BIKES, BELLS AND BYWAYS

AS THE WARMER WEATHER approaches, bikes are starting to come out in greater numbers. We live on the incline of a main road. Everyone loves going downhill. The lycra clad groups and individuals power up the hill – impressively, the E-bikes with their older owners saunter at pace, while the rest test themselves in front of patient (and not so) cars, or walk up the path to the brow.

In this time of increased fuel costs and warmer weather, folk are going to be using bikes more, but judging by the way some of those passing us are riding, it can't be too comfortable for them (excluding sore posteriors).

I remember three necessities, told when young, to good riding (cycling proficiency instruction?). The right pressure in the tyres – I notice a lot of mountain bikes seem to be low on air when on the road, which is harder to ride; pedal with the balls of the feet as it can be painful on the arches; have the right seat height so that your foot will just touch the ground when you stop – knees up round the chest when pedalling can't be comfortable.

I've learnt two other 'necessities' as an adult: the right distance between the handlebars and the seat – for long or short backs; and having a bell to alert walkers on our byways.

If you want to do the adjustments yourself, there's a very good site on the 'interweb' that looks at the ergonomic way to set up a bike – type in 'bike ergonomics reduce size'. If this is too technical then why not take your bike to Sinclair Cycles at Loch Leven's Larder and ask for help – Mark is very helpful and even more obliging if you buy a bell and fit it before you use the Loch Leven Heritage Trail.

Why a bell? I can't emphasise its need and use enough (as a walker, cyclist and driver). On one walking occasion when about to pass walkers coming towards us, I suggested to my partner to come over to my side of the path. She fortunately ignored me, for at that moment an unannounced cyclist shot between us at speed. I still have palpitations at the thought of what would have happened had she moved at that moment – hospital, without a doubt. How serious, who knows. Please get a bell and use it on the Loch Leven Heritage Trail to warn of your approach.

NB. Other bike shops and internet sites are available.

LOCH WORRIES

FURTHER TO RECENT ARTICLES in the *Newsletter*, I have been told by two sources that one of the problems is that the soil in Kinross-shire and around the Loch is naturally unusually high in Phosphorus (even if there were no agricultural run-off), and that Scottish Water is making the problem worse by adding excessive amounts of phosphates to the drinking water at the Glen Farm reservoir. This is reported to be because of blanket EU advice which should be adjusted to local conditions.

This further addition of a phosphorus burden to an already high level not only runs over through the system into the Loch but causes problems for local water supplies such as at Wester Balgeddie (Queens) where the water supply system is forced to breach the required levels because the water arrives too high in phosphorus. This may have already led to sanctions.

On a more general approach:

- The Loch is too shallow to function properly restoring its depth should be considered for the future.
- There should be better natural balance restoring access for eels to flourish and migrate.
- Housing and other developments should have green sewage and waste-water systems such as reed-beds/dry systems etc. Both stop polluting the loch and reduce the current load.
- There is an active Forth Water organisation working to improve and restore things right along the Forth catchment area and in the Firth into which Loch Leven drains and there should be close involvement; articles in the Newsletter; public meetings; active engagements for those living round the Loch and its tributaries.

The huge increase in development round Kinross and Milnathort – which is causing a huge burden on Loch Leven - has been allowed to get out of hand in volume, and out of control as to proper planning by a persistent failure: a) to exercise due limits on numbers; b) to prevent illegal tree-felling (serious soil-damage and 150 years needed to repair the damage) and c) gross pollution of a once internationally famous Loch and its fish.

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All these are as serious as climate damage and show a wholly irresponsible dereliction of a duty of care to look after the environment, and to restore the damage done by generations up to and including this one. Everyone needs to be active in remedying this before it is too late.

IN RESPONSE TO RECENT reports in the *Newsletter* that farming is being singled out as the principal input of importance in the decline in water quality of Loch Leven, I feel the following observations seem pertinent:

1. There is a real drop in livestock numbers in Kinross-Shire over the last 30 years or more, especially in the dairy sector, now only three dairies left in the county.

2. Fertiliser application onto cereal, grass, vegetable and root crops have probably plateaued in the last 20 years. The Nitrate Vulnerable Zone (NVZ) areas have set maximum targets for nitrogen applications per hectare, more precise fertiliser applications with weight cells on fertiliser spreaders and GPS in the tractor; better use of soil analysis to target fertiliser usage; no spreading fertiliser from 15 September-15 January on till land and 1 September-15 January for grassland; buffer strips along waterways and hedging.

3. Price of nitrogen in 2008 were around £140/T; January 2019 nitrogen was £240/T and July 2022 nitrogen sold to £840/T. Phosphorus prices in 2008 were around £291/T; January 2019 £337/T and July 2022 £925/T. Fertiliser prices are outwith the control of the farming community and every kilogram applied to the fields is done so precisely to get the full benefit of the growing crop.

4. Currently Scottish Environment Agency (SEPA) are conducting diffuse pollution inspections over all the farms in the Loch Leven Catchment Area and my understanding is that they have not found much evidence of poor practice.

5. There has to be an element of diffuse pollution from the tree felling that has been done in the shire over the last 10 years, the felled land is left reasonably bare for a couple of years before machinery enters to make ready for new planting. This surely has to make diffuse pollution a problem for the waterways from the top of the hills around the county when it rains, passing through the farmlands and onto the loch. Nutrients measured in the watercourse are not necessarily all from agriculture!

We cannot say that farming does not contribute to the water quality of Loch Leven, agriculture will have a very small part in the issue. In my view the biggest change within the county is the amount of new build housing around the town and villages of Kinross and a sewer system that is more than likely working beyond its maximum capacity.

OUR MP

I SYMPATHISE WITH OUR MP, John Nicolson, for the pain he is suffering from his osteoarthritis as I had the same problem, until I had a hip replacement operation last November. I was very lucky in that I could get enough money together to pay for the operation privately.

However, I wish Mr Nicolson would stop filling his column with personal matters and instead address the concerns of his constituents. He could, for instance, reply to an email I sent him last October, an email which I also sent to Mr Jim Fairlie, our MSP. I informed Mr Nicolson that I had been given a waiting time of two to three years for NHS treatment and was angry and frustrated that the NHS was letting me down despite paying my taxes willingly all my life. I pointed out that his party had been in total control of the NHS in Scotland for some 15 years and that Ms Sturgeon had cut back medical training places when she was in charge of that brief. While acknowledging that the UK government had made a mess of the economy since 2010, no amount of SNP complaining about 'not having the necessary levers' etc. could excuse the currently poor state of the NHS here.

Being in government means making choices about priorities and so I wonder how many hip operations could be paid for by the cost of all the Gaelic signage and publishing official documents in archaic Scots that few people understand. The SNP should pay less attention to pursuing their fantasy wish lists and instead concentrate their efforts on improving the things that matter for the day-to-day lives of normal people. *Bill Cooper, Kinross*

WINDFARM WORRIES

I WOULD LIKE TO EXPRESS my concerns to the readers of the *Kinross Newsletter* about the wind farm proposals that are springing up around the Kinross and Milnathort area – two, so far....

We live an area of outstanding beauty with the loch, the nature reserve and the fabulous hills all around the Kinross basin. I am extremely concerned about the height of these wind farms, one of 12 turbines at 200 metres and the other much larger with 26 turbines at a massive 220 metres. There are no other wind farms (I believe) on this scale on the main land of Scotland. To give an idea of the height of these turbines the Queensferry crossing from sea height at high tide to the top of the bridge is 207 metres. Imagine that sitting on top of the hills surrounding Kinross.

Don't get me wrong, I'm all for renewable energy but at a local community meeting people were quick to point out they aren't 'nimby's' (Not In My Back Yard). However, the scale of these developments mean that most of central Scotland will be able to see these turbines from their windows so residents shouldn't feel scared or concerned to voice their concerns and to ask questions. These turbines will be in all our back yards and will be on the horizon for at least 20 years and probably more! Not only am I concerned about the height and visibility, this will be compounded by the flashing red light 24 hours a day to warn aircraft. At a recent development south of Edinburgh the MOD voiced concerns only for the application to be approved by the Scottish government.

Over the border in England there is a much tighter control over planning for wind farms, but with these due to be relaxed at the end of the year one proposal to reduce the likelihood of wind farms being built in more residential areas is, properties within 1 mile receive 100% free electricity and within 2 miles 50% free electricity. So far one of the companies in Kinross has touted the figure of £300,000 to local communities. This sounds a large sum of money but split between the six bordering local communities this reduces the sum to £50,000. Compared to the many millions that the company will bring in this is small change.

But forgetting the money, which is a nice carrot to win local approval I am very concerned that once these wind farms are approved there is no going back. What was once a beautiful hillside and view will be gone forever!

The volume of off-shore licenses for wind farms sold across the Scottish crown waters far exceeds the needs of this beautiful land. Why are these companies still trying develop onshore in high population areas like Kinross? Greed and profit.

Please, Kinross – think before you agree to this proposal.

BELOW IS A COPY of a letter that I sent on 6 February to Brian Cargill (Traffic & Network Service Manager at PKC and Daryl McKeown, a member of his team) regarding the A977:

SUBJECT: A977 MITIGATION MEASURES AND RELATED MATTERS

Dear Brian and Daryl,

In the Council's Capital Budget of June 2016, Cllr Cuthbert and myself secured £600,000 for the above. Following community consultation, 4 main projects to slow traffic were agreed but only one has been delivered, namely the signalisation of the junction west of Blairingone. The other 3 projects agreed were the signalisation of the Drum X roads and the School Road Junction, along with re-alignment of the B9097 junction. In May 2022 assurances were given to me by Blair Watt that the Roads Department were actively working on delivering these projects, following significant delays attributed to the pandemic and staff shortages.

I am now informed that there are insufficient funds to deliver the remaining projects and I would like to know what has happened to this capital allocation because the Blairingone signalisation should not have cost the provision secured? If my information is correct, it is incumbent on the Council to make further capital provision for the projects agreed on a road that carries the highest volume of traffic, particularly HGV's, of any road under PKC control (PKC figures!).

Whilst I was a PKC representative for the Kinross-shire Ward between 1999 and 2022, I frequently raised the lack of finance allocated for this road and the effect increasing HGV traffic was having on the villages in west Kinross-shire that straddle it. This concern was also expressed by me in a request for PKC to carry out a survey of HGV usage (many fuel tankers use this road to access the M90 from Clackmannan Bridge but there is only one garage before the motorway services) which they have never done! Also, at Transport Forums involving Transport Scotland, I raised concerns on satellite navigation and signage for HGVs without receiving a sympathetic hearing i.e. Why aren't HGVs, through the Road Hauliers Association, encouraged to use dedicated SATNAV's directing them to trunk roads for anything but local access required (A977 is not a trunk road!); also why doesn't national signage in central Scotland at the junction of the M876 and M80 direct HGV's for Aberdeen, Dundee and Inverness to use the M9/A9 to Broxden which avoids such traffic going through villages?

I thought I would give you the opportunity to respond before contacting PKC's Chief Executive and provost about the way the authorities have let down our west Kinross-shire communities by not giving the above the priority it deserves. Surely the issue should be an agenda item for Kinross-shire's Area Committee!



I set myself a challenge to find as many good raffle and auction prizes as I could over a couple of months and was simply blown away by the generosity of local businesses as well as individuals. I took letters along the High Street to speak to people about Kirsty personally and was so rewarded with all sorts of vouchers, experiences and gifts.

We had the most amazing fun night, lots of dancing, catch-

KINROSS GETS THE OSCARS!

Local Businesses Triumph At Countryside Alliance Awards

Hunters Win Best Scottish Butcher

HUNTERS OF KINROSS have won the 'Best Butcher' category.

The Butcher Award celebrates butchers who are providing that key link between local people and the farms and fields that surround them. It commends those who have high regard for animal welfare and put their community on the map through the quality local produce they sell.

Hunters were crowned 'Champions for Scotland' after getting overwhelming support in a vote by the public. The awards are driven by public nominations, with customers voting for their favourite businesses.

They were up against three other Scottish butchers in the competition and cheered as they received a ceremonial

plaque at the awards ceremony held in the National Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh.

They will now head to London in May where they will face national competition in a bid to win the title 'Best Butcher' of 2023.

Pamela Hunter told the *Newsletter*, 'The shop and team have worked so hard to achieve this win. To be given the title of Champion of Butchers across all of Scotland is a huge achievement.'

BALLO THE OTTER COMES BACK FROM THE DEAD!

BALLO THE OTTER WENT to the Scottish SPCA National Wildlife Rescue Centre just before Christmas after he was found near Kinross at the side of the road by a member of the public.

He had been hit by a car and heartbreakingly, people were driving over him and past him. Thankfully one person noticed that his head was moving and that he was in fact alive!

When Ballo arrived he was much more lively than when he was found. Our wildlife assistants needed to sedate him in the car as he was understandably feisty after his ordeal and was reluctant to be caught.

Once sedated he was taken to our vet suite where a series of x-rays were carried out and a physical examination to see what damage there might be. Amazingly, there wasn't a single break or fracture and all of his teeth were intact.







Ballo had a gash on his face and nose which needed treatment, but luckily he started eating well so all of his medication could be put in his food.

A spokesperson for the Scottish SPCA said, 'He was in our care for a few weeks

until his face healed, he gained weight and became strong and fit enough to survive in the wild.

We were so pleased when Ballo was released at the beginning of the year near to where he was found.'

Road collisions are the leading cause of mortality for otters. There are an estimated 8000 otters in Scotland and they are regularly spotted around lochs and rivers.

SECOND WIND FARM FOR CARNBO?

THE POSSIBILITY OF A second wind farm for Carnbo is now on the cards, with 12 large turbines proposed at Craighead Windfarm adjacent to Brunt Hill. The two projects are not connected, so this is in addition to the Brunt Hill proposal which the *Newsletter* reported on in the February issue. If planning permission is approved, the projects would involve a total of 38 turbines for the area.

The developers came to Carnbo to present this development and the hall was packed with interested members of the public at the recent Fossoway and District Community Council meeting in February.

There was a presentation from Galileo, who seemed confident that the Scottish Government will be receptive to the proposals. There was a significant amount of community benefit suggested.

Galileo is an Italian company formed in 2020 but the Edinburgh office is staffed by people with longer experience of projects in this area. The Project Manager explained that following a hiatus in onshore wind development, there was now UK and Scottish governmental pressure to dramatically expand wind generation to stabilise the availability of power and move towards net zero. All the

'easy' sites had already been developed and it was now necessary to consider sites at higher altitudes and with larger turbines (in excess of 200 metres high) in order to catch enough wind to make the site economic.

Further, with only European suppliers of turbines currently operating, there is no availability of smaller turbines anyway. This site would have about 12 turbines of this size.

Councillor Neil Freshwater said, 'The E Power application suggests that turbines could be up to 235m tall including blades. As a comparison, last week the *Guardian* reported that consent was given for England's tallest turbine at 190m including blades. I read elsewhere that Vestas energy has announced the 'world's tallest on shore tower' for wind turbines at 199m (ex blades) in Denmark.'

The 10km radius area surrounding the site covers several Community Council areas so it would be necessary to identify how any grants were distributed. There will also be a Construction Fund to address impacts of the construction process. The presenters stressed the company's desire to work with the community.

As the Craighead project is intended to generate over 50MW, in the same way as the Brunt Hill scheme, it falls outside the normal planning process, but will be governed by a 'Section 36' application which is decided directly by the Scottish Government, intended to be submitted in 2024.

Cllr Cuthbert explained that PKC's Planning Committee are statutory consultees to these applications and will submit their opinion to the application, consequently Cllrs Cuthbert and Watters will not be able to make any public comments to avoid invalidating their membership of the Committee.

Former councillor Mike Barnacle, now Chair of Fossoway Community Development Trust, told the *Newsletter*, 'With the Brunt



Hill proposal that makes 38 turbines in an LLA, which will have a major cumulative effect on the landscape and effectively create a wind farm dominated landscape between Glendevon and the M90, that would be surely contrary to PKC'S Policy - unless there has been a complete U-turn in that regard!'

In an email to PKC he went on to say, 'The Scottish Gov't have launched a consultation on Energy Policy to 2045 that is predicated on concentration on onshore windfarms to meet climate targets, an incredibly short-sighted policy that will do untold damage

> to our hill landscapes and damage a tourist industry significantly reliant on visitors who come to Scotland for its scenery; it would appear that this drive is principally for enabling the export of energy to the south!'

> Councillor Willie Robertson said, 'No planning applications have been lodged to date but what is of concern to me is that because of changes in the Scottish governments planning laws both these applications will be decided by Scottish ministers and not PKC. This is yet another erosion of local democracy and will lessen the ability of local people to influence decisions which will affect them.'

Fossoway and District Community Council told the *Newslet*ter. 'Incidentally, there is a consultation to which members of the public may want to reply.*

They went on to say, 'We acknowledge the need to harness all technologies available to reach the goal of Net Zero. We will work with communities and developers to reach mutually agreeable solutions.'

EIA REFUSAL FOR MILLER HOMES 'UNACCEPTABLE'

WIDESPREAD DISMAY GREETED the recent decision from Scottish government ministers' that an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) will not be required for the proposed Miller Homes development of 160 dwellings on the controversial Davies Park/H46 plot.

The letter says the development 'Would not be likely to have a significant effect on the environment and therefore an EIA will not be required'.

This means, in effect, that the question of whether the new development, consisting of 160 dwellings, could have a negative effect on Kinross by contributing to increased pollution levels in Loch Leven through discharges into the sewage system, will not be addressed.

This decision goes against the opinion of PKC and flies in the face of almost all local opinion. A spokesperson for the Kinross Action Group said, 'This is just another example of how biased the planning process is toward developers.'

Cllr Willie Robertson has expressed his frustration with the decision. He says 'Sewage treatment plants serving Kinross and Milnathort have been shown not to be able to cope in periods of heavy rain, forcing Scottish Water to divert untreated sewage directly into the loch. This situation is totally unacceptable.'

'Scottish Water must ensure that the consents are complied with and that the discharge will not cause combined sewage overflows to overflow more regularly.'

A spokesperson for Kinross-shire Civic Trust said, 'We are disappointed that the Scottish Government has overturned the opinion of PKC about the need for an EIA for this proposed development.

'Scottish Ministers seem to have wilfully ignored the simple logic that more houses mean more phosphates in Loch Leven which is detrimental to water quality.

'We also have the problem of raw sewage discharge in times of heavy rain. The Decision checklist said that Scottish Water must ensure that the discharge from the proposed development would 'not cause combined sewage overflows to overflow more regularly'. We know that surface water from any new development has to drain away separately and sustainably, but the foul waste will still be going through the combined sewage system at the Treatment Works. We'd like to know how Scottish Water will ensure

there will not be more overflows, as according to reports from our local Councillors of a meeting held in December, Scottish Water do not keep records of storm sewage overflows into Loch Leven.

'As Loch Leven is a Special Protection Area, we feel a precautionary approach should have been taken and the developer made to carry out an Environmental Impact Assessment."

Cllr Dave Cuthbert said he was disappointed for two reasons, the first being that he 'had asked for an EIA at the council's pre-application meeting, following a discussion with a local resident about the presence of bats being in the area. He went on to say, 'I also strongly believe that planning decisions and the paperwork surrounding them should rest with the people who have been elected to make these decisions. Not with a faceless bureaucrat who doesn't know the area like we do. I have been appealed to the DPEA (Planning & Environmental Appeals Division) following a refusal decision by the council are upheld, thereby overturning the decisions of those whose job it is to shape the Local Development Plan and judge applications against it. If councillors get it wrong, we are answerable to our electorate. If the DPEA get it wrong, then who are they answerable to?'

Cllr Neil Freshwater said 'This is disappointing news especially in light of recent environmental concerns about Loch Leven. Yet again the Scottish Government is showing its total disregard of local democracy. Similarly, we should not forget that the decision to install what could be 26 of the world's largest wind turbines in Kinross-shire will also bypass the council'.

It is not only our local councillors who are disappointed with this decision by Scottish government ministers.

Liz Smith, MSP said 'PKC was – rightly in my opinion – very keen that a full EIA was required and so it is very disappointing to hear that Scottish Ministers believe otherwise.

There has been widespread concern amongst the local community about this proposed development not least because of the implications for the local infrastructure. Residents have every right to be angry that their opinions are being undermined.'

In a statement that seemed to indicate he also believed the Scottish Government should have requested the EIA, MP John Nicolson told the *Newsletter*, 'I am disappointed. I completely understand local feeling. Loch Leven is a place of outstanding natural beauty and great historical importance.

'It's also ecologically vulnerable. The land use round about it should reflect these special factors. And while I understand the need for more housing especially for young families, I don't believe the developers have adequately addressed the issues raised by my constituents.

'As an MP at Westminster I don't have any power over local planning. But it's my view that we need to move towards more brownfield site reclamation and urban, town and village repopulation. Long term, I welcome Scottish Government changes to planning rules which will further prioritise ecological concerns in future developments.'

Sarah Eaton (63), a member of Kinross Road Runners, has signed up for the London Marathon on April 23 in aid of Save the Rhino, an international charity devoted to halting the decline of these magnificent animals, which are at risk of extinction because of poaching and loss of habitat.

And now Sarah's calling on kind-hearted Kinross-shire residents to help her raise the funds she needs to secure her place in the event.

She's holding a quiz night in Milnathort Scout Hall on 18 March, which will include a 'name the rhino' competition, and is inviting people to take part in virtual races in aid of the charity. After 17 years, it has now been detached from the wall, mounted on a background and relocated to a spot further in the graveyard, where it will be easier to visit and to hold a memorial service.

Trudy Duffy-Wigman, Chair of FDCC said, 'It will give me great pleasure that we can take this item off the FDCC agenda. It will be a shock to the system!'

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BREAK-IN AT RSPB LOCH LEVEN



POLICE SCOTLAND ARE APPEALING for information following a break-in at RSPB Scotland Loch Leven.

Around 10pm on Friday 10 February, the RSPB Scotland Loch Leven Reserve Visitor Centre at Vane Farm was broken into and a large quantity of very high quality and valuable binoculars and telescopes, from brands including Swarovski, Leica, Zeiss & Nikon, were stolen.

These items are worth around £33,000 and are very identifiable and traceable.

Constable Matthew Bull at Perth Community Investigation Unit said 'Not only have the staff had the trauma of discovering the break in, but the stolen equipment means the important work they do to protect nature and the environment has been disrupted.

'We are keen to hear from anyone who has been offered Swarovski optics for sale recently, or from anyone who was in the area at the time and may have seen someone acting suspiciously.

Anyone with information should contact police in Perth via 101 quoting incident number 3990 of 10 February 2023.

Alternatively calls can be made to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 where anonymity can be maintained.

A spokesperson from RSPB Loch Leven on Facebook urged the public to be on the look out for sales of stolen goods locally, saying, 'High quality binoculars and telescopes that are up for sale and seem like too good a deal to be true probably are!'

The Retail Manager told the *Newsletter*, 'Around 10pm on Friday 10 February, the shop at RSPB Loch Leven was broken into and a large quantity of high value identifiable binoculars and telescopes was stolen (brands including Swarovski, Leica, Zeiss & Nikon). This obviously this has been very devastating to the team.

'As well as the theft the thieves also damaged cabinets and a large window. This also really impacts on our ability to do the conservation work we do here. Police are keen to hear if anyone has been offered any items or saw anything suspicious at that time.'

Dont Be Idle – Ease the Wheeze!

NEW POWERS TO IMPROVE air quality and reduce the impact of climate change in P&K comes into effect on 1 March.

The anti-idling policy aims to make drivers aware of the harmful emissions produced when motor vehicles are left running, and how they can affect the environment and human health.

A stationary engine left running for more than 10 seconds uses more fuel and produces more CO2 than if the vehicle was switched off and then restarted.

Vehicle idling is an offence against road traffic regulations. Over half of all Scottish councils have already adopted measures to encourage drivers to switch their engines off.

From 1 March, monitoring staff will follow the 'Four E's' approach (Engage, Explain, Encourage and Enforce) when reminding drivers to switch off their engines. A £20 Fixed Penalty Notice will be issued if motorists do not comply.



Councillor Andrew Parrott, PKC's Environment, Infrastructure and Economic Development Convener commented: 'The introduction of our anti-idling policy is not about penalising drivers, but improving local air quality and reducing harmful emissions. I really hope we do not have to issue many Fixed Penalty Notices.'

Climate Change and Sustainability Con-

vener, Councillor Richard Watters added: 'We can all do our bit to help 'ease the wheeze' and make a positive choice for our environment. The approach we are taking is to educate drivers and encourage them to switch off when stationary.'

Anyone affected by excessive vehicle idling can report this by email and environmental health officers will investigate.

CORONATION WEEKEND CELEBRATIONS

MOST READERS WILL HAVE heard about the national plans to celebrate the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III over the long weekend of 6 to 8 May.

Saturday 6 May: Coronation service in Westminster Abbey; coronation procession; Buckingham Palace balcony.

Sunday 7 May: Concert and lightshow at Windsor Castle; Coronation Big Lunch street parties.

Monday 8 May: Extra bank holiday; Big Help Out encouraging people to get involved in local volunteering.

Organised by The Together Coalition and 25 of the UK's biggest charities, The Big Help Out will highlight the positive impact volunteering has on communities across the nation – www.thebighelpout.org.uk. From rolling your sleeves up to pick litter, to volunteering at a food bank, this is the chance to lend a hand in your neighbourhood. Sports and youth groups are especially encouraged to take part. For example, the Samaritans will be telling people about the importance of 'active listening'.

The National Literary Trust will be out and about reading to people. Here in Scotland, we have Volunteering Scotland www.volunteerscotland.net. The coronation at Westminster Abbey will see the crowning of King Charles and the Queen Consort Camilla, in a service full of religious symbolism and pageantry.



The ceremony is expected to be a shorter, smaller and a more diverse occasion than for Queen Elizabeth II's coronation in 1953.

That previous coronation lasted three hours and the ceremony for King Charles is expected to be considerably shorter. There were more than 8,000 guests for the 1953 coronation, while the ceremony in May is expected to be smaller, with Westminster Abbey usually having a capacity of about 2200.

The coronation procession is expected to be more modest. In 1953, there were 16,000 participants in a procession that took 45 minutes to pass any stationary point on the 7km (4.3 miles) route.

This time round the King and Queen Consort will arrive at the abbey from the palace, in the King's procession and return in a larger Coronation procession, joined by other members of the Royal Family. It is not yet confirmed who will then appear with them on the balcony at Buckingham Palace.

A more inclusive, multi-faith dimension is anticipated for the service, with representatives of a range of religions.

The line-up for the Windsor concert has still to be announced but organisers are promising 'some of the world's biggest entertainers'. The event is expected to be a wide mix of music, dancing and a laser lightshow will be linked to the illumination of famous sites around the UK. For the Shakespeare-loving monarch there will be spoken-word performances from stage and screen stars.

You might want to think about holding a Coronation Big Lunch in your village street, park or garden. Funding of up to £10,000 for Coronation related events and activities via the National Lottery Awards for All programme is available. T&C's at www.tnlcommunityfund.org.uk/funding/under10k.



You will need:

Serves 4

Butter for greasing Handful of finely ground breadcrumbs or grated parmesan 50g butter 50g plain flour 275ml whole milk Half an Arbroath Smokie, flesh removed from the bone and well picked 4 eggs, separated 100g smoked or extra mature cheddar 1 tsp mustard powder ½ tsp cayenne pepper

Salt and pepper

PREHEAT YOUR OVEN TO 200/180/Gas 6 and place a large baking sheet inside to heat. Use the middle shelf and make sure the upper shelf has been removed to give your soufflés lots of space to rise.

Grease and line 4 ramekins with butter and breadcrumbs or parmesan. Make a thick white sauce with the butter, flour and milk and season well with salt and pepper and add the cayenne and mustard powder. Add the cheese and heat gently until melted. Remove from the heat and whisk in the egg yolks one by one. Add in the flaked smokie and stir to combine well.

In a very clean bowl, whisk the egg whites to soft peaks and very gently fold into the cheese mixture using a large metal spoon.

Gently tip into the prepared ramekins. Once filled, use a butter knife to flatten the tops. Then take your thumb around the edge of each ramekin to create a shallow channel all the way round the edge. This will encourage the soufflé to rise.

Place the ramkeins on the heated baking sheet and bake for 25 minutes until very well risen. They may crack or sink a little once removed from the oven, but don't worry. Sprinkle the top with a mix of finely grated cheese and spring onion or chives. Eat immediately!

Windfarm Proposals

As many of you will be aware there are proposals to build two very large windfarms north of Carnbo with turbines up to 200 metres tall. No planning applications have been lodged to date

but what is of concern to me is that because of changes in the Scottish governments planning laws both these applications will be decided by Scottish ministers and not Perth & Kinross Council. This is yet another erosion of local democracy and will lessen the ability of local people to influence decisions which will affect them.

Orwell Cemetery

The cemetery at Milnathort is now at capacity so Milnathort residents wishing to have their loved ones interred are being told to use the North Cemetery in Kinross. There is land between the Milnathort cemetery and the M90 which I am sure could be used for a cemetery extension but when I asked for this to be investigated in the past, I was told that it wasn't suitable. I am going to ask for that assessment to be looked at again. I am still of the view that every parish should have a cemetery for their community.

Miller Homes

The Scottish Government's planning directorate (DPEA) has decided not to require Miller Homes to provide an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for their proposed housing development in Kinross. I am very disappointed that once again the DPEA has failed to take a precautionary approach when it comes to large housing developments in the Loch Leven catchment. I think that it is now accepted that the decline in the quality of water in the loch can be linked directly to the large increase in housing numbers within the catchment. Each development, often approved by the DPEA at appeal, incrementally adds to the phosphorous loading of Loch Leven. Added to that the sewage treatment plants serving Kinross and Milnathort have been shown not to be able to cope with the volumes of combined sewage and flood water in periods of heavy rain forcing Scottish Water to divert untreated sewage directly into the loch. This situation is totally unacceptable. I am pleased that Perth and Kinross Council planners recognised these issues by asking for an EIA on the possible added impact of the Miller Homes proposals but am frustrated and upset at the attitude to the environmental protection of Loch Leven again being shown by the DPEA.

Letter To The Environment Minister

As I write this there has still been no response to the letter sent by the Leader of Perth and Kinross Council, Cllr. Grant Laing to the Environment Minister Mairi McCallan MSP. This followed my motion to the Council in December. I think the letter was excellent and am enclosing it (opposite) for you all to read. Let's hope it prompts the minister to take real action.

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Letter from Cllr Grant Laing to the Environment Minister

Dear Mairi

Environmental Regulation at Loch Leven

I am writing to ask for your assistance in introducing adequate environmental regulation to manage pollution into Loch Leven, Kinross.

This Council is very concerned about the deterioration in water quality in the loch, whichis one of our most important nature sites and a very popular tourist attraction. At its meeting of 21 December 2022 the Council agreed to request action from you to help address this problem.

Loch Leven is designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), a Special Protection Area (SPA), a RAMSAR site (Wetland of International Importance), and a Nature Reserve. The water quality in the loch is being adversely impacted by a number of things, including the effects of climate change.

Two factors which relate directly to nationally-administered regulatory control are:

• The water in the loch is being enriched by phosphates entering the loch from agricultural run-off and treated effluent from the Milnathort and Kinross Waste Water Treatment Plants. This is leading to growing instances of algal blooms, some of which are toxic, making it unsafe for humans and animals alike. Our understanding is that although individual licences set limits, there is currently no overall weight limit set on the amounts of phosphorous which can cumulatively be deposited into the loch.

• Due to the shared sewage systems (carrying both sewage and road water) in Milnathort and Kinross, in periods of heavy rain Scottish Water are forced to divert untreated sewage directly into the loch. Currently there appear to be no substantial records kept of these occurrences.

The Council has done what it can within its powers, but this is limited to introducing planning policy and guidance, which can only address new development. The above problems require action through other statutory frameworks, principally the environmental regulation administered by SEPA.

Accordingly, I request that the Scottish Government:

- Instruct SEPA to introduce an overall weight limit on the amount of phosphorous permitted to be deposited into Loch Leven.
- Instruct SEPA to introduce tighter controls to stop Scottish Water depositing untreated sewage into Loch Leven and to ensure that any such overspill events are recorded and reported.

I am hopeful that this is something which you can assist with and look forward to hearing from you.

IT HAS BEEN A busy period at Council as Elected Members prepare to decide how to adjust Council Services so the budget balances. The budget is made up of a block grant and other awards from the Scottish Government as well as



Council Tax set by PKC. As things stand as I write this it would take around a 50% increase in Council Tax levels to maintain a balanced budget. Of course, this is not what will happen and there is much effort by officers and elected members to find adjustments that provide the least negative impact. All of the efforts from this process will become clear at the Council Meeting on 1 March.

I have my first meeting as Convenor of Kinross-shire Local Committee on 16 February. We will be testing out having the meeting in person in Kinross-shire for the first time. This will be at Loch Leven Community Campus with some hybrid attendance by some PKC officers and Community Council Members not able to attend in person. We are still tweaking the best time and format for this committee. From my point of view it is important that it is local and the local people can attend, watch and participate. You will have seen the most recent minutes in the February *Newsletter*. This will continue. A transparent process with timeous reporting is important for this project. I look forward to significant agenda items in the coming months.

Over the many years I have worked inside and outside PKC the slippage that happens between decisions and information processes that happen at Council and the local needs, projects and resources, is the biggest issue. Our Independent Group of elected members is very keen that services are delivered in the most efficient and targeted manner. Local Committees are an aspect of that aspiration. PKC has set up groups in the past with this kind of remit.

I am hoping the Local Committee Scheme of Delegation will provide the more formal conduit between PKC and our local community which will remain transparent and have regular public meeting and reporting which helps hold everybody to account. Most people want local democracy to work better; this is the objective.

More Windfarms for Kinross-shire?

Readers will have seen reports in last month's Newsletter about plans for a wind farm (up to 26 turbines) at Brunt Hill near Carnbo. E Power Limited has

submitted a pre-planning application to Scottish Government, as was reported.

Further to that, I have been advised that a second company, Galileo Green Energy GmbH is considering an application at neighbouring Craighead for up to 12 turbines. Galileo presented to Fossoway Community Council at a packed Carnbo Hall last week which led to some interesting discussion.

They talked about potential community benefit fund of £360,000 per annum for the life of the windfarm depending on power generation. We also discussed the need for wind turbines in Scotland to be higher than existing ones, given that the number of available sites suitable for 'smaller' turbines is depleting.

Notably, the E Power application suggests that turbines could be up to 235m tall including blades. As a comparison, last week *The Guardian* reported that consent was given for England's tallest turbine at 190m including blades. I read elsewhere that Vestas energy has announced the 'world's tallest on shore tower' for wind turbines at 199m (ex blades) in Denmark.

I sought clarity on whether the two applications are related but seemingly not, although it is apparently the case when a windfarm application goes in, a competitor application may follow nearby.

Perth Harbour Closure

A number of Kinross-shire residents have been in touch about the Council's decision to close Perth Harbour because they either work there or have connections to it. At relatively short notice, the Full Council was presented with a recommendation to close the harbour given that it is currently loss-making. I spoke in a debate in the chamber last week and voiced my concerns about the closure. Whilst the harbour is a great asset for the area, and I do not believe that it is for the council to run it as a loss making enterprise, I did want to ensure that if there was the possibility of a company taking on the full operation, that should be explored. A motion to keep the harbour open and dredge it, with a view to finding a fully commercial operator was defeated. However, although the Council did agree to close it, it will welcome approaches from interested parties who could lease it on a long term basis in order to keep it open as a commercial port.

Community Speedwatch for Kinross-shire

Fossoway Community Council has secured funding to operate a community speedwatch and buy the necessary equipment. This will be open to all community council areas in the county. It will allow (following training) volunteers to monitor traffic speeds. Anyone 'caught' speeding will receive a warning letter from the police advising them of their speeding. This is a really good scheme to empower communities who are frustrated with speeding, to take real action. Anyone interested should contact Fossoway Community Council (or myself and I can pass on details).

I am delighted to announce the official lodging of the final proposal for my Outdoor Education Private Member's Bill in January. Readers will know from my previous articles in the *Kinross Newsletter* just how passionate I am about the aims of this Bill. Outdoor education



has a proven track-record of developing life skills and building self-esteem in young people and this is needed more than ever following the Covid-19 pandemic.

My final Bill proposal has been lodged under the text: "A proposal for a Bill to ensure that young people, in particular those in their first four years of secondary school, have the opportunity to experience residential outdoor education to an approved educational standard."

This also coincided with the publishing of the consultation responses to my Bill which can now be accessed here: https://www.parliament.scot/bills-and-laws/proposals-for-bills/proposed-schools-residential-outdoor-education-scotland-bill. I would like to thank all of the 535 individuals and organisations that completed the survey with over 95% of the responses supportive of the proposal.

The final proposal now has one month to get support from other MSPs. In order to progress, the Bill must receive the support of at least 18 individual MSPs across at least two different political parties. I am glad to say this threshold has already been met comfortably and I extend my thanks to all those who have already shown their support.

Now that my Bill has been so enthusiastically supported by both the outdoor education sector and the public, my focus will now be on ensuring that I can convince my colleagues in the Scottish Parliament to vote through this legislation to ensure no child in Scotland will be disadvantaged by missing this enriching learning experience.

IN PARLIAMENT I RECENTLY had the privilege to host a Members' Business Debate on the subject of Male Suicide in Scotland. This is a highly sensitive issue, and I appreciate that this is a topic that can be unsettling and difficult to discuss openly but it is my strong belief that



MSPs should do absolutely everything to raise awareness and to remove perceived stigma of suicide so that necessary, open discussions can take place across our communities.

Far too many of us know a family member, a friend or somebody meaningful that has died by suicide ¬- myself included. Statistics show that overall death figures by suicide are falling but the number is still stubbornly high, and men are three times more likely to die this way than women, with three times as many deaths occurring in more deprived areas. It remains the biggest killer of men aged under 50.

Since becoming a MSP I have become aware of the exceptional work being undertaken by Samaritans and Andy's Man Club in the local area – both of which promote the positive value of conversation. I intend to invite both organisations to Holyrood in the near future so that they can share their experiences and expertise to MSPs so they may return to their own constituencies to relay the vitally important message that 'it's okay to talk'.

Andy's Man Club meets every Monday 7pm at football grounds McDiarmid Park and Central Park, whilst Samaritans can be contacted on 116123.

This month two of our most popular and highly-regarded local businesses have received national acclaim by winning the Countryside Alliance's Champion for Scotland awards. Hunters of Kinross scored a first place finish in the Butcher category, whilst Loch Leven's Larder topped the Local Food and Drink Category.

This is a huge achievement for both businesses and I have submitted motions to Parliament congratulating them on their success, which I am pleased to report has received support from MSPs across Scotland and across the party political divide.

These awards are particularly meaningful as they are nominated by members of the general public on a basis of 'celebrating rural businesses that go the extra mile, supporting their local economy, and are the unsung heroes in every community'. The awards are otherwise known as 'The Rural Oscars' and highlights the diversity of rural enterprise and the determination of rural communities to survive and prosper.

Both businesses are no strangers to winning awards and they will now compete for the title of the best in the UK at a final in London scheduled for 17 May 2023. I know only too well how dedicated each business is to producing quality local produce to a high standard, and each brings great credit to the local area for showcasing Kinross-shire as the very best that Scotland has to offer. THE KINROSS NEWSLETTER ALL PROFITS GO TO LOCAL GOOD CAUSES

I WENT TO A LOCAL playgroup recently. It was full of toddlers from Ukraine, their mothers chatting while keeping a watchful eye on them. They looked happy, but I detected a certain vigilance – more than the usual parental watchfulness. How could it be otherwise given what they'd endured?



'So how are you finding Scotland?' I asked. 'Are people being welcoming? Are you and the children managing to settle in?'

'The children are completely at home now' one mother told me 'and they've already got Scottish accents.'

'People are so lovely in Scotland' another mother said. 'They quite often ask me if I need land to grow potatoes. I think they assume that's what we do in Ukraine. But I'm a doctor in Kiev. I've never planted a potato in my life.'

I suppose it's the thought that counts.

The Ukrainians join a significant number of Syrian families who fled the bombing horrors there, and now live in my constituency. I've often wondered why people in Scotland seem to be so warm towards folk who come to seek sanctuary on our shores. Why do so many immigrants say they find a ready welcome here? I wonder if it is because we are a land of emigrants? Generation after generation of Scots have had to leave home. Most, in recent years were economic migrants – to England, to the rest of the European Union, and to Commonwealth countries. I was one of them. I left for London in my twenties to pursue work in journalism.

But of course emigration took much darker forms in our country's history in the 18th and 19th centuries. The Clearances saw huge swathes of our country brutally emptied of people who were forced on to boats, never to see their homeland again. Piles of stones scattered throughout Highland glens to this day bear testament to the cruelty of landlords who preferred sheep to people.

I didn't know until recently how many Scots ended up in Argentina. But I've become friends with the Argentine Ambassador. Javier Figueroa is a clever and charming man. And Argentina has recently been enjoying a fascination with all things Scottish because of Alexis MacAllister, their star football World Cup player. Ambassador Figueroa has fallen in love with Scotland. He reminded me that the now famous MacAllister family were only one of thousands of Scottish families who found a new home and language in his country during the nineteenth century. And we brought something in return – football when Alexander Watson Hutton taught it to Buenos Aires schoolboys. I think it's fair to say they've become almost as good at the game now as us.

These days Argentina has the largest number of Scottish descendants of any country outside the English speaking world, with their own traditions including schools, churches and Scottish country dancing clubs. They've assimilated. But they're still proud of who they are and where they came from. And doesn't that create the perfect mix?

Flood Defence for Kinross and Milnathort

WITHIN THE NEXT FEW months, both Kinross and Milnathort are due to have important community consultations on relevant Flood Defence schemes. The

schemes for both communities are included in the Forth Estuary Local Flood Risk Management Plan and will help make both communities more resilient to River and Surface Water flooding. Both schemes were delayed largely by the Covid Pandemic.

The Milnathort Surface Water Flood Scheme and Surface Water Management Plan takes account of the 2016 Scottish Water sewer improvement work and has the potential to reduce strain on the combined Sewerage and Surface Water sewers in the town.

The Kinross Flood Defence Scheme is needed to protect 129 homes and 55 businesses from potential flooding from the South Queich, Gelly Burn, and Clash Burn to the south of Kinross.

A Surface Water Management Plan for Kinross is currently scheduled between 2024 -2026, this is due to be preceded by Scottish Water completing a Sewerage Flood Risk assessment between 2023 – 2025.

With the impact of Climate Change on changes in rainfall, these projects have the potential to help us build more resilient communities as well as to help us protect our local environment— especially Loch Leven.

Replacement Fence

HAVING BEEN IN DISCUSSIONS with council officers regarding the unsightly broken fence between Stirling Road and Marshall Place in Milnathort, I was delighted to be informed that replacement fencing will be erected in the near future.

Planning Applications

THERE ARE A NUMBER of important planning applications due within Kinross-shire, such as an application for Aldi in Milnathort, for housing next to Davies Park in Kinross, for a development at the old Car Auction site in Kinross, and possibly for two windfarms in the Ochils near Carnbo.

I am often asked for my opinion on these applications. However, due to the quasi-judicial nature of these applications and in my roles as a member of the Planning Committee, the Local Review Body, and Full Council, if I were to pre-judge or comment on an application that is due to come before any of the above committees, that would create a conflict and would require me to declare an interest in the application and remove myself from debating on it or voting on it.

My behaviour in respect to planning applications is covered



under section 7 of the councillors code of conduct – 'taking decisions on quasi judicial or regulatory applications' with the need for me to 'ensure there is a proper and fair hearing of the application and must avoid the impression of bias in the whole decision making process'.

Occasionally, due to my involvement with a specific constituency issue I have chosen to remove myself from the decision-making process. However, I aim to remain within the guidelines set out in the Councillors Code of Conduct That enables me to carry out my commitments as a Councillor on the Planning Committee and the Local Review Board.

The Kinross-shire Fund was established in 2006 to make the area a better place to live,




by making grants to a wide range of local charities, organisations and projects which make a positive difference to the community.



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BANK TRANSFER FRAUD

Authorised Push Payment (APP).

THIS IS WHERE A victim is called by someone claiming to be from their bank or the police and convinces them to transfer monies to another third party account. The fraudster tends to claim that the victims own bank account has been compromised in some way and that to ensure the safety of their savings they must transfer their money to another account; either online or by going into a physical branch.

They may also use names of genuine bank employees or Police, which they have found from previous alerts about these types of frauds.

The victim will always be sworn to secrecy as part of the 'ongoing investigation' and maybe told to come up with false reasons for transferring money if questioned by bank staff; or they've been told that the bank staff are in some way untrustworthy.

Almost £400 million has been lost to bank transfer fraud over the past 2 years which shows that the perpetrators of these crimes are professional and will come across as genuine, authoritative and convincing.

But let us be clear:

Nobody from your bank or the police will ever contact you and request that you transfer money from your account or reveal personal/ financial information over the phone.

If you receive such a call then politely hang up. If you feel a need to contact your bank then do this from another phone as the fraudsters can continue to hold your phone line so that when you think you are calling your bank you are in fact still speaking to them.

Alternatively contact the police. You won't be wasting our time and I would much rather have my officers attend and potentially prevent a crime than see a victim suffer from these unscrupulous criminals.

Either way under no circumstances should you transfer any funds or provide people with personal or financial information over the phone.

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AGRICULTURE AND LOCH LEVEN

Following last month's article on sewage treatment, Dr Brian D'Arcy now looks at the effects of agriculture on Loch Leven. Brian has worked with agricultural and environmental scientists and advisors for several decades, addressing nutrients in rivers and lochs associated with agriculture. He was Chair of the International Water Association Task Group on Land Use and Water Quality from 2017-2022. When it comes to Loch Leven we are being advised to 'listen to the science'. Further Reading is given at the end of this article.

How The Loch Leven Catchment Became An Exemplar For Managing Diffuse Pollution From Agriculture

'It's agriculture' – that seems to be the message coming from the people now advising our local councillors, as reported in the *Newsletter* over recent months. It is a surprising viewpoint, given the decades of innovation and achievement by the agricultural sector in the Loch Leven catchment, especially since the 1990s. The other aspect which is surprising, is the implication that a single source is 'the one'. From the outset, a catchment management approach has been that each and every sector must strive to manage inputs, according to recognised national notions of best practice. That's not just good scientific sense for catchment management, it is fair and even handed. For the farming community, from the 1990s onwards, it led to many actions going well beyond any regulatory requirements.

In 1985 an intensive sampling survey to produce a quantitative idea of the phosphorus (P) inputs to Loch Leven was undertaken by a partnership effort between the Nature Conservancy Council (NCC; later SNH, now rebranded as Nature Scot), responsible for the Loch Leven National Nature Reserve (and all others), and the Forth River Purification Board (absorbed in the new Scottish Environment Protection Agency, SEPA in 1996).

That valuable joint endeavour gave us information on the relative importance of each of the measured inputs to the loch. As well as highlighting the Todd and Duncan textile mill as a priority for dialogue and action (successfully concluded by 1987), it highlighted river borne (diffuse) multiple sources too. The detailed data collected in 1985 (published in 1987) allowed comparisons, for that very wet year, between the different watercourses and identified the Pow/Greens Burn as the tributary with the highest phosphorus per hectare (P/ ha) load to the loch. A small sub-catchment, mainly arable, it was an obvious target for focused action (e.g. buffer strips and nutrient budgeting).

Ten years later, in a dry year (1995), a subsequent survey found that the highest P input per hectare was no longer the Green/Pow Burn but was the South Queich. Livestock farming was more characteristic of that catchment, so nutrient and slurry management advice there was backed up by livestock exclusion fencing (especially on the Gelly Burn tributary). That decade and the following one (1985-2005) was a period of innovation and activity, establishing new practices and demonstrably effective ways to reduce inputs from agriculture. The public outcry following the algal blooms in July 1992 was a great help in bringing together people in the catchment, including farmers, with a real spirit of everyone must do what they can.

Managing Diffuse Pollution And Reading The Landscape

Diffuse pollution can usefully be described as contamination of land or air, washed or blown by weather into rivers, lochs and the sea, or seeping down into groundwater. The concept explains why in heavy rain a diffuse pollution impacted river is often worse than in dry weather. The land use determines the type of contamination risks. The landscape presents the pathways for runoff and the scope for interventions. 'Reading the landscape' for diffuse pollution management gradually became the basis for assessing pollution risks from agriculture. That fresh mindset was encouraged by a joint venture in 1994 between FRPB (later taken up by SEPA), SAC and FWAG (the now defunct Farming





Figure 1. Buffer strips guide and measured effectiveness at reducing total P losses to the Greens/Pow Burn, Loch Leven (SEPA data published by S Greig in D'Arcy et al 2006).

and Wildlife Advisory Group): the *Buffer Strips Initiative*. The buffer zones aimed to move the farming back from the edge of the watercourses and, in our initial sub-catchment, to stabilise slopes on arable land.

It was not a one-size-fits-all approach. On the Greens/ Pow Burn 7.3ha of buffer zones were established, varying from 3m in flatter reaches to 30m on the broad steeper slopes. 'Hotspots' (across the loch catchment) required bespoke solutions and included moving a farm gate up-slope



along a boundary line, rather than being at the lowest point; shifting winter feeders to a high spot in a field, remote from where runoff could enter a drain or burn. Often relatively simple interventions, and the farmers knew best where to make them. A good example was where runoff from a rough grass hill pasture in wet weather flushed out a hollow where sheep would enrich the ground with a lot of droppings; the farmer modified the pathway for the runoff to by-pass the sheep holding area and thereafter drain clean water into the head of the burn. At another hotspot, a sediment trap was excavated to capture eroded soil, which is periodically excavated and returned to the top of the field (see over for Fig.2).




Figure 3. Decline in nitrate concentrations in the Greens Burn (1994-2008), SEPA data in D'Arcy et al 2006.

The non-landscape interventions were equally important. Part of the loch catchment is a Nitrate Vulnerable Zone. Figure three shows that the concentration in the burn in that area was halved (1994-2008). Because it is highly soluble, it is more difficult to reduce nitrate by landscape means than P, the latter being associated with particulate matter amenable to filtration and soil stabilisation. The data in figure 3 is a measure of the success of nutrient budgeting by farmers in the catchment (which would also have included reduced P application in many situations).

Success And What Has Changed Since Then?

By 2008 (Dudley *et al* 2012) an amazing degree of recovery was clear: rooted plants were growing on the loch bed at a depth of 4.3m! The agricultural practices at that time were clearly compatible with the restored water quality. So, if 'it's agriculture' what has changed? Facts are needed:

- Informal indications from farmers are that the current SEPA survey has not found much evidence of poor practice so far.
- A quantitative assessment of the landscape measures across the catchment, using modern satellite and/or drone mapping data, comparing that with information from the late 1990s is proposed for a student project at SRUC, but we'll need farmers' permission to access the 1990s historic landscapes data.

- Any changes in quantities of fertiliser applications? Improvements in technology now allow much finer targeting of fertiliser applications, reducing quantities. The current price increases also make excessive use seem unlikely.
- Any changes in proportion of land growing root crops? Or increases in livestock numbers? A proper review of land use and water quality would allow for a more scientific evaluation of the contribution of agriculture, compared with the earlier good quality decades.

In conclusion, a big thank you to Loch Leven farmers for helping in the restoration of the loch all those years ago and putting Loch Leven at the forefront of restoration studies internationally. Now let's have a proper, thorough examination of the current situation, as outlined above.

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
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Kinross-shire Cricket Club 1920-2000

IN LAST MONTH'S NEWSLETTER we reviewed the early years from 1853 up to the start of the First World War. No records exist as to the impact the war had on player numbers but an article in the Dundee Courier of 19 October 1921 indicates that club finances were good with £89 in the bank and a very healthy membership. The article also lists the office bearers as; Hon. presidents, Sir Basil I. G. Montgomery. Bart., ex-Provost Anderson, Mr J Gardiner, M P., and Mr J. J. Moubray, Lord-Lieutenant of the county: hon. Vice-presidents, Provost W. J. Montgomery, Mr J. B. Black, Tillywhally, and Major Simpson, Mawcarse; president, Oswald; vice-president, Mr D. M. Hutchison; captain, G. Telfer; vice-captain, Councillor T. H. Mitchell; secretary and treasurer. Mr R. Telfer, Lochburn Terrace, Kinross. It seems the club was in good order and in a strong position for the foreseeable future. Match reports and scorecards for the period saw the club play teams from of Edinburgh, Kirkcaldy, Cowdenbeath, Dunfermline, Dollar, Perth and Scone.

In 1930, local schoolboy, Alistair Dowell made his first team debut at the age of 10 years old. It is not unusual for sons to play alongside fathers and Alistair continued playing for the club until the outbreak of the second World War in 1939. Work and family commitments meant Alistair moved away from Kinross in the mid-1940s but he continued to play cricket and was selected for Scotland between 1951 and 1955. It is recognised that Alistair was the first Kinross-shire CC teenager to go on to play for Scotland. He was not the last as we will see in the 2000s. The club welcomed Alistair back in 2008 as an official guest at a match against Bute County.

During the 1930s another significant father and son partnership played for the club. Robert and Andrew Downie made regular appearances for the club until the start of the war. Robert is listed as a club committee member in the official records from 1937. Sadly, Andrew's cricket career was all too brief as he was killed in action in 1942 when he was just 21. The images below were very kindly donated to the club by Robert Downie's daughter, Mrs Margaret Able, who still lives in Kinross. The Downie Quach was also donated by Mrs Able





in honour of her father and brother and is one of the annual awards presented by the club to the junior member who made an impact as they progressed into the senior teams.

By 1933 the club was firmly established at 'The Beeches' a park located where the current Montgomery Golf Course Club house is situated. On 24 July 1933 the club house was totally destroyed by a fire. The Kinross July Fair was taking place in the adjacent field and although the fire brigade was on hand the entire building and all its contents were destroyed. The local community came together and raised the money to build a new building which was officially opened on 25 May 1934 by club president Mr D Hutchison.

The second world War had a significant impact on the club as a considerable number of its members were killed in action. As a result the club was unable to continue in its regular form and the decision was taken to wind up the clubs affairs with the ground and pavilion being put up for sale in November 1945.

While the formal club was in abeyance, it appears that friendly fixtures were arranged on an ad-hoc basis through the 1950s and 60s.

The 1970s saw the first resurgence of the club and by the early 1980s the club shared its home with the local rugby club at the King George V playing fields. When high-level floodlights were installed at the KGV fields in 1991 the cricket club was again moved to another location at the Myre Park. As this is a public park it was decided by the local council to install an artificial wicket between the existing football pitches. During the 1990s the club continued to play regular friendly fixtures under the guidance of John Stewart, Richard Oldham, Ken Reilly and Julian Foster. The club also undertook several cricket tours and a picture of the Somerset County Ground at Taunton hangs in the club pavilion as a souvenir of one trip.

As the club moved into the early 2000s the 150th Anniversary loomed and a decision was taken which would have a significant impact on the future. In next month's *Newsletter* we will look at the past 20 years which saw the club reach new levels of success and recognition.

Features FOSSOWAY Memories

IF YOU DRIVE INTO Crook of Devon from Kinross you will notice The Village Hall, previously called The Crook of Devon Institute, on your left. The community used to use the Fossoway school for the odd concert and an occasional lecture, but the village were not happy and their discontent became so great, they took steps to get an Institute built in the village. Apparently, the adults didn't like sitting on small chairs in the school!

They raised a good sum of money, but they were rather ambitious, so that the money raised was only about half sufficient to meet their scheme. Mr Moubray of Naemoor Estate generously donated the balance, and the result was the erection of the Institute with housing for a good library, a fairly large hall for concerts, lectures, and recreation with committee rooms. The village library had opened in 1890 and was originally in the school. By 1906 it had moved to the Institute and had over 1200 books people could borrow. In 1914 they were still handing out books!

The Institute was opened in 1911 by Miss Moubray of Naemoor Estate, and in 1914 it was handed over to Red Cross as a convalescent hospital for injured soldiers & sailors in the war.

Directly opposite the Crook of Devon Hall is a house called 'Clentry'. Mr Drummond who was the village policeman. He retired early due to injuries he received during the First World War and built the house. He named the house after Clentry Burn in Kelty which is where his wife came from. Behind the house they had a run where they kept 400 chickens. The house became the village shop and villagers remember buying eggs wrapped in paper, long before egg cartons. You could also buy four sweeties for a farthing – those were the days! Lots of the children would visit the shop after school while waiting for the bus for home. The building is now a private house.

Behind 'Clentry' was the Crook of Devon Railway which opened

in 1863 and closed in 1964. The field where the tractor is working is now replaced with houses aptly named Drummond Park. Prior to this it was allegedly also used as a putting green for tourists.

OVARIAN CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

EACH YEAR 7400 WOMEN are diagnosed with ovarian cancer in the UK, but most women are still unaware of the symptoms to look out for. Target Ovarian Cancer is a UK charity which works to improve early diagnosis. It also funds life-saving research and provides support to women with ovarian cancer. Their awareness campaign this month is aimed at increasing knowledge amongst women of the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer. Ovarian cancer cannot be detected by the smear test, so it is essential for women to know more about it so that they can raise any concerns as soon as possible with their GP or practice nurse.

The symptoms of ovarian cancer are frequent (they usually happen more than 12 times per month) and persistent. They include:

- · Persistent bloating not bloating that comes and goes
- Feeling full quickly and/or loss of appetite
- Pelvic or abdominal pain (that's your tummy and below)

Milnathort and Orwell Community Council

News from the January Meeting

Present At The Meeting held on 12 January 2023 were M Thomson (chairman); N Bingham, A Macrae, K Heneghan, P Britton, A Wanless, Cllrs W Robertson, Cllr R Watters and 5 members of the public.

Apologies were received from A Ward, Cllrs N Freshwater and D Cuthbert.

Police Report

Traffic Statistics

Community officers are aware of regular areas where there are complaints about speeding in and around Milnathort. These are all on our speeding matrix and we will continue to make efforts to carry out speed checks across the area during our patrols.

Traffic units from Perth have also been carrying out regular speed checks in the area and have issued tickets over the last month for speeding and various other road traffic offences.

From 8 December 2022 there have been 24 calls to Police from the Milnathort area and 3 crimes recorded on Police systems.

Parking outside Milnathort Primary School(MPS)

Cllr Robertson has received complaints about parking outside MPS, the police had spoken with the school but although it has been busy of late, no one has been parking illegally. He suggested that the school look at the Safer Routes to School initiative and it was also mentioned that some schools in PKC have implemented an exclusion zone which can be looked at but may have an impact on surrounding areas and roads.

Matters Arising

Windfarm Application.

A windfarm application has been submitted for the Brunt Hill area, see link to the pre-application: www.energyconsents. scot/ApplicationDetails.aspx?cr=ECU00004654

There is very little information available other than what is at the above link, as more information becomes available, we will schedule to discuss and share at forthcoming MOCC meetings.

Loch Level Pollution

Cllr Robertson raised a motion with PKC which was passed unanimously, the leader of the council will write to the Environment Minister to ask that they do whatever is necessary to help identify and stop/control what is adding to the increased pollution of the loch and impact the loch's water quality. Cllr Robertson was not happy with a previous response where it was mentioned that there was no issue and actions had already been implemented on land management and the sewage discharge into the loch. SEPA are not taking records but were asked to give a report on what is going on.

Cllr Watters mentioned that Scottish Water have budget to add telemetry to monitor waste discharge. Adding that Linda May was at the last Climate Café and has over 47 years of collecting data on the Loch. Malcolm (CC) mentioned that he would ask Linda about attending a future MOCC meeting.

Q. Are other community councils discussing this issue?

A. Yes, a number of other community councils are discussing this.

Previous Actions Damaged Wall At Burleigh

Kevin (CC) previously wrote to the landowner about what can be done to repair the wall, however has not heard back.

Lathro Footbridge/New Path In Need Of Repair/Damaged Gate Cllr Watters previously contacted Persimmon but has not heard anything back, so will contact them again with an update Wester Loan signage

Cllr Freshwater contact PKC and they have added the request to improve the signage at Wester Loan junction with North Street/Manse Road to the open list of outstanding road improvement requests.

On 24 January 2023 for a period of one day to allow Scottish Water to repair ironworks.

Core Paths

Kevin Heneghan gave the following update :

Jobs for the next few months include filling in depressions in the Core Paths that can form large muddy puddles. The location of these have been noted and infill has been ordered and will be deployed over the winter/spring months.

Another job for the winter is erecting new Core Path way markers and replacing old or missing ones.



Community Council News

There are a few areas where bushes and branches need to be cut back and these will also be tackled over the coming months.

Comments and Questions

An audience member asked about the meeting on the BCA planning application for a retail park. Cllr Robertson responded that there is no application at present and Cllr Watters commented that the expectation is that the planning application will include a road to the loch as was previously agreed. The planning application timings are most likely to be governed by when the flood defence improvements are planned/implemented.

It was also asked whether MOCC were invited to the meeting. MOCC were not invited, as this was an application in the Kinross Community Council area.

It was commented on that ClIr Cuthbert asked about whether there was any impact on housing. An audience member asked the ClIrs why they don't ask this for previous planning application, specifically the Aldi planning application. ClIr Robertson responded that questions of those sorts have been asked in the past, but not normally at a public meeting.

Councillors' Reports

Clir Robertson: mentioned Glenfarg Oil Buying Syndicate. Glenfarg locals that pool resources so they can purchase oil for their houses at a reduced rate, and whether this was worth looking at something we need to look at setting up for local residents.

Potholes are not great in our area, however Fife is worse, if you do see any please contact ClIr Robertson to raise with PKC. **Clir Watters**: all but one application to the Community Investment Fund has been approved and the interim report on the Kinross-shire Local Area Committee has been shared with the ClIrs, although it is the interim, the feedback is positive with some areas for improvement highlighted. The consultant leading the report has been speaking with Community Councils for input. MOCC are yet to be contacted. It is important to keep this committee going as it will only increase the benefit to the community in the long run. ClIr Cuthbert is the convener and ClIr Watters is the Vice-Convener.

MOCC Chair

After a number of years of being the MOCC Chair, Malcolm Thompson has decided to stand down, all the MOCC members would like to thank Malcolm for his tireless work in the role as MOCC chair. Malcolm will continue as a member of the community council. Neil Bingham has kindly volunteered to take on the role of chair which was agreed by all members of the MOCC.

Neil thanks Malcolm for all his hard work and looks forward to serving as the new chair and will start to reach out to other Community Councils and organisations.

The next meeting of Milnathort and Orwell Community Council will be held at 7.30pm on Thurs 9 March 2023 in Milnathort Town Hall.

Police Report

The police sent apologies for not being able to attend the meeting in person and sent a list of local incidents of note from the previous 4 weeks. The police report has no crimes of note since the last FDCC meeting on 6 December 2022.

Community officers are aware of regular areas where there are

complaints about speeding in and around Fossoway and have added these areas to their speeding matrix as well as continuing to carry out speed checks across the area during patrols. Since 6 December 2022, there have been 12 calls to the police from the Fossoway area.

Matters Arising Road Safety in FDCC Area

(Including A977 Mitigation and Carnbo)

PKC provided the FDCC with a list of outstanding work in Kinrossshire; following discussion at the FDCC meeting in November 2022, the FDCC have proposed a matrix to categorise the work and used this to prioritise the list provided. The prioritised list was made available at the meeting for CCIIrs and MoP, who were asked to email any comments to the FDCC.

PKC provided an update as follows:

The lowering of the speed limit at Carnbo, from 40mph to 30mph, was identified as a community priority at the Ward meeting with the Kinross-shire Councillors. PKC reported on 9 Dec that they are working on the creation of this Traffic Regulation Order (TRO). It is anticipated that this will come into effect from April 2023.

The FDCC and residents of Carnbo reiterated that despite this being due for completion in March 2022, it had still not been carried out and should therefore be a priority.

There are also three outstanding projects from the A977 Mitigation Measures programme in the vicinity of Crook of Devon/Drum.

The two priority projects (as agreed with the PKC Cllrs and FDCC) were the signalisation of the School Road junction and the realignment of the A977/B9097 junction. The traffic signals were reported to be installed at School Road, (FDCC note: this has not yet been done) and there is still work to be done to complete the footway links. The junction realignment project still has to be designed and costed. To date, PKC have not had the staff resources to progress either of these schemes as resources have been directed to other priorities of work. It is hoped that these can be delivered in the next financial year. Upon completion of these two projects, and provided funding was still available, the third project was to be undertaken; this involves the signalisation of the Drum crossroads, the removal of the Puffin crossing (as a pedestrian phase would be incorporated within the traffic signals) and a reduction of the speed limit from 40mph to 30mph.

FDCC and MoP note: concern has been raised about the loss of the existing pedestrian crossing as there is no footpath on any section of the roads at the crossroads so adding pedestrian lights to crossroads will make it less safe for children crossing to get to school – this was one of the main purposes in putting in the pedestrian crossing in the first place.



MoP and FDCC are of the opinion that these projects need their priorities to be reassessed, so urgent projects can be completed without waiting for others to be completed first.

FDCC have compared the update from PKC with the minutes from Kinross-shire Area Committee and the prioritisation matrix (which has been discussed in previous FDCC meetings) to identify dates for completion of projects and priorities.

FDCC are due to meet with CPKC representatives later in January to discuss progress and appropriate prioritisation for all these issues and will report back at the next FDCC meeting.

Speeding And Transport Issues

The Speedwatch project is progressing, albeit very slowly. The local sergeant has informed the FDCC that CCllr Duffy has to visually confirm that the photograph is of a particular person, and then the sergeant or the community police officer have to sign off that they know CCllr Duffy. The police apologised for this extra bureaucracy.

In March 2023 the FDCC will find out if we have been awarded a grant for the Speedwatch equipment.

Safer Cycle Route Between Crook Of Devon And Kinross

There is a call for the setting up of a paths group in Fossoway and there is money, help and equipment for loan available.

This would be a group that keeps paths open to the public by cutting back vegetation and generally improving accessibility of our walkways. The cycle path from Aldie Road to Drum and the 'Walk Around Lovely Crook' both have overgrown vegetation and would be good candidates for such a group.

Recently a member of the public approached us with ideas and questions for bus transport; she purported to be interested in cycle routes. We have invited her to follow that up.

FDCC are looking for volunteers to take the lead on this (contact Cllr Robertson for details)

Brunt Hill Wind Farm

On 14 November 2022, Epower Limited on behalf of Brunt Hill Ltd (the Applicant) submitted a request for a scoping opinion from the Scottish Ministers for the proposed section 36 application for the Brunt Hill Wind Farm. The proposed development is for 26 wind turbines with an estimated blade to tip height of 220 metres and associated infrastructure, located approximately 4.5km north-west of Kinross in the planning authority area of Perth and Kinross Council, in line with regulation 12 of The Electricity Works (Environmental Impact Assessment) (Scotland) Regulations 2017.

The FDCC has been given the opportunity to respond to questions posed by Brunt Hill Ltd on the scoping document for Brunt Hill Wind Farm (Oct 2022) by 9 Jan 2023. In the past we have objected against all and any turbine planning application on the grounds that the cumulative effect of turbines is never taken into the equation.

FDCC have drafted a response to this scoping proposal; a version of this was shared and discussed at the meeting, and comments from MoP present were included in the response. Once this summary response has been submitted, it will be shared on the FDCC Facebook page and on noticeboards.

Proposal For New Woodland

RTS Forestry have a scoping proposal for new woodland at Barnhill. The 32.5-hectare site will be mostly diverse conifers with some native broadleaf species. The FDCC is broadly in agreement with this proposal

Drum Flooding

CCIr Bruce-Jones reported that after the most recent heavy storms there was significant flooding on local roads (A977 and B9097) and all surrounding fields.

Drum residents have been cleaning their own ditches and machines have been spotted sucking up sewage from some

sites, but the roads aren't draining well and hold too much surface water.

After these storms no properties were affected this time and whilst ditches and burns are all extremely high, they appeared to be coping. There have also been reports from residents in Drum around issues with sewage.

FDCC will contact residents who have reported this and contact SEPA and Scottish Water around mitigations.

Crook and Drum Growing Together

The community orchard is progressing well, and lots of work has been carried out to plant native plants to make the site a haven for pollinators. The next stage of planting trees will be done in March.

Community Council Business

Appointing Associate Members Of The Fdcc

Angus Cheape (with a special focus on the Kinross-shire Committee Fund) and Carol Farquar (with a special focus on Crook Moss travellers site) were appointed as associate members of the FDCC.

Meetings Attended

CCIr Marchant attended the engagement meeting with PKC CEO Thomas Glen and his Snr Officers in Kinross. FDCC were disappointed to see that they were the only community council present alongside other community organisations e.g. KYTHE, Broke Not Broken and other charities.

The focus of the discussion was on transport infrastructure, building sustainable communities, engagement with communities and communication. The PKC team will discuss these topics further. There was also a discussion on the evaluation and operation of the Kinross-shire Committee; in particular how this worked with respect to the Local Area Partnership and the Kinross-shire and Glenfarg Stronger Communities. There was a view that boundaries and responsibilities were unclear and that for the Kinross-shire Committee to continue and to be more successful a stronger framework was required.

A decision on the future of the Committee will be made by the end of the financial year. It was evident that PKC Officers would find it challenging to support all of the committees/partnerships.

Councillors' Reports

Clir Richard Watters reported that PKC are seeing a significant deficit on the budget over the next 3 years which will have a substantial impact on the services which are delivered. PKC officers are working hard to minimise the impact of this budget deficit.

Planning Applications

The FDCC were not notified of the submission of any new planning applications.

Community Council News

Planning Decisions

22/01791/FLL Renewal of permission 19/01568/FLL (alterations to garage) Larch House, Carnbo, Kinross. Application approved, FDCC had made no comment.

22/01577/FLL Siting of 2 storage containers, Land 50 Metres South West Of Cairnwell, Drum. Application was refused, FDCC had made no comment.

Planning Appeals

21/02133/AML Erection of 10 dwelling houses, 6 garages and associated works (approval of matters specified in conditions of 18/01855/IPL) Land 70 metres west of Innerdownie, Crook of Devon. PKC have advised that they will forward all representations to the DPEA. CC has already objected to the planning application and has chosen not to add any further comments.

Development of LDP3

CCIIrs Duffy and Marchant have started engaging with PKC around development of LDP3, and further engagement with the community will commence in spring 2023, starting with the community development trust. This is to ensure that there is engagement with local residents to establish what the local communities need (engagement will be carried out with the primary school, Crook Moss travellers site etc)

LDP3 is due for submission in 2026.

AOCB

The FDCC were approached about the A823 to Muckhart road with the complaint that it was overgrown and the vegetation encroached on the road. CCIIr Duffy recently saw that there has been some work done.

News from the February Meeting

Present: CCllrs S Bruce-Jones, T Duffy, N Marchant and G Pye; Cllrs D Cuthbert, N Freshwater, W Robertson and R Watters; 35 members of the public (MoP).

Apologies: CCllr F Hansraj-Jackson; Assoc. CClrs C Farquar and A Cheape.

Major Announcement

The Blairingone War Memorial has finally been moved to its new location at the back of the Church yard, after a tireless campaign since 2002 by ex-Cllr Mike Barnacle. All present expressed their congratulations!

Police Report

The police sent apologies for not being able to attend the meeting in person and sent a list of local incidents of note from the previous four weeks: A housebreaking at Gartwhinzean Farm, and a driver charged for failing to stop after an accident. Roads Policing Officers recently held a day of action around Loch Leven resulting in 21 vehicles being stopped.

CCllr Cheape reported that an incident of sheep worrying was attended by the Police and swiftly handled.

Matters Arising

Road Safety in FDCC Area

(Including A977 Mitigation and Carnbo)

CCIIrs Duffy, Bruce-Jones and Marchant together with all four local CIIrs attended a meeting on 13 January with PKC's Officers to discuss the outstanding issues. The Officers stressed the extreme budgetary and staffing constraints they are working under. Currently the focus is working on the review of all the temporary TROs that were put in place during Covid and then they will start to process all the 40 to 30mph TROs. As part of this process the Carnbo change will be actioned. Allowing for the length of the various approvals required, it's hoped that the Carnbo signage would be in place by June or July, but more probably by autumn. PKC Officer Daryl McKeown committed to keeping the CC updated on progress. The Carnbo Traffic survey has been ordered and the CC members reiterated the need to do this during Dollar term time.

CCllr Duffy reminded the meeting of the need for volunteers to join the Speedwatch programme.

Of the original budget for A977 mitigation of £600k, only £190k remains, which will not be enough to complete all the originally planned measures. The signalisation of the School Road junction in Crook of Devon is planned to take place in either the Summer or October school holidays. The work is estimated to cost £150k and hence will use up the majority of the remaining budget. The CC members proposed that the Drum A977 traffic signals would be the next priority with the realignment of the A977/B9097 junction being reconsidered later.

Cllr Robertson commended the CC Members and his colleagues for progressing these issues. He added that Road Safety is a massive issue for PKC and although there is budget, there is a shortage of resource with a recruitment ban in place.

Cut-Out Cops

The CC has identified a supplier approved by the Police and will act as a common route for purchase to minimise shipping costs. Community groups need to raise the funding (£85 each) and identify people responsible for putting the signs out and in at night – they need to be strengthened and locked to a solid object! The Police recommend changing the location at frequent intervals. Contact the CC via the usual email address to place orders – see the CC's FB page for details.

Community Speedwatch

Volunteers are needed! Teams of three people are required to operate the equipment.

Brunt Hill Wind Farm

Details of this were included in the recent *Kinross Newsletter* – a consultation will be held in due course.

Galileo – Craighead Wind Farm

Members of the project team attended this meeting to give an overview of the project, which is currently at the scoping phase, with the report due to be submitted this month. Note that although this site is adjacent to the Brunt Hill project discussed last month, the two projects are not connected. As this scheme is intended to generate over 50MW, in the same way as the Brunt Hill scheme, it falls outside the normal planning process, but will be governed by a 'Section 36' application which is decided directly by the Scottish Government, intended to be submitted in 2024. Cllr Cuthbert explained that PKC's Planning Committee are statutory consultees to these applications and will submit their opinion to the application, consequently Cllrs Cuthbert and Watters will not be able to make any public comments to avoid invalidating their membership of the Committee.

Galileo is an Italian company formed in 2020 but the Edinburgh office is staffed by people with longer experience of projects in this area. The Project Manager explained that following a hiatus in onshore wind development, there was now UK and Scottish governmental pressure to dramatically expand wind generation to stabilise the availability of power and move towards net zero. All the 'easy' sites had already been developed and it was now necessary to consider sites at higher altitudes and with larger turbines (in excess of 200 metres high) in order to catch enough wind to make the site economic. Further, with only European suppliers of turbines currently operating, there is no availability of smaller turbines anyway. This site would have about 12 turbines of this size.

The company proposes to make an annual community grant of £5000 per MW of installed equipment, anticipated to be £360,000 per annum for each year of the windfarm's lifetime, and to offer opportunities for community investment in the scheme and hence to share in the profits. The 10km radius area surrounding the site covers several Community Council areas so it would be necessary to identify how any grants were

distributed. There will also be a Construction Fund to address impacts of the construction process. The presenters stressed the company's desire to work with the community.

Questions were then taken from the floor: How will effect on Loch Leven be mitigated? Nature Scotland and SEPA will review. Are individual properties compensated? Not the norm in Scotland. Previously the Friends of the Ochils have successfully defeated wind farm developments as an area of great landscape value? Pressures from government and energy crisis may be considered more significant. Why is this project right next to another one? That's the way it works – companies strike deals with landowners of potential sites – there's no overall planning; Scottish Government will decide which ones go ahead. How will the hill be accessed during construction? From the east of Carnbo.

If there are any further questions from the Community they can be submitted to the CC's email address and answers will be provided in next month's meeting.

Fossoway Area Transport

Kinross-shire Transport Forum has not met recently so no update. Cllr Cuthbert highlighted the Glenfarg Community Bus, which they are keen to develop. Stagecoach are interested in supporting Community Buses as a way of feeding passengers to their hubs.

Consultations

Your Police 2022-2023: https://consult.scotland.police.uk/ strategy-insight-and-innovation/your-police-2022-2023/ Closes 31 March 2023. The CC will respond, but individuals should comment too. The consensus is that the police are resource-constrained but do what they can well.

New Business

Local Place Plans

CCIIrs Marchant and Duffy have attended meetings with PKC in relation to LDP3 and will partner with the Community Development Trust and PKC to develop Local Place Plans. PKC is keen to lead on engagement with youth, elderly and travellers, with the CC supporting. The CC will lead on the development of Local Place Plans.

Community Council Business

Meetings attended

Road Safety Officers as described above; **CCIIrs Duffy and Marchant** attended a meeting on 25 January with PKC Officers about Engagement with Children.

Councillors' Reports

Clir Robertson reported a complaint about long-term parking outside the shop in Crook of Devon. PKC Officers had suggested that the CC had been against restricting this in the past, but no one present could remember that. There seems to be some confusion about the route and location of stops of the 202 Bus Service.

Clir Watters reported that PKC are seeing a £20m deficit on the budget with no obvious way to clear it. The Scottish Government has given PKC permission to refinance and change accounting methods to help.

Clir Cuthbert noted the intention that the next Kinross-shire Local Committee would be hybrid, i.e. part physical presence and part online.

The CC objected on grounds that conditions associated with the prior application (22/00541/FLL) had not been met. However the PKC Planners informed the CC that this was not a material objection.

22/02064/FLL Erection of two dwelling houses at Land 15 metres north west of Ivy Cottage, Gartwhinzean, Road Powmill. The CC Objected as contrary to Policy 1B – Placemaking.

22/02090/FLL Change of use, alterations and extension to agricultural building to mixed classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 and 10, formation of parking area and associated works at Solsgirth Home Farm, Solsgirth, Dollar. The CC made a supportive comment.

22/02232/FLL Erection of two dwelling houses and associated works at Land 50 metres south-west of Barnhill Farm, Powmill. No CC Comment.

Present At The Meeting: held on 13 December were Cllrs D Cuthbert, Cllrs A Miller (Chair), D Morris (Vice-Chair) and 6 members of the public.

Post Meeting Note: It appears that there were some people who had issues accessing the Zoom link for the CC Meeting. PCC apologise to anyone who had problems and weren't able to attend. The Chair and Secretary had attempted to ensure there were no issues and had tested the account and access prior to the meeting. Everything appeared to be in order in advance. PCC will try to ensure a similar situation doesn't arise again.

Post Meeting Apologies for access problems were received from Cllr W Robertson, Cllr A Davidson (Treasurer) and Cllr D Paterson.

Matters Arising

Kinross-shire Local Committee (KLC) update

The Chair advised that he had been unable to attend the recent KLC meeting but that the Vice Chair had stood in. The Vice Chair advised that he was again unable to participate in the meeting proceedings due to technical issues. The most significant item arising was that PKC Roads Department had advised that with over 900 road traffic and safety projects to deal with, only the top three projects from each CC area would be prioritised. The Chair advised that despite previous PKC agreement, the minutes did not appear to have been circulated.

Road Safety Action Update

The Chair opened the minute item by advising further contact had been made to PCC from the residents of Bowhouse, who were concerned that no action appeared to be forthcoming in respect of the temporary traffic speed restriction order to 40mph (Scotlandwell to Bowhouse) which was ratified and agreed at the inaugural KLC meeting. Several Bowhouse residents had joined the meeting and Cllr Cuthbert confirmed he had received the email from the Chair to all Cllrs regarding the item. The Chair expressed disappointment that despite numerous requests for programme updates from PKC Roads, no updates had been received and that it should be a comparatively simple exercise to erect standard speed reduction signage. There similarly did not appear to be any progress on the A911 Route Action Plan, also agreed at the inaugural KLC. The Chair voiced that the limited devolved powers to KLC was one of the petitioned successful outcomes of the Committee, but that perception was increasing, questioning whether the KLC had any actual powers. The Chair apologised that the prioritisation of the PKC requested Road Safety items had not yet been subject to PCC agreement however, as the neither the Bowhouse TTRO or the Wester Balgedie VAS appeared on the list, further clarification was required in respect of the requested prioritisation. Cllr D Cuthbert advised that the reason that the latter two projects may not appear on the listing is that they are already scheduled for action. The Cllr also stated his disappointment at the current status, however the issue was not funding but resourcing. This had been a frequent discussion between the Cllrs and had been escalated to the Chief & Deputy Executive at PKC and a suggestion had been made that the works should be 'outsourced'. Cllr Cuthbert agreed to pursue the outstanding road safety issues with Head of Roads to try to obtain programme update for report at the next CC meeting. Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path: The Chair advised PCC were still awaiting response from PKC Officers Daryl McEown and Dave Stubbs regarding an 'agreement in principle' in respect of the path route and fundamental feasibility of the speed mitigated crossing points as detailed in conjunction with the proposal. The Chair confirmed he had received a land ownership plan for the upper route section and was trying to obtain details for the lower section. The Chair confirmed that the path was one of the three priority projects agreed by PCC members and asked if the Cllrs could pursue the relevant personnel for a response.

Play Facilities At Scotlandwell Green

The Chair was unaware of any communication in respect of the play facilities and hoped upgrade would still happen within this financial year.

Phosphate Addition To Drinking Water Within Loch Leven Catchment Area:

There was substantive discussion in respect of this item. Cllr D Cuthbert confirmed that a PKC-led meeting had taken place at which both senior members of Scottish Water and SEPA were in attendance. This was to discuss the specific problem of increased phosphate load and pollution of Loch Leven. It was acknowledged that a number of primary contributory sources were of consideration (development wastewater, agriculture, drinking water, overwintering wildfowl). The Vice Chair expressed surprise that the Local CCs had not been invited to the meeting, which had been requested on a number of occasions. While previous studies suggested the principal pollutant contribution was from boundary agricultural practice, recent studies note a direct relationship between increasing development and documented pollutant load. The Chair noted that infrastructure improvements of the principal wastewater treatment plants has not taken place despite massively increased development, particularly in Milnathort and Kinross. Current SEPA policy permits the discharge of untreated sewage effluent to watercourses and Loch Leven during storm overflow events. It is clear that the current service infrastructure is at capacity, and significant changes to Planning gain/approval status are required to control discharges. Cllr Cuthbert advised that Scottish Water phosphate addition at source as pre-dosing to mitigate potential effects of lead pipework and lead uptake to domestic supplies, was national applied policy. The Chair advised that it seemed an absurdly heavy-handed measure given the likely instance of lead pipes in local communities and was extremely prejudicial to private treatment plants and schemes which are experiencing problems meeting SEPA discharge targets, such as those previously minuted at Wester Balgedie. The Vice Chair suggested that voluntary changes to farming practice concerning set-aside at boundaries adjacent to Loch Leven may be required to assist run-off and wind-blow control. The Chair suggested that a fundamental examination of planning permission and supplementary treatment plant upgrades is necessary to attempt to control pollutant load. It was advised that PCC had been contacted by Milnathort CC with a view to potentially for the Loch Leven Action Group to discuss the specific associated issue. It was suggested however that this was, and should be the remit of the KLC in precisely addressing issues of local importance.

Police Reports

The police liaison officer had sent a report to the Secretary. The only item of relevance to Portmoak was an incident of fire raising at a public bin in Kinnesswood, necessitating attendance by Fire Services. Two male youths were seen leaving the scene.

New Applications

22/01958/FLL Installation of solar panels: Craigard Main Street Scotlandwell. Last date for public comments: Fri 23 Dec 2022

PCC: No Comment or representation

22/01829/FLL Extension to building to provide staff showers and toilet facilities and formation of access ramp, Loch Leven's Larder, Wester Balgedie, Kinross. Last date for public comments: Tue 13 Dec 2022 PCC: No comment

22/01723/FLL Alterations and extension to dwellinghouse, alterations to wall to form vehicular access/parking area and associated works Briarbank, The Cobbles, Kinnesswood Kinross. Note: Last date for public comments is past, but PCC have been granted an extension to represent the community following the PCC meeting on 13/12/22. PCC had been contacted by a number of local Kinnesswood residents regarding the application. The lodged plans did not appear to be in keeping with the surrounding properties on the Cobbles or the restrictions placed within the Conservation Area. It was also felt that the proposals would over-develop the site with property heights, development footprint and proposed access all cited as concerns.

Existing Applications

(a) 22/01191/FLL Erection of 16 dwellinghouses (3 with detached garages, one with detached garage/ancillary accommodation), formation of 6 plots for affordable dwellinghouses, formation of SUDS pond, landscaping and associated works, open for comment. Land 100 Metres South East Of Cragton Villa Rost Gardens, Scotlandwell. There was no further update on the status of this application.

Planning Decisions

Progress with Developments

Westfield Community Liaison Committee: No update was received in respect of the Liaison Committee. The Vice Chair did however comment that he believed community projects and individual organisations within Portmoak could possibly apply and benefit from the 'Wind Energy Project' funding which permitted individual applications for up to £2000. Additional details would be sought and provided in due course. Westfield Paths Feasibility Study: Monday 14/11/22 in-person meeting. The Chair and Vice Chair attended this meeting. A detailed feasibility report (Commissioned by Hargreaves) was presented which presented a Paths 'deliverability' schedule for a number of priority routes connecting the communities. An Action Group had subsequently been formed with single representatives from each Community Council area, with a view to driving and coordinating collective funding applications and to prioritise the most deliverable routes. The Vice Chair agreed to act in this capacity on behalf of PCC

Paths Group Update

Cllr D Morris advised there had been limited activity over the past month due to the weather.

Treasurer CC Accounts

The Treasurer had been unable to join the meeting. It was agreed by the ClIrs and CClIrs present that the accounts could be added as a post meeting notification. These were subsequently advised as:

MBW account. Balance: £1523.00. No transactions in last few weeks. CC Account Balance £299.51.

Councillors' Reports

Clir D Cuthbert reported on a number of items of consideration in Kinross-shire:

It was advised that PKC currently estimate a 'budget black hole' of £30 million. Cllr Cuthbert suggested there would be inevitable cuts to public services as a result.

A presentation had been made to PKC from a prospective developer of the British Auction Car Site at the south end of Kinross. The proposal included for the potential for 3 retail outlets, including Marks & Spencer, B&M and LIDL and a fastfood drive-through-style outlet. The proposals also sought to generate a direct access to the pier and improvement to the flood defences on the southern aspect of Kinross. It was suggested that central Government funding was available in terms of the flood defence upgrades.

Housing Allocation & LDP: Cllr Cuthbert advised that there had already been significantly more housing allocation and development in Kinross/Milnathort than that programmed in the LDP. Indeed, the number of houses was several years ahead of the allocation programme. While this does not specifically impact on PCC area, for the reasons cited earlier in the agenda concerning pollution of Loch Leven and demand on servicing infrastructure, it is deemed of local significance.


Current projection forecasts suggests that completion of the currently approved development schemes will place Kinross High School at 117% of capacity. This does not include other schemes currently in pre-application or planning consideration. Cllr Cuthbert also highlighted potential issues with the capacity of the doctors' surgery and the possible requirement within the immediate area for a small hospital to accommodate the local demand.

The Chair thanked Cllr Cuthbert for his report and noted the relevance of the projects to both PCC and the wider Kinrossshire Community. Given the oversubscription of the LDP locally and the issues which are consistently being raised regarding lack of infrastructure improvements in line with the development, increased developer responsibilities should be applied to all applications, and should include Scottish Water and SEPA.

News from the January Meeting

Present At The Meeting held on 24 January were CCllrs L McKay, (Chair), W Freeman, H Phillips, E Leslie, M Wilson and C Collins, Cllrs D Cuthbert, N Freshwater, W Robertson and R Watters, one member of the public and Mrs C Aird (clerk). Apologies: CCllr T Stewart and PC B Samson.

Police Report

PC B Samson was unable to attend the meeting but had forwarded a report which provided an update on incidents in the area since the November meeting.

24/11/2022: No MOT/Insurance (High Street, Kinross) reported to the Procurator Fiscal

29/11/2022 – 30/11/2022: Theft by housebreaking (Gallowhill Rd, Kinross) Subject to live investigation.

20/01/2023: Theft from a handbag (Sainburys, Kinross) Subject to live investigation

CCIIr Freeman advised that the community officers were aware of the areas where there are complaints about speeding in and around Kinross. While these have all been added to the speeding matrix, the community officers will continue to make efforts to carry out speed checks across the area during our patrols.

Traffic units from Perth have also been carrying out regular speed checks in the area and have issued tickets over the last month for speeding and various other road traffic offences, while Officers from the Roads Policing Department recently engaged in a day of action in January 2023 around Loch Leven. Enforcement was carried out in areas including Kinross, Milnathort, Portmoak, Scotlandwell, Crook of Devon and Gairneybank. In total, 21 vehicles were stopped and issued with warnings for the following offences:

- 4 for speeding
- 2 for light defects
- 1 number plate offence

In addition, one driver was reported for having no insurance and the vehicle owner was charged with causing and permitting the offence.

Since the last meeting, there have been 184 calls to police from the Kinross area with 36 crimes recorded on police systems.

The Kinross Community Policing Team have been carrying out regular patrols in Burnbank Meadows, Gallowhill Road, Springfield Road, Argyll Road and the area of The Green Hotel in Kinross as a result of complaints being made about youths involved in anti-social behaviour and causing a public nuisance. On several occasions, youths have been identified and dealt with accordingly by officers. Regular patrols of these areas will continue.

The CC thanked Police Scotland for their informative update.

Matters Arising

Hayfield Community Wildlife Garden

CCIIr Phillips advised that there was funding available from a restoration fund from PKC, but this required to be matched. It was therefore up to those in the group/school to decide what they wished to do with the garden before funding could be sought. CCllr Phillips will continue to research funding opportunities meantime.

CCIIr Leslie suggested asking the school PTA, Boy's Brigade, Brownies and Guides if they would like to get involved with CCllr Collins suggesting approaching the Rotary Club for funding.

Road Safety Issues

While the list had been forwarded to members, CCllr Mckay agreed to resend this with a request for comments as a matter of urgency.

Springfield Road

Cllr Robertson had advised that he had not yet received a response and will chase this up again if nothing had been received by the end of the week.

Kinross Town Centre

Cllr Cuthbert advised that a walkaround the town centre had taken place and that suggestions for improvements, along with the results of the 2022 survey would be circulated as soon as possible. He requested that if there was anything that the CC wished to add to the list, then this would be the opportunity to do so. CC members were concerned with the amount of traffic manoeuvring through the town centre and asked for this to be directed away. Traffic monitoring and speed restrictions were also suggested.

Cllr Cuthbert confirmed that PKC had agreed to a give way junction at Burns Begg Street.

Cllr Robertson commented that there was a lack of parking in the town centre, with Millbridge car park always being full, and cars parked all day. He suggested the creation of a shortterm car park.

Another concern was the bollards and while they were not the best, it was noted that residents at the new flats are now spraying areas for bollards to be placed.

Members were advised that the people involved with the purchase of the BCA site would be attending the next meeting.

Designated Bathing Site – Loch Leven

CCllr Freeman advised that an email had been received from the office of Mark Ruskell - the Scottish Green MSP for Kinrossshire who has recently called on the Scottish Government to consider designating Loch Leven as a designated bathing water sites in order to trigger action on water quality. CCllr Leslie commented that she felt that there would be definite interest in this but that people should not be encouraged to swim in the loch at the present time.

It was agreed that the CC would invite Mr Ruskell to a future meeting to discuss the matter further, with CCllr Phillips writing to Mr Ruskell, enclosing a copy of the letter recently sent to SEPA.

Councillors' Reports Cllr W Robertson

Vehicle Activated Signs: A member of the public raised the issue of VAS in Kinross, specifically Gallowhill Road, stating that having spoken to a member of PKC they had been advised that there would be no VAS in Gallowhill Road for several years but that two would be implemented in The Muirs and on the road from Milnathort. CCllr Mckay advised that pre-pandemic it had been agreed that there would be eight VAS in the town, of which one would be sited in Gallowhill Road. There was a long discussion on this topic and Cllr Robertson suggested that one of the proposed VAS be moved from Broom Road to Gallowhill Road. Cllr Cuthbert is to email Blair Watt at PKC with his suggestion.

Cllr Watters advised that it had been a condition of the planning process that Persimmon Homes would fit traffic lights at the School, and this should have been triggered when residents moved into homes in Phase II.

Heritage Trail

Clir Robertson advised that work to upgrade and repair the Loch Leven Heritage Trail will take place from 1 February to 30 April 2023. During this time sections of the path will be closed between Kirkgate Park and Pow Burn (below Loch Leven's Larder) with diversions being put in place when necessary.

It was noted that the TPO in respect of Sunny Park woods has now been progressed, and any objections should be submitted. Volunteers are required to join the Paths Group with CCllr Phillips advising that an article had been placed in the next edition of the Newsletter. Anyone interested should contact Cllr Robertson direct.

Clir R Watters that a new campaign had been launched in order to reduce the impact caused by cars idling. It was noted that PKC follow the four Es approach – engage, explain, encourage and enforce - when reminding drivers they need to switch off their engines. While idling will be permitted in certain circumstance, e.g., defrosting a windscreen, the new campaign will see parking wardens asking drivers to switch of their engines if not moving and explain why it is harmful to leave it running.

Clir D Cuthbert advised that he was now Convenor of the KLC and he would be looking to make the group more community friendly during his tenure.

CCIIr Freeman advised that an email had been received from the Dog's Trust advising that their fostering scheme (where unwanted dogs are placed into temporary homes with foster carers, until a new forever home is found) is now active in Perth and Kinross. Tuesday 28 March, St Ninian's and Loch Fitty



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
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
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Kinross in Bloom

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

Raingardens Update

February is a busy month with restoration work at three wetlands along the Kinross raingardens trail at the end of the month. Volunteers are welcome for some planting in March, and we also hope to put some interpretative signs up in March.

We've had good discussion with the High School Geography department for a modest project to try some raingarden work there too, and at the museum/library on the campus to give the Raingardens Community Award a home.

Scottish Ministers' EIA Decision – Miller Homes

After several postponements, in February the Scottish Government issued its decision as to whether Miller Homes need to carry out an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for their proposed development north west of Davies Park. This followed a request by the developer's agent, who disagreed with Perth & Kinross Council's opinion that an EIA was necessary.

The Scottish Ministers decided that the 160-dwelling development 'would not be likely to have a significant effect on the environment and therefore an EIA will not be required', overriding the opinion of PKC.

The Trust is disappointed at this decision by Scottish Ministers. An EIA would have provided a more thorough understanding of the potential environmental effects prior to considering a planning application.

The Trust remains concerned at the deteriorating quality of the water in Loch Leven, a Special Protection Area. We believe there is a correlation between the state of the loch, which receives waste water treatment plant discharges, and the increase in house-building in recent years.

The Scottish Ministers' reasoning checklist said that Scottish Water must ensure that the discharge from the proposed development would "not cause combined sewage overflows to overflow more regularly" yet, according to reports from local councillors of a meeting held with Scottish Water and others in December, Scottish Water do not keep full records of such overflows.

January proved to be a popular month for our coffee mornings with a number of new faces which was great to see. This has meant we have been able to send a good sum of money to our charity of the month, African Promise.

This is a small charity working to improve the quality of primary school education in rural areas of Kenya. A total of 6000 children have benefited since starting in 2008 and there are now eight schools in South East Kenya. Water supply is now provided as well as textbooks, furniture and at least one good meal a day. Money is also funding teachers' salaries and the upgrade of the fabric of the school to create a safe and conducive learning environment.

A project Lunch is due to take place on Tuesday 21 March at 12 noon. A speaker from The Nora Docherty Foundation will give a talk and slide-show. This is a Scottish charity which started in 2007 by building a primary school in rural central Malawi. It is supported exclusively by Margaret Cummings, her husband and family and is named after her mother, Nora. There were 750 pupils, eight teachers with eight classrooms. Now there are 25 teachers, 2500 pupils, plus a nursery for 100 children, alongside an antenatal and pre-5 clinic on the campus.

of the young people of Kinross-shire. Details of weekly activities, ad hoc events and mobile KYTHE visits can be found on our website and social media.

On 7 February we welcomed Ana de Miguel, PKC Waste Minimisation Officer who came back to our group (her first visit was back in



September 2021) to talk to us about kerbside recycling and upcoming changes in PKC recycling strategy.

As before Ana's talk was very interesting and well-illustrated, highlighting important aspects of recycling at the local council level. It was interesting to learn that there are a few high street recycling bins coming to the centre of Perth.

Another new development to the current blue-bin content is the inclusion of plastic containers that 'hold their shape' as opposed to soft plastics (the latter can be recycled at Sainsburys). Also, coloured wrapping paper (without foil or glitter) can be now added to the blue bin.

The upcoming changes will include:

(1) Deposit Return Scheme: deposit of 20p will be added for every drink container (plastic, can or glass bottle) excluding milk. The deposit will be claimed back on return of the empty container to the seller.

(2) Every household will receive a new bin (probably grey) in addition to the blue bin. So plastics/metals will be separated from paper/card. This is to reduce recycling costs.

We were delighted to welcome back a fantastic team of staff and volunteers from NatureScot in January, to help with the ongoing work of pulling birch saplings out of Portmoak Moss.

It's really tough work so we were especially pleased that, after doing it for a day last year, they were prepared to return for another onslaught. Altogether, there were five volunteers and two members of staff from NatureScot and five members of the Portmoak Community Woodland Group.

It's amazing how much work you can get done with a dozen folk – and how much fun it is.

By the end of the session we had crossed from one side of the bog to the other and cleared trees from 800 square metres of ground, as well as partially clearing another 200 square metres.

If you're walking the circular path round the Moss look out for the big heap of brash which was created, on the northern side of the main peat dome.

The aim, as always, was to take away the young trees, which draw too much water from the raised peat bog, and to provide a better habitat for sphagnum moss, which eventually rots down and creates more peat – as it has been doing for thousands of years on this spot.

Simon Ritchie, Nature Reserve Officer from NatureScot's Loch Leven Nature Reserve, said: 'We do a little lowland heath restoration, which requires pulling out young trees, but nothing on this scale.'

He was full of praise for the task force: 'We have a hardy, dedicated bunch of volunteers who help us with a lot of habitat management on the reserve and it's great to spread our resources onto other local community projects.'

PCWG can only agree and thank them wholeheartedly for the tremendous effort they put in. We hope it won't be too long before we see them again.

Meanwhile, if you're up on the hill, in Kilmagad Wood, you should be able to spot more work carried out by PCWG in the community orchard. We'll be pruning the apple trees and planting half a dozen new ones, in a special compound, provided by Woodland Trust Scotland. This is designed to keep the deer out – as they're thought to be less likely to jump into a small space.

Fingers crossed for the success of the trees and for another good crop in the orchard this summer.

Lomond Antique and Collectors Club



The club met on Wednesday 15 February for a talk entitled, 'Hopetoun House through 20 Objects,' presented by Mr Ian Low. Mr Low, for many years the Head Guide at Hopetoun, presented us with a pictorial guide of the grounds and house pointing out just 20 of the most interesting or intriguing artefacts and features.

We began at the Robert Rowand Anderson designed Main Gate which featured curved quadrant walls with Tuscan columns, crowning vases and a wrought iron over panel bearing the family crest. The gardens had a pair of non symmetrical Egyptian Sphinx sculptures (made of lead) denoting wisdom, one of which guarded the end of the famous William Adam Ha Ha (sunken wall or fence) at the east lawn.

Inside the house we saw a maquette of a sculpture of John Hope – the 7th Earl of Melbourne (later 1st Marquis of Linlithgow). Set on horseback the full sculpture is now in Australia. An elaborate Italian table with a Florentine Petra Jura top with the base made in Bologna showed Mermaids wrapped around the legs, each with two tails.

The Garden room featured a Dutch bracket clock from the early eighteenth century showing the day, month and phases of the moon and featuring a display of moving musicians that played one of a series of six different tunes on the hour. In the Library, once home to over two thousand books, an Italian/Tuscan Dictionary dated 1623 is the second edition of a work displaying the written Tuscan language for the first time in history.

In the State bedroom a grand four-poster bed by Scottish furniture maker James Cullen and carved by Samuel Norman thought to have been obtained by the family following the cancellation of an order by an initial purchaser. The staircase



displayed a classical mural and decorated ceiling and a Trompe l'oeil depiction of a cupboard on which the doors appear almost in 3D. Next we saw a picture of two leopards in fine silk embroidery thought to be Japanese and purchased from Liberty of London. A work of exceptional quality.

A bedroom was home to engraved plates depicting the management of horses in fine detail including actions to be employed when horses were involved in wartime action. The Library featured a screen made up of botanical prints by Dr Robert Thornton each, unusually, showing background images of the environment where they would be found.

The yellow drawing room was graced by a large work thought to be by the 'Old Master' Peter Paul Rubens and also contained a Turkish clock by French Makers 'Roy et Fils.' This interesting piece with cloisonné enamel had two dials, one with Roman and the other Turkish script numbers. The clock, wound by a single mechanism, was placed in front of a mirror so that both faces were visible.

Two beautiful bow fronted commodes by James Cullen featured in the Drawing Room, unusual in that the items were side opening and fitted with drawers.

A pure white marble fireplace by William Adam (father of Robert Adam) is adorned with two sculptured figures each facing outwards, but angled away from the front of the wall and the Dining Room has items of early Meissen white, hard paste porcelain decorated with flowers, cherubs and even a cockroach.

The final item on our tour was the Craighall Eagle taken back to Hopetoun House from Ceres in Fife when a house there was demolished.

Ian Low offered us much more than a 'shopping list' of antiquities, his talk was liberally sprinkled with facts, anecdotes and displayed the huge breadth of his passion for the subject.

LACC next meet on Wednesday 15 March for a talk entitled' 'Edinburgh - The Walled City' by Mr Graeme Cruickshank.

Probus Club

The club welcomed Ken Blacklock who gave us a fascinating talk about the Paddle Steamer *Waverley*', the world's last sea going paddle steamer.

Built in 1946 as a replacement for the original *Waverley*, which was sunk during the Second World War at Dunkirk, Ken gave us an insight into his lifelong involvement with this old lady of the sea, and especially the trials and tribulations of keeping a ship like the *Waverley* seaworthy. The beating heart of any ship is her boilers and the *Waverley* has had to undergo many repairs and boiler replacements over the years.

Each of these episodes has brought many challenges, financial, engineering, and staffing, and more than once the *Waverley* looked doomed as costs rose and owners forced to make difficult choices.

One example was in 1973 when the then owners Caledonian MacBrayne decided to remove her from active service and have her become a static restaurant and museum. Thankfully within a year a new organisation was formed 'Waverley Steam Navigation Company' and she was bought for £1. There followed some major repairs and she set sail again in May 1975.

Ken offered us an insight into the dedicated work carried out over the years by a volunteer workforce who every winter spend hours and hours maintainer the ship and getting her ready for the sailing season.

But there comes a time when a ship like the *Waverley* begins to show her age, and hard decisions have to be made. By the mid 1990s continually escalating maintenance costs and new marine safety requirements were threatening the ships long term future, and it was decided that she needed a complete rebuild. After an intense period of fundraising the work was carried out in two stages over the winters of 1999-2000 and 2002-2003, with the main contractor being George Prior Engineering of Great Yarmouth.

Twenty years on and the Old Lady is still sailing, summer trips down the Clyde, another boiler refit in 2020, coping with the challenges of Covid, but especially, bringing a smile to everyone who sails on her.

Ken has clearly spent a lifetime working on, caring for and promoting the importance of maintaining this fragile treasure we call the '*Waverley*'. Many thanks.

President Linda Martin welcomed John Noble and Brian Fraser to our February meeting, from Blood Bikes Scotland, a voluntary organisation and independent charity. Members were astounded to learn that in 2022, the Borders region alone handled 8000 calls to carry blood (or specimen/tissue samples) from hospital to hospital or laboratory and in addition, patient notes, patient belongings and medication between hospitals or to the patient's home. Other examples included larger items like heart monitors, zimmer frames and parts for ventilators and smaller items such as teddy bears, scales and dietary feeds. This represents an annual saving to the NHS of £260,000 but just as important is the saving in time. Across the Scottish regions, there are 179 volunteers

and the monthly cost to maintain the motorcycles, tyres, insurance and fuel is around £5000.

A touching example of the importance of speed was that while an operation was being carried out at a hospital in Leeds, a sample was sent by Blood Bike to a laboratory in Dundee, the result analysed and fed back immediately to the surgeon, who could then complete the operation.

Members were thrilled to be invited to sit on the Linda Martin, Club President

polished blood bikes. They are electric vehicles, with a range of 100+ miles and ideal for short journeys. There are 16 bikes, for the Lothians, Fife, Forth Valley, Tayside, Aberdeen, Inverness, so UK coverage is from John O'Groats to Land's End. The bikes have tracking GPS, satellite navigation and and cameras for safety. The other, unseen, side of the service is the controllers, who work from home, taking calls from the NHS Flow Centre and there is also IT support. They operate on a three rings system and volunteers choose their shifts each week, committing to at least one shift per month. finding out more about Blood Bikes Scotland, please email johnnoble@bloodbikesscotland.co.uk





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Out & About



NatureScot Loch Leven NNR



WE HAVE MADE IT through winter, folks! We are now into meteorological spring! Although March weather can be a bit of a gamble, will we see a mild start to spring? Or a 2018 beast from the east March... time will tell. The wildlife are all geared up for spring. Look out for ducks pairing up and displaying, mute swan holding territory and the mighty grey heron which can be on eggs in late February!

A fantastic early spring milestone, is the song of the skylark. This beautiful song is one of the greatest and is certainly one of my favourites. It is a very intense, and chaotic song with lots of whistles, chirrups and rolling notes. Often you hear the song as the bird ascends, beating their wings extremely fast (12 times per second) until they are tiny spec in the sky and you can just make out the faint, chaotic song. Just wonderful! Skylark are ground nesters and often nest in field margins, often farmers can leave 'skylark plots' which are areas of grassland that aren't cultivated in the middle of the field. Look out for these birds around agricultural areas.

I often see my first butterflies in March. Usually this is a scraggly small tortoiseshell or peacock that has spent the winter hibernating. March is a good time to spot more uncommon butterflies, like the comma. It's a great time to hunt for early butterflies as there aren't many flowers for them to feed on. Look out for lesser celendine, daffodils, hazel flowers and winter aconites in flower in March!

We will start to see our first summer arrivals in March too! Late March can be good for the first osprey arriving. They have spent the winter in West Africa and start their migration to Europe in March. If we are lucky, we can also spot the first hirundines to arrive to the UK (sand martin and swallows). Sand martin are normally the first seen. Last year I saw my first sand martin of the year on 23 March. They also migrate from West Africa and spend the breeding season in Europe.

Look out for tree bumblebee if the weather is mild. These recent colonisers to UK soils are now a frequent sight in Scotland, even though they were only first recorded in 2013. They are easily distinguished by their orange thorax and white tail. Latest wildlife highlights from the reserve include; drake smew, brambling, 10 greater scaup, nuthatches, wintering green sandpiper, 10 shelduck and a short-eared owl.

Do keep on the lookout for the first butterflies on the wing, first osprey fishing, first sand martin or swallow soaring and do let us know your wildlife sightings!

Spring On The Wing

AS WE BEGIN THE transition out of winter, it's amazing to see and hear so many signs of spring starting to appear. With delicate snowdrops sprouting up along the pathway and the sound of many birds singing as they warm up their voices in preparation for the breeding season. We have been hearing the chirpy sound of skylarks out of the reserves, as well as a lot of different tits, wren, song thrush and goldcrest in the woodland. In terms of sightings, we have been seeing a good number of wigeon and teal in the pools and there have been a few pintails about too. A couple of egrets have also been showing well in front of the hides which has definitely been worth a watch. Other highlights this month include a large flock of curlew, fieldfare and yellowhammer along the Heritage Trail and some sightings of a short-eared owl and hen harrier were seen slightly earlier in the year.

Out on the reserve our warden team have been carrying out work to try and get ready for the fast-approaching breeding season. They have spent time topping some rush to ensure the nesting habitat for lapwing is in good condition, repairing our predator fence, brush cutting, sowing wildflower seeds in the meadow, controlling gorse along the loch shore and creating some temporary pools for wintering ducks and waders to utilise. Although it seems busy now, this is just the start of what is to come to make sure our lovely lapwings are happy.

In the world of events, we are looking forward to our second Optics Weekend on Saturday 4 and Sunday 5 March, 10am-4pm. Why not pop along and speak to our experts about what binoculars and telescopes would work best for you and see if you can spot any 'Nature Wows' this year?

For daily adventures, why not come along and see what you can discover in our ponds by hiring a pond dipping kit for just £3? Or why not go on an exploration with our explorer backpacks for only £3 and see what birds and beasties you can find on our spotter sheets?

Did you know that we also offer adventures for schools with our Schools on Reserves programmes? From discovering pond and land minibeast, to learning all about the adaptations of our brilliant birds and how to use our senses to work out which season we are in – our hands-on, curriculum linked adventures are perfect for early and primary years! Farming

IT'S A SOURCE OF pride to me that I can shine the spotlight on others when writing this farming column so I'm delighted to give Dora Smith of Holton Farm, Milnathort the focus for this month.

Dora met me for a cup of tea to chat about all things farming and tell me of her new role as President of Kinross-shire Agricultural Society (KAS), which runs Kinross Show. Before we'd even got the tea poured we were comparing notes on lambing tips and how to catch and coup a ewe safely, now that we're not as fleet of foot. We both studied agriculture at college, albeit a while ago, and agreed lambing is a favourite time.

After over 20 years as a receptionist for the local vets which fitted round bringing up her children, Jennifer, Gregor and Bruce, Dora then started up on her own, offering her diverse set of skills to support farms and estates. 'Many rural businesses only need extra assistance during the seasonal peaks, so I set up Scotsmiths Rural to help them at these busy times", she says. 'During winter, I'm up in the Ochils at least two or three days a week, always with my springer spaniel, Craig, (aka Princess!) or Paddy lab we work as part of a team helping local gamekeepers. During the rest of the year, I'm usually outside or helping out at a local kennels, so I get plenty of fresh air and time spent with dogs,' she adds.

It's no surprise Dora has such an affinity with the countryside when you hear her tales of growing up on a hill farm on the Cleish Hills. 'My Dad came from Northumberland to Scotland to Shieldbank at Saline to help his uncles at lambing time in 1934 and never left, later taking on their hill farm at Outh in his own right, his priorities being good husbandry, traditional livestock farming, herding and good dogs. Everything was out wintered, the Blackface ewes were bred pure and we crossed our small herd of Galloway cows with a Whitebred Shorthorn to produce hardy, growthy Blue Grey calves, it was a traditional hill farm and was a great place for my brother and I to grow up.' She continues, 'Dad trained a lot of sheep dogs, competing regularly at trials such as Glendevon and Kinross, so my early years were spent with collies and their pups, and as I grew so did my responsibilities. I'd often be sent out on a pony to check the ewes, I'd always make sure we climbed right to the top of the park hill, from there I could see the whole of Kinross-shire, a wonderful view and it always seemed to be a bit sunnier looking across to Loch Leven.'

It was joining Kinross Junior Agricultural Club that led to

Dora's initial involvement with KAS when she was invited to join the show committee in 1987 as the young farmers' representative. 'Being tasked to come up with the main ring entertainment we devised games to round off the day in front of Kinross House." Since then she tells me she has joined her husband, Dan, helping out in the sheep sections, firstly with the Texel breed, covering for then President, Willie Stevenson, followed by a stint overseeing the Shetland section. In 2006, the Arts and Crafts Marquee was launched, a few years later, Dora moved to co-ordinate the traders and enjoyed her time in this area. With her good friend, Lynn Ballantyne, the duo introduced a gun dog scurry, this is an exciting dash for a canvas dummy, the winner being the dog with the fastest retrieve, it was popular with all breeds and showcased an often unseen part of rural life.

Dora's experience spans all aspects of farming and the countryside and she concludes our chat by explaining this is how she hopes to shape Kinross Show.

"I love to see the community of Kinross-shire coming together at Kinross Show, the lives and livelihoods of our area are intertwined and that's why its so important we can all share a fabulous day out."

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Gardening

Spring Greetings!

WELL, THAT'S ANOTHER WINTER almost over. This time last year I wrote this first column of the year while it was snowing – it's a bright crisp morning here, just what you want for late winter/early spring.

I'm already underway with the sowing of some seeds for this year. I know it's early, but some plants take longer than others to mature and grow in our fairly short summers. So far I have chilis, snapdragons, brachycombe and carnations – first time growing carnations, so wish me luck!. All of the seed packets say to sow from January to March, so I figured February was a safe bet.

After the problems I had with germination of seeds last year, I decided to invest in a bag of seed compost this year. It seems to be working well but I have a question. I usually tell when trays need watering by the weight of the tray, but seed compost seems to have sand in it so it's heavier. So... how do I tell when they need watering? It's a dilemma, I may have to re-sow a couple of things due to over watering but hey, we're constantly learning, right?

Some of you may remember I also had problems with my baskets last year and vowed to get some decent compost this year. Luckily, I had a birthday in January and requested 10 bags of Miracle Gro compost. I have high hopes, but we'll see how it goes.

This year I've decided to go for plug plants for my baskets and pots. I got in early enough to get some good deals and they should start arriving the second half of March. They'll just need potting up into the greenhouse, watered and fed and planted out at the beginning of June.



I also have lots of seeds for the taller flower bed plants. This year I've gone for phacelia, dill (the flowers are gorgeous in vases), sunflowers, nicotiana, rudbeckia, briza grass, corncockle, cornflowers and cerinthe. If successful, these will also be used for cut flowers too. As usual, Higgledy Seeds are the source of cut flower seeds... it's one guy and his dog who live on a narrowboat, what's not to like?

I've also decided this year to completely dig out one of the borders in my front garden... the existing plants have weeds growing through them and it's just a bit of a mess. I love the tubs that Milnathort in Bloom have at the Cross that have grass-

es and lavender in them so I have decided this is the way to go. Both plants are in the greenhouse ready for me Snapdragons by Maia C, Flickr

to get my backside in gear and start digging – I'll keep you updated.

I'll also need to empty a couple of tubs of lily bulbs as I noticed they were a bit overcrowded last year. No, I didn't label them for easy identification but I 'think' I remember which ones they were!

So, the next few weeks will be a mixture of clearing out dead stuff from last year, sowing seeds (probably mid-March) and digging. Happy days! Have fun whatever you're doing – and welcome to the new growing year!

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The Sky Above Us



THANKS TO READER CAT SCOTT for sending us this photo of colourful Nacreous clouds above Kinross. According to the MET office, 'Nacreous clouds form in the lower stratosphere over polar regions when the sun is just below the horizon. The ice particles that form nacreous clouds are much smaller than those that form more common clouds. These smaller particles scatter light in a different way, which is what creates the distinctive luminescent appearance.'

ALAN TOLD THE *NEWSLETTER*, 'My camera is a Fuji xt30 with 70-300mm zoom lens at 300mm with a 1.4x tele-converter so 420mm focal length.

'The Moon is tracked with the *Move Shoot Move* star tracker to keep it in the centre of the frame. Once aligned with the North Star (Polaris) using a laser a total of 250 24Mp images are taken using 1/60s shutter speed and an aperture of f13. This gives about 11Gb of data.

'The individual images are then rated using a software package called PIPP to pick the best and clearest images and filter out any poor images. The best images as decided by PIPP are then stacked together in a software package called AutoStakkert. This aligns all of the images before taking the best pixels of each and combining them into one large image.


'That image is then taken into Adobe Photoshop for post processing editing to highlight the colours, enhance the details and contrast etc. The final image is a clear and detailed photo which shows the moons surface and also the minerals on the surface of the moon show up as different colours.






