous meeting minutes and that MOCC should have held more discussion and a consultation meetings on the development.

Neill responded that the CC have a standing agenda item related to Large Planning Applications, with all open planning or proposed planning applications raised for discussion at each meeting, with PKC Cllrs able to update on the status of any developments where possible. The windfarms have been discussed at various MOCC meetings, making reference to consultations, a public meeting, planned visits to CC meetings across Kinross-shire including MOCC. The previous minutes detailed the Energy Consent Unit (ECU) application for the Brunt Hill Windfarm. NB confirmed that information is shared on the MOCC Facebook page and committed to ensure this is done in a more timely manner in future, he reiterated that the website issues need resolved.

Cllr Robertson also added that it is not the responsibility of the CCs to hold consultations on planning applications, that is the responsibility of the developers and in this instance the developers presented to the MOCC on two separate occasions and held a day-long consultation event in the Town Hall.

Sustainability group: Neil also clarified that the Sustainability Group has been set up with participation from all Community Councils across Kinross-shire, and although triggered by the initial windfarm consultations it is completely separate to the developers. The aim of the Sustainability Group is to manage any community benefit funds that become available from now and into the future. It has nothing to do with any of the planning applications. Noting a number of the CCs involved with the Sustainability Group have objected to the Brunt Hill application.

Comments And Questions From The Floor Local Development Plan 3 (LDP3)

A member of the audience queried an article in the *Newsletter* about local input into the LDP. PKC will soon publish a consultation for local residents to comment on LDP3, this is an opportunity for residents to input into the future use and needs for the local area. The LDP details what areas of land are to be designated as retail, farmland etc.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Robertson: Complaints were received about the path that runs between White Place and the Primary School – PKC will cut back the hedges and have already cleared the rubbish.

No Southern M90 slip road and alternate routes: The current

4-way traffic lights in Kinross clearly shows the impact of not having alternate routes and our reliance on the existing road network and the delays to journey times when we have road works.

Cllr Watters added that the weakness of the road network has become more is stressed more due to the recent housing developments. The review of LDP3 is important to ensure we have all services and infrastructure to support these new developments.

Clir Watters: Grow Wild, the PKC initiative will mean less grass will be cut. This is partially related to budget availability but also related to environmental factors.

PKC also grow their own trees and plants, and wildflower seeds. These can be requested for planting in local areas that would benefit. Across the UK 97% of meadows have been lost. Within the most recent boundary maps all of Auld Mart Wynd and part of Auld Mart Lane have incorrectly been included within the Kinross CC area rather than MOCC. Cllr Watters has raised this with PKC and steps will be taken to rectify this error. Neill will raise with Kinross CC to get their agreement that this should be corrected.

Any Other Matters

Christmas lights: The MOCC raised some funds last year to purchase several sets of battery operated lights and put them up across the village. This was a great start and we received a lot of fantastic positive feedback. We will be contacting local businesses and applying to various funding streams (e.g. the *Newsletter* fund) to help purchase more to cover more of the village this year.

The AGM and next meeting of Milnathort and Orwell CC (second Thursday of each month) will be on 10 October at 7.30pm at Milnathort Town Hall

Portmoak Community Council News from the July Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 9 July were Cllrs A Miller, D Morris, A Davidson, S McGregor and 1 member of the public.

Apologies: Cllrs W Robertson, D Cuthbert, N Freshwater, and R Watters.

Matters Arising

Kinross-shire Committee update, and Kinross-shire Active Travel Master Plan: The Chair asked that the two items be split out to two separate Agenda items for the next PCC meeting.

KLC Update: Dave Morris confirmed the next KLC meeting was scheduled for August, so there was no update for today. D Morris had submitted the information on ARUP Active Travel Plan.

Kinross-shire Active Travel Master Plan: The Chair had also attended a meeting for the Kinross-shire Community Transport Forum. The Chair had had an informal discussion with Glenfarg Community Bus (GCB) to ascertain if there was any possibility for GCB to do an extra loop through Portmoak area and offer a service into Kinross to the Park & Ride and Town Centre. It was explained that existing timetables for the GCB were very tight. Interestingly the GCB also goes to Clackmannanshire, Dollar and Stirling which is effectively a P&K route servicing access to three different council areas. The Chair had suggested that it would be beneficial to enhance transport provision in the Kinross-shire area, but the arguments against this amounted to the fact that no bus operators want to support non profitable routes. It was suggested at the Transport Forum that it was more beneficial for Portmoak community to be given long term lease for a local bus for long-term supply of a local community bus as in the case of the GCB. PKC have promised to get back to PCC on this possibility. There would be a need to canvas in community if a service of this type would be supported. It would also require

drivers and people to operate the system. It may not be a comprehensive service at all hours of the day, but needs to be supported sufficiently by the local community. Discussions are very early stages so no such service is likely to start imminently.

Road Safety Action Update: Speedwatch campaign has renewed the appeal for volunteers. Chair has been in contact with MOCC who are co-ordinating and is confident that a meeting will be scheduled for information and questions soon. Police have been out on patrol and have caught speeders. The ultimate aim is to highlight problem areas for the police to focus on.

Double yellow lines on Bruce Road: item will be added to the Roads Dept. priority list. PCC have already highlighted to PKC key road safety projects for priority consideration.

Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path: The project had become busy in last week. Nick Mainprize had confirmed there is 100% funding through 'Paths for All' and TRACKS, up to £40K available to get feasibility studies completed which would be a massive step forward. Unfortunately, the proviso for funding from "Paths for All" is they need the path to be completed on the full path length, which is problematic due to the lack of communication from the landowner of the lower Section 2 of the path down to Scotlandwell. Everything is in place except the letter confirming that landowner is in agreement for feasibility study to be completed on their land. The Chair intended to escalate his correspondence to landowner to continue to try to obtain a response. Cllr D Morris had concerns about the report N Mainprize has produced specifically regarding Section 1 through woodland and the problem of trying to avoid gradient issues. D Morris had pointed out that the path should follow the contour to avoid problematic steep gradients up and down. N Mainprize had not inspected the field edge path for the lower Section2 due to the lack of landowner confirmation, even though access rights would permit him to do so. As part of the project the inspection of Section2 needs to be completed.

The Chair had notified all the affected landowners with full details of the path proposals and the current position for a feasibility study and should any landowners object to the proposals that they can contact PCC with their objections. As to date there has been no success for PCC in securing landowner agreement for the lower Section 2, and further that PCC and TRACKS have no power to impel the landowner to agree, it is necessary now for PKC to try and progress this. Cllr D Morris raised the possibility to implement section 21 of Land Reform Legislation 2003, to issue a Path Order; this enables an agreement to be made with a landowner about a necessary path which is to be created. A time limit would be applied and then PKC would then move on to section 22 and issue a Path Order. This is an important power within 2003 act which doesn't involve compulsory purchase. It is only possible

The Chair noted the repeated efforts of the previous PCC members to proceed this project over many years and the similar difficulties that they have encountered. Compulsory purchase did not appear to be an option that PKC were prepared to pursue.

Renewables Sustainability Group Meeting: update on meeting of 19/06/24: The Secretary had attended the meeting on 19/06/24. Agenda items included discussions around the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for all the included CCs within the group, a new one would be drafted to include Dunning and Auchterarder whose CCs were to be invited to join the RSG, this would be signed at the next RSG meeting. Representatives from Orbit and Galileo were in attendance to provide an update on their planning applications and the projects. Their planning application to PKC was expected to be submitted in July 2024. An extensive community consultation process had taken place including c30 meetings with various CCs, regular newsletters and multiple public consultations. The Secretary noted that the applicants had not engaged at all with Portmoak CC or Community, even though Portmoak residents would be affected to a large extent with regard to visibility/visual impact. It was explained that this was due to the fact that Portmoak sits outside the radius that has been designated for consultation. The radius is not designated by legislation and is elective, in fact there may be no requirement to consult with communities at all, but Wind Farm companies do so in order to try to engage communities and progress projects more smoothly. The original proposal had been amended from 12 turbines of 200m (to tip) to 8 turbines with 2 reduced in height to 180m to reflect comments arising from community consultation and to reduce the expected output to under 50MW to remain within the thresholds for local authority consideration. Orbit & Galileo felt there was a strong interest in a Reduced Energy Discount Scheme (REDS) expressed from members of the community through their ongoing consultation. Various members of the RSG, some whom have been involved in previous wind farm applications, noted that a REDS was unlikely to deliver sustainable long-term benefit and consequently is unlikely to be the most effective use of the Community Benefit Fund. There were discussions about Indexation and Potential for Shared Ownership again these options need to be assessed carefully with an eye to the experiences other CCs have had on these types of Community Benefit from other wind farm projects. Post meeting the representative of Orbit confirmed that in terms of grid connection, the current understanding is that this will be Westfield, although it is subject to change and dictated by Scottish Power Energy Networks (SPEN). It is understood that grid connection routing would be scrutinised under separate planning application(s), if the wind farms are approved. The grid connection routing could potentially affect Portmoak. Cllr D Morris warned to be clear that the purpose of the RSG should not get mixed up with the Planning process. The RSG is not a group that is looking at the rights and wrongs of the Planning Applications or taking a stance in support of applications. Each affected CC is at liberty to make representation on behalf of their community in Objection or Support. The RSG is a group of local Kinross-shire CC representatives that are sharing knowledge and experience to try to be prepared should the planning applications be approved and how any Community Benefit may be best negotiated. DMorris emphasised that PCC need to understand the consultation process and why we have not been involved.

(Post-meeting note: Galileo Energy have now reached out to PCC about the application to PKC for Craighead PKC PKC Ref# 24/01193/FLM. Application available now for public comments until Fri 27 September 2024)

Scotlandwell footpath between Wellside Park & The Green: the issue around ownership of the footpath has been discussed, decided and dealt with. There was an option to approach Scottish Water to request that they ensure raised ironworks were made safer. The issue was the adoption of Wellside Park itself. A meeting had been held on 26/06/24 onsite with Officers of PKC: vegetation and small tree clearance required in order to adopt. Require to use the road bond to do this. The Chair queried that the road bond had been repaid to developer. Footpath item can come off agenda for August.

Reports

Police Reports: nothing for Portmoak, except Speedwatch campaign. Residents had commented on people using lamps in fields very late at night, unclear of the purpose. Speculation it may be people shooting. Any concerns, contact Police by phone – 101 for non-emergencies. 999 for emergencies only.

PCC have lodged an objection. Nothing additional to discuss at this point.

24/00525/FLL: Part change of use agricultural building to dog breeding facility, land 40 metres north east of Glenheart Farm, Glenlomond, Kinross.

The Treasurer had flagged the application, but Last Comment date was passed. The application had not been discussed at PCC meeting. The Secretary had investigated details and it appeared this application had been missed at the time of planning application in April. Remove this application for next meeting.

Progress with Developments

Westfield Community Liaison Committee: no updates. Roads are a mess. Phased start up/test likely later this year.

Westfield Paths Feasibility Study

Paths Group update: main item is £10K cost needed for Cobbles drainage at top path to Gamekeepers: this sum has been raised through various channels, including PKC, Community Environment Challenge Fund, the Westfield Community Fund, Portmoak Festival Fund. A proper path and drain had been put in. Thomson Landcapes will start on the 10/08.24 there will be some disruption around that time while the path work is taking place. Path will probably be closed.

Other work includes clearing rapidly growing vegetation. Volunteers are always invited to participate. The Chair commended the work that had been done and the fundraising efforts.

Treasurer CC Accounts:

Confirmed £2,000 payment has arrived to the Michael Bruce Way account. Other grants to follow.

Village Newsletter: Editor and Reporter Positions advertised on local media, VH and GCC notice boards. One member of the public has been suggested for the Editorial role and this will be discussed between that person and CCllr Ponton.

The Tree Stump: CCllr Fraser reported that the tree stump in the River Farg, adjacent to the Village Pond, has been removed by PKC.

Defibrillator – sourcing replacement Defibrillators batteries: Has now been completed. An additional defibrillator to be installed at the WTW by Scottish Water.

Wallace Park: The 'walk around' to agree areas for grass cutting and areas that are to be left alone has taken place.

PKC Cllr Robertson was thanked for providing details of a member of the public's contact details (assistance for terms of ownership and maintenance) for a similar venture.

Dog Incident

CCIIr Pilmer reported that he had published a copy of a Public Leaflet on the village Facebook page.

Public Complaint

Safety and environmental concerns were raised regarding activities relating to Social Housing properties on Greenbank Road. The matter as discussed related to a great concern regarding the use of the properties for an ongoing vehicular business within their boundary grounds. Cllrs referred to Tenancy Agreements and it was agreed that the matter lies wholly with PKC and their Housing Department. Cllrs are to raise the safety, environmental and other concerns with PKC Housing. Additionally, the matter of vehicles parked on Public roads was discussed that may or may not have a legal basis to be so parked. Police Scotland's advice is that a vehicle not having a current MOT can be reported to Police Scotland. Any vehicle not road taxed can be reported to the DVLA. Any vehicle that may be associated with a status of being abandoned can be reported to PKC who will take the necessary course of action to remove it. One vehicle on Main Street is to be reported to PKC via PKC Cllrs. As a further point of notification caravans (detached) cannot be left on public roads for long periods of

Meetings – Virtual and Public

Stronger Communities Network: CCllr Pilmer reported that he had attended a Stronger Communities Network meeting at the end of August and explained the wellbeing topics that were covered.

Foundation Scotland Live Seminar for Microgrant applications: CCIIr Pilmer reported that he had partaken in a virtual event, at the end of August, involving 42 CC representatives who were subdivided in to four groups and led through a serious of presentations covering best practice for Microgrant Applications. The aim is to achieve consistency across Scotland

Kinross-shire Meeting: CCllr Smart reported that they had attended a Kinross-shire meeting that covered: Eco Wilding Scheme, Sustainable and Active Travel. Speed Limit Plans to have dedicated 20mph within the communities throughout Scotland. A map of the roads that would be affected in Glenfarg was distributed and it was agreed that further calming measures could be appropriate on the Main Street. An extension of a 40mph from Glenfarg to the Bein Inn was suggested and this was to be fed back to the relevant Transport contact for PKC.

Scottish Water & GCC Liaison Group: CCllr Fraser reported that he has had further discussions and correspondence with Scottish Water. The delivery of a large Plant Unit module via Milnathort has been delayed and no confirmed date is planned as far as the GCC is aware. Traps have been set up at the WTW to facilitate the safe removal of the resident Beavers prior to the WTW upgrade works. The Beavers are to be relocated elsewhere in Scotland. Confirmation of a planned start for the works upgrade to date.

Flooding Issues

CCIIr Christie reported that work conducted revealed that at least 80% drainage efficiency was achieved in the Greenbank Road area. However, because of heavy rainfall recently, it was

envisaged that problems may arise. Drain/gully cleaning was raised by PKC Cllr Robertson who emphasised that he had written to the relevant PKC department requesting action for cleaning once again. It was noted that the grass verge on Main Street southbound was subject to flooding onto the adjacent roadway and that drainpipes located there were in need of cleaning out too. Matter to be passed to PKC via Cllr Robertson. A member of the public claimed that there are 190 drain/gully points in the village.

Village Inn update, now to be known as Community Centre Hospitality Development

VH Trustees Subgroup represented by a Mr D. Aird and Mr S. Whiting gave an update about matters, and these were: plans for the development now available, the future use of the development for café/bar facilities, the recreational area outside the Village Hall within the grounds is now upgraded and Funding research. The VH Trustees Chair, W. Macpherson, advised that matters are progressing with the Subgroup working together to progress the improved facility project and that funding is the challenge, as it stands. Those in attendance at this evening's meeting supported the progress to date.

Glenfarg Transport Group

CCIIr Smart reported that the travel routes for the 55 changing to the 23 for onward travel to Tillicoultry had now commenced. A number of passengers had used the service and their feedback was well received. It is expected that notice of the service, its reliability and tie up with transport links for Stirling will have a positive plus effect on passenger numbers.

It was noted too that a letter had appeared in the *Courier* that was of a disparaging nature regarding the Community Bus activity. A reply is to be submitted.

A new CTG booking service for pick ups was discussed particularly for rural bus stops given their dark locations and access points. Some of which may not be disabled friendly access. Further thoughts about this point to take place by the CTG.

Binn Eco Wind Farm: A discussion took place about where is the Fund money and how do we obtain it? CCllrs Ponton and Pilmer are to attend a meeting in mid-September and will give a report at the next GCC Business meeting.

AOCB

Gazebos: Presently the Gazebo is stored in an outbuilding at a local farm. CCllr Fraser has visited to see the item and suggested a number of points. Arrange to have the item removed or arrange to have the item erected to determine its actual condition and decide what to do with it finally as in offer it for sale or to a community group in the village. The outcome is that a visit to arrange an inspection is to take place as we have a time extension by the farm owners allowing for the item to remain where it is presently.

Village Newsletter

CCIIr Christie reported that the *Glenfarg Newsletter*'s position of Editor remains unfilled. Although as mentioned earlier under Action Points the position may have an applicant. It is an essential matter of urgency for the post to be filled therefore, the post is to be readvertised along with an additional further request for reporters. The matter of advertisers and their bona fide payments for four issues (annually) was tabled. It was agreed that four issues should extend into 2025. It was viewed with regret that the most recent quarterly issue had failed to be published. An impending issue is due out shortly in September.




Kinross Cubs



Fairtrade in Kinross-shire

biscuits or chocolate or the ingredients for a delicious meal such as rice from Malawi, curry sauce from Eswatini or tomato sauce from Kenya. We have many other items, and a variety of baskets which we can package into an attractive hamper, to give an unusual gift, with the contents selected by you. Speak to us at the Farmers' Market or contact the Kinross Church Office. When you buy Fairtrade gifts you are helping producers in the Global South and also the planet.

Broke not Broken

As the nights get longer we are turning our sights to the cold nights and the challenges that brings for so many people accessing our support.

With support from Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro project we are working with The Heat Project to identify households who are repeatedly referred for energy payments, and find ways of making long term impacts rather than short term fixes. The removal of the Winter Fuel Payment will affect many households across Kinross-shire. By only awarding the payment to households in receipt of Pension Credit, many households who find it very hard to manage on the state pension they do receive, will not benefit from that support and will turn to the third sector, food banks and other charities for support.

Pension credit is massively underclaimed for reasons including digital exclusion, pride, and just not knowing anything about it. Having access to cash means rural homes off mains gas (23,000 in P&K) are able to afford to purchase larger amounts of coal, wood or oil and keep warm over winter. There are 1722 pensioners across P&K missing out on this benefit. Pension Credit is a valuable benefit, worth £2,677 a year on average to eligible people. It also unlocks other support such as Housing Benefit and Council Tax Support. It also opens up eligibility for social tariffs, the Warm Home Discount, cheaper broadband, free TV licences, lower water bills and now the Winter Fuel Payment. To check if you are eligible please contact the Welfare rights team on 01738 476900.

Please speak with the older people in your life and help them check if they might be eligible for this support. Also take the opportunity to speak to The Heat Project when they visit Kinross. They are super approachable and very knowledgeable and have saved many local households hundreds of pounds as well as supporting people clearing large energy debts. Looking forward, we are working hard to make sure that projects for 2025 are funded and our Fundraising Development Officer Hannah has been working very hard to secure funding from National Lottery. This funding will enable us to continue to staff the charity and cover some running costs and project costs. It is a fantastic achievement.

We have some spaces available in our upcoming Tuesday Trips which run through the October School holidays. Please email admin@brokenotbroken.org if you are interested in attending. These trips are fully funded and cover the cost of transport, food and any entrance fees for activities for you and your children.

The Evidence Report will be sent to the Scottish Government to be 'gatechecked' before proceeding to the next stage, which will be a call for sites and ideas. Officers said that even though the deadline has passed for commenting on the topic papers, community groups might find it beneficial to keep looking through them for ideas of matters to suggest for the next stage. An example of something that could be raised in the call for sites and ideas is where the boundary of a settlement should be.

World Challenge Trip to Borneo

Pupils went on a life changing journey this summer to Malaysian Borneo accompanied by Mr Turnbull, Mr Scrimgeour and their leader Karen Shaw.



The trip allowed pupils to immerse themselves in the local culture: trying new foods like durian and fresh pineapple cut straight from the path, learning a local dance as well as teaching Strip the Willow to their hosts and learning about the head-hunter tribes of Borneo.

They also learned about how palm oil plantations are destroying native habitats and biodiversity whilst seeing first-hand the animals these factories are impacting: orangutans, horn bills, crocodiles, sun bears, pygmy elephants and proboscis monkeys among many others.

The pupils helped with efforts to replant elephant/napier grass and fig trees into new areas to increase the biodiversity of the area and to encourage an increase in numbers of pygmy elephants, which are currently a critically endangered species.

All pupils were excellent ambassadors not only of Kinross High School, but of their country, really engaging with the challenges the trip presented. Group funds were donated to local charities, including to help with orangutan, elephant and sun bear conservation projects.

Social Subjects - A Blueprint for the Future

This course is about 'thinking global' and 'acting local'. When designing the course, pupil feedback showed that our young people want to work with our community and know about the great things that happen there.





Our 'Knowing our Community' event saw five partners speak with our five S1 classes. Following this, our young people worked together to share their learning and build the jigsaw of our community. Learners listened intently to our wonderful speakers, and we look forward to revealing our 'Craftivism' work during our showcase and in the community in June (date tbc). We also look forward to sharing our Education Scotland video when it is published later this month.




KCC will play in the Perth & Kinross Indoor League again this year with fixtures announce in early October. The club has also arranged indoor training which start on **17 October** at the Campus.

AUGUST AND EARLY SEPTEMBER were a treat for seeing osprey here at the reserve. Our Carden hide gave front row seats to visitors watching osprey fishing in the pools. We're now excitedly waiting for the pink-footed geese to return this autumn. There have been lots of ducks flocking together in the Carden flood, these are a mix of pintail, teal, wigeon, gadwall, shoveler and mallards. It is well worth a trip to the reserve at this time of year as there's lots to see.

We're looking forward to our October holidays events programme. We'll be running our Halloween spooky self-guided trail, which is always popular. We'll also be running guided pond dipping sessions for families, as well as a Loch Leven at night event which will involve crafts, campfire and a nighttime walk around the reserve.

We're also excited about our Dawn Goose Watches. These will take place on 16 and 20 October, starting at around 6.45am. It's wonderful to watch thousands of pink-footed geese take off from their night-time roost on the loch, and a great way to start the day. Looking ahead to November, we have Wetland Birds Guided Walks, taking place on 5 and 6 November from 10am- 11.30am. These will be led by our wonderful Site Manager and Assistant Warden, who will lead the tour of the reserve to look out for wetland bird species

A WEEK ON THE FARM...

THEY SAY THAT A week in politics is a long time, but the same could be said about farming. As I write this article, late (again, sorry Hannah), we have had a week of fairly settled weather which I think it's fair to say may just have arrived in the nick of time to save harvest from being a smash and grab affair from start to finish.

Obviously, there is still a lot of work to be done with this harvest season but it is phenomenal what can achieved in the space of a week when conditions are favourable. It's not just arable farmers



who have benefited from a bit of settled sunshine' It has been very welcome for livestock and grassland farmers too, as animals will have enjoyed the bit of late season warmth and sunshine and the fields which were starting to get a bit wet have dried out a bit at least. It will certainly have helped the state of mind of many farmers who were feeling pretty scunnered after a dreich few months which were apparently summer.

Here at Backward Farm we have just had our two

fields of barley combined and this years' job was ably completed by the faithful old 'Dominator' combine expertly piloted by Andrew and his brother Alastair, each of them completing a field. The reasonable pile of barley in the shed will be used mainly for feeding the pigs over the next twelve months and the cattle will be fed some of it as well. There will hopefully be enough to last us the whole year, and the straw has been baled for use mainly for bedding the cattle over the winter but some will also be used for feeding along with some lush silage which was recently baled. We have made a lot of quite lush silage this year and the straw will help balance out the diet of the cows over the winter months.



The cattle still have a reasonable supply of grass to graze, but I have been supplementing them with some silage to help the grass last a bit longer and hopefully it will be a wee while before they need shut in there sheds for the winter. We will soon need to sort through the ewes ready for the breeding season. They have been in two

basic groups since they were sheared and weaned so they should have recovered from rearing their lambs this year. We have sold a few lambs so far but seem to be a bit slower to grow than I would like, especially since



they have had plenty of good grass to graze.

The pigs have been fairly quiet lately apart from a couple of litters of saddleback piglets. They have been doing surprisingly little rooting, even when the ground was softer during recent heavy rain, but I'm sure they will make up for it over the winter.

IT'S NOT QUITE THE middle of September and there was ice on my car this morning. Ice. I don't know what's happened to our summer this year, but I'm not sure it's going to turn up anytime soon.



Anyway, as this is the last column of the year (yes, already) I thought I'd do a bit of a round up of the season... I have the theme tune of the Sunday evening Top 40 countdown going through my head now, but maybe that's just me! Success of the year -There's actually two or three that I can think of because of the cooler weather, the begonias have been absolute stars this year; bigger and bushier than ever. And they always last a long time. Angel's

Fishing Rods (pictured), what started

off as a 9cm plant three years ago has doubled in size every year — this year I had 14 stems on it (seven last year)... the flowers don't last long but is a stunning plant nonetheless. I think the success for me this year has been the hanging baskets. After a couple of years of dismal efforts, they really surpassed themselves this year.

Longest lasting flowers — apart from the Begonias, I think the argyranthemums have lasted way longer. Bought as teeny plug plants back in March, they started flowering at the beginning of June and are still flowering in the middle of September. But surpassing even those has to be the nemesia (below). Again, bought as plug plants, with a bit of deadheading, they have lasted for months and are extraordinarily gorgeous.

Surprising heartthrob — A few spring to mind — the dahlias were lovely (must remember and put them in the greenhouse for the winter), the lobelia filled many gaps and lasted ages and I was surprised to find out that trailing lysmachia flowers (I know! Who knew...). The plant that I have fallen most in love with this year though is alstromeria. I know, I know... it's fairly common but I've tried growing it in the garden before without much success. I planted into old flower buckets last year and not much happened so this year I fed

it well and they really surprised me with the number of flowers and longevity. So, that's my heartthrob for this year (below).



Things for next year — As always, as I wander through the year, new plants come to mind, or I notice something gorgeous in the village that brings me out in a rash of covetousness. This year, I made a list, which is super-organised and very unlike me. The top of the list is a California Tree Poppy. I noticed one when I was looking for a place to turn my car around in the village one day. I had no idea what it was so did a quick Google when I got home... I am so getting one of those next year. The second is Peonies, the pink ones. I usually buy a few bunches when they're in season, and they're not the easiest plant to grow but they're lovely and flouncy and smell nice, and I want some.

Well, that brings us to the end of another season in the garden. The nights are starting to draw in and thoughts turn to the long nights, cocoa and slippers.

It's been a pleasure writing this column for another year and I hope you've got something out of it... even if it's only a shake of the head at my ineptitude sometimes in the garden.




