Look After Your Locals!

THE RSPB AT VANE FARM has had major work done to the building and carpark. When the car park was partly open, people were back to walking from there to the hides; walking and cycling sections of the Loch Leven circular route; walking up through the woods and other woodlands trails for kids; using it as the base to walk Benarty – being the only paved access to the hill from the west side. On the return, refreshments were there at the wooden cabin and finally at the newly renovated café. A good end to the outing. Now, unless you are an RSPB member the car park is not free. £3 for the pleasure when you take your mother out for a coffee even if the views are lovely from the café. Free for 15 minutes if just popping into the shop. This really is encouraging people to come! This seems so like Perth Council who think attracting shoppers and income is by putting in car park charges (let alone raising them) and higher business rates, when St Catherine's retail park is free, and so is Glenrothes – Kirkcaldy is suffering the same fate too.

The RSPB is supported by donations and membership, and understandably needs income, but car parking charges are not the way in this area. The access to Benarty is the one thing you can't get from somewhere else around the loch. Access to the same part of the loch circular track is free half a mile away at Findatie, with a cafe. Loch Leven Larder offers everything except a hill; Kirkgate and Sandport likewise with cafes in town; birds aplenty from Burleigh Sands.

There is a steel tube you can pass, without noticing it, between the car park and café that takes donations. I love those machines where you roll a coin in and it goes round in ever decreasing circles before disappearing into the black hole of the centre; something interesting, easily seen and novel could guilt-trip coins from those who don't use the café. Also, how many people know the cost of an Americano in their favourite Kinross café or indeed in the RSPB café itself? Unless the price is exorbitant or the quality poor, few will notice. Give quality and good service and the price matters little to most, so adding a few pence to a drink and/or cake will bring in revenue all the time. Don't shoot yourself in the foot. It's locals who keep you going in the lean off season times. Don't mess with them.

Closer to home, in over three decades of parking in Sand's car park, I have always found a space, no matter what time of day. Purely by chance, just after Christmas I noticed a machine tucked away behind the cars nearest the shop. My guess at its use was not confirmed by anything on the machine as

there wasn't anything obvious. It was confirmed by a notice alongside that at the entrance welcoming you to Green's convenience shop - car parking charges. Why? We have parking on the streets (albeit time limited in some areas), parking in Mill Street and at Millbridge Hall. Why are they charging? It can't be to move people through quickly because most people parking are not there for long anyway and there's always a space; did they do longs days of research to find out how many people stayed over half an hour? I doubt it. It can only be to get money from customers to pay for upgrading the shop and car-park, though it looks as if the charging is being done by an outside agency. So much for community spirit and buy local. During the first lockdown it was very noticeable the increase use of local shops and in particular the Coop - you queued to pay, which I haven't really done since. Hypothetically, you would in the past, park, then queue at the chemist, queue for the PO, buy some produce then go for a coffee at one of the cafes on the High street. Not now you can't without paying for parking over 30 minutes. You can forget going for a wash and perm and buy your groceries on the way back – I understand that one person who took longer at the dentist than expected, bought goods in Green's got a £60 fine for the pleasure – how many others? The impression I have been given is that there are fewer cars parked there now and thus less of a footfall for all the shops. The same applies here as the RSPB; if you mess with your base, you screw yourself in the long run.

Why must business try and mug folk for money? If you want increased business, you give good friendly service, you listen to customers and stock what customers want, not just what you think they want. And they will come back and support you when times are lean and difficult – or during a pandemic.

I'm sure many would welcome feedback from the RSPB and Green's.

Parking Fury

Drivers beware! Do you know that the free parking time at Greens car-park in the centre of Kinross is now limited to a mere 30 minutes?

I didn't until I got a letter demanding £100 for parking there for 41 minutes in the first week of January. It's hardly less

painful that the charge is reduced to £60 for paying within 14 days of issue, which I have done.

Yes, I have since discovered the signs indicating the parking charges but they are neither prominent enough or different enough from the previous signs to warrant attention from a casual parker. There are, for instance, no prominent signs showing, 'New Parking Charges' or similar. Of course the fine is a deterrent but £100 or £60 for 11 minutes can only be described as wanton greed.

Greens are undoubtedly within their legal rights to give control of their car park to UKPC but it's anything but good customer relations. Greens had a big splash in the *Newsletter* when they took over from the Co-op, extolling various improvements, but they have neglected to publicise the punitive parking rates for many potential customers, rates which are in excess of parking charges in Perth city centre!

Queue for the post office at the back of Greens then queue again at the chemist across the road and you'll probably have to pay the charges. You won't even be able to take a few minutes to visit a couple of the attractive shops in Kinross centre. The inevitable consequence of this is that drivers will park cars on the streets in and around the town centre to the detriment of traffic flow and road safety.

Many of us will remember when this car park was free before paying was introduced with a reasonably free allowance. However, do those responsible really need to squeeze as much money as out of their property as they can get away with?

I for one will no longer use Greens unless the car-park rates and excess charges are reduced to a sensible level and in a short time Greens will have lost more than the ± 60 I have paid in my fine.

I urge others to do the same and make sure they get in and out of the car-park in 29 minutes and 50 seconds at the latest.

Lathro Meadows Residents 'Let Down Time After Time' By Persimmon Homes

DESPITE AN ONGOING CAMPAIGN by residents at the Lathro Meadows development and several interventions by local MP John Nicolson and local Kinross Councillors on their behalf, housebuilding company Persimmon Homes continues to receive significant criticism from residents that their homes are still not fit-for-purpose.

In the week of 11 January 2022, more than a dozen residents at the development have contacted the MP to voice their concerns regarding ongoing issues and delays to their resolutions. In a letter written by Persimmon Homes boss James MacKay, which was sent to John Nicolson MP last year, Persimmon took 'full responsibility for the problems on the development' and recognised they had caused 'significant inconvenience and disruption'. James MacKay went on to write that 'the issues encountered on the development are caused by the workmanship during the installation of the sewer network.'

Persimmon Homes agreed to a programme of works to remedy the problems which include digging up parts of the road on the development and anticipated that works on the development would be complete by the end of February 2022.

In the past 18 months, local MP John Nicolson has held virtual surgeries with constituents on the Lathro Meadows development to discuss their issues and subsequently put the complaints directly to Persimmon Homes. Persimmon Homes had initially blamed residents for the drainage problems. But follow-



ing talks with John Nicolson MP, James MacKay apologised saying: 'We would like to clarify that our customers are not responsible for the drainage issues, and apologise.'

Commenting on these recent complaints, Mr Nicolson said:

'Persimmon Homes has let the Lathro Meadows residents down time after time.

'My constituents bought these houses in good faith, but have since discovered multiple faults. Many of a serious nature. Residents have had water running into their houses: one was even told they shouldn't expect their house to be watertight. Some residents' gardens have remained waterlogged.

'All residents I've spoken to have experienced problems with the roads on the estate. Clearly, the drainage and sewerage system built for the development is inadequate. The company, having initially blamed residents for the problems, accepted full responsibility.

'Residents are now experiencing the misery and chaos of a sub-contractor digging up their roads and laying a whole new drainage and sewerage system at what appears to be a snail's pace.

'I urge Persimmon Homes to resolve this issue speedily, to repair the damage to residents' property, and to provide compensation for the inconvenience and distress caused to so many.'

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FREE BUSES FOR U-22s



FROM 31 JANUARY, nearly a million 5-21 year olds living in Scotland will be eligible for free bus travel.

To qualify, young people must apply for a new or replacement National Entitlement or Young Scot card. Children under 5 travel free, so don't need a card. A parent or guardian must apply on behalf of 5–15 year olds and provide approval for free bus travel and, if you are aged 16-21, you must apply for a new NEC yourself at *getyournec.scot*. Those who can't apply online should get in touch with the local council.

Jim Fairlie MSP said, 'Young people in Kinross-shire — as they are right across the world — are rightly challenging their politicians to take bold actions to create a sustainable future for them and free bus travel is an example of what can be done to rise to this challenge.'

The new pass will help young people connect with the communities around them and access education, training or work. Around a third of the population are already entitled to free bus travel through schemes for older and disabled people.

Transport minister Graeme Dey said: 'The pandemic means that we are encouraging people to stay at home as much as possible. But there are many essential reasons for children and young people to travel by bus and I am keen that they benefit from this scheme at the earliest opportunity.

The Scottish Government says the full marketing launch of the scheme – which is set to benefit nearly a million young people – will take place at a later date given current public health guidance to reduce contact and mixing.

Dey added: 'Public health must always come first. The approach we are taking will enable children, young people and families who will potentially benefit most from free bus travel to access it from the end of January. It will also ensure that when we are able to fully publicise the scheme, we can help bus services recover from the impacts of the pandemic and encourage children and young people to travel sustainably.'

The *Newsletter* took a quick straw poll amongst Kinross teens to try and ascertain the popularity of the initiative.

Caroline, 17, said 'I think free bus travel is going to allow us to all live again, especially following lockdown in such a small place like Kinross. In the run up to moving to university I think it also lifts a big burden around financial anxieties when coming back home to visit family.'

Emily, also 17, thought that 'free buses are an excellent idea because it means more people will be able to get buses instead of driving which will help the environment'.

Isla, 18, was equally positive. 'I'm really looking forward to

having free buses because it means I will be able to travel,' she said. 'Lots of my friends are going to uni in September and this will make it so much easier to keep in touch and visit them without the barrier of an expensive ticket.'

NEW 202 TILLICOULTRY SERVICE

FOLLOWING THE REMOVAL OF the X53 service, which provided public transport from Kinross to Stirling, a new bus operator, Bay Travel, has picked up part of the route.

Funding has been secured until the end of March for an off peak daytime bus service from Monday to Saturday. It operates between Kinross and Tillicoutry stopping at Crook of Devon, Rumbling Bridge, Yetts O' Muckhart, Pool of Muckhart, and Dollar.

Service 202 is operated by Bay Travel and is a fully wheelchair accessible vehicle. Connections for other routes to and from Stirling can be found at Tillcoultry.

The timetable has been agreed up until 31 March 2022. Usage and passenger feedback will be monitored with regards to establishing what timetable would be appropriate the end of March 2022 and in line with available funding. Cllr Mike Barnacle urged locals to 'use it or lose it.'

The timetable is on the Council's website.

dlemiss were presented with their BEMs by the Lord Lieutenant, Mr Stephen Leckie, on behalf of HM The Queen.

The British Empire Medal (BEM) was established in 1922. The BEM is awarded for meritorious civil or military service, worthy of recognition by the Crown. The BEM was awarded to subjects of the United Kingdom until 1992, after which time it lay in abeyance in the United Kingdom. It was specifically re-instated in June 2012, for HM The Queen's Diamond Jubilee, specifically to reward and honour those who work in the charitable, and voluntary sectors.

In this part of Scotland, Nan Cook is very well known for her unstinting work and inspirational leadership in running the wonderful Kinross Day Centre. The centre, in more ordinary times, provides a welcoming, safe and homely atmosphere. It has been open for over 40 years. During the worst part of the pandemic lockdown, Nan and her team brought joy, hope, contact and happiness to many people in Kinross shire. For that, and all her previous service to the senior community, she was recognised by Her Majesty with the award of the British Empire Medal.

Nan said:

'This is an amazing honour — and I accept it for my wonderful team of volunteers, and dedicate it to all the users of the Day Centre.'

Andy is Chairman of the local branch of SSAFA, The Armed Forces Charity, which helps servicemen and their families in need, and is a Vice President of the Forces Children Scotland Trust. Andy said:

'I am honoured to be recognised by the remarkable lady, who I have worked for since I was 18 – HM The Queen – for doing something close to my heart, all my life. That is the care for, and support, of my fellow members of HM Forces, and crucially their families. I am but one part of a great group of SSAFA volunteers – this is theirs as much as mine.'



MSP Expresses 'Delight' At £400k Investment In Green Kinross Firm

MSP LIZ SMITH HAS expressed her delight at the UK Government investing almost £400,000 in a Kinross 'green' firm. She was reacting to the announcement made in December that more than £116 million in new Government funding will boost green innovation across the UK as efforts to help businesses reduce their carbon emissions continue.

This government funding will support companies across the UK to put cutting-edge technology in operation, which will stimulate further investment from the private sector, and help develop UK expertise in this area.

Commenting, Liz Smith MSP said: 'This is great news for Kinross. The investment will see the projects receiving this money play a key part in the UK's green industrial revolution, putting British business at the forefront of green innovation – helping to generate green jobs and kickstart millions of pounds of private sector investment.



'LIND Limited in Kinross will receive £385,595 to develop new heating technology using low carbon energy storage, which is fantastic news.

'The money provided to the companies will help develop new technologies that increase energy efficiency in homes and buildings, reduce carbon emissions, boost the UK's energy security and provide cleaner ways to generate power and heat.'

UK Energy and Climate Change Minister Greg Hands added: 'From Edinburgh to Aberdeen and Orkney to Kinross – the UK government is helping Scottish businesses turn their green ideas into reality, for projects that will save energy, slash utility bills and tackle pollution.

'Supporting green innovation will be vital as we drive forward the UK's green industrial revolution – helping us reach net zero, while also bringing new jobs and investment to Scotland and across the UK'.

The investment comes from the Energy Entrepreneurs Fund (EEF), which is a programme funded through the BEIS £1 billion Net Zero Innovation Portfolio.

The EEF supplies innovation grants for small to medium sized enterprises and start-up companies to back the development and demonstration of disruptive technologies whilst also supporting the UK Government's decarbonisation targets.

Having now donated 100 pints of blood she has received a commemorative badge from the NHS and will receive a certificate and quaich from the Lord Provost when she attends a commemorative ceremony in Dundee later this year.

Her daughter Ruth told the Newsletter, 'Our entire family are very proud of Mum. This is an outstanding achievement from her over many years. Donating a pint of your blood takes less than 10 minutes and as a society we should be grateful to everyone giving their time and blood to help others. Blood has a short shelf life and can't be stockpiled by hospitals. A continuous supply of donors across Scotland is essential to save lives.

Almost everyone over the age of 17 can give blood up until 70 years of age. If in good health you can continue beyond 70 years of age. Mum is just approaching her 75th birthday and fully intends to reach her next milestone of 150 pints!

We are sharing Mum's achievement to celebrate all blood donors out there and hopefully to encourage a few more people to get involved. This is a simple action with a big impact! Well done to our Mum and all the donors.'

ARE YOU LIVING IN A SHARED BUILDING?

ARRANGING REPAIRS to shared buildings can be frustrating as progress can often be slow or stop altogether. Lack of communication between owners, financial difficulties, and identifying problems are only a few of the difficulties owners may face during this process, during which time further deterioration of buildings can occur. This has been identified by Perth and Kinross Council as a common problem faced by shared property owners and a new service has been implemented to assist in overcoming these problems.

The Missing Shares Service is available for all property owners who are facing difficulty in arranging common repairs to roofing, stairwells, external walls and other issues of shared responsibility. The service can provide advice, assistance in identifying or contacting unresponsive owners, and where necessary, an application can be made for Perth and Kinross Council to pay the share of repair costs where an owner cannot be located or are unwilling or unable to pay their share. 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GLIDING – THE SKY'S THE LIMIT!

PAULINE GALLAGHER TOOK UP gliding in 2004 and here at the Scottish Gliding Centre, we are delighted that after an absence of nearly 7 years is back with us!

As for many, life gets in the way and gliding like so many other things can take a back seat. But we are thrilled to have her back at the club and in the air again.

Pauline took her first flight at the age of 16 with the Air Cadets and came to us about 10 years later. She has flown with our instructors and with the Walking On Air charity, who enable those with disabilities to take part in gliding.

'With cerebral palsy, taking in part in some sports can be difficult but the WOA and Scottish Gliding Centre have been great in helping me to get into gliding, and not allow the limitations of my disability to hold me back.'

Pauline was hooked after that first experience and credits the great training and support she has had from the Scottish Gliding Centre's Chris Robinson, Kate Byrne and Ron Smith as giving her the confidence and skills she needs to continue her passion.

'The training I have had with SGC instructors has been great. They are all so experienced and inspire me to challenge myself. I am loving being back at Portmoak. It has such a great sense of community which is a big draw. I'm planning to take some leave from work over the next few weeks and do some day courses, so am looking forward to being back here a bit more often.'

Her goal is to go solo but she isn't stopping at gliding, 'I also take part in powered flight from Prestwick, where I have already taken solo flights and I loved that experience. I'm hop-

ing that with the right training under my belt, I'll be able to do the same in a glider.'

The centre is delighted that more women are trying out gliding and that those who have experienced it before are coming back to this fantastic sport.

ample space for all the stock I have. I just hope that people enjoy coming to the shop and go away with a pot of paint, or paint-



was removed from its original spot outside the McBain's house (by PKC who were the custodians) it was to be repaired and placed in Perth Museum. With the help of councillors, they met with PKC street lighting and agreed a site adjacent to the fountain with an agreement that KCC would bear all costs.

An application for funding to the Arthur & Margaret Thomson trust was successful. Sadly, the original site was not possible due to ground conditions. The project was put on hold due to the pandemic. KCC and PKC then decided to place the lamp at corner of Swansacre and the High Street. The grant covered the cost of an in-



formation sign and this was designed and supplied by the Sign Company Kirkcaldy and has now been put up.

The research and text for the sign was supplied by Professor David Munro at Kinross Museum. It has a comprehesive history of the significance of the lamp. Have a look next time you are passing!

This would enable all our currently absent banks to offer in-person banking facilities for local people without them having to use our poor public transport, in its current inadequate state, to travel to other towns several miles away in order to use a traditional banking service.

Their 'friendly customer service assistants have dedicated office space in a local venue for you to discuss your needs in private. There is no need to arrange an appointment. 
Anyone of any age and ability is welcome to turn up, have some fun and give it a go!

Bank of Scotland Community Service

It is still shocking that somewhere the size of Kinross-shire now has not a single local bank branch. Given the continued need for local businesses and residents to have access to cash and the poor public



transport links locally, this remains a significant problem.

For some time, I have been working with the Bank of Scotland alongside Nicola Marchant of Fossoway Community Council and Liz Smith MSP to look at ways of providing community banking services following the closure of their branch.

They have recently confirmed that they are undertaking a trial Community Banker Service in the Millbridge Hall in Kinross. This will allow local customers to make personal and business account enquiries, get help with on-line banking, and access financial education and support.

The service is open each week on Fridays between 10 am and

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3.30pm. The trial runs from now until 1st April, following which an assessment will be made about its long-term future.

If uptake is poor, we may lose this banking service also so, if you are a Bank of Scotland customer, please make use of this service during the trial. It is vital that we demonstrate that there is a continued need for such services locally.

Kinross-shire Local Committee

By the time you are reading this, the first meeting of the Council's Kinross-shire Local Committee will have taken place. The aim of the committee is to have more decisions about Kinross-shire taken by Kinross-shire representatives and not by councillors in other parts of Perth & Kinross.

The first meeting is due to debate a range of issues, including road safety and speed limits, the shared space on Kinross High Street, the former Blairingone Primary School building, and how to manage the Ochil and Lomond Hills.

THE NEW YEAR IS a time we all think about families and tradition. My social media stream is full of people posting pictures of well-scrubbed houses 'Grandma insisted on a clean broom for Ne'er Day' and family recipes 'I don't



bake much but this has been in the family for generations.'

With no jobs to be had in post-war Scotstoun, he escaped Glasgow tenement life for New York tenement life, working as an elevator attendant by day and playing jazz piano by night. He'd a 1920s radio show 'Jimmy Stewart, the Scotch Lad' and sent money home to help his widowed mum.

My grandpa features heavily too. He also fought in the Great War but succumbed to German bombs in the Clydebank Blitz. His handsome features stare out from baby to proud young father. There's one especially poignant image from 1940, standing with his beautiful twelve-year-old son Eric. Within a year, both would

I AM A GREAT believer in encouraging self-employment and entrepreneurial development, so I am very happy to be able to give a bit of publicity to a scheme designed to support young people aged between 18 and 25, living in Perth &



Kinross who have an idea for a business and need a bit of a hand in getting it set up.

SEED - Self-Employment and Entrepreneurial Development — comes under the GrowBiz umbrella, supporting enterprise in rural Scotland. They can provide grant funding of up to £1000, one to one support from their business support team, online learning, mentoring and networking opportunities.

If you are a young person with a business idea but wondering how to get started, get in touch with them and see what help they can give you. The website is easy to find at *growbiz.co.uk/seed*.

Something that will be an enormous help to all young people comes into play this month thanks to the Scottish Government with free bus travel being made available to everyone aged under 22.

All that any young person has to do to access this fantastic opportunity is apply for a new or replacement National Entitlement or Young Scot card.

Applications for the scheme have been open since the 10th of January but with the free travel now available I wanted to make people aware that they need to upgrade their card to be able to benefit from this opportunity.

Children under 5 years old do not need a card as they already travel for free on commercial bus services, a parent or guardian must apply on behalf of 5–15 year olds and provide approval for them to travel for free by bus and, if you are aged 16-21, you must apply for a new NEC yourself. You can apply online at *getyournec. scot*.

If you cannot apply online, there are many other ways to apply, just get in touch with the local council, indeed many schools are coordinating applications on behalf of their pupils and may

be dead. Grandpa at the hands of the Germans; Eric lost to leukaemia. My grandma's grief was, by all accounts, heart-rending to watch and hear. I still have the griddle that her next-door neighbour made during his shipyard lunch hour in an attempt to lure her from her mourning bed.

Going back a few generations, my grandpa's grandma Sarah Stant's fearsome features brook no challenge. My mum had spun some yarns about her when I was growing up. She owned a Manhattan brownstone apparently, carried her own feather mattress when she visited Scotstoun, and had coins sewn into her petticoats. The truth was much less glamorous. She emigrated with her husband and infant son in the nineteenth century, settling into a Brooklyn rooming house with other Scots and Scandinavians. Her blacksmith husband appears to have grown weary of New York life and left to join the Australian gold rush. She followed, trying to find him, and visited Glasgow en route. Her feather mattress wasn't a sign of wealth but penury. She probably slept aboard the ship, guarding her few coins in her clothing. I'm not sure she ever found her husband in Australia, but she lived to a great age in Brooklyn, and her elder son, my great grandfather, became a seafarer. I have his ocean-going passport.

We stand on the shoulders of giants. So many Scottish families have stories like mine with brave near ancestors forced to leave loved ones to seek work abroad. Small wonder we are so accepting of those who, today, seek sanctuary on our shores.

I WOULD LIKE TO wish all readers of the Newsletter a Happy New Year. This year may be challenging, but we also have opportunities for progress on dealing with Climate Change.



Rural Bus Services

Before Christmas, the Climate Change Strategy and Action Plan was presented to the council. This is a dynamic plan that clearly highlights the challenges we face in meeting our Net Zero commitments by 2045. The report is currently available on the Council website: www.pkc.gov.uk/climatechange

One of the Climate Change challenges—and opportunities—is Rural Bus Service.

First Bus announced the termination of the old x53 bus service running from Kinross to Stirling — mainly due to the lack of bus drivers. Stagecoach echoed that story when they announced the reduction of service on the 56 route.

The consequence of these decisions would be unthinkable for two reasons:

- 1. The impact on our communities that now have reduced bus services and, even worse, the impact of no bus service at all for west Kinross-shire.
- 2. The impact on the requirement to meet our Climate Change commitments by giving positive greener transport options for local people.

In response to this potential, I met with Bay Travel last November along with a community member from the Kinross-shire Community Transport Group. Bay Travel were interested in taking over the route but were concerned about the financial viability of the route. Having got both the council and Bay Travel



talking about finding a solution, I am relieved to see some level of service provision through the 202 service.

Unfortunately, there are limitations on the availability of buses because the service needs to fit around the provider's school transport runs. The new service runs Monday to Saturday starting at 8:40 am at Kinross Park and Ride and finishing at the same location at 2:38pm. While this service is limited, it is a considerable improvement on no service. Since the Scottish Government's funding will only cover the service up till the end of March, there is much to do to persuade Bay Travel to continue and enhance the 202 service.

I have spoken with Councillor Barnacle asking him, as Chair of the Kinross-shire Community Transport Group, to request a meeting between Council Officers and the Elected Councillors to look at how we can promote the route and find ways to enhance the timetable so that the route is viable.

In February, the Scottish Government will begin providing free travel for people 21 years old and under. I hope this increase in passengers will increase the demand for rural buses and in turn help

address the climate change issues facing us. This does depend on there being buses serving our rural communities in the first place.

If you qualify for free bus travel (or know someone who does) and don't have your entitlement card yet, you can apply here – www.getyournec.scot.

I was disappointed to see the state of the cycle lockers at Kinross Park and Ride and I raised this with council officers last year. The officers have replied to say they are arranging for an assessment from a local blacksmith to see if these can be repaired. If this is not possible, they will look to fund replacement lockers from existing active travel budgets.

This will encourage more people to ride a bike to catch a bus—doubling their contribution to meeting our Net Zero commitments.

I WOULD LIKE TO wish everyone a happy new year and hope that 2022 is rather better than 2020 and 2021. Despite the rapid transmissibility of Omicron and the increasing pressures on the health services, there are, at last, a few signs of optimism which we can cling on to as we read the daily bulletins. It does appear



that Omicron is much less threatening to life and less prolonged for those who are hospitalised. It also appears that some parts of the economy are showing better resilience than was expected although there are other sectors which are still suffering grim projections, most especially hospitality and entertainment venues, including theatres and cinemas. And at last, the First Minister has moved to bring Scotland more in line with the rest of the UK in terms of quarantine and travel regulations.

As residents will be very aware, Kinross has been the victim of some recent public transport reductions, notably the X53 and X56 buses. I contacted both First Buses and Stagecoach seeking clarification for their decisions and have offered them my full support in returning the services. Additionally, I have started a petition to return the X56 to its more frequent operation, which can be found on my social media accounts and website.

Unfortunately, the X53 service was withdrawn entirely, isolating communities in Kinross-shire from Stirling. However, I am pleased that Bay Travel are now operating the temporary 202 service until the end of March which will link much of the Clackmannanshire Hillfoots with Kinross until the route's future can be fully decided.

The X56, Perth to Edinburgh, service was cut by half to just one coach every two hours. This service is essential for access to healthcare for the elderly, and is very popular among students, passing through Kinross and Milnathort.

These decisions by the bus service providers are particularly ill-timed considering the recent conclusion of COP26 in Glasgow last year which has encouraged us all to cut down on our carbon footprints. Access to greener transport options are vital if we are to meet our ambitious targets for cutting carbon emissions and these decisions feel like a backwards step which will leave commuters little option but to get back behind the wheel of private cars. Not to mention, Kinross is completely dependent on regular bus travel considering its unviable distance to the railway network.

I sincerely hope that these services can be returned to their full operation in 2022. With the population of Kinross set to increase markedly over the next few years, it is clear that demand for public transport options is only going to be on the rise. LOCH LEVEN: I attended a meeting of the Loch Leven Catchment Management Committee on 10 January involving Nature Scotland, SEPA, Scottish Water, P&K Council, Linda May of the Centre from the Centre for Hydrology and



Ecology and others. This committee has been reformed to address the growing incidences of algal blooms on the loch.

We were told that the algal blooms including toxic algal blooms were becoming more common. The reason given was that the rising water temperatures in the loch and the continuing high levels of phosphorous (P) in Loch Leven from agriculture and sewage treatment plants.

Incredibly there was no one at the meeting from Scottish Water waste water services! I thought this was very surprising given that the discharges from the Scottish Water waste water treatment plants are thought to be major contributors of phosphorous into the loch.

The representative from SEPA said that the Scottish Water WWTPs were working well within their licence. In response to questions from me she said that there were systems in place to prevent raw sewage entering the loch in periods of heavy rain. SEPA said they didn't know how many times raw sewage is put straight into the loch during periods of heavy rain when the WWTPs get overwhelmed, but said that new screens have been installed to remove 'larger solids' from the sewage bypassing the treatment plants before it enters the loch.

I have to say that I was both depressed and alarmed at the laid back attitude the statutory organisations tasked with protecting Loch Leven seem to have. We surely need to set much tighter limits on the amount of P that is permitted to be discharged into the loch before the next Local Development Plan (LDP) is agreed.

I asked for a further meeting of the group to be called this autumn. This meeting would discuss the next LDP and its likely impact on Loch Leven. Hopefully a representative of Scottish Water waste water services will be present this time and we can come up with an agreement to reduce the total amount of phosphorous entering the loch.

Loch Leven is our most important asset and we have to protect it. We can't allow a situation where toxic blue green algae makes entering the water for people and animals dangerous for the majority of the year.

REAL TIME BUS INFO: I am a great fan of the Stagecoach Bus phone app. It allows you to track your bus in real time and is a great tool. I think that Citylink should have a similar app for people to use and I have contacted them about this. They now have a page on their website that allows you to track your Citylink bus – coachtracker.citylink.co.uk. They are carrying out further work to make it really user friendly.

FLY TIPPING: A new mobile camera that will be used to tackle-fly-tipping is now in operation. The camera can be deployed in mobile locations where fly-tipping is an issue. Footage is recorded and can be streamed to mobile devices or laptops. Anyone caught fly-tipping can face anything from a Fixed Penalty of £200 to a fine of £40,000.

This year Perth & Kinross Council has been working with Dundee City and Angus Councils on an information campaign advising residents to ensure anyone they pay to take waste away is registered with SEPA in a bid to prevent fly-tipping.

POT HOLES: This is the worst time of years for potholes and the Council are struggling to repair them in a timely fashion. However the potholes on the A911 east of Milnathort and the main road between Kinross and Milnathort have now been filled. If you spot a pothole please let me know and I will try and get it filled asap.

LATHRO FARM: Spare a thought for the residents of the Persimmon Homes estate at Lathro Farm. The drainage system installed when the houses were build contained serious defects.

This has led to all the sewage pipes needing to be completely replaced. This has resulted in not to just the streets being dug up but also the paths and gardens of the houses, so you can imagine the mess. The works are due to go on into March.

Welcome and Apologies

Cllr Barnacle opened the meeting and noted apologies.

Minutes Of Last Meeting On 28 October 2021

Minutes accepted with MR noting the following corrections: Phillip Lord does not have connections at Stirling university but was noting that one of the initial requirements of Service X53 was to provide public transport for students to Stirling University. Also in terms of the paper MR is to prepare for senior management in terms of seeking funding for a community minibus, it should be to cover the whole of Kinross-shire and not just West-Kinross-shire. The minutes had been published in the Kinross Newsletter and will continue to be provided to the editor of the Kinross Newsletter for future publications.

Matters Arising From Last Meeting

Cllr Barnacle advised group that Paul Appleby of Cleish and Blairadam CC has now left this group and noted that no representative from Milnathort CC has attended the last few meetings of this group.

Cllr Barnacle provided the transport survey link to Douglas Fraser of Glenfarg CC as requested.

MR advised that the results of the Kinross High School pupil survey had been received and collated. However, due to the low response, Sarah Brown had agreed to re-issue the survey once the free U22s bus pass was launched as this may encourage a greater response. MR will liaise with SB to this end.

Further to Douglas Fraser request to tweak timetable of Service 55 so that it could provide a connection from Cuthill Towers to meet the 1030 ex Glenfarg to Perth departure, however, on speaking to the operator it was established that this would not be possible as it would alter journey times that current passengers use and depend on. MR noted that a connection in Milnathort was possible from Service 55 to connect with Service X56 to Perth.

Cllr Robertson confirmed that a joint letter had been submitted to John Nicolson MP from all Kinross-shire Ward Cllrs in terms of their concerns in relation to rural transport provision.

Update on Kinross-shire Volunteer Community Transport GroupDavid Aird advised the group that KVG are continuing to operate all health related journeys for their whole area. Recently the group has completed a significant number of trips to convey people to receive their COVID19 Booster injection. However, they are not operating any social runs at this time.

DA confirmed that KVG supports the community transport proposal for Kinross-shire and that he and MR met to discuss this. DA suggested a further meeting in the new year with MR and including Nan Cook from the Kinross Day Centre. MR will arrange this meeting.



News

MR suggested that a network design of a fixed timetable registered bus service operating the core route for Kinross-shire and a Community Bus to serve locations in the deeper rural areas of Kinross-shire.

DA agreed that such a design would not compete with the work of KVG but complement it.

Response to Service X53 Cancellation

Philip Lord read out an email to the group from Muckhart Community Council in terms of their meeting concerning the withdrawal of Service X53 and the concerns raised. First had advised that they were only suspending the service due to lack of drivers. MR advised that First had submitted a full service cancellation to the Traffic Commissioner with no note that this was a temporary suspension of the service.

MR advised the group that she was progressing securing funding and an operator to undertake a public transport service to mitigate the cancellation of Service X53 and was striving to have this in place for Monday, 10 January 2022, which was the first date that service X53 would not operate. MR added that she had met with colleagues from Clacks/Stirling PTU to discuss this proposal as she was aware the impact that the cancellation would particularly have on Muckhart and Pool of Muckhart residents.

Phillip Lord requested that new bus service operate as far as Tillicoultry as connections to Stirling buses could be made there. Cllr Barnacle noted importance of bus being wheelchair accessible due to known wheelchair user that currently accesses Service X53.

John Fallon asked if the X53 passenger usage figures that MR had received from First could be shared with the group. MR advised that she would need to seek First's permission in this regard and so would ask them.

MR confirmed that she would keep Cllr Barnacle and the other ward Cllrs up to date on the progress on the new bus service for 10 January as aware that group would not be able to meet again before 10 January.

AOCB and Date of Next Meeting:

There was no AOCB, The next meeting to be advised in due course.

POST MEETING NOTE:

Funding was secured from 10 January – 31 March 2022, for an off peak daytime Monday – Saturday service to operate between Kinross – Crook of Devon- Rumbling Bridge – Pool of Muckhart – Dollar and Tillicoultry as from 10 January 2022. This will be named Service 202 and be operated by Bay Travel with a fully wheelchair accessible vehicle. Connections for onward travel to/from Stirling will be possible at Tillcoultry bus stance.

The timetable has been agreed up until 31 March 2022 thus far. The usage and passenger feedback will be monitored with regards to establishing what timetable would be appropriate beyond 31 March 2022 and in line with available funding.

The timetable is on the Council's website and social media

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platforms. A press release was also issued in December regarding this matter. The roadside information boards will be replaced on Monday 10 January.

Letter sent to the Boundary Commission for Scotland on 18 January 2022

Dear Commissioners

2023 Review of UK Parliamentary Constituencies

I write as the elected member of Perth & Kinross Council (PKC) for the Kinross-shire Ward, as regards the above.

I have represented Kinross-shire since 1999 and I am standing down next spring after 23 years service in local government. I have just recently realised one of my original campaign pledges from my first term of office and manged to persuade the PKC Administration to approve a devolved committee of the Council for the Kinross-shire Ward.

It is therefore deeply concerning that your proposals seek to split Kinross-shire between two constituencies to be shared with Fife Council rather than other parts of PKC. I am completely against your proposal and ask you to reconsider it. I believe such proposals stem from an instruction to try and harmonise the number of voters in each constituency, when clearly our country has not developed in a way to accommodate that. Such proposals bear no relationship to community identity or geography and it is little wonder that the general public hold politics in such low regard as a result.

Kinross-shire has never been included in a parliamentary constituency with parts of Fife since we started sending MPs to Westminster in 1707. Glenfarg, part of Kinross-shire Ward, has also never before been split off from the rest of Perthshire in a parliamentary constituency. I believe strongly that Kinross-shire, as an historic county in its own right up to 1975, should be contained within a single parliamentary constituency and not be split up between two different seats. Kinross-shire shares a Council with Perthshire and it makes significant sense for it to be included in a single constituency with other parts of Perth and Kinross. Our shire is a strong, cohesive community that works together on issues of common interest across the Council ward (hence the support for the area committee), so splitting the ward between two seats would inevitably lead to poorer community representation.

Including different parts (east and west) of our shire within constituencies dominated by Dunfermline or Glenrothes will mean our concerns are marginalised, since the issues faced by our predominantly rural community such as broadband, farming and tourism are very different to those of urban areas like Dunfermline or Glenrothes.

I therefore implore you to seriously reconsider your proposals and come forward with a revision that enables Kinross-shire Ward as a whole to be represented under one parliamentary constituency.

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

New Technology for 999 and 101 Services

POLICE SCOTLAND IS INTRODUCING a new digital contact platform that will protect and strengthen its critical 999 and non-emergency 101 services for the future.

The new digital technology replaces current analogue telephony infrastructure, and brings greater resilience to 999 and 101 services, essential to enable the public to contact the police.

It is also a significant milestone in Police Scotland's commitment to make contact with the police more accessible, relevant and responsive to the needs of the public.

Assistant Chief Constable John Hawkins said: 'This significant investment in new technology for our service will further protect and strengthen our emergency 999 and non-emergency 101 services for the public.

'We have taken action to support our 999 and 101 services who performed well over the festive period against a backdrop of high demand and significant absence. We continue to provide a good service and prioritise 999 calls which are answered in under 10 seconds on average.

'The new digital system will provide greater resilience for these critical service, making it easy, convenient and safe to contact the police.

'Proposals to introduce additional contact methods will be subject to consultation and engagement with our communities and I would emphasise that face-to-face and telephone contact through 999 and 101 will always be available. We know that being visible and making personal contact is important to our communities.

'Please continue to phone 999 for emergencies, or use 101 or Contact Us on the Police Scotland website for non-emergency enquiries.'

The new digital technology will also provide better quality data to support workforce planning for Police Scotland's national service centres during periods of peak demand, and it will ensure 999 and 101 services continue to operate when analogue services are switched off in 2025.

It is a major investment in Police Scotland's contact network, and for the 999 and 101 service, with an initial capital spend of £1.2m and ongoing revenue costs of £20.7m over the duration of the seven year contract.

Andrew Hendry, Chief Digital Information Officer, said: 'The public need will always be at the heart of any new service design and we aim to provide modern and easy-to-use options for people who need to contact their police service.

'This enabling technology is part of our wider digital transformation and will form a foundation across Police Scotland that other parts of the organisation will utilise and build upon.'

Kenya Emergency – 1952-1960

THE KENYA EMERGENCY or 'Mau Mau Revolt' - some called it - was one of the British Army's post war bloodiest conflicts- but is another one largely forgotten about. Although the rising was defeated, it remains a significant step towards the independence of Kenya.

In 1952, elements of the Kenyan Kikuyu tribe, known as the Mau Mau, began a guerrilla campaign against Europeans and fellow Africans. Although it contained many elements of anti-colonialism, the rising was primarily about land ownership, and who was to rule Kenya once the British withdrew. Many Kikuyu had lost land to white settlers during the previous decades.

Crook of Devon resident Mike Hughes served as young soldier with the Black Watch in the campaign, and has very vivid memories -see below.

Although the Mau Mau murdered a number of white settlers, the vast majority of their victims were fellow Africans. By the end of the emergency, 32 European civilians had died at the hands of the Mau Mau, but so had over 1,800 Africans. Mau Mau guerrillas may have totalled 25,000, but they had few modern weapons. Some were armed with homemade guns, swords, spears and bows and arrows. Even so, it took over four years to defeat them.

A State of Emergency was declared in October 1952 after the Mau Mau murdered a loyal Kikuyu chief. Despite this, it took some time for an effective response to be formulated. The Kenyan police were few in number and unused to operating in the tribal areas. At the same time, the British military garrison in Kenya only consisted

of three battalions of the King's African Rifles. It was a worrying and dangerous time for all, especially the settlers who ran farms in the very remote, rural areas.

Erskine In Command

In June 1953, Lieutenant-General Sir George Erskine was appointed Commander-in-Chief, with powers over all security forces in Kenya. The garrison was also reinforced by three more battalions of the King's African Rifles and a brigade of British infantry. A second brigade was added as the campaign progressed. But the military command in Kenya did not immediately learn from the lessons of Malaya.

> At first, troops were used in small numbers to

guard farms and isolated settlements. They also took part in ineffective sweeps through the jungle, while the Royal Air Force (RAF) dropped bombs with little effect. This was largely the result of a lack of intelligence about the Mau Mau's activities.

To fix this, Erskine integrated police and military intelligence organisations under a single head, while the authorities began to deprive the Mau Mau of support by addressing some of the Kikuyu's grievances. Providing medical treatment was one way of winning 'hearts and minds' and gaining useful intelligence.

Many Kikuyu had been intimidated into supporting the Mau Mau. When offered government protection and agrarian reform, they were prepared to inform on the Mau Mau and even fight against

them.A local Kikuyu Home Guard was formed, which eventually totalled 25,000 men. This freed up the security forces for offensive operations. Unfortunately, many members of the Home Guard used violence as a means of controlling the population.

In April 1954, the authorities launched Operation Anvil, a massive cordon and search operation in Nairobi. It destroyed Mau Mau strength in the capital, and netted over 16,000 suspects. The information they provided allowed military units to take the offensive against the Mau Mau in a much more effective manner.

Many Mau Mau suspects were placed in detention camps where conditions were poor. Disease was rife and food in short supply.

Government efforts were concentrated against the gangs in the forests around Mount Kenya and the Aberdares. These were designated 'Prohibited Areas', where the security forces operated a shoot-on-sight policy.

'One night we found a track that was being used for supplies by the bandits... so we laid a quick ambush and lay there all night. As dawn was breaking we heard footsteps. I was alongside Jim my mate, who was on the Bren gun. They came along with huge, heavy loaves of bread on

their heads, and heavily armed. We waited and then 'Clunk', the Bren gun jammed, and they were away – never saw them again. They'd legged it!'

Meanwhile, the concentration of the rural population into defended villages

forced Mau Mau gangs out of hiding in order to get supplies. By April 1955, the back of the rebellion had been broken. And by the end of the year, Mau Mau strength had been reduced to about 2,000.

To defeat the remaining hardcore guerrillas the authorities employed 'pseudo-gangs', often consisting of surrendered Mau Mau whose local knowledge proved invaluable. The rebellion was largely over by the end of 1956, but the Emergency remained in force for another four years as the remaining gang members were hunted down.

Local Crook resident Mike Hughes remembers his time in Kenya.

Twas 18 and living in St Andrews. I did my National Service straight from school. So I found myself in the Black Watch, and spent 18 months fighting in the Mau Mau campaign, up country from Nairobi, in the forests. Our main tasks were to patrol the forests to stop food reaching the gangs of Mau Mau insurgents, from the Aberdares up to Meru. But for real, our biggest enemy were the soaking forests, bamboo and the altitude. We used to be out on patrol for spells of 10 days – resupplied by aircraft drops. There were some bonuses – including amazing opportunities to travel

for a young teenager!'

Altogether, around 600 members of the security forces and nearly 2000 civilians were killed during the Emergency, the vast majority of them African. Over 10,000 Mau Mau died. The rising had been defeated, but it had taken 10,000 British and African soldiers, 20,000 police and 25,000 Kikuyu Home Guard to do it.

granted in 1963. Independent Kenya's first Prime Minister, Jomo Kenyatta, was one of those arrested during the Emergency for his alleged Mau Mau links, even though he was a moderate.

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



Queen's Canopy: Where should trees go? Discussion ensued and included locations such as Boathouse car park, perimeter of town, marshland between McBain Place and the Muirs or Davis Park up to Gallowhill road.

Comments from the Floor

Brian D'Arcy talked to the CC about his Raingardens Proposal for the Park and Ride. Met with Kinross in Bloom to discuss placement of some planters there. Also discussed connecting habitat by using Scots Pines or other native deciduous trees (see above) to form a barrier at industrial estate and create vital wildlife corridor linking to heritage trail. Need to find out who owns the land — Bear Scotland? Civic Trust would appreciate comments from the CC.

A MoP raised a concern about Loch Leven Health Centre being unable to cope with demand. Very difficult to get an appointment with St Serfs – why aren't they using AskMyGP like Orwell practice, which seems to be more efficient? The CC agreed to send a note of concern.

A MoP raised a concern about a marked increase in planes flying over gardens at a low level, noise and disruption to

privacy. They were advised to contact local councillors re flight path concerns and legislation relating to the low level aircraft. An MoP raised concern about drainage having moved in to a Springfield home in July. SUDS pond. Investigation by a plumber found large concrete blocks in a pipe that shouldn't be there. The MoP was advised to email local councillors.

Licensing Applications

Unorthodox Roasters – license to sell alcohol daytime hours. No objections from the CC.

AOB

Funding available for CC members to do related courses (First Aid, etc)

Plaque on old high school to mention Kinross Olympians – homeowners would need to agree – Persimmon Fund?

Memorial flags: Flag poles at side to protect corners. Flags used to be on county buildings. Permission would be required from PKC to reinstate flags.

There was no December meeting. The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be on 22 February 2022 at 7.30pm.

Portmoak Community Council News from the December Meeting

Present At The Meeting held on 14 December were Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters; Cllrs: A Miller (Chair), D Morris (Vice-Chair), A Davidson (Treasurer), S McGregor (Secretary), and 1 member of the public.

Apologies: Cllr M Barnacle; Cllrs S Forde and D Patterson.

Matters Arising

Kinross-shire Committee

The Chair had received feedback from the CC members on initial thoughts on priorities for the Kinross Committee (KC) and had communicated these back to C Purves. It is likely the Committee will convene for first meeting around the 19/20 Jan 22. There will be issues of commonality to be agreed across all PKC CCs e.g. Loch Leven water quality, Public Transport, Roads, Core Paths. KC expects to meet every 8 weeks. Recommendation is that issues discussed at KC, are then taken back to each CC and representation made at next KC meeting. Kinross Committee will have policy to address issues that are locale specific within Kinross-shire i.e. do not apply universally across PKC. Cllr C Purves has drafted 5 themes to present to committee as a starting point for discussions: roads and road maintenance; forward planning on local place plans opposition to sites being developed in principle; footpaths and connections between settlements; climate change and environmental initiatives; public/community transport working with local authority and other voluntary groups and private companies. Items and actions will be linked to budgets.

Road Safety Action Update in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell Speed Trial information had been received and circulated within PCC. The Chair outlined the results which showed that pre-20mph speed limit the 85th percentile speed was under 33mph, during the reduced trial speed limit 85% percentile was only reduced to 32mph, indicating only marginal compliance with the 20mph reduced speed limit. From this it appears the 20mph speed limit does very little for the villages. The conclusion would be that physical mitigation is necessary to reduce the speed of vehicles. ClIr D Morris agreed with The

Chair's analysis of report and suggested the necessity for PKC to complete the A911 route plan asap. W Robertson agreed that the only way to really slow traffic is to put in physical measures. Cllr C Purves agreed this was a fair summation of the report, but indicated that there was limited staff resource at PKC to do this at present. Fife Council's analysis of speed trials suggested that the main benefit was that residents reported feeling safer with 20mph limits. PCC asked Cllrs what measures are available for physical mitigation. Cllrs reported that roads team have a backlog and with many requested items outstanding. PKC are currently unable to carry out requests, due to a shortage of contractors. Cllr W Robertson was pessimistic about responsiveness and has written to the Convener of the Services on the issue. Cllr R Watters agreed that it is hard to get a response even within the three-week response window. There was agreement that speed mitigation speed bumps shouldn't be placed next to houses to avoid road noise. The Chair hoped that the KC with devolved powers should be able to resolve delays locally. C Purves noted that budgets would not be set until Feb/Mar 2022. The Cllrs highlighted the issues at PKC with staffing and budget allocation and asked that PCC be understanding about the difficulties in the path of achieving the things they want to do. These served to highlight the importance of the KC to push items forward with a strong and united voice.

Glenlomond sewage, and Water Supply to Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie: Cllr A Davidson reported that there had been no water outages recently. Sewage works are still being maintained by a group of residents which is not sustainable. The Residents' Association had approached another local company for quotes to get repairs done at a reasonable cost these had not yet been supplied. Cllr R Watters had contacted Jim Fairlie as actioned at Nov 21 PCC meeting but had not received a response.

Portmoak Primary parking issues: no substantial update, subject to delayed works due to PKC difficulties.

Issue of local Affordable Housing: update from Cllrs: Cllr Mike Barnacle action from PCC Nov 21 meeting was to write to Chief Executive. Cllr C Purves was able to confirm M Barnacle had written and this letter had been published in the Kinross Newsletter.

Proposed changes to constituency boundaries: Internal communication within CC and representation had been sent and confirmation received back.

New Matters Arising

Item 1: Co-option of Graham Smith: At the Oct 21 AGM Graham Smith had not been co-opted onto PCC. The CC agreed he would be co-opted again to the PCC.

Reports

Community Speedwatch Programme: The Secretary had posted an update to local social media to update interested members of the community as actioned in last meeting. Cllr W Robertson asked the CC to identify areas of concern for risk assessment by the police. Cllr D Morris raised the concern that local people might be asked to Speedwatch in other areas away from their own, and Cllr W Robertson agreed to raise this issue for clarification with Police Liaison Officer A Mitchinson.

Planning

New Applications

Planning Decisions

Progress with Developments: Westfield Community Liaison Committee. Cllr K Donaldson had some information from the last liaison meeting.

Paths Group update: Paths Group had provided an update. The group would break from weekly maintenance work for the winter so minimal activity over the past month. The group will use the break to reflect on priorities, and welcomed feedback from PCC and local people to help shape our work programme for 2022. Over the past year efforts have focused on the following: Maintaining local Core Paths including Michael Bruce Way (not including the sections that fall within remit of Portmoak Woodland Group);Dryside Road Path from Easter Balgedie to Springfield Farm; Maintaining the informal path network within Stephens Field; Installation of the 'Portmoak Paths Network' information board at the car park in Kinnesswood and identifying other improvements in terms of signage.

A number of projects have already been identified by PCC and these have not progressed including: Path connecting Heritage Trail to Lochend Farm Shop (already included in the Portmoak Paths Network Information Board as advised by George Lawrie); Off road path linking Scotlandwell and Kinnesswood (safe walking/cycling route to school); Off road path linking Easter Balgedie and Kinnesswood (safe walking/cycling route to school – behind the hedge); Design work completed for a Portmoak Paths Network leaflet but the PCC application for PKC funding was unsuccessful. The Portmoak Paths Group budget sits within the PCC budget and is currently in excess of £1000.

Cllr W Robertson commented on the path from Findatie to LLHT which had been washed away by bad weather. The path had been restored by local landowner, with costs shared between the landowner, Nature Scotland and PKC. A local landowner had complained again about problems walkers' dogs worrying sheep and had taken action to lock gates. New self closing gate needed – PKC D Stubbs was to meet with the landowner in the next week. Cllr D Morris suggested that PKC should place more emphasis of urgency on requests from a CC as these indicate representation, not a single individual complaint. PKC required multiple complaints before taking action Cllr W Robertson again cited issues with overwork causing delays. The Cllrs asked that issues with paths be additionally raised to them for escalation within PKC.

Cllr D Morris raised issue of Core Path between Orwell and Arlary (ancient coffin route) which was routinely ploughed and planted over, plus locked gate at Arlary end. Cllr W Robertson agreed to escalate this issue.

Councillors' Reports

W Robertson has reported the bad pot holes along A911. Residents are requested to be careful and try to avoid these if travelling by car or bicycle.

Matters Notified to the Secretary:

Community Investment Fund: a second round of funding available in Jan 2022: Cut-off is the 18/02/22. Secretary to review the applications in Portmoak area. The Portmoak Village hall were likely to put in an application to augment their recent successful Crowdfunding initiative. Interested local groups can view more information at www.pkc.gov.uk/ cif. There is £12,395 available for Kinross-shire groups.

Development of PKC LDP3: The Chair invited comment from the Cllrs. Cllr W Robertson talked briefly about Local Place plans. There was no guidance from ScotGov on these as yet, so the scope and purpose was still ambiguous. Cllr Robertson encouraged Portmoak to submit one when the guidance was published. Cllr R Watters suggested that any group could identify as a community and send in a place plan.

Perth and Kinross Communities Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund: PKAVS Third Sector Interface (TSI) and Perth and Kinross Health and Social Care Partnership (PKHSCP) have launched the Perth and Kinross Communities Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund. Administered by the TSI, on behalf of the Scottish Government, this fund recognises the significance of early intervention and preventative mental health and wellbeing support that is anchored in local communities. £412,861.80 has been allocated to promote and support the conditions for good mental health and wellbeing across Perth and Kinross by March 31 2022. News from the January Meeting

Present At The Meeting held on 11 January were Cllr C Purves, W Robertson, and R Watters; Cllr A Miller, A Davidson, D Morris, K Donaldson, S McGregor, D Paterson; and 3 members of the public.

Apologies: Cllr G Smith, S Forde

Matters Arising

Kinross-shire Committee: Cllr C Purves spoke on the topic. The first Committee meeting is scheduled for 20/01/22. Papers will be released into public domain this week in advance of meeting. There are various items on the agenda, some relevant to all of Kinross-shire, and others Portmoak specific, these include discussions about:

A911 speed limit: particularly the speed limit from Scotlandwell to the boundary with Fife, including additional information from PKC and Police and other official sources. The paper covers the issue of the Route Action Plan, proposed to be developed in this financial year from Apr 2022. The A911 is currently third in priority for completion, with actions likely to commence in 2024-25. Once papers are made available C Purves will pass these onto the local community in order to make a deputation if they wish.

Creation of Regional Parks: the KC agenda includes a discussion about Regional parks, seeking to confirm if there is agreement within the KC to extend the Lomond Hills Park to include Loch Leven. The creation of Regional Parks is a topic that seems to be a priority within ScotGov. It is positive to raise awareness of this at an early stage.

20mph limit in Kinnesswood: outlining data and evidence of the effectiveness of 20mph speed limits, to assess whether CCs consider the 20mph limits are effective or if other physical mitigation or VAS signs are more popular.

The Chair thanked C Purves for the outline and is looking forward to the first meeting. Road safety seems to have come up high on the agenda for KC. The Chair expressed concerned about time lines, and the necessity of ensuring that progress of local issues was not side-lined or slowed by the 2 month frequency of the KC meeting. Local CCs may still need to be picked up by CCs on a more frequent monthly basis in order to fully explore the issues. Cllr W Robertson agreed with this concern about an area committee, and keeping focussed on priority issues. C Purves commented that as a local committee KC should carry more weight than perhaps a local CC may have, but the CC can help to engage with the local community to assess opinion. The KC as a new concept may not as yet be a perfect format, but the hope is that it is a more effective

forum; there will be a 1yr review of the KC to asses progress. Cllr D Morris raised the issue of pollution of Loch Leven, an item which was common to all Kinross-shire CCs and had been raised by Cllr Robertson at the Dec 21 in addition to the 5 themes outlined by Cllr Purves. Cllr Morris requested the issue of Loch Leven could this be added to the agenda? C Purves agreed this could be discussed at the first meeting.

Road Safety Action Update in Kinnesswood and Scotlandwell: The Chair had previously requested the 20mph trial data for Scotlandwell but had not yet received it; Cllr C Purves had emailed Daryl McEown in late Dec but had not yet had a reply. The Chair felt it was necessary to have a holistic view in light of other areas requesting speed mitigation, as the Kinnesswood data appeared to show evidence that other measures were also necessary and speed limit reductions were not a panacea. Cllr D Morris raised the issue of the footpath between Scotlandwell and Portmoak Village Hall, and wished to remind the Cllrs that there was a strong commitment at last election to move this project forward, suggesting that there should be an onsite meeting in Feb/Mar22 to discuss the footpath progress before the next elections in May 22. Cllr W Robertson agreed the Cllrs' commitment to support the creation of the footpath. Both W Robertson and C Purves had discussed the item with TRACKS, but a route for the footpath had not yet been clearly identified. Once a route is decided Cllr W Robertson will commit to obtaining funding for the project. Cllrs are trying to find a solution but there are few options and these are quite tricky. The Chair commented that physical speed mitigation or possibly priority road systems may create space whilst also slowing traffic as an incidental bonus. In previous years D Morris had met with George Lawrie and had been able to identify a possible route on the East side. He proposed another onsite meeting to identify and decide the ideal route. The Chair and Cllr W Robertson agreed this plan was the best way to progress. Cllr R Watters commented that active travel routes were the projects that were attracting funding and it would be possibly to apply to both Sustrans and

Cllr K Donaldson raised concerns regarding the damaged surface of the B 9097 and C50, and the likelihood of additional heavy traffic causing further erosion. Cllr W Robertson offered to raise this with the correct PKC team for response.

Glenlomond sewage, and Water Supply to Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie: A Davidson provided an update. The Glenlomond Residents had not yet heard from Jim Fairlie MSP, which was a disappointment. The Residents team who currently volunteer to manage the sewage plant are increasingly not able to take the responsibility due to health and the physical nature of the work. If no one was able to step forward to manage the sewage plant it had potential to become a public health issue. The current volunteer situation is not a sustainable option. The CC understand the issues the Glenlomond residents are facing and agreed it was a difficult situation where Scottish Water were not taking responsibility as guickly as they should. The Chair asked the Cllrs to outline what pressures could be brought to bear on Scottish Water? Also should any additional development be discouraged on the site of the old hospital. Cllr R Watters had reviewed a survey from Scottish Water recently and had raised the item of Glenlomond with them. He offered to write a letter to Scottish Water to bring additional pressure. R Watters had raised the item twice to Jim Fairlie with no response. The CC expressed disappointment with this.

Cllr D Morris asked Cllr R Watters to engage with relevant ministers to apply appropriate pressure to Scottish Water. Cllr W Robertson commented that he had previously tried to engage with both Scottish Water and Roseanna Cunningham on the sewage issue, but he believed no-one would make SW

Cllr D Morris requested one action point for Cllr R Watters to raise the issue direct to the relevant ScotGov Minister with copy to Jim Fairlie. R Watters agreed to do this.

Portmoak Primary parking issues: D Morris requested that this item be removed from agenda for the meantime as other items required focus at present. The Chair agreed.

New Matters

The Secretary had received a query from a member of the public requesting clarification of the definition of affordable housing. Cllr R Watters provided information on the scope of Affordable Housing which included smaller sized housing, shared ownership, but also housing plots, affordable rents and Social Housing. Dependant on planning committee, there is a hierarchical need for each site assessed and decided whether a commutable sum is therefore payable. R Watters thinks the policy is clear. Rural sites continue to prove more difficult, as affordable housing tends to be in more built up areas. The Chair and Cllr D Morris agreed the policy is clear and needs to be applied. On a previous action point the Cllrs had agreed to write to the Chief Executive of PKC and M Barnacle had written a letter and this had been published in the Newsletter.

Reports:

Police Reports: the Police liaison team were unable to attend the meeting.

Community Speed watch program: The CC had received a response from the police who had confirmed that it was possible for locals to be involved in SpeedWatch actions in their own area.

Cllr D Morris had been surprised that a local incident had not been listed in the Weekly Commander's Bulletin. The Secretary had noticed in the past that specific local incidents were not always listed in the Commander's Bulletin, and had queried this with the Police. A response had been received that the Commander's Bulletin was not intended to be a comprehensive list of all Crime in the area, but rather a summation along lines of current Police campaigns or issues that local communities should be aware of for their safety or benefit. Cllr D Morris felt the summary nature of the Bulletin should be made prominent to readers.

Planning

New Applications: no new applications, since Dec 21 meeting. **Gairneybank caravan:** K Donaldson expressed concern that a caravan had been put on a property at Gairneybank. The Secretary thought the property of concern could potentially be in an adjacent CC Area.

Old Farmhouse at Wester Balgedie: members of PCC had heard concerns raised by local people that the Wester Balgedie Farmhouse and land appears to have been bought and work to clear some of the old buildings had commenced while planning permission had not yet been sought. Locals had expressed concern about the work that had commenced within this sensitive Conservation Area.

Existing Applications: 21/00997/FLL Erection of 22 dwellinghouses, 3 garages and a garage with ancillary accommodation, formation of SUDS pond, landscaping and associated works (LDP site H54). Land 100 Metres South East Of Cragton Villa Rost Gardens Scotlandwell.

The Chair asked the Cllrs if it was possible to approach PKC Planning for information about why the application had been withdrawn.

Planning Decisions

Progress With Developments: Westfield Community Liaison Committee: K Donaldson had attended the liaison committee meeting in Feb 22. Last meeting intimated work would start in Jan 22. Original building design impact had changed and

another company has submitted new plans. Proposing to dig the silo hole which will require a large quantity of concrete, and a possible corresponding increase in large size cement trucks travelling to and from site.

Paths Group update: On behalf of the Paths Group, PCC would like to remind members of the Community that the Paths Group would like people to feedback their views on priorities with regard to path clearing and any other type of maintenance work that may need to be done locally.

Orwell Mawcarse Core Path: Further to the Dec 21 PCC meeting, Cllr W Robertson had tried to walk the Core Path in question which is MTHT/127, A911 west of Orwell to Cycle route east of Arlary. Cllr D Morris highlighted that the landowner continued to plough over the path and the route was no longer clear. Cllr W Robertson agreed that the path was not visible.

Glenlomond Core Path: PTMK/115 Glenlomond to Glenvale. Cllr D Morris understood the landowner was proposing to put in a stile which was inappropriate given the nature of the Core Paths.

Westfield Paths: Hargreaves had released some information for review regarding the path network proposals. Cllr D Morris agreed to contact Hargreaves to discuss how to make this information publicly available.


Documents for the Credit Union account had been obtained per Dec 21 meeting so the application could be progressed.

Ward Councillors' Reports: Cllrs W Robertson and R Watters had attended a meeting on Loch Leven Pollution and the Loch Leven catchment. No rep from Scottish Water had attended the meeting who had knowledge to address issues and concerns around Waste Water treatment. SEPA were similarly under-represented at the meeting. Cllr R Watters outlined his concerns about the pollution going into Loch Leven and identified diffuse pollution from flooding run-off as an additional concern which had been clearly seen in a recent photo from Bishop Hill showing the soil deltas flowing into the Loch from local rivers. Cllr D Morris commented that the Loch pollution issue had been going since the 1990s. A whole review of the agricultural land use needed to be done, and R Watters said this had been discussed.

Fossoway and District Community Council

News from the December Meeting

Present At The Meeting: on 7 December were CCllrs S Bruce-Jones, A Cheape, T Duffy, C Farquhar, N Marchant, G Mudie and G Pye; Cllrs M Barnacle, C Purves and R Watters; One Member of the public.

Apologies: PC Ashley Mitchinson.

Matters Arising

Access to Cash in Kinross-shire: Cllr Purves reported that the Bank has made a site visit to Millbridge Hall to decide if it was suitable for a facility similar to a Banking Hub

Community Development Trust: Cllr Barnacle reported that there was a public meeting on the 24 November. It was suggested at the meeting that a list of projects should be created which might attract more interest in taking part. Cllr Barnacle will approach the Kinross shire Fund for seed funding. It was agreed that it was important for the Trust to gain charitable status in order to raise funds.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: A meeting of the Transport Group will be held on 9 December.

A977 Mitigation Measures: Cllr Purves had made an application to request speed measuring lines to the west of Crook of Devon and east of Drum, but this has not been done yet – Cllr Purves explained that this work is done in batches so may be slightly delayed until the next batch is ready.

Crook Moss Travellers Site: CCIIr Farquhar has been in touch with one of the previous occupants who has now permanently left the site after a long history of violence and damage against him and his family. CIIr Barnacle had a virtual meeting with the planners where he emphasised the importance of enforcing the conditions.

Speeding in Carnbo: Cllr Purves said that he hadn't received any response to the proposal to extend the 40mph buffers further out of the village.

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Flooding in Drum: Cllr Barnacle has asked PKC for a ditch management programme, but has not received any response as yet. CCllr Bruce Jones is organising a public meeting of Drum residents to hear views on how flooding (and speeding) should be handled.

Community Speedwatch: Cllr Robertson has put a notice in *The Newsletter* and a number of people have made contact. The Police have requested locations to be considered and the CC should be able to generate those. CCllr Mudie will canvass parents at the School.

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle has been contacted by PKC's Estates department who wish to get their own estimate for the work before it takes place.

Aldie Road Vegetation: Cllr Purves has also been contacted by other locations about salt bins and work is scheduled to provide salt either to the bins, or in heaps at suitable places.

Kinross-shire Area Committee (previously known as the Kinross Forum): CCllr Bruce-Jones will be the CC's named (nonvoting) representative, with CCllr Cheape as first reserve. CCllr Duffy will circulate requests for short and long term goals for the agenda to be discussed by members of the CC by email in time for the pre-meeting.

Seamab School New Build (21/01467/FLL): Whilst Seamab is a residential school the children's accommodation is on the Lendrick Muir estate. The Seamab building is therefore only used during the 38 week school term, Monday to Friday by the children. Although the current building is only 30 years old it is not suitable for its current use. The CC regrets that the existing building is to be demolished but understands that it is a commercial decision.

There is a major water pipe running through the site and the architects have worked with Scottish Water to ensure that there is no building within 10m of this pipe. However, it was acknowledged by the architects that there are likely to be additional utility pipes and cables traversing the site and these must be identified and safeguarded to avoid disruption to the local community. We have requested that PKC add this as a condition of approval.

Lastly the unadopted road from the busy A977 to the school leading further on to other properties is in a poor state of repair. Although the developers assured us that it would be resurfaced, we would request that the developers consider PKC adoption of the road in partnership with other residents. Cllr Barnacle has had some informal discussions with the principal about the possibility of constructing an alternative access for construction traffic.

Devonshaw Whinstone Quarry: CCllr Marchant reported that the site now appears to be split between two owners, one who owns the site for the houses, and one for the remainder, including the quarry, for a recreational development. There is

a plan for a public consultation for the latter in the New Year. **Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge:** Cllr Robertson reported that the Flood Assessment is with the consultants, and other required studies, including wildlife are in preparation, prior to the planning application submission.

New Business

Possible Adoption of Spur of U241 Road, Drum: A resident of the road which fronts Kilchattan, Garh, Drum Cottage, Firs of Viewfield and a new house, asked if it could be adopted by the Council. There is some doubt about whether it is already owned by the Council as it has street lighting. Cllr Barnacle will ask Andy Brown of PKC whether it is currently adopted or not. If not, then frontagers will need to contribute 60% of the cost. There is also concern about some trees alongside the road – Cllr Barnacle will ask Community Greenspace if they own the trees. Cllr Robertson added that if the road has ever been owned by any of the preceding councils, even before the creation of Perth and Kinross, then it will have to be adopted by PKC.

Rashie Hill and North Hill Forest: CCllr Marchant reported that the CC has received notice from Highland Forestry Limited that they are in the process of renewing the Long Term Forest Plan (LTFP) for Rashie Hill and North Hill (to the West of Stronachie Rd), a predominantly commercial conifer plantation in Perthshire. CCllr Marchant has read the proposal and reviewed the map and believes that they are proactively managing the commercial forest and have committed to maintain the paths which I know are well trodden by local walkers. CCllr Marchant recommended sending a comment to that effect which was agreed by the meeting.

Community Council Business

Minutes Secretary: The search for a volunteer continues, but with no candidates. In the interim the CC members will undertake the task in rotation, with CCllr Cheape volunteering to take the January meeting.

CC Annual Grant: Has been received.

P&K Councillors' Reports

Mike Barnacle: Cllr Barnacle has spoken to waste services who have circulated 'Stick to Six' leaflets to householders. He has sent a submission to the Boundary Commission and a letter to PKC's CEO about the lack of affordable housing. The Drummond Park adoption is ready to take place; residents now need to make a final commitment to the finance with work to take place in March. Cllr Barnacle is meeting with Community Greenspace on the 10th where the Crook of Devon skate park will be discussed.

Richard Watters: Noted that the application to reinstate the Lord Provost of Perth as part of the Queen's Jubilee celebrations was discussed at a recent Council Meeting.

New Applications

21/02039/FLL Erection of three agricultural buildings and a stable, formation of access track and associated works at Land 360 metres south west of Craigton House, Rumbling Bridge. Neutral CC Comment to seek assurance that this application will take into consideration the outcome of the Appeal against application 21/00001/FLL.

Appeals: 21/00001/FLL S42 application to delete condition 6 (access upgrade) of permission 20/01319/FLL at Land 180 metres south west of Powmill Cottage, Rumbling Bridge. At the 14 September LRB meeting the application was deferred – it was not on the agenda for the October, November or December meetings.

Decided Applications

21/01446/IPL Erection of a dwelling house (in principle) at land 30 metres north east of Corner Cottage, Powmill. The application was approved, the CC did not comment.

21/01146/FLL Erection of a dwelling house and garage with home office at land 30 metres east of Vine House, Solsgirth. The application was approved; the CC had made a neutral comment requesting that conditions from the previous planning approval were carried forward. The conditions were included in the approval.

21/01590/FLL Erection of a dwelling house at land 40 metres south of Craighead Bungalow, Drum. The application was approved, the CC did not comment.

21/01720/FLL Erection of a dwelling house (revised design) (plot 6) at former Steading Pitfar, Powmill. The application was approved, the CC did not comment.

20/01860/FLL Erection of a dwelling house at land 50 metres south west of Greenparks, Church Road, Crook of Devon. The application was approved, the CC had objected on the grounds of a lack of a SUDS plan and concern regarding known flooding issue. Condition requiring temporary (during construction) and permanent SUDS schemes was incorporated in the approval.

Enforcement Issues

20/00809/FLL Craigton Farm Lane — Notices to obtain site owners have been issued with the expectation that an Enforcement Notice will be issued shortly, but the caravans are still present on site.

AOCB

A MoP asked the CC to contact Muckhart CC to ask them if they can make an application to their Council to get vegetation cut back on the Rumbling Bridge to Yetts main road.

News from the January Meeting

Present At The Meeting: on 4 January 2022 were CCllrs S Bruce-Jones, A Cheape, T Duffy, C Farquhar, N Marchant, G Mudie and G Pye; Cllrs R Watters and W Robertson.

Apologies: CCllr Faiza Hansraj; Cllrs C Purves and M Barnacle; PC Ashley Mitchinson.

Police report: CCllr Bruce-Jones reported on a serious incident at the Crook Moss travellers' site on Wednesday 29 December involving attendance by the police, three fire appliances and an ambulance.

Matters Arising

Access to Cash in Kinross-shire: Further hub locations have been announced, including one in Carnoustie. Despite indicating our interest, Kinross-shire was not included. Liz Smith's office has written to the Access to Cash team to ask how these locations were chosen and why we were not informed. Not further update yet on the Bank of Scotland community banking pilot.

Community Development Trust: CCllr Duffy will update at the February meeting.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: Cllr Watters advised that Bay Travel would be replacing the First Bus service between Tillicoultry and Kinross providing five daily return journeys. CCllr Bruce-Jones added that the proposed timetable was inadequate for the purposes of the regular school run. Cllr Watters emphasised the need for viability and sustained public support.

A977 Mitigation Measures: Cllr Robertson reported on the long delayed realignment at the junction with the B9097 opposite Fossoway Garage now due to commence in the spring. As an aside CCllr Duffy commented on incomplete works to the footpath alongside the A977 at the Crook of Devon hall crucial to the safety of children walking to school.

Flooding in Drum: Cllr Barnacle had asked PKC for a ditch management programme and a response was awaited pending re-opening of P&K offices. Meantime CCllr Bruce Jones is organising a public meeting of Drum residents and canvassing opinion to produce a prioritised list of issues.

Community Speedwatch: CCIIr Duffy reported that volunteers for more areas were being sought ahead of police vetting (low level check) and there had been informal consultation on procedures with Portmoak.

Blairingone War Memorial: Cllr Barnacle had been contacted by PKC's Estates department and an estimate of the cost involved in the work was still awaited.

Kinross-shire Area Committee (previously known as the Kinross Forum): CCllr Bruce-Jones reported that a Teams Meeting had been arranged for Thursday 20 January and this would be live streamed enabling public participation.

Seamab School New Build (21/01467/FLL): CCllr Marchant commented on a proposal to adopt the access road (in private ownership) and provide adequate turning space in the car park for emergency services. Meanwhile neighbouring proprietors maintained expressions of concern generally.

Devonshaw Whinstone Quarry: CCllr Marchant was in touch with the applicant who will contact the CC once a PAN date has been agreed.

Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge: The Flood Risk Assessment has been completed by the consultants, and their report received. As a result the line of the bridge is now proposed to follow the line of the previous bridge but at a higher level, meaning it will now be 9m longer than previously planned. TRACKS are obtaining estimates for the Tree, Bat and Otter surveys required by PKC prior to the planning application submission. It will also be necessary to obtain a licence from SEPA. CCIIr Duffy would progress matters assisted by CCIIr Cheape.

Possible Adoption of Spur of U241 Road, Drum: Cllr Barnacle was going to ask Andy Brown of PKC whether it is currently adopted or not, and ask Community Greenspace if they own the trees.

Community Council Business

Minutes Secretary: The search for a volunteer continues, but with no candidates. CCllr Bruce-Jones volunteered to take a minute of the meeting scheduled for Tuesday 1 February.

P&K Councillors' Reports

Richard Watters: Advised that the Climate Action Plan was underway and a report would be posted on the P&K website. This entire exercise was a considerable challenge but of fundamental importance.

Willie Robertson: Reported that PKC had been looking at the draft budget for 2022/23 and commented that the drive towards net zero in the coming years would be very expensive. **Callum Purves:** (Written report) **Speed monitoring:** no further update.

Carnbo Speed Limits: we will seek to progress these changes through the local committee.

Grit bins: roads maintenance have advised that they do not believe Aldie Road is a suitable location for a grit bin and would not usually put one on such roads. They will continue to dump grit as they have done previously when it is thought to be needed. They are looking for a grit bin for Back Crook Road, but have to move one from another location.

CIIr Robertson responded that whilst this would do much to ease traffic congestion in Kinross such a project was unlikely to become a priority in the foreseeable future given the proximity of the north and south junction at Kinross and funding problems (absence in the immediate future of essential Developer Contributions).

Recipe

Sausage and Bean Casserole

Here's a hearty dish for winter days. You can replace pork sausages with veggie, use something other than chorizo sausages, different beans or use up any other vegetables you have left over to add to this dish. It will be delicious and warming.

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 medium sticks celery, finely chopped
- 1 pepper, finely chopped
- 400g chorizo sausages
- 400g pork sausages
- 3 cloves garlic or adjust to taste
- 2 tsp sweet paprika
- ½ teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 tbsp dried thyme
- 125ml white wine
- 2 x 400g tins chopped tomatoes
- 2 sprigs fresh thyme
- 1 stock cube
- 1 x 400g tin aduki beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 bunch chives, snipped

Method

Heat 2 tbsp olive oil in a large heavy based pan. Add onion and cook gently for 5 minutes. Add the celery, pepper and cook for a further 5 minutes.

Add the sausages and fry for 5 minutes. Stir in the garlic cloves, paprika, cumin and thyme and cook for a further 1-2 minutes. Pour in the white wine, add the tins of tomatoes and thyme and bring to a simmer. Crumble in the stock cube.

Cook for 40 minutes, stir in the aduki beans and cook for a further 5 minutes. Remove the thyme sprigs, season with black pepper and stir in chives if used.


There have been many badges and


*Like last year, in August the market will be bigger and will take place at the market park.

From South Inch car park the walk crosses the railway bridge. A stretch of road walking leads to the steep climb up Kinnoull Hill. The walk is mostly on good paths but is likely to be muddy in places, so boots and walking poles are advised. Lovely views from the peak (ascent 222m /728ft).

Sunday 6 March, Beecraigs Country Park (near Linlithgow), Witchcraig and Cockleroy Hills, 6 miles

A walk on good paths through the country park, ascending to the top of Witchcraig, then through woodland to enjoy the views from the top of Cockleroy.

Saturday 19 March, Gartmore Dam Circular, 7 miles

Circular walk from Muircot Farm Shop, descending to Gartmorn Dam. Circuit of the Dam on good paths and tracks before returning to Muircot. Lunch/coffee available in farm shop from around 1.30pm at end of walk.

Sunday 3 April 2022, Glen Sherup Horseshoe, 9 miles

A circular walk following tracks and paths taking in the summits of Innerdownie, Whitewisp, Tarmangie and finally Ben Shee.

The really encouraging thing is that, having been one of the earliest peat restoration projects to be funded by the Scottish Government's Peatland Action programme, back in 2012, we



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

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






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now find ourselves in good company, with similar schemes underway across Scotland.

Peatland restoration is constantly in the news because of all the research showing that it's a good way of combating climate change. The Scottish committee on Climate Change says that every £1 spent on peatland restoration brings £4 of social benefit through reduced carbon emissions, improved water quality and flood mitigation.

Water is held in the peat and the wetter the bog, the better it is for mosses. Anyone who has walked round Portmoak Moss



recently will know that it's heading in the right direction; it's been soaking wet! We can keep it from drying out by continually removing young trees and giving the lovely sphagnum moss, the main building block of peat, a chance to thrive.

There have been some impressive puddles, though, and we've asked Woodland Trust Scotland, who own the site, to add some extra sub-base where deep ones have been forming on the western section of the path.

Speaking of the weather, we were very lucky to get a dry day for the Christmas tree event. A record number of people turned out; 165! Many family groups came along, to argue about which trees they wanted. We are grateful for the generous donations, for trees and home-baking, and the money will go towards equipment, events and projects. Feedback was good with comments like, 'It was a brilliant experience, a story to tell and a great opportunity to learn more about the conservation efforts made' and 'Our tree is perfectly imperfect!'. As well as trees and baking there were some beautiful Portmoak calendars for sale, created by woodland group member, Michael McGinnes, and featuring a great variety of local wildlife.

It would have been nice to finish by saying that our monthly open meetings are back in the Well Inn but continuing Covid-19 worries mean that, at the time of writing, we're still communicating by Zoom.



The Trust is concerned to learn that limits on phosphorus discharges were allowed to be relaxed in the 2000s following the successful measures taken in the 1990s to deal with the serious algal bloom problem. 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

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
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Kinross Volleyball

Club coach, Dave Munro, has been very busy over the past six weeks. He has been questioning Live Active Leisure and Perth & Kinross Councillors about the lack of transparency and scrutiny over the planned 'repurposing' of the coaching hall at Bell's Sports Centre into a 100-station gym with work scheduled to start in April, thus denying all other sports access to this purpose-built facility. A petition to 'save the coaching hall' has been started and has achieved over 2,000 signatures within 10 days. The petition includes loads of supportive comments, questioning the validity of the decision-making processes involved in this matter.

The club is working in partnership with Active Schools and Scottish Volleyball with a primary schools' initiative. This initiative will target local primary schools with introductory three, one-hour sessions, where pupils will be introduced to the fun that volleyball can bring. The sessions will run on Mondays and Tuesdays after school at Kinross, Milnathort, Fossoway, Portmoak and Arngask schools between January and March, with a view to continuing as a transition project in the summer term at Kinross High School. We hope to bring the children involved together for further coaching, culminating in a competitive festival.

The Kinross Club is hoping to enter multiple teams in this year's Scottish Open Volleyball Tournament which should take place on 28-29 May at Perth's North Inch, after a two year, Covid-induced absence. The competition usually attracts over 100 teams from around the UK and Europe. Our juniors, in particular, are looking forward to participating in this national competition.

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
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

Swan Wars

FEBRUARY, THE LAST MONTH of winter and a sign that spring is just around the corner! Sometimes February can feel a bit 'spring-like'; the first time you feel the warmth of the sun is normally felt in February. Our wildlife also knows that spring is approaching; look out for the first wildflowers of the year; Lesser Celandine (Ficaria verna) and Primrose (Primula vulgaris) can be spotted along ditches and streams. When walking around woodlands, look out for Wood Anemone (Anemone nemorosa). The bird song also stars in February - listen out for the 'teacher-teacher' calls of great tit.

On the loch, much of our wildfowl will be starting to pair up. Look out for the ongoing 'Swan Wars'. Mute swans will be pairing up, feeding together and establishing a territory. Occasionally, territory wars can flare up between two pairs. Usually the males (cobs) will battle it out with some flaps of the wings, v-shaped posture marching and a bit of chasing each other – it can also be resolved without contact through each bird circling around each other in a non-aggressive manner – quite a sight!

Our ducks will be displaying, look out for the 'head-bop' of the mallards or the bizarre display of the goldeneye. The drakes (males) do a bonkers display and extend their necks and flick their heads onto their back — the poor female must wonder what he is up to (but it is a tried and tested successful method!).

Herons will be very close to nesting — we usually have a good number of pairs on Castle Island and the small island in front of it called Alice's Bower. Unfortunately, the cold snap in early February last year meant that we had a really



poor heron breeding season. Hopefully this year they will bounce back!

Herons nest in colonies at the tops of trees and in the past we have seen up to 30 pairs using the Loch. The safety of the islands is where they choose to nest and we monitor them throughout the season as part of the long running 'Heronries Survey'. Herons have been studied in the UK since 1928 through the British Trust for Ornithology and this is the longest running single species survey in the world! These birds are truly amazing to watch. Next time you are out at the Kirkgate viewpoint in late Feb/early March look out for herons carrying nesting material and pair bonding on the tops of the trees on Castle Island.

Latest wildlife highlights around the reserve include; an unusual wintering green sandpiper, 15 pintail, 450 pochard, 4 little egret, kingfisher at the Burleigh Hide and plenty of roe deer!

Spring is just around the corner; it won't be long until we are spotting the first butterfly of the year or the first sand martin flying over the loch! Until then, we will take each day as it comes and enjoy what wildlife delights February has to offer.

Lapwing Return

WINTER HAS WELL AND truly arrived at RSPB Loch Leven with lots of icy patches appearing around the reserve. The wildlife highlights for the month have been wintering wildfowl and waders with a regular group of whooper swan on the flood alongside a few hundred teal, goldeneye, mallard, tufted duck and wigeon. A flock of around a hundreda curlew have been spotted moving about the loch with their haunting calls. Daily sightings of hunting kestrel have been spotted over the wetland, as well as the occasional sighting of hen harrier and short eared owl at dusk. There are lots of birds in the woodland with some good sightings of treecreeper and bullfinch around the visitor centre. Flocks of linnet and goldfinch have been seen in the fields, and fieldfare can be spotted along the Heritage Trail in the trees and hedges. The red squirrels are still active and making the most of the food on offer from the visitor centre. Further along at the east viewpoint there have been some great views of red breasted merganser, and a large group of goosander on the loch. Numbers of pink footed geese have subsided in recent weeks due to the cold weather, which has caused many of them to head further south into England.

Out on the reserve the team have been strimming back vegetation in preparation for the rapidly approaching breeding season with the lapwing arriving back in mid-March. They prefer wet areas with

some rush tussocks to build their nests in. The team have also been flooding and drying out areas of the wetland to benefit wintering wildfowl. The wetter areas will provide lots of wet and soft mud for breeding waders to forage for food, including their fledged chicks.

Want to get involved with conservation work at the reserve? We have two exciting voluntary opportunities for you to get involved in. We are looking for a full-time lapwing intern to assist from late March until early July. This role will involve the monitoring of lapwing nests and their chicks, carrying out predator watches,

and assisting with surveys across our three reserves -Loch Leven, Loch of Kinnordy, and the Tay Reedbeds.

Starting from mid-February the reserve will also be hosting monthly work parties to carry out practical tasks across the reserve, including habitat management and reserve maintenance. For more information on these opportunities, please email lochleven@rspb. org.uk.

The remaining part of the refurbishment project from 2021 that is still to be delivered is the installation of the electric vehicle (EV) charging points. The delays have been caused by supply issues and absences due to Covid within SSE, who need to install a power supply. We are hopeful that the EV points will be up and running by the end of March.

We have an exciting new Treasure Trail running this February half term, come and join us for some family themed fun! Follow your treasure map around the beautiful woodland and see how many answers you can find hiding about the wood. The trail runs between 12 and 20 February. Drop in anytime between 10am-4pm, no booking required, £2 per sheet.

The cafe is currently closed on Mondays and Tuesdays until further notice due to staff shortages. We are recruiting for an assistant catering manager and catering assistants to increase our capacity which will get us back open seven days a week, so that everyone who visits can enjoy a break in the cafe with a coffee or some lunch. 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Farming

Donald's the Daddy

It's always a source of great wonder to me how after just a few weeks after the shortest day, you can start to see quite clearly our daily quota of daylight starting to increase. It was also interesting how, with the change of the calendar the weather changed from the murky dampness of the Christmas period to something a bit fresher - very welcome.

We are now firmly entrenched in the winter routine here at backward farm with all the cattle inside — even the wee Dexter cattle are safely under cover. They spent the summer in our furthest fields from the steading so they had a good mile to run back and run they did, even Loki the short legged bull who had done very well from his summer (and winter) grazing and is carrying plenty of flesh. Hopefully he has also done what a breeding bull is supposed to do, and we will shortly have a few calves.

They certainly can be described as small cattle with a big attitude. The sheep will be getting pregnancy scanned in early February so we will find out how successful their breeding season has been. They had a good wedge of grass in front of them going into the autumn and it has

kept them going well although a couple of batches are starting to run a bit low on their supply, so they might need some silage put out to them to keep them satisfied in a week or so.

The scanning will let us know what our potential lamb numbers might be for the season ahead and we will be able to target feeding appropriately to ewes according to the number of lambs they are expecting. Hopefully we will have a similar (well, maybe slightly better) scanning percentage to last year which had been our best for a year or two. We didn't have too many ewes expecting triplets which helps takes some pressure off the lambing workload but we will just have to wait and see what nature decides to give us and work with it.

The pigs have been enjoying the sticky, mucky conditions of late and they are doing a great job of turning over the land in their paddocks, which should be in good order for re-seeding back into grass next season, once they have been moved to their summer paddocks. There was great excitement back in November when lan's pedigree Saddleback sow farrowed her litter of piglets. She had a good sized litter and a lot of them have really nice 'saddle' markings which is what you hope for but can never predict. Hopefully, stud boar Donald (above) has been doing his job and there will be some more piglets born before too long to other sows in the herd but again, we will just have to wait and see.

For the coming season, probably the biggest challenge facing most (if not all) farmers will be dealing with eye watering rates of inflation of costs of inputs, in particular fertilisers which are going to be in short supply and have roughly tripled in price. For fruit and vegetable farmers, sourcing a supply of skilled labour for harvesting and processing fresh produce will be, once again a huge challenge further burdened by inflationary cost pressures. I would like to wish everyone in 'Newsletter' country a happier, more sociable year than the two we have just waved goodbye to.

Obituary

Campbell Colin Watson

Campbell Colin Watson, 74, of Kinross died peacefully at home on Friday 26 of November after a short illness.

Born in 1947 in London, Campbell was sent from a young age to board at Drumtochty Castle Preparatory School and later Fettes College in Edinburgh; an experience which perhaps instilled in him the independence, self-assurance, and consummate ease in social situations which defined him as a person.

Campbell completed his education at St Andrews University (at the Dundee campus), graduating in law in 1972. After a spell in the Caribbean working in investment banking, where



he met his wife of 37 years, Pauline, he returned to Scotland to work as a solicitor and later a partner at Andersons LLP in Kinross (formerly JL Anderson & Co). He was instrumental in building Andersons into the thriving business it is today, and continued working there until his illness.

An active and popular member of the community, Campbell was involved for many years in the Rotary Club, the Community Council, and the Kinross Centre, where he was the chairman for 16 years and a regular volunteer. He was also a well-known figure at Kinross Golf Club: a member for over 30 years, he assisted the club with legal matters whenever he could. Recently he was involved in bringing parkrun to Kinross, something which brought him great satisfaction. As well as volunteering regularly, he often ran it himself, a smile on his face, with his children and grandchildren in tow.

A man of wide and varied interests, Campbell was blessed with family and a legion of close friends with whom to share those interests; skiing, golfing, diving, and making music to mention just a few. He was particularly proud of his status as a Munro 'compleatist' which he achieved in 1998, and he deeply valued the time he spent in the bothies and hills with

family and friends in the pursuit of that goal. He continued to enjoy spending time in the outdoors right up until the end. It would be difficult to name a sport Campbell didn't have an interest in, but it was football which he loved the most. A Dundee fan in his youth and a long-suffering follower of the Scottish national team, he was old enough to remember good times for both; Dundee winning the league in 1962 and bunking off school in 1963 to see Scotland beat England 2-1 at Wembley. His greatest love however was Liverpool FC and, as a season ticket holder, he regularly travelled to Anfield to see them play. He was proud to have witnessed first-hand 'The Miracle of Istanbul' in 2005 and even a life-threatening hernia wasn't enough to prevent him attending Liverpool's most recent Champions League victory in Madrid in 2019.

A deep interest in people and place meant that Campbell travelled widely during his life. From his travels around South America after university, to his life in the Caribbean; from his diving expeditions in the Pacific, to following Liverpool, Scotland and the British Lions abroad; he managed to see much of the world. If pressed, however, he would name Assynt as his favourite place on earth. And on a cold, wet winter's-day, Campbell was most happy at home in Kinross in front of a roaring fire and the football.

He is survived by his children Ian, Stuart and Verity, his grandchildren Barney and Lucille Watson, and Sam, Isla and Alex Thwaites and his brother, George.


