SPACE FOR A NEW VISITOR ATTRACTION!

THE NEWSLETTER WAS EXCITED to receive, early in March, news about progress of the sale of the 'golf ball' at Balado and the possibility of a new family-oriented aerospace-themed visitor attraction for Kinross in the pipeline!



The AEROSPACE Kinross (ASK) website describes the attraction as a 'uniquely themed Aviation, Astronomy and Space Flight Science Centre based in the

heart of Scotland' which will form an 'Aviation Centre of Excellence'.

We look forward to finding out more. Aero Space Kinross released the following statement to ASSET investors and members:





'Aero Space Kinross are very pleased to announce agreement with the current owners (R W Ferguson & Company) to Heads of Terms for the purchase of the former MOD Balado Bridge Satellite Communications Station at Kinross. Subject to planning approval and confirmation of funding, the existing buildings and satellite dish (in the iconic 'golf ball' on the site) will be repurposed for the creation of a family oriented aerospace themed visitor attraction.'

Mike has always fought for more decisions to be taken locally by the people who understand our area best and I hope that the area committee will become a permanent feature for many years to come.

Councillor Willie Robertson said 'Mike Barnacle and myself have been friends for a long time and have worked together politically since before I was elected. In fact he was my agent when I was first elected back in 1995. I think we share very similar views on many things such as community politics and the importance of our environment both locally and nationally. We are both long standing St Johnstone supporters. Mike is very much a 'community' politician especially in his beloved Fossoway. One of his amazing skills is that he can

KINROSS SHOWS UKRAINE SUPPORT

KINROSS-SHIRE RESIDENTS HAVE TURNED out in force to help ease the terrible plight of the people of Ukraine. Essential items like warm clothing, toiletries, batteries, phone chargers and much more, intended for those who have had to flee their homes, have been gathered at various collection points so that they can be sent by lorry to where they are most needed.

Great generosity has been shown via collections and fundraising activities, while Kinross shops have demonstrated their own support through their displays, as seen here in the picture of Baillies' balloon window (below left).

Other photos show just one collection made by Portmoak cubs through donations left at Portmoak Hall. Many other collection points, such as Loch Leven Library, became designated drop-off zones for people to hand goods in.

This year's Lenten Cross at St Paul's church (below) is being decorated with ribbons showing Kinrossians' support, and is rapidly becoming festooned with the blue and yellow of the Ukrainian flag. You are encouraged to add your own ribbons wherever possible.

As the photo shows, these flowers are a beautiful shade of blue, very close to that of the Ukrainian flag – hence the sale and proceeds going to alleviate the plight of those unlucky enough to have suffered through this terrible conflict. Normally retailing from £4.50 - £8, Bob is looking for a minimum donation of £2 per plant – although anything more is obviously welcome. All monies will be given to the appeal.

DURING LOCKDOWN, A FRIEND asked Claire Wingfield if she would work with her dad to compile his life stories. Her task was to talk to the client and tease out the themes, historical context and action in the stories he told her.


They started on Zoom. Ever anxious at losing material, she typed as

they talked and afterwards listened to the recording, adding anything she'd missed. Neil liked to be prepared for the discussions, so she used the first meeting to get an idea of the themes to cover and then sent a related task before each call. She looked for ways to include Neil's children and grandchildren. She was aiming for a collection of stories from Neil's life rather than a definitive 'life story'. The book is set up so he and his family can order copies at any point, and he may even add stories in the future.

Neil described himself being 'as far away from bring a 'writer' as it's possible to be'! By the end of the project, the part of himself that had achieved technical innovation in his engineering business was much in evidence, and he brought great creativity and enthusiasm to the task.

If Neil's story has inspired you to try some life writing, why not find a little space to begin thinking about what the key ingredients of your life stories could be.

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MOVE GREENER NEED YOU!

KMGO IS A SMALL, volunteer-run charitable organisation aiming to reduce the environmental impact of cars, promote health and well-being and to create local economic activity.

Their vision is a mixed fleet of electric vehicles operating throughout Kinross-shire. This will include shared cars, minibuses, vans, eBikes (plus variants for those who are differently abled) and commercial eCargo bikes for businesses and organisations. They want to see new and safer cycling, wheeling and walking routes and activities. Ultimately, they aim for an income-generating but not-for-profit operation – employing and training local people of all ages and abilities and using the services of local businesses – to generate local economic activity.

With the support of the Community Council, PKC and others, *Kinross-shire*

Move Greener have delivered and continue to operate a successful car share scheme in Kinross and have now secured funds from the Energy Saving Trust to run a bike share pilot.

Whilst their car share scheme is run in conjunction with a commercial partner their next project, bike share, will require more people to make it happen.

KMGO are looking for volunteers* from across the community to help them take this project forward. They are still thrashing out the pilot project operating model but, starting in spring of this year, they will need volunteers to:

- Issue bikes and receive/recover them back to base
- Train as bike mechanics and maintain the bikes
- Train as cycle leaders and then lead group rides
- Do the back room stuff, such as monitor bookings

HAVE YOUR SAY IN MAY!

ON THURSDAY 5 MAY people in Perth & Kinross will go to the polls to decide who represents them on their local council.

In order to vote in May, residents must be on the electoral register. With the deadline to register to vote fast approaching, The Electoral Registration Officer is urging people who are not registered at their current address to make sure they are registered in time.

If you live in Scotland and will be 16 or over on 5 May, you can register to vote in these elections. The deadline to register to vote is midnight on Monday 18 April. It takes just five minutes to register online at *www.gov.uk/register-to-vote*.

This year, residents in Perth & Kinross will be voting to elect councillors, who will represent their local area, and make decisions in areas such as education, social care and housing.

Mr Alastair Kirkwood, Perth & Kinross Council's Electoral Registration Officer said:

'Time is running out to make sure you can take part in these elections. They are an important opportunity to make your voice heard and have a say on who represents you on issues that directly affect day-to-day life here in Angus and Perth & Kinross. If you're not registered by 18 April, you won't be able to vote.'

Andy O'Neill, Head of the Electoral Commission in Scotland, agreed, saying:

'You can't have your say in these elections unless you are reg-





istered to vote. Registering is easy and only takes five minutes. If you have recently turned 16 or moved home, it is particularly important to make sure you are correctly registered to vote. If you were registered to vote in the last election and your details have not changed, you don't need to take any action. If you were registered to vote in the last election and your details have not changed, you don't need to take any action. If in doubt, you can check with your electoral registration office by calling The Electoral Registration Officer on 01738 630303.

People can choose to vote in a number of ways – in person, by post or by appointing someone they trust to vote in their place, known as a proxy vote.

The deadline to apply for a postal vote is 5pm on 19 April, and for a proxy vote the deadline is 5pm on 26 April.

Councillor Callum Purves

AS MANY OF YOU know, the next set of elections to Perth & Kinross Council are being held on Thursday 5 May. By the time you read this, nominations will have closed.



After much thought, I have taken the

decision not to stand in these elections. While I have greatly enjoyed my five years as one of your local elected representatives, I feel that now is the right time in my career to explore other opportunities that may take me away from the local area. I do not feel that this would be compatible with the role of a local councillor, and therefore it would not be right to put myself forward again for election in those circumstances. Kinross-shire needs representatives that are able to dedicate the time to the role as I hope you will feel that I have done over the past five years.

I believe we have managed to make significant progress over the past five years. In my view, our biggest achievement has been the devolution of significant powers down to Kinross-shire as part of the pilot local committee. This is something that my colleague, Councillor Barnacle, has been campaigning on for over two decades and I was pleased to be able to help secure the scheme. For too long, the Council has felt remote and often the decisions taken up in Perth do not sit well locally. While it is not a panacea, we have already seen from the first meeting that longstanding problems can be resolved when decisions are taken only by Kinross-shire councillors and not representatives from across Perth & Kinross.

We have also made many improvements in road safety, which is often one of the major issues that is raised with me. I have secured additional funding over the years for schemes to lower speed limits and install more vehicle-activated signs. In Kinross-shire, we have received more than our fair share of this funding and many towns and villages that have requested speed mitigation measures have seen them installed. There are still some communities that have waited patiently for speed reductions, and I hope that, through the local committee, these can be delivered soon.

Another major issue has been planning. The planning system can often seem distant from our communities. Big developments in Kinross-shire that were approved despite overwhelming local opposition are a good example of this. I remain fully supportive of the principle of a community right of appeal that would level the playing field between local communities and big developers. It is not right that Persimmon were able to get a second shot at approval for phase 2 of the Lathro development by going over councillors' heads to the Scottish Government. While I cannot take full credit for it, I am pleased that my party has now adopted a national position of opposition to such decisions.

I am also pleased by a number of the budget decisions that I played a part in. The Community Investment Fund that provides support to local groups who might otherwise struggle to get funding has been a great success. It has supported many causes right across Kinross-shire such as village halls, other local facilities, and initiatives to tackle inequalities. The grants and schemes we established for local enterprises have also helped our local businesses thrive and grow. Moreover, I pushed for further funding to expand course choice in our schools and, while this is an area where there is still much work to do, I hope that this is a step in the right direction.

I have also enjoyed being part of the board responsible for health and social care locally. There have been significant improvements in reducing delayed discharges and making more services available in the community and in people's homes. There are also areas that still require significant improvement, particularly in the provision of mental health services. I am still of the view that NHS Tayside has not properly grasped the seriousness of the independent review of these services by Dr David Strang. There is an urgent need to improve trust and respect between the service uses, carers, staff, and the NHS itself. Recent attempts to conduct an options appraisal (if you can call it that) of inpatient mental health facilities by only considering a single option suggest a slipping back to the old ways of working. I do hope that I am proved wrong.

On the theme of needing to change, I think there are many things that could be improved to make councils work better. These are not political points, but more reflections on the problems with the way local government is set up. People quite rightly expect the representatives they elect to be able to take decisions and to make things happen. Too often, however, this is not the case. This is primarily because the way councils operate gives far too much power to unelected officials.

The first thing I was told when I was elected is that councillors set the 'strategic direction' while officials are responsible for operational matters and 'never the twain shall meet'. While on the face of it, this does not sound too objectionable, this has proved my biggest challenge in my five years.

Rather than being a helpful distinction to make, it is often used to prevent councillors implementing what local people want or trying to hold officials to account for their actions. Sometimes councillors are even threatened with complaints should they try to get too involved. This means that councillors are often held accountable for things over which they have no control.

Unless and until this changes, councillors simply cannot fully deliver on the wishes of their constituents. This will require a change at Scottish Government level and given the recent programme of centralisation, I am not optimistic of progress on this any time soon.

More generally, the Council needs to be more agile and willing to try new things and adopt new ideas. Too often things are done a certain way simply because they have always been done that way. There are many more efficiencies that could be made to be reinvested into improving core public services or indeed to limit the need to increase our council tax each year. I brought forward a budget that showed it was possible to freeze the council tax for three years while investing a further £10 million extra on delivering community priorities without affecting front-line services. It can be done. It is more a question of whether or not there is a willingness to do so.

The Council also needs to get better at engaging with the public rather than simply seeing consultation as a tick-box exercise. Local people have the knowledge and expertise about what is right for their local area. Officials need to accept that they do not have a monopoly on wisdom. The Council should listen to local people more.

On a more positive note, we are very lucky that in Kinross-shire, there has been a long tradition of all local councillors working together on matters of common concern. While we may disagree on some political issues, I have greatly enjoyed working with my colleagues Mike, Willie, and Richard over the past five years. I would like to think that this spirit of co-operation will continue no matter which candidates you decide to elect in May.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those local residents, community councils and voluntary organisations that I have worked with over the past five years. We are very fortunate to have such a strong sense of community spirit and resilience in Kinross-shire. Without the efforts of local people and volunteers, particularly through the recent pandemic, the lives of so many in our community would have been much more difficult.

I hope that one day in the future, I might be able to represent you and Kinross-shire again in some capacity. That would, of course, only be should you wish me to do so.

I WILL NOT BE STANDING for re-election in May '22 after 23 years unbroken service on PKC since first elected in May 1999, including various Convenorships on the Development Control & Environment Committees.



It has been a huge privilege to represent the people of Kinrossshire over this period. It seems an opportune time to reflect upon some of the issues I have tried to address, working with community organisations, government and in particular, former Independent Councillor Cuthbert and present Councillors Purves and Robertson.

There have been a number of successful initiatives I have been involved in worthy of mention, *viz*:

Environmentally, lobbying for the new wastewater treatment plant in DRUM, installing local recycling points (CROOK, KINNESSWOOD & POWMILL), creating Waulkmill Park, CROOK and improving play areas (CROOK, KINNESSWOOD, KIRKGATE & POWMILL), as Environment Convenor moving Community Greenspace back within PKC control from a failed privatisation. Footpaths include the Core Path Plan, footpath/cycle route between CROOK & MIDDLE BALADO for TURFHILLS, old railway path south of Waulkmill in CROOK and path along river between Crook and Rumbling Bridge Gorge, path between Naemoor Road & River Devon in CROOK, DUNCRIEVIE to Wallace Park, GLENFARG and Lochleven Heritage Trail with links thereto. Identity of Kinrossshire has been re-inforced through border signage that needs enhancing, challenging various proposals from the Boundary Commission to interfere with Kinross-shire status at government electoral level, which is ongoing, improved settlement signage at places like BLAIRFORGE, DRUM, LOCHRAN & MAWCARSE but principally the establishment of the 'pilot' Kinross-shire Area Committee that I hope will become a permanent fixture of PKC's Committee Structure (future elected members for this ward should be committed to that). A successful Landscape designation as AGLV's for the Cleish Hills & River Devon Gorge was won at a public inquiry prior to a local plan but subsequently these areas were not granted Local Landscape designation in our current plan following a flawed consultancy exercise, a wrong that must be rectified in LDP3. Planning successes of note were opposition to Mellock Hill Windfarm, opposition to development expansion west of the M90 at Kinross, opposing major Naemoor Road housing developments in CROOK, relocation of Orange Phone mast in Kinross to Turfhills; School relocations and upgrades include primaries at Fossoway & Portmoak (including one-way systems), GLENFARG (including 'pilot' pedestrian & cycle zone), KINROSS and the new Secondary LOCH LEVEN CAMPUS. Transport improvements include successful road adoption schemes in Station Road, CROOK & KINNESSWOOD, speed control measures (i.e. Build-outs & VAS) throughout the shire to reinforce new 20 - 50 mph limits, including walking & cycling friendly routes, such as the Dryside Road at GLENLOMOND, KINROSS WEST link road & HGV bans on Vicar's Bridge Road in BLAIRINGONE & in DRUM main street, not forgetting pedestrian crossings on the A977.

Notable failures I have to record *viz* – The loss of all community facilities in BLAIRINGONE (the Fossoway Community Development Trust that I am trying to establish may be a vehicle to gauge whether there is an appetite to lease the redundant school buildings). Planning failures include the loss of GLENFARG HOTEL & LOMOND COUNTRY INN to development proposals, the integration/creation of dialogue between the settlement at CROOK MOSS and the local community, and the growth of the Greenacres site way beyond planning limits set by PKC, the lack of a Master Plan for Kinross & Milnathort and the erosion of the green agricultural land between these burghs through over-

development, failure to restrict the number of windfarms in the Ochil Hills (PKC's landscape consultant advised one and we now have three as a result of Scottish Government overturning PKC refusals). Transport failures include no progress on restoring a rail link from Kinross to Fife Circle or improved integration of bus timetables on services accessing the Kinross Park & Ride.

Finally, there are a significant number of works in progress matters, which there always will be, that I wish to highlight and which members elected in May 2022 should be encouraged to progress, *viz*:

The Community in Blairingone will note the long-running saga of the re-location of the war memorial from the former church to the cemetery with part-funding secured. ENVIRONMENTALLY, a 'Keep Kinross-shire Tidy campaign' with the help of 'Bloom Groups' is a proposed Area Committee agenda item, a Ditch Management Scheme for DRUM to address flooding needs progressing, we need more policy protection for Lochleven & Trees. On FOOTPATHS an Area Committee agenda item is to progress a proposed safe route to school between Scotlandwell & Kinnesswood, the embryonic Development Trust could be project leader for the replacement footbridge required at Rumbling Bridge Gorge and to lobby PKC for gorge improvements for locals & visitors, also establishing a footpath link between Gairney Bank & Kinross. On LANDSCAPE protection we should try and progress through the Council, an Ochil Hills Regional Park and an extension of the Lomond Hills Regional Park to Lochleven. CLEISH PRIMARY SCHOOL upgrade needs finalisation. On TRANSPORT we have a Kinross-shire Community Transport Group seeking to boost community transport provision given the recent reductions in private bus operator services, the Kinross High Street Regeneration Scheme is the subject of further consultation on improvements required, a Road Adoption Scheme for Drummond Park, CROOK now has all residents in agreement to part fund with PKC the proposal, an HGV ban for Back Crook Road in Fossoway is on the Area Committee's agenda, the Route Action Plans for the A911 & B9097 need progressing further after blind summit signage & flood prevention measures for the latter have been undertaken and concluding with the agreed capital provision for A977 mitigation measures that require to be completed from funding secured.

Apologies for the length of this reflection but it serves to illustrate to those that follow as elected members the commitment required to try and address the aspirations of folk in Kinross-shire, a place I have grown to love since moving here from the Borders in 1980.

Dear Douglas and Michael

ADDRESSING UK'S UNWRITTEN CONSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

I have thought long and hard before drafting this letter regarding the above but feel now is an opportune moment as we hopefully emerge frae the Covid Pandemic and approach the local authority elections this Spring in Scotland and elsewhere (elections I personally will not be contesting after 23 years unbroken service representing the Kinross-shire Ward of Perth & Kinross Council (PKC), firstly as a Liberal Democrat, then as an Independent and latterly as a Scottish Conservative & Unionist Councillor after the latter group agreed to support my original Manifesto commitment in 1999 to set up a devolved area committee of PKC for Kinross-shire).

I am not an enthusiast for Referendums, regarding them as 'a blunt tool' to assess opinion and if there have to be some in connection with our constitutional arrangements, then there should be thresholds to mandate change, not simple majorities. I also feel that all people born in the UK or residing here for a certain number

of years should be able to vote in any referendum that changes the current U.K. Having said that, I campaigned in the 2014 referendum for Scotland to remain within the UK (Kinross-shire Ward had one of the strongest votes for the union in the country) and in the EU referendum since for Britain to leave the EU. Subsequent events have not changed my position on both issues!

One of the strongest lessons from the COVID pandemic is that it should have been controlled on a UK wide basis with full involvement of the 4 UK 'nations' in a joint committee to produce common and easily understood guidance for the population since viruses don't respect borders; as an island nation we singularly failed to do that!

I believe it is imperative that we wrestle the constitutional agenda away frae the SNP since the UK's arrangements are not just about Scotland. Their leaders constantly refer to having a democratic mandate for another referendum in 2023, whilst ignoring the clear democratic wish of voters in Scotland in 2014 that they wish to remain part of the UK, in a vote both sides accepted was a 'once in a generation vote'. I would also question why the Scottish civil service can be used by a devolved administration to make the case for separation using public funds?

The Priority for all tiers of Government in the UK at the moment is to concentrate on managing our way out of this COVID Pandemic, dealing with the health issues that have multiplied because of it and rebuilding our economy and society. We should, however, acknowledge that there is work to be done on our constitutional arrangements and I believe the time is right to invite other parties to take part in such a debate and examine options going forward through a constitutional convention committee. They may reject such an approach, but the offer should be made 'in good faith' and I would criticise Labour and the Liberal Democrats for refusing to work with the Scottish Conservatives post the last referendum; they have let supporters of the Union down!

This is a personal letter and not an official Council communication.

I am a 'Federalist' when it comes to debate about the future of the UK: but this 'option' is currently not on the table: it must be! In fact, I would like to see the Scottish Conservatives adopt this as a policy aim for the forthcoming elections aforementioned. We should learn from history because the failure of Gladstone's Home Rule Bill for Ireland in the early twentieth century resulted in the partition of that country rather than delivering what most Irishmen at the time would have been happy with. The resultant border remains the source of current problems in delivering a workable 'Brexit' negotiation with the EU. Northern Ireland should not be treated differently to the rest of the UK as regards arrangements with the EU. I think there is now a strong case to embrace a federal government structure for Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales with full control of all domestic policy and the tax required to deliver it. Any devolution within the Celtic nations should remain their sole responsibility. There should be mechanisms to ensure no hindrances to trade across borders within the UK. Such Federal



Governments' powers would exclude common defence and relations with the commonwealth (should have been a trading bloc after 2nd World War), European and other foreign countries; crossborder infrastructure/transport projects (a shared responsibility if jointly funded), currency and financial services, immigration and border control and finally, importantly, the monarchy!

However, Federal Governments should be 'consulted' on such excluded reserved matters. There is, however, a strong need to examine the adequacy of scrutiny of federal government operations and review the possible requirement of second chambers here.

Alongside this Federal structure, in order to properly deliver on a 'levelling-up agenda' with proper representation, we should examine the creation of 'powerful' Regional Assemblies for England, preferably based on former counties and tribal areas that people continue to identify with i.e. Anglia, Cornwall, Cumbria, Lancastria, London (Greater), Mercia (East & West), Northumbria, Wessex, Yorkshire (East, North, South & West). The House of Commons should monitor the operations of these Regional Assemblies in England and cover all nondevolved reserved matters.

Finally, we should address the long-standing issue of reform of the House of Lords, which should be reduced in size significantly with less party nominations, less hereditary membership and more representation from people of experience in business and public life. It should continue to act as the revising chamber for England and on non-devolved reserved matters. I am yet to be convinced of the need for elected second revising/scrutiny chambers which solely would mirror the outcome of elections to the principal chambers in the Commons and Federal Governments; their main function being scrutiny based on the experience of members.

Apologies for the length of this letter but I hope you may find my suggestions helpful in taking the UK forward to a more democratic and prosperous future of co-operation for all its people.

SO MUCH HAS CHANGED in the world since my last contribution in the *Kinross Newsletter*. The unspeakable crimes which are being inflicted by Putin on innocent Ukrainians are on our media screens not just day by day but hour by hour. It is scarcely believable that this is happening in the twenty-first century



and on such a scale that threatens the world order that has been in place since the end of the Cold War. We feel helpless too which raises so many other questions about the alliances of the Western world and what action we need to take to defend our precious democracies.

As we have all watched with horror the events in Ukraine, it has been humbling to see the response of communities across Perth and Kinross. So many people quickly mobilised to gather together funds and items for those who have left their homes and now find themselves displaced with very few belongings. Perth and Kinross has strong and valued links with Eastern Europe. The Polish communities have taken a lead in gathering items and I would encourage anyone who can to donate to this humanitarian effort. I am sure that many people in Perth and Kinross will be keen to do their bit for Ukraine by offering a room to refugees through the UK Government's Homes for Ukraine scheme.

While the impact of the conflict on living costs for families – particularly at the fuel pump – has received extensive media coverage, the immediate peril facing our farmers has been covered to a far lesser extent. Just like the rest of the population, farmers are feeling the pinch of the increasing price of fuel which they require to power the wide variety of agricultural vehicles.

For farmers in rural communities like Kinross-shire, the war has also brought many additional challenges. It has been reported that farmers will be unlikely to be able to buy fertiliser for the spring planting season with supplies having dried up as a result of Russia (producer of a fifth of the world's supply) ending exports of urea to the UK. Prices had risen to over £1000 per tonne for fertiliser, however stock now remains unavailable to purchase at all for the foreseeable future. Unless farmers have already obtained the fertiliser, they will be unable to grow food which will hamper UK food production and lead to the inflation of prices for consumers. Indeed, if we choose to do nothing to support farmers through this crisis, it will inevitably lead to implications for us all in the near future.

So what can we do to support local farmers in Kinross-shire and the wider Perth and Kinross area in their time of crisis? It is paramount that we buy local produce while it is still available which will ensure farmers have enough income to purchase fertiliser when it again becomes available. I am aware that Tayside Contracts recently organised a 'meet the producer' event with the aim of encouraging the greater use of local food produce in school meals. I warmly support any moves such as this which seek to make use of the food we can produce here in Perth and Kinross.

Supporting the agricultural sector through this crisis is essential for mitigating the increase in food prices which could be upon us soon, and every individual can help this situation by buying local. I will seek to raise these issues on behalf of farmers in the Scottish Parliament.

ONE MONTH AGO — in late February — Perth and Kinross Council held a meeting to set the budget for the coming year. Each party/group of councillors presented a budget, with the Conservative budget being voted through due to their superior numbers.

One major difference between the SNP budget and the other two main budgets is the choice of how to use the remaining money from the £52 million that the Scottish Government provided to Perth and Kinross Council to help during the pandemic. The remaining Covid reserve is £9.5 million. It is important to note that this Covid reserve is separate from the normal reserves held by the Council to deal with any emergencies.

In these unprecedented times we are witnessing a cost-ofliving crisis — mainly due to the huge rise in heating and fuel prices, but also due to increasing food prices — that are hitting our communities just as the Covid Recovery was beginning, the SNP group proposed a Covid Recovery budget that utilises £7.9 million of the remaining £9.5 million.

In comparison, the Conservative budget used only £1 million of this money. And the Lib Dems budget did not use any of it, tucking it away, supposedly for a rainy day. For many people in Kinross-shire, this is already a rainy day. And it follows many other rainy days over the past two years. The people of Kinross-shire and throughout the whole of the council area need help now.

The SNP budget would use these Covid funds to help the communities we serve and would show our commitment to a 'Green Recovery'.

The SNP budget would mean extra welfare-rights capacity to support the most vulnerable in our communities, extra resources to deal with fly tipping, more investment in Grit Bins and our roads infrastructure, and proper funding for our Local Action Partnership—as well as investment in other areas.

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A key part of our Covid Recovery should be that it is a Green Recovery, so our SNP budget set aside over a million pounds to invest in new green technologies, including -

- £250K pounds to support trials using innovative green-heating solutions for houses.
- £300K to support feasibility grants for local community-led renewable-energy developments, like the successful Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro Society scheme near the Crook of Devon.
- £100K to fund feasibility proposals to set up private grid systems, aimed at locally produced green energy that provides efficient, low-cost clean energy.
- £200K towards feasibility studies to support the possibilities around the circular economy.
- £200K to help attract new clean-technology manufacturing to PKC, implementing SMART manufacturing.

As part of delivering this, the SNP budget commits to providing additional staff capacity to add to and complement the excellent staff resources we already have and to ensure a fair and just transition to Net Zero.

In addition, the SNP budget would set aside significant sums of money to address community resilience — especially in dealing with the impacts of climate change — as well as extra money to invest in free parking for electric vehicles and community car share schemes. The SNP budget would set up a strategic review of how public transport is delivered throughout the Council Area and would invest in local bus services that work for our communities by providing proper timetables.

If the SNP gets the majority at the council elections on 5 May, then we will bring 'Our Budget' before Council as soon as possible, to ensure we can invest in a Green recovery, building a innovative and ambitious council.

MY GRANDMA USED TO tell me about the bomb shelters. Across Scotstoun, she said, the terrifying wailing could be heard, a moaning warning amplified up the closes and through the tenement backcourts. It penetrated their top floor room



and kitchen as the children grabbed their pre-packed satchels full of homework. She, in turn, grabbed the children.

My Grandpa was seldom there. He worked nights at his shipyard in Clydebank, riding the darkened tram down Dumbarton Road until, one bright moonlit night, German bombers struck. The two days of devastating bombing became known as the 'Clydeside Blitz'. Like so many other men, he never returned home and there was no funeral. The men's pay packets found amidst the rubble were divided equally between the widows.

The bereaved family had to cope as best they could. But the underground bomb shelters held fresh terror offering, as the families now knew, no defence from a direct hit. And black outwalks to and from school through Kelvingrove Park were bleak.

I was born in the 1960s when my Grandma's grief still seemed acute. But her generation's memories of unimaginable grief at the destruction wrought across our continent convinced us that we'd never again see war visited upon Europe on such a scale again. The Cold War which held nations captive on the wrong side of the Iron Curtain offered a grim stability.

When the Wall fell, I was a young reporter on 'Newsnight'. I visited the darkened streets of East Berlin, exploring the majestic architecture of Mitte, its buildings still pockmarked by bullets and shrapnel. Hope was in the air. Some called the period 'the end of history'. Old nations claimed their seats at the United Nations. We promised, collectively, to renounce war and respect existing borders. Dictatorships held free elections, and in some cases elected dictators. George Bush looked Putin in the eye, got a sense of soul he said, and found him trustworthy. It was an assessment the people of Grozny, Syria, Crimea, and now the rest of Ukraine would not share.

I've been thinking a lot about my Grandma as I watch the carnage in Ukraine. As I write, Vladimir Putin has bombed a theatre sheltering 1000 people with 'children' written outside in large Cyrillic letters to deter attack. War crimes are being committed by the invaders daily. Old people are being stretchered out of their apartments, blinking and dazed. Maternity wards have come under attack, and Germany is rearming in response. Retired generals are speaking on the radio about Kyiv being encircled in a mediaeval style siege.

My Grandma died four decades ago. In the intervening years, our societies have advanced technologically beyond recognition. But, in the heart of Europe, another war criminal is pounding a civilian population in the hope of crushing their collective spirit into submission. He will fail. But how dismal it is that we bear witness not to the end of history, but the endless recycling of a centuries-old story.

Kinross-shire Local Committee: The next meeting of the Kinross-shire Local Committee has been set to meet virtually on 21 April at 4pm. If you would like to join the meeting please let me know and I will send you the contact details.



Embankment Mill Street: The Council have replanted the embankment on the north side of Mill Street. This embankment has been a problem for some time and had become very unsightly, overgrown with weeds, brambles and self-seeded trees. It has been a huge task to clear the ground and replant it. The work should greatly improve the appearance of this important part of central Kinross.



Bus Stop, South Street: There is a growing problem with delivery vehicles and cars parking both in the entrance to Church Street and at the South Street bus stop opposite. This makes it very difficult for buses to stop to pick up passengers and is also causes traffic hold ups. I have written to the Council to see what action can be taken to alleviate the problem. It will likely need better road marking and parking enforcement.

Ride Across Britain: The event is a multi-day cycle ride (not a competitive race) and is made up of nine stages starting at Land's End and finishing at John O'Groats. There will be up to 900 riders on the event each day and each stage starts in the early morning and finishes in the early evening. There will be 2 pit stops on each day with food, water and sports nutrition at each. The riders will be set-off from the start of each stage in small groups to minimise the impact on the road network. Simple route signage will be erected the day before the event and removed the day of the event behind the final rider. The riders are due to pass through Kinross-shire on Friday 16 September, cycling from Hopetoun House, Edinburgh to Strathdon in Aberdeenshire, a distance of 112 miles. The route through Kinross-shire is Keltybridge – Gairneybridge – Kinross High Street – Milnathort – Middleton Farm – Glenfarg – Perth via the Wicks o' Baiglie road.

I WOULD LIKE TO TAKE THIS opportunity to remind people to take precautions whilst dealing with unsolicited callers.

Bogus callers try to get into your home or obtain personal details by pretending to be someone they're not, including council staff, charity collectors, meter readers and police officers. In reality, they are criminals trying to steal money and valuables.

How can I protect myself from doorstep crime?

- Be on guard if someone turns up unexpectedly.
- Keep front and back doors locked.
- Use the door viewer or nearby window when answering the door.
- Fit a door chain or bar use it and keep it on when talking to callers at the door.
- If you're not sure, don't answer the door.
- Don't feel embarrassed genuine callers expect you to be careful.
- Only let callers in if they have an appointment and you have confirmed they are genuine.
- Always ask for identification badges of anyone you answer the door to, but don't rely on them. Identity cards can be faked – phone the company to verify their identity.
- Some companies offer a password system. Ask your utility providers if this can be used and if you have a password with a company make sure the caller uses it.
- Never let people try to persuade you to let them into your home even if they are asking for help – they may not be genuine. If someone is persistent, ask them to call at another time and arrange for a friend or family member to be with you.
- Never agree to pay for goods or give money to strangers who arrive at your door.
- Don't keep large amounts of money in your home.
- Remember, it's your home. There's no reason why anyone should ever enter your home against your wishes.
- If you're not sure, don't answer the door.

What action should I take if someone visits me and I think they're a doorstep criminal?

- Keep the caller out of your house, ask them to leave and call the police immediately by dialing 101.
- You might also want to try to alert a family member or attract a neighbour's attention but you should always contact the police first by dialing 101. The police would much rather attend a false alarm than have someone fall victim to a doorstep criminal.
- If the person refuses to leave your door, or you feel threatened or scared Call 999 and ask for the police.
- Note down their description and the description of any vehicle they're using, including make, model, colour and registration number.

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TRANSFORMING THE PARK & RIDE

AFTER A COUPLE OF years of proposals and dialogue, at last in March work began to transform the muddy grass centre strips in the Kinross Park and Ride car park. The community driven project, led by Kinross-shire Civic Trust, was funded by a grant from the Scottish Government's Nature Restoration Fund, administered for Kinross-shire by Perth and Kinross Council. Our contractor was Thomson Landscapes, who stripped away the overgrown turf, which had bulked up so much over the decades since it was laid, that rainfall draining off the car park puddled in the carpark spaces, rather than enter the soakaway beneath the grass. The level of the soil beneath the turf was lowered and regraded to allow scope for growth in the new wildflower turf which has now been sown there. A volume of free space ('freeboard') for exceptional cloudbursts, (very intensive rainstorms), to linger as they take time to soak away, has also been created on top of the new vegetation.

Two new raingarden features have thus been established. On the larger of the two main available grass areas, most of the turf had to be removed and a seedbed was created. Strips of conventional turf were re-laid along the edges to stabilise the bare soil there in case of heavy rain which might have washed much of it into the centre, displacing any seeds carefully sown by our volunteers. Strips were also laid to divide the area into manageable spaces for sowing seeds in the seedbeds created by the contractor. The strips were laid in diagonals, forming a chevron effect, and allowing the volunteers to work the beds without compacting them too much. As the plants grow, it will become a more integrated vegetation than if there were simple direct lines across it.

A central barrier fence has been provided to remind drivers not to try and drive across the features.

The excellent volunteers were members of the Kinross-shire



Civic Trust, Kinross in Bloom, and a couple of friends who also joined in enthusiastically. The seeds were an urban wildflower meadow mix, supplied by Scottish native plants specialist Scotia Seeds. That seed mix was developed by ecologists at Edinburgh University and includes species selected to provide

some plants in bloom over a prolonged spring to autumn flowering season. Whilst the primary design aspiration of the Edinburgh ecologists was to have a long period providing nectar for pollinators, it also means flow-



ers should be in bloom somewhere from March to September. Blooms will include poppies, ox-eye daisies, vetches and cowslips; 21 wildflower species; a grass meadow mix. We also included some patches of seeds from Scotia Seeds 'Get nectar rich quick' seed mix. They were purchased for the long narrow mud strip, before we knew about the council's alternative plan

to create a rock feature. It's a 100% wildflower mix, so should provide more visual diversity to the raingarden.

To provide more interest during the weeks required for seeds to germinate and seedlings to grow, we also planted some plug plants. These included flowers such as meadow cranesbill and ox-eye daisy, as well as some red campion, red clover and devil's bit scabious.

Although the features are raingardens, (vegetation designed to accept rainfall running off the surrounding surfaces), the areas will dry quickly in a prolonged dry summer, so wetland plants will struggle to survive. In ten small 'dustbin-lid size' places (where large concrete blocks – footings from former fences – had to be excavated, creating deeper

hollows) we have done a bit of bog-garden creation, lining the small excavations with pond-liner off-cuts, to slow the rate of infiltration at those places. That has allowed us to add

some wet meadow plants such as spring flowering lady's smock, (also known as cuckoo flower) and marsh marigold; summer flowering ragged robin; and late summer blooming purple loosestrife.

raingarden feature, a native wildflower turf has been used in the centre of the car park to try and get soil stabilisation and meadow growth more quickly and securely. We aim to compare both raingardens as they develop over the coming months and years.

Once the seeds, plug plants and turf had all been sown, planted and laid respectively, we tested the drainage performance by dropping the excess water we had for the plants, on the new car park surface. Happily, it ran gently across and down into the drainage features – soon to become much better known as the Kinross Park and Ride raingardens!

We are most grateful to our volunteers, especially our project manager Andrew Flinn, without whom this work could not have been done, and to the helpful staff of Perth and Kinross Council.





KNOW YOUR RIGHTS by Joyce

GENERALLY SPEAKING, many of us are not afraid to complain if we feel that we have been kept waiting too long or if we have received bad service somewhere. We feel confident and speak up, often achieving a discounted bill or an apology. Only the other day I was standing in the supermarket and heard a lady complaining because she had been wrongly charged for an item. The shop assistant duly investigated and refunded the money and the wronged individual went on with her day. It is easy to challenge when you have the correct information and know that you have been wronged.

However, it is not so easy to stand up for yourself or ensure that you are properly represented when you are out of your depth or experiencing difficulties you have not encountered before. In the current climate of rising costs and zero hours contracts, people can quickly find themselves out of their depth and unsure where to turn. I regularly advise clients who have encountered unexpected circumstances; job loss, illness and bereavement are common themes. It is not uncommon for mental illness to hit and render a previously 'capable' professional unable to function. It can happen to any of us. No job means no income and, even for those with savings, money quickly runs out.

A well-known housing and homelessness charity once stated that



most people are three pay-days away from homelessness. A terrifying prospect but an accurate one. What would you do if the unthinkable happened?

Most people do not know that mortgage lenders have a duty (more formally known as 'pre-action protocol') to borrowers to work with them before taking legal action for unpaid mortgages. There are also numerous legal protections for those living in private and local authority tenancies. It all depends on the type of let you have and remember that the landlord cannot simply throw you out on the street. If they have not followed the correct legal procedure and obtained a valid eviction order, removing you from the tenancy could constitute a criminal offence.

Even if the worst happens and you have to move, have you considered all the options? As well as options which most people have heard of, such as sheltered housing, there are other schemes such as amenity housing as well as the existence of legal duties on local authorities to house people in certain circumstances. If you have an illness or disability, you may be able to apply for priority points and if you have problems with antisocial behaviour, you may be able to apply for social needs points for example. Although the word 'homelessness' is scary, that does not mean that you have to be roofless; if you are living with a friend, 'sofa-surfing' or are suffering domestic abuse (including financial coercion and control), you may be eligible for help.

When people think of lawyers, they tend to think of making wills, getting a divorce or buying a house. However, social welfare lawyers are there to help with problems like those described in this article. To make people aware of their legal rights and to help them protect their position. Whatever your problem or dilemma, and however big it seems, get advice as soon as possible. In most cases, the law is there to protect you and it is often a case of knowing your rights and how to invoke them.

Bowel Screening:

Scottish Bowel Screening Programme



Bowel Screening

Bowel cancer is a major public health problem in Scotland. The Scottish Bowel Screening Programme invites men and women aged between 50 and 74 to take part in screening every two years. Bowel screening aims to find cancer at an early stage when treatment is likely to be more effective. Bowel screening is the only screening programme where the test is completed at home.

Key Facts

- Scotland has a higher rate of bowel cancer than most other countries in the Western world.
- Bowel cancer is the third most common cancer in Scotland. Around 4,000 people in Scotland get bowel cancer every year.
- From age 50 onwards the risk of bowel cancer is higher.
- Men are more likely to have a positive screening result.
 Early diagnosis is key: 9 out of 10 people survive bowel
- cancer if it's found early.
- You are 14 times more likely to survive bowel cancer if it is found early



The simpler bowel screening test is likely to overcome a process barrier for those who found the gFOBT test difficult or unhygienic to complete.

NHS inform has all the bowel screening information for the public. This includes information in audio format, British Sign Language format and video format.

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EMOTIONS: What Are They Good For?

Winning Ways by Jo Middlemiss

IN MY WORK, I FIND that people generally think that emotions are a nuisance. Being emotional is weak and hysterical. Being unemotional is regarded as cold, critical and unloving. It sounds like a lose/lose situation. The truth is that as human beings we are all emotional, whether we show it or not. Some peoples' emotions are close to the surface, and others bury theirs deeply, where they think they can do no damage. Sadly they are mistaken. Emotions are never buried dead. They are always buried alive, and will eventually surface. This explains sudden bursts of temper or tears. Emotions are triggered by thoughts, and are signposts to help you learn, from what ever is happening to you. We tend to be very unproductive, if we are trapped by our emotions. The best thing to do with emotions is to acknowledge and accept them, as something helpful.

With some practise, you can clock your emotions, and become aware of what they are telling you. Take anger. The simple question is, 'What is this really about' or 'What is under this feeling'? The chances are that the answer is disappointment in someone, or something. Under disappointment is probably hurt or sadness. And it's probably really about something completely unrelated to the present incident.

Accept all your feelings, learn what you need to learn, and then let them go: bottling them up just keeps them hanging around, waiting to attach themselves to another situation, completely unrelated. Just as you can choose your attitude, so too you can choose how you are going to react. I am always alert when I hear people saying: 'So and so made me angry':

If we always give other people power over our thoughts and emotions, we'll always at the beck and call of their behaviour. That is disempowering. You need your power for your own life. Don't give it away to people or situations that don't have your best interests at heart.

You can also be in charge of keeping the emotion, or letting it go. Keep it, if it helps. Allow it to slip away if it doesn't. Keep asking yourself positive questions. 'How do I want to feel in this situation?" "What would be a helpful reaction in this situation?'

Feeling Boosters:

- Ask yourself 'What am I feeling? How do I feel about this?'
- Relax and feel your feelings, they'll flow and go. If you are feeling a very strong emotion, then do something physical. Walk it out, pound a pillow, or go for a hard cycle.
- Be curious and not critical of others' behaviour. Try not to blame. It does you more harm than the other person.
- When a lot of negative feelings are in your mind, have a collection of happy memories, which you like to revisit.
- Make friends with your feelings. They are helpful, but not in charge of you.
- You often hear talk of Emotional Intelligence. Some people have it naturally, but we can all learn it by being aware of our own emotions, and being curious but not critical of others.

Kinross Community Council News from the February meeting

Present at the meeting held on 22 February were CCllrs L McKay, (Chair), CCllr D Colliar, CCllr W Freeman, CCllr T Stewart Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters, Mrs Caron Aird minute-taker and 2 members of the public

Apologies had been received from Cllr M Barnacle, CCllr H Phillips, CCllr M Wood and Police Scotland.

Police Report

Police Scotland had submitted their apologies for the meeting, but a report had been received and had been circulated to members. It was noted that there had been several break-ins in the area recently, along with speeding offences.

Matters Arising

Parking At Co-op

CCllr Phillips had written to the owners regarding the car park. The parking conditions had been amended.

Proposed Sale of Private Parking Area to Owner of Myre Cottage, Smith Street, Kinross

It was noted that at the last meeting, KCC had decided to object to the proposed sale of the piece of land next to Myre Cottage, however it was now felt that the CC should not oppose this and CCIIr Phillips was requested not to send the letter of objection, as per the minutes of the previous meeting.

Kinross Town Centre

Members noted that the survey in respect of the High Street had been issued, and the deadline for responses extended. CCllr McKay advised that she and CClllr Phillips had spent time in the High Street recently speaking to residents to get their opinions, and there had been positive feedback. However, it was noted that the local businesses were concerned about the potential for another set of works in the area and had commented that they may not survive if this was to go ahead.

Surplus Funding – Provost's Lamp

CCIIr D Colliar advised that there was £1432 remaining from the funding provided by the Arthur and Margaret Thomson Trust, and that normal procedure would be to return these funds to the Trust. It was suggested that some single seats be purchased to put at the base of the lamp, and it was agreed that KCC would write to the Trust to advise them of this. It was also noted that approval from PKC would be required before anything was purchased.

Planning Matters

Applications Received

21/02225/FLL Formation of hard standing area, erection of storage shed, gates, alterations to fencing and associated works at King George V Playing Field, Muirs, Kinross

Members were reminded that a similar application was made a few years ago and the CC wrote a letter of objection to PKC. It was agreed that since this was a similar application (keeping the trees in place), another letter of objection should be written advising CC's concerns that this was the same application but in a different format.

21/02230/FLL erection of an agricultural building, formation of access track and associated works at land southwest of Levencorrach, Balado

Reports From PKC Councillors

Clir Robertson advised that PKC were meeting the following day to discuss the budget for 2022/23 with several savings were requiring to be made. It was noted that road safety issues concerns to be the biggest concern raised and while money had been allocated last year, this had been unspent due to several reasons including the inability to recruit staff and the allocation of short-term contracts.

Cllr Robertson also advised that a joint letter had been sent regarding the water quality in Loch Leven. There is a meeting next week where this matter will be discussed, and it was noted that there needed to be more information made available in respect of the impact on the resident's health before PKC approved any more housing applications. **Cllr Watters** advised that following a feasibility study, the issue appeared to be in relation to the phosphates coming of the land surrounding the loch and if the water is higher than 17°C, then this also causes an issue.

There is due to be a litter pick on the main road (southbound) until the fishtail and it is hoped that an improvement will be seen shortly.

Clir Purves thanked everyone for their efforts in respect of the survey of the High Street and advised that initial feedback had been positive.

He advised that there was now WiFi in the town centre and urged members to use it and advise him of any efforts.

Cllr Purves, in response to a question from a member of the public, agreed to investigate the issue surrounding the use of the Loch Leven Community Campus outwith school hours as it was felt the Campus was being run as a school as opposed to a community use facility. The member of the public highlighted a number of concerns including the campus being closed due to a lack of staff.

Members noted that the PKC meetings had not been held over the last couple of years and if they had been, the CC had not been invited. It was agreed that Cllr Purves would investigate these matters and report back to a future meeting.

Clir Watters advised that there would be some traffic disruption at Lathro shortly as Persimmon Homes start to join up the sewers.

The renewal of the planning application for the toilets at the Pier requires to be completed and members agreed that this should be renewed.

Reports From CC Representatives CCIIr Colliar

Signage at Bowton Road

CCIIr Colliar confirmed that CIIr Robertson and himself had visited the area to review the signage and agreed that this was inadequate. CIIr Robertson is to raise the issue with PKC Roads Department and ask for additional signage to be arranged.

CCIIr L McKay

Partnership/Website

CCllr McKay advised that she had spoken with Dave West and



agreed for herself and CCIIr Phillips to meet with him for a final meeting in respect of the website. CCIIr Colliar reported that the CC had decided at the previous meeting to withdraw from this venture but CCIIr McKay felt that there should be a final meeting to discuss the matter one final time. She commented that there was funding available until 1 March 2022 to complete the work but CCIIr Colliar advised that this money belonged to the Community Initiative Fund. CCIIr McKay would provide an update at the next meeting

CCllr McKay advised that clearance had been received for PKC to manage/adopt the outdoor gym area for the next 10 years. Positive feedback had been received on the facility.

CCIIr McKay raised the issue of a lack of notification from PKC in respect of road closures

Correspondence

Census 2022

An email had been received advising of several vacancies for enumerators for the Census. It was agreed that the information would be shared on the website and Facebook page.

Scottish Water Repairs

It was noted that there would be a prohibition of parking/ loading in the High Street for a period in April to allow Scottish Water to carry out repairs.

AOCB

Kirklands Hotel

A member of the public, while welcoming the development at Kirklands, enquired as to whether the cones outside the area were official. Cllr Robertson agreed to investigate this matter.

Path at Lathro Lane/Dalwhinnie

A member of the public raised the issue of continual flooding at the power station in the area. It was agreed that the member of the public would forward photographs of the area in question to ClIr Robertson, and he would raise the issue with PKC and report back.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be on 26 April 2022 at 7.30pm.

Milnathort And Orwell Community Council

News from the March Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 10 March were M Thomson (chairman); N Bingham, A Macrae, P Britton (treasurer); K Heneghan (associate member); B Brian, L Rougvie (minute secretary), Cllr W Robertson and two members of the public. **Apologies** were received from A Ward, F Books and Cllr C Purves.



Police Matters:

Neill Bingham reported on the following:

Naloxone: All police officers now carry Naloxone overdose spray as part of their kit, following a successful pilot scheme carried out last year. So far, the emergency treatment (which counters the effects of opioid overdose) has been used on 62 occasions.

Sheep worrying: Dog owners are reminded to keep their pets fully under control during the lambing season. Owners face prosecution if their dogs worry or chase sheep, and the dog could be destroyed.

Matters Arising

Kevin Heneghan advised that the gingko biloba tree that had been gifted to a resident of Church Street was to be planted on Milnathort Golf Course and the CC would provide a plaque.

Correspondence:

PKC is currently carrying out a public consultation as to the most suitable locations for free period products. The consultation closes on March 25.

In response to a query made by the CC on behalf of a resident, PKC confirmed that Ba'Hill was not a suitable location for a recycling bin for foil containers. It was not economically viable to site such facilities anywhere other than recycling centres.

PKC has announced new funding to help with repairs to communal buildings through its Missing Shares Service. An application pack is available by emailing *MissingShares@pkc.gov.uk*.

There are still vacancies for enumerators to help deliver the 2022 Census. Visit *www.scotlandscensus.gov.uk* for more information.

A consultation has been launched on a proposed bill by Murdo Fraser MSP to tackle the scourge of fly-tipping. The consultation closes on 23 May and further information can be found at *parliament.scot*.

Core Paths Group

Kevin Heneghan reported on the following:

There had been an excellent turnout of volunteers for two recent projects to fill in the depressions on the path alongside the golf course. More than two tonnes of material was required, and a similar amount will be needed for the stretch beyond the bridge.

Funding may be available from Greenspace to improve the woodland and field edge path north east of Kinross Community Woodland that is currently extremely muddy. Alistair McLeod of Greenspace is to help the group with its application.

The group had conducted research into the type of benches that would be most suitable for the village and had concluded that recycled plastic uprights and wooden seats were the most cost-effective and practical option. Kevin will explore sponsorship opportunities.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee

During a discussion about ways of marking the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, the following ideas were put forward:

A gathering in Donaldson Park to which villagers could bring their own gazebos. No alcohol would be permitted.

Providing Milnathort Primary schoolchildren with mementos of the occasion. Cllr Robertson will find out what funding is available. A beacon that would be sited permanently at an appropriate location in the village. Neill Bingham will take this forward.

Upgrading a core path to a high standard and naming it 'The Platinum Jubilee Walk'. Cllr Robertson said that TRACKS could offer help and advice if necessary. Schoolchildren could be asked to plant trees as part of the UK-wide Queen's Green Canopy initiative. Kevin Heneghan will provide suggestions for suitable routes.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Robertson advised that he had met with representatives from SEPA, Scottish Water, PKC's planning department and NatureScot regarding the amount of phosphorus in Loch Leven. It had been a positive meeting and the agencies had agreed to look at ways in which the levels could be reduced.

AOCB

New pavement: Malcolm Thomson expressed his appreciation to PKC for installing a new pavement on Stirling Road at its junction with Church Street.

Social media: Bobby Brian, a P5 pupil at Kinross High School, is to set up Instagram and Twitter accounts on behalf of the CC in order to extend its reach to younger members of the community. **Unsafe parking:** Bobby Brian raised the issue of congestion near Heaven Scent in South Street, caused by cars parking at the bus stop. This causes problems for passengers, particularly those with disabilities. It was noted that there is a parking restriction at that location and that causing an obstruction is an offence. Similar concerns were expressed about cars parking on the zig-zag lines next to the Zebra crossing in South Street, which can affect motorists' visibility. There has been an increased presence of traffic wardens in the village and this was to be welcomed, as were the changes to the Highway Code, which give pedestrians priority at all times.

The next meeting of Milnathort and Orwell Community Council will be held at 7pm on Thursday, 14 April, 2022. Following discussion, it was agreed that before the meeting a 'dummy run' would be carried out to see whether it was possible for participants to also join via Zoom.

Matters Arising

Community Development Trust: CCIIrs Duffy and Marchant had a meeting with CIIr Barnacle and reported that the CC was not supportive of joining with Muckhart to form a joint CDT. Next step is to seek funds to do a community mail shot to determine interest in forming a CDT.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: Awaiting evaluation of 202 bus service. It is believed that the service has been regularly used. Hopefully it will continue beyond the trial. There is still only one person driving for the DRT.

A977 Mitigation Measures: Cllr Purves has made an application to request speed measuring lines to the west of Crook of Devon and east of Drum, and this has been supported. CCllr Mudie has had input from Drum residents raising safety concern due to drivers going through red lights. CCllr Mudie will use a survey to gather views on desired mitigation actions. One idea has been the addition of flashing warning lights. CCllr Duffy will speak to PC Craig regarding regulations for a red-light camera for the traffic lights.

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

It does appear that in recent days an attempt has been made to clean part of the site.

Speeding in Carnbo: MoP reported a recent incident of possible speeding resulting in a near miss. Storm Arwen has knocked out the solar panel linked to the speed camera. Cllr Purves agreed to report this to PKC. CCllr Duffy asked MoP if anyone in Carnbo is interested in joining the speedwatch group. Cllr Purves will raise speeding issues at next Kinross-shire committee meeting.

Community Speedwatch: CCIIr Mudie is taking the lead on this and will organise primary school children to write letters about their worries of speeding which could be included in notifications to speeding motorists. Volunteers will have a basic police check. Funds need to be raised to purchase equipment. Training will be given to volunteers.

Devonshaw Whinstone Quarry: CCllr Marchant toured the Devonshaw Quarry with developers on 15 February. The PAN has been submitted and a virtual event to open the consultation on 3 March can be accessed via *www.devonshaw-leisure-park-consultation.com*. A MoP raised concern for potential impact on the SSSI site.

Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge: We are still awaiting quotes for the otter and tree surveys.

Crook & Drum Growing Together: Agreement to start a community apple orchard on land close to the Church.

Hedges from Rumbling Bridge to Muckhart: CCllr Duffy emailed Muckhart regarding the hedges requiring cutting but there has been no response.

New Business:

Coulshill Forest Near Dunning: An application has been made which contains proposals for 641.21 hectares of afforestation, 13.95 hectares of forest road and 4.65 hectares of forest quarries. Public access provision will be enhanced through the establishment of a new car park and new forest.

Comments by 24 March – CCllr Marchant will provide a supportive comment regarding enhanced public access.

NP4 Consultation: The Scottish Government are encouraging communities to respond to the NP4 consultation which closes on 31 March. CCIIr Marchant will develop and submit the CC response. CIIr Purves reported that PKC has started to consider LDP3. Local place plans can be produced by local communities. Queen's Jubilee: The CC has received several emails from organisations regarding plans, applications for road closures must be made to PKC. CIIr Purves reported that PKC are considering a funding pot for events.



Portmoak Community Council News from the March Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 8 March were Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson, and R Watters; CCllrs D Morris (Vice-Chair), A Davidson (Treasurer), SMcGregor (Secretary), K Donaldson, S Forde, D Paterson; and 5 Members of Public.

Apologies: CCllrs A Miller, G Smith, and D Paterson

Comments and Approval of previous Minutes from meeting on 8 February 2022:

S McGregor: date inaccuracy to correct for approval of previous month's minutes should be 'Jan 11 2022'.

D Morris: correction regarding the Bowhouse Bus Laybys, minutes state 'RTK original developers were to install a bus layby on the West bound side of the A911', this should East bound side.

S Forde: Proposed. A Davidson: Seconded

Matters Arising

Kinross-shire Committee (KC) – update: Cllr C Purves spoke, there was no substantial update. At the Feb PCC meeting Cllr M Barnacle had indicated an additional KC meeting should take place to discuss and set priorities but this had not yet been scheduled.

Road Safety Action Update: A911 Route Action Plan: a paper had been sent to Committee for consideration in 2022-23. Cllrs and Cllrs agreed it would be best practise to have a full consultation with residents to have all measures agreed at the beginning of the process. There was a discussion about the types of speed restriction measures that could be used, given that 20mph speed limits appeared to have limited effect, and there was support for physical constraints to be introduced in all of the communities along the A911, and/or one-way priorities which seem to work well in other small villages. There was agreement to look at all mitigation measures and to approach a route action plan with an open mind as to the solutions.

Glenlomond sewage, and Water Supply to Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie: The village committee had submitted a FOI request to ScotGov to confirm how many other, similar sewage works had been taken over. ScotGov had pushed back on this request, suggesting the information would be supplied by Scottish Water. A subsequent FOI had now been made to Scottish Water with the same request. There was an expectation of reply before the end of March.

Glenlomond tree felling and clearing at entrance to village: Cllr A Davidson provided an update on the vegetation clearance work that had been going on at the entrance to the Glenlomond village site. More clearing has been completed since the PCC Feb meeting. The existing owner who had demolished the nursing home has a buyer for the site. A company has been onsite doing due diligence onsite to establish services. There was particular concern about a small part of the site on Dryside Road, at the entrance to the village, which until recently was growing with rhododendrons and trees, but has now been completely cleared. Villagers were concerned about destruction of wildlife habitat and general pleasant appearance of the village landscape. PKC had been notified and had advised the clearing did not necessarily contravene planning rules. There was suggestion that potentially a wildlife crime may have been committed due to time of year and destruction of nesting sites. Residents were concerned that digging equipment may have exposed services or pipes. The digging equipment has now been removed. Cllr D Morris commented on the possibility for a village Development Trust to purchase the land under part 5 of the Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2016.

Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path: at time of meeting PCC had still to arrange the on-site meeting. The PCC and Cllrs discussed the importance of identifying the best route, and the development of a feasibility study. There was agreement that the 'best route' has not yet been identified and that in principle the project should be Scotlandwell led. Concern was expressed that Scotlandwell was poorly served in terms of safe connections to local facilities shops and school. There was general agreement that the project should be taken to the KC.

Wester Balgedie Farm development – correspondence to PCC from Developer: no formal planning permission has been sought at time of PCC meeting. Demolition of unsafe barns has taken place. There was concern from residents that some demolition of outhouses had taken place and some small trees cut down and photographs had been sent to PCC. The Developer had communicated with PCC in reference to a promised pre-planning meeting to present the development



plans to local residents but this was now likely to be delayed towards the end of March. The developer did not believe any demolition or tree removal had occurred.

Additional Item Core Paths: Cllr D Morris raised the item apropos of discussion in the Feb 22 PCC meeting, picking up on three items: 1. Establishment of MTHT/127 Core path from Arlary to the Orwell Standing Stones: Cllr Morris had visited the site and there is a thin strip of grass approximately along the line of the Core Path from Arlary to the A911 crossing to the MTHT/126 but it is unclear if it is intended to be the Core Path, and the gate at the Arlary end is still locked. Dave Stubbs at PKC has written to the farmer but had not received a response. Issue to be escalated. Cllr W Robertson will wait till mid-March and follow up again with D Stubbs.

Core Path PTMK/115 Glenlomond to Glenvale path: lambing season is about to commence. D Stubbs of PKC had suggested to close the path, but ClIr D Morris had highlighted that it is not easily possible to close a Core Path. The Core Path will remain open. D Morris had suggested that PKC should make it clear to anyone walking the Core Path between Glen Vale and Glenlomond (PTMK/115) that dogs should be on a lead through its whole length , throughout the year, partly because of lambing but also because of levels of public use. He also suggested that the 'dogs on lead' signs should be on every gate along the route to reinforce this message. PCC agreed with this approach and noted that a dogs on lead policy would help members of the public to remind dog owners of this requirement and to point out that simply saying that dogs had to be 'under close control' was not adequate in this situation.

New Matters

Portmoak Church Glebe lease to Woodland Trust: Church of Scotland lease of the East side Glebe field (on hill side of the A911) to the Woodland Trust would come to an end in June 22. PCC had been approached to establish if there were any objections to the suggestion that the site be offered to the Woodland Trust to purchase. On the question of a land transfer of the Glebe to be sold to the Woodland Trust, the PCC and attendees at meeting were in favour of the sale. Update on Lomond Inn site developments: work has started on one of the house sites. An old stone wall at the North end of the site should be rebuilt according to the planning requirements. PCC had made objections to the most recent planning application 21/0050/FLL and Cllr D Morris had spoken to this representation at the meeting of the PKC Planning Committee. In reviewing all the planning applications affecting the Lomond Inn site over the last ten years, covering both the demolition process and the decision to build large houses on the site, Cllr Morris noted that none of the many representations made by PCC on this matter had any effect on the planning process. Planning officers repeatedly ignored

Furthermore when the main planning application went before the planning committee approval was granted despite the opposition of the two PCC ward councillors on the committee. The other two ward councillors not on the committee were also opposed to the planning application. This crucial decision to approve a controversial proposal for development at the heart of Kinnesswood, in the Conservation Area, was therefore taken by Ward Councillors from elsewhere in Perth and Kinross, without any local knowledge of the Kinnesswood requirements. Cllr SMcGregor indicated that she had also followed this planning process over many years and agreed that the decision at the Planning Committee Meeting appeared to be taken by Councillors with no connection to the area and with a total disregard of the representations made by PCC and local people. Cllr W Robertson commented that historically representation had been listened to by the Planning Committee, but he felt this was no longer the case, and if the Planning Officers had recommended planning approval then the approval was nearly always granted by the committee. C Purves agreed with the point that W Robertson had made. Cllr Morris said there was a long standing problem with the planning committee in PKC which covered far too large an area. By contrast the much smaller area covered by Fife Council had three area committees. It was noted that an attempt was made to devolve planning services as part of the new KC arrangements, but this had failed.

Planning

Existing Applications

21/00997/FLL Erection of 22 dwellinghouses, 3 garages and a garage with ancillary accommodation, formation of SUDS pond, landscaping and associated works (LDP site H54) Land 100 Metres South East Of Cragton Villa Rost Gardens Scotlandwell.

No further updates, or planning applications have been submitted at time of meeting. R Watters flagged the National Planning Framework coming forward which had a specific focus on how to deal with planning applications for land that had peat. Retain item on Agenda for future meetings.

Planning Decisions

Progress with Developments: Westfield Community Liaison Committee: Cllr K Donaldson had attended Feb 22. Since beginning of month work has commenced on approach roads. There are machines now working on site itself. D Morris asked about vehicles using the wrong route: Cllr K Donaldson thought most of the heavy vehicles were using the B9097. There was a high level of traffic.

Paths Group update: PKC Ranger Alistair Macleod and 4 members completed some essential repairs on the hill section



of the MBW. Culverts and ditches have been cleared to improve the drainage. Gorse encroaching onto the path was cut back. The Paths Group extend their thanks to Alistair for all his help and providing the Paths Group with a good supply of tools and equipment using the PKC fund to support local paths groups. Volunteers for the Paths Group would be welcomed. Anyone wanting to help please contact Anne on 07547 457046.

Treasurer CC Accounts:

No movement on the accounts since Feb 22. Docs lodged for the Credit Union Account

Councillors' Reports

R Watters: Community Investment Fund: date to be defined for meeting to allocate final £16k.

W Robertson: update on Lochend to Heritage trail path: TRACKS applied for money from PKC, with the other half to come from ScotGov, but the latter application was turned down. This initial decision was challenged and unexpectedly overturned, so all the money is in place and work will start in the next financial year, in Summer 2022.

C Purves: gave a brief overview on budget, including: 2.5% likely increase on Council Tax. Reinstatement of posts for Road Safety Officers. Capital funding for road repairs has been put in place. Funds made available for business improvements. Additional sum for local KC to use at their discretion. Cllr C Purves does not intend to contest the next election, so in effect the PCC Mar 22 meeting would be the last that Cllr C Purves would attend. The PCC members expressed thanks to C Purves and to Cllr Barnacle, who was also standing down, for their considerable efforts in assisting and supporting PCC actions over the years.

Matters Notified To The Secretary:

Road closures in Kinnesswood: Gamekeepers Road 01/04/22, and Whitecraigs on 04/04/22: Roads to be closed for parking and loading.

School meals at Portmoak Primary: Cllr S Forde had raised concerns to the members of PCC about changes to school meal provision within PKC but had adjourned early from meeting and was unable to voice her concerns. The Secretary had contacted Head Teacher of Portmoak Primary on the item and had received a thorough response that seemed to allay concerns and gave reassurance that the Head Teacher was monitoring the situation on an ongoing basis.

Portmoak Hustings for forthcoming PKC Elections: Cllr D Morris raised suggestion of organising these: basically a forum whereby candidates present their proposals to the public. To discuss at the next PCC meeting.

Diamond Jubilee Events: C Purves advised £70k has been allocated to Perth and other funds to larger Towns for Jubilee events.

Matters Arising

The council was contacted via the Cllrs regarding drainage at Boreland but no progress has been made. This to be reviewed in two weeks to see if progress made.

Drains at Keltybridge are re-filling due to spoil from the building site and compacting. There is significant flooding due to this Broadband update and proposal for Maryburgh / Blairforge The Maryburgh project is now going live and fibre is being installed.

The Keltybridge Community Fibre Partnership is still ongoing and hoping to cover more of the outlying properties. Cleish and Blairadam is currently at 86% enabled or planned install. With thanks to Andrew Mitchell for the update.

It was noted from the floor that fibre is not provided with a backup battery so VOIP emergency calls could be an issue, though Openreach are not disabling the copper connections just yet.

Drainage Updates

No further updates other than from Tillhill who will be harvesting ahead of their schedule due to storm damage. This is on Cleish Hills and they have been excellent at communicating their harvesting and have undertaken to maintain the current drainage system and are willing to show the community what their plans are for replanning. The most risky areas will be harvested last to minimise potential flooding. Tillhill are also happy to have a meeting on-site to discuss the harvesting and any potential amendments. They have said they wish to minimise any potential flooding risk and engage with the community. This excellent and much appreciated. Planning Correspondence from Perth and Kinross

Legislation going through Parliament regarding Local Place Plans. This could be of significant benefit to communities, though exactly how it will be implemented is as yet to be completely defined. This will be added to LDPs (Local Development Plans) the next version of which has just started to be worked on over the next five years. This will allow communities to comment on what they would like to have happen in their areas, though how binding and what influence it will have is as yet to be seen. It is also believed that once templates are available then the process may become more streamlined and low cost. The changes in the LDP will incorporate more of the currently supplementary

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information so it is hoped that Local Place Plans will have a guiding influence.

Updates

It was reported from the floor that there may be an amended planning application for the plot by Hillcrest to reduce the number of approved houses from four to two.

Lots of dumping has been taking place in some of the fields by Blairforge and Cllr Watters confirmed that the Council is looking into this and SEPA is likely to be involved due to burning of waste.

Village Update – Blairadam

The Bench and planters have been moved and subject to approval from the owner they may go on the triangle at Maryburgh. The seat will be moved elsewhere in the village. Thanks to the council for picking up litter from the B996. The Council has now managed to get enough people to work on this as Covid restrictions have eased. The Layby off the B996 by junction five will be cleaned and fence repaired as it is subject to regular fly-tipping. The private water supply at Keltybridge (believed to be the third largest in Scotland) is working hard to resolve the issues with lead in the supply and has now mapped where the pies are and are taking steps to resolve this situation.

Village Update – Cleish

Cleish Primary is no longer facing closure and is going to progress to the next phases and should have about £3million spent on it to bring it up to specifications.

Cllr Purves explained that whilst it is good that after the 6-7 years the decision has finally been made, the appropriate consultation with the community was lacking and somewhat last minute.

The roll will be dropping from three classes to two unfortunately and capacity will be capped at 50. The two classrooms will be external and the existing building will be used for dining, administration and toilets.

Cllr Watters also pointed out that the initial papers duration of 4 years was far too long and has now been reduced to two years. It was also felt that the new building should be net zero carbon standard and that was unfortunately not confirmed, but it may also be that the council are looking at increasing the footprint of the school. Cllr Robertson pointed out that overall despite the issues this is an excellent result for Cleish and Blairadam and something to celebrate.

This is most definitely a positive result in the long term and secures the future of the school whilst providing a huge upgrade to the facilities it will have on offer.

Preparations to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee are under way in Cleish and flyers have been delivered and registration is required. Please consult your letterbox and see the dedicated email address on the flyer for further details.

Recípe

Supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

We all need a chocolate boost after the long winter. Here is a baked cheesecake which will go down well at Easter.

Easter Cheesecake

Ingredients

For the topping:-

- 200g chopped milk chocolate
- 300g full fat soft cheese
- 150g caster sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 150g sour cream
- 4 tbsp cocoa powder plus some for dusting
- chocolate shavings
- 20g maltesers, broken up
- 40g small chocolate eggs
- For the base:-
- 250g digestive or other plain biscuits
- 100g melted butter
- 1 tbsp cocoa powder

Method

Heat the oven to 180°C. Butter a 23cm tin and line with baking parchment. Bash the biscuits in a plastic bag with a rolling pin to make a fine crumb then stir in melted butter and cocoa powder. Press the mixture into the base, bake for 10 minutes, then leave to cool.

Melt the chocolate in a heatproof bowl over simmering water. Beat the soft cheese and sugar with an electric whip until combined, then beat in eggs, sour cream, cocoa and melted chocolate. Pour the filling over the base and bake for 35-40 minutes until filling is just set. Turn the oven off and leave to cool. Chill for at least 2 hours. Top with chocolate shavings, maltesers and eggs. Dust with cocoa powder.

Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Week

STEM week in Kinross High school took place from the 7-11 March. These subjects empower students to use their creativity whilst developing their critical thinking skills when solving problems. When used in education, STEM uses an interdisciplinary learning approach where academic concepts are coupled with real-world problems to help contextualise the subjects discussed.

In employment, STEM underlies the foundations of a range of different sectors, making up 18% of all occupations in the UK. A STEM career requires professionals to solve problems, develop new ideas and conduct research. These professionals can work in a variety of settings – including an office, laboratory, research facility, classroom or out in the field.

STEM careers have come to light recently following the



pandemic and the rapid research carried out in the discovery of Covid-19, different variants and the production of vaccines.

Kinross High School encourages pupils to participate in STEM subjects providing pupils with confidence, skills and knowledge for application in later life and employment.

In school, we celebrate the range of subjects by hosting and organising several STEM-related events and activities over the week. These events range from science busking to whole school photography and plant growing competitions.

The aim was to spark other pupils' interest in different areas of STEM, whilst also testing their problem-solving skills when participating in different activities. We also aim to promote the continual growth of STEM in the world of employment.

Lomond Antique & Collectors Club

On Wednesday 9 March our first meeting for exactly two years took place and we were delighted to welcome Dr David Munro as our guest speaker. David introduced us to the world of deltiology (the collection of postcards) with a talk called, 'Kinross in Picture Postcards'.

Our well attended gathering at the Elizabeth Wilkie Hall of Fossoway Church were guided through the history of this now fading communication medium from the introduction of plain cards in the 1840s though to the introduction of picture cards in the 1870s and then picture postcards in the 1890s.

With a focus on works depicting Kinross, Milnathort and the surrounding villages we were told about the 'pioneers' of this art form beginning with George Washington Wilson who, at the peak of his enterprise, had sold 500,000 picture postcards. An archive of his works at Aberdeen University holds over 38,000 examples, several hundred of which are of our local area. It was fascinating to look at images of Kinross as it was at the beginning of the twentieth

century with traffic free streets and some buildings still recognisable today. Equally poignant were the messages written on the cards. For one pre-decimal penny a card and a stamp could reach out to family and friends, often arriving within a day of despatch. James Valentine from Dundee produced and sold postcards from 1896 through to the 1960s as did Raphael and Ernestine Tuck, publishers to the King and Queen.

Photographer Andrew Gardiner used his art work of local scenes prior to 1939 to make postcards, often in colour or aquatint, with a selection entitled the 'Orwell Series'; images of the sanatorium at Milnathort, the Tillyrie auxiliary hospital (used for recuperating patients from the first war) and a picture of boats loaded with fishermen waiting to be rowed out from the pier to try their luck on Loch Leven. With aerial photography still in its infancy the towers of churches and public buildings began to be used to provide panoramic views and these works were popular on cards showing Kinross with Loch Leven in the distance.

Other significant contributors included J Nicoll Small who, in 1908, had a studio in Edinburgh and David Brown and Son who, in 1917, had a printing office in Kinross.

For the collector, examples of early postcards can command increasing prices. For the historian, it is a window into social history.

Our next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday 13 April at 2.30pm. Our speaker will be Mr Tom Bryson on the topic of 'Sakura-Blossoms in Japan'.

There's a new and powerful incentive for climbing

the hill above Kilmagad Wood; namely a lovely bench to sit on, installed by the Woodland Trust Scotland. Simply take the main path up towards the Bishop, from either of the entrances near Portmoak kirk car park, turning up the hill to the east before heading west to where the viewpoint indicator was installed some years ago by Portmoak Community Woodland Group. The new bench gives you the panoramic view captured by the viewpoint board, which on a clear day shows you the Bass Rock in one direction and the Wallace Monument in the other. You'll probably have to stand up to see it but, comfortable as the new bench is, you can't sit there all day!

After taking in the view you can retrace your steps or carry on westwards, until a gully path returns you to the Michael Bruce Way and Kinnesswood or climb to the top of the hills.

If you look carefully at the viewpoint board itself you will notice that it needs another refurbishment. Don't worry, PCWG are on the case and we waiting for some settled weather before carrying out the necessary repairs.

From the new bench you can see Portmoak Moss and get a good idea of how much birch clearing has been going on in the middle of the bog. That has been down to members of the group and visiting squads of other volunteers. We're very pleased that Lothians Conservation Volunteers and a specialist team, the Bog Squad, will be joining us in early April to have another go at removing the birch saplings. The more we get rid of, the better the chances of a successful bog restoration, as we need to stop trees from growing on the peat and drying it out.

If this sounds like too much work and not enough play, fear not; we are beginning to put together some fun events for the rest of the year, from a dawn chorus walk to a fungal foray. PCWG have never been accused of not knowing how to enjoy ourselves and we hope you will join us for our events as well as making the best possible use of our two community woodlands in the months ahead.

Annual General Meeting

The Trust's Executive Committee met in person in March for the first time in two years. Noting the continuing presence of Covid-19, it was decided to take a cautious approach and again hold this year's AGM by email and electronic survey, as we did in 2020 and 2021. This will take place in May. It is hoped that we may be able to have an in-person event of some sort later in the year.

Kinross Park & Ride Raingardens Update

The work to transform the run-down Park & Ride is described in a separate feature on p31; please note that we are aware that there is still some tidying up to be done there.

Soil and gravel heaps have been left so they can be used to fill a set of large planters which we plan to buy to embed in the new rock-fill strip created in the narrowest centre strip there. That should be done during April, if funding can be secured. We'll also organise some tidying up around the edges of the car park too.

There are also some issues to be resolved with the white lines demarcating the parking places (too close to the edge of the raingardens, risking intrusion by vehicles); and we requested that the narrowest final pairs of spaces be designated for bikes. Bike spaces are shorter in terms of risks of vehicle impacts on planters or rock features, allowing us to complete the aesthetic ambitions for that strip. This has been requested in writing and in person some weeks prior to the work.


We must stress that the council staff have been very positive about the work overall; it may take many months to get approval for such tweaks to white lines.



Murdoch delivered coaching sessions to swimmers across all four squads in the club as part of the prize for Otters being





named Scottish Swimming's Club of the Year back in 2019.

Due to Covid, the visit has been delayed but it was a case of better late than never as Murdoch got into the water with the youngsters to give an insight into the levels of a top athlete.

Murdoch has represented Great Britain at the Olympics, World Championships and European Championships and flown the flag for Scotland at the Commonwealth Games. The breaststroke specialist won gold and bronze at the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow in 2014 and silver at the games four years later and has a gold, silver and bronze from the Worlds and has won two golds, three silvers and a bronze at the Europeans.

Otters chairman Nigel Martin said: 'What a fantastic way to celebrate the Otters winning Scottish Swimming's Club of the Year in 2019 and great recognition of the hard work by the club's volunteers and coaches.

'Ross is a true ambassador for swimming, his energy and passion for the sport is so infectious. He gave swimmers from across our four squads a true insight into what it takes to compete at the highest level and represent Scotland and Great Britain on the world stage.

'It was such a privilege to be in the room and watch our swimmers' eyes burn so bright with inspiration – a perfect prize from Scottish Swimming.

'As our club begins its 50th anniversary Ross's visit was just a stupendous way to celebrate its history and inspire the latest generation of Otters.'

As well as seeing what it takes in the pool, the swimmers were able to pick the brains of Murdoch following a chat poolside (see photo) – and many autographs were signed.

Ahead of the session with Murdoch, the youngsters proved they are well and truly back in the swing of competitive swimming by claiming four club records during the Midland District Championships – and that's probably a club record in itself!

During the February meet, Struan Bennet set a new 1500m freestyle record with 16:17.44 and Emily Cumming posted a new 100 backstroke record of 01:09.59. That was followed in March by Charlotte Chadwick setting a new 200m backstroke record of 02:34.30, beating a 2009 time, and Stuart Pritchard set a new 50m backstroke time of 00:30.50, beating a 2013 record.

In addition Struan was awarded the title of Best Male for the whole championships. Well done to all who competed, and also at the Perth Pentaqua, hosted by Perth City Swim Club, where the standout performance may well have been from Jessica Sloan, who set a consideration time for the forthcoming Scottish National Age Group Championships by knocking more than four seconds off her personal best.

Whooo Let The Owls Out?

SPRING IS IN THE AIR! April is a month to spot ospreys flying to their breeding sites, maybe even stopping off over the loch to catch a fish. The first Swallows arrive in mid-April – a sure sign that summer is on the way. Butterflies can be seen basking in the spring sunshine – look out for green-veined white, comma and small tortoiseshell.

April is a flying to be even to catch arrive in summer can be sunshine d white, hell.

Some of our nesting ducks will be on eggs, and by the end of the month we will start to see our first young ducklings on the loch. Usually, the first broods we see are mallard. The eggs were incubated for 28 days and then hatched over 24 hours. The ducklings stay in the nest for around 10 hours then head out to the water. Straight away, the ducklings know how to feed but what matters is finding out what is edible! This is an important time for the young ducklings as they learn what to eat and how to survive under the watchful eye of their mother. After around 50 days the ducks will fledge and become independent.

The Islands are where ducks are nesting, the shoreline is where the young ducklings tend to feed and shelter. If you are planning to go out on the loch on a kayak, paddleboard, canoe or any other watercraft, please read our signage out on the reserve. Keep away from all of the Islands and keep 200 metres from the shoreline – this will help to protect the nesting ducks that call Loch Leven NNR their home. A reminder that there are no sailboats or motorised crafts permitted on the loch.

Speaking of the Dawn Chorus, we will be running a Dawn Chorus walk on Saturday 7 May. The event will start at 6am from Findatie Car Park and will run until 8am. The walk will involve a gentle walk, strolling on the trail through the woods listening to the wonder of birdsong. They're Coming Home

AS SPRING ROLLS IN we have seen an excellent influx of breeding birds at RSPB Loch Leven. Flocks of lapwing, shelduck, gadwall, and oystercatcher have been spotted on the wetlands. Out on the loch great crested grebe have been seen displaying their elaborate courtship shows. These birds court by rising out of the water and shaking their heads, just like something out of a Rita Hayworth movie! They also dip their heads to one another, mimicking little bows. Over the next few months, we hope to see some chicks appearing. Very young grebes often ride on their parents backs – a lovely sight to see! Lots more of the passerines have been singing now too, with skylarks displaying above the wetland trail and lots of woodland birds to listen out for. The lovely sound of a great spotted woodpecker drumming on the



trees has been heard too. Many of the wintering birds will be departing soon, however there are still lots of wigeon, teal and goldeneye on the loch. Numbers of whooper swan have fallen this last month, indicating they have started their long journey back to Iceland for the summer. Likewise, the latest goose counts resulted in 1400 pink footed geese left around the loch, however it is possible numbers could increase over the next few weeks as birds from further south pass through.

With the nesting season just around the corner the reserve team have been hard at work repairing the islands in front of the Waterson and Carden hides for the black headed gull colony. It is important this work is done now so there is minimal disturbance for the birds when they start to breed. The reserve team have also recently put in some new sluices to allow for greater control of water levels on the Wetlands.

Our wonderful volunteer team have been fantastic as always and have been working on improving the Little Vane woodland for wildlife with the addition of shrubbier tree species, nest boxes, wildflower patches and seed planting. They've

also improved the area in front of the visitor centre through more wildflower planting. In addition to this they have been helping to maintain parts of the reserve such as fences, footpaths and steps up the hill.

We have some exciting events happening this month too with our **Big Wild Easter Trail running 2-17 April**. Pick up your map from the visitor centre, follow the trail to build your own nest! A good nest might just find an egg in it.. No need to book, just drop in! £2 per sheet on the day or avoid the queues and book via our website (50p booking fee), simply show your e-receipt to a member of staff.

Awake in the Wild Saturday 26 March 10-11am: Awaken your body, mind and senses in the beautiful surrounds of Loch Leven with a mindful movement and meditation session. Offered by local yoga teacher, Orla Beaton, the monthly sessions will include gentle yoga and Qigong, seated and walking meditation, and poetry to help us de-stress, connect and find balance. We will meet at the picnic area. Please bring a yoga mat, blanket/shawl and small cushion and wear warm comfortable clothing with light shoes/trainers. 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Farming

Ewe Little Beauties...

THE SIGNS ARE THAT spring is on its way. There are buds of life appearing on the trees, there is more daylight than darkness in each day and by the time you are reading this the clocks will have moved forward to summertime – although this can often coincide with the final snarls of winter blasting down our semmits. There have been flashes of the restless symptoms of 'spring fever' among the cattle as the recent sunny days have them gazing over the gates of their winter accommodation, anxious to get stuck in to the fresh green shoots of spring grass, but they will have to be patient for a few weeks yet as I suspect they would be bitterly disappointed if they were to be set free just now.

The ewes are due to start lambing officially from 10 April although we have about 20 which had access to the tups sooner that the rest so we have a few lambs already. We had the same start date last year and it seemed to work quite well for us so we thought we would go for the same again. Last year, the official start date greeted us with a crisp covering of snow which fortunately didn't last so we will just have to wait and see what happens this year. The ewes pregnancy scanned quite a pleasing percentage this year (by our standards, at least) but it is how many lambs end up running around the fields that really counts and we don't have too many ewes scanned expecting triplets, which is quite pleasing.

Pregnancy scanning is one of the most worthwhile tasks we carry out in my opinion, as it helps with the management of the ewes in the run up to and during lambing. We can separate the ewes into groups according to whether they are expecting one, two or three lambs and we target feed accordingly, since a ewe expecting triplets needs a lot more feed than one only expecting a single lamb. It is also a great help for fostering an extra lamb from a ewe who wouldn't be able to rear it herself on to a ewe who could easily cope with another lamb to rear, as we can have likely candidates separated off in preparation for doing this job.

I think the pigs are enjoying the slightly drier conditions of late (although I must admit I haven't actually asked them) as they will be able to bask in the warming spring sunshine on some drier ground. Although their traditional breeding means that they are pretty hardy creatures and they seem to enjoy rooting (and roaming) about in all weather including snow, some slightly drier conditions makes the daily task of feeding them much easier.

Hopefully we will soon be able to get on with some spring fieldwork as conditions improve as there is dung to spread on the fields which are to be planted in cereal crops which will then need ploughed before cultivating and drilling. We have some ploughing to do for a neighbour as well as fertiliser to spread (very carefully, given the price) and preparing the fields to be used for growing silage and hay. There is certainly plenty to be doing to keep us out of mischief for the next few weeks.

use 15-cell inserts as they're then able to grow on until planting out in early June.

In Begonia news, I unwrapped my overwintered Begonias in mid-March and most of them are starting to show signs of life, I'm always amazed at how a seemingly dead corm, when introduced to moisture and heat, can sprout into life. When it gets a bit warmer, probably about mid-April, I'll put them into individual pots and grow on in the greenhouse.

Overwintered Fuchsias that I kept in the greenhouse are also doing well. I was a bit apprehensive as I hadn't watered them at all over the winter – but I only lost one! This is a valuable bit of learning for me – I usually give them a bit of water every couple of weeks over the winter

IT LOOKS LIKE SPRING has finally sprung – the crocuses are past their best and the daffodils and tulips are really coming into their own. This really is my favourite time of the year, everything's starting to wake up... unfortunately, even the weeds.

I sowed all my seeds under cover around the middle of March, I could have waited two or three weeks but I'm an impatient sort of person. Rest assured, you still have plenty of time to sow your annual seeds for this year and get a bumper crop of flowers.

Most of the seeds have germinated and it'll soon be time to prick them out and pot them on. (I usually sow into mini propagators (you can get quite cheaply on EBay) and place them either on a heat pad or in an electric propagator to germinate).

When the seedlings have two pairs of leaves on them, I usually loosen up the roots with the handle of a spoon by inserting into the edge of the tray and lifting the seedlings slightly – this makes them easier to remove. Lift the seedlings carefully by the leaves and pot them on into either trays of compost, or I

and lose about a third of the plants – so the answer is not to water at all, who knew?

The plan for the next few weeks I think is to get the garden ready for summer. This will include pulling out all the annuals that I didn't get round to doing last autumn – too cold and wet, that's my excuse and I'm sticking to it. I'll lift and divide some plants such as Hostas and perennial Geraniums and find homes for them elsewhere, this is the perfect time of year for doing this. I need to tidy up the strawberry bed which will involve cutting back all the dead foliage, weeding and chucking loads of manure round about the plants. Next year I will put in some new plants, strawberries are only productive for two or three years so need replacing regularly.

And then it'll be on to pricking out seedlings, weeding, clearing out pots, cleaning the patio and generally swearing about everything that needs to be done... who'd be a gardener, eh?

That's me for this month folks... things to do and all that! Have fun, take care and don't forget to sit back and survey your handiwork every once in a while.


