

From January we will be starting a three-to-six-month pilot of an extension to the 55-bus route. The extended daytime service will be running hourly from Kinross, through Milnathort, Glenfarg and Bridge of Earn to Perth, where we will serve a range of stops including the station, leisure pool, hospital and retail park in addition to the City Centre.

We are therefore recruiting.

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NEW HORIZONS FOR THE GLENFARG BUS



AFTER GETTING OFF TO a great start in 2023, the new year brings a number of exciting developments for Glenfarg Community Transport. In January, the 55 Bus will start to run an extended hourly service between Kinross and Perth via Glenfarg and it is hoped to deliver the same benefits that the Glenfarg to Kinross route introduced - reliability,

punctuality, friendliness and inexpensive travel. Like the shorter route, the Perth service will be flexible and in due course, offer a wider range of destinations in Perth.

The new service will be run as a pilot for 3-6 months to allow GCTG to trial a few innovative solutions for public transport. For the first six weeks, to allow the service to bed in, it will be run as a traditional bus service.

In March, however, it is hoped to start the trial of a flexible service using the MooveFlexi passenger App which will allow passengers to book a trip, pay for a trip via the App, watch the

progress of the bus with a real time tracker and receive updates if the schedule should slip.

It is hoped that the 55 will connect with the Ember E1 service and run to Perth destinations such as the Railway and Bus Stations, Leisure Pool, PRI, The Retail Park and Mill Street Bus Interchange.

Cllr Neil Freshwater commented, 'Glenfarg has been doing amazing work with the new bus service which has won national acclaim, and it's great to learn of the expansion. It's also exciting to hear that they may pilot an app which could make the service even more responsive and convenient for passengers.

Cllr Cuthbert said, 'I am really pleased to see this new route being taken on ... I wish them well with it. As for the new technology, I think this will be fantastic once it works!'

A telephone booking service will continue for those who do not have access to smart phones. More information about this development will follow in the February Newsletter, the new website Glenfargct.co.uk and the GCYG social media channels.

SECOND CHEMIST FOR THE HIGH ST?

PROPOSALS ARE AFOOT for a new pharmacy to open on Kinross High Street.

NHS Tayside is currently in discussion with Kinross Pharma Ltd who wish to open a new community pharmacy at 145 High Street (next to Mark's Barbers).

Before Kinross Pharma Ltd submits a formal application, a joint consultation exercise is being carried out to seek the views of people local to the proposed premises, or those who might use the proposed new pharmacy.

The consultation aims to measure opinion on current access and adequacy of provision of pharmaceutical services in the 'neighbourhood' where the premises are situated. The consultation is aimed at gauging the level of public support

for this proposal. Views are invited from those living in the area or who may use the proposed pharmacy. There are eight easy questions to answer including:

Do you think that the current pharmaceutical services being provided in the neighbourhood, are adequate?

Do you think there are any gaps/deficiencies in the existing provision?

Do you think that the proposed opening hours are appropriate?

PKC: MISTAKES HAVE BIN MADE

CONFUSION HAS GREETED the announcement that medicine blister packs cannot be put in the new grey bin, despite leaflets from Perth and Kinross Council saying that they could.

The information was incorrectly printed on documents that went out to householders.

A spokesperson for PKC told the *Newsletter*, 'We had thought that medical packaging included blister packaging. However it has been clarified that blister packs are not an acceptable item in the grey bin and should be placed in the green bin, or can be taken to Superdrug for recycling.'

Superdrug pharmacy stores have dedicated collection boxes which are collected by Terracycle. They will not, however, accept bulk drop offs. The nearest Superdrug pharmacy stores are Perth and Glenrothes.

Whilst some blister packaging may be branded as recyclable, blister packaging is made of composite materials which cannot be extracted by the machinery at the processing facility. However, until 15

January, grey bins will not be rejected by PKC if they have blister packs inside them, and the packs will go to an Energy from Waste facility — they will not be landfilled.

Cllr Freshwater said, 'Kinross-shire residents were glad to learn they could recycle blister packs in the grey bins, so it's disappointing to learn that's not actually the case. There has been quite a bit of confusion over this and the miscommunication from PKC, albeit well-intended, is regrettable.'

Cllr Cuthbert said, 'I was hugely disappointed when I heard the news that blister packs cannot be recycled in the grey bins.

'What's worse is that people have been told that they can be. Clearly a mistake which needs sorting out'.

KYTHE GET £90K LOTTERY FUNDING

KYTHE IS CELEBRATING AFTER learning they have been awarded £90,000 in National Lottery Funding to support its work with young people.

The Kinross-shire based charity plans to use the money for a three-year programme of drop-in, workshops and activities for young people aged 11-19. The programme will include Dropins, Study Support Sessions, Job Club, Cooking Skills, Life Skills Workshops, Youth Band, Woodwork and Art. These all contribute positively to young people's mental health, wellbeing and employability skills.

KYTHE has grown in size since it was formed in 2014 and now supports over 360 young people. Barry Dougall, youth worker, told the *Newsletter*, 'We are delighted. Now we will be able to further develop our team to offer a variety of groups across Kinross-shire for young people to meet in a safe, informal setting.

'This is important because it puts young people at the centre in a non-judgemental environment to be challenged, supported and also to relax and socialise.'

The new funding from The National Lottery Young Start Fund, will see KYTHE be able to reach more young people that are



struggling and provide support to help young people reach positive destinations, such as re-engaging with education, going to college or getting a job.

John, volunteer said, 'It's a privilege to be part of a team working to see young people happy, relaxed, and comfortable. It's genuinely satisfying to be part of such a joyous environment.'

NET ZERO AT ORWELL FARM

IN LIGHT OF THE UK's aim to achieve Net Zero by 2050, businesses are taking greater steps to run their operations in an environmentally conscious manner. This can range from using electric or hybrid business vehicles to altering business practices to incorporate recycling.

However, for one Scottish architectural practice, their solution was to create their own net zero rural office for themselves and other SMEs who shared their environmental ethos.

Orwell Farm was purchased in 2019 by Jeff and Lynsay Manson who wanted to create an inspiring, sustainable rural office space for

their architectural practice, Studio LBA.

Although disused for many years and in a state of disrepair, Orwell Farm presented the perfect opportunity to create a sustainable, environmentally conscious development. The Studio LBA team approached the project with a focus on reusing the existing agricultural buildings, minimising waste, and utilising locally sourced materials and trades. This approach was initiated from the design stage and has led to a successful and sustainable outcome, achieving carbon neutral in the EPC ratings.

In order to ensure long-term sustainabil-

ity, the project was strategically designed to include integrated carbon zero technologies such as ground source heat pumps and solar PV. This allowed for the provision of all heating and electricity to the farm solely through renewable resources. Additionally, the car park features multiple electric vehicle charging points for both staff and visitors.

Jeff Manson, co-owner of Orwell Farm commented 'Our vision was to create a sustainable space where a community of businesses can all work, grow and thrive together and we're continuing to work towards that.'

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SARAH RANKIN COOKS



AFTER THE hectic nature of the festive season and the inevitable comedown that New Year never fails to bring, soup can never fail to fill the soul and I have a couple here that feel like a warm hug. First up is a sweet and fragrant beetroot version that's sure to satisfy. I

use fresh beetroot which is incredibly affordable and those you'll find in the supermarket at this time of year are almost always locally grown. You can of course use the ready cooked variety, but be sure you avoid those in vinegar. Using the ready to eat beets will take some

of the messy prep away, and you might find that avoiding the bloodbath that your kitchen will resemble after peeling the fresh ones is well worth the extra cost. Whatever you choose, you'll come back to this recipe again and again as its so simple and easy.

BEETROOT SOUP

You Will Need:

(Serves 2)

1 leek, finely sliced

1 small onion, finely sliced

2 garlic cloves, finely sliced

1kg beetroot, peeled and diced

11 vegetable stock

1 bramley apple, peeled and grated

1 cinnamon stick

1 bay leaf

1 clove, crushed

4 or 5 juniper berries

1 star anise

2 cm of fresh horseradish, peeled and grated

Olive oil for frying

Fry the leek, garlic and onion in the oil slowly over a low heat so they cook gently and do not colour. This helps to bring out their natural sweetness and enhances the flavour of your soup, so please be patient. Add the spices and allow them to fry for a minute or two before adding the grated apple. Stir those together and add the beetroot and stock. Place a lid on top and bring to the boil. Once boiled, turn down to a simmer and leave to gently cook for 45 minutes.

Allow to cool a little and stir around to find the anise, juniper berries, bay leaf and cinnamon stick and remove them. Add the grated horseradish and blend well. Serve with a dollop of crème fraiche and some peppery leaves like rocket or nasturtium.

The second soup is the perfect way to use up your leftover cheeseboard into a rich and velvety cauli cheese soup with the crunch of fried shallots.

Sarah's Soups



CAULIFLOWER CHEESE SOUP

This will serve 2 comfortably:

1 cauli, cut into florets

1 small leek, white part only, finely diced

1 tbsp butter

1 tbsp plain flour

200g cheese (any hard cheese you like)

100ml milk

100ml veg stock

White pepper

Salt

1 shallot finely sliced

1 tbsp seasoned plain flour

Vegetable oil for frying

Steam the cauliflower until tender, drain and set aside.

Cook the leek in the butter until very soft and translucent. Add in the flour and make a roux. Add in the milk to make a white sauce. Add in the cheese and stir until completely melted. Add in the cauliflower and the stock and cook for a few minutes more. Add salt and pepper to taste and leave to cool.

While the soup has cooled enough to blend safely, toss the finely sliced shallots in the seasoned flour and fry in batches in hot oil until crispy. Dry on kitchen paper.

Blend the soup and check the seasoning when it's cool. Reheat and serve with a sprinkling of the crispy shallots and a little extra grated cheese.





CATCH THE LATEST NEWS

AT THE TIME OF writing, COP28 has just completed, mentioning fossil fuels for the first time, but only with a weak call for reduction. This is despite us nearing the end of the hottest of the last 100,000 years and with broad climatic impacts of greenhouse gas emissions plain to see. Collectively we need to do more..

The Scottish Government is responding more urgently, recognising that voluntary measures to shift away from fossil fuels are too slow. The proposed Heat-In-Buildings (HiB) legislation is now out for consultation, targeting one of the main sources of emissions, which will enact legal requirements to invest in efficiency upgrades and replace polluting fossil fuels-based boilers, affecting all householders and businesses.

anticipated by many, the first strand of action relates to energy efficiency of buildings. EPC rating will be extended; not a perfect way of measuring efficiency, but it does currently exist as a mandatory approach. From 2028 (i.e. less than 5 years away), private landlords will be required to meet the minimum energy efficiency standard of EPC C, equating to a space heating energy need of less than 120kWhr/m2/year. For private dwellings this implementation deadline will be extended to 2033.



For many this will require access to grants and loans. Given the range of build standards, this will be, for some, a long and expensive journey. ScotGov talk of working with mortgage companies and other financial institutions to make access to funds easier but, in the current cost of living crisis, this will challenge the budgets of many households. Perth and Kinross Council (PKC) estimate over £900 million pounds is required to upgrade the county's properties.

The second strand of action embodied in the new law relates to mandatory replacement of fossil fuel-based boilers. Following purchase of a home, there will be a limited grace period where the new owner must eliminate a polluting heating approach. This will likely affect house prices where the change has not already been implemented. All buildings will need to eliminate polluting heating by 2045.

In other words, the carrot didn't work too well, so the stick is coming out. The shift to clean energy will be expensive with adaption costs falling primarily on individual consumers, now with legal consequences for non-compliance with HiB.

Another element embodied in the HiB proposal relates to District Heating Networks (DHNs). Heat Networks provide an opportunity to decarbonise faster, with reduced impact and efficiency requirements for the connected buildings. ScotGov is keen to increase the number of networks quickly and are implementing a licensing scheme to protect consumers. Every council has been asked, as part of its Local Heat Efficiency and Energy Strategy (LHEES), to identify heat zones in suitable locations. We have one proposed by PKC in Kinross, centred on the High School and swimming pool.

Where a formal heat zone exists, the HiB proposal suggests that businesses and new builds should be mandated to connect. Also, homeowners with a connection option would be given the choice of connecting to the clean source or investing in short

order in their own individual solution, although the DHN ought to provide the most effective answer with minimal impact. This becomes a legally enforceable way of assuring enough connections to the DHN to be economically viable. If connected EPC upgrades, (and household funding thereof), would not be required, but optional. Regular readers will recognise that there have been many recent articles about district heat.

Networks in this Newsletter

CATCH Loch Leven, as a community organisation, has been exploring the potential and opportunities of such a system to serve

the whole community of Kinross and Milnathort. Useful progress has been made on several fronts, including:

- CATCH is now written into the PKC LHEES strategy, adopted by the Council in November.
- We are actively participating in dialogue on various sub-programmes within PKC.
- We have clear support to push on from our local Councillors, Community Councils, Mark Ruskell MSP and a range of community groups.
 - As a new communi-

ty-oriented model, it might be applicable in other towns across Scotland.

Historically, there are many examples where, in times of change for our utilities, monopoly rights have been granted to big companies with remote shareholders. This results in profits, from meeting basic needs in the community, being extracted and removed.

The Danish, who are experts in DHNs, have a long-established approach which avoids this, delivery high quality service with strong local accountability. In Denmark there are some 327 local energy COOPs, owned by the consumers of heat, which as non-profit organisations, reinvest any surplus in improving the service, or reducing prices further.

This gets to what seems a crucial point; that of community wealth. If we act together then we can have a DHN:

- Of broad reach, bounded by the motorway and 30mph signs, accessible to all.
- Operating solely for the benefit of residents and businesses in the towns.

Without a strong collective response, and either no local DHN or one optimised for maximal profit for shareholders, the risk is of increased burden applied to individual families and small businesses, where our wealth is siphoned off as a significant part of monthly bills.


The door is open with PKC to grow their initial low ambition here. We are not central Perth, or the area of most challenging deprivation, though do have a relatively high emissions output.

CATCH is working to increase the priority for action here. For this we need your support. Evidence of engagement across the community is fundamental to investor confidence. With a single voice we can grow the ambition to reduce bills and carbon emissions, but also build community wealth and the wellbeing of all who live here.

KIM GOES TO DOWNING ST

KIM STOKES, a veteran based in Kinross, is a volunteer at the military charity 'Salute Her UK'. Their free service supports female veterans who have been sexually assaulted or abused while serving in the Military. They offer trauma-informed support, with qualified therapists.

Salute Her UK believes that women veterans are often marginalised and frequently ignored. They advocate for compassionate services, treatment and care.

Of Lord Etherton's LGBT Independent



Review* (an Independent Review into the service and experience of LGBT veterans who served prior to 2000) Lord Cashman KC said '...It is a most informative, extremely disturbing, and at times, appallingly repugnant read.'

Since the review was released, many gay women have come forward to report rape and sexual assault. Many cases were not reported out of fear, say Salute Her UK, and if they were, they were swept under the carpet.

Recent newspaper reports have brought this to the public's attention e.g. the recent acknowledgement by the Head of the Royal Air Force that an 'unacceptable culture of sexism, harassment and bullying' was allowed to flourish at the RAF's Red Arrows, where women were seen as 'property'**

Salute Her UK is a lead campaigner for the inves-

tigations of Military Sexual Assault to become totally Independent of the MOD and the Military. Kim herself is currently involved in creating 'safe spaces' for women. This enables them to meet up together, as part of their healing process.

Kim was recently invited to Downing Street. Here is her story.

I was delighted to be invited by The Minister of State (Minister for Veterans' Affairs), Johnny Mercer and Akshata Murty

(wife of Prime Minister Rishi Sunak) to a Military Charities Reception in the State rooms at No.10 Downing Street in late November.

After a flight down to London and an overnight stay in the Military Union Jack Club, we arrived by taxi early, so as to get through security.

The Union Jack Club is just minutes from Downing Street and a great location for veterans and their families to stay, when on a visit to the capital.

For any woman who has experienced MST there is an opportunity to spend a few days away with free accommodation, food and activities, these are currently in England in the Lake District and in Wales in Hafren Forest. This is in collaboration with Brathay Trust and Radiate Arts.

I am currently looking for people in the hospitality industry in Scotland who could offer a few days in the year, free of charge, as a donation to charity. Ideally we are looking for accommodation to suit a small


group of four to eight female guests. We keep the groups small so they can be kept safe.



Winter Festival Market

I am the Chair of the Kinross-shire Local Events Organisation (KLEO), which is the voluntary group who put on the Kinrossshire Winter Festival, the Kinross farmers'



markets, Leven Voices, Kacophony Orchestra, Comedy Nights, Burns Suppers and so on. During the planning for this year's winter festival market, we considered what we would do should the weather turn against us. One of the interesting things was that nobody suggested re-locating the event to the Campus. Which struck me as odd, until I considered all the impediments that would present. As it was, we were incredibly lucky with the weather and I think the event was generally a great success. The aim of KLEO is to create a sense of community and I think the market helped to do that.

Loch Leven Community Campus

Since being elected to Perth and Kinross Council (PKC), I have been working hard to get the facilities at the Loch Leven Community Campus better used by the community.

There are several impediments which block the use of the campus, many of which have been in existence since the Campus was opened back in October 2009. I think the Campus is currently an untapped community resource and there are a lot of things I would like to see going on there.

To give examples of these: I would love to see a community theatre group putting on regular performances in the Campus. Kinross-shire produces many talented performers and I would love to see the Campus offering a performance school using the amazing facilities it has to offer. There is a climbing wall in the campus, which is currently not in use as it requires a licence. I would love to see a community climbing club accessing this on a regular basis. Finally, I have often thought that the closure of the Perth college facility in Swansacre should have led to them moving to the campus and have wondered why constituents must travel to other places to get these services.

So, I was very pleased to learn that responsibility for the Campus buildings would be moving from the Council's Education and Children's Services to a newly configured service which will have responsibility for the whole Council estate. I attended a meeting of the Campus Management Group last week and the strategic lead for this new service attended this as well, so hopefully the transformation process is starting.

Council tax on Second Homes

At its meeting on 6 December, Councillors agreed to charge double Council Tax on second homes, once the Scottish Government adopt the legislation to do this. Other parts of the UK have already done this, as second homes cause real problems in rural areas. The council's Highland ward has almost 500 of these properties and it has led to house prices increasing to the point where locals find themselves priced out of the market. It also leads to seasonal peaks and troughs for services such as shops in the area. The council agreed to set aside £1m towards affordable housing in rural areas from the additional revenues anticipated in 2025-26 and 2026-27.

202 Bus service

I have been working with the Glenfarg Community Transport Group, who now operate the 55 bus service and do a school run for the Council. They have been doing a fantastic job, more than quadrupling the number of passengers on the route. They have also tweaked their route to allow passengers to catch buses to and from work via the Kinross Park and Ride. I believe they are now looking at changing the timings slightly so that passengers can meet the Ember service, which is moving to an hourly schedule. I think this proactive response is fantastic. Well done guys. The 202 bus service however is not working. So, I have been working with

the group and officers to see if they could take over the 202 bus service, which runs from Kinross to Dollar and Tillicoultry. I am hopeful that this can be moved forward over the next few months.

A977 Mitigation Measures

The traffic lights at the junction between the A977 and the end of School Lane in Crook of Devon have now been installed and are operating. Feedback I have received, is that the way that these lights work will need to be tweaked to make them operate effectively. Officers have confirmed that they will monitor the situation and will adjust them as required.

The traffic lights in Drum have been delayed due to the cold weather snap. I have been told that the traffic signal equipment installation is programmed to begin on 8 January and officers expect to be able to switch on the junction between 15 and 17 January. The necessary road marking changes will also be undertaken during this time.

I am disappointed that there has been a delay, but I am looking forward to the lights being installed and made operational. These lights will work in the same way as the lights in Blairingone, thereby hopefully slowing traffic through Crook of Devon.

Funding for these works was obtained by me in 2017 and I negotiated a top up at the Council's budget meeting in March this year. The work is important as the A977 is one of the busiest roads maintained by the Council, carrying more heavy-goods vehicles then any other non-trunk road in Perth and Kinross. This makes it a huge issue for residents who live near the road.

Cleish Primary School Sign

A new sign was erected outside Cleish Primary school to advertise its presence. The sign is in my view, big brash and totally inappropriate for the conservation area. The four local councillors were contacted by Cleish and Blairadam Community Council who also felt that the sign did not fit within their conservation area. I have been pursuing this issue with officers, who have now agreed to liaise with the community and to erect a more appropriate sign in the village.

Revisions to Community Council rules

Kinross-shire is very fortunate to have all six community councils (CC) operating. They do excellent work. Some wards in PKC have no CCs functioning (Perth North



and City South wards) and some have as many as many eight, with still space for more (Highland ward). Kinross-shire is also unique in having the devolved Kinross-shire Committee which devolves powers to the county and I believe helps to empower community councillors. The rules ('Scheme of Establishment for CCs') governing CCs are legally required to be reviewed by PKC on a routine basis and this was done recently and approved. Most of the changes are a tidy up, but it does modernise the wording of the rules such as allowing digital banking and online meetings. It was also agreed to remove the power for CCs to create subareas as it was deemed this can be a barrier to participation. Nonetheless, the review provides an opportunity to remind us of the great work that volunteer CCllrs do in their areas.

Town centre shops

It's great to see that there is continued demand for retail units in Kinross and Milnathort with vacant properties generally filled after a short period of time. Recently we've seen the Audrey T salon move to premises on Kinross High Street, Tartan Kipper open in the former bookmakers, and I note the vacant shop at number 145 (next to Mark's Barbers) is being proposed as a pharmacy. I think we are fortunate that while there are many other towns whose High Streets struggle, we are fortunate. This poses the question of there being enough space for all the businesses, and this will be something that will be monitored, but on balance it's good to see businesses thrive.

Another pharmacy for Kinross? Have your say

Further to the above, Kinross Pharma Ltd is considering submitting an application to open a pharmacy at 145 High Street, Kinross. NHS Tayside is consulting on the proposals and readers can have their say online at https://uk.surveymonkey.com/r/KYT7FBG. There is also a link on the NHS Tayside homepage. I presume this would be in addition to the two existing pharmacies in Kinross and Milnathort.

And finally...

I enjoyed reading the article by Jo Middlemiss in last month's Newsletter about her time in Norway and the comments about how bad we are here at speaking second languages. I agree with her. Not having the fortune of being a councillor full-time, I – like many others – have another job, which is for the local branch of a Danish company. So I can relate to Jo's comments about how good the Scandinavians are at English. Reflecting on this some time ago, it dawned on me that as nice a 'problem' as it is to have, there is no default second language for native English speakers. You could be fluent in Spanish, Polish and German, but that's useless when visiting Greece or France. This is of course a complacent and arrogant view, but it does perhaps explain our inadequacy. Former UK education secretary Charles Clarke proposed this week that we should teach languages in the same way as we do music performance, with graded exams, rather than shackle them to the school curriculum. I think this idea has much merit and might even mean some more Norwegian speakers here in Kinross (I've tried Danish and it's very hard but am told Norwegian, despite its similarities, is much easier)!

And with that, I hope you all had a wonderful Christmas and wish you a prosperous 2024.

John Nicolson, MP

Once a year, the UK Youth Parliament is invited to hold a debate in the Commons Chamber. And last week I was asked along to listen in and say a few words.

Some people say that young folk aren't interested in politics. And it's true that they can be cynical about political parties. But they care passionately about issues.



And they care about one another. The contrast between a Chamber filled with MYPs (Members of the Youth Parliament) and MPs was stark. They listened intently to other Members. They kept to time. They applauded rather than making the weird grunting noises many MPs make to denote approval.

None of this went unnoticed by the Commons door staff who have had to endure adult MP tantrums over the years. "I'd like to see this lot here every day instead" one staff member whispered to me.

Some kids were there but still questioned whether politics achieved anything. And for them I pointed to the incredible social progress we'd made against the odds. They knew about the Suffragettes and their struggles against an unyielding Establishment. But many hadn't realised the relatively recent equality laws passed to protect the rights of disabled people, and to make racial discrimination illegal. And when I told them that when I was born, gay men could be arrested for holding hands in the street there was an audible gasp.

That day's debate was about food poverty. MYPs were outraged that some of their contemporaries went hungry in this, the fifth wealthiest country in the world and there was a vehemence in their condemnation of political leaders who had presided over such inequality. Because one thing seemed to unite the teenagers who'd come together from every corner of these islands – they were compassionate.

When it was my turn to speak I knew there was one unaddressed issue on everyone's lips – the bombing of Gaza. And so I tackled the issue of integrity in politics. MPs, I argued, had seen their conscience tested in recent days. My party – the SNP – had proposed a motion supporting a ceasefire. Symbolism matters in politics. And given our role in the division of the Ottoman Empire and imperial control of Palestine we have a special responsibility to speak about promises we once made and broke.

The Labour Party leadership had threatened any of its MPs with punishment if they voted in the Commons for a ceasefire and I told the story of one of my best friends in the place — a young Labour MP who had defied his whips and was waiting to see what retribution he would face for following his conscience.

He is ambitious, I told the Chamber. But his conscience matters more to him than his career. That's integrity.

The House rose in a standing ovation. And in the days following I've had emails and Direct Messages on social media from kids across these islands – thoughtful, detailed, sensitive communications showing empathy for the students' contemporaries in both Israel and Palestine.

I hope many in the Chamber enter politics. I have a feeling our future is safe in their hands.

On Thursday 23 November, I was delighted to attend the Herald Politician of the Year Awards at Prestonfield House in Edinburgh and even more delighted to find out that the campaign of the year was named as the Public Inquiry into Professor Eljamel.



I want to pay tribute to Kinross resident Jules Rose who has led this campaign following her traumatic experiences. For the last ten years I have worked with Jules, and fellow campaigner Pat Kelly, to seek justice for the former patients of the disgraced neurosurgeon at NHS Tayside, Professor Eljamel.

Over this time many more patients have come forward. Each with their own harrowing story of Eljamel's operations and whose clinical malpractice has inflicted overwhelming pain, misery, and trauma upon his victims.

Worse still, we now know that Eljamel's butchery was allowed to continue despite warnings beyond reasonable doubt. He not only ruined the lives of patients, but their families who also had to adjust to living with the horrific consequences of his crimes.

On 7 September we eventually witnessed a breakthrough. The Scottish Government finally granted a full independent inquiry into the circumstances which allowed Eljamel to harm so many patients.

It is essential that this process can begin as soon as possible as the nature of Eljamel's crimes means many worry they will not live long enough to see the outcome and conclusion to this tragic affair.

Those responsible for this negligent lack of supervision will soon be compelled to face the scrutiny of the inquiry panel. Hopefully, this inquiry will ensure that events such as this can never be allowed to happen again.

I would like to send my best wishes to Jules and Pat who without their steadfast campaigning may have seen up to 200 patients continue to suffer in silence.


Their unwillingness to give up, despite being obstructed and knocked back at every turn, is a credit to their dedication for answers.

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
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Community Council News

Fossoway Community Council News from the December Meeting

Present on 5 December were CCIIrs S Bruce-Jones, T Lamb, N Marchant and G Pye; Assoc CCIIr C Farquhar; CIIr D Cuthbert; 12 (MoP).

Apologies: Cllrs N Freshwater, W Robertson and R Watters; CCllr A Cheape.

Declarations of interest

CCIIr Cheape declared an interest in Planning Application 23/01961/FLL.

Community Police report

An assault took place in Crook of Devon on 13 November, the assailant has been charged; A driver was charged for Drink/ Driving on the A823 by Rumbling Bridge on 25 November; Speed checks were carried out on the M90 by Roads Officers and the local perform checks as part of their normal patrols. On 24 November a driver was charged with careless driving in Powmiill; on 2 December while carrying out speed checks in Carnbo, Roads Officers stopped a vehicle the driver was found to have no insurance or licence.

Matters arising

Windfarms

CCllr Bruce Jones reported that there were 110 responses to the survey (11.7%) and they are currently being collated. There will be a public meeting at Carnbo Village Hall in the last week of January to share the responses.

There was a good representation from the various areas with 14% from Carnbo. 63% of respondents were aware of the wind farm proposal, although only 26% had attended any of the public events. A significant number of respondents (over 80%) gave detailed answers to the questions.

The Brunthill Section 36 application will be submitted shortly, the CC will receive a digital copy and a hard copy of the application will be made available to view at Carnbo Village Hall, Loch Leven Campus Library and Bell's Library Perth.

A MoP asked if it could be placed in the mobile library as well, but there isn't sufficient space and it doesn't visit all areas.

The Craighead developers had sent a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) about Community Ownership of the scheme.

The MOU states that 10% of the company will be offered to the community – but it's not clear what communities it would include. Getting an MOU signed is in Galileo's interest as Community Ownership is a key goal of Scottish Government renewables policy. CCIIr Bruce-Jones has consulted various community organisations and been advised not to sign it at this stage. Consequently the CC has replied to that effect.

CCIIrs Bruce-Jones and Lamb attended a meeting with other CCs affected by windfarms in the Ochils – this is not a forum to oppose or support windfarms, each CC retains the right to make their own decisions. The aim is to collaborate on mitigation measures and get the best Community Benefit. The Chief Officer of 9CC, a group of nine CCs in Ayrshire, explained how they are handling Community Benefit from turbines in their area.

Although the scope of Community Benefit is entirely in the gift of the developer, Scottish Government guidelines specify that the benefit continues in perpetuity regardless of change of ownership. The CC agreed to continue consulting with the local CC group (7CC.) A MoP asked if the CC could get money from developers to pay experts, however the CC members were very reluctant to follow this route.

Community Development Trust

CCIIr Marchant provided a report from the 15 November meeting of the Trust: A website for the CDT with local information is being developed; The Community Action Plan (CAP) and LPP will be prepared in conjunction with the CC; Funds are being raised to develop a proper feasibility study and Business Plan for Blairingone School; Glenfarg Transport Group are interested in joining with the CDT to take over the 202 service. PKC have agreed to fund the CAP/LPP and website along with an administrator.

Road Safety in FDCC area including A977 mitigation measures

The traffic lights at Drum crossroad are being worked on, the plan is to complete by end of December in spite of cold weather affecting tarmac.

A MoP had raised concerns about the new traffic lights beside Country Fabrics, they had assumed that the new lights would work in sync with the old lights, but they are currently independent. PKC are studying this to see if it needs to be changed.

Another MoP was concerned about the lack of a footpath connecting Carnbo to the Gelvan Road, especially in the winter months when the verge can be very slippery, although the new 30mph limit is helping to reassure pedestrians. There are no countdown signs at west end of Carnbo. The CC proposes to reexamine the priority of traffic measures once Drum signalisation has been completed.

Fossoway area transport - 202 bus service

CCIIr Lamb reported that the 202 service has been more reliable this month with only one breakdown. There are still problems with the tracking system. The major issue is restoring public confidence in order to improve take-up.

Crook Moss Travellers site

Cllr Watters had confirmed that the PKC engagement contact is Zoe Garvie. CCllr Farquhar said that things are currently very difficult at the site due to recent bereavement. The CC's aim is to get the Travellers to feel part of the local community and hence co operate with them. CCllr Farquhar has obtained two contacts at the site and in conjunction with Zoe will try to move things forward in the New Year.

FDCC By-election results

CCIIr Marchant reported that the CC had three newly elected members who will formally join the CC on 7 December 2023. They

are Adrian Carter, Angus Cheape and Tony Lamb. This means we still have the option to co-opt two additional members.

New Business

Cllr Freshwater reported that new grit bins had been requested at Aldie Hall; A MoP suggested Craigend Road as an additional site.

Consultations

Scottish Woodlands sent a consultation for the creation of Foswell Woodland on the northern facing slopes of Steele's Knowe and Carlownie Hill in the Ochil. The CC will comment, even though it is outside our district.

Scottish Water has sent a survey regarding the service they provide. The CC will respond.

Scottish Government

Democracy Matters Phase 2

Conversations have already started to explore whether far more decisions could be made by communities themselves. https://consult.gov.scot/local-government-and-communities/democracy-matters/ Closes 28 February 2024.

Tackling the Nature Emergency: Consultation on Scotland's Strategic Framework for Biodiversity

A draft response was prepared by Adrian Carter at the request of CCIIr Marchant, which will be submitted shortly. Disappointingly it's essentially a process document with many aspirations but no concrete proposals other than in the National Parks. There is little coverage of the Lowlands at all and nothing about rivers and lochs which would apply to our area.

Proposals for a Heat in Buildings Bill

Like many other countries, Scotland has a legal target to reach 'net zero' greenhouse gas emissions. There is no way to meet 'net zero' without changing the heating systems in the vast majority of our buildings. This consultation describes proposed new laws about heating systems in homes and places of work, and to invite your views on those proposals.

Closes 8 March 2024.

The CC will respond to this in due course, meanwhile the CC urges individuals to make their own comments. CCllr Pye noted that his initial study of the proposals indicated that they may be unrealistic for the majority of rural properties.

Community Council Business

CCIIrs Bruce-Jones, Cheape, Farquhar and Marchant attended the CDT on 15 November.

CCIIr Bruce-Jones attended the Kinross shire Committee on 16 November. Items covered included active travel; Blairingone School purchase is still in progress; CIIr Watters is trying to get a banking hub in Kinross or Milnathort.

CCIIrs Bruce-Jones and Lamb attended the Sustainability Group of 7CCs Regarding Windfarms on 21 November.

CCIIr Marchant attended the Planning Aid Scotland Webinar on Development of Local Place Plans on 21 November.

CCIr Cheape attended the Kinross Fund on 4 December – £2000 was granted to Light up Kinross.

Councillors' reports

Cllr Cuthbert said that there was due to be a Full Council Meeting on 6th, among agenda items is whether second homes would be charged twice the council tax, now allowed by Scottish Government, this could raise £2M in PKC alone.

Cllr Cuthbert will propose that £1M be ring-fenced for affordable housing. There could also be a moratorium on short-term rentals.

Planning Matters

Presentations from Developers – Position Statement

The CC has been approached by a developer who wishes to present their proposals regarding land in our district at a CC meeting. As we expect to have more requests in the future we wanted to agree how to respond. We have already said that the CC intends to prepare a LPP in partnership with the CDT which will provide spatial maps indicating areas that the community believe could be developed and their possible intended use.

Therefore, whilst the CC is happy for developers to make a presentation to us, they would be before the start of our formal meeting, and occupy a maximum time of 15 minutes. The CC will not make any official comment or provide feedback ahead of the completion of our LPP, although MoPs can ask questions and make comments if they wish.

Planning Applications

23/01794/FLL Change of use, alterations and extension to sawmill to form dwellinghouse and formation of vehicular access at Land 40 metres south east of 1 Nursery Cottages, Solsgirth, Dollar, no CC comment.

23/01619/FLL Formation of access track, erection of stables, siting of a caravan, and associated works (for temporary period) (in part retrospect) at Land 250 metres north of The Farmhouse, Easter Muirhead Farm, Blairingone, Dollar.

The CC objected. Access via a narrow single-track road does not comply with NPF Policy 29.

23/01813/FLL Extension to dwelling house at Suilven, Drum, Kinross, no CC comment.

23/01961/FLL Erection of a dwelling house and associated works at land 250 metres south west of Broomhill House, Station Road, Crook of Devon, Kinross KY13 0PG. The CC objected – No information to suggest the application is not contrary to NPF4 Policies 1, 9 and 17.

23/01865/FLL Extension to dwellinghouse at Craighead House, Drum, Kinross, no CC comment.

23/00491/FLM Formation of leisure development comprising erection of 124 holiday accommodation units, community hub with reception/leisure/retail areas with other associated uses, formation of vehicular access, motorhome stances, SUDS ponds, treatment plant, parking, landscaping and associated works at Whinstone Quarry, Devonshaw, Powmill.

The CC had obtained an extension in order to further discuss this application at this meeting.

The Fossoway and District Community Council in principle have supported the development of the Devonshaw Quarry site as it has long been a concern for the safety of visitors who predominantly use the area in the summer months. We recognise that this is unauthorised use and leads to litter and unsafe parking on the A977.

Initially the CC had made a series of neutral comments on the application expecting that the developer could accommodate



them, enhancing the biodiversity of the site and contributing towards active travel for visitors and local residents. However, we are disappointed with their response to PKC.

The CC now Objects.

Unacceptable impact on the natural environment, contravening NPF4 policies 3 and 4; No provision for sustainable travel (NPF4 policies 13 and 30.) The CC seeks an assurance that all owners of the lodges will be made fully aware of the occupancy restrictions of the site.

Planning Decisions

21/02133/AML Planning permission appeal: Erection of 10 dwelling houses at land 70 metres west of Innerdownie, Crook of Devon.

The DPEA have agreed to the appeal. In summary they believe the site can accommodate the ten houses and that their character is consistent with the village and will not generate a significant increase in traffic. Also believe that biodiversity will not be adversely impacted.

23/01265/FLL Siting of a container for storage use (in retrospect) at Waulkmill Park, Waulkmill, Crook of Devon. Application was approved, no CC comment.

The next meeting of Fossoway and District Community Council will be held on Tuesday 2 January at 7.30pm in Powmill Moubray Hall. All are welcome!

Neill updated that they submitted a comment on the PKC portal in support of the flood alleviation works.

Gate/bridge/fence gate to Fleming Court

The gate procurement is in progress.

Broken dog bin at Tillywally Woods

Cllr Watters received an update from the responsible PKC officer that they were awaiting stocks of new dog bins and when they arrive they will schedule in the bin to be replaced.

Milnathort Primary School Update

Laura was not present but provided an update readout by Neill MPS have been successful in their grant application to the Nature Restoration Fund.

The funds awarded will go towards encouraging wildlife and habitats and promoting biodiversity within the grounds of MPS. The project will promote community involvement with the school as well as helping to develop the school's outdoor learning curriculum.

MPS have been raising awareness for Remembrance Day and collection are underway for the Rotary Shoebox Appeal.

MPS have re-established links with the Orwell and Milnathort Parish Church and as part of our Religious and Moral Education (RME), P1-P7 classes will attend a Christmas Service on 22 December 2023.

MPS continue to promote safer routes to school and our Junior Road Safety Officers (JRSOs) continue to promote road awareness and safety.

Core Paths Update

Finalising a date with Alistair McLeod at PKC to waymark various Core Paths in the area.

The Core path Group are planning to re-commission the Core Path that runs from Stirling Road to Pitdownies, this Path will at least get cleared this year.

Approximately 10 trees at Crow Wood were blown down during the recent storm. They completely blocked the Core Path there. These have now been removed.

Fly-tipping on the Core Path at the old Arlary railway line. Landowner has been informed about this. As it's private land, PKC aren't obliged to remove it.

Community Greenspace have been contacted for an update regarding the replacement gate off South Street at Lathro.

Milnathort Core Paths Group have been funded by PKC Community Investment Fund to buy our own flail.

Planning

Decisions

23/00775/FLL P8 Kinross-shire Erection of a dwellinghouse and agricultural shed, land 150 metres north-east Of Meadowside Middleton, Milnathort for WS Young And Son, refused.

Large Planning Applications

Ex-BCA – developers present to give an update on their planning application.

Graeme Reid, London and Scottish developer, gave an update on the BCA site, to be named Loch Leven Gateway.

They have completed the public consultation, which is a precurser to submitting the application.

They held two public meetings, and were delighted with the

positive response from the community, they were well attended and a lot of feedback forms were returned complete with some useful feedback.

They are using this feedback to identify a phase 2 to the development.

The proposals have been well received, most people wanted to see the area benefit from the proposed shops. There will be no chicken or burger related drive through. Report will be created and submitted to PKC with the planning application.

They are waiting on the outcome of the Aldi application before proceeding with their proposal as it may have to change or adapt depending on the outcome.

The food discounter proposed as part of the Loch Leven Gateway development believes that there is only room for one discount food retailer in area.

The flood alleviation is needed to start first before the development can start. They visited the public consultation, and now the council will review the findings and move forward to get the funding, the timeline for starting and completing the flood alleviation has much improved from previously published, and is better for the Loch Leven Gateway development.

Audience members asked a variety of questions and below is a summary of the outcome of the discussions:

Graeme confirmed that if the Aldi application is rejected, there is no guarantee that the Loch Leven Gateway will get approval and go ahead.

PKC may want to review both application at the same time, this has been the approach by councils in the past, however the Loch Leven Gateway application will not be submitted until the outcome of the Aldi application is known.

Analysis performed by Lidl is that they area can support one discount supermarket in the area. This was challenged by a number of the audience, as nearby towns have two discount supermarkets, and a major supermarket larger than our own Sainsburys.

Graeme confirmed that they, the developer now owns the Loch Leven Gateway site. They have a plan B for the development if the initial proposal does not continue, but it will not be based on the same type of retailers.

Aldi planning application

Comments on the planning process are to be submitted to the PKC portal by 14 November.

Comments from a number of audience members included:

- The proposed site is unsuitable.
- The updated change to loading bay now make is unsafe for cars as delivery lorries are now accessing the site via the same entrance and may be reversing while traffic are trying to enter and leave the site.
- I don't like the site the changes proposed are irrelevant, 10,000 cars is a modest assessment of the increase of cars, I think it is likely to be nearer 15,000. The volume of traffic has increased thru the village with the new housing developments in both Milnathort and Kinross.
- Traffic is going faster, and a few accidents at the junction to the development.
- More traffic already in the village, a bonus for the site is that a lot of local people could walk to the site.
- I've never experienced 1000 cars at Aldi in Cowdenbeath or anywhere else for that matter, I never see a queue or trouble to park at Perth for example.
- The junction at the end of the road, is too narrow for HGV.
- Will they put in traffic lights?
- Having this development is a benefit to the community, do
 we just want to be a village where people come back to
 sleep and we have to travel to do all our shopping.

CATCH presentation (Climate Action Through Community

Heating)

David Cairns from CATCH gave an overview on what CATCH is, the benefits it could provide to our community and what they are planning.

In summary CATCH are a local group exploring how to reduce carbon emissions, heating prices, and improving community wealth in our local context.

CATCH are exploring the role of District Heating (DH) as a solution to this and plan to explore this more and requested support from the local community.

Response from the audience was positive and the community council encourages all initiatives of this type to help explore new ideas as a mechanism to improve our lives and in the process help improve the environment and help with the cost of living crisis. The CC agreed to write a letter of support for CATCH that will help in applying for funding from PKC.

Kinross Community Council News from the October Meeting

Present at the meeting on 24 October were: CCllrs L McKay, W Freeman, E Leslie, H Phillips, C Collins, S Wells, B West, M Wilson and C Willsher, Cllrs N Freshwater and Cllr R Watters and Mrs C Aird, minute-taker and 8 members of the public.

Apologies: CCllr T Stewart, Cllr W Robertson, Cllr D Cuthbert and Police Scotland.

CCIIr L Mckay introduced CCIIr Brian West and CCIIr Chris Willsher, both of whom had recently been co-opted to the Community Council.

Police Scotland Report

Since the last meeting, there have been 71 calls to Police from Kinross area, with 11 crimes recorded. Crimes of note:

Racial abuse of a retail worker (Sainsbury's, Kinross) and Theft of motor vehicle (Dalwhamie Street, Kinross)

Both charged and reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

CATCH Loch Leven

CCIIr Mckay introduced David Cairns (chair), Bill McDermott and Mike Ramsay to the meeting.

Mr Cairns and his colleagues were present to speak to the Community Council about ways to reduce heating costs for the residents/community of Kinross and Milnathort via a District Heating Network.

Mr Cairns advised that CATCH were working on a local heat and energy efficiency strategy which involved utilising Loch Leven as a heat source, thereby supplying energy to homes in Kinross by means of underground pipes. He advised that 60% of PKC households are now defined as being in fuel poverty, stating that the country was in a climate crisis, and new energy sources need to be found. While heat pumps are a great source of renewable energy, two-thirds of houses would require a major upgrade for their installation to be successful. District heating is not a new idea: it has been successfully implemented elsewhere, mostly in Europe, providing low cost, low carbon energy to local communities and the technologies are well proven.

Loch Leven is currently under stress. Climate change is driving rising temperatures, combined with long standing issues of nutrient run-off which are changing the eco-system balance and CATCH had asked to present to KCC about their project.

After the presentation, members of KCC confirmed that they were happy to encourage CATCH to continue with their work on the project and wished them success with public consultation work.

Minutes of September meeting

CCIIr C Collins raised concerns regarding inaccuracies of the draft minutes of the September meeting regarding item 6, Potential Kinross Community Action Plan and stated he had sent a number of emails to which he had not received responses. CCIIr Collins raised a number of concerns with the minutes, namely the omission of the name/job title of the representative from STAR (Lesley Campbell, STAR Group Senior Consultant), the description of STAR as a 'local action group', the way in which the meeting had taken place without anyone else from the CC being invited to attend, the delay in information being relayed to CC members, the way in which the presentation at the meeting had seemed to be a 'fait accompli' and the omission of a large part of the conversation from the discussion at the September meeting.

CCIIr Mckay apologised for not amending the draft minutes to include Ms Campbell's name – and for the delay in passing information on – this had been due to CCIIr Mckay becoming unwell. CCIIr Mckay agreed to the draft minutes being amended regarding the description of STAR. It was also noted that it was CCIIr S Wells who had suggested a vote and not CCIIr Collins. The Minute Secretary was asked to update the draft minutes.

CCIIr Mckay again advised that the meeting had not been a formal meeting but more a chat with herself, CCIIr Freeman, CIIr D Cuthbert and Mr Bruce Crawford about the potential of a Community Action Plan for the area and funding application being submitted, to which they had no prior knowledge of either. During the meeting, Ms Campbell had contacted Mr Crawford to advise she would be passing through Kinross that afternoon and could drop in some leaflets/information on the process. Ms Campbell did deliver the leaflets while CCIIrs Mckay and Freeman and CIIr Cuthbert were with Mr Crawford and during the discussion, it was agreed that Mr Crawford would be invited to the next CC meeting (September) to present the idea to members. CCIIr Mckay also confirmed that other CC members (CCIIr S Wells and CCIIr E Leslie) were invited to attend at short notice but had been unable to do so.

CCIIr H Phillips raised concerns with regard to a private sector person (Ms Campbell) recommending one particular organisation for this work. CCIIr Mckay advised that should the CC be successful in their application for funding, STAR would not automatically be employed, but a tendering process would be undertaken.

The discussion became heated, and a member of the public

commented that the conversation should not be held in public. CCIIr C Willsher also advised that he was not impressed by the behaviours and commented that he would be reconsidering his position if this was the way the CC conducted business. CCIIr Mckay apologised and confirmed that meetings were not like this. CCIIr Mckay advised that she was raising a motion regarding CCIIr Collins' behaviour under section 7 Obstructive and Offensive Conduct and asked CCIIr Collins to leave the meeting. This motion was proposed by CCIIr Mckay and seconded by CCIIr Freeman, and subsequently carried. CCIIrs Collins and Phillips left the meeting at approximately 2027hrs.

CCIIr Leslie asked those present whether they had been happy with how the information had been provided and this was confirmed. The minutes of the meeting, subject to the changes noted above were proposed by CCIIr E Leslie and seconded by CCIIr S Wells.

Matters arising

CAP Funding – CCIIr Freeman confirmed he had submitted the funding application.

Speed reduction stickers for refuse bins – this idea had been put to PKC for consideration, but this had been declined.

Town twinning – more information had been received from David Munro with Cllr Watters confirming that PKC were changing the ways town twinning was being undertaken (handled centrally by PKC and adopted by respective CCs). It was noted that any such twinning would be covered by the CC's liability insurance and that there would be no cost to KCC. After consideration, the CC agreed to participate in this.

Kinross Town Centre

Burns Begg Street Junction

Following a request by CCIIr Mckay for an update on this, CIIr Freshwater advised that work was in progress and that he would raise the issue again at the Road Safety meeting.

Parking in Shared Space

CCIIr Wells advised that this parking area was not fit for purpose due to indiscriminate parking and cars being parked between bollards meaning people were having to walk out into the streets to move around the town centre. It was agreed that CIIr Freshwater and CIIr Watters would raise this at the Road Safety meeting on 13 November.

It was also agreed that signage for alternative car parking was poor.

Other planning matters

22/01004/FLL Erection of a retail unit (Class 1), formation of parking areas, landscaping and associated works (LDP site E21) Auld Mart Business Park Kingfisher House Orwell Road Milnathort Kinross – the meeting was advised that amended plans had submitted and therefore comments could be submitted prior to deadline (14 November 2023). CCIIr Freeman was asked to request an extension to this deadline and asked the Minute Secretary to remind him to do this.

23/01413/FLL Formation of access road, land 60 metres southwest of Baltree Farm, Hatchbank.

Mr and Mrs Fernie from Greyhound Rescue Fife addressed the meeting about their planning application for the formation of an access road at Baltree Farm. Mr Fernie advised that he had been surprised to see two letters of objection, one from KCC and the other from Kinross-shire Civic Trust and wanted to advise the CC of the reasons for the application and the work which would be involved in what was classed as ancient woodland.

Mr Fernie advised that he and his wife had made a number of improvements over the years, including the clearing of drains, removal of fallen trees as well as planting new trees. In respect of this application, he advised that that there would be no damage to the woodland as all digging work would be done by hand and once complete, the road would only be used by cars. On hearing this additional information, the CC agreed that they would contact PKC to withdraw their letter of objection. It was also noted that the Civic Trust had withdrawn their objection.

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Mr and Mrs Fernie thanked the CC for their time and invited everyone to visit the Centre in the future.

23/01349/FLL Part change of use and alterations to building to form 10 short-term let accommodation units at 54-56 High Street, Kinross.

In response to a question from CCIIr S Wells, CCIIr Freeman confirmed there was no further information available on this application.

Reports from PKC Councillors

Cllr N Freshwaters

There is a missing 40 MPH sign. CCllr Mckay asked about the replacement bus shelter at Kirklands Hotel. Cllr Watters agreed to raise this matter with Cllr D Cuthbert.

Cllr R Watters

An application had been submitted for a banking hub for Kinross. He advised that a hub had previously been refused due to the alleged small number of businesses in the area (29) and the number of residents in a 1 km area (4000). These figures were subsequently challenged, with Cllr Watters advising that there were currently 62 businesses in the area and more than 4000 residents. Calculations have now been undertaken again and a team will be sent to assess the area for a potential hub. If successful, discussions can then commence on suitable premises.

In response to a question from CCIIr Wells, CIIr Watters advised that not all hubs are in existing premises. A further question was asked by CCIIr M Wilson in respect of who the hub was being aimed at and CIIr Watters confirmed that it would be available to anyone who wished to use it. CCIIr Wilson questioned whether there was a need for a hub since a lot of people now carry out their banking online, but it was felt that the hub was a requirement for the area, given the lack of banking facilities and therefore the need to travel to other areas.

Cllr Watters confirmed that if the application was unsuccessful then the FCA will review the decision. He will provide an update at a future meeting.

Taktran who are responsible for a regional transport strategy/ active travel plan would be issuing a consultation shortly and encouraged the community to respond. Cllr Watters also advised that Kinross had initially been omitted from the map, but this had now been rectified.

Reports from CC representatives

CCIIr Willsher asked if there was a formal way for information to be shared and questioned why the minutes from the September meeting had not been uploaded to the website but were available on the Facebook page. Everyone was advised that information for CC members tended to be received by email and as such was forwarded on. The September minutes had not been uploaded to the website due to an admin error.

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It was agreed that CCIIrs West and Willsher would be added to the member's What'sApp group.

CCIIr Leslie advised that The PKC Road Safety Team had been out to look at the VAS in Gallowhill Road, there was no update available, and she would contact CIIr D Cuthbert for more information.

The Safer Route to School programme had also been discussed with the Road Safety Team and raised previously by Cllr Watters.

The Primary School are trialling a 'walking bus' where pupils meet at certain points (Green Park, LLHC and the bottom of Kinross) to walk to school with one teacher and one volunteer. In doing this, CCllr Leslie also highlighted an issue with parking on double yellow lines/zigzags outside the school, resulting in several 'near misses.' A more permanent solution was required, and she asked if the Police could be involved, speaking to drivers and highlighting the issue. Cllr N Freshwater agreed to raise the issue at a meeting of the Road Safety Team on Thursday, and Cllr Watters would take photographs to provide evidence.

Cllr McKay advised that a disabled resident had contacted her recently about them having difficulty accessing their property due to cars parking on/at the dropped kerb. The resident had also experienced problems whilst out in the town where the camber of some paths meant that they were being 'tipped out' of their wheelchair and were then unable to get up and into their chair. Cllr Watter agreed to investigate this matter and report back.

With regard to grey refuse bins, residents were advised to contact PKC Waste Services either via the website or the Facebook page.

It was suggested that the restrictions regarding on street parking in the High Street be removed but it was felt that this would cause the High Street businesses to suffer due to a reduction in movement. Cllr Watters agreed to raise the issue at Thursday's Road Safety meeting and CCllr Leslie is to speak to business to gain their views on the current parking issues.

CCIIr Mckay enquires as to the action regarding the clearing of drains and was advised that PKC had doubled their efforts in this respect.

CCIIr B Freeman advised that the Christmas lights switch on would take place on 23 November in Greens' car park. The Remembrance Parade would be held on 12 November.

AOCB

Wind Farms

Neil Bingham, Milnathort and Orwell CC, advised that following a scoping exercise, the application for Craigie Wind Farm had seen the height tips and number of turbines being reduced. He also advised that a meeting was arranged for all CCs in the area to come together to discuss investments and use of funds for improving the area. At this meeting, there will be a short presentation from a representative from Ayrshire who will explain what has happened in their area, following the installation of wind farms.

Community Speedwatch

Mr Bingham also advised that Fossoway CC had purchased equipment for their speedwatch group but were now no longer

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able to participate and as such, Milnathort and Orwell CC were now holding the equipment.

The CC were looking for volunteers for the campaign and anyone interested should contact them direct – full training would be given with volunteers being vetted by Police Scotland before being appointed.

Mr Bingham advised that anyone who was caught speeding would be sent a letter by Police Scotland with details of the offence. CCllr Leslie asked if it would be beneficial to include a letter from a child giving their point of view of speeding and what it could mean to them, and she was happy to tie in with the PTA to do so. Mr Bingham asked CCllr Leslie to wait until more information was available.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be on 23 January 2024 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall. All are welcome.



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


















Kinross Garden Group

An autumn walk in the Moss inspired designer, Louise Mossom, to create a beanie hat based on the play of light and shade. Her



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

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

The purpose of a parent council is often misunderstood. Therefore, this month, we thought it might be worth giving a brief overview to briefly explain what a parent council is and what its main functions are.

What is a parent council?

It is an independent body established under legislation to represent the collective parent body of the school. It is not run by the school or the local authority and is essentially a committee appointed by the wider parent forum to represent its views.

The committee usually comprises parents or carers but can coopt non-parent members who have special skills that benefit the running of the committee. The school's headteacher is not a member of the committee but has a right and a duty to attend meetings. The local authority should support a parent council with finances, advice and support to allow it to operate within its functions.

What are the main functions of a parent council?

These are set in law and include supporting the development of the school improvement plan and standards and quality reports that set out how the school plans to improve how it works, involvement in the appointment of senior staff (such as the appointment of a new headteacher) and is considered to be a key stakeholder in school inspections.

It is the responsibility of a parent council to gather and represent the collective views of the parent forum to inform school planning, and the responsibility of the headteacher to encourage the parent council to have an active role in the development and review of school policies based on those collective views.





lunch at The Kirklands. Compliments to the chef and all the staff who made it such an enjoyable event!





Kinross Historical Society

Despite problems with the digital projection system in the church, the members of the society really enjoyed their annual Christmas talk by Dr David Munro. His talk this year was called 'Grave Matters – Tales from the Kirkyards of Kinross-shire.'

Kinross museum volunteers have been recording information about grave stones in local graveyards for ten years.

The very first survey was done in 1850 by Henry Flockhart of Annacroich and in the 1960s a national survey was done by the Mitchell family for the Genealogical Society but they didn't record much information.

Stones are very different, some just grave markers with initials and some of the other older stones record Trade symbols and or Mortality symbols. Commonwealth War Graves can be found in some of the local kirkyards too. Lairs are sometimes recorded on the stone or between stones to mark boundaries.

By the wall at the Kirkgate graveyard is a watchtower but it is a replacement for the original one which was used to watch for grave robbers.

Dr Munro told the chilling story of a grave-robbing incident which took place in Portmoak in 1837. When the stolen body was returned to Portmoak there was a huge turnout for the reburial service.

Also in Portmoak kirkyard are the gravestones for the most of Tod family who farmed at West Brackley. The family had to give their farm over to the royal Navy during WW2. However, when it was no longer required, Tam Tod insisted on a big hand-over event. When he died in 1951, he was buried on his own land beneath Benarty rather than the greaveyard.

Old Orwell Church once stood by Loch Leven before the loch was lowered. The building still there today is a mausoleum erected by the Horn family of Thomanean. The gravestones there are very old and include that of Robert Stirk a covenanter and John Henderson a local farmer who was killed with a pitchfork by Balfour of Burleigh in 1697. When the museum volunteers were working there, they discovered that below ground level a pitchfork had been carved on his stone to record the death.

Rev Thomas Mair was ordained at Orwell Established Church but later joined the Seccession. The Muckle Kirk was built then for his congregation which could be as many as 2000 on a Sunday. When he died in 1768 he was buried in Milnathort Orwell graveyard and the inscription on his stone includes an acrostic poem using his name as the start of the lines.


Kinross-shire graveyards also show how the people of the area have travelled far and wide, such as Kabul, St Vincent Island and Belize. Dr Munro described how several local families came to be in such foreign climes.





Responding with greater urgency to Climate Change, it introduces proposals to force householders and businesses to upgrade the efficiency of their properties and to replace polluting gas boilers.'

There is a fuller article on p21, in which David talks about the new requirements and the potential impacts for our community.

Following on from this, we have an interesting programme of talks planned including a meeting with Nathan Jameson, an expert from the Heat Project Organisation with advice on heat pumps (March), presentation of Kirsteen Ross (CEO of Trishaws) about improving local cycling facilities (April), 'All about Raingardens in Kinross' by Brian Darcy (May). We are also starting our own Repair Café in Kinross-shire; the plan will be presented at the meeting in February.

A Wildfowl Winter...

As we're now well into winter the loch is extremely busy with wintering wildfowl. We conduct monthly WeBS surveys along with our friends at the RSPB, to get as accurate a count as possible of all wetland birds on the loch.

At this time of the year you can see thousands of tufted duck, coot and good numbers of golden eye, as well as the thousands of geese that roost on the loch, the most numerous being pink-footed geese. We also occasionally get some rarer visitors, such as greater scaup, slavonian grebes, longtail ducks, great egrets, velvet scoters and shovelers. There have recently been hundreds of greylag geese up close at Burleigh sands during the day. You'll usually hear them before you see them!

Winter is also a great time for tree planting, and we've been busy transplanting trees across the reserve, moving them from sites where they may not be best suited, or there may be more than plentiful, to another part of the reserve to where they will be more suited and can make more

of a positive impact. This method saves our resources and is beneficial to the trees.

We've been out on the boat in order to plant willow around the shoreline of the loch, which when mature, provides excellent cover for birds.

In December we had our wreath-making evening, a free event where we used resources from around the reserve and provided guidance for visitors to make their own wreaths.

Everyone came up with beautiful individual creations to take home, and the event was so successful I'm sure we'll be having another evening next year. When using materials from places such as national nature reserves, it's important not to take too much, such as berries and flowers, as these are an essential resource to wildlife coming into winter.

Some of the materials we collected that were left over can be re-used, such as the willow whips we used to make the base of the wreaths.

They can be used as part of an anti-erosion method, by weaving willow fences at the water's edge into the ground, creating a stable wall and allowing the willow to continue to grow. This method was used along the south queich and can be seen from the bridge. This was built by our volunteers a few years ago, and they've been prepping more willow getting ready to weave more fencing.

We had our first snow of the year early December, turning the loch into a beautiful winter wonderland, with parts of the loch freezing over. I'm sure we'll be getting some more so when colder temperatures hit remember to wrap up warm and be careful on the icy trails.

...or a Very Waxwing Winter?

I feel like we say this every year but, it's crazy that we have moved into 2024 already! We hope you all had a fantastic festive period filled with lots of yummy treats (including our Christmas tiffin if you had been lucky to grab a piece while it was on offer!).

Although the Christmas period tends to signal the time for winding down, the reserve was as busy as ever with our winter wetland birds coming en masse as always. Species such as teal, gadwall, pintail and whooper swans were being spotted in large numbers with as many as 150 teal being seen at once during our Wetland Bird Survey (WEBS) counts. We were also lucky to have seen regular sightings of marsh and hen harrier at the reserve over the winter months in addition to short-eared owl sightings in late November. Waxwing, fieldfare and redwing also popped



up on our sightings board quite a few times as they visited us for the winter, following their breeding season in Scandinavia. It was looking like a very waxwing winter with several sightings popping up in the area which isn't always a guarantee every year.

We have had some gorgeous images of these captured by our Assistant Warden, Darran. For more frequent sightings updates and to

In general, the team have been working hard to maintain the site

over winter as well as having been busy developing plans for the improvement of our Cottage Garden area, Leafy Loop and Play Area. We are excited to hopefully see some of these plans becoming a reality in the coming year.

Now that we are in January, we are looking forward to the Big Garden Bird Watch weekend on the 26-28 January



with our Optics Weekend and Big Garden Bird Watch trail events running alongside it. We are really looking forward to seeing the results of the world's largest garden wildlife survey and to see if there have been any changes and improvements for nature. In February we have our Fun Fact February trail back for the whole of the month to test out your searching skills and wildlife knowledge. Farming

Peas on Earth...



Some VIPs joined us for Christmas, alongside our turkey, stuffing, pigs in blankets, roast potatoes, parsnips and sprouts. The festive meal was deemed more important than presents when I carried out a wee survey of my nieces and nephews a few years ago. When I asked at home, our family agreed the dinner trumps gifts and I think many families feel the same. There's not much to beat coming together round the table with good company and lovely food and as I love it so much, I used to rely on a trusted formula to prepare for the festive meal.

However since my op, I have taken a back seat and I'm now only tasked to peel the veggies and make the stuffing. Andrew handles the turkey, he's always up first anyway so it gives him plenty of time to add the cream and flake to the trifle which he starts making on Christmas Eve. As Charlie has

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a few livestock jobs to do, he misses out on the cooking so Kay and Fraser manage the rest and it seems like a fair division of labour. It has been great to see them take a few new approaches and our local tattie Barron (as John likes to call him) would be pleased to see such great care taken over the roasties, I must admit the addition of garlic and a sprig of rosemary during the last 10 minutes in the oven adds so much flavour. I'm unsure what goes in the gravy but it was very tasty and I think the young team are a bit more accurate when it comes to cooking the veg than I ever was. A bit like my farming, I miss being in control but am pleased the next generation is so capable, I really enjoyed it with our special guests, the VIPeas.

Yes, it's peas that made an appearance, a big bowl of these were plonked down on our farmhouse table to be demolished and they are so special, as they

were grown on our farms last summer by a local pea company who was kind enough to hand in a box of frozen peas just before Christmas. Scotland's annual production is in the hands of only a few specialist growers and in 2023, we were one of 200 landowners from Angus, Perthshire and Fife who rent land to Bruce Farms. They manage the entire cycle from seed to harvest, the crop is carefully monitored and it was visited very regularly.

The machinery required is specialist and the staff very dedicated as the vining operation runs 24 hours a day throughout the harvest period. Being the only independent supplier of peas to Birds Eye, Bruce Farms have invested in technology to guarantee 100% traceability so if you spotted the viners working in our fields in August you will know how huge the machines are and unsurprisingly they cost the price of a small house. With Kinross-shire being furthest out from their Dundee factory, it's rarer that they take land down here but I'm pleased to say our peas did well and met the target from harvest to frozen within an impressive 150 minutes per load. The rent paid of £180 per acre seemed attractive this year as the other option was to purchase very expensive fertiliser to grow spring barley and sell into an unpredictable market. Peas are valuable to us in another way too as they act as a 'break crop' naturally restoring the Nitrogen levels of the soil as they grow. So we both rented 34 acres each and have sown winter wheat into the fields already with no need for artificial fertiliser.

I hope you all enjoyed your own Christmas dinner and if you have peas on your plate at any point in 2024, thanks to a joined up approach between farmers and the grower, you will be eating a local and nutritious treat. Enjoy!





Tom Webster

'The Singing Postie" passed away peacefully at his home in Kinross on 22 August 2023

Tom was born on 23 July 1933 at Southfields, Cuthill Towers, near Milnathort. He was the youngest of nine children born to James and Mary Ellen Webster. Growing up at the family home in Viewfar Road, Tom attended Milnathort Primary and Kinross High School before completing his apprenticeship as a Gardener at Telford Nurseries in Milnathort. Tom went on to serve across the south of England in the Army and Royal Military Police during his National Service before returning to his beloved Kinross-shire where he remained all his life, marrying his sweetheart Jean and going on to have four children – Wendy, Alan, Amanda and Alistair.

Tom was well known around Kinross-shire, Tayside and Scotland for his musical talents. Having toured across the country with 'The Bill Wilkie Show' Tom became a member of the 'Fife Yokels', appearing weekly on TV in the late 1960's and releasing two albums. During this time Tom won Grampian Televisions prestigious 'Male entertainer of the year' for 1969 and 1970.

Tom then went on to found 'The Lomond Cornkisters' playing Bothy Ballads, Scottish favourites and some of their own compelations. In their first year – the Cornkisters won the coveted 'Browse Cup' for Scottish Music. The Cornkisters released five albums and feature on many more compilation albums.

Tom remained at the helm of 'The Lomond Cornkisters' for over 45 years — taking their music across Scotland, England and Germany, entertaining the crowds with a grand Scottish Ceildh as well as raising thousands of pounds for charity.

Tom was also well known for his gardening and for being a local postman around Kinross for over 25 years. Be it delivering the post or tending a local garden, you would hear his singing, whistling or yodelling before you saw him.

Tom is survived by Amanda and Alistair, seven grandchildren – Mark, Craig, Paul, Chloe, Daniel, Katie and Natalie and (currently) six great grandchildren with two more on the way!

Mandy and Allie would like to thank the family, friends, neighbours, carers and NHS staff who helped with Tom's care and happiness during his final years at home. Also for



the many cards, flowers and contact from people expressing their love and respect for Tom. A special thanks must go to the Reverend Robert Calvert and his team at Orwell Church for a fantastic service and celebration of Tom's life.

Over £1200 was collected at Toms funeral and presented to Kinross-shire Day Centre as a thank you for their tremendous work in the local community.

Tom really was an integral part of Kinross-shire for 90 years. He will be greatly missed by many but fondly remembered when his music is played.



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KEEPING SAFE ON A NIGHT OUT

Festive Party Safety

If you're going on a night out then have fun and enjoy yourself. However, people can sometimes end up acting out of character and may end up regretting it later. Keep these simple steps in mind while having fun.

What can I do to keep safe on a night out?

- Plan your night out including how to get home.
- Take your mobile phone with you and make sure it's charged.
- Stay with friends and avoid leaving parties or nights-out with strangers.
- Be sensible about how much alcohol you drink and pace yourself - a drunk person is much more vulnerable and a far easier target for criminals.
- Watch your drinks don't give anyone the opportunity to alter them with other substances. If you leave a drink unattended then don't go back to it.
- Think about what you've had to drink If you feel very drunk or unwell after just a small amount then ask a trusted friend or a member of the club / pub management for help.
- Don't take drugs or New Psychoactive Substances (sometimes misleadingly called 'legal highs').
- Don't have sexual intercourse with anyone who is unable to give their consent because they are too drunk or under the influence of drugs. In Scots Law this is rape.
- Look after bags and valuables. Attracting attention to a phone, especially when leaving a club under the influence of alcohol, makes you more vulnerable to criminals.
- Make sure you have enough money left at the end of the night to pay for your journey home.
- Stay alert at cash machines. Hide your PIN, be aware of who's behind you and keep money out of view. Avoid using them if you've had too much to drink as you'll be more vulnerable to being the target of a robbery.
