Your Loch Leven Questions Answered

I AM GRATEFUL to your readers for the very interesting questions raised about water quality in Loch Leven, and phosphorus sources and impacts in particular.

My article, published in the May 2023 issue, was a very brief overview of the situation. Our routine data collection at fortnightly intervals over the last 53 years has been enabled by funding provided to UKCEH by the Natural Environment Research Council and is collected for scientific purposes. This funding supports the monitoring of a limited number of factors that are considered likely to affect the water quality and ecology of the loch. In addition, we have undertaken 10-yearly surveys of the phosphorus inputs to the loch from its 11 main inflows in 1985, 1995, 2005 and 2015/16. Each of these surveys has comprised weekly sampling over a one year period, and most of them have been funded by NatureScot, SEPA and PKC. We would have needed many, many pages to share all of the information that we have.

Here, I would like to address some of the concerns raised by your readers. For brevity, I have adopted a frequently asked questions (FAQ) approach. I am more than happy to provide additional information if required. The most important thing is that we understand exactly what is causing the water quality problems at Loch Leven. This will help everyone focus on delivering the management interventions required to deliver positive changes for people, nature and the environment.

FAQs

Q1: Does phosphate added to drinking water to reduce lead contamination from old plumbing systems increase the phosphorus input to Loch Leven?


A1: The best available data suggests that this process adds about 58 kg of phosphorus per year (kg P/year) to the loch – a very small proportion of the annual input from all sources, which is estimated to be about 10,500 kg P/year.

Q2: Is the loch too shallow to function properly?

A2: The loch is about 1.4 m shallower, and about 50 per cent smaller by volume, than before the sluice gates were built in the mid-1800s. As there has been little change in the amount of water entering the loch from its feeder streams since then, this will have almost doubled the flushing rate (the time required to completely renew the loch's water). This higher flushing rate will have improved water quality, not made it worse.

Q3: How can we be sure that phosphorus input from wastewater treatment works (WWTWs) fell between 1985 and 2015/16





if there is no record of the effluent discharged into the loch from overflow events?

A3: In the 10-yearly phosphorus loading surveys, phosphorus inputs to the loch were measured at weekly intervals over a one year period at the points where the 11 main inflows enter the loch. So, phosphorus inputs from all sources upstream of these points were included. Additional measurements were made upstream and downstream of WWTW discharge points so that discharges from these systems could be estimated under high and low flow conditions. In 2005, we also collected data from the Pow Burn every 2-hours between October and December (the three wettest months of the year) at the point where it enters the loch. This was to explore the impacts of storm events on phosphorus inputs from this inflow. We found that high rainfall events increased the phosphorus loading to the loch enormously over a very short periods.



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
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


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Q4: Measurements of phosphorus inputs to the loch are made every 10 years; if there is concern about pollution overflow events shouldn't they be measured more often?

A4: Our previous research has not been focused on short term inputs, although some data were collected on inputs during storm events in a PhD project than ran alongside the decadal phosphorus loading study in 2005. With storm events having increased in recent years, due to climate change, we would be keen to focus more on pollution overflows in the 2025 survey if sufficient funding can be found. It is very likely that CSO monitoring will have been installed by then, too.

Q5: Shouldn't samples be collected and analysed immediately before the 11 burns enter the loch to identify which burns carry the most phosphate?

A5: In the 10-yearly surveys, we measured phosphorus inputs from these 11 inflows at weekly intervals over a 1 year period. We also estimated the corresponding contributions from industrial and WWTW sources by comparing phosphorus loads upstream and downstream of their discharge points. Please note: It is important to consider inputs of all forms of phosphorus, not just of phosphate.

Q6: Could the burns carrying the most phosphorus be sampled at 1km intervals moving steadily upstream to give a picture of where most phosphorus enters the water system?

A6: In theory, yes, but this would be a massive undertaking for the whole catchment and does not form part of our routine monitoring of the loch. To-date, such data have been collected for the Gairney catchment, only, as part of the 2015/16 nutrient loading study. This was as part of an investigation into the potential impacts of septic tanks on the Gairney Water.

Q7: Could poultry farms be a large source of nutrient inputs to Loch Leven?

A7: This has not been looked at in any detail, but the data that we hold currently do not suggest that poultry farms are a major source of phosphorus. However, if sufficient resources are available, we will review this during the 2025 phosphorus loading study.

Q8: Shouldn't a single value stating the phosphorus input to the loch be prefaced by "estimated"?

A8: We agree that this single value is an estimate. It is derived from the river discharge and phosphorus concentration values measured at weekly intervals during the phosphorus loading surveys. It is not usual to state this explicitly in a summary document, but we will do so in future to avoid confusion.

Q9: Isn't it misleading to quote values for reductions in phosphorus inputs to the loch without a complete picture of what all the phosphorus inputs are?

A9: Each of the loading surveys have quantified phosphorus inputs to the loch from each of the 11 main inflows using comparable methods. These data provide information on the total inputs to the loch, but they do not identify their upstream sources.



Q10: How can CSO contributions be estimated without data on frequency, extent and composition of discharge?

A10: Yes, ideally, but in the absence of such data, estimates can be derived from the 10-yearly monitoring data by applying a source apportionment model to the measured values for phosphorus concentration and inflow discharges. However, given current concerns, the collection of more detailed data would enable these contributions to be estimated more accurately.

Q11: How were WWTWs upgraded to reduce phosphorus discharges?

A11: When the main WWTWs were 'updgraded' in the 1990s, a third level of treatment (known as "phosphate stripping") was introduced. This reduced the amount of phosphorus being discharged from these systems by 80 to 90 per cent. This is evident in our monitoring data.

Q12: Why was there a massive increase in phosphorus input from diffuse sources between 1995 and 2005?

A12: The phosphorus input to the loch from diffuse (land based) sources was much lower in 1995 than in 1985 or 2005 because of the unusually low rainfall, and therefore very low levels of runoff, in 1995. This needs to be taken into account when comparing these values.

Q13: Couldn't the apparently consistent phosphorus concentrations in winter combined with elevated phosphorus concentrations in summer be accounted for by changes in loch volume and rainfall?

A13: The data suggest that summers are now characterised by sudden releases of soluble reactive phosphorus from the sediments under warm calm conditions. These appear to be driving the current rise in summer average phosphorus levels. It is unlikely that changes in loch volume or rainfall are causing this phenomenon.

Q14: Increases in housing must have increased the phosphorus inputs to Loch Leven; how can it be said that it hasn't?

A14: The increase in housing within the catchment will have increased the phosphorus inputs to Loch Leven, but the data suggest that this is unlikely to be the main reason for the recent increase in in-loch phosphorus levels and algal blooms. For example, phosphorus inputs from housing were probably very similar in 2022 and 2023. However, 2022 was marked by persistent algal blooms and very low water clarity whereas 2023 has seen some of the highest water clarity levels ever recorded.

Q15: Is Dr May using repeated reference to climate change to increase her teams' ability to secure research grants?

A15: No. Our routine data collection over the last 53 years has been enabled by funding provided to UKCEH by the Natural Environment Research Council. This funding supports the monitoring of a limited number of factors that are considered likely to affect the water quality and ecology of the loch. Focusing on the facts, we have found that climate change has resulted in an increase in the loch's water temperature over the years and that

this has increasingly become an important explanatory variable in terms of observed changes in the loch.

Q16: Why does the Loch Leven data portal show data for only 5 years? Why haven't the long-term data been included?

A16: The aim of the recently launched Loch Leven portal is to share summary information with local stakeholders that will help them understand the recent decline in water quality and its potential causes. Data from the last five years are displayed alongside long-term average values for key variables that have been calculated from data collected between 1968 and 2022. Over the coming months, as time and resources permit, we will add more historical data and a data download facility to the portal to ensure that our long-term data are freely available to everyone. We will also add links to, or copies of, relevant reports and publications, and update our news tab at regular intervals. The Pygmy Plan

Re (A) Letters: Einar Hilmarsson, Milnathort (Newsletter, June 2023)

I appreciate that repeated reference to climate change may help Dr May with her and her teams ability to secure research grants. However I think it would be better for the loch and community if efforts were focused on the boring task of collating more robust, high quality analysis of all input streams and in particular undertaking robust analysis of the CSO events so that we can discuss this issue using facts rather than hearsay.

Mr. Hilmarsson's point illuminates a problem which goes far beyond the issue of sewage being pumped into Loch Leven, alas. This is the ever-spreading 'bloom' of, 'climate emergency' and 'nature crisis' – to quote the Scottish Government's National Planning Framework 4.

This 'framework' bears comparison with some of the 'planning' prevalent in the emergent Soviet Union, from the 1920s on, as later copied in the Peoples' Republic of China, from 1949. As stated in the 'Ministerial Foreward' ... 'Planning is a fully devolved function of the Scottish Government'.

Across 160 pages, the word 'climate' is printed 195 times; while the word 'sewer' appears 5 times. Once in the body, on page 75 '...manage all rain and surface water through sustainable urban drainage systems (SUDS), which should form part of and integrate with proposed and existing blue-green infrastructure. All proposals should presume no surface water connection to the combined sewer...'

Once in Annex B, section 5, on page 105 'A nature-based approach to surface water management has the potential to deliver multiple health, wellbeing, economic and climate adaptation and emissions reduction benefits and it may free up sewer capacity.'

And thrice in the Glossary, under 'Flooding from all sources': 'Pluvial Flooding – occurs when rainwater ponds or flows over the ground (overland flow) before it enters a natural or manmade drainage systems (e.g. a river or sewer/drain). It can also occur when drainage systems are at full capacity. It is often combined with sewer flooding and groundwater flooding; Sewer Flooding – occurs when the sewerage infrastructure has to deal with loads beyond its design capacity. This occurs most often as a result of high intensity rainfall events...'

The Scottish Government's reticence on the 'sewer crisis' might appear strange, notwithstanding, for example, the 'sewerage emergency' articulated in an article published in the *The Scotsman* (21 May, 2023); 'Sewage to fill 19,000 swimming pools spilled into Scottish waters in 2022.'

But it is not so strange, when one considers the deeper game; Flood Risk Management.

The question is not whether there exists the problem (UK wide) of sewage 'over-flowing' into water-courses, but who is going to pay to fix it. Which commensurately, raises the question of who is to blame.

The answer in Scotland is the combined Scottish Water/Local Authority 'agreements' permitting the use of old, under-maintained sewers for all and any new developments' storm-water run-off. The devolved Scottish Government owns/controls both Scottish Water and the Local Authorities.

What about SEPA? it may be asked.

SEPA is a 'non-departmental agency of the Scottish Government'; that is, answerable to ministers only.

So, from the Scottish Government down, through SEPA, Scottish Water and all the local authorities, there exists a vested interest in not revealing the true cause of the sewage crisis; that is the cost of fixing it, which they would prefer to spend elsewhere.

While they have struck on an expedient, alternative cause of the sewage crisis; the fact, they say, that due to 'climate change', half of Scotland is going to be under water in a few decades time. And so, all local authorities must make provision for 'Flood Protection Schemes' — which, by the way, can be used to disguise their 'sewerage-crisis' schemes.

Now revisit the article in the May *Newsletter*. On p25; Dr May, Scottish Water (x2), SEPA, and Local PKC councillors (x2). Dr May, on cue, is quoted as saying that the '...main cause likely to be the internal release from sediments due to climate change.' Three cheers for Mr Hilmarsson.

While, on the same page, 'Robert Wills from PKC Planning spoke about the ongoing work preparing Local Development Plan 3. Flooding prevention was a major factor in the Council thinking. Scottish Water confirmed they are currently unable to monitor the number and volumes of sewage discharges into Loch Leven...' This statement is a variant of the Minister's letter, extracted in the May *Newsletter*.

Such sophistry, while they all know that Scottish Water have completed a S16 Assessment of the Kinross sewer network. Perhaps they didn't like its findings?

Re (B) Local Farmer's Letter (name and address withheld) (Newsletter, June 2023)

'When, oh when, will all the agencies realise that waterways must be kept relatively unobstructed?'

Sections 18 and 59 of the Flood Risk Management (Scotland) Act 2009 place duties of watercourse assessment, and clearance and repair on local authorities.

Local authorities have a duty to assess watercourses and carry out clearance and repair works where such works would substantially reduce flood risk. They produce schedules of clearance and repair works and make these available for public inspection.

But, as with sewerage networks, it seems that local authorities have given-up on their statutory duty to 'assess, clear and

repair' the watercourses in their area; in PKC's case, from dredging the Tay, to clearing burns.

In August 2020, there occurred significant flooding in Perth town centre. One year later, PKC published a report, which included the real reason. Following the flooding of 11 & 12 August 2020, officers from the Council's flooding team were immediately deployed to investigate. The high rainfall also generated a considerable response in some watercourses, with the Craigie Burn in Perth, the Alyth Burn, the South Queich in Kinross as well as other small watercourses being particularly affected. Flooding in some parts of Perth was also exacerbated by three of the flood gates around the South Inch flood storage area not being closed.

One was as a result of human error (due to a training issue) and a lack of time to initiate the checking process which is usually followed during the gate closure procedure. The other two gates were inundated by water in the short time it took staff to arrive rendering it unsafe to approach these gates. The requirement to close the gates was triggered by a surface water flood event rather than a river warning. They had insufficient warning.

That report cited a report by SEPA, 6 months earlier, which included 'On Saturday 8 August the Scottish Flood Forecasting Service indicated that 'property flooding and damage, and disruption to travel and infrastructure are possible' for three consecutive days from Monday 10 August to Wednesday 12 August. Similar and updated guidance on Sunday 9, Monday 10 and Tuesday 11 August in the Flood Guidance Statement were issued highlighting the possibility of significant impacts.

The South Queich, the Clash Burn and the Gelly Burn in Kinross were all cited as being 'particuarly affected', during that rainfall event. Which assertion has been endlessly repeated by PKC to promote Flood Prevention Schemes in Kinross - or should that be 'sewerage crisis' schemes?

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The water backs-up during 'extreme weather events', arising from 'climate change' and so 'flood protection schemes' are required.

HM King awards BEM medal to BNB co-founder Annie McCormack

MANY CONGRATULATIONS TO Annie McCormack of Broke not Broken on being awarded a British Empire Medal (BEM) in HM The King's Birthday Honours List.

The British Empire Medal (BEM) was established in 1922. The BEM is awarded for meritorious civil or military service, worthy of recognition by the Crown. The BEM was awarded to subjects of the United Kingdom until 1992, after which time it lay in abeyance in the United Kingdom. It was specifically re-instated in June 2012, for HM The Queen's Diamond Jubilee, specifically to reward and honour those who work in the charitable and voluntary sectors.

Annie's co-founder Clare Slight was, as an Irish National, earlier awarded an Honorary BEM. Now, both of them have very properly and rightly been recognised.

Annie McCormack, said, 'Although starting life as a food bank, Broke Not Broken (BNB) has evolved and developed a range of projects, based on working with and for our community. I am accepting this honour on behalf of the whole charity and the hard work everyone has put in to create something very special. It is very humbling indeed. We love doing what we do, and we love how much of a difference we can make by doing small meaningful things for people that we live beside. Honours are not what any volunteer does the work for, but it's lovely to acknowledge the hundreds of thousands of hours of time that goes into all the volunteering across the country making Scotland a better place



for everyone to live in. It is so lovely to share this with Clare Slight who started the charity almost 10 years ago and remains a valued and active trustee..'

Readers will recall Broke Not Broken Kinross received The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service in 2022, which recognises outstanding work by volunteer groups to benefit their local communities. This is the highest award given to volunteer groups across the UK, to recognise exceptional service within their communities.

All of us in the Kinross community send congratulations on this royal recognition, Annie McCormack BEM. We're proud of you!









DISBELIEF HAS STRUCK KINROSS at the announcement by the Kinross Beer Garden that they are being forced to close on Saturday 15 July due to having been served an Enforcement Order by PKC Planning. They have been instructed to remove the bar, marquee, toilets and seating by Thursday 20 July.

The Enforcement Order says, 'The marquee is sited in an area with significant amenity value within the Kinross Conservation Area and is immediately adjacent to a designated Garden and Designed Landscape. It does not contribute positively to the surrounding environment. There are a number of residential receptors and a public road in close proximity to the site. The amenity of those receptors will be compromised by the development through disturbance caused by noise and lighting, lacking proper mitigation.'

It also states one of the reasons for closing as 'the development is less than 4 years old' – they were about to celebrate their fourth birthday (17 July). Planners say they have have received 'complaints regarding the marquee, associated structures and their intended use as an events area...'.

Jamie Montgomery, Director of the Kinross Estate Company told the *Newsletter*, 'We were obviously shocked to be informed by PKC Planning Department last week that we must shut down and remove all elements of the Beer Garden by 20 July. Although it was originally conceived during the Covid pandemic to permit people to meet up in a socially distanced environment, we have continued staging it during the summer months in the two years since the restrictions were lifted because all the feedback indicated that people wished it to continue. Since going public today with the closure order, we have been blown away by the strength of the support from the local community and, on the back of that, we will almost certainly lodge an appeal in the hope that the Kinross Beer Garden can gain a reprieve.'

As far as we are aware there has never been an issue with the Beer Garden. Local residents showed their support immediately by signing a petition www.change.org/p/save-your-beer-garden.

Observers have also commented that the Beer Garden is regularly cleared of litter and looked after by all who use it. It is well-supported by the local community and provides the only sizeable outdoor catered space in Kinross. Many others have enjoyed seeing the Market Park used to such an extent following the pandemic and have said what a great opportunity it has provided for live music and social get-togethers.

According to the enforcement order '...the marquee is sited in an area with significant amenity value...'. Many Kinrossians have commented on how perverse it seems that this amenity area will no longer be used or enjoyed. The electricity supply is also to be removed.

Cllr Dave Cuthbert said, 'As the Chair of KLEO, I would be hugely disappointed if the electrics were taken out of the Market Park. They make the events we put on there possible. We are planning a large market in the Market Park in August and we were planning to include the Beer Garden in our event. Hopefully, a solution can be found quickly.'

Cllr Neil Freshwater added, 'It's one of the few community spaces that brings people together in the milder months and there does seem to have been a huge number of objections to the closure. Of course, planning and licensing matters do need to be properly considered and so I hope that there can be a constructive dialogue between the owners, community and PKC planning officers to find a resolution.

'One option could be for a proper planning application to be submitted so that the beer garden's long-term future can be given full consideration. I am involved in a community pop-up pub elsewhere in Cleish which has been a huge success and I have been following with the interest the plans for a Glenfarg community pub, who also run a pop-up beer garden, so I know how important these spaces are to the community.'

Cllr Willie Robertson added, 'I am well aware that many Kinross-shire residents and visitors have greatly enjoyed meeting there to socialise. However on checking on the Council's planning portal it appears that the site does not have a valid planning consent to operate as a beer garden. A planning application was lodged for this last year but for some reason it was withdrawn.

'The rules were relaxed on the use of outside spaces for hospitality during Covid, but these relaxations are now no longer in place so all businesses who want to use outside spaces such as the Market Park for this purpose must apply for planning consent. Hopefully the owners of the site will do this promptly.'

Cllr Richard Watters added, 'I am both shocked and surprised by this news and will discuss it with council officers to understand the reasoning behind the notice. Since this is a planning issue and I sit on the Council's Planning Committee, I am unable to comment further according to the Councilors' Code of Conduct.'

Who Owns The Market Park?

THE MARKET PARK IS privately owned and maintained by Kinross Estate Company who, for many generations, have allowed community events to be staged in the Market Park — almost always free of charge. The Beer Garden is just the latest in a long list of events that have been able to use the Market Park in ways that benefit the Kinross community.

We hope that a solution will be found soon.







ANOTHER NEW BIN?!?!

CHANGES TO OUR BIN collections are coming soon, with the introduction of a new grey-lidded wheelie bin. Each household will receive one new wheelie bin.

Currently we have a 2 week cycle for bin collections with general waste collected on week 1 and recycling collected on week 2.

The new service will see a move to a 4 week cycle with general waste collected on week 1, paper/cardboard collected on week 2, general waste collected on week 3 and cans/plastics collected on week 4. There will be no reduction to general waste or garden and food collections.

The delivery of the new bins begins from 31 July and deliveries may take up to 3 months. This means that those that get bins delivered first will have a wait before they can start using them. You can to continue to use your blue lidded bin as usual until you receive a letter regarding the new service.

These changes to household recycling arrangements aim to reduce contamination and help contribute to PKC's corporate priority of tackling climate change and supporting sustainable places. Processing general waste is extremely expensive. It has extremely detrimental environmental factors and PKC is trying to move to becoming carbon neutral, which will only be achieved by reducing general waste output.

What Goes In Your New Bin?

FUTURE POSSIBLIITIES INCLUDE glass – it is being considered, however, large amounts of glass recycling are likely to be removed from council collections due to the upcoming national Deposit Return Scheme which is to be introduced on 16 August 2023.

Films, flexible plastics and foil are also under consideration.

The new service is expected to start in early November. Residents moving onto the new service will receive a letter around a month before the changes are implemented with information about the new bins and information on changes to collection dates.

Why Is This Necessary?

PKC SAY THAT splitting the waste out over 2 containers will achieve:

- Consistency to recycling services across Scotland
- Bringing down contamination levels
- Better quality materials for recycling as fibres which are easily contaminated by liquids or food remnants left on cans and plastics are kept separate and clean
- The possibility of accepting new materials for recycling

The recycling process becomes much easier when there aren't as many materials mixed together, and it is expected that

This is why PKC is not required to carry out a consultation process regarding the introduction of the new bins.

It is recognised that the new recycling system may not be convenient for everyone. Many have already expressed frustration and anger that they have no place to store a fourth wheelie bin. An online form will be created for those who want to report issues with storage.

PKC say they have endeavoured to provide the most appropriate service to reduce contamination, environmental impact and waste disposal costs in order to benefit everyone. Residents will be required to keep the new bins within the grounds of their property and present bins to the kerbside for collection, as they do currently.

GLENFARG SHOP TO CLOSE?

THE OWNERS OF THE shop that became a community lifeline during the pandemic have made the sad announcement of its impending closure - unless another aspiring shopowner takes it over.

Owners Russell, Mark and Joe were sad to say that after 13 years they are going to sell the shop and their house with it.

They told their customers, 'The cost of living crisis, energy crisis, interest rate rises, overhead price hikes and constant additional add on charges from our suppliers – it's felt like we just ended up throwing good money after bad.' They thanked the 'fantastic, supportive loyal customers and families in the village'.

A local resident told us, 'I really hope someone will take over the shop and keep it going.'

Glenfarg residents will face a hefty hike to the nearest retail outlet if they find themselves short of milk or bread (or even



the *Kinross Newsletter*) of an evening. The nearest shop will be Bridge of Earn, Milnathort or even Strathmiglo.

Grocery retailers up and down the country are finding it difficult to trade under the effects of the cost of living crisis, where the price of all essential goods and services has risen since the pandemic. Small shopkeepers are feeling the worst

effects, with many openly calling for help from the government, while many more have simply given up the ghost and shut up shop.

It's to be hoped that a valuable local resource such as the Glenfarg Village Shop, which has been a loyal supporter of the *Newsletter* for many years, can find new owners and keep trading.





A new event was the Community Climate Cafe organised by Alison Robertson and Louise Batchelor. No one quite knew what














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to expect but the group managed to keep talking till after 9pm.

PKC Award New Waste Recovery Energy Scheme

PKC HAS AWARDED a ten-year £50m waste treatment contract to Paprec Energies Binn Ltd. From August, they will work in partnership to treat residual waste and turn it into energy.

Each year, 40,000 tonnes of non-recyclable waste collected in P&K is sent to landfill. This material will be banned as new Scottish landfill regulations come into force at the end of 2025.

Cllr Richard Watters, Convener for the Climate Change & Sustainability Committee said: 'Through this contract the Council has sought to find a sustainable alternative for our residual waste and one which will also meet the Scottish Government's ban on landfilling biodegradable municipal waste.'

A new £90m facility is being developed at the Binn Ecopark in Glenfarg. The facility will be operational by 2026, will generate heat and electric power and could power an extended private renewable energy grid into Perth. The facility will supply heat using processes at the Eco Park, including horticultural systems.

Councillor Grant Laing, Leader of PKC said: "This will secure local jobs and provides further economic and community benefits

including the creation of a generous Community Benefit Fund.'

Sébastien Petithuguenin, CEO of Paprec said, 'PKC's ambition to transition waste from landfill into the circular economy is a clear way to answer to the challenges of this century.'

BCA To Become Loch Leven Gateway?



THE FIRST EXHIBITION AT the Millbridge Hall took place in June from developers London & Scottish Property Investment Management about their proposed retail park for the former BCA site. There was a chance to look at the plans in more depth.

Their new retail and community hub would be known as Loch Leven Gateway.

The developers also attended the May KCC meeting and discussed the possible creation of a new link road down to the loch as part of their plans. A planning application will be submitted around August, with building work estimated to be complete by 2025.

unauthorised access to a large empty car park.

As with all large scale developments, there are varying opinions. While many welcome a low cost supermarket in Kinross others are concerned about traffic, the impact on local businesses and there is, of course, environmental concern for Loch Leven. The developers say they are in discussion with PKC about flood mitigation measures.

They say, 'Our proposals will work in tandem with SEPA and the Council's proposed flood mitigation scheme to erect defence walls along the banks of the Quiech Burn. Measures will be incorporated to alleviate pressure on local drainage systems and watercourses such as Sustainable Urban Drainage systems, rain


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gardens and soft landscaping. This will create an attractive environment around the Retail Park and enhance biodiversity.

Cllr Freshwater commented, 'It was good to see that some of the suggestions that came out of a discussion between the proposed developers, ward councillors and community councils had been taken on board such as access to the Boat House at Loch Leven, should the application go ahead.'

No date has yet been set for the second public consultation event, however this is likely to be around mid/end August.





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

DON'T LOSE YOUR VOTE!

KINROSS RESIDENTS ARE being urged to check their electoral registration details or risk losing their chance to vote on decisions that affect them.

Roy Christie, Electoral Registration Officer said, 'Keep an eye out for important updates from the Electoral Registration Officer. The annual canvass is our way of making sure that the information on the electoral register is accurate and up to date. To make sure you don't lose your say at upcoming elections, simply follow the instructions sent to you.

'If you're not currently registered, your name will not appear in the messages we send. If you want to register, the easiest way is online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.'

The letter sent to each household will contain a flyer regarding Voter ID. If voting in person at a UK Parliament election you will need to show photo ID. You can use a range of different forms of ID, including your passport, driving licence or National Entitlement Card.

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document known as a Voter Authority Certificate. The requirement to show photo ID currently only applies to a UK Parliament by-election, but will apply to a UK Parliament general election from October 2023.

You do not need to show photo ID at Scottish Parliament or Scottish council elections. For more information or if you wish to apply for Voter ID please visit www. electoralcommission.org.uk/voter ID.

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

You will need:

For the gooseberries 300g gooseberries 75g caster sugar 10 heads of elderflower

For the custard
450ml whole milk
80g caster sugar
4 egg yolks
1 split vanilla pod seeds removed,
or ½ tsp vanilla paste
25g cornflour
2 leaves gelatine

For the pastry case
200g plain flour
100g cold cubed butter
2tbsp cold water
25g caster sugar
1 egg yolk (reserve the egg white)
Pinch salt

METHOD

For the gooseberries

Wash and trim the gooseberries and add to a pan with the sugar. Cook down on low for about 10-15 minutes or until softened and broken down. Mash with the back of spoon if needed and leave to cool.

Dunk the elder heads in cold water to wash and remove the leaves by dragging a fork along the stems. Add to the cooled gooseberry compote.

For the custard

First, make the custard. This is set custard which will hold when the tart is cut so has the addition of gelatine. Soak the gelatine leaves in cold water.

Beat the egg yolks, sugar and cornflour together with the vanilla until light in colour and slightly thickened. Heat the milk and add a small amount to the egg mixture before adding the rest of the milk slowly, whisking all the time.

Once all combined, return the custard to the pan and heat gently until thick enough to coat the back of your wooden spoon. Squeeze out the gelatine leaves and whisk into the custard off the heat. Pour into a

GOOSEBERRY AND ELDERFLOWER custard tart is the perfect way to celebrate the best of the season and as soon as the elderflowers came out, I hot-footed it down to my friend Lyndsay's fabulous kitchen garden to ransack whatever I could.

This cold tart is a taste of summer with the richness of custard, floral sweetness of the elderflowers and the zingy hit of the gooseberries. The gooseberries will need cooking down as eating them raw can lead to upset tummies and the tartness in the early season can be a bit of challenge!

container and cover the surface with cling film to stop a skin forming and chill.


For the pastry case

Make the tart pastry by mixing the flour and salt with the butter using your fingertips to create breadcrumbs. Cream the egg yolk and sugar in another bowl and add to the mix using a little cold water to bring it together if needed. Turn out the pastry and shape it quickly into a thick round and cover with cling film before chilling for about 30 minutes. Blind bake in a greased and

lined 20cm cake tin for 12 – 15 minutes at 190°c/170°c fan/ Gas 5. Remove the baking beans and paper and brush the base with a little egg white and return to the still hot oven for another minute or two.

Once cooled, spread a layer of the gooseberry compote on the base of the tart case and spoon the custard on top. Add another layer of compote on top of that and sprinkle with light brown sugar and crushed hazelnuts. You can use crushed ginger biscuits if you don't do nuts. Chill before cutting.

Weavers Gait Play Park

Residents of the Weavers Gait Development next to Lathro Farm are understandably concerned that the play park promised for their development has not yet opened.



When I started to investigate the issue, I discovered that the story behind the play park is incredibly complicated. When the original application for the development was put in, back in 2015, the play park was to be constructed in the first phase of the development, just off Acremoar Drive at the top of the hill.

The condition attached to the original application said that the play area was to be laid out and equipped within six months of the occupation on the site. However, in 2017, a new application was submitted and this moved the play park to a new location, this time it was to be in the phase two area of the development, with a temporary play park to be built adjacent to the surface drainage pond at the end of Latch Dubh Lane. A new condition for this application said that the temporary play park was to be made operational within six months of the occupation of the first residential unit in phase two of the site.

I do not know for sure when the first house was occupied in Drumeuther Way, which I am guessing is the first residential unit in phase two. However, I am pretty sure it was much more that six months ago. I have asked that officers treat this apparent breach of planning seriously and take enforcement action immediately.

I have also asked that the position with the final play park be looked at now, as the condition set in yet another planning application, in 2019, said that the approved play area shall be designed, laid out and equipped in accordance with the planning authority's current criteria for play area provision and be available for use prior to the occupation of the one hundredth dwellinghouse hereby approved."

I do not know the exact number of houses now built and occupied in phase two of this development, but I imagine that there must be almost 50 houses now completed. Given the speed of build out, I have asked officers to inform the developer, that this condition will be enforced to the full extent of the law.

Enhanced Rear Gardens / 3m Buffer Strip

Residents of Lathro Park have told me that they were promised a 3m buffer strip at the back of their properties. I understand that this was to allow them to maintain their fences and hedges.

The drawings which were approved, show a fence 3 metres from Lathro Park rear fences, with a hedge to be planted between the two fence lines. This is described on the drawings as 'Enhanced Rear Gardens / 3m Buffer Strip'.

The new houses are now being built and it would appear, that the developer has decided to simply make the gardens longer and not to put in the fences which are shown on all the plans relating to the site. On contacting the developer, they have told me that the '/' means that they can build either a buffer strip OR build enhanced gardens. They went on to tell me that they will rescind one of these plans, which clearly shows the fences. I have not been able to establish what rescind means, but I have asked officers if they would instruct the developer to put forward new drawings, wherever the fences are shown as being constructed. I await a response.

Having sought legal advice on the interpretation of the '/' in the description, I have been told that it can either mean 'or' or it can mean 'and'. Given the ambiguity, officers are of the opinion that they cannot enforce the erection of the fences (despite them being shown on all the drawings).

I have asked for a second opinion, on the basis that I believe a 'reasonable person' would interpret the drawings as showing that

a buffer strip was to be built, between the two fence lines. This may appear to be a small problem, but it isn't for the residents of Lathro Park neighbouring the new houses and I think it again reflects badly on the developer and the Council. I am now starting to look more closely at the other conditions attached to the numerous planning consents on this site, as I have a suspicion that there are more issues that need addressing.

Local NHS Dental Provision: Many people are becoming increasingly worried about being able to access an NHS dentist locally. In light of this I contacted both out dental practices on 5 June – please see the correspondence below. I am



very disappointed to report that both of them have completely ignored my letter. I am still hopeful that they will respond. Good oral health is very important and should be available to everyone regardless of their financial situation.

Good morning.

I have been contacted by several constituents who are concerned about the difficulty in accessing an NHS dentist in Kinross. One of them wrote to our MSP Jim Fairlie and he has now replied - please see below. Can you please let me know if your practice is going to avail itself of the funding Mr. Fairlie refers to? I am hoping that this funding would enable Kinrossshire residents to continue to access NHS dentistry locally.

Dear Sir,

Thank you for copying me into the email you sent regarding your concerns with the removal of NHS Dentist provision from Kinross and I am sorry with the delay in getting back to you but my office has experienced a large influx of correspondence.

As you may be aware, Dental practices are similar to GP practices in that the provision of service that they provide is up to each individual practice as they are private practices who have contracts with the NHS. So in this case, it would be up to the practice in Kinross to decide how many places they offer for NHS provision. However, I share your concerns that people within Kinross are now not able to receive NHS dental services locally.

I have already raised this matter directly with NHS Tayside and have raised the matter within the Scottish Parliament.

The Scottish Government and I recognise the challenges facing the sector and are working on the introduction of national payment reform with a new, modernised system that will provide NHS dental teams with greater clinical discretion and transparency for NHS patients.

We have put in place tailored solutions for health board areas where dental access is particularly challenging by expanding Scottish Dental Access Initiative grants to help with setting up new practices or extend existing ones. The Scottish Government has also made available an enhanced recruitment and retention allowance of up to £37,500 over three years.

When I raised this in Parliament this week, the minister announced that they recently expanded the Scottish dental access initiative grant support to Kinross. Which is an attractive and unique financial support package has been offered to incentivise the setting-up of new practices or the extension of existing practices. There is the potential of up to £100,000 being offered for the first surgery, with £25,000 per additional

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surgery. I am hopeful that this will encourage future practices to be set up so the people of Kinross-shire can have access to NHS dental services locally.

Official statistics, published by Public Health Scotland, show that more than 95% of the Scottish population is registered with an NHS dentist. Considerable progress has been made in NHS dental services and oral health improvements – progress that was interrupted by the unique challenges of the pandemic. Statistics now show a significant recovery in NHS dental service provision following the relaxation of infection prevention and controls in April last year.

In my capacity as Convenor of the Covid-19 Recovery Committee, we have agreed to an enquiry into the impact that Covid has had on dental practices but also to enquiry to the reasons to why NHS dentists are going private or leaving the profession all together. This will be done to help shape the debate and aim to inform further policy decisions that impact the dental sector.

However, it is undeniable that Brexit, which all main Westminster parties are now signed up for, has had a significant impact on recruitment of health and social care staff. The rate of EU and EFTA dentists joining the register has halved since the EU referendum without a clear increase in rest-of-world registration. The Nuffield Report 'Health and Brexit: six years on' published in December 2022 describes the UKs workforce of qualified dentists as being "a particular concern". The report states that before the EU referendum, consistently well over 500 dentists trained in the EU workforce. This dropped sharply around the time of the referendum, to around half its previous level, and has never recovered.

Whilst Scotland continues to outperform England when it comes to number of dentists per head despite the incredibly challenging pandemic period, with disruptions to the education and training of dentists – we need to find a way of ensuring that we have an immigration system that is not just humane but meets our social and economic needs.

It is clear, and it is becoming clearer every day, that Scotland will not find either of those things as part of the Westminster system of government. The route to both is through Scotland becoming an independent country.

Thank you again for getting in touch regarding this important issue.

Big Place Conversation and Tourism Following on from my column in the June edition of the Newsletter regarding the 'Big Place Conversations' taking place throughout the area, I discussed with the Kinross Partnership and council



officers the possibility of holding an event focused on tourism, allowing the views of tourism to be incorporated within the council's future strategies, such as the Local Development Plan and Mobility Strategy. The officers have agreed to collaborate with the partnership to develop a 'Focus on Tourism' Big Place Conversation at the end of September. This will provide an opportunity for local businesses, organisations, and individuals to express their opinions on the future of tourism in Kinross-shire.

Electric Vehicle Charging Network

A £1.465 million plan to supercharge electric vehicle charging in Perth and Kinross was passed at the last Climate Change and Sustainability committee, creating an accessible EV charging network that meets the needs of users across Perth and Kinross, particularly those in rural areas. To achieve this, the Council is planning mini rapid charging hubs in strategic locations. These will be supported by a range of local fast chargers in towns and rural areas. In total, there will be three mini hubs, 40 fast chargers installed in rural areas and another 40 in Perth. A further six rapid charging units will be added to existing sites: three at the South Inch hub in Perth and three in Kinross.

The estimated total cost of installing the new chargers is £1.465 million. A significant proportion of the funding is expected to come from the Scottish Government's Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Fund, with the remainder from private investment. This is a long-term project, but it is important to plan for rising demand. Improving network coverage will make driving electric vehicles more efficient and sustainable, regardless of location.

Additionally, I am pleased that the Council has committed a further £250,000 in this year's budget to enhance the provision of EV charging points across the Council area.

Waste Management

I recently attended the signing of a significant 10-year contract worth £50 million to treat residual waste and turn it into energy. The Council has appointed Paprec Energies Binn Ltd and from August, both will work in partnership to manage the waste through thermal treatment, energy recovery and recycling solution.

Currently, around 40,000 tonnes of non-recyclable waste is collected in Perth and Kinross each year and sent to landfill. This material will be banned from landfill as new Scottish landfill regulations come into force at the end of 2025.

The new Energy from Waste facility is being developed locally at the Binn Eco Park in Glenfarg. This energy from waste solution offers a safer and less environmentally damaging way of treating unavoidable non-recyclable waste that previously went to landfill, It secures a solution that will reduce carbon emissions in line with our Climate Change Strategy.

However, waste avoidance must be the main priority and we all need to do our part to reduce, reuse and recycle as much as possible.

Mens Shed - Swansacre Building

I was delighted to attend the official opening of the 'Mens Shed' Swansacre building along with our MSP, Jim Fairlie and Cllr Cuthbert. One of my highlights as a Councillor was the day that the University of Highlands and Islands announced that the Mens Shed had been successful in their bid for the building, bringing an end to a long process and starting a new process of turning the building into a 'shed'.

I HOPE KINROSS NEWSLETTER readers are enjoying the summer months. It is now the parliamentary recess until September, meaning there is no Chamber business and MSPs spend their time within their constituencies and



that provides us with many more opportunities to support local events and agricultural shows. Of course, these events would not happen without a huge number of volunteers and I want to thank everyone who gets involved.

I also want to thank those across Kinross-shire who got in touch with me about the Dewars Centre. My colleague Murdo Fraser MSP introduced a motion to the Scottish Parliament to debate the concerns over the proposed closure of the facility which has now thankfully been saved for at least a year.

The Dewars Centre is not only the historic heart of Curling in Scotland, but has also been central to the numerous successes we have witnessed on the international stage, and many of our highest-level players have used the facility to train. Some of these notable successes include gold at the Men's World Championships for the first time since 2009, silver for both the Men's and Women's sides at the World Senior Championships, and of course, the extraordinary gold medal success of Eve Muirhead's team at the Winter Olympics, all of which have happened in the last year.

The Dewars centre is equally important for grassroots sport and is an important inter-generational social hub. The sporting facilities it provides are crucial for the physical and mental health of its many users across Perth and Kinross. We all subscribe to the goal of increasing national health and wellbeing and the recent surge of sport facilities closing will only exacerbate the growing health problems we are witnessing. That is without mentioning the knock-on effect these decisions have on overall sporting attainment, the economic consequences, and the inevitable rise of anti-social behaviour among young people.

I am so glad we have been able to save the facility from closure, but this is just one high-profile case among many. It is clear from the evidence provided at the Cross-Party Group on Sport - which I convene - that there are growing concerns among the sporting sector about the impact these closures have on grassroots sport. I implore the Scottish Government to think very carefully about its current approach and to properly re-evaluate its approach to grassroots sport.

THIS MONTH IN THE Scottish Parliament I asked the Scottish Government to provide an update on the challenges faced by NHS dentistry following the disappointing news that the last NHS dentist is to close at the end of July in Kinross.



Whilst the practice is set to go private it is clearly an issue for many people who would like to access coverage of a very important health service, with many being now having to travel to Perth or further north to get a dentist appointment under the NHS. My question to The Minister for Public Health and Women's Health, Jenni Minto, was to ask what more the Scottish Government can do to improve access to NHS dentistry in rural areas, including those in my constituency.

The Minister responded that the Scottish Government is working apace to move forward with a modernised system of payment reform that will provide longer-term sustainability for the sector and encourage dentists to provide NHS care.

The new system provides greater clinical freedom to dentists through a high-trust and low-bureaucracy model and is part of a Government commitment to provide sustained and improved equitable national access to NHS dentistry by 2026.

Furthermore, the Government is working closely with NHS boards, to help them develop tailored solutions to address local access issues.

The Minister confirmed that they have expanded Scottish dental access initiative grant support to Kinross, which is an attractive and unique financial support package to incentivise the setting-up of new practices or the extension of existing practices. This is a potential of up to £100,000 being offered for the first surgery, with £25,000 per additional surgery.

I welcome the Government's action, and I hope that it helps provide a solution towards returning a NHS dentistry practice in Kinross.

As I write this I am looking forward to attend the Open Day at Kinross and District Men's Shed this coming weekend and learn all about their outstanding community project. The concept of the Men's Shed originated in Australia, as a solution to promoting social interaction and reduce depression that was often experienced by retiring men. Over the years the idea has travelled overseas and is now widespread across Scotland, including locally.

The Men's Shed is a place designed to make men feel at home, where they can come together to work, play or just hang out with others. There's no pressure to create anything or provide help, but there are a range of activities such as railway modelling, photography, boat renovation, restoring garden benches, woodworking, cycle repairs and converting cycles to electric cycles.

Age Scotland research demonstrated that 76% of members surveyed agreed their physical health improved, and 79% felt that their mental health improved as a result of shed involvement, and MSPs have highlighted this impact during several member's debates in Parliament over recent years. The Kinross and District group also do many projects for charitable groups and the community, and I'm also interested to hear about that side of their work.

'FIRST OF ALL, ARE you ok?' That was Holly Willoughby's knuckle bitingly excruciating opening to camera, addressing her 'This Morning' audience at home when she returned to the studio sofa, Phil-less.



As I write, the papers are filled with gossip. What does Eamonn think of Holly, and why is Holly hurt by Phil? I'm getting emails from constituents furious about the airtime devoted to hot air when there's a war in Ukraine and a cost of living crisis at home.

So should we care about the presenter stooshie, with one set of TV stars slagging off their colleagues? In my view, absolutely not. Because it's not the story.

The real story centres around the toxic work environment which seems to exist at ITV, with multiple allegations of bullying, and serious questions about vulnerable staff safeguarding. The programme's editor was doorstepped by a journalist and asked for comment. 'You know what I think is toxic? Aubergines!' I think he thought it was funny. It wasn't. It was surreal. He was asked a serious question, and responded with arrogance. An ITV executive later told me the response was 'ill judged.'

I sit on the Commons Culture and Media Select Committee and we've summoned the Chief Executive of ITV to appear before us. She has already announced a barrister led inquiry into bullying claims. I suspect she may try to deflect questions by saying she's waiting for the KC's report. But I won't be having that. I've already used social media and the press to ask whistleblowers to contact me, in confidence, to tell me about their experiences. I've had a substantial number of replies. There's a recurring theme – folk bullied and belittled at work and complaints going unaddressed. Those complaining often end up leaving whether willingly or unwillingly.

Folk sometimes see the media as a glamorous career. And it can be. But for every high paid Huw Edwards or Fiona Bruce there are hundreds of freelancers working long hours on minimum pay. Or, if they're young unpaid 'work experience'. That encourages disproportionate numbers whose parents can help them out. As a result the media is too often led, especially at the upper levels, by privileged privately educated men. Indeed the current Chair of the BBC secured his job after donating hundreds of thousands of pounds to the Conservative Party and having helped facilitate a loan for Boris Johnson – the Prime Minister who then appointed him. When this was revealed he was forced to announce his resignation.

I'm a big fan of public service broadcasting. We don't want to slip down an Americanised route with channels like GB News and TalkTV filling the air waves with angry intolerance. As we try to counter disinformation in what's sometimes called the world of 'post truth politics' we need trustworthy news sources.

So to answer Holly's question, yes I'm ok. But are her junior colleagues? We need to detoxify the working environment in much of the media. Whether for jobs, exports or news it's a vital part of our national life.

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THE LOVELY SUMMER WEATHER is here which makes us spend more time outdoors. We must consider risks to safety so here are a few tips to help have a safe and enjoyable summer.

Everyone wants to see our countryside and enjoy our waterways and coastline particularly with swimming pools being closed.

But please remember, any area of water, including lochs, reservoirs, canals and rivers can hold hidden dangers (this is particularly pertinent for those who might wish to swim to the islands found on the Tay as it passes through Perth).

With many stretches of water in the county being located in remote areas, help will often be some considerable time away, so take responsibility for your own actions and make sensible decisions to stay safe around waterways.

Be responsible and enjoy a safe summer by:

- Being aware of the dangers when out hillwalking, cycling or near areas of water. Think about the risks and plan to minimise them.
- Never underestimating the current, temperature or depth when in water.
- Never get into the water alone and don't go swimming after drinking alcohol.
- If you get in trouble in water, float to live.

You can find out more about inland water safety from our partners Scottish Water.

To get more information about how to enjoy sea sports and Scotland's coastline safely, get advice from the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) and HM Coastguard, and general advice about water safety is also available from the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA).

If you see someone in difficulty or at risk at sea or along the coast always dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

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IT'S THURSDAY MORNING. Sunshine is bouncing off the walls and windows of Rachel House. Birds are singing. After a long, cold spring, flowers are bursting with pentup energy.

'You chose a good day to visit,' a smiling Lyndsay Stobie says as she opens the front door to the Kinross hospice for children.

As welcomes go, it could hardly be warmer. Yet many people (including Lyndsay herself) admit to feelings of uncertainty on their first visit. That word 'hospice' casts an end-of-life shadow. But, as I'm about to discover, the building, the blossoming garden and the dedicated staff and volunteers who work here, are full of cheerful life. Like the children whose families enjoy comforting respite here, some of them for many years to come. Defying stereotypes, their stories are as uplifting as they are moving.

Why am I here? I'm visiting Rachel House because this year Pond Cottage is fundraising for the inspiring and desperately needed work of CHAS through our Scotland's Gardens Scheme events and activities.

And I want to know more about an unexpected personal connection between Rachel House and Pond Cottage. A welcoming invitation from community fundraiser Lyndsay Stobie included intriguing information. Almost 30 years ago — when the *Daily Record* was campaigning to raise money for what was then Scotland's first hospice — the Montgomery family of Kinross House gifted four acres of tree-sheltered land to CHAS to build Rachel House. That was in December 1994, and by an odd chance, just a year previously Ray and I had

bought our ten-acre slice of woodland and wetland from the Montgomery family – a little over two miles north of Kinross.

Like Rachel House, Pond Cottage is surrounded by fine old trees bequeathed by the Kinross Estate. But, while we overlook a pond created a century ago (probably for duck shooting), Rachel House and its garden catch glimpses of Loch Leven Nature Reserve. Today the great expanse of water is sparkling with sunlight.

By another lucky chance, Thursday is a day when gardening volunteers are at work, digging, weeding and planting. Lyndsay leads me through the garden to meet them, along a path lined with spring bulbs, through an arch framed with cherry blossom, past playful touches – sculptures and painted signs – among the plants.

Children's bedrooms are on the ground floor opening to green space with play equipment and swings designed to take wheel-

chairs. We pass the beautifully planted quiet space around the three peaceful rooms reserved for end of life care. At the other end of the garden a secluded area is popular with teenagers getting a rare chance to hang out.

There's evidence that children were actively involved in the building designed by Alan Marshall in 1994. It provides rooms for eight children with 24 hour one-to-one nursing care. There's separate accommodation (and chance of a night's sleep) for parents and siblings, a hydrotherapy pool, and comfortable common rooms for dining and socialising.

'Families have such different needs,' says Lyndsay, 'for some coming here is a lifeline, there's medical and social support, financial guidance. But it's also a chance to make things happen. To have fun.'

The garden is for rest and fun. In an important sense it is a chance to live a normal life. Many families live in deprived areas, most do not have time to spend in gardens or public parks. 'It's not easy to get out when you're looking after a child with a life-shortening condition," says Lyndsay.

We round a corner. Two volunteers, Jo Brown and Angela Taylor, are digging behind a handsome sandstone wall marking



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the old Kinross estate. It's another cheerful sight. In a developing kitchen garden, raised beds grow crops for the hospice, healthy young espalier apple trees, (donated by Kinross Order of St John to celebrate the Queen's platinum jubilee) promise autumn fruit. Rachel House gardening volunteers are looking forward to the return of a head gardener after two years without one, but clearly they have not been idle.

Jo and Angela have just planted rows of potatoes. 'Earlies, second earlies and main crop,' says Jo, straightening up. She got to know CHAS as a Sunday School teacher bringing groups of young people to visit the hospice and applied to become a volunteer when she retired. 'I was quite nervous the first time I brought a group of children here. Now sometimes people ask me, how can you work there? They just don't know how happy this place is.'

It's a recurring theme of our conversations. Another volunteer, Pam Paxton, weeding by the front gate, has been part of the Rachel House team for almost ten years. She wanted to help in the garden when she retired from her admin career but was asked to start in reception. 'I wasn't sure about working in the house but walking through the door for the first time I felt it was such a warm and happy place.'

Angela applied to help in the garden after becoming redundant from Lloyds Visa Centre during lockdown but she had known about CHAS since the pioneering campaign which began in 1991. Her friend's sister, Lorraine Dickson, had to travel to Yorkshire for respite with her young son, Marc. She joined forces with another mother, Nancy Blaik, making the same journey with her son Daniel. 'They wondered why there were several hospices in England and none in Scotland,' Angela tells me later.

It's a remarkable story (to be told more fully later), a 'mission impossible' which quickly led to the founding of CHAS. With support of the *Daily Record*, a fund-raising appeal raised £4m towards the £10m building cost, the rest followed within 13 months. Scotland's first children's hospice was named Rachel House after Rachel, Lady MacRobert, in recognition of a £2 million donation by The MacRobert Trust.

'It was the fastest built hospice in the

UK,' says Rami Okasha, CHAS chief executive, with a smile, on my second visit to the garden two weeks later.

Fund-raising is a constant fact of life for a charity providing high quality, multi-disciplinary 'life and death affirming' care for a growing number of children and families facing the reality of life with life-shortening conditions. Medical advances mean longer lives for more children with

terminal illnesses (recent CHAS research estimates more than 16,000 children aged 0-21 are in need of specialist care). Each year CHAS needs to raise £21.5 million to fund care across Scotland, including two hospices (Robin House opened in Balloch, West Dunbartonshire in 2005) plus a growing outreach programme of specialist care in hospitals and at home. The Scottish Government gives £7m which leaves £13m to raise from fundraising activities and generous sponsorship.

Volunteers are an essential part of this effort. Working in hospices, family homes, or online from their own homes, they bring all kinds of skills and experience. Not least Craggan the golden retriever, a much-loved part of the Therapet team — with his own website page.

Volunteers also provide an invaluable link with local communities. Numbers have declined since the pandemic but there are more than 800 across Scotland and currently 102 volunteers in Kinross, 43 in Rachel House and 59 in the two shops in Kinross High Street.

Sunlight is casting dappled shadow across the lawn as we finish our cups of tea. On my second garden visit, we've seen the early potatoes are already sprouting. I ask Rami if there's a message he wants to emphasise. As CEO his tweets often convey urgency with optimism. CHAS is firmly resolved in its vital mission – to reach every family in need of help. It is hugely demanding and yet immensely satisfying work.

'There's a wonderful camaraderie between staff and volunteers,' says Rami. 'Although hospices deal with sadness they are also places of huge fun. I think we owe a huge thank you to all our volunteers and their incredible gifts of time and ingenuity. We need them and want them to enjoy being here.'

A MODEL EXAMPLE

Dollar Museum contains a scale working model of the old Dollar railway and mine workings, over 3m in length, built by local enthusiast Mick Rice. Here he tells us about the pitfalls of mine modelling

DOLLAR STATION

THE MINE MODEL was started in the first Covid lockdown period in March 2020. The first task was to design the station and its buildings, the goods-yard and associated trackwork.

Due to the size of the model and the need to incorporate as much relevant material as possible, "N" gauge was decided upon. The has a scale of 1:148 or 2mm / foot. Most of the buildings were scratch built and then painted and weathered. The track and crossing points as well as signals, locomotives, wagons, vehicles and people were purchased. The display case the model had to fit in was $1.6 \times 0.6 M$ in size.

The station in the model was dated 1963, just before the line was closed to passenger traffic, although the track was used until 1973 to carry coal from Dollar Mine. The goods yard was replaced with houses and is now Strathdevon Place.

The only part of the station remaining is the curved platform edge and the track-bed is now a cycling and walking route called The Devon Way. There is a scale model locomotive and wagons moving from east to west in the model. This model was installed in the museum later on in 2020.

DOLLAR MINE

I STARTED TO design the mine model in the Autumn of 2021. This involved the layout of the rail tracks, roads, mine tunnels and associated mine infrastructure. The 2 tunnels Dollar #4 and Dollar #5 were sunk going south from the mine site at Westerton at an angle of about 30° and were 1000' (350M) long and at the bottom of the shaft were 600' (200M) deep and directly under the Devon River.

The layout was researched using archive photographs and other material held at Dollar Museum as well as advice from the Scottish Mining Museum south of Edinburgh and most importantly eye witness accounts of former mining employees still living in Dollar. This model has been displayed in Dollar Museum since Christmas 2021.

STATION & MINE JOINED

THE TWO MODELS were always intended to be joined as one model and an unfortu-

nate water leak at the museum over Christmas 2022 allowed the Trustees to carry out some re-organisation to the interior fixtures to enable this to happen. It was relocated downstairs adjacent to the main permanent display of the Devon Valley Railway.

This combined model is now over 3M in length and nearly a meter wide. The model now has a functioning LED lit underground display with representations of the coal face cutter, hydraulic roof supports and conveyors, as well as personnel. There is also a computer-controlled system of wagons being hauled up the ramps and into the mine building complex. The main-line locomotive and wagons can now travel from Dollar Station the length of the model to Westerton Crossing.

To see this model and its supportive displays as well as lots of other local material, visit the museum at the top of East Burnside and at the entrance to the Mill Green.

The museum is open from Easter to Christmas on Saturdays from 11.00 to 13.00hrs and 14.00 to 16.30hrs and Sundays from 14.00 to 16.30hrs. Entry is free.

TRACTORS FOR STEPHEN



I WENT DOWN TO the Stephen Lyon Charity Shop on the High Street to meet with Jackie Lyon, Stephen's mum. She was smiling broadly as she showed me a letter she had received from Stephen Leckie, Lord Lieutenant of Perth and Kinross which she had quite rightly put in a frame. Holding it tightly she told me, 'I'm so proud of it!'

The letter commends all the work in the community by the charity that Jackie set up in September 2020 after the loss of her son Stephen to suicide. The charity has been going for almost three years now and is reaching more and more people, offering emotional and practical support for those who have been affected by suicide or experienced suicidal thoughts.

Jackie summed it up: 'We work to give them reasons to live.' From teenagers as young as 14, they can help with home visits and one-to-one sessions in children's own homes. The health centre and PKC mental health team now signpost clients to the organisation and get them much needed local help. Jackie is delighted that they have linked up with PKC to work with them on delivering workshops about suicide prevention.

The charity shop has had a revamp and has a welcoming vibe. Jackie told me that it is a hub run by service users, and not just a shop. It offers retail experience and mentoring to young people who want to gain some work experience: it's also a place they can meet friends and socialise.

Recent local fundraising events include the popular Vintage Tractor Run in May. Jackie told me, 'The staff and volunteers are very thankful to the drivers of the vintage tractors for supporting us. Although the weather wasn't great in the morning by the afternoon the sun was shining. The run supported us as well as the Guide Dogs for the Blind. I want to thank them for considering us as a local charity to support.'



Jackie was excited to tell me about the The Baton of Hope UK Tour which starts its journey this month, and visits 12 cities across the nation along the way. The journey starts in Glasgow and ends in Downing Street two weeks later.

The Baton of Hope has fast become the biggest campaign for suicide prevention, and is endorsed by a number of public figures including the late Queen Elizabeth II. Organisers hope to impact the lives of thousands along the way, and raise awareness for those affected by suicide as well as pre-

vention initiatives. There is a clear message: Where there is hope, there is a real opportunity to save lives.

The Baton is carried by notable personalities, leaders, and people with inspiring stories of hope. Jackie is honoured to be carrying it for Stephen.

Meanwhile back in Kinross, there will be an August Fun Day in memory of Stephen at Kirkgate Park. This involves the now annual Superhero walk around the loch. There will be lots of stalls in the park, races for children, Beat the Goalie and lots of other activities on Saturday 5 August, as well as the opportunity to see lots of superheros!

WHAT IS KEY TO understanding yourself and others? I'm going to begin a series of short articles to encourage reflection and personal growth with a consideration of awareness — being present in every moment.

A professor was invited to deliver a series of lectures in America. To reach the staff accommodation, he tried to take the lift to the third floor. He pressed the button marked '3'. The doors closed, but nothing happened. He tried again, still nothing. He pressed the button to open the doors- Still nothing. He punched buttons '1' and '2' - still no result. He felt panic beginning to rise. On the verge of pressing the emergency button, he made a final try with button '4'. Much to his relief, the lift set off and deposited him on level 4, after which he walked down to his destination. On reporting the "fault" he was asked, "But don't you have the key?" Sure enough, when he checked the keys he had been given, there was a small one marked 'Elevator'. It would give him access to those floors not normally open to the public. He had the key, but he did not know it.

I heard this story recently, and it struck me as a very strong and appropriate metaphor for how we often look at what is going on our lives. We have the keys, but do not know it, or the keys are easy to find, but we don't know where to look.

Over the next few articles, I would like to develop the key metaphor, and consider what keys can unlock our understanding of ourselves and of others. The first is AWARENESS.

Recent years have seen a dramatic rise in all things spiritual and alternative, including reiki, reflexology, and hypnotherapy. This interest seems to cross the intellectual, class and ethnic differences in society. One of the arguments against this trend from the traditional religions is that it encourages selfishness and introspection. It seems to me that it is far more about trying to understand oneself, in order to be less selfish and introspective, but also to feel that solutions come from within rather than being imposed from the outside. If it is important to mention God - and I believe it is - then it is only important because God has to be within every cell of our body, and therefore within every cell of the bodies of others. That is why the Indian greeting "Namaste" is so gentle, yet utterly appropriate: "The God within me greets the God within you."

Without awareness, change, growth and development are impossible. Without it, we cannot know our strengths and weaknesses. We cannot be sensitive to the needs of others and,

as Anthony De Mello says in his wonderful book, we stay asleep for most of our waking lives.

Priorities And Perspective

How many of you have experienced the sudden shock of a car accident, burglary, death of a loved one, or partner losing their job? This is a tiny list of the many things that can make a dramatic impact on our lives. While you live through the aftermath, you possibly describe yourself as numb. However, I would venture that you are actually numb to the unimportant things of life. You are probably very much aware of the things that really matter. A sense of priority and perspective comes into everything. You just know that such things as dirty windows, not having everything you want, work, politics, or whether or not you were invited to this or that event are suddenly not important any more. Your concentration zeroes in on love and pride, consideration and gratitude. You swear that you will not lose this clarity and sense of purpose but, life being life, this precious sense often slips out of your grasp without you even noticing.

Deciding to be aware is the starting point of the journey. Keep not only your eyes and ears open, but also your other senses - especially your sixth sense, that part of you that knows what is going on, beyond the usual knowing. Think about:

A new mother who always seems to know when her baby is crying, despite the crying of many other babies.

Stepping into your workplace and instantly sensing the atmosphere, friendly or otherwise.

Asking yourself, with curiosity rather than criticism, what might have caused a strong reaction either in you, or in others.

The sudden instinct to make contact with someone.

This is a way of walking alongside yourself, as you live your life, and just gently observing your way of being. Don't beat yourself or others up about perceived mistakes, just be an observer - 'the watcher of the thinker'.

The awareness key does not take you out of circulation, but encourages you to be fully present in every moment. You will find your awareness grows simply because of your intention to be aware. From the position of awareness, understanding follows and you learn to flow with life, rather than being rigidly fixed to one point.

ARE YOU TICK AWARE?

LYME DISEASE WAS ONLY recognised as recently as 1993 and is caused by a bacteria known as Borrelia burgdorferi which sounds like something you would catch in a drive-through. The bacteria are transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected tick. These ticks are found all over the UK but are particularly common in Tayside and the Central Highlands, in woodlands, long grass and open countryside. Although Lyme disease can occur at any time of year, it is more common in summer and early autumn.

The Big Tick Project in 2016 found that one third of dogs studied had ticks attached which can then be transmitted to their owners.

The importance of awareness of the disease lies in the ability to prevent tick bites, as there is no current vaccine against Lyme disease. The following advice may help:

- If walking, running, cycling or even playing golf, wear long sleeved shirts and trousers tucked into socks.
- Use insect repellent on exposed skin
- Check yourself, family members and pets for ticks at the end of a day spent in woodland or long grass areas

Tick Removal

Ticks, if found, are best removed with special tick removal tweezers available at pharmacies or veterinary surgeries. After removal, the area of skin should be cleaned with antiseptic or soap and water.



DO NOT try to burn ticks off or douse them with alcohol.

When To Contact The Surgery

If you are not sure if you have removed all of the tick, please contact the surgery, you may be asked to send a photo of the area.

A number of people bitten by ticks develop a distinctive rash sometimes up to three weeks after being bitten.

If the affected person also develops fever and muscle aches, you should contact the surgery or Out of Hours Service.

Again, a photograph will be helpful to the clinician in deciding how to deal with the situation.

Treatment of Lyme disease is beyond the scope of this article, but remember prevention is key so be 'tick aware'!

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
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Community Council News

The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. Kinross Community Council News from the May Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 23 May were CCIIrs L McKay, W Freeman, E Leslie, H Phillips, C Collins, CIIrs D Cuthbert, W Robertson and CIIr R Watters, 35 MoP, clerk Mrs C Aird

Apologies CCllrs T Stewart and M Wilson, Cllr N Freshwater and Police Scotland.

Police Scotland Report

Police Scotland advised that since the last meeting there had been 96 calls to the police from the Kinross area. There had been 11 crimes recorded within this period.

01/05/2023 Drug Driving (Park & Ride, Junction Road, Kinross) Subject to live enquiry

Officers continue to carry out speed checks across the area, with four drivers being spoken to.

Community team activity, on 3 May 2022 PC Samson held a talk with a modern studies class at KHS.

Andy Robertson and Team, London & Scottish Property Investment Management re proposal for former BCA site (Planning Application: 23/00005/PAN)

CCIIr Mckay welcomed representatives from LSPIM. Mr Robertson thanked the CC and advised that processes were already underway with PKC in terms of a PAN being submitted. Mr Robertson presented a history of both his organisation and work previously carried out by them across the country.

LSPIM are looking to regenerate the site, providing employment both in the construction phase but also with a range of retailers, with the ultimate aim of reducing expenditure leakage to other areas, reducing CO2 emissions, helping PKC to achieve their Net Zero target, providing new linkages to both the Loch and the High Street, while noting that there are currently a number of constraints including ground contaminations, asbestos in the buildings and flooding problems. Mr Robertson advised that PKC were currently looking into a flood mitigation scheme and they will work with them on this.

Mr Robertson advised of key milestone dates including public consultations between 14 June and mid-July, planning application submission around August 2023, with building work estimated to be complete by 2025 (construction will not commence until all funding is in place).

A member of the public questioned the flood defence scheme in respect of building a retaining wall and Mr Robertson advised that this work was about a wider area of flood defence, with SEPA not allowing anything to be built which would make the system worse. It was noted that a petrol station was proposed and the public enquired about EV points, with Mr Robertson advising that with all applications, a minimum of 30 EV points must be provided.

The audience also raised concerns about litter and were advised that it would be part of the contract with retailers that litter would be collected by their employees and about lighting (would not be on 24 hrs).

Concern was also raised about the removal of the bollards and were advised that BCA had removed them. Concerns about access to the car park would be looked at and Mr Robertson agreed to do something about this to allay fears.

Cllr Watters asked whether LSPIM would work with residents with regard to safeguarding the quality/buffer and the impact of same, with Mr Robertson confirm he heard their concerns and would be happy to work with them.

The audience also raised concerns with the current drainage system and suggested a rain garden/creative landscape be provided. Mr Robertson confirmed he was happy for the community to raise concerns/challenges and whilst he could not promise the company could deliver everything, he was willing to listen to suggestions.

Another resident raised an issue with regard to the lack of pavement and speeding issues on the B996 and Mr Robertson confirmed that his modellers would advise him on the possible solutions to this.

Mr Robertson and his colleague advised that public consultation events would be held (14 June). A bigger team would be present to allow as many questions/concerns to be raised and discussed as possible. A microsite was currently being prepared and would be available through the LSPIM website https://www.lspim.co.uk/

Matters Arising

Members were advised that the Myer Park sign will be moved as soon as possible.

Kinross Town Centre

Tour of town centre – a tour had been held earlier in the day with a number of concerns raised including the car park at Millbridge Hall, 'give way' signs at the junction of Burns Begg Street and the High Street (these have been ordered but no date for erection had been agreed).

Parking Restrictions At Montgomery Street

Restrictions can be updated as required. It was agreed to keep the 1-hr restriction for the shops, and there was concern about the lack of disabled parking in the area. It was agreed that ClIr Watters would discuss the matter with PKC officers and report back.

Other areas of concern centred around the introduction of a one-way system along Springfield Road (southbound, although Northbound would be better if the retail park is approved) – PKC are to look at this, as well as better signage to car parks. There was also concern raised with a lack of pavement and overgrown hedges (owners to be requested to cut back) and signage re pedestrians crossing in Gallowhill Road. There was also a request to make crossing safer at schools and the introduction of a crossing in Argyll Road, with Cllr Watters advising that a safer route to school should be seen as a priority. It was also suggested that a build out be put in near the Lathro crossing/walkway. VAS would be fitted soon.

There was also a need for a dropped kerb to be installed at Persimmon Homes along with a pavement at the woodland between Milnathort and Kinross.

Cllr Watters will discuss these points with PKC.

Other Planning Matters

22/00623/FLL erection of 16 dwellinghouses (revised design and change of house type) Land 300 Metres North West Of Lathro Farm Kinross.

Cllr Watters advised that PKC had treated this as a local amendment to a major application so went through without discussion. He also advised that another application was being submitted, this time being treated as a major application, but the PKC officer was arguing that this should also go through without any clause or conditions being applied to the application.

It was agreed that both these applications, and the concerns around them, should be escalated to a higher level.

Reports From CC Representatives

CCIIr E Leslie advised that she was still awaiting further information regarding the IT devices which had been promised to local schools.

CCIIr W Freeman advised that an email had been received regarding "Managed for Wildlife Trials - Biodiversity Monitoring" and the need for volunteers to monitor Davis Park and Kirkgate Park to identify if they have demonstrated enhanced biodiversity in comparison to the nearby mowed areas. CCIIr Mckay urged volunteers to come forward to monitor the areas, particularly because of an increase in the number of ticks and it was agreed that the information would be added to the Facebook page.

CCIIr Freeman confirmed that he would represent the CC at the Kinross=shire Local Committees meeting on Thursday evening.

CCIIr Mckay was pleased to see the planning application for the

CCllr Mckay was pleased to see the planning application for the golf driving range at Burleigh Sands, although expressed concern

if the facility was to get busy, particularly around traffic build up. There had been a meeting of LLCC Management Group where it had been agreed to look at accessibility for less able-bodied people. CCllr Mckay again raised the issue of the goalposts being used by the Colts and left on the pitch. This continues to cause local residents health concerns and she asked if it was possible for these to be moved to another area of the pitch. Cllr D Cuthbert agreed to raise the issue with Andy Williams at a meeting on Wednesday. Mark Ruskell MSP had agreed to attend the July meeting to discuss concerns with the Loch, and it was agreed to invite David Cairns and Catch to this meeting.

AOCB

A member of the public raised an issue about the number of HGVs using Gallowhill Road to access the Persimmon Homes site. They had emailed Persimmon Homes providing photographic evidence supporting their complaint and while he had received a response, he asked if the CC could do anything to help in the matter. Members urged the community to keep reporting such instances, copying in PKC's planning officers, as well as the ward councillors. Cllr Watters agreed to forward all such emails to both Sean Panton and Mary Barr at PKC.

Boundaries Scotland is undertaking its Second Review of Scottish Parliament boundaries, with a consultation on constituencies running from 17 May to 17 June 2023 inclusive. More information can be found on the Boundarie's website https://boundaries.scot/

Portmoak Community Council News from the May Meeting

Present At The Meeting on 9 May were Cllrs R Watters, D Cuthbert, N Freshwater, W Robertson; Cllrs A Miller (Chair), D Morris (Vice-Chair) S McGregor ((Secretary), A Davidson (Treasurer), D Paterson, K Donalsdon; and 2 members of the Public.

Matters Arising

Kinross-shire Committee Update

Cllr D Cuthbert confirmed Minutes of the last KLC had been circulated. Suggested Agenda items for the next meeting included wind turbines, and pollution in Loch Leven. The wind turbines were discussed at a recent PKC Committee meeting attended by Cllrs, though the planning for the turbines was a DPEA decision and not a PKC decision. PKC Committee acts as a stat consultee. The next KLC meeting date is 25/05/23 and would be in-person at Kinross Community Campus. Either the Chair or Vice-Chair would attend. Cllrs R Watters and D Cuthbert would be arranging a workshop type session with all Councillors to decide on how the KLC it is working and how it can be improved. The Chair commented that the draft of the KLC Review Report has been submitted. Cllrs to meet with the author of report. Once report is complete, it will be circulated. Cllr R Watters raised the issue of



the need for a log of actions arising from KLC meetings as there are a lot of actions even outstanding from first KLC meeting. An action log would need to be reviewed systematically and items ticked off. Cllr N Freshwater commented that other Local Area Committees are now going ahead. Cllr D Cuthbert confirmed that PKC have agreed three other local area committees will be formed. KLC is still being assessed. The assessment will help inform how new committees are formed for best practice.

The Chair agreed to the need for an Action log, pointing out the first actionable point from the inaugural KLC meeting 15 months ago was Bowhouse speed limit signage, which remained unactioned. The Chair had been continually asked by Bowhouse Residents why it is taking so long. The Chair asked the Cllrs why the weight of 6 Community Councils voting on this action did not accelerate the project within PKC? Cllr D Cuthbert commented that this was the purpose of the proposed action log with dates for completion of projects and KLC can only really recommend items to other committees. Cllr D Cuthbert expressed opinion that a rethink about community engagement was due. More weight being given to decisions reached following Community engagement. Cllr R Watters reiterated that KLC was not intended to be a talking shop and that it was intended as a device for implementing change within Kinross-shire.

Road Safety Action Update

There was a discussion about the Road projects priority list from PKC which included many items requested over many years and by different CCs and members of the public. The PKC Roads Officer had suggested each Kinross-shire CC ratify their lists before the next KLC meeting. Portmoak CC had reached out to the other Ward 8 Kinross-shire CCs to suggest creating a fully resolved and consolidated list for each area, that could then be taken to the KLC for voting on as a complete list of prioritised road projects across Kinross-shire and it could then be voted on by the KLC members.

At the time of this PCC meeting, some response had been received from other CCs regarding this proposal but not all of them. PCC had also suggested that public comments/requests made directly to PKC should be referred to PCC for community discussion and comment, prior to being added to the road projects priority list. The Chair invited attendees to comment on some outstanding items on the list of priorities for Portmoak:

TRO of waiting restrictions at Buchan Avenue: the Vice-Chair believed this to be a request for painting double yellow lines at Buchan Avenue, Kinnesswood to restrict parking around Portmoak Primary school. The details of this TRO needed to be verified

New Gullet Bridge Warning Signs: Right of way from one side or the other. PCC believed this was a priority.

Build-Out At Buchan Avenue, Kinnesswood: The Vice-Chair thought this was another Portmoak School item of which there were 3 on the list. The Vice-Chair thought this should be batched with other School items for verification.

Priority System relocation at Leslie Road, Scotlandwell: The Chair had been speaking with local residents and did not think anyone had recently requested a relocation of the priority system. Cllr D Paterson thought there had been an incident that had raised comments. Agreement that this item should be removed from the Priority List.

Puffin Crossing Main St, Scotlandwell: The Chair proposed this should be removed from the list as it was a high value item and enforcement of 20mph was more crucial than a puffin crossing. Cllr D Paterson agreed. Cllr W Robertson agreed in principle.

Footway: Scotlandwell to Church: this item was ongoing. Agreement to retain this on list as a high priority.

Footway: Portmoak Hall to Kinnesswood: it was agreed that this pertained to the pinch point on the pavement at Woodmarch, may need a priority route or build-out. Retain on list. There was agreement the path was sufficient otherwise along this stretch.

Footway from Auchmuir Bridge to Scotlandwell: R Watters recalled the residents wanted an extension to the Fife footpath to

connect the Auchmuir Bridge houses. There was agreement that this may not be a current deliverable priority.

The Vice-Chair raised two further road safety issues: 1. The problem with the path Lochend – LLHT: Cllr W Robertson confirmed N Mainprize and D Stubbs of PKC Greenspace have had discussions around the issue. A meeting with landowner is proposed to resolve issues. The Vice-Chair commented on the need for some bollards on the road to make the current roadside path safer. W Robertson agreed that the current situation was very dangerous, and the meeting with landowner would hopefully drive towards a positive outcome.

2. A Resident had emailed PCC about issues with B9097. Residents requested options for paths along the B9097 as walking and cycling on the road was very dangerous as the traffic volume has increased and travels at high speed. The issue of high-speed overtaking and blind summits not signposted was also discussed. Due to the high traffic volume and increased HGVs the road surface is breaking up and is very poor. PCC agreed these items were all relevant and flagged that the Westfield traffic was not yet even at peak flow. There has to be some form of agreement of who is responsible and who needs to contribute to make the road better. Cllr W Robertson said there was a route action plan for the B909.

The Vice-Chair commented that all the residents' concerns had been raised at the planning stage, but that Fife Council had failed to discuss the problems with PKC and PCC, all the mitigation measures could have been resolved at planning. PKC Planning had done nothing to action these measures, despite pressure from Cllrs and PCC at the time. M Strang-Steel (former PCC Chair) commented that Fife Council Planners had requested PKC estimate a lump sum to be paid from Fife Council to PKC as mitigation funds to carry out extra maintenance. PKC named a figure of £100k which, by most accounts, seemed insufficient. The Vice-Chair requested the Cllrs to request confirmation that the sum had been paid to PKC, also whether the funds had been ring-fenced for the B9097. The Chair raised his concerns about promised route action plans. In a note on 25/03/23 from PKC Roads Officer, he had stated there were no current route action plans and insufficient staff to create Route Action Plans at present due to other priorities of work. The Chair believed PKC needed to make an onsite plan to ensure the road is up to standard and safer.

Cllr N Freshwater had spoken to D McKeown and confirmed Westfield signage would be completed by the Summer.

The Chair concluded it was apparent there was/ is nothing being done currently to address the issues on the B9097, and as a result, no positive information could be offered to update the resident's email request. The Chair felt the issue should be escalated to the KLC. Cllr W Robertson said there would be an update from Roads at the next KLC.

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New Matters

Kinneston Estate, near Scotlandwell. Long Term Forest Plans: The Chair had reviewed the plans and had no specific issues with these. The proposals of increased biodiversity, creation of other walking routes, and a managed forest plan were considered positive. The Vice-Chair thought it was positive that PCC were being consultated. One or two items to be discussed, such as informal paths that are already created, but The Vice-Chair agreed with the Chair in thinking the forest plan appeared a positive land use

PKC winter provision 2022-23 — Resilience Plan: The Secretary had circulated the documents from PKC to the PCC members noting the comments that there was a 'finite budget'. The Chair commented there was not much to add except to say that it was hoped that winter provision, treatment and service is not subject to reduction around Portmoak.

Reports

Police Reports

Speedwatch update: The secretary had no further updates at present. N Freshwater asked that PCC share the list of potential volunteers with the Fossoway Speedwatch group. There is also the possibility to share equipment if the minimum numbers can be met.

New Applications

23/00492/FLL Formation of balcony, 8 Bishop Terrace, Kinnesswood

23/00438/FLL Alterations and extension to dwellinghouse, and formation of parking area, Briarbank The Cobbles Kinnesswood The Vice-Chair commented that the previous application had been withdrawn. There were currently disputes about land ownership and rights for parking within the lane adjacent to the property. The Vice-Chair would approach the residents again to enquire if PCC representation was required. The Chair agreed to have another look at the planning.

Existing Applications

22/01191/FLL Erection of 16 dwellinghouses (3 with detached garages, one with detached garage/ancillary accommodation), formation of 6 plots for affordable dwellinghouses, formation of SUDS pond, landscaping and associated works, Land 100 Metres South East Of Cragton Villa Rost Gardens Scotlandwell

SEPA had removed their objection for peat removal on basis that ground is a peat soil, not pure peat, which meant a Peat Management Plan was not required for the site. The issue of flooding has not been addressed. PCC were disappointed that SEPA had not requested a more thorough and competent ground investigation.

Planning Decisions

Progress with Developments

Westfield Community Liaison Committee: Cllr K Donaldson provided comment; There were fewer construction vehicles travelling on the roads. Heavy duty cranes had been installed.



Previously requested signage was not yet completed as discussed earlier in meeting.

Westfield Paths Feasibility Study: The Vice-Chair confirmed a report has been issued. The VC had attended a meeting on 27/04/23 with Hargreaves and CC members from Fife and members of Fife Countryside Trust. The Vice-Chair would like to see a project manager employed to ensure the actions of the report move forward quickly and had voiced this request to Fife Countryside Trust.

Paths Group Update: no updates this month due to volunteers having limited time. Some issues had been reported regarding signage at top of Cobbles and PKC Greenspace were looking into this to ensure all signage was correctly in place.

Treasurer CC Accounts

Some monies received had been paid into old PCC accounts, not the new Credit Union accounts so Treasurer has been dealing with rectifying the mistake.

Treasurer needs to action payment for hall for PCC April meeting. Secretary to pass Zoom invoices to Treasurer for remuneration payment.

Cllr David Cuthbert commented that this application is not to be reviewed by PKC planning process as it is being reviewed by the Scottish Government, however PKC will review and submit comments as part of the consultation.

Former BCA site Kinross

No update, however the developers have been invited to present at a future meeting.

Driving Range

Currently in pre-application process to council, and engaging with the public.

Local Cemetery Provision

PKC officer will come to 25 May Kinross-shire Liaison Committee (KLC), to present on cemetery provision. They will present on what is planned which can be questioned by those in attendance.

Matters Arising

Loch Leven Pollution

Cllr Richard Watters commented that the Loch visibility appears to be good with visibility being up to 3-4m in depth, and it also appears that the fishing is good.

Loch Leven management group meet at end of month. Dr Linda May has been awarded funding to look at climate change and impact on Loch Leven and land use around the loch and the effect on the Loch, and mitigation.

Cllr David Cuthbert commented that this topic will be added to the August agenda of the KLC and hopes to have SEPA and Scottish Water to attend.

Actions From Previous Meetings

Damaged wall at Burleigh Kevin commented that he approached the community payback team, but they cannot do it, as they have no one skilled to build dry walls. Cllr David Cuthbert commented that Tayside Contracts provide a community fund, so Kevin will explore.

Footbridge at Lathro/new path in need of repair/damaged gate: Cllr Richard Watters commented that PKC officers have visited and discussed with Persimmon who will install a new crossing, fix the path and improve to prevent flooding.

Access gate that is broken: Persimmon agreed to add a feature gate at South Street, but have asked for us to help decide on the type of gate. Kevin will provide some input.

Access thru Fleming Court is outside the plans, so PKCllr Watters will speak to the farmer/landowner if they can leave the gate open to help those travelling back and forth to the primary school.

Correspondence

PKC have informed us that there are diseased Ash trees in Donaldson Park, these will be removed over the next few weeks and will be replaced by alternate species. If residents would like to suggest some alternate species then please get in touch with your suggestions.

Core Paths Update

Infill of type 1 and whin dust have been put down across a number of the core paths, thanks to all the volunteers for coming out. Waymarking will be started soon.

A local resident has informed Kevin of an incident affecting one of our Core Paths.

The resident was walking with their dog along the Heritage Trail near Old Orwell Churchyard, one evening recently. As they turned a corner on the Path, a motorbike and a quad bike raced towards them. The motorbike had to brake violently, skidded and just missed them. The riders never stopped and just rode off. Apart from scaring her and her dog, the Path surface was torn up and had been broken through.

We realise this is partly a police matter, but the community council will speak with PKC to determine if some explicit signage prohibiting those modes of transport on the Core Path would be useful.

Councillors' Reports

Clir David Cuthbert: LDP3 is currently in discussion and there are Big Place Conversations being held across PKC.

Clir Richard Watters: A motion was put forward at full council for Lucinda Russell to recognise her success – this has resulted in giving her the freedom of the city due to her contributions to the local community. It was passed unopposed.

Planning enforcement is now online.

Motion on single use vaping ban proposed as 10% of kids vaping, and there the level of waste is unacceptable. Zero waste Scotland will recommend to the Scottish Parliament on what options there are.

Q. Is there any more information on the potential job losses and reduced hours at Kinross recycling centre?

A. Cllr Watters responded that there were no details on what the outcome of the review of the recycling service due to the budget announcement from PKC.

Police Report

A caravan was set on fire on the A977 between Blairingone and Powmill on 6 May. Investigations continue. Speed checks have been carried out throughout the area, including Carnbo, but no tickets were issued this month.

Matters Arising

Road Safety in FDCC Area

(Including A977 Mitigation and Carnbo)

CCIIr Marchant had requested a report from CIIrs on the recent traffic surveys in our district. CIIr Cuthbert received a report from Daryl McKeown that the Carnbo survey showed just under 3500 vehicles per day with a mean speed of 43.9mph and a the 85th percentile speed was 52.7mph. A further survey will be done once the 30mph limit is in place. CIIr Cuthbert has asked Mr McKeown to look into more mitigation measures, perhaps including a Puffin crossing, also to investigate the small size of the bus shelter and the difficulty of accessing it safely.

Cllr Freshwater had passed on a complaint from a MoP about damage to cars due to stones flying from grass cutting machines, however the responsible officer has assured him that guards are permanently fitted to their machines and they have not received any reports of such damage.

The Carnbo school bus driver has been told to turn in Pitcairn Lane rather than the previous place for safety reasons, and this was implemented within a couple of days.

Community Speedwatch

We still only have enough volunteers for one team which is disappointing. For our district we need at least 12 volunteers. There are continuing reports of speeding through our villages, and this would surely help. CCllr Duffy had a meeting with members of Milnathort CC. They have some interest from members of the public in their area to commence the Speed Watch Programme. Glenfarg has also expressed interest. As the equipment should be either in Kinross or Milnathort to make it accessible to the other areas in Kinross-shire, it was thought to make sense if Milnathort would take the lead on this. They will start with an information morning for all those in the whole of Kinrossshire who are interested.

Wind Farms

The Developers of the proposed Brunthill site, E Power Ltd, have notified this CC of the dates of their public exhibitions and we encourage everyone to attend: 28 June 3:30pm — 6:30pm Milnathort Town Hall

Mike Barnacle has been trying to get NPF4 modified to resolve inconsistencies with other plans, but it's too late now. He has also spoken to Friends of the Ochils about safeguarding the landscape, however Cllr Robertson responded that the problem with controlling Wind Farms in the Ochils is that there are already turbines operating and so a precedent has been established.

Community Development Trust: The Trust has been incorporated and established its charitable status. Membership is also increasing without any further advertising. An anonymous vote is being held to decide whether the Trust should continue to consider leasing or renting Blairingone School or to let it go to a

third party. Cllr Cuthbert noted that the Kinross Local Committee has oversight of Community property purchases; Mike Barnacle said that the Trust is cognisant of the timescales.

Local Place Plans: The final face-to-face event will be held on 11 June from 13:00 to 16:00 at Moubray Hall, Powmill. We encourage everyone to attend as this is your chance to contribute to the development of LDP3. To date we have hosted two events which highlighted the challenges of living and working in a rural location with limited infrastructure, unfortunately they were not well attended. We also met with pupils of Fossoway Primary School who wanted more open spaces with trees to play in and build tree houses. They also wanted a sheltered area for when weather is bad. There will be a further online meeting on 28 June between 18:30 and 20:30. Email developmentplan@pkc.gov.uk for connection details. Information gathering will continue until July, and will then be collated by FDCC. The next phase is Finding Solutions (September – October) which will lead into creating the Local Place Plan.

Consultations

PKC: The Big Place Conversation - Let's Talk Transport

PKC are currently developing a Mobility Strategy that will set out their vision for managing and developing the transport network over a minimum period of 10 years. Stage 1, commonly known as a main issues report, highlights the current issues and opportunities.

The CC will make the following comments:

As the strategy is not planned to be finalised until the end of 2024 implementation will not start until 2025. We are concerned that any actions may not be in time to impact the Scottish Gov 2030 net zero target.

One issue is the complex and large number (over 30) of policies and strategies across PKC and Scottish Government that all have different timelines. Not consolidating and streamlining these would be a missed opportunity.

Table 6 shows that commuting is the main reason for travel but this data predates Covid and hence may now be incorrect.

Table 7 shows information regarding railway station car parks but does not indicate daily spare capacity which is a known issue at some stations and could discourage commuting by train.

The majority of data infers that people shop and use healthcare within P&K, however as a rural community on the edge of Fife and Clacks many of our residents use facilities in other local authorities. A known issue is connectivity of transport across local authorities.

Willie adds that there is a no overall public transport strategy for Scotland so that, for example, buses don't connect with trains, and different bus companies can't enter bus stations owned by different companies. Cllr Watters notes that it's because they have to pay.



Local Living and 20 Minute Neighbourhood: Draft Planning Guidance

Local living and 20 minute neighbourhoods are intended to help to deliver the healthy, sustainable and resilient places required to support a good quality of life and balance our environmental impact. This guidance has been published to assist anyone with an interest in these local living and 20 minute neighbourhoods. It provides further detail to support the National Planning Framework (NPF4) policy framework on these items.

The guidance sets out the benefits and context, what local living looks like and the key considerations, and the ways in which to support it. It aims to encourage, promote and facilitate the application of the Place Principle and create connected and compact neighbourhoods which prioritise liveability, and environmental, social and economic sustainability. Closing date: 20th July 2023.

Scottish Government Review of Permitted Development Rights – Phase 3

The Scottish Government is carrying out a review of permitted development rights (PDR) as part of our wider planning reform programme. The PDR review is being taken forward in phases, with each phase focussing on specific development types. Phase 3 of the review considers PDR in relation to renewables equipment, thermal efficiency improvements, development by electricity undertakers, reverse vending machines (Money back on bottles) and the temporary use of land for shooting ranges. https://www.gov.scot/publications/scottish-government-review-permitted-development-rights-phase-3-consultation/ Closes 23 August 2023

Meetings Attended

CCllrs Duffy and Marchant attended Big Place Conversation events with PKC at Fossoway Primary School, Wilkie Hall Crook of Devon and Carnbo Village Hall.

CCIIr Duffy attended the Kinross-shire meeting, standing in for CCIIr Bruce-Jones. The three main points discussed were the Road Safety Update; provision for cemetery expansion and the use of commuted sums for affordable housing. The Carnbo 30mph is still on track to commence by July — August. The Roads department will work with Community Councils to get the correct priorities on the top of the list. There are currently 950 projects on the list. All over Kinross-shire we need more places for burial. Bereavement Services is looking at the current provision of cemeteries; what we will need in the coming decades and where that may be.

When developers build, the expectation is that 25% of the properties are affordable. Current expectation is that they will be built on-site. If it that is not possible, off-site and if that is impossible, a commuted sum (related to land value) is paid to the council, to be used for affordable housing. Currently all this is built in Kinross and Milnathort; however, the rural areas also need affordable housing to enable young people to stay in the area and older people to stay in the community. The Council has around £0.5M for this purpose; suggestions for sites and projects are very welcome.

CCIIr Cheape attended a meeting of the Kinross Fund on 5 June. Grants were awarded to Portmoak Film Society and King George V Playing Fields. There were no applications from Fossoway.

Community Council Business

As announced at the last meeting, Angus Cheape was co-opted to the CC – Proposed: CCIIr Pye; Seconded: CCIIr BruceJones.

CCIIr Duffy has announced her intention to retire at the next AGM. Currently we have five voting members (including CCIIr Cheape) but with the departure of CCIIr Duffy we will be down to four, which means that Fossoway CC urgently needs new members. We need a minute-taker (who could be an associate member, only responsible for the minutes) but we also need a person who will look after the email, the correspondence and the Facebook Page. Without your commitment we will struggle to do the work necessary.

P&K Councillors' Reports

Clir Cuthbert: Kinross is 15 years ahead of the rest of PKC as far as development is concerned, but now it's spreading elsewhere, so there is an increasing number of planning applications outwith Kinross-shire.

Clir Robertson: Reminded landowners that hedges next to roads need to be kept cut back, to make it easier for pedestrians. The Aldie Road path has thistles growing through the tarmac – Currently there is no paths group in Fossoway and they would be able to look into this. Mike Barnacle replied that the CDT will hopefully spawn a Path Group shortly.

Clir Watters: A paper on grass cutting and rewilding has been created – more areas will be allowed to re-wild with paths cut through. Collecting grass cuttings helps to improve the quality of the grass relative to weeds. It would be great if communities could help with this. PKC are developing a strategy for Electric Vehicle charging.

The community is split on whether this development is completely unnecessary and will have a serious impact on the SSSI and the surrounding landowners, or whether the site is an eyesore, creates traffic and litter problems and the development will address those issues. The CCllrs were consequently unable to determine during the meeting how the CC should respond and will seek further information and formulate their response after the meeting.

Cllr Watters said that during the PAN he had asked for a study of the rare orchid that is found in the SSSI and wondered if this was covered in the application.

Planning Decisions



With the warm weather we had a lot of watering to do at the polytunnel, both inside and out, to make sure the plants






Our chosen charity for June was Farm Field Schools which was started in 2015 in Kenya. This helps the poorest farmers with training and inputs (seeds and fertiliser) to increase yields from their land of an acre or less. Most see an increase of three or four yield which secures food for the family and enables the children to attend school. 200 farm schools have been sponsored so far lifting about 500 people out of poverty and also benefiting local communities. Money is now being raised to buy a second hand 4x4 as the present one is

15 years old and has done 173,000 miles! All money raised goes directly to Kenya where it is tightly managed.

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Fairtrade in Kinross-shire

The farmers in the Global South need our support more than ever because of the effects of climate change that they are facing when trying to grow the crops that we so enjoy eating and drinking. If you



choose to buy Fairtrade tea, coffee, chocolate, sugar, wine, bananas and other products when you are shopping, you are helping them to have the resources to farm using sustainable methods, work together in cooperatives and take action to try to prevent soil erosion by planting trees. Please choose Fairtrade!

Crook and Drum Growing Together

included in the young, mixed, native woodland, established in Kilmagad Wood 13 years ago. Ash trees are very common across the UK. In the Portmoak area they are found in most of our woodlands. Sadly, there is a disease called Ash Dieback, which is killing most of the ash trees in the UK, including Portmoak.

The pupils counted and marked the diseased trees in Kilmagad Wood, recording some of the disease symptoms and making measurements which indicate the health of each tree. Back in the classroom they have been using their observations, and the data which they collected, to suggest how many new trees might be planted to replace the dead ash. They will submit this information to the Woodland Trust, who own the woodland, and we look forward to seeing some of their findings.



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
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

Buzzing With Activity

JULY IS ONE OF the busiest months on the reserve for visitors, and you can see why. The reserve comes alive at this time of year, and the weather is just pleasant enough to enjoy a walk or cycle around the reserve.

The first thing that springs to mind when I think of July is the insect life. This time of year is when Ringlets and Meadow Brown butterflies are seemingly everywhere, especially in our meadows. They can also be joined by the Common Blue butterfly, showing off its bright blue upperwing. There's something about seeing blue in nature that is so magical. And speaking of blue insects, our Azure and Common Blue damselflies are also plentiful by our ponds, and can be joined by various Dragonflies as the season progresses.

Of course it's not just the more obvious and brightly coloured insects that are about at this time of year. Many species of moth, beetle, fly and bee are buzzing about too. These insects are crucial to the food web as they provide a great food source for a variety of wildlife. This includes swallows and swifts which can be abundant at this time of year – keep your eyes to the skies and you're bound to witness (or hear!) them over the reserve.

July is also a good month to see osprey – a magnificent bird of prey that we are lucky enough to see here in the summer. As we head into late summer, we can see multiple Osprey fishing on the loch, feeding up before they head back to Africa.

There are also more duck broods on the loch at this time of year and some are getting almost indistinguishable from their parents. However, tufted duck ducklings are just emerging now, and mute swan cygnets can still be seen around the loch (and are getting quite big now)!

As well as insect and bird life, the plant life is equally as good in July. National Meadows Day is celebrated at the start of July every year and this is a great time to get out and appreciate all the flowering plants that make meadows so important. We conduct our annual count of Lesser-Butterfly Orchids this month too, and after a slightly lower count last year we're hopeful that our management will mean a better count this year!

We will be holding another Botany Walk at Burleigh on 4 July so

if that interests you then email <code>LochLeven_NNR@nature.scot</code> to book a place. Keep an eye on our social media channels (Facebook and Instagram and the blog) for other upcoming events, open days, and pop-ups as we will be holding them throughout the summer!

Lastly, as I mentioned before, July is a busy month for visitors so please make sure you read up on all guidance before heading out on the water or when camping so that we can keep this place special for wildlife!

New Life On The Wing

AS WE MOVE INTO the summer months, it's hard to believe that we seem to be having a summer here in Scotland... with actual sunshine! This month, the reserve has been full of new life with baby lapwings, snipe and black headed gulls on the wetland and goldfinch, blue tits, and great tit young in the woodland and in the wildflower meadow. We have also had regular sightings of Marsh Harrier and Great Crested Grebe. We are very excited to be able to watch our swallows busy feeding their chicks up close on the TV in our visitors centre with the footage coming in from our new wildlife cameras. Out with our bird life, our wildflower meadow is now in full bloom, and we are looking forward to being able to open that to the public from July so our visitors can experience the gorgeous bursts of colour from our flora and fauna including species such as the small copper butterflies and Hares which have been spotted around the area.

Our volunteers have been busy this month helping us manage the vegetation growth around the Visitors Centre and pathways as well as planting some of the new wildflowers they have been growing throughout spring. They have also been rejuvenating our dipping ponds by pumping some water back into them to increase the water levels for the beasties living under the surface and supporting us with our predation watches and fence checks to ensure the young chicks on the reserve are as safe as they can be.

In the world of events, we have a busy summer fast approaching with a range of different events and activities for all the family! In addition to our Optics Weekend on the first weekend of July, we have a variety of new events filling our programme including Woodland Warriors on each Wednesday throughout July until the 2 August, Meadow Meanders on the 25 July and Discovering Pond and Discovering Minibeasts sessions throughout the holidays too. Daniel, our Visitor Experience Assistant in the team, will also be running some more Connecting to Loch Leven events on the 1 and 29 July which you can watch more about at https:// tinyurl.com/C2LLV.

Not Much Fun In The Sun For Some

OLE, OLE, OLE... The Eighties song by The Merrymen has been going round in my head for days now as every morning when I check the ewes and lambs I say to them you 'party people' you must be 'feelin hot, hot, hot'.

This warm spell has been lovely but is challenging for stock, particularly the ewes who have a full fleece at the moment and who do feel the heat, so it will be a welcome relief when the shearers remove it during the first week of July.

In the high field, I've got 79 ewes with 126 lambs, during the heat of the day, I notice hardly anyone is out grazing, instead every one of them crowd under the shade of two old trees taking refuge from the sun. There are a few other trees in the field and a sheltered area at the side of a small coniferous wood but the shade of the old oak and beech must be far superior. The trees are over 40 ft high so I'm guessing could be 100 years old, their branches spread out wide and the leafage is dark and dense, the shade they offer to the ewes and lambs is a welcome gift during the sweltering days of the last few weeks.

In another field down the hill, there is no such luxury of a beech tree. In this field the hawthorn hedge, that has been allowed to grow a bit taller to provide shelter for the birds in winter, is the only shade available and I imagine it's a race for this spot as the sun comes up - the sheep equivalent of getting the best sun lounger and parasol at the pool on holiday.

On top of contending with the hot weather, the ewes in this field only had their lambs in May so are in full milk production and consequently very thirsty. In this field there are 65 ewes and 113 lambs but with no piped water or trough we transport water in a tank to them and fill the containers up regularly. During the hot spell we are delivering over 1000 litres a day to this group to keep them topped up with enough fluids to get through the day.

The heat makes both ewes and lambs very lethargic, they keep

their energy for moving to the water trough and graze during the later cooler part of the day. I wonder if it will have an impact on growth rates, or if the forecasted rain will come at just the right time to provide relief, rehydrate everything and get the grass growing again?

My daily checks are mainly focused on looking for couped ewes or fly strike and fortunately I've not found too much of either, just one ewe who had an attack of maggots but since it was caught early and treated she has made an excellent recovery, however, with no wool on that area we did apply a bit of sun cream to moisturise the skin and keep it protected.

It's not all fun in the sun for the sheep or the shepherd but with the ewes and lambs looking well and the long lambing having come to an end, maybe it's time to party and in the words of The Merrymen to get our 'Hands in the air for some celebration time'.

Gardening

Keep Watering!

WOW. SO FAR SUMMER'S been a bit of a scorcher, eh? It's lovely to see the sun for so long but it does increase the need to keep everything watered somewhat. I have three water butts. They're all empty. And at the time of writing this, I think it's rained exactly once in the last several weeks. Every silver lining has a cloud and all that!

The biggest task for this month, dare I say it, is watering, however you can. I'm usually a huge fan of my many, many patio pots, but this year I'm giving them a good water every two or three days to make sure they're getting the best start possible. I'm also feeding every week or so with liquid feed.

As your bedding plants grow and mature, it's important to dead head them regularly so that you get continuous flowers throughout the summer. You're not wanting your plants to divert their energy into producing seed heads just yet, so a once or twice a week session as you're watering will suffice.

As if there's not enough going on, June/ July is the best time to sow your biennial seeds (grow this year to flower next year). Biennials fill the gap between when the spring plants die off and the summer ones start to flower, so well worth doing. My favourites are foxgloves, hesperis, lunaria and sweet williams. They're all dead easy to germinate and grow and hesperis and lunaria self-seed like crazy so you probably only have to grow them once to get years and years of colour. Sow and grow in exactly the same way as with annuals... seed tray, germinate, prick out and grow on.

If you can get a cutting or if you can find



them on offer, early summer flowering clematis are also a good bridge between spring summer flowering plants. I'm quite chuffed this year, the clematis below has flowered for the first time since I planted it four years ago, I thought it was dead!

There's one good thing about this hot weather – there aren't any slugs! I've seen whole regiments of snails - usually after the sun goes down, traipsing steadily over my hostas - but very few slugs.

In case anyone's wondering, the planting of my hundreds of bedding plants went really well, and I even enjoyed it. Everything's growing on nicely and there's just a few odd plants that I'm trying to find homes for. I'll take some pictures when things start to look good and there's lots of colour. I even planted up the front border with the promised grasses and

> lavenders. The only downside to the planting was that I

was doing it during the really hot spell at the start of June... lots of breaks to survey my handiwork were had!

This next month I will be mostly concentrating on watering and feeding and feeding and making sure my annuals continue to flourish. This will include the dreaded weeding to make sure no nasties are in there strangling my plants. I'll also be sowing some biennials - my four-year-old sweet williams are on their last legs, so I'll definitely be growing more of those. Spring bulbs will also be being thought about, I'm thinking some purple and white tulips would look nice in some pots. That's it for this month folks. Have fun in

the garden and pray for some rain... during the night with lovely sunshine during the day would be good!
