### **Voting Boundary Changes Will Split The Shire**

I THOUGHT IT WORTHWHILE highlighting the proposals for the new Westminster constituencies. In brief it's proposed that, for electoral purposes, Fossoway and Cleish westward are hived off into 'West Fife' with the remainder of the Kinross-Shire swallowed in 'Glenrothes and Loch Leven, which would included Ballingry and Lochgelly as well as Glenrothes. Maps are available online.

This table top exercise fails to take into account the cohesive and historical nature of Kinross-shire and I anticipate that many of you will want to make representations to change this proposal. These can be made online at <a href="https://www.bcs2023review.com">www.bcs2023review.com</a>.

Personally I would recommend either retaining the Kinross-shire whole and leave it in the proposed constituency, or to adjust the boundaries to move us into NE Fife, renamed NE Fife and Kinross-shire.



## VOTER ALARM OVER THREATS TO CONSTITUENCY BOUNDARIES

### THE BOUNDARY COMMISSION FOR SCOTLAND,

the body set up by the government to monitor constituency voting numbers, is seeking to change UK constituency boundaries to make them more similar in size. Their proposal for Kinross-shire is as follows:

- The Kinross-shire ward is proposed to be split between two different constituencies.
- These seats will be shared with Fife rather than other parts of Perth and Kinross.
- Fossoway and Cleish will be included in a proposed 'West Fife' constituency dominated by Dunfermline.
- The rest of Kinross-shire will be included in a proposed 'Glenrothes and Loch Leven' constituency dominated by Glenrothes.

### WHAT ARE THE ARGUMENTS AGAINST THIS?

- As an historic county in our own right, Kinross-shire should be contained within a single constituency.
- Kinross-shire is a cohesive community. Splitting the ward between two seats would lead to poorer representation.
- Including all or part of Kinross-shire within a constituency dominated by Dunfermline or Glenrothes will mean that our concerns are less of a priority.
- Issues faced by rural communities (e.g. broadband, tourism or farming) are very different to those faced in urban areas like Dunfermline or Glenrothes.
- Kinross-shire shares a council with Perthshire and it makes far more sense to be included in a single constituency with other parts of Perth & Kinross.
- Kinross-shire has never before been included in a constituency with parts of Fife. Glenfarg has also never been split off from the rest of Perthshire.

It seems as though the Boundary Commission are keen to split up the country based on numbers, rather than on identity and geography.

### WHAT CAN YOU DO TO STOP THIS?

We have stopped similar changes in the past. The more people who





write in to object, the more likely we are to get these plans changed. Please send your comments by the deadline of 8 December.

The proposed boundaries are drawn up under strict numerical criteria so that similar number of voters are present in all constituencies. This has to be central to any response – those who want to oppose the proposals should make alternative suggestions which meet the numerical criteria.

## WHERE HAVE ALL

MUCH DISMAY HAS GREETED the news that bus services connecting Kinross to Stirling, Perth and Edinburgh have been drastically reduced – or even completely axed – leaving many without any suitable means of transport to work, university and for other vital travel requirements such as doctor or hospital appointments.

With only a week's leave, Stage-coach announced that their X56 route, which serves Kinross en route between Perth and Edinburgh, would have its frequency cut to every two hours. The change to the Edinburgh service came into effect on Monday November 1 and will remain until further notice.

Then recently First Buses announced that the X53 service, which links Kinross, Crook of Devon and Rumbling Bridge to Stirling, would be temporarily suspended. The service was only launched 18 months ago but bosses confirmed it will be axed on January 9, if more drivers cannot be found.

For those living in a rural area, the bus is a crucial lifeline. Both routes are vital for students and commuters who have been left bewildered and upset by the changes. One distressed resident told the *Newsletter*, 'I go from Gairneybridge to Edinburgh six days a week; it's going to be a nightmare getting there and getting back. I'm either late for work by an hour or early by an hour — it's infuriating!'

Stagecoach have also been criticised for removing the most commonly-used buses on the route. Speaking of the reduction of the X56 route, one disgruntled user commented: 'I really don't understand why they kept on the likes of the bus that goes through Milnathort at 3.18pm and ditched the one at 4.18pm. Barely any buses go through here at peak times and the next X56 is just before 6pm.

'It's understandable that they might need to cut some services if they're short on drivers, but surely they should have stopped the afternoon ones and made sure they had more between peak times of 4-6 when more people are finished work, kids are finished school, etc. It seems odd more people use the bus in the middle of the afternoon than between 4 and 6.'

With COP26 recently on our doorstep and measures being taken to encourage us to think about more environmentally friendly means of transport, many local people are angry – not just by the cuts in services, but by the lack of information notice and information provided by the bus companies.

On hearing the news about the X56, Lesley from Kinross said, 'Really? I thought hourly was bad but this is basically a Sunday service... I haven't seen anything about this either on the buses or at the bus stops. This is just as bad as the lack of information regarding the closure of Perth bus station for re-surfacing; when the bus station was closed (which no one seemed to know about in advance) there was NO informa-

tion available regarding where to get the buses. It's absolutely shocking, the lack of communication.'

Andi from Milnathort said, 'The bus my daughter relies on to get to gymnastics in Perth each week is no longer running. This is ridiculous at such short notice! I've pre-paid for classes that we're now struggling to get to.'

Both routes have been deemed vital to students and commuters but transport bosses say their hands have been forced by national driver shortages connected to Covid and Brexit.

Local councillor Willie Robertson said 'Stagecoach have said that driver shortage is the main reason for the 50% cut in the X56 services and for First Bus's removal altogether of the X53 Kinross - Stirling service. There is a national shortage of bus drivers. This has been solved in the past by recruiting drivers from abroad but, due to Brexit, this is no longer available. Myself and my fellow ward councillors have written to MP John Nicolson asking him to try and get the rules around using foreign drivers relaxed (as has been done with HGV drivers). We await his response.

'I am already getting reports that with the X56 only running every two hours it is making life difficult for those who depend on the service to access their work and other appointments. The loss of the X53 will also make it very difficult for those in West Kinross-shire to attend doctor appointments in Dollar and for students to travel to Stirling University.

It is very concerning to be losing bus services at a time when we should be trying to divert more journeys away from cars and on to public transport.

The Council's public transport officers have tried to persuade the bus companies to reverse their decision without success.

## THE BUSES GONE?

MSP Liz Smith was equally unhappy about the changes. 'It is little wonder that local people are complaining so bitterly about these changes. They come at a time when Scotrail is proposing to remove the direct train link between Perth and Edinburgh and also on top of the cancellation of the X53 bus route between Stirling and St Andrews. All of this just adds to the misery being faced by all those who rely heavily on public transport.

'The M90 corridor is seeing extensive house building which will clearly increase demand for bus services so this change doesn't make any sense at all, especially when we are all being encouraged to 'go green'.

I have written to First Buses on behalf of constituents and I hope they will quickly review matters.'

Cllr Mike Barnacle told the *Newsletter*, 'I think it is remiss of commercial operators to close services without consultation, based on passenger numbers during the pandemic when Scottish Government were advising folk not to use public transport. It is always rural services that are hit first.'

Cllr Callum Purves added, 'It is really disappointing that Stagecoach have taken this decision alongside the loss of

the X53 service. While I know there are a number of issues that have affected the availability of drivers and passenger numbers, the pandemic has clearly led to reduced usage. I hope that once some of these issues have been resolved, and when people are looking to travel more, Stagecoach will consider reinstating this route.

'Kinross-shire is a rural area and many local residents rely on public transport to get about to get to work, school, GP or the shops. This will make it a lot more difficult for people locally to go about their daily lives. I hope the work of the Kinross-shire Community Transport Group will help to link our rural communities with Kinross for connecting services, which while not a perfect solution, may alleviate some of the problems.'

Cllr Richard Watters said, 'Having dependable bus services that aren't at risk

of being withdrawn or changed at the rate we have seen over the last few years are essential if we are to provide alternative options to single person car journeys.'

In a statement, Graeme Macfarlane, commercial director for First Bus in Scotland, said 'As is being experienced across the bus industry, we have seen varying levels of driver shortages in some of our operating areas over the last few weeks. We are doing everything we can to maintain a comprehensive network of services that supports our customers and our communities. The majority of routes are running normally although in some areas we are making temporary timetable adjustments to ensure a reliable service and minimise disruption. We thank customers for their patience and understanding while we overcome this short-term situation.'

He added: 'We have entered a 70 day process to temporarily suspend the service until further notice, in order to help address the driver shortage and focus resource where there is current demand and on those services that we are seeing a higher rate of post-Covid passenger recovery on.

'The 70 day process will give us time to try to address the shortages and if driver numbers improve then this is something that we can cancel at any point and we will of course keep passengers informed of any decisions made in this regard well in advance of any changes taking effect.'

A spokesperson for Stagecoach East Scotland said: 'We apologise to our customers who have been affected by travel disruptions in the area. Like many industries, we are experiencing a number of challenges due to national driver shortage.

'In an effort to reduce the impact to communities, tickets will be accepted on certain Citylink services, full details of which can be found on our website, *stagecoachbus.com*.

'The reduction to these services is a temporary measure until such time our staffing level returns to a point where we can reliably operate our schedule. We have a strong pipeline of talented individuals currently in our training school which is at capacity. We understand these changes can be frustrating and would like to thank customers for their patience.'



## **Loch Leven Visitor Centre Reopens**



**AFTER A LONG WAIT,** the visitor facilities at RSPB Loch Leven are finally back up and running. There have been alterations to the pricing structure; it has now changed from an entry fee to a car parking fee.


Parking for the day is £3 for non-RSPB members, or free for RSPB members and blue badge holders. Payment can be made by cash or contactless card at the machines in the car park. Visitors are not expected to pay when popping in to the shop, so there are designated spaces set aside for shop customers, allowing up to 30 minutes free parking. These can also be used for visitors popping into the café for takeaway food and drinks.

RSPB Loch Leven believe this offers great value for money and it will allow

them to maintain the reserve as a wonderful haven for both wildlife and visitors. In recent years, the reserve has



undergone some incredible improvements, bringing more people closer to wildlife.



A spokesperson said: 'We want to further develop the reserve to provide visitors with an excellent, inspiring and accessible day out. As a charity, the income we generate from the parking charge will allow us to maintain and build upon our facilities, whilst continuing to carry out vital conservation work.'

As part of the changes, well behaved dogs are now allowed into the café!

The new toilet facilities have also been quite a talking point, with some of the most inclusive facilities in Scotland. The new Changing Places room has already attracted a lot of interest, as this will allow those with multiple access needs to visit with their families and carers.

## CHILD POVERTY INCREASE IN PKC

**A SHOCKING 5500 CHILDREN** in Perth and Kinross are currently living in poverty. The figures, recently published by PKC, show the number of local children living in poverty has risen to almost a quarter at 22.6%.

The report warned these were pre-Covid figures and likely to be an underestimate. The Local Child Poverty Action Report stated that while local authorities alone cannot end child poverty they do have a 'considerable influence'.

The pandemic has had a significant impact with 8500 Perth and Kinross householders struggling to pay for food and other essentials. 24,500 families are estimated to have no or less than one months' savings – almost double the pre-pandemic figure. One in six jobs were lost to the local economy and the number of people on out-of-work benefits doubled to 4195.

The number of P&K households receiving Universal Credit increased by 237% and 105 families with three or more children had their benefit capped. An officer said the Scottish Government measure poverty on four scales: relative poverty, absolute poverty, combined low income and material deprivation and persistent poverty.

Council Leader Murray Lyle said, 'The negative impacts of poverty on each child cannot be underestimated.' He highlighted efforts made by PKC and its partners to tackle the problems.

## Heritage Trail Repair





A NEW EXPERIMENTAL path surface has been laid on the section of the Heritage Trail that regularly floods in front of Kinross House. The 100 metres stretch has been repaired free of charge by contractor McKenzie Construction as a trial.

The new surface is said to be non-slip and long-lasting. The existing path material is lifted, crushed and mixed with a bonding material, then a top coat of fine gavel is applied before it is rolled. Its life span is up to 30-years and its benefit is that it recycles existing path materials.

Councillor Willie Robertson, who has, through TRACKS, co-ordinated the work with the contractors, says: 'If it proves successful it will be used on other sections of the trail. Please let me know what you think.'

## **Northern Lights Reach Kinross**

**EYES WERE CAST UPWARDS** in November as the Kinross sky was lit up with a spectacular show from the Northern Lights. Kinross residents were treated to magnificent hues of green and purple as some of the most ideal conditions of the year were in place.

Taking their name from Aurora (Roman goddess of dawn) and Boreas (the Greek name for the north wind), the breath-taking phenomenon of lights are caused by solar ac-

tivity. They occur when a huge burst of material from the sun causes a geomagnetic storm, which interferes with the Earth's magnetic field.

The solar storm is caused by a type of solar flare called a coronal mass ejection — a huge expulsion of plasma from the Sun's outer layer, called the corona. Charged particles in the solar wind collide with the earth's magnetic field, which pulls them north and south to the poles. Scotland is one of the best places in Europe outwith Scandinavia to see them.

Usually the Northern Lights are best seen between December and January. Luckily in November even skywatchers in Edinburgh and Glasgow were lucky enough to see them overcome the usual light pollution.

Local resident Alan Ruiz sent us these terrific photos, taken from Vane Farm and Cleish Hill. Alan told the Newsletter, "I got very lucky. I just happened to be out trying to photograph some deep space stuff. I abandoned that when I saw the sky!'

## **Grants Flow From Rumbling Bridge Hydro**



RUMBLING BRIDGE Community Hydro has given a total of £21,000 in grants to local facilities and events from its surplus profits made in 2020/21. It operates a hydroelectric scheme which utilises water from the River Devon near Kinross, and is one of the largest community-owned hydro schemes in the UK.

Grants ranging from £500 to £5000 were awarded to the Crook of Devon Hall, the Coronation Hall in Muckhart, the Moubray Hall in Powmill, Fossoway Church Hall and Muckhart Parish Church Hall. The Muckhart Horticultural Society and the Fossoway Flower Show were also beneficiaries.

These grants are to support local village halls and events which have been adverse-

ly affected by a lack of income due to difficulties caused by the Covid-19 pandemic restrictions.

Hugh Wallace, Chair of the Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro Society Board said: "We are delighted to have been able to award these grants. This brings the total donated to local community projects by the Society to over £100,000 since the hydro scheme launched in 2016."

As a community-owned co-operative, members of the public can own a stake in their local renewable energy source and thus benefit from the sale of green electricity. Any queries should be directed to *info@rumblingbridgehydro.coop*.



# A BUSY CHRISTMAS AT KINROSS PARISH CHURCH

**REV ALAN REID OF** Kinross Parish Church of Scotland is gearing up for a busy Christmas — including four services in less than two days! The Kirk Session agreed to his suggestion that a full programme of special Christmas Services should go ahead this year to help bring the God of Hope to people at Christmas, especially after what has been a difficult year for many.

The Nativity Service will be at 10.30am on 19 December — with a twist, as the church's young people have been creating a film. An important part of the programme is a quiet service of remembrance and thanksgiving at 6.30pm on Monday 20th. This is particularly for those who have been bereaved and for whom Christmas is often a difficult time. On Christmas Eve there is a Crib Service for those with young children at 4.30pm and the moving Watchnight Service starting at 11.15pm and running into Christmas Day. On Christmas Day itself there is a short, all-age, service at 10.30am and, at the same time on Sunday 26, a Service of Lessons and Carols.


Rev Alan Reid says, 'Because Christmas Day, a Saturday, will immediately be followed by Christmas Sunday the programme will be particularly concentrated. But each of these Christmas services is a special part of Christmas for many. I'm sure that people will welcome that this year we can celebrate the coming of Jesus at Christmas by worshipping in person, though some of these services will also be on line. Track and Trace details are no longer necessary though masks are required. We continue to ensure good ventilation — expect a colder kirk than normal! — and have maintained spacing of chairs. A team of volunteers will

The litter pick, which is now a wide community effort with teams in both Kinross and Milnathort, is organised by the Eco-Congregation team of Kinross Parish Church with the equipment being paid for by money raised by Susan Smith of the church making and selling masks and bags from donated material.

The idea for a community litter pick started with Gill Boardman, who was originally litter picking on her own during the first Lockdown. Her work has now been recognised by a Gold Litter Picker Award by Perth and Kinross Council. Around 250 bags of litter have been collected over 18 months!

## John Nicolson, MP

I DIDN'T KNOW DAVID Amess well. We probably talked a couple of dozen times in lifts, queues, or the Members' Lobby. I remember him as a warm man with a ready smile. We agreed on very little. Although I admired his passionate



advocacy on behalf of animals, he was a Brexiteer and a social conservative. I doubt we were ever in the same lobby to vote.

Everyone knew that David wasn't a sook. Whips could find no blandishment which would persuade him to place party above conscience. He didn't care about promotion, which was just as well as he was never offered any. He cared about issues. And, above all else, he cared about his constituents. He died doing what he loved most, helping those who had come to his weekly constituency surgery asking for help.

Most folk never contact their MP. MPs can sometimes seem remote. People worry that if they voted for a different party their MP might not want to help them. And in any case, what's the point? David knew that there was a point. The best MPs are blind to party allegiance when helping constituents. We've no idea how people voted. And we know that we are often the last port of call for constituents who desperately need help. We can't solve every issue. But with our team of dedicated caseworkers, we try.

Since the start of the pandemic, I've been available for

surgeries two days a week. They're mostly on Zoom, with some on the phone. People tell me they like the privacy involved. And for me, it's the most rewarding aspect of my job. That's why, although there has been some talk since David's death about curtailing or even halting surgeries, I intend to keep on doing them. And I know most of my colleagues, cross-party, feel the same.

There was an arrest made following David's killing. There will be a trial and so I can't speculate on the motive of the man who ended his life so cruelly, leaving his wife and children bereft. Many blame social media for the coarsening of language used in political debate, and for the increasing radicalisation of aspects of our public life. It's certainly true that disinformation is the scourge of our age. We know online abuse is at epidemic levels with women MPs targeted disproportionately. And we know that children can now be bullied from the moment they get up in the morning until the moment they go to bed. In the Instagram era, there is no safe space. As an MP sitting on the Joint Committee on the Draft Online Harms Bill, I'm working on ways to address these fundamental challenges to our social cohesion. We will be publishing our recommendations soon.

But with or without legislation we can all take a leaf out of David Amess's book. It has to be possible to disagree without being disagreeable. As another murdered colleague Jo Cox famously said: "We have far more in common than that which divides us."

IT IS INCREDIBLY FRUSTRATING that businesses desperate to make up for the unavoidably difficult times brought upon us by a global pandemic are having to contend with the additional impact of something that was far from unavoidable



and which is making their road to recovery very much harder than it needed to be.

Major employers across my constituency have been contacting me to express their concern at the major shortages in staff they are all suffering from.

As John Swinney, the Deputy First Minister, said when I raised the issue with him, we are facing acute challenges in availability of skills in a number of sectors. It is an issue not only in health and social care, but in hospitality, transportation, distribution and in the rural economy.

I have written to the UK Home Secretary demanding she take urgent and immediate action to alleviate the problem because there is absolutely no doubt that the single biggest source of these problems is Brexit and the impact it has had on freedom of movement and the ability of people from EU countries to work here as they have done in the past.

Meanwhile, as we enter the last month of the year, I sincerely hope that we will be able to enjoy a far more recognisable festive season than was possible last year.

All the data clearly shows that being vaccinated gives protection against infection but also, if you do catch the virus, your chances of becoming seriously unwell are much reduced.

Covid-19 has not gone away and without the incredible efforts of everyone involved in the vaccination programme – and the fantastic numbers of people prepared to get their sleeves rolled up and get the jags – there is no question that the level of restrictions in place would be far more akin to last winter than the much more limited protections that are necessary now.

We are already past the remarkable milestone of 1,000,000

people having had the third injection and I would encourage everybody to take up the opportunity of getting vaccinated whenever the opportunity presents itself – whether you are due your first, second or booster injection, get yourself jagged. And that applies to the regular winter flu vaccine as well as the Covid one!

LAST MONTH THE CHANCELLOR of the Exchequer, Rishi Sunak MP, announced his Budget to the House of Commons and it includes some significant investments in key projects right across Scotland. A particular aspect of the budget that caught my eye was the £8 million injection to upgrade broadband in 3,600 premises,



spread across five of Scotland's rural regions, including Perth and Kinross, as part of the UK-wide Project Gigabit.

Project Gigabit is the largest rollout of broadband ever and it is being aimed at the UK's most rural areas. It will deliver future-proofed connectivity and gigabit-capable connections through full fibre broadband cables, which will be both fast and reliable.

Weak broadband is a concern that has been raised with me countless times by constituents in Kinross-shire over my many years as an MSP, so I am delighted that this budget is delivering on your priorities.

I am more than aware of the frustration that weak broadband causes and the negative affect this can have on work and social life. Moreover slow connectivity has a detrimental impact when encouraging home start-ups and keeping the established local businesses as competitive as possible. For many, Covid-19 has changed the way they work, and how they will work in the future, and access to broadband for virtual meetings on Zoom and Microsoft Teams at home has become an absolutely essential aspect of working life. If anyone in Kinross-shire is continuing to have issues with connectivity, then please do not hesitate to get in touch with my office and I will do all I can to assist.

Another great piece of news has come to Perth and Kinross last month with Perth becoming the first city in the UK to become a UNESCO City of Craft and Folk Art. It comes after a lengthy application process by Perth and Kinross Council which emphasised Perth's long tradition of being a centre for crafts (being known as 'Craftistown' from the early 16th century) and extensive consultation with craftspeople across the city. While the bid was centred around Perth City, the designation is for the entirety of Perth and Kinross. This is fantastic news for Kinross-shire because the new UNESCO badge will likely deliver increased funding and more learning opportunities for those in the trade. I know there are many artisans and manufacturers in the Kinross-shire area who will have a keen interest in the opportunities this presents.

As this will be my last column before the new year, I would like to extend season's greetings to everyone. While the last 20 months have been extraordinarily difficult, we can be truly inspired by the selfless – at times heroic – actions of many individuals across Kinross-shire during the height of the pandemic, not to mention, the collective community spirit which has helped carry us all through this difficult period together.

**Bus Services:** Government and Council policy is to try and encourage people to stop using their cars and use public transport instead. A policy which I totally support. However here in Kinross-shire we have in the last few weeks lost the



X53 Kinross – Stirling service and seen the X56 service between Perth and Edinburgh reduced to a two hourly service. This goes completely against what we should be doing and makes life really difficult for those who depend on public transport. The bus companies blame the loss of European drivers because of Brexit and the Covid 19 pandemic. The loss of the X53 service leaves those living in west Kinross-shire with no bus service at all. The Council's public transport department are speaking to the bus companies in a bid to get these cuts reversed but are not at all optimistic that they will be successful.

**Pier Car Park:** The new car park at The Pier, Kinross is already looking very good even though there is still a lot of work to do. I am however concerned that the pedestrian links to The Pier that are proposed are not as good as I was hoping for. Meetings have been held to see what can be done to make it as safe as possible for people walking to The Pier and heritage trail and avoid them having to try and dodge cars and other vehicles on Pier Road.

Community Speed Watch: Visitors who read our community council minutes will be aware that speeding traffic is a big issue locally. To try and address this we are hoping to establish, with the support of our local Police, a Kinross-shire Community Speed Watch Scheme. If you are interested in volunteering please get in touch and I will send you information on the scheme. Our community councils are currently listing speeding blackspots in their areas so that they can be assessed by the Police for their suitability as locations to carry out Speed Watch checks.

**Loch Leven Heritage Trail repair:** By the time you read this the new 150 metre section of heritage trail path in front of Kinross House should be laid. This new surface is hoped to be much longer lasting and require far less maintenance than conventional path surfaces. If this new surface proves to be successful TRACKS will use it on other sections of the Loch Leven trail, especially the parts that are low lying or prone to erosion. I would welcome your comments on this new section of path.

Kinross-shire Area Committee: The first meeting of the KAC will be held virtually in December. The committee will be made up of the four Kinross-shire ward councillors and a representative from each of our community councils. As I write this report the agenda for this meeting is being drawn up. Among the items that will be discussed are road safety issues and speed limits in Kinross-shire.

**Festive Greetings:** May I take this opportunity to wish you all a Happy Christmas and a healthy and prosperous New Year. 2021 has seen a slow return to a new normal. The discovery of a vaccine for Covid has made a huge difference in the number of people becoming seriously ill and worse but we must still all do our best to keep this virus at bay.

AN EMAILED SUBMISSION OF 26/10/21 to SEPA's consultation on the Flood Risk Management Plan with particular reference to DRUM.

Message from Councillor Michael Barnacle

### **Dear Staff**



In relation to the Forth Estuary Local Plan District (FELPD) (LDP 10) on Potentially Vulnerable Areas (PVA), I do not agree that you have identified all the communities that require flood risk management within the District. I am concerned about the exclusion of the Drum Area in West Kinross-shire and fundamentally disagree with PKC that this is not an area requiring flood management. It has a high water table and lies just east of the River Devon Catchment. To my certain knowledge, during periods of high rainfall, several areas of land around the settlement flood extensively and I am aware of 2 houses experiencing serious flooding and several others at high risk thereof. PKC do not listen to Community Council representation on the flood risk in the area when sanctioning further new build development that exacerbates the situation. The waste water treatment plant put in relatively recently by Scottish Water, as an environmental improvement after community request, is at near capacity. For years, I have asked PKC to support a ditch management scheme for the area (there are a significant number of water courses flowing through the settlement from neighbouring hills for which I have the maps and they frequently get obstructed) to no avail.

I fully support the response to your consultation from my constituent, Julie King and have personally witnessed the flooding that her home has been subjected to. PKC have done little to assist with the problem. The above response also relates to Kinross target area 239, actions thereon and the identified timescale therefor. I reiterate that declaring Drum a PVA and agreeing a suitable Ditch Management Scheme would help considerably with managing flood risk in a separate or an extended target area.

### Kinross-shire Community Transport Group, Minutes of Meeting held on 28 October 2021 Matters Arising From Last Minutes


**CLLR BARNACLE ADVISED GROUP** that he had issued the last minutes to the Kinross Newsletter where they had been published. Cllr Barnacle had also provided the Kwik Survey to Sarah Brown, HT at Kinross High School in terms of a school pupil transport survey. MR will collate the results once the closing date of 15 November has passed.

Douglas Fraser requested that he be provided with the link to this online survey to assist with the transport survey he is drafting in terms of Service 55 in Glenfarg. Cllr Barnacle will provide this link to DF.

### Update on Current Subsidised and Commercial Local Bus Services in Kinross-shire

**X53:** MR confirmed that First had advised the Council that they are to withdraw this commercial service in January 2022, with its last day of operation being Saturday, 08 January 2022. MR added that First had cited ongoing bus driver shortages as the reason for this withdrawal of service.

All meeting attendees agreed this was bad news and PL added that this was also hugely disappointing for the residents of Muckhart.



Douglas Fraser asked if MR could examine the above timetable to ascertain if certain tweaks could be possible. Requests were that the service connected with the 1015 Service 56 departure in Glenfarg for Perth. MR confirmed she would liaise with the bus company in terms of any adverse effect such a re-timing would have on current passengers.

Future Planning for Public Transport Provision in Kinross-shire Lengthy discussions took place regarding the withdrawal of the Service X53 and what action was required to mitigate this loss of service

MR confirmed that she had received the boarding and alighting figures from First from 2nd August – 22nd October (day the notice to withdraw was given). MR will interrogate these stats to ascertain the travel demand patterns and passenger levels during this period and update the ClIrs when completed.

MH made the point that some people continue to be inhibited to use bus services due to the ongoing Covid-19 situation.

MR also confirmed that she would speak with her colleagues in Stirling/Clacks Public Transport Unit and ascertain what their intentions were and if any partnership working was possible.

Phillip Lord confirmed that he had contacts at Stirling University and he would contact them to ask what impact this withdrawal would have on the University students and staff.

Three options were agreed covering short-term and long-term actions:

- MR to investigate possibility of tendering the X53 timetable with the resultant cost shared between the three Council areas. JF added that the tender should be widely publicised. MR confirmed that if a tender was issued it would be through PCS-T.
- MR to compile off peak timetable that would operate between Kinross and Yetts o' Muckhart or possibly Kinross and Dollar. Clacks to be approached to ask if they would contribute to this service if it operated to Dollar. The intention would be to put this in place as from 10 January 2022, subject to senior management approval.
- MR to prepare business case to purchase a small minibus including cost of training and employing drivers to operate a Community Transport service in West Kinross-shire at the request of Councillor Barnacle. MM added that reference to COP26 and environmental benefit of community transport should be mentioned.

There was no AOCB.

Letter to Mr Thomas Glen. Chief Executive Perth & Kinross Council

#### **Dear Thomas**

I write in the first instance to welcome your appointment to the post of Chief Executive of our Council and to wish you all the best for the future, noting my first introduction to you at our recent Full Council meeting.

I now write to you on the following topic:

### Lack of Affordable Housing in the Rural Villages of Kinross-shire

At the last meeting of Portmoak Community there was a discussion about the recently withdrawn planning application for 22 houses in Scotlandwell (where no on-site affordable housing was proposed), which is site H54 in our Local Development Plan. I was encouraged to draft a letter to you, on behalf of the 4 elected members of Kinross-shire, in relation to the wider issue headed above.

It is the view of the Kinross-shire Forum of elected members and community councils, now to be replaced by a PKC Area Committee for Kinross-shire that is to hold its first meeting shortly under my convenership, that the Planning Department are not carrying out correctly the policy of PKC as regards affordable housing. No sites for affordable housing in the rural villages are currently in the plan for the coming decade. The Housing Service say there is no demand, which we utterly refute! Our policy states that, wherever possible for sites of 5 houses upwards then a percentage onsite provision of affordable units should be provided. However, we note that planning officers appear to be negotiating with developers to allow commuted sums to 'a central pot' rather than on-site provision without reference to a viability statement. This results in the affordable housing only being provided in the main towns of the housing market area. I can provide examples! Councillor Watters and I serve on the Development Management Committee and note the lack of affordable on-site provision when applications come forward in our rural areas.

The effect of this interpretation of the Affordable Housing policy means that people in the rural villages are effectively unable to either get on the housing ladder or have to move into the towns if they want to down-size. Where is the ability to have social housing, mid-market rented houses or even self build plots? All that is being built in rural Kinross-shire are large houses for the Edinburgh market catchment area. I would ask you respectfully to use your office to bring pressure to bear on the housing and planning services to implement properly our current policy.

### Councillor **Richard Watters**

COP26 has highlighted the need for transformational change if we are to contain Global Warming to within 1.5 degrees.

With such a vast problem, it can be difficult to know how to make a difference. However, in Kinrossshire I believe that we can play our part. I am in no doubt that people in our community want to do their bit to help, but it is key that all levels of Government look at how our infrastructure can be improved to allow positive options for individuals in Kinrossshire looking to reduce their carbon footprint. It is important that we address multiple areas which have a large scope for improvement such as household energy and transport emissions which are strongly implicated in the current climate crisis. The changes required will provide opportunities for each of us and create a better society for all.

Transport emissions are Scotland's single largest source of greenhouse gas emissions. In transitioning to meet the Scottish Government's 2030 goal of 75% reduction in greenhouse gases, it is key to put in place infrastructure to allow the necessary transition to take place.

#### **X53 Bus Service**

I have been having numerous conversations with council officers and others regarding First Bus terminating the x53 service. The Kinross to Stirling route has had numerous changes over the last few years. Add to that, the temporary reduction in the 56 service between Perth and Kinross by Stagecoach. The reason given by both operators is the lack of bus drivers, due to drivers needing to self-isolate as a result of Covid, fewer European drivers and problems with DVLA in getting provisional driver licences released.

Having dependable bus services that don't risk being withdrawn or changed at the rate we have seen over the last few years are essential if we are to provide alternative options to single person car journeys.

### **EV Charge points**

Along with this, one of my fellow SNP Councillors, John Rebbeck, and myself have asked the council to install electric vehicle charging points at all the Council run schools in Perth and Kinross, where practical. This would help and encourage teachers who are considering purchasing electric vehicles.

They can do so with confidence that the infrastructure is available to support their decisions.

### **Provost**

At November's Full Council meeting a motion was brought forward by two Conservative councillors to put an application into the Platinum Jubilee Civic Honours Competition to 'reinstate' our Provost with the Title of 'Lord Provost of the City of Perth'. This title was removed in 1975 with the creation of Tayside and Perth & Kinross, the same time as the removal of the Provost of Kinross. Before being able to seek clarification on what this meant for Kinross-shire or Rural Perthshire, both the Tories and the Independents shut down the debate by raising a separate call to go straight to the vote.

### **Project Servator**

Project Servator is a policing tactic that aims to reassure the public. It targets criminal activity, including terrorism.

We work with partners, including businesses and security staff, to keep Scotland safe. The aim is to make Scotland a difficult place for criminals and terrorists.

Project Servator has been successful in gathering intelligence. It has helped Counter Terrorism Units investigate and prevent acts of terror.

It has also resulted in arrests. It helps remove firearms, knives and drugs from the streets.



If a Project Servator deployment is happening where you are, there's nothing to worry about. They are normal police deployments.

Project Servator deployments are highly visible and unpredictable.

They can happen at any time, anywhere. They are made up of specially trained uniformed and plain clothes officers.

They can involve a wide range of other specialist police resources such as police dogs and horses.

Officers also make use of a range of technology including CCTV cameras and automatic number plate recognition (ANPR).

Officers will speak to people and local businesses to let them know what they are doing.

They will remind them to be vigilant, trust their instincts and report any suspicious or unusual behaviour.

You may also see officers handing out leaflets explaining what Project Servator is or posters on display.

Working with the community is vital to making Project Servator a success. If you have any questions please feel free to talk to our officers.

Our teams also work with partners such as British Transport Police, security staff and CCTV operators to carry out deployments.

You have an important part to play. Report anything that doesn't feel right, for example an unattended item or someone acting suspiciously.

We'll always take your report seriously.

- In an emergency, always call 999














# A Most Happy And Wonderful Life

Gina's nephew told the Newsletter about the life of his wonderful Auntie, Gina Long.

£360 was raised for charity at the funeral collection.

EARLIEST MEMORIES, FOR SOME reason, are of happy times with my grandparents. My mother would put me on a certain bus in Milnathort and my gran would be waiting for me at the bus stop in Kinross – which was just across the road from her house. My grandfather was severely disabled with rheumatism and spent many hours in his workshop making wooden toys for me. There was a wooden doll and a cradle and he was also very good at making a slit in the top of a pink electric light bulb which he acquired from the manager of the nearby picture house. He then fitted the bulb into a holder making it into a bank to hold the silver three penny he gave me at the end of every visit.

At five years old I was enrolled into the 'Infant' or 'Wee' school in Milnathort. It was thus called as we could only do two years there before moving to the 'Primary' or 'Big' school. I had not been many months at the 'Wee' school when I took Scarlet Fever. I can remember my mother telling me I was going for a ride in a horse and carriage – this was the local ambulance which was to take me to the 'Fever Hospital' at Gallowhill, about two miles from my home. When anyone from the family came to visit, they had to stand on a step outside the window and try to make themselves heard. Visitors were not allowed to come inside. Shortly afterwards we saw the beginning of World War 2 and the issue of the 'gas mask' which we were required to carry to school each day. Thankfully these were never required. We often heard the sirens warning of an impending air raid but always in the evening and only on one occasion did we hear the terrific bang of a landmine dropping at Tillywhally Farm. One of our upstairs windows was blown out and part of the ceiling fell away. Many people of the village trudged to the farm to view the crater and to collect a piece of the metal as a souvenir.

At the age of seven I moved on to the 'Big' school and enjoyed my school days there. My first teacher in primary three was Miss Baxter – she had been in the same class as my father many years before.

The neighbouring children of my age with whom I spent the after school hours were all boys – so I was usually the last picked to make up a team – whether it was cricket, football or kick the can. The boys even taught me how to 'guddle' fish in the burn but

I was not too keen on this ploy – always a bit scared as to what I might find under the stones! However, at 10, my mum presented me with a little brother, Frank – who I was always particularly close to – and I was then able to do all the 'girlie things' only not with the usual teddy bear or doll – but a real live baby!

During the autumn of each year we schoolchildren looked forward to the 'tattie picking'. We had to approach either the farmer or his manager prior to the holiday to ask if we could get a job helping to bring in the potato harvest. We had to be at a certain spot each morning to meet the tractor and trailer that would take us to the potato field. As it was very cold in the mornings, usually with a touch of frost, we had to be appropriately dressed and with gloves and Wellingtons and to complete the picture was the inevitable knapsack that held our lunch and a bottle of juice. Of course the knapsack served two purposes - at the end of the day it was filled with potatoes to take home. The pay was good – sometimes 10/- and even sometimes 12/6d – but come the afternoon most of us were doing the work by crawling along on our hands and knees! However, we were kept going by the thought of the pay packet at the end of the week – this was usually used to clothe us out for the coming school term.

Towards the end of my primary school days, I had the 'twelve plus' examination and the result of that meant that I could move on to Perth Academy. I spent three years there, taking a classical course – I had the odd idea that I wanted to be a chemist! I have no interesting memories of my time at the Academy – only that it was hard work. We did have fun travelling in a double decker bus when there were many feet of snow on the ground. No matter how deep, each morning we would turn up at the bus stop anxious to get to school and often we had a long walk home when the bus got into difficulties and the driver found that he could take the bus no further. Sometimes we had to come home by train.

In the village there was a butcher, Andrew Duncan, and on Saturday afternoons my dad and I delivered the meat orders that Andrew had secured on his visit to Portmoak and Fossoway. I can still remember the names of his customers and the contents of their order, usually the same from week to week. I often got a 'tip' and a fresh egg being one that I remember, as, being wartime, there were not many fresh eggs available. Another customer gave me a shilling (5 pence) and that too was very acceptable.

### **Features**

Best of all, on the back roads from Drum to Milnathort, my dad taught me how to drive! Obviously there was not the traffic that we have nowadays! My pay for the afternoon was 4/6d - a fortune to me!

I was 16 by the time I left Perth Academy and my thoughts of employment had moved on to secretarial so I was enrolled into the Perth Secretarial College, just behind St. John's Church in Perth. I had a very happy year there learning shorthand, typing, book-keeping and office procedures. At the end of the year, offices, with vacancies for juniors, would contact the college and the supervisor would send us out for interviews. My first interview was in a plumber's office but I decided against it because of the very low pay. Miss Robertson, the College Supervisor, then asked me if my father was tee-total as she had another interview in mind for me – this was with Arthur Bell, the whisky firm. But this meeting did not last very long - they did not want anyone from the 'country' because of the possibility of not being able to get to work because of bad weather! Third time lucky - I went to see a Mr Mactaggart, the Export Director in the office of Matthew Gloag & Son, blenders of the Famous Grouse Scotch Whisky, and my fate was sealed. He was looking for a 'country girl' - the pay was good and little did I know when I entered the door on 26th July 1950 that I would remain with that firm for 43 years moving through the various stages from office junior to Personal Assistant to the Joint Managing Director/Deputy Chairman. I retired on my 60th birthday – 20 December 1993.

I had, in my 12-14 years, been a 1st Orwell Girl Guide. The meetings were held in the 'Big' school as the army had taken over the Guide & Scout Hall in Church Street. By the time I reached the age of 18 a friend, Maureen Giacopazzi by name, asked if I would like to come back into Guiding and in due course become a Lieutenant, as the current Captain was retiring. I had enjoyed my Guiding days, so 'yes' I would give it a go. Shortly after becoming Lieutenant, Maureen moved on to join the Police Force in Clyde-

bank, so then I was catapulted into the position of Captain at the age of 23 – a position I was to hold for 34 years! The vacant position of Lieutenant was shortly filled by my very good friend, Jean Toshack who had been a very keen guide, and between us we ran the company in complete harmony. We had such fun – doing all the usual guide programme, badges, camping, country dancing - we won this class at the Perthshire Musical Festival on several occasions and even with the mixed class where we entered four guides and four scouts. On one occasion we even entered the company into the camp fire section of the Festival but the training and practice for this was by Valerie, another Guider who worked with us for several years – as neither Jean nor I had been blessed with good singing voices! Then there was the never to be forgotten bi-annual jumble sale – most of the villagers donated to this event and turned up on THE day! We usually cleared over a thousand pounds. Much of the sale takings were used to buy tents and camping equipment as we were a camping company and went to camp for a week each year. The Orwell Company eventually owned enough canvas and equipment to cater for about 20 guides. We also bought uniforms for the girls as we did not ask parents to do this, only if they preferred it.

During this time we had a Young Leader, Sheila Muirhead, who had been a keen guide before coming to live in Milnathort. She completed her Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award with the Orwell Company and invited me to join her parents to witness her presentation by The Duke of Edinburgh at the Palace of Holyroodhouse. This was a very happy and memorable day. I have a clear picture of seeing a young and lovely Princess Anne in a lemon suit.

In June of 1987 I was invited, along with Jean, to another Holyrood Palace Garden Party – this time the invitation was issued by The Lord Chamberlain on behalf of Her Majesty but instigated by the Milnathort Community Council – for services to the Community – another day to be fondly remembered.





To mark our retiral from Guiding Jean and I were invited on 27th March 1992 to a 'cup of tea' by our Commissioner, only to discover that it was in fact an invitation to a Surprise Party in Milnathort Town Hall. This was a very special night and attended by many friends whom we had met over the years – Friends, Guiders, Scouters and many of the very brave ladies who had faithfully manned the stalls at our jumble sales. We each were presented with good service certificates and brooches by Mrs Valerie Gordon, County Commissioner; engraved paperweights were presented by Mrs Adele Inglis on behalf of Guiding in Kinross-shire and a handsome cheque from our many friends was presented by Miss Pat Eadie. I spent my cheque in a jewellery shop and purchased a beautiful gold chain bracelet.

I was also much involved with the Church and for many years assisted with the Sunday School.

I also became involved, as I thought on a one-off occasion, with the Kinross-shire Agricultural Society. However, for the past 28 years I have been one of two Stewards at the Dog Section of the Show.

Another one of my interests was the Kinross-shire Historical Society, being secretary for ten years. Although no longer secretary I still have involvement in that I am in charge of a grand collection of old postcards and photographs, adding to them as necessary.

As I have mentioned earlier, my working days were all spent in the offices of Matthew Gloag & Son Limited, in Perth. I start-

ed as the office junior and one incident that has remained in my memory is the day that I stuck the stamps willy nilly on the corner of each envelope. My boss, Miss Smith, on examining my work took me to one side and explained that work like this did not go out from the office of Matthew Gloag. She made me go to the kitchen, boil a kettle of water, and with the steam detach all stamps that had not been attached straight. To this day, no one will ever get an envelope from me where the stamp is not stuck squarely in the corner.


I moved up fairly quickly through the various office desks – and eventually found myself to be Office Supervisor, a position I held for many years. Then sadly in 1971 my boss, Mr Fred Gloag died very suddenly on a Sunday followed by the death of his wife the following Wednesday. This was devastating for the firm – double death duty! How was the firm to continue? But survive we did – we came under the umbrella of Highland Distiller and the brand has never looked back, in fact it went from strength to strength and today I think is number one in Scotland. As the office personnel grew in size I moved on from the General Office to become secretary to the Sales Director and later, when he was promoted to the position of Joint Managing Director/Deputy Chairman, I became his Personal Assistant.

In 1990 Mr & Mrs Matthew Gloag invited the four longest serving members of the company to accompany them as representatives of the firm to a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace given by the Queen to mark the 150th Anniversary of the Royal Warrant Holders Association – The Famous Grouse having held this Warrant for several years. It was a remarkable day and we had good views of Princess Diana, The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh and The Queen Mother who was in her 90th year. In the evening we went to see the show 'Miss Saigon'. We returned to Perth the following morning and were back at our desks by the afternoon – a very busy but most enjoyable 24 hours.

I retired in December 1993, having spent 43 years in the service of Matthew Gloag & Son Limited, the firm that I had joined in 1950. I had seen the small private firm as I knew it in 1950 become one of the Scotch Whisky giants and I had loved every minute of my working life – well almost – there were naturally a few ups and downs!

To my delight my retiral gift from the firm was a computer and printer and it was not long before I was approached by Mrs Nan Walker, Editor of the monthly *Kinross Newsletter*. I spent

much time typing up articles for inclusion in the *Newsletter* and this lasted until it became computerised under the wings of a new editor. Progress – I was really quite sad to give up on the old style of setting up the *Newsletter* with the help of a light-box and the old cut and paste method!

I was enjoying my retiral and spending much time with my little Jack Russell, Rusty, then one day in early May 1994, the postman dropped a letter through my letter-box marked "On Her Majesty's Service"- it was from the office of the Principal Private Secretary at 10 Downing Street informing me that the Prime Minister, Mr. John Major, 'in strict confidence, had it in mind, on the occasion of the forthcoming list of Birthday Honours, to submit my name to The Queen with a recommendation ... .....that I be appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire.' A form was enclosed which I had to complete and send by return of post if I could assure the P.M. that I agreed to accept the honour! Wow! I wanted to shout this news from the rooftops but, at the same time, had to observe that this information had been given in confidence. Then in June a further letter was received from The Scottish Office – I was given the option of having the award presented by The Queen probably, but not necessarily at Buckingham Palace, or locally by the Lord Lieutenant. I was also told that I was allowed to invite three relatives or friends to accompany me so, without a doubt; I chose The Queen and Buckingham Palace. Come Saturday 11 June - the Queens Birthday Honours' list was published and the secret was out! What excitement as the news spread around the village, phone calls and many cards of congratulations.

My guests included friends Jean Toshack, Margaret Garry and my sister-in-law, Margaret Harley. Then in August I received a letter advising that the Investiture was to take place on Tuesday 8 November. What fun we had in the weeks following – visiting the boutiques – and making all kinds of arrangements. The firm, Matthew Gloag & Son paid for our return plane flight and one night in the Goring Hotel, just around the corner from Buckingham Palace.

On THE day, the most important day of my life, I can remember my friends tucking in to a lovely breakfast but my nerves were such that I could only watch them eat! We walked to the palace, joined a queue of people all looking as nervous as I was feeling and very shortly we were shown inside – my friends went one way and I the other! I had to wait in a very large predominately red room, along with the others who were to be invested, and instructed as to how to address her Majesty, not to turn our back on her, and how and when to curtsey. Everything went like clockwork and when it was my turn to go forward, a loud voice from somewhere announced – Miss Georgina Harley – for services to the distilling industry. That was my cue to approach the Queen. As she pinned the medal on to a hook, that had been pre-

fixed to my jacket, she asked how I been involved in the industry. After my reply she shook my hand, I took five steps backwards, did my curtsey – and that was it – all over!

Back at The Goring, we picked up our luggage and made our way to The Strand Hotel, where we were going to spend a further three days. We did some shopping in Harrods and also took in a show – Starlight Express – wonderful! Too soon we were on the plane for Edinburgh but it had been a fantastic four days – never to be forgotten.

My next most important day was to be my wedding in the following year. As I said earlier, I had mapped out all of the things I was going to do in my retirement but matters didn't go according to my plans. Quite by chance I met my future American husband in the village Post Office and we wed in November 1995. Very much a traveller, he has taken me on many trips to the U.S.A. and we have visited around 42 states, as well as Canada, Malaysia, Borneo, Australia and many countries of Europe. We do not travel abroad now; we have a 'rescue' dog living with us so we take holidays where he can go with us...

Life has been good to me – I had kind and loving parents, good friends, I enjoyed every minute of my working life; I had much fun with the Girl Guides and in retirement blessed with a husband who has been, and still is, very kind and exciting. And as if that was not enough, I became step-mum to Ward's two charming and delightful sons whom I love dearly – Charles and Michael and they, in turn, blessed my life further with the addition of their wives Karen and Hanne and children Callum, Lise, Lachlan and Kayleigh. Yes! There is no doubt about it – I have had a most happy and wonderful life!



# Christmas Tragedy In The Air



Herbert Norman Scott Anderson

IT WAS 104 YEARS AGO, on Christmas Eve 1917, that one of Kinross-shire's youngest casualties of the Great War of 1914-18 died as the result of a tragic accident while training for active service. Having enlisted in September of that year in the Royal Flying Corps, the story of Second-Lieutenant Herbert Norman Scott Anderson is told in the Roll of Honour compiled by Alastair Smith and held in the archives of Kinross (Marshall) Museum.

Born in 1899, 'Bertie', as he was known to family and friends, was the son of Murdoch Christie Anderson and his wife Josephine Lydia Scott who lived at Bracklemoss in The Muirs and later at The Hollies on the corner of St Ronan's Drive and the High Street in the centre of Kinross. Murdoch Anderson, who was a solicitor, held the position of Provost of Kinross from the onset of the First World War until 1923. His only son Herbert was educated in Kinross and then at Merchiston Castle School in Edinburgh where he carried off an exhibition or scholarship that would have taken him on to Cambridge University had he not decided to enlist in the Royal Flying Corps.

Looking forward with eagerness to active service Herbert Anderson began his training with the 80th Squadron at Montrose before heading south to Beverley in Yorkshire in November 1917 where the squadron was equipped with Sopwith Camel F1 fighters. Scheduled to take off for France in January 1918, Bertie took to the air at every opportunity in order to practise manoeuvres and gain confidence in handling his machine. Before long he earned

tributes from his Commanding Officer and brother officers who described him as 'a very fine pilot and second to none.'

On the morning of 24 December, Bertie and two other officers were ordered into the air where they went up to a good height doing assorted 'stunts' for over 50 minutes. In one of these stunts, Bertie dramatically spun down from 1500 feet to 400 feet where he recovered control of the plane before making a further dive of 200 feet in order to regain more speed. Unfortunately, he was too near the ground to get the engine working properly and he spun out of control, crashing the plane on the Beverley Westwood golf course. Sustaining very severe injuries, he died soon after arrival at the local Cottage Hospital.

An inquest that followed returned a verdict of accidental death and his remains were brought north to Kinross where a funeral with full military honours was held on Friday 28 December. A service, conducted by the Rev. M D Fletcher, was first held in St Paul's Church prior to the cortege processing down through the town accompanied by a firing party of 40 men of the Royal Scots Fusiliers with a pipe band drawn from the same regiment. Bertie Anderson was finally laid to rest in the Kirkgate burial ground with bugles playing the 'Last Post.'

Today you can still see the fine memorial stone over the grave of Herbert Norman Scott Anderson which takes the form of a cross emblazoned with the wings of the Royal Flying Corps and the Latin motto *per ardua et astra* – 'Through adversity to the stars.' The inscription below notes that he was 'killed while flying 24 December 1917 Aged 18 years.' It ends with another Latin quotation taken from an ode by the Roman poet Horace – *Dulce et decorum est pro patria mori* – 'It is sweet and fitting to die for one's country,' words that bring to mind one of the most famous poems by the war poet Wilfred Owen (1893-1918).

# The War Poet And The Attractions Of Milnathort



Poet Wilfred Owen

**POET WILFRED OWEN'S LINK** with Craiglockhart Hospital in Edinburgh is well documented – much less well known is his connection to Milnathort.

Owen is regarded as the greatest poet of World War One and his works about the horrors of trench and gas warfare are still taught in schools today.

Born in Shropshire in 1893, he was beginning to forge a career as a teacher when war broke out. In 1917, while being treated for shell shock at Craiglockhart Hospital in Edinburgh, he taught English in the city – one of a number of projects in which, to aid his recovery, Owen was encouraged to take part.

At Craiglockhart Owen met Dr Arthur John Brock, who encouraged him to write poetry, and Siegfried Sassoon, another war poet, who was also a patient there.

Neil McLennan, a historian from the University of Aberdeen, says: 'Owen wrote about a quarter or a third of his poems during his time in Edinburgh, including his most powerful, *Anthem for Doomed Youth*, and *Dulce et Decorum est*.'

Craiglockhart treated thousands of soldiers, some so damaged by their war experiences that they could not even leave their rooms. Others, like Owen and Sassoon, were allowed out to work or to travel.

'They were blue armbands to show they were serving soldiers, undergoing treatment, but they were able to travel around the country,' Mr McLennan says. 'Sassoon was a keen golfer so they went to North Berwick and St Andrews.' But the two poets also made regular visits to Milnathort in Kinross-shire. Milnathort had a golf course, which may have been the initial draw for Sassoon – but for Owen, the village had another attraction.

'Albert Dauthieu had been the head chef at the Savoy in London and now ran the Thistle Inn in Milnathort,' Mr McLennan says. 'The food would have been remarkable for two young men used to war hospital fare, and army rations.'

Albert had two daughters, 19-year-old Albertina, and her younger sister Rose. Rose was deaf and mute, and something of a mascot for local soldiers. She collected autographs from visitors in a book, which is now in the Craiglockhart Collection.

Albertina was engaged to a Scottish captain, but she quickly became smitten

with Owen. 'The story goes that Albertina was taken with Owen, and the feeling was mutual,' Mr McLennan says. 'According to her family, it was agreed that whoever returned from war first, would take her hand in marriage.'

Sadly, neither returned. The young captain died in March 1918 and Owen the week before war ended, at just 25 years old. The telegram was delivered to his parents in Shropshire on 11 November 1918 as the bells rang out to mark the Armistice.

Owen's sexuality has always been the subject of speculation, but McLennan believes the latest information leaves open the possibility that his inclinations were more complex than had been previously suspected. 'Romantic undertones are a key part of his poems,' he says. 'The assumption was that these had homosexual connotations but this changes things, and will hopefully lead to a re-examination of his work.'

Owen's poems were published posthumously. He left a list of 25 people who were to receive first editions, should they ever be published. Five of them were in Edinburgh, including Dr Brock, who first encouraged him to write. And among the collection was *The Ballad of Many Thorns*, which seems to reference Milnathort and the French family with whom he found a brief moment of happiness before returning to the horrors of the Western Front.

'I hope the village of Milnathort can now have this strong connection and pride in Wilfred Owen,' says Mr McLennan, who is writing a book about Owen's time in Scotland, which will be published next year.

'For history, it's an important moment, because more than 100 years after the end of the First World War, it shows there's still much evidence to be unearthed and interpreted to help us better understand that era.'

# HOW CAN WE IMPROVE THE PARK & RIDE?

In recent months, Kinross Park and Ride has become a dumping ground for vehicles and rubbish, with potholes and poor drainage. Here Brian D'Arcy shows us the proposed solution.



### THE PROBLEM

THE KINROSS PARK AND RIDE has become a local hotspot for dumping cars and caravans in recent months, and littering has increased noticeably too.

Not only that, but the tarmacadam surfaces are crumbling with potholes, and cars and vans regularly drive over the grass amenity strips in the centre, tracking mud across the car park surface and crushing the plants. It looks a mess.

As described in previous *Newsletters*, the car park has a failed drainage feature, resulting in water pooling in the car park spaces. The muddy pools of rainwater on the parking spaces adds to the degraded, neglected appearance.

### THE PROPOSAL


### **Surface Water Drainage**

Surface water drainage should run into the grass and the soakaway structure lying beneath, but is prevented from so doing by excess height of the grass turf. This project will reduce the level of the grass and soil in the central grass features to allow rainfall runoff to enter them and the soakaways beneath.

At the top end where the grass strip is widest and soil depth is greatest (See diagram on next page: Raingarden 1), a wildflower meadow will be created, using native wildflowers and some of the original turf. The mid-section (Raingarden 2) will be a wildflowers seed mix with plug plants and limited grass, since the soil is shallower. The final strip is extremely shallow; even

with compaction caused by driving over it, there is barely enough potential for a reasonable freeboard to accept the runoff. It drains poorly too. A planter might be useful to support biodiversity and aesthetic interest?

### **Fences**

Fences were originally in place around the grass strips but were removed years ago. New fences, along the north side only, are essential to stop the damage caused by driving over the grass. A tim-

ber fence as exists across from the car park, is proposed. That would still leave access for maintenance work, from the south side of the centre strips.

### The Soakaway Drainage Layer

The soakaway drainage layer (washed stone within a Terram liner) will not be altered or subject to interference by the changes to the soil cover and plants.



# **Community Council News**



The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. Where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

### Kinross Community Council News from the October Meeting

**Present** at the meeting held on 26 October were CCllrs L McKay, (Chair), D Colliar, W Freeman, H Phillips, T Stewart, Cllrs Purves and R Watters, one member of the public and Mrs Caron Aird, minute-taker.

**Apologies** were received from CCllr M Wood, Cllrs M Barnacle and W Robertson.

### **Matters Arising**

**Gallowhill Road and Garden:** Cllr C Purves advised that he had chased PKC for a response again.

Water Safety: Live Action are still to respond.

**High Street:** issues in respect of green spaces will fall under the jurisdiction of the new local committee which is currently being set up. A paper describing the committee's remit will be discussed at a future CC meeting.

Flooding: Cllr Purves advised that he had spoken with Angus Forbes at PKC and there still appeared to be confusion in respect of what the insurers are being asked to look at. The group had asked PKC to take them on as volunteers but things now appeared to be at an impasse. While the CC can demonstrate that other councils are operating in this way, it would appear that PKC want to go down a different route. Cllr Watters advised that he was meeting with PKC later in the week and would raise the issue with them again.

**Learning Centre Signs:** it was confirmed that the majority of the signs had been removed, although two still required to be replaced as they were joint signs with the free parking signs (they are on order).

Common Good Fund: CCIIr Colliar advised that he had been invited to the previous meeting of the Fund but had received an email advising that whilst he could attend, he was not to contribute to any discussion. When he joined the meeting, it had already started and it was obvious that a mistake had been made with the arrangements. CCIIr Colliar agreed to forward the email to CIIr Purves so that this could be discussed at the next meeting of the Fund.

War Memorial: there had been no response.

**Repair to Bridges**: this had been raised at a recent TRACKS meeting where it had been announced that these were the responsibility of PKC and not SNH. No response has been received from PKC as yet.

**Benches**: CCllr Purves agreed to ask PKC to look at the broken bench which was discussed at a recent meeting. CCllr Freeman also advised that there was a broken bench at Kirkgate Park which needed to be repaired.

CCIIr H Phillips asked if the Men's Shed could repair the benches but CIIr Purves advised he would ask PKC to look at these first.

**VAS:** Cllr Purves advised that the signs for Springfield Road (one at either end) which had been scheduled to be erected in 2021 had been delayed due to the lack of components and it is likely to be later in the financial year before the issue will be resolved.

It was noted that there were now traffic lights at the Campus and that there had been a three car RTA on Springfield Road/ The Muirs.

**GDPR:** CCIIr Freeman confirmed that he had completed the action allocated to him.

**Kirkgate Park:** CCllr Mckay advised that a space had been allocated in the park for the exercise equipment, although funding would need to be raised for this (around £30,000: £35,000). PKC funding for Davis Park in terms of a possible pump park, shelter, charging points for phones, along with one main structure (including a climbing frame) is to be provided. Cllr Purves suggested the CC contact the Sports Hub for funding. It was noted that PKC would take on the maintenance and public liability insurance for the park. Designs are still to be received and consultation process is ongoing. Cllr Purves advised the CC to liaise with PKC as early as possible, and in writing, with regard to the fees involved for Kirkgate Park.

A report will be provided at future meetings.

Remembrance Parade: CCIIr Colliar advised that whilst he had been unable to contact everyone for a meeting, the Cadets, Brownies, Scouts/Cubs and Masonic Order were all keen to be involved in a full parade.

Road closure requirements were under consideration, and it was agreed that a Church service could be held.

It was agreed that CCllr Colliar would contact the individual organisations in respect of their requirements for wreaths, with payment being required upfront. CCllrs Colliar, Freeman and Mckay will work together on this.

## Planning Matters Applications Received

21/01729/FLL: Change of use from agricultural storage building to workshop (Class 5) and display area, and erection of a fence at land 70 metres south of Gallowhill Cottage, Kinross.

CCIIr Colliar asked whether the CC would want to submit a letter of support in respect of this application, as there is no reason to refuse the application. It was agreed that CCIIr Phillips would write a letter to PKC.

21/01767/LBC: (internal) Alterations to Kirklands Hotel, 20 High Street, Kinross

### **Applications Determined**

21/01589/LAW: Extension to dwelling house (proposed) at 14 Ross Street, Kinross, approved.

21/01329/FLL: S42 application to amend condition 4 (access construction) and delete condition 14 (street lighting) of planning permission 16/00996/FLL at land 110 metres south east of Beaufield, Balado, approved.

### Other planning matters

Cllr Purves advised that PKC had made a final decision in respect of Phase II at Lathro Meadows, and this had been approved. There remains a separate concern regarding the residents' association and the factor continues to deal with greenspace maintenance.

Play park discussions are ongoing, and whilst this is supposed to be temporary, there is no option to appeal the decision.

Cllr Purves also advised the CC that there had been disquiet in respect of the height/scale of buildings on the Windlestrae site, particularly the buildings which back onto Muirpark Road and while the buildings are imposing, there is nothing which can be done.

CCIIr Colliar commented that the Kirklands garage development was looking good and the properties were much better than had been expected.

### **Reports From PKC Councillors**

Cllr Purves advised that at a recent full meeting of PKC, the four ward councillors had supported the creation of a local committee to deal with all local issues. It is hoped that the first meeting would be held on 4 December and he would circulate the Scheme of Administration for information.

From a CC perspective, one representative would be requested to join the committee (same person preferable) in a non-voting role. CCllr Freeman volunteered to join the committee. Cllr R Watters advised that he had received an email from Mr W Wright in respect of the flood resilience group and the insurance issues being experienced.

CCIIr Mckay and the CC felt that discussions were going round in circles. A vote had been taken not to continue discussions with the group, the CC members did not feel it was appropriate for them to be held liable for any accidents and that this was an issue for PKC to work with the resilience group.

CCIIr Mckay confirmed that it was the CC's view that the group should be set up as a charity or constituted group in order to obtain insurance from another source.

It was agreed that the ward councillors would continue to push PKC to insure the group in the same way as other local authorities do. Cllr Watters agreed to respond to Mr Wright confirming that while the CC were fully supportive, there was nothing more they could do to help the group.

### **Reports From CC Representatives**

**Kinross Partnership AGM:** CCllr Mckay had been invited to attend in her role as chair of the CC. She had also been asked to arrange a meeting with the Partnership to discuss the website. **Wall at Rowlands Pharmacy:** it was noted that the wall outside the pharmacy had been damaged and Cllr Purves agreed to report this to PKC so that it could be repaired. It was noted that while there was CCTV attached to the RBS building, this pointed in the wrong direction so that identifying the people involved would be difficult.

In respect of the pharmacy itself, CCllr Mckay advised that they were having to close regularly due to drainage issues, as well as having staffing issues. The pharmacy had agreed to try to keep the CC and their local Facebook page updated with the latest information.

**Blocked Drains:** it was noted that the drains where Mr Wright lived were blocked and this needed addressed as a matter of urgency. Cllr Watters agreed to raise this issue again with PKC, along with the drain issues in the High Street/side streets.

### **AOCB**

### Request for Volunteers: Musical Theatre, Perth Concert Hall

CCIIr Freeman advised that an email had been received requesting volunteers for the Musical Theatre in Perth. It was agreed that this would be shared on Facebook and circulated to Members.

### **Crossing at Lathro Meadows**

The issue of a 30mph limit was raised again and Cllr Purves advised that the limit did not need to be moved until the first residents had moved into the area. Cllrs Purves and Watters agreed to raise this issue again with PKC.

It was also noted that there was funding left over from Persimmon Homes.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be 25 January 2022 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall.

### Portmoak Community Council News from the November Meeting

**Present At The Meeting** on 9 November were Cllrs W Robertson, M Barnacle, R Watters, and C Purves, CCllrs A Miller (Chair), S McGregor (Secretary), A Davidson (Treasurer), D Morris (Vice-Chair), S Forde, D Paterson; and 5 members of the public.

### **Matters Arising**

Kinross-shire Committee: Cllr M Barnacle is convener of the new Kinross-shire Committee. Awaiting PKC officers confirmation of first official meeting which will probably be in December 21. M Barnacle confirmed the Scheme allows for a substitution in place of the assigned member from PCC. It was agreed the Chair A Miller would attend the committee meetings and Vice-Chair D Morris confirmed his willingness to attend in Chair's place, if required. M Barnacle has circulated his ideas on agenda for first meeting categorised as long term issues, short term issues, and budget ideas. C Purves had circulated a request to members for a list of priority items. M Barnacle mentioned the topic of a Kinross-shire Regional Park in brief: flagging the need for forward planning to other authorities that would also be involved. Engagement with other authorities would be key. D Morris mentioned he had been involved in previous discussions regarding a Regional Park and a key question was if ScotGov would make money available, at that time it had seemed unlikely, but it is possible that the situation may have changed now with more momentum for regional national parks from ScotGov. M Barnacle confirmed that D Morris was probably correct in his summations.

Road Safety Action Update in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell: The Chair commented that his request for provision of the data from trial of 20mph zone was still outstanding. Chair flagged that speed of traffic still appears excessive and physical mitigation measures are still required to slow traffic, by way of road cushions or buildouts. This has been an item on PCC agenda for many months and years.

C Purves had requested the information on Scotlandwell and Kinnesswood trials. Data does show that traffic speeds are reduced. W Robertson did however confirm that he had seen the 20mph trial data, which had concluded that the 20mph zoning had been ineffective. It was suggested that, Kinross-shire Committee can look at this issue and decide how to proceed. D Paterson commented that, anecdotally, in Scotlandwell traffic exiting the village to the South via the Causeway seemed to be going faster than ever leaving the village. S Forde asked the Cllrs about possibility of speed cushions on this stretch. D Morris commented that speed cushions often did not appear to be a good measure in most locations, as some of the Kinnesswood cushions had proved. D Morris felt there was a need for PKC to agree to physical build-outs at pinch points and 1-way priorities in all the communities. D Morris had recently travelled through Norway where comparable roads have a general limit of 50mph speed limit with hamlets at 25mph. ScotGov is considering reduction of speed limits across the country. Clear intention across governments to reduce speed limits. D Morris suggested the whole of the A911 speed through Portmoak should be reduced to 40pmh, from the northern boundary near the standing stones (Orwell farm) through to the southern boundary at Auchmuir Bridge, with a 20mph in E&W Balgedie, Kinnesswood, Scotlandwell, and Bowhouse. The Secretary agreed with this suggestion. A member of the public from Easter Balgedie commented that the speed limit restrictions there do not seem to have reduced the speed at all, anecdotal evidence of drivers travelling at 50mph and excess, also abuse being called by drivers towards residents and farmers trying to cross the road.

The Chair and members of PCC agreed that physical mitigation measures are needed in addition to speed limits.

Cllr Barnacle suggested that the item be added to the priority agenda items for Kinross-shire Committee. Cllr Purves suggested the A911 Route Action Plan would be useful in this situation in terms of estimates of funding and taking requests to PCC. On Scotlandwell to Auchmuir bridge, there is conflict of opinion on best approach and Cllr Purves suggested employing the method of a Charette to find united approach.

Glenlomond Sewage, and Water Supply to Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie: Cllr A Davidson provided an update. Minor repairs to the system were being done by local residents, and the village had had no report from Jim Fairlie MSP as yet. Cllr Davidson asked if the Cllrs could bring pressure to bear to get Scottish Water to get them to adopt the system. Cllr Watters offered to speak with Jim Fairlie to chase on the status of this. D Morris agreed that pressure needs to be brought on Scottish Water and Jim Fairlie should be encouraged to take this up with the minister responsible for Scottish Water.

**Portmoak Primary Parking Issues:** Cllr D Morris commented that issues seemed to be OK at present, there was no further update, this is not a high priority item, and attention needs to be given to other transport agenda issues.

Issue of Local Affordable Housing (Update From Clirs): The Cllrs accepted that there was deviation within PKC Planning Dept on applying the policy as regards including affordable housing, which is a requirement in developments of more than five houses. The policy required affordable housing to be provided on site in such developments or at an alternative location nearby, with the commuted sum option being very much a last resort. Cllrs confirmed this was the policy and they were pressing for adherence to the policy. And for planning officers to stop using the commuted sum option unless there were exceptional circumstances. PCC noted that failure to follow the policy was resulting in virtually no affordable housing being built in rural areas. As one of the Cllrs who sits on planning committees, Cllrs Watters said he felt responsibility to press for an explanation of why affordable housing is often not provided on site. He stressed the need for Cllrs to remind Planning Officers that affordable housing is required in rural areas and it is wrong that the funds secured through the commuted sum route appear to be used primarily for affordable housing provision in urban areas. The Chair commented that a fundamental issue is the scale of housing. For example, the recent H54 Scotlandwell application had 22 houses with values between £400-£650K, with no allocation for Affordable Housing at all. Cllr Morris agreed the policy of PKC is very sound, and there was no need for Cllrs to seek policy revision. The fundamental problem appears to be the PKC Planning Officers who encourage developers to go down the commuted sum fee route instead of incorporating affordable housing within their planning applications. Cllr Morris requested that the four Cllrs should write to the PKC Chief Executive, to request a memorandum to officers, with copy to PCC, which instructed the planning officers to follow the PKC policy. A member of the public commented on the need to build a mix of sustainable housing to represent the communities we live in and for the future. Cllr McGregor asked for clarification if mixed level housing was also required by the policy in addition to affordable housing and Cllr Barnacle confirmed this was the case. Cllr Watters explained that Affordable Housing can take different forms, and the commuted sum fee will be spent by PKC wherever affordable housing can be best created. He agreed that the way the policy is being interpreted by officers is leading to no affordable housing being provided in rural areas.

### **New Matters Arising:**

**Proposed Changes To Constituency Boundaries For UK Parliament:** Cllr C Purves outlined the details: the Boundary Commission for Scotland has sought to change UK Constituency boundaries to make them more similar in size. The initial proposal has been published:

 The Kinross-shire ward is proposed to be split between two different constituencies.

- These seats will be shared with Fife rather than other parts of Perth and Kinross.
- Fossoway and Cleish will be included in a proposed 'West Fife' constituency dominated by Dunfermline.
- The rest of Kinross-shire will be included in a proposed 'Glenrothes and Loch Leven' constituency dominated by Glenrothes.

Cllr C Purves stressed that the proposed boundaries were drawn up under strict numerical criteria so that similar number of voters were present in all constituencies. This had to be central to any response – if PCC wanted to oppose the proposals, alternative suggestions would have to be made which met the numerical criteria. Cllr CPurves raised concerns that local issues faced by rural communities such as broadband, tourism and farming are very different to those faced in urban areas like Dunfermline or Glenrothes. Kinrossshire shares a Council with Perthshire and it makes far more sense to be included in a single constituency with other parts of Perth & Kinross. Also, Kinross-shire is a cohesive community and splitting the ward between two seats would lead to poorer representation. As an historic county in its own right, Kinross-shire should be contained within a single constituency. Not least was the issue that the Kinross-shire Committee had just got the go-ahead to form as an area committee to focus on local Kinross-shire issues and the boundary change could undermine the opportunities the new committee offered. Cllr Robertson, M Barnacle, and R Watters agreed with the points that had been made. Cllr M Barnacle and a member of the public both commented the boundaries are not concerned with communities, they are concerned with numbers, and sought to split up a country on numbers, rather than identity and geography. The Consultation has 4 weeks left to go, all correspondence will be published.

### **Police Reports**

PC A Mitchison was not able to connect to the meeting due to technical issues. But provided a short update via email of two recent incidents of note: firstly on 13/12/21 a glider had crashed into a field near Portmoak airfield. PC Mitchinson had attended the incident and fortunately the pilot had not suffered life changing or serious injuries. Second a door-to-door caller in Kinnesswood who claimed to represent Cancer Research and requesting donations. The Police asked residents to remain alert and ask for ID when approached by any cold caller. There have been approximately eight traffic related incidents in the nearby area.

Community Speedwatch Programme: W Robertson updated on the project. Speedwatch meeting had been hosted by PC A Mitchinson. Volunteers were requested from Portmoak. The Secretary had previously posted on Portmoak Community Facebook requesting volunteers and had had a good response. In terms of timelines, it is unlikely anything will happen before beginning of 2022. There were concerns voiced that volunteers may be disincentivised if they were asked to do Speedwatch in a different area, but were motivated instead by the opportunity to make their own area safer. The Cllrs thought that the scheme should be flexible to accommodate the wish of volunteers to do Speedwatch in their own area.

### **New Applications**

21/01742/FLL Alteration to garage, Shanthi, Wester Balgedie Kinross, no comment.

### **Existing Applications:**

21/00997/FLL Erection of 22 dwellinghouses, 3 garages and a garage with ancillary accommodation, formation of SUDS pond, landscaping and associated works (LDP site H54). Land 100 Metres South East Of Cragton Villa Rost Gardens Scotlandwell.

Application has been withdrawn at present. There was no firm knowledge at meeting as to why the application was withdrawn.

### **Paths Group Update**

Paths Group had supplied an update report. Paths Group volunteers continue to keep local paths clear mainly removing gorse and other overgrowing vegetation in the Stephen's Field area. A particular problem within 50 metres of the access gates to Stephen's Field from Bishop Terrace was a lot of dog poo, and the Group encouraged dog walkers to please remove their dogs' poo.

### **Treasurer CC Accounts:** General Account: £ 499.70

Michael Bruce Way Account: £ 1522.82

The Treasurer had submitted accounts to PKC. A Grant of £700 was expected. £150 grant had been received.

The Treasurer and Secretary had met to complete and sign forms for opening an account at the Credit Union.

### **Councillors' Reports**

W Robertson: a Special County meeting was to be held on the next Monday on the issue of rural poverty action. W Robertson gave the troubling statistic that there are 5500 children in PKC described as living in poverty which is a 22% Access to Cash in Kinross-shire: CCllr Marchant and Cllr Purves rise since last survey. Interesting to hear the discussion that evolves from that meeting and W Robertson would update at next PCC meeting.

R Watters: The Recycling Contracts for PKC are coming up for renewal, and these should be reviewed in context of sustainability and environmental issues. Flooding between Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell at the Golf Course. Silt traps were to be installed to establish how much silt comes off the hill and advise future for alleviating issues of silt blocking up drains and exacerbating flooding. Cllr D Morris requested a copy of the report. R Watters agreed to send this report to PCC. D Morris felt the solution was to plant more trees and stabilise the hillside in landslip areas.

Kinneston Memorial: significant amounts of items left in memoriam. A few members of the community have commented that these are causing distraction particularly at night in the beam of headlights. PCC do not suggest that the memorial be taken away and have all sympathies with the families and friends of the motorcyclist who had died there. The Chair, Vice-Chair, Cllr D Paterson and one member of the public felt the memorial was distracting to drivers at night. Four additional members of the public had raised the same complaint with Cllrs in the weeks prior to the meeting. W Robertson suggested that PCC take a step back and do not get directly involved and write instead to PKC. The Secretary thought that the issue was not one for PCC to address, and that if safety was being compromised by people or items distracting on road then this should be reported to the police as suggested at the October PCC meeting by PC A Mitchinson. Chair commended Kinnesswood in Bloom for winning the Nourishing your Community RHS award. The Chair also thanked Scotlandwell in Bloom and the many local people who also attend to public areas locally and improve the local environment.

PKC Village Hall: Chair had attended the AGM for the Hall. The Committee had agreed to repair the floor. Due diligence was carried out with three companies before lock down, but the selected company has gone into liquidation and funds paid upfront (a deposit of approx £12,000) had been lost. Also windows are now needing replaced approx. £6000k. Day-today hall hires are the main stay of income at present as events cannot be held just now. The Chair suggested that PCC should look at the background and ways to potentially help the Hall as a centre within Portmoak for meetings and social occasions. D Morris commented on the COP26 Conference taking place, and suggested this could be added to a future agenda to reflect on the conference outcomes and potential relevance for Portmoak.

The next meeting of Portmoak Community Council is on Tuesday, 14 December 2021, at 7.30pm. It will be held online.

Community Development Trust: Cllr Barnacle reported on the 27 October meeting of the steering group, there is difficulty in attracting enough members, so combining with the Muckhart trust which is in a similar position was considered with no conclusion reached – a public meeting will be held, probably on 24 November, to seek the community's opinion. If there are sufficient people to join the Fossoway Trust it may still be possible to continue alone. It's been agreed by the steering group that the Trust should be a company limited by guarantee, which will be created once the name is determined. The Trust needs to have at least 20 members, and ideally more.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: CCllr Duffy reported that the X53 service through Crook of Devon will be discontinued in January – it hardly seems fair if this has been stopped on the basis of insufficient usage in the wake of a pandemic. Cllr Watters explained that First Bus is actually discontinuing the service due to shortage of drivers.

Local councillors have made it clear to PKC's Bus Group that it is essential that there are bus services in rural Kinross shire. Clackmannanshire are having similar problems and it may be possible to create a solution in conjunction with them. The next meeting of the Transport Group will be in December. CCIIr Farguhar pointed out that there is still only one driver operating the DRT. The Kinross-shire Volunteer Group operate a driving service for the residents of Kinross-shire: www.kvgandros.org.uk/index.htm

A977 Mitigation Measures: There is no news about when the remaining measures will be implemented. Cllr Barnacle has arranged for PKC to perform an HGV survey of the A977 between the M90 and Blairingone. Cllr Barnacle has asked Transport Scotland to consider changing road signs from the Glasgow side to suggest routes along the M9 rather than the A977.

### Community Council News

CCIIr Duffy noted that the police have installed a PC Kirstie Speed Check Cut-out in Blairingone. Additional ones can be purchased by the Community at a cost of approximately £50. CIIr Purves has made an application to request speed measuring lines to the west of Crook of Devon and east of Drum. This will hopefully give us evidence to support a request for a lower speed limit.

**Crook Moss Travellers Site:** Cllr Barnacle is trying to set up a site meeting with the Planners so they can see the state of the site. Cllr Purves observed that additional budget was allocated to increase the capacity for site visits, but this doesn't appear to have had any effect.

Speeding in Carnbo: The proposal to include the Village Hall in the 30mph limit is not currently included but ClIr Purves has put in an application to extend 40mph to before the Hall. PKC's traffic department responded that they recommended keeping the existing 40mph limit to the west (past the South Queich bridge to the Muckhart side of the Gelvanmoor Road junction) with the 30mph limit starting nearer to the village – this is planned to be worked on in the autumn. However they were not in favour of extending the 40mph limit east to the Village Hall, as the road conditions mean that compliance would be poor unless further measures, e.g. VAS, were considered.

A MoP from Carnbo passed a survey of village members to Cllr Purves representing their views on what should be done. Carnbo didn't get speed limit reductions under the 'Spaces for People' scheme during Covid because it was thought to have pavements, which residents point out are actually not usable. Flooding in Drum: Cllr Barnacle had shared his response to the Flood Risk Management Plan – Forth Estuary Local Plan Consultation. He considers that the Drum area should be included in communities requiring flood management and that Drum should be declared as a Potentially Vulnerable Area (PVA). CCllr Bruce Jones asked whether it would be worth asking for a ditch management programme – Cllr Barnacle thought it would be.

Cllr Purves asked if a public meeting should be held with Drum residents to hear views on how flooding (and speeding) should be handled – CCllr Bruce Jones agreed to organise one.

Community Speedwatch: CCllr Duffy attended a meeting on 26 October with the police and a number of other CCs to discuss restarting the Speedwatch Programme. During the meeting it was clear that Community Councils in the Kinross shire area are keen to take part. Officer Ashley Mitchinson asked that all CCs indicate areas where this could take place – only in 20/30/40 MPH areas, straight stretches with good sight lines. They will then risk assess those areas, after which PKC has to risk assess them as well. A minimum of three people should be there per team, one to operate the speed-

measuring equipment and two to corroborate. All need to be highly visible. All the volunteers will be checked by the Police before they are allowed to operate. Volunteers can come forward as of now, forms will be available soon.

The speed measuring equipment, as well as the warning signs and the high-viz gear need to be bought by the group as well as insurance for the equipment and public liability. The standard measuring gun is £2200, but jackets and signs are also needed.

There was a discussion about whether a separate organisation should be set up or just a loose cooperation between CCs. Ideally volunteers would be deployed throughout the area. A follow-up meeting will be organised.

### **Blairingone War Memorial**

Cllr Barnacle is trying to set up a meeting with PKC's Cemeteries Department to discuss the access to the site (as approved by a planning application.) A mason has been found, but their price won't be covered by available monies.

### **Aldie Road Vegetation**

Nothing has been done. CCllr Marchant asked about the procedure for salt bin filling as there was a problem last year. Cllr Purves agreed to investigate.

### **New Business**

Kinross-shire Committee (previously known as the Kinross Forum): There will be a final meeting on Thursday 5 November of the Kinross Forum for all the CCs to assemble a list of possible items for the new Committee to cover. CCllrs Bruce-Jones and Cheape will attend the meeting. Cllr Purves said that the first meeting of the Committee should be before the end of the year, and the CC needs to nominate a named (nonvoting) representative.

Blairingone Tapestry: The CC was approached about a tapestry/ textile work made in Blairingone School in the Millennium Year. The PKC archives can't hold it and the museum doesn't want it – it has been offered back to the community. A posting on FB provided suggestions – three people have offered to store it; one said to give it to Fossoway School. It was agreed that we would accept one of the offers to store it for the time being.

Seamab School New Build (21/01467/FLL): A member of the public raised concerns about the state of the access road, which is dismal, contrary to the statement in the planning application which claims the road has been recently resurfaced, in fact only a very small section has been done. CCllr Marchant said that the applicant has had a pre-application discussion with the planners during which they stated they would restore the road after the works were complete. MoP asked what conditions were in place when the house was originally converted to a school? There was a restriction on the number of children which apparently may have been exceeded.

Cllr Barnacle suggested that the CC asks for a community consultation even though it's not a major app.

The CC will ask for a two week extension for comments (two weeks) to allow a consultation; meanwhile the CC will submit a neutral comment requesting that conditions regarding the road are enforced.

**Dunning Glen Signs:** A member of the Devon Angling Association reported that signs exhorting campers to be tidy have been erected, however it's not known who put them up. All answers welcome – as are the signs!

**Glendevon Bridge:** PKC have informed the CC that they are currently planning final repairs to the A823 Glendevon Bridge, damaged during the storm in August 2020, with closure starting on 15th November 2021, and reopening on 20th December 2021. A full closure for vehicles will be necessary for part of the works, but it is intended that it will mostly remain open for pedestrians and cyclists.











### **Community Council Business:**

**Minutes Secretary:** CCllr Marchant's 'job description' for a volunteer will be published in the KHS Pupil Bulletin; will be on the Notice Board; in the *Kinross Newsletter* and on the Kinross website in the volunteering section.

CCIIr Marchant has submitted comments to the proposed new Planning Policy 41 - Planning for Nature: Development Management and Wildlife Guide.

### **P&K Councillors' Reports:**

Mike Barnacle: Last month a MoP drew attention to the additional charges PKC has to pay when the wrong material is placed in recycling bins – the response from Environment Service, discussed at Committee, is that if there is persistent offending by a household the bin is tagged and not emptied, but they're reluctant to impose fines and think that education is a better idea. CCllr Faiza noted that it's a problem that recycling options are different in each Council area, and if options are too complex there's a risk that people will put everything in landfill; some councils take a much wider range. Cllr Watters said that PKC's recycling goes to Newcastle to be processed, but the contract is due to be renewed – this time it should be based on environmental rather than just financial justifications.

Callum Purves: Cllr Purves drew attention to the proposed changes to Westminster Constituency boundaries. Current proposals would see Kinross shire split in two and other parts merged with Fife. All agreed that this would mix rural and urban areas in the same constituency which would not be a good idea. Instead similar rural places should be combined, e.g. merge Kinross shire with parts of rural Perthshire. Everyone can, and should, comment on this proposal which can be found at:

### **Westminster Constituency Boundaries**

Cllr Callum Purves advised that the Boundaries Commission are proposing to change Kinross-shire and Milnathort would be absorbed into the Glenrothes constituency. There are many problematic issues with this. There is a consultation underway and residents are urged to write in with their views to the commission.

**Core Paths Update:** Kevin Heneghan advised there will be a last maintenance cut of the year on 27 November or 4 December. Maintenance machinery will be purchased shortly. It was noted that the Pace Hill core path is still fenced off.

**Speeding on New Road:** A speed activated sign is due to be installed. This has been an ongoing problem and is part of overall speeding issues in the village.

**20mph Speeding Trials:** Cllr Willie Robertson advised that each community in Kinross-shire are to identify areas for the police to concentrate the Speedwatch efforts, and names of volunteers to be submitted.

**Puffin Crossing on South Street:** Several close misses have been reported with cars driving through the crossing whilst children have been crossing. One of the problems is cars parking on the diagonal-lined areas either side of the crossing: this is illegal and extremely dangerous. It was asked if traffic wardens could patrol this area.

**Community Investment Fund:** Cllr Callum Purves advised on the funding allocation meeting.

The Town Hall committee has advised that the Hall has had funding accepted to install sound deadening.

**Gigabit Update For Milnathort:** The Gigabit partnership groups are awaiting communication for BT Outreach for progress.

Sean Colebourn is stepping down from the committee due to moving away for his work. The committee's thanks were noted for Sean's hard work and diligence during his time on the committee, particularly in his role as Treasurer and also undertaking a lot of the Secretary's work at the same time.

Cllr Callum Purves: 20mph limits enquiries are being assessed as part of the overall trials. Lathro Meadows Phase 2 has been granted despite the Council having rejected their application. The Kinross-shire Area Committee are asking for CC's thoughts on what should be included.

### **AOCB**

An enquiry was made about the bottle recycling station and whether it will be located at Bowling Green Avenue. MCC has been in contact with the PKC dept involved and bigger glass bins will be installed, at either Ba' Hill or Bowling Green Avenue: this is to be confirmed.

Attracting younger new members: It was suggested to approach the High School about promoting this and possibly the Duke of Edinburgh scheme would be a route. It was also suggested if the CC would ask along youngsters and possibly mentor them.

**Community Led Development:** A young people's forum: it was asked if Kinross-shire had one, there is not but was agreed that it would be good to form one. This could be a good thing for the Kinross-shire Local Committee and this will be looked into.

the planters at the surgery, which had a huge crack down the side, has been replaced.

Looking forward, we have ordered the summer bedding plants taking into account that 2022 will be the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

A big thank you to all our sponsors, waterers, the rugby club and helpers who have helped make Kinross bloom in 2021.

We had our AGM at the start of November and the office bearers for 2022 are as follows: Chair, Graham Barnett; Secretary, Susan Mitchell; Treasurer, Aileen Sorbie.

### Chair Report 2021

Primarily, I would like to thank Susan and Aileen for their sterling efforts as secretary and treasurer and all other members of the Bloom for their work throughout the year, especially as myself and Kathy could not commit to any assistance due to a family bereavement.

For the second year running, Covid-19 reared its ugly head, what with its restrictions and adverse effects. Despite this, Kinross in Bloom were able to succeed in keeping the town looking colourful throughout the year with the winter pansies going on to create a riot of colour as the weather heated up, flowering well into May/June. This was followed by a colourful summer display.

Planters throughout the town were planted up with winter pansies in 2020 which bloomed through the winter months until May/June when they were lifted, even though still in full bloom, to make way for summer planting. The summer plug plants were delivered in April and were immediately planted up into larger trays and placed within the polytunnel to grow on prior to planting out. May saw the Bloom busy when some 2000 plants were planted up into the hanging baskets and later on into the planters throughout the town. The hanging baskets were put out onto their hangers with help from the Kinross Rugby Club and our thanks and gratitude go to them. With all plants in place for the summer a watering rota was drawn up by Aileen and the work began in keeping the planters and baskets watered and looking in top condition. My thanks go out to all members and others who were prepared to use their own time to keep the town looking bright and cheerful for a few months.

Towards the end of the summer, the weather, being fickle as it is, meant that some of the plants were looking somewhat tired earlier than usual and some of the planters were overrun with chickweed. With this in mind, the decision was taken to strip out the planters a bit earlier than usual which

enabled us to do something with the chickweed and top up planters as required with new compost and slow-release feed pellets. These planters were then left 'to rest' for a couple of weeks prior to starting the cycle again by planting up the winter pansies. Hanging baskets throughout the town were removed, with help once again from the Rugby club, and these were taken to the recycling centre and emptied into the recycling skip. Thanks once again go to the Kinross Rugby Club for sterling effort and we look forward to working with them next year. Thanks lads!

With all the watering for the year completed, the tank was removed from the back of the buggy and placed within the compound until next season. Due to Covid-19 and other circumstances no major projects were started during 2021, but the Bloom group are still committed to the work to spruce up the Mungal bust memorial at Swansacre. This work involves the sympathetic cleaning of the bust and plinth, painting of the metal railings around the memorial, and also the refreshment of the eulogy, either by painting of the old lettering or full replacement. Any other necessary work will also be attended to. Hopefully this work will be carried out during 2022.

I would like to sign off for the year by once again giving my heartfelt thanks to everybody who was involved in keeping the town of Kinross looking colourful and inviting throughout 2021. Thank you all!



# Portmoak Community Woodland Group

While everyone else was planting trees for COP26, we were pulling them out. That's because we have a raised peat bog on the doorstep and peat stores about ten times more carbon than forests.

Our members were joined by a dozen from the Lothians Conservation Volunteers, who specialise in jobs like restoring peat bogs and who've had a long association with our group. Everyone was there to do their bit, protecting the special place that is Portmoak Moss, where the peat is so thick (at least six metres deep) that it stores the carbon footprint of more than 40,000 people. One of the volunteers, Jackie Howlett, from Edinburgh, said, 'Peat bogs have got a very important role to play in stopping climate change.'

Sphagnum moss, which forms the peat, takes carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, and locks it into the bog. Unfortunately, if too many trees are allowed to grow on the bog they dry it out and the carbon is released. We do have too many birch saplings at the moment which is why we spent six hours on Sunday 7 November pulling them out.

Both groups were helped by volunteers from Scotlandwell and Kinnesswood, who grappled with the tough birch roots to get the saplings off the Moss. 6,000 square metres of bog were cleared of birch in weather conditions that might not have been wet enough for bogs but were fine and calm and welcomed by everybody there.

Michael McGinnes, of PCWG, and the event organiser,

said, 'With so much help we achieved twice as much as we expected and considerably more than on previous events, so it was highly successful. A big thank-you to the Lothians Conservation Volunteers.'

We'll be removing more trees on Sunday 12 December when we hold our popular Christmas tree event. This time it'll be spruce and, as ever, you can do your bit for restoring the bog and helping us to raise funds by coming along and choosing a tree which we'll cut down for you.

We welcome donations so please remember to bring cash as we don't have card facilities in the Moss. The event will be from 11am-2pm and there will be home-baking and hot drinks.

We continue to dodge the November showers and finish up the season by clearing plants, cutting back, sweeping leaves (continuously)

### **Christmas Punch**

If you are hoping to get together with a few folk this Christmas or New Year, try serving this punch. You can try either the alcoholic or non-alcoholic version.

### **Ingredients**

- 2 pears or apples, sliced
- 2 lemons, 1 sliced, 1 juiced
- 2 tbsp caster sugar
- 1 tsp mixed spice
- 400ml white grape juice
- 100-150 ml white, dark or spiced rum, vodka or gin (optional)

275 ml ginger ale

500 ml sparkling water

Ice

Handful of pomegranate seeds Rosemary sprigs to serve

### Method

Put the pear or apple and lemon slices, sugar and mixed spice in a large bowl or jug and chill for an hour. Add the lemon juice and grape juice, stirring to dissolve any sugar. Stir in your chosen spirit if using.

Pour in the ginger ale and sparkling water and add a few handfuls of ice. Sprinkle over the pomegranate seeds and drop in a few sprigs of rosemary.

### Kinross-shire Climate Café

November was a busy month with COP26 taking place in Glasgow. A few of us participated in the COP26 fringe events for civil society. The Main Space Climate Café provided a great opportunity to meet visitors from Tunisia, Sumatra, Australia and so on, while the Green Space featured climate change frontier exhibitions.

The Human Institute organised a film evening at the Pearce Institute called 'Listening to the Land: Indigenous Voices at COP26', about the devastating damage of climate change to the lives of African communities. One part focused on a Danish windfarm in Kenya that displaced an indigenous community from their land without any compensation; a significant negative effect of 'green energy' investment that ignores human rights.

COP26 was the time to speak out for indigenous peoples who contribute to only a minor fraction of climate change, but who suffer the majority of its effects. As a result of climate change many communities lost their access to fresh water, lost their property (homes and livestock) and are unable to grow crops. One of the main aims of COP26 was that world leaders would agree to create an immediate fund of £100 billion that would help to rebuild ruined communities and make them more resilient to extreme events in the future. As we all now know, that unfortunately did not happen.

Another expectation of COP26 was to agree on phasing out fossil fuels in a bid to limit the global temperature rise to 1.5°C; an ambition first drawn up by the Paris Agreement in 2015. As we all know this also did not take place; not only as gas and oil were omitted in the final agreement, but also 'phasing out' of coal was changed at the last minute to 'phasing down'. In view of that it is hard to accept that governments are still serious about limiting the temperature rise to 1.5°C (or even 2°C) despite the rhetoric of the final COP26 agreement.

One major positive aspect of COP26 was the huge involvement of civil society in a great variety of fringe debates, forums, events and marches. The main marches in Glasgow (Fridays for Future on 5 November and Global Climate Justice on 6 November) have each brought 100,000 protesters to the streets carrying messages to the leaders about the urgency of action to phase out fossil fuels and ensuring climate change justice. Many of those people travelled from other countries,















many others set out on pilgrimages from distant parts of Scotland and the UK on their bikes (Pedal on COP groups), or walking and carrying their messages (Coat of Hopes). Others spoke through singing about climate change; the Big Sing in front of the Scottish Parliament with our local group, Leven Voices, joining in the event at Kirkgate Park on 6 November. Some people spoke through digital media; 'Voices from Loch Leven', a film with local people sharing their reflections and hopes for the future.

Hope for the future was the main message of the documentary film '2040' that was screened in Milnathort Town Hall on 6 November, thanks to generous help from Milnathort Filmhouse and supported by KLEO. In the film Damon Gameau travels the world in search of already existing solutions that could be embraced to help overcome the climate change crisis. This presents an idealised futuristic view of the world, showing a vivid picture of a balanced, sustainable, and just world.

Our next meeting will be on 6 December at 7pm in Milnathort Town Hall. Karena Jarvie from Fairtrade will talk about how her organisation aids climate change justice and the adaptation of indigenous communities; an important issue particularly as it was not addressed in COP26. Our group will also share ideas about sustainable ways to celebrate Christmas.

At our January meeting we will welcome Orla Beaton, a local mindfulness and yoga teacher who will offer a session on 'Cultivating Happiness in Difficult Times', with mindfulness teachings, gentle movement and writing to strengthen our resilience to climate change.

# **Kinross High School**



Whilst the world's leaders were attending COP26, our learning community were partaking in events designed to enhance awareness of climate change and engage young minds with ideas to keep the global temperature from rising by 2°C.

One lucky pupil, Callum in S4, got the chance to attend the summit in person. After winning the Keep Scotland Beautiful competition, Callum had the unique opportunity to provide coverage of COP26 as a young reporter for the environment. Together with three other young reporters from around the UK, he attended conferences, conducted interviews, explored the blue zone and even gave a rousing 'call to action' speech at the Foundation for Environmental Education's Climate Action: Harnessing the Power of Networks event. After his busy week at COP26, Callum said, 'I don't think I'll ever forget the experience. It really was incredible.'

What's more, the Eco Committee have been successful in achieving green flag status for Kinross High School. The group, mostly made up of senior students, worked throughout the year to make KHS as environmentally friendly as possible. Empty plastic bottles were collected from the dining areas, as well as from local residents and businesses around Kinross. The responsible bunch then used these to build a greenhouse in the pupil support garden, preventing the materials being sent to landfill or ending up in the ocean. Since we started building our eco credentials three years ago, the greenhouse is just one of many green initiatives including removing all plastics and non-recyclable cutlery from lunches

### **Recent Meetings**

On 18 October, we were indebted to former Rotarian and past president Malcom Wood for standing in at short notice as speaker. Malcolm gave us an update on his recent business activities.

In 2019 he spent time in Dubai, introducing his Peeltech filtration system, until the pandemic struck and curtailed progress. Demonstrating his customary resilience and innovation, Malcolm returned home and to his former business, the preparation and supply of chips for catering. The challenges during this difficult period of business inactivity were immense but hard work and adaptability are paying off, with excellent progress this year and prospects for further expansion and development.

We were delighted to meet up with Malcolm again and impressed, as ever, by his energy and work ethic.

On 1 November the Rev. Angus Morrison joined us on Zoom as our speaker. Recently retired, Angus told us about his 'Life in the Ministry', over 42 years. Ordained in 1979 in his home town of Oban in the Free Church of Scotland, he worked there for 7 years. He moved to Edinburgh in 1986 for 15 years, then to St Columba's Church of Scotland in Stornoway in 2000, and finally to the parish of Orwell and Portmoak in 2011.

Furthermore, he became Minister to the Lord High Commissioner, Lord Mackay of Clashfern, in 2005 and, in 2006, he became one of the Chaplains in Ordinary to the Queen; a position he will retain until his 70th birthday. In 2015-16 he was the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Angus regaled us with many tales from his long and interesting career, including preaching at Crathie Church and in Gaelic in Stornoway; experiences at Holyrood Palace and at Balmoral; and international work and travel in his role as an ambassador for the church.

He described his time in Kinross-shire as 'a happy and fulfilled decade' and reflected on the 'privilege of serving for 42 years.... meeting so many interesting people from all walks of life'.

We wish Angus and his wife Marion a long and happy retirement.

At a breakfast meeting on 9 November, John Ross, operations director at Kinross Wooden Products Company, gave us a fascinating insight into his work as a timber manufacturer intent on reducing waste and CO2 while supporting people and communities.

With over 30 years' experience in furniture manufacturing, logistics and wholesale, he and his wife Kirsteen are focusing on furniture remanufacturing. John illustrated the need for circularity; to re-use resources, not to use briefly and throw away. He provided us with a range of exciting and impressive examples of their work, including repurposing unwanted furniture to create bespoke homeworkers' desks, fun playground equipment, and garden furniture created

out of unwanted potato boxes. Furthermore, he believes that we need to create local employment and grow our local economy. John believes in training and mentoring staff, helping to develop people.

With messages from COP26 ringing in our ears, this was a fantastic local example of innovation and resource management.

### **Kinross and District Probus Club**

It has been a while since we last met due to last years' lockdown and the many restrictions that prohibited us from holding an 'actual' meeting.

So, on 3 November, it was a delight to have a presentation from one of our own members, Rev Duncan Stenhouse. Duncan had spent many years as prison chaplin at Friarton Prison in Perth. There is no evidence of the prison nowadays with the buildings having been demolished and new housing built on the site. It had originally been a fever hospital before being purchased and redeveloped to house inmates who had committed minor crimes and then, later in its life, to house long term prisoners who were coming to the end of their sentence and were undergoing rehabilitation.

Duncan related tales of inmates who had been sent up from Barlinnie in Glasgow and Saughton in Edinburgh. In those days, when people didn't travel far from home, Perth might as well have been on the moon and some prisoners took being away from family very hard. In certain circumstances they may have been granted a day pass to go home; the result was that some decided 'hame's best' and didn't return

To say there were characters amongst the inmates is an understatement! They were all characters, and Duncan had stories galore about the tricks they would get up to. However, he said it was generally all good natured and, in the main, they were just lads who had strayed from the path with no real hardcore inmates.

Church services were always a bit hit and miss and Duncan

recalled the time that another minister seemed to be able to attract much larger numbers to his services; only when it was pointed out that he always brought the communion wine with him did the reason become fairly obvious.

Many would think prison chaplin would be an onerous position, but Duncan looks back fondly at his time there and retains many memories.

A vote of thanks was delivered.

### Lathro Appeal Decision – Volume House Builders Win Yet Again

The Trust was disappointed, but not surprised, at the Scottish Government Reporter's decision, issued on 18 October, to allow Persimmon's appeal against Perth & Kinross Council's refusal of their application for an increased number of houses on phase 2 at Lathro Farm.

We were not surprised because the Reporter, David Buylla, had issued a 'Notice of Intention' in January stating that he was minded to grant the appeal, subject to the local authority and the developer registering a Section 75 agreement regarding contributions for education, transport infrastructure and affordable housing.

The Trust had submitted two letters to the Scottish Government's Planning and Environment Appeals Division (DPEA) before the deadline for comments for the appeal, plus three later submissions with new evidence, gained through Freedom of Information, regarding the sub-standard drainage in phase 1. We felt this was relevant as the phase 2 drainage was to be connected to the phase 1 drainage. However, the Reporter felt that the phase 1 drainage problems had 'very limited relevance to a consideration of this appeal.'

The decision will result in a further 169 houses at Lathro Farm, where 203 houses were built in phase 1.

The decision raises lots of questions.

When Lathro Farm was named as a development site in a draft version of the first PKC Local Development Plan, the Scottish Government Reporter who examined that Proposed Plan in 2013 said, '...the potential developer's suggestion of 350 (27 units per hectare) appears excessive in this edge of town location' and added, 'the council's alternative of 20 units per hectare, i.e. 260 houses on H47 (140 during the Plan period) is a reasonable solution here.'

So, one Reporter thinks that 350 was an excessive number of dwellings on this site, but another Reporter thinks that 372 is just fine. Where is the logic and consistency within the DPEA?

One of the requirements of a Local Development Plan (LDP) is to estimate housing needs for a ten year period and identify sites that can fulfil this Housing

Supply Target. In both Development Plans 1 and 2, PKC reduced the housing land requirement for the Kinross area by 10% and reallocated it to the Perth area for 'environmental reasons.'

This is because, even with processing at Waste Water Treatment Plants, a certain amount of phosphorus generated from households' waste water ends up in Loch Leven, with a detrimental effect on water quality. Loch Leven is a 'Special Protection Area' due to its importance for breeding and over-wintering wildfowl

What is the point of reducing the housing target in the Kinross area by 10% due to the sensitivity of Loch Leven if planning officers recommend approval of, and Reporters grant appeals for, developments that are greatly in excess of their LDP allocations?

This has happened with numerous housing sites in the area in recent years:

Lathro Farm: **43% over the LDP allocation.** (372 dwellings instead of 260. There was also a limit of 140 dwellings up to the year 2024 in the LDP but PKC did not impose this.)

Pace Hill, Milnathort: **54% over the LDP allocation.** (77 dwellings instead of 50.) Former High School: **30% over the LDP allocation.** (91 dwellings instead of 70.) Pitdownies, Milnathort: **67% over the LDP allocation.** (67 dwellings instead of 40.) In this case, not only did the

planning committee of councillors refuse the application, but planning officers had recommended refusal. Nevertheless, the Reporter granted Springfield's appeal.

Why should the opinion of one person, the Reporter, get to override the views of the local planning committee?

Of course, only developers who have had an application refused can appeal. There is no right of appeal for 'third parties' such as local communities who are affected by the planning proposals.

The planning system in Scotland is not fit for purpose and is heavily weighted in favour of the volume house-builders.

#### Raingardens

Our focus last month has been to work up the projects provisionally agreed with Perth and Kinross Council for the Scottish Government's Nature Restoration Fund. (See feature elsewhere in this *Newsletter*.)

In parallel, we have also been helping identify some sites for tree planting as part of the Queen's Green Canopy initiative (see Rotary Club), including some gaps in the trees planted to screen traffic noise from the M90 where the proposed Raingardens Trail is especially exposed to the unscreened movement of trucks, buses and cars. That would be a nice winwin action for residents and visitors, as well as extending the habitat link provided by the M90 margins belt of trees.



### Womens' Football

Kinross Colts have been actively developing woman's football since 2019. Recently the club have applied to become fully affiliated members of the Scottish Women's Football (SWF) association. This will allow us to establish a girl's and women's pathway in partnership with Live Active, SWF and the SFA.

Live Active run a girl's only football session at the campus on Fridays at 5pm with around 20 girls from ages 5 to 12 regularly attending. With support from the Colt's female football ambassadors, our hope is that we can get these girls along to some fun festivals when the season resumes next March. We hope that, once the girls have caught the football bug, we can encourage enough player and volunteer support to establish age-specific teams within the club and get the girls playing regularly in fun festivals and competitive football.

Our longer-term aim is to have a pathway similar to that which currently exists for the men's game. Girls will progress through the age groups and will feed into a competitive women's team playing in the national SWF leagues or into our recreational women's team. Ambitious plans indeed but exciting times are ahead for girl's and women's football in Kinross-Shire. In addition to the pathways development, we already have an active adult team up and running. One of our existing team members has shared the history of how the team has developed over the last few years:

It was a hot summer evening at the community campus with a decent turn out on the first meeting, and that was the start of it. After a few months we had established a good number of regular attendees and joined forces with the Kinross Colts.

We continued to meet every Monday evening from 7-8pm



through the winter months and travelled up to Crieff community campus for our first friendly match. We welcomed them back to our campus for another friendly with the Colts winning both matches.

Then Covid was among us and, like everywhere else, all training, matches and meet ups were on hold for months. Regrouping after restrictions were lifted, Kinross Colts women happily welcomed back both old and new members with more women in the community wanting to take part. As the club continues to grow, we are in the process of gaining feedback from all our members about what they want from the club and ideas for the future. There are not many other social and recreational women's teams in the area so organising matches is one of the challenges. However, we are in regular meetings with the Scottish FA and exciting times are ahead. Currently we have 18 members, ranging in age from 17 to 40-somethings. New friendships have been established, along with improvements in skills, but most importantly, an inclusive club for women of all ages and abilities to play football is thriving. Player manager Alison Scott says, 'We have such a great bunch of ladies all here for different reasons. It's fantastic to see them leave training with huge smiles on their faces each week. Fossoway is located within Perth & Kinross and includes the settlements of Blairingone, Powmill, Crook of Devon & Drum, Rumbling Bridge and Carnbo. The Fossoway and District Community Council is a group of volunteers, elected by the Community who work together for the benefit of the Community. We meet with members of the public on the first Tuesday of every month from 7.30pm to 9pm and discuss issues that affect the community which can range from planning applications to local crime to concerns about community facilities. Our meetings rotate around public buildings in our villages.

We have a volunteering opportunity for a young person ideally in the higher years to join us as an associate community council member for the period of 1 year.

- •The individual would be asked to attend our monthly evening meetings to act as minute taker. They would have an opportunity to see how a community council operates and meet a diverse group of people.
- •We are also seeking the individuals help in considering new opportunities for us to enhance our engagement with the community especially through the use of social media. This could be in the form of a project led by the individual with outcomes reported to the Community Council. The project could be used as part of their exam submission for subjects such as Business Management or contribute to volunteering for a Duke of Edinburgh award.
- •The Fossoway District is also in the process of establishing a community development trust. Presently we are looking for community engagement opportunities to seek members of the trust and again the individual could support these events and help raise our profile with the younger generation.
- •Ideally the candidate would be confident using Microsoft Office and social media tools.
- •Training and mentorship will be provided





# **Goldeneye Bond** On Loch Leven

'TIS THE SEASON AT Loch Leven National Nature Reserve! We can now wave goodbye to autumn and welcome in the winter months....or try to, even if that means keeping warm indoors and breaking out the woolly jumpers. Thinking about seasonal wildlife; have you ever wondered why robins are depicted all over Christmas cards and other festive merchandise? Well, legend says that this all started in the Victorian era. Christmas cards first started becoming popular around this time, and the royal mail postmen who were busy delivering all of these Christmas cards all wore bright red uniforms; thus giving them the nickname 'robin' or 'redbreast'. Over time, people started to decorate their Christmas cards with robins and fast forward one-hundred years robins are a very common site on baubles, wrapping paper, jumpers etc.

We also see a large increase of robins during the winter months as they escape the cold winter climes of Scandinavia, the robin visiting your garden could have hailed from the forests of Norway/Sweden! Robins may look cute and symbolise the jolly time of Christmas, but they are very territorial and will happily chase off any intruding robin on their 'patch' - even fighting to the death!

On a more jolly note... the Reserve has now got its winter hat on. The trees are bare, we have large flocks of winter thrushes (redwing, fieldfare, mistle thrush, blackbird etc.) and the ducks are looking pristine! They have moulted into their breeding plumage and are looking fantastic. Drake (male) goldeneye are absolutely stunning ducks and this is the time that they look their best. Look



out for a duck with a white body, green head with big white cheek patches. We have recently spent a bit of time building some goldeneye boxes to put up around the loch. Goldeneye are rare breeders in Scotland with a handful of pairs in Deeside and Speyside. We get around 30,000 birds wintering, but less than 200 breeding! Normally you associate ducks nesting on the ground, but goldeneye nest in trees. We hope that we can attract a pair of goldeneve into our boxes and have these glorious ducks breeding on the loch for the first time.

The starling roost at the pier is still active at dusk, which is around 3.30pm. The murmuration is quite small, with only around 500 birds currently. It was up to 1000 earlier in the autumn, and the numbers might build if we get a

cold spell! It's fascinating to watch, all of the shapes and swirls that they create. If you are lucky, you might spot a sparrowhawk trying to catch a starling! Safety in numbers however, and this is the reason why they have these murmurations - to confuse predators and make it much harder to catch a bird.

Recent wildlife highlights include; 21 slavonian grebe, 280 great crested grebe, 25 pintail, lots of redwing and fieldfare and kidney spot ladybird (first for Loch Leven!).

# We're Open For Visitors!

WE ARE VERY EXCITED to announce that the Visitor Centre is now fully open at RSPB Scotland Loch Leven and it's wonderful to welcome back our visitors into the warm and dry. As part of the changes, we are now able to welcome well behaved dogs into the café!

Our new toilet facilities have been quite a talking point with some of the most inclusive facilities in Scotland. The new Changing Places room has already attracted a lot of interest, as this will allow those with multiple access needs to visit us with their families and carers.

With all the visitor facilities back up and running, we are now changing from an entry fee to a car parking fee. This offers great value for money and allows us to maintain our reserve as a wonderful haven for both wildlife and visitors. In recent years, the reserve has undergone some incredible improvements, bringing more people closer to the amazing wildlife here. We want to be able to further develop the reserve to provide our visitors with an excellent, inspiring and accessible day out. As a charity, the additional income we generate from the parking charge will allow us to maintain and build upon our new facilities, whilst continuing to carry out the vital conservation work here.

Parking for the day is £3 for non-RSPB members, or free for RSPB members and blue badge holders. Payment can be by cash or contactless card

at the machines in the car park. We don't expect visitors to our shop to pay for parking when popping in to make some purchases, so we have designated spaces set aside for shop customers, allowing up to 30 minutes free parking. These can also be used for visitors popping into the café for takeaway food and drinks.

Our volunteers, as ever, have been doing an amazing job this month. They have been working hard to help us with re-opening by putting up signage, clearing paths, fixing fencing, painting and giving the place a general tidy up as we start to welcome people back to the centre again. We've also been working on the wildflower banks around the underpass which gets strimmed and raked every year to ensure good conditions for next year's beautiful flowers. There is also our fabulous team of visitor volunteers who are ready to welcome you and answer any questions you may have.

In terms of our wonderful wildlife, wintering bird numbers are continuing to build with around 400 teal and almost 150 wigeon seen from the third hide on the reserve. There have been amazing numbers of grebes on the loch too with almost 300 great crested grebes and 21 Slavonian grebes. Slavonian grebes are one of the UKs rarest breeding birds with around 30 pairs. In the winter, numbers build to around 1000

birds, so it's exciting to have so many here at Loch Leven.

Finally, why not join us until 10 January for our new Robin Robin themed Christmas trail? This amazing new trail will encapsulate the adventures of Robin who features in the brand new Aardman film Robin Robin, which is available to watch on Netflix!

Please note that the centre will be closed between both 25-26 December and 1-2 January, so the trail will sadly be unavailable on these dates.

# 'Go And Do Something For Someone Else!'

Here is a touching tribute from her family to **Agnes Smith**, who always put other people before herself for all of her 103 years.

Agnes Smith was born at 138 High Street, Kinross on April 14 1918.

The daughter of George Moffat and Isabella (nee Stuart) she was baptised in St Paul's Episcopal Church, Kinross — where she remained a member for more than 100 years. It was the same church her grandfather had founded.

She was the only child of her father – whose profession was recorded as chauffeur, and her former shoemaker mum. But thanks to her mother being the youngest of 13 she had plenty of cousins. Agnes attended Kinross Primary School and then the junior secondary.

After school she became a nanny before working in a baker's shop. In 1942 Agnes married Tom Smith in the manse of the United Free Church and they moved to Milnathort, where he ran his W and T Smith plumbing business.

Agnes was known for her hospitality and ability to make anyone feel welcome. The couple's three children Sandy, Leise and Isobel recall their mother having an open door policy. And when Tom died in 1974, Agnes had nursed him through illness then began a new chapter in her life as a landlady, helping the village bank manager by providing accommodation for single men employed but moving into the area.

'She earned the name Mum Smith with mine and my sisters' friends and then when we had children and they grew up she

became known around the area as Granny Smith,' said Sandy. Agnes' concern for others was further shown in the work she did with the RSPCC – then called the League of Pity. Both she and a friend were on the leadership committee, staging concerts and winter balls in Kinross' Bridgend Hotel. Being a member of the league came with a pledge. Members had to undertake to do all they could "to help suffering children and make them happy".

But the charity's patron – Princess Margaret – took note of their hard work and the pair were invited to Edinburgh to receive an award for their work.

Until her 99th birthday Agnes lived on her own in a Kinross flat, having moved from Milnathort following Tom's death. Until a fairly recent hospital appointment after a fall, her previous hospital visit was on the birth of her youngest 72 years earlier.

Mobility issues meant she moved to Ashley House Care Home for her final years. "It was my birthday in July," said Sandy. "Visiting my mother, now in her 104th year, I asked, 'do you know what day it is?'. "'Of course I do,' she replied. 'I was there!' "And that's the kind of sharp wit and humour she had until the very end." Agnes was very proud of her seven grandchildren, 12 great grandchildren and her great, great grandson born in November last year. Getting to finally meet him and to stage a five generations photo was the highlight of her year following a difficult time during lockdown.

Never losing her spirit she even learned to take selfies when she was 96.

Sandy added: "What was the secret to her long life? Putting others above herself. "If ever anyone was down she would say 'go and do something for someone else."






