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#### Wind Farms - More Information Needed

NOMINATED AND ELECTED representatives should be primarily focused on defending the landscape of Kinross-shire which could be decimated under the false premise of mitigating global warming using wind energy. The environmental and cost arguments for stopping these projects are now exceptionally strong. The pitifully small community benefits are insignificant.

Scotland previously sought to reduce its carbon contribution to play its part in reducing global warming. At that time it was wrongly assumed that the cost penalties of wind energy on consumers were affordable. It was also assumed that visual acceptability could be satisfactorily resolved by the planning process. Later, when preference was given to large capacity wind projects and planning control was split between central and local control, there was a distinct lack of foresight.

Mainly by switching from coal and oil to gas, UK human-made carbon emissions have been greatly reduced. Unsurprisingly, carbon emissions from Scotland are now insignificant in terms of global warming. The Scottish government stated 'around 0.1% of global emissions' (*Ref. CO2 emissions emitted in Scotland vs the rest of the world: EIR release 26 October 2023*). That information was based on 2020 statistics and is now considerably less and Scotland's proportion of world carbon is still reducing.

With the present pricing structure, which is outwith the control of the Scottish government, more wind power will result in further substantial electricity cost increases. Electricity costs increased by 55% in the decade preceding the Russia / Ukraine war which also caused further rises. Our domestic unit electricity cost is now the second highest in the world. At this time we need to pursue more effective carbon saving methods rather than encouraging wind energy which increases consumer costs, saves little carbon and decimates landscapes

Visual impact may be subjective but it cannot be ignored. There is a pressing need for an immediate moratorium on the planning control of large wind projects. Decision making for all land based wind projects should be passed back to local planning authorities. This would allow all implications and the cumulative effect of wind farms to be assessed by only one local body which has the intimate knowledge of our landscape. Rural politicians could stop mistaken decisions being made based on outdated information.

#### **Dangerous Driving On The High Street**

I HAVE NOTICED that there seems to be increasingly more selfish and dangerous driving on Kinross High Street, especially on the southern end between the butchers and the Raj Mahal. Drivers seem to think that they have sole rights to the 'shared' road area and park wherever they like in order to get their takeaways. This is causing increasing frustration for other drivers and road users trying to get down the High Street and there appears to be no sign of police or council intervention. I was almost run over walking out of the Raj Mahal, on the pavement, when a car pulled up onto the pavement at considerable speed and very close (about 1m away) from the open door. If a child had run out of the door this could have resulted in a fatal accident, all caused because a driver couldn't be bothered to park their car sensibly and walk to the entrance of the restaurant.

Parking on pavements, never mind driving up onto them at speed, is highly reckless and this particular corner is constantly used as a parking space when it is a pavement. It's not even as if people can blame 'young hooligans' for this type of behaviour, the driver who nearly ran me over was an older woman who really should have known better.

Does there need to be a fatal accident before someone in authority takes action against this antisocial and dangerous behaviour?

#### Joscelyne's Journey

JOSCELYNE WAS POISED for a future filled with promise, excelling academically with straight A's from Kinross High School. She started at Edinburgh University studying Astrophysics last September. At that time she initially thought she had a benign tumour which was troublesome enough causing headaches and double vision, however, this was subsequently revealed to be one of the rarest of the rare brain tumours.

December 2023 saw Joscelyne undergo complex brain surgery and on 20 December she was given the devastating news that she had stage 4 cancer with 12-18 months to live. Six weeks of daily radiotherapy and chemotherapy did not work so her family took the difficult decision to go public with the view of raising the mammoth amount of £250k to provide the potential opportunity for Joscelyne to have specialised immunotherapy.

Since launching this mid-April the beyond amazing amount of over £70k has been raised and so many heartfelt thanks go to the Kinross community who have taken Joscelyne to their hearts.

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# **B.E.M. FOR GEORGE!**

MANY CONGRATULATIONS TO George Lawrie of Kellieside, Kinross on being awarded a British Empire Medal (BEM) in HM The King's Birthday Honours List.

The British Empire Medal (BEM) was established in 1922 and is awarded for meritorious civil or military service, worthy of recognition by the Crown. The BEM was awarded to subjects of the United Kingdom until 1992, after which time it lay in abeyance. It was specifically reinstated in June 2012, for HM The Queen's Diamond Jubilee, specifically to reward and honour those who work in the charitable and voluntary sectors.

George Lawrie has had agricultural interests in the Kinross area of Perthshire all his life. He has had multi-faceted, handson involvement with all things natural, farming and rural in that part of Scotland, and wider. George is known as a big-hearted, larger than life character – fun, and ebullient, and he gets extraordinary things done.

He sits as a volunteer, unsalaried, Trustee/Director on a wide variety of boards, all Scotland rural or agricultural-based. The depth and spread of his commitments is quite remarkable.

He is a stalwart member of both the Light Up Kinross team and Kinross and District Rotary Club, running many successful fundraising and community engagement ventures, including the very popular Santa's Sleigh round the whole local area, in all weathers.

On hearing about his award, George told the *Newsletter*: 'This came a a total surprise, but it is an honour to be recognised for something you enjoy doing. As someone who has lived in Kinross-shire all my life I am passionate about the area.'

President of the Kinross And District Rotary Club, Jo Middlemiss MBE, said: 'This is such great news – our club's heart beats strongly because of members and doers like George. He is a great giver, always has the Yes Can Do words on his lips and just loves working for the community's advantage. He is Mr Santa Sleigh and loves doing it. We are proud to call him a Rotarian and a friend.'

Two major achievements which stand out are his Tractor Ride round Scotland, for the Royal Highland Education Trust (RHET) — a great media capturing endeavour — for the benefit of educating hundreds of school children about rural matters — from 'Farm to Fork', and raising a large sum of money along the way, for RHET.

The second extraordinary achievement, which has transformed this whole part of Scotland, is his 10 year project to complete the track around Loch Leven – a superb location in its own right – but now accessible in its entirety.

As Project Officer for TRACKS (The Rural Access Committee of





Kinross-shire) George's major success was to complete the trail all around Loch Leven. Scotland's biggest lowland loch was finally 'unlocked'. For the first time ever, people could make a complete circuit of Loch Leven either by walking or cycling, via a trail which links a wide range of cultural and historical sites.

This marked the completion of a ten-year project, masterminded by George, which involved painstaking negotiations, Lottery funding applications, and trail design, in order to safeguard the largest concentration of breeding ducks in inland Europe, as well as tens of thousands of overwintering geese. The Heritage Trail is now a safe, off-road trail that runs for a total distance of 21km (13 miles) around the shores of Loch Leven, and links together over 30 natural and cultural heritage sites. His perseverance against many obstacles — physical, planning, monetary — paid off and his success has meant an increase of visitors to the area that can literally be measured in thousands.

Planning for the Heritage Trail started in 2004 and the project secured £3 million in funding from national and local agencies.

Alan Laidlaw, CEO of Rhass (Royal Highland Agricultural Society of Scotland) said of George, 'When he was Chair of the Royal Highland Education Trust (RHET), until May 2023, his dedicated, tireless work with that wonderful charity was inspiring.

'He embarked on an extremely motivating, and huge publicity-generating charity tractor ride around Scotland over a week, raising awareness and funds (over £15,000), educating children about rural affairs – his 'Farm to Fork' programme – and going into many schools all over Scotland.

'RHET went from strength to strength under his leadership, bringing literally thousands of young people a better grasp of things agricultural and rural, plus bringing them to the farm to get a better feel for that life on site.

'People often ask him what hat he is wearing today. He also somehow manages to make time for his much loved family. His life has been one of service before self. He is very worthy of recognition by His Majesty for his dedicated commitment over 40 years, to land, farming and rural based organisations in Scotland in a very wide variety of ways.'

Many Kinross and District Congratulations on this Royal recognition, George – we're proud of you!

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# PORTMOAK CC OBJECTS TO BRUNT HILL WINDFARM

**AT ITS MEETING ON** 11 June, Portmoak Community Council decided to object to the proposed Brunt Hill windfarm proposal along the following grounds:

- These proposed wind turbines are massive industrial structures which would transform the view of the Ochils from the south, completely altering its landscape quality and diminishing its natural beauty.
- Within the Ochils hill range these wind turbines would seriously impair the public enjoyment of the hills for walking, cycling and other activities that are based on the natural beauty and wild quality of the countryside, unimpeded by industrial structures.
- The intrusion of large turbines into the skyline would spoil views of the sunset for much of the year and would require aircraft warning lights. The Christmas tree effect on the hills would be far removed from their present dark and tranquil appearance.
- The hills around Loch Leven are important, at a UK level, for air sports including hot air ballooning, hang gliding, para gliding as well as activity by gliders and other small aircraft. The possibility of direct impacts from collisions or indirect impacts from the air turbulence created by rotating blades is of concern.
- The Ochils have already been impacted by significant wind farm and transmission pylon development and no more giant turbines should be permitted in this hill range. The cumulative impact limit was reached some years ago. Any further wind farm approvals would set a precedent for further erosion of landscape quality and amenity value.
- Additional wind farms would require a new overland power line to connect to the national grid at the Westfield energy park, impacting the scenery around Loch Leven.
- These proposed wind farms are not needed to meet UK renewable energy demands – there is already a waiting list for grid connections from prospective wind farms far in excess of the UK's maximum requirement. Future wind farms should be located in offshore locations, not on land, with subsea cables used for long distance transmission.
- There should be a presumption in Kinross-shire in favour of small scale wind turbine development, with turbines no taller than 50 metres to the vertical blade tip and located close to farm buildings, helping to meet local energy demand.

Dave Morris, Vice-Chair of Portmoak Community Council, told the *Newsletter*, 'The primary purpose of gigantic wind turbines on our hills is to provide huge profits to corporate interests in faraway places. The place for such turbines is well offshore, along with

Fossoway & District CC has received an extension to date for comments from the Energy Consents Unit (ECU).

a levy applied to each turbine. The funds secured through such a levy would allow for the establishment of a Scottish sovereign wealth fund, equivalent to that enjoyed in Shetland and Norway as a consequence of North Sea oil and gas development. A fund based on offshore wind farm development could be used to benefit local communities across the whole of Scotland. At present, however, the integrity of our planning system is being eroded by developers who seek planning approval through the temptations of "community benefit". This favours the few, not the many. A wealth fund should benefit everyone, everywhere and not be dependent on living in the shadow of industrial monsters.'

The Brunt Hill application will be determined by the Scottish Government's Energy Consents Unit and representations should be sent to *representations@gov.scot* quoting reference *ECU00004654*. All representations should be received by the ECU not later than 28 June 2024 although Scottish Ministers may consider representations received after this date. In due course PKC will also make their views known to the ECU. If possible you should copy your ECU representation to PKC at *developmentmanagement@pkc.gov.uk* and to our four local councillors, mentioning the PKC reference number for this wind farm application: 24/00716/ECU36.



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
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## SERVICE FOR THE GENTLE POET

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

is looking for your views on setting up a local resilience group. Resilience groups are a way for individuals, groups and local businesses to support their communities through challenging situations. Coming together to prepare for emergencies and disruption can help everyone to cope better, particularly more vulnerable people.

May saw localised flooding in Kinross-shire with 60-90mm of rain falling in an hour. The worst affected areas were Bowton Road, Smith Street and Cleish.

Some of the duties of the group would be

to carry out welfare checks on the elderly and vulnerable, and to distribute sandbags during difficult times, whether that be flooding, power outages or storms. This doesn't mean doing the job of the emergency services. It's about making sensible preparations so that all the skills, knowledge and commitment in your community can make as much difference as possible when needed.

Frank Campbell, Parking & Civil Contingencies Officer, PKC, attended a KCC meeting wishing to highlight community resilience.

Mr Campbell advised that PKC were working with social care partners and the emergen-

cy services in respect of community resilience and he was looking for the CC's opinions and thoughts on the possibility of setting up a community resilience group in the area.

The CC are now considering options for a storage point for supplies e.g. sandbags, bottled water, blankets etc. Funding is and could be made available. ## ALL CHANGE AT COUNTY FABRICS

COUNTY FABRICS HAVE LAUNCHED plans for a new store and associated small business units. They held a consultation coffee morning back in May as part of a three-day-event which celebrated 40 years of the business, all of which has been based in Crook of Devon, and about 30 of these years spent in the mill.

Owner Katie told us, 'We love being here but the lack of warehousing and delivery issues on a road that leads to the school makes our operations very difficult. The new traffic lights, that I think are brilliant as a road and pedestrian user, have exacerbated these issues for us.

'I have looked for alternatives within Kinross-shire and we have just not found anywhere that would allow us the combination of retail and warehousing space that we need. Therefore, I am looking at building a beautiful new shop.'

'I have also incorporated three other businesses because I believe there is a shortage of small business units for rural enterprise and that this inhibits our rural economy. These units are also required to make the development financially viable given the infrastructure costs.

'The design is in a very concept stage, but my idea is that it looks like a collection of attractive farm buildings. I would have loved to replicate the repair shop but the vaulted thatch roof was just a tad too expensive!

'I'm a huge believer in bricks and mortar retail and the contribution it makes to a vibrant rural community. Non-essential retail is now an experience-based business. To continue to thrive and grow we now need to move with the times to a building that is fit for purpose.

'The little veg shop is a sentimental



idea of mine. I am old enough to remember when there was a fruit and veg shop across the road at the Poplars. I know from personal experience how hard it is to sell fresh produce at a profit when selling via wholesalers so I wanted to have a facility where local producers could sell their stock direct to the consumer. It could also provide a space for kids to learn about growing and cooking their own food. They could then visit CF for a workshop on how to sew and make basic repairs. My teenagers think I am crazy but I think these skills are vital, given current cost of living and environmental issues.'

As with many developments, there are concerns from local residents about the potential impact on the environment and landscape. One objector has described the new development as 'a new 5 building industrial park complete with a car park for 30+ cars, all on prime green belt land

off the A977'. Concerns were raised about building on green belt land in a biodiversity champion village, There is also concern about increased traffic on the already busy A977.

Others claim that the PKC local development plan identifies brown belt land suitable for redevelopment. A resident told us, 'In Crook of Devon/Drum and Kinross itself there are multiple industrial development sites being opened up which seem far more suitable sites than building on green belt land.'

Katie said, 'When we held our consultation coffee morning about 30 people attended and the vast majority were positive although clearly there were a few people who had concerns. We have taken on board many of the points raised and are reworking the plans to take account of various suggestions. We aim to submit a planning application in June.'

# CALEDONIA PLAY DEVISES A.S.N. SWING

A MILNATHORT-BASED outdoor play equipment manufacturer has launched a new swing specifically designed for children and adults with additional support needs.

The Super Swing is specifically created with special educational needs and disabilities in mind.

'Inspiration for the swing came from conversations we'd had with parents,' explained Caledonia Play's MD Jamie Bruce Jones. 'Many relied heavily on a swing because the

vestibular activity is calming and therapeutic.'

A world-record attempt provided the ideal scenario for a test run. Jamie said, 'We had an unusual request to build a swing that could endure a man repeatedly swinging on it over an extended period. We created a particularly tough bit of kit that would do the job.'

The job was the attempt by Kinross man Richard Scott's attempt to register the longest time (36 hours and 32 minutes) ever on a swing, as

recorded in the Guinness World Records 2024.

Richard proved the swing would withstand constant use over a prolonged period. The Super Swing shares its DNA with a world-record breaker!

Jamie said, 'We want it to be a permanent fixture in people's gardens, despite repetitive and spirited use."

The new swing can be classed as zero-rated for those with a recognised disability or illness, making it exempt from VAT.




#### **SALLY HUGHES**

#### HELEN MCDADE

#### Reform UK

I HAVE BEEN lucky enough to live in beautiful rural Perthshire for 20 years, working locally for most of that time. I grew up in the far north of Scotland and, apart from a year working in Kent, I have



lived in different parts of Scotland which has given me an understanding of the similarities and differences throughout the country. I qualified as a veterinary surgeon and worked as one for a number of years. Once I had children, I helped in a family business and then campaigned on ME at the Scottish Parliament. This led me on to work in charity organisations in communications and public affairs. I campaigned on environmental matters, latterly campaigning to protect our wild peatlands from industrial energy projects. I have been retired since 2019 and continue to campaign on key issues, including the need for a secure energy supply and the dangers of the Net Zero targets and the economic and social damage from the lockdowns. I was a member of the SDP in the 1980s standing as a General Election candidate in 1987. I was an Independent candidate for the Scottish Parliament in Mid-Scotland and Fife, campaigning to 'Save Local Hospitals'.

I have not been a member of a political party since the 1990's until joining Reform. I am dismayed by the decline in people's quality of life over the last two decades. Reform has a comprehensive costed contract, outlining how we would resolve key issues such as the failing economy, cost of living, particularly the costs of food and energy, health and social services and education. These have all declined due to policies which are often agreed by all the main political parties. There is no significant opposition. All the main parties support Net Zero policies which would stop exploration for North Sea oil and gas - costing Scotland over 100,000 jobs. Labour, Conservative and SNP would continue massive subsidies to multi-national renewable companies - to build huge wind and solar power developments, including the ones threatening the very special landscapes around Kinross-shire. These policies have led to massive job losses in the North Sea and in steel and manufacturing industries. Reform would revoke Net Zero policies and invest in energy which comes from within our borders.

Our farmers have been badly let down. Political parties have ignored the importance of having food produced in Scotland. Reform would put £3bn into farming subsidies in the UK. Family sized farms are hugely important in rural areas. Reform would reduce red tape on farms of under 500 hectares, allowing them to be managed by those who know best. Our children have been badly affected by loss of schooling in lockdowns and are now confused by being taught that there are multiple genders. Reform would ban critical race theory and gender ideology in primary schools, allowing teachers to restore Scotland's excellent education system.

Reform's policy on immigration would still allow NHS and social care workers to come into Scotland and indeed would give tax breaks to those who chose to work within the NHS for some years. However, it would tackle the immigration crisis. It seems obvious that if a net increase of 1.4million people have come into the UK in the last two years then that will have contributed to the huge increase in housing costs, pressure on health and other services and adversely affected job opportunities. This has an effect in Scotland as we then get less of the financial 'cake', through the Barnet Formula.

If you want to see Scotland reformed, vote Reform UK.

I WELCOME THE opportunity to introduce myself as the Liberal Democrat Parliamentary Candidate for Perth and Kinross-shire. As a resident of Scotlandwell, I am proud to be standing in



the constituency where I live. I recently took early retirement, after thirty years of teaching, to become a carer for our learning-disabled son, Archie. I balance my caring role with volunteering with various community groups in the local area and also fundraising for cancer charities.

There are an estimated 2.4 million of us unpaid carers in the UK. Many of you will be a carer or be cared for by an unpaid family member at some time in your lives. You may have seen the interview with our leader, Sir Ed Davey, talking firstly about being a young carer for his dying mother, and now for his disabled son, John. As a Liberal Democrat, I am passionate about caring for carers.

Indeed, it was my colleague, Wendy Chamberlain, of North East Fife that led the Carers' Leave Act through Parliament. This entitles carers to a week's unpaid leave. We have opened the door to give legal protection to those who are trying to balance the cost-of-living crisis with working and caring. Yet, we know there is so much more to do. If elected, I would be working hard alongside Wendy to continue to advocate for carers.

But it's not only carers that we care about. The Liberal Democrats' priorities at any election are health, education and the economy.

Everyone has a right to good healthcare. It can take weeks to see a doctor and there has been no investment in NHS dentistry leading people to resort to DIY treatments! Kinross is a dental desert. As an unpaid carer I have an hour's round trip to a dentist in Perth and have to pay privately.

As a teacher, I know that education is a devolved matter, but it is still a top priority. Scotland used to have one of the best education systems in the world. Alarmingly, we have tumbled down the international education rankings. It's time to give Scottish teachers the support and resources needed to make it the best again. I would hold the Scottish government to account for the promise of 3,500 more teachers and classroom assistants.

I am also extremely concerned that families are having to constantly fight to get what they deserve for their children with additional support needs. They are exhausted with paperwork and appeals, not to mention daily care for their special ones. I know-because we've been through it too. Due to funding cuts specialist support staff are losing jobs and yet there are still limited places in special schools.

We need to repair the broken trade deals with Europe. My husband manages a small manufacturing business, employing local people, and exporting to European customers. Too often his attempts to develop the business have been thwarted by extra paperwork and issues with sending prototypes through Customs post-Brexit.

As a retired French teacher, I am looking forward to taking part in the 50th Anniversary celebrations of Kinross' twinning with Gacé in Normandy. It's a shame that people can no longer travel to and work easily in Europe. Liberal Democrats DO want to return to the heart of Europe, and eventually the single market but we want to take the rest of the UK with us.

If elected as your MP, I would be a Champion for Carers, and a strong advocate for parents, teachers and families as well as joining the vanguard to get us back into Europe.

# SARAH RANKIN COOKS

ITS BARBECUE SEASON and, whether you're grilling sausages under an umbrella while everyone else sits indoors or slow smoking and roasting a leg of lamb while an adoring legion of hungry guests mill around on your beautifully manicured lawn, this is the time for cooking outdoors.

I always opt for sides duty. The thought of being chained to the barbie for a whole afternoon does not appeal. How on earth would I put away two bottles of prosecco with tongs and a meat thermometer in my hands?

So if asked what job you'd like; plump for



salads, these are easy to do, look fabulous and will give people plenty to pile on their plates even when the protein is running low. They also double up as a rare sight at a barbecue – something for the non-meat eaters that isn't grated cheese. Not only adding a bit of colour and texture, they can be as imaginative and flavour-packed as you like. And secretly padding out the protein offering with bright and crunchy veg is affordable as well as healthier for your guests.

These are a few summer salad options that work beautifully with grilled meats or fish and are ready as quick as a flash – leaving you minimal time without a drink in your hand...

## **BBQ SALADS**

## CABBAGE, BEETROOT & APPLE SLAW WITH WALNUTS

A GREAT SLAW is a must for outdoor dining, there is something absolutely delicious about the crunchy, freshness of a cool salad that pairs so well with a hot, juicy steak.

This one is quick and simple, which is as you know my mantra for all things in life. Shred half a red cabbage and add to a large bowl. Grate in a large, unpeeled bramley apple and a small, raw beetroot. Mix 1 part lemon juice with 3 parts extra virgin olive oil and add 1 tsp wholegrain mustard and some lemon zest. Toast 2 handfuls of walnuts until they just start to go golden and add to

the dressing. Pour over the slaw and mix well.

THERE IS SOMETHING really special about this bitter leaf that I just love. It works cooked or raw with so many dishes, and is wonderful baked. In this instance though, we are just peeling off the leaves, add a few sliced preserved lemons and tossing the lot with a dressing made with lemon juice, extra virgin olive oil and some elderflower cordial. So simple and tasty and a perfect foil to oily fish like mackerel

Simply toss them with oil, crushed garlic and some lemon zest and cook at 200°c fan for 30 minutes. Serve with...

#### ROASTED RADISH

A HERBY MAYO mixed with mint, parsley and more lemon zest. Don't waste the tops either which can be wilted and served like spinach. Do make sure to cook the tops, they have a rather unpleasant furry texture when raw which disappears once they've been wilted in boiling water with some crushed garlic.

## GRIDDLED COURGETTES WITH LIME RICOTTA

I VERY OFTEN make these as a main for any non-meat eaters, but they will work very well as a plated side too. For serving as a main; split a mix of yellow and green courgettes in half lengthwise and scoop out some of the central seeds. Take a tub of ricotta and add the zest of a lemon and good twist of black pepper. Stuff the centres of the courgettes generously with the ricotta mix and wrap loosely in foil. Bake in the cooler part of the barbecue for around 20 minutes or until beautifully tender. Drizzle with olive oil and season with sea salt to serve.

For a plated version, slice the courgettes into lengthwise slices and brush with olive oil and grill directly on the grill or on a very hot griddle pan. Turn when nicely coloured and finish cooking. Place on to a large plate and crumble the same ricotta mixture over the top before serving.

Enjoy the seven hours of sunshine we've got coming this month!







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# HAPPY 100TH, ALEX!

## WAR HERO ALEX FRASER REACHES HIS CENTURY

ALEX FRASER WAS BORN in Sandport, Kinross on 29 May 1924, the second youngest of six children: Marion (Mairne), David, Mary, Catherine (Kate), Alex and Richard (Dick). They were all born and brought up in Kinross and attended the local school for all their studies. Alex's parents died when he was quite young, and it was left to the family to bring them up.

Alex left school aged 14 to go into apprenticeship with local

carpenter, Bobby McGee and, when war broke out in 1939, as this was a Reserved Occupation, he was not eligible to join the forces until he was 18, which he did, joining the RAF in 1942.

His first posting was to Donibristle in Fife, near Dalgety Bay for his basic training then, following on from this, Alex went to RAF St Athan in South Wales for Flight Engineering Training.

In 1944 Alex, found himself joining the first of the newly formed 'Night-time, Precision Heavy Bombing' squadrons, 630 Squadron at RAF East Kirkby in Lincolnshire, where at the age of 19, he shared a Lancaster bomber over Germany, to carry out Bomber Command's night raids over industrial Germany. In a time of high casualties and aircraft loss, Alex and his six fellow crew members made it virtually unscathed through their allotted 30 missions over Germany without losing either a crew member, nor their aircraft. However, due to the extremely heavy loss of flight crew and aircraft within 630 Squadron, there were insufficient crews left to complete the raids and so they were allocated a further six missions, again successfully.

Following the war, Alex married Jean Lafferty, from Dunfermline and had two sons who both tragically died at quite a young age. Alex did no regular flying for three years and instead went to RAF Lossiemouth, where he was based in the Maritime Reconnaissance

Unit developing his skills as a Flight Engineer on other aircraft including the Avro Shackleton. Following service there he was posted to Northern Ireland for 2-3 years to continue working on other new aircraft.

In the 1950s, Alex was transferred to RAF Lyneham in Wiltshire, home of the RAF Transport Command, where he began flying on more different aircraft, developing his skills further and,

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
when the fleet were transferred to RAF Brize Norton in the 1960s following withdrawal of the USAF, Alex went with them as part of 10 Squadron. Over the years he continued to progress and, as a result of this, found himself Flight Engineer on a Vickers VC10, where he was given status and security clearance to fly VIPs to and from their destinations.

He has great memories of the time he escorted Princess Diana and Prince (now King) Charles returning from their honeymoon and also several tours with Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher, until he retired as a Warrant Officer Master Engineer in 1984 with a King's Commendation For Valuable Service In The Air from HM King George VI and a further Queen's Commendation For Valuable Service In The Air, from HM Queen Elizabeth II.

Since his retirement, he has lived for many years in Sidmouth, Devon where he has been an active part of his local community and was always ready and willing to help out whenever anybody had any engine problems with their cars.

Following the death of his wife Jean, he always liked to return to Kinross around his birthday. This year was very special, as it was his 100th birthday and he celebrated this with all his family of nieces and nephews, with their partners, who joined him, David Fraser and Pauline Sharp-Stevenson from Kinross, Nancy Barron from Perth along with others from Yeovil, Stirling, Tillicoultry, Arbroath, Alloa and Auchinleck, on Saturday 8 June at the Green Hotel in Kinross.

The Green Hotel is a very special place to Alex as he used to go past the hotel four times each day going to and from school and it

brings back lovely memories of his childhood and growing up in Kinross.

He was also overjoyed to be joined on the day by Flight Lieutenant Iain Eagle, Deputy Officer Commanding, Leuchars, who congratulated Alex on his centenary and thanked him for his 42 years' service. Flt. Lt. Eagle then presented him with a print of a VC10 that Alex flew in with 10 Squadron RAF. Alex still has many happy memories of his time in the RAF and was very proud to share them and show Flt. Lt. Eagle some of his logbooks from over the years.

It was a fabulous day of celebration and memories with maybe a few tears too! Alex had brought a few items of old memorabilia for everyone to see and we really must thank The Green Hotel and particularly the staff for the first class service and excellent meal they supplied us with and for going the extra mile to ensure this was such a successful day and that Alex's 100th birthday celebration was such a success.

# KIM GOES TO THE PALACE

**ON 17 MAY I HAD** the honour of being invited to attend the Royal Garden Party by the Not Forgotten Association at Buckingham Palace, along with my guest and neighbour Morag MacLeod and another ex-WRNS colleague Shelagh Fraser.

Garden parties have been held since the 1860s at the palace as a way for the monarch to recognize community members for their

public service.

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It was during Victoria's long reign that the first Garden Parties were hosted in the Buckingham Palace garden.

The very first event took place on 22 June 1868 with Queen Victoria describing the event in her journal: 'The afternoon splendid, & not too hot'...

quantities of people on the lawn whom I had to recognise as I went along...it was very puzzling and bewildering'.

#### The Not Forgotten Association

In 1919 American soprano Marta Cunningham visited a Ministry of Pensions hospital, having heard that there were 'perhaps a handful' of soldiers wounded in WWI still residing there. She called on the Matron and asked if she had a few lonely patients who would like to come out for tea. The Matron looked surprised and replied that there were in fact 600 injured patients

lying in the hospital, with many more across the country. Marta was horrified by what she saw:

'Could these wasted, listless men be the once adored youngsters, who, but a few years, nay months ago, went so dashingly, with a swing and a song to the Nation's rescue? Alas and this was their reward, suffering, silence and loneliness.' An avid charity worker during the Great War, Marta soon set about contacting her friends to organise tea parties, concerts and outings for those able to attend.

During one of these early





invitations one injured soldier said: 'We don't want no charity Miss, we are forgotten by everybody and we'd better stop so.' But, undeterred, on 12 August 1920, Marta formed the 'NOT FORGOTTEN' Association for the 'comfort, cheer and entertainment' of the war wounded and within a year some 10,000 men had been entertained.











Despite records being lost it is estimated that around 1 million men and women have benefitted from 'not forgotten' activities since 1920.

Unfortunately I was poorly at the time but the great GPs at Loch Leven Health Centre managed to get me well enough to travel down with a course of antibiotics. We arrived in London late on Thursday evening at the Union Jack Hotel. We had a quick bite to eat, then an early night, to be up early for the big day on Friday. Much of the activity at a Garden Party takes place on the 5-acre camomile lawn between the garden front of the palace and the lake with tea tents set up on the lawn. The weather held for us, not a bit of rain fell – the sun shone!

We set off in some special taxis that had been laid on for us to get us to the palace on time and in comfort. We shared the taxi with a wonderful woman from the RAF called Rosemary and her escort Tom, who was a real gem, getting us to the correct access points and letting us know what we needed to say and do. We managed to get into place well before the crowds arrived, as we were on a special guest list to be presented to the Not Forgotten Patron, HRH Princess Anne The Princess Royal and Vice Admiral Sir Tim Lawrence.

The royal party appeared on the terrace and we stood and sang the National Anthem. The salute was received by HRH the Princess Royal accompanied by Admiral of The Fleet Sir Benjamin Bathurst.

There were many celebrity guests to keep us entertained. As ever the Chelsea Pensioners were in attendance. We had access to all the gardens right along to the lake which was an oasis of calm away from the buzz of the party itself — it was beautiful. The Band of the Irish Guards played by kind permission of Major General James Bowder OBE, General Officer Commanding London District and Major General commanding (The Household Division and will perform under direction of Captain Peter Brydon).

We met a distant cousin of mine Andrew (Vern) Stokes Garrison Sergeant Major of London. He is the Organiser of State Ceremonial events that are the epitome of Britishness; a gentle man who is modest, exacting, understated, but always impressive.

He had the extraordinary task of overseeing ceremonies of a scale and significance not witnessed for 70 years. After a busy summer marking the Platinum Jubilee, the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in September 2022, prompted the planning and delivery of a State Funeral and the Coronation of King Charles III.

We were invited to the celebration dinner after The Garden Party for Anne McGinley's 25 year of service celebration and to celebrate the work of the Not Forgotten and raise some funds. All in all it was a wonderful few days.

# **EIGHTY YEARS ON**

## A party from the King's Own Scottish Borderers went to Normandy to pay tribute to their fallen comrades and were welcomed with open arms



**JUNE 2024 MARKED THE** 80th anniversary of the D Day landings and the beginning of the Normandy campaign, in which 1 KSOB and 6 KOSB fought, both taking heavy casualties, especially in the break-out battles around Caen.

A KOSB party of 35, led by the author, recently conducted a five-day Battlefield Tour to mark the 80th anniversary of the KOSB actions during the Battle for Normandy. 1 KOSB landed on Queen/Red beach (part of SWORD) on D-Day itself, taking low casualties that day. 6 KOSB landed later, unopposed, on D+9.

However, 225 KOSBs from both battalions were later killed in action in the Normandy Campaign, most of them in the breakout battles around Caen in Operations Epsom (The Scottish Corridor – the famous 15th Scottish Division), Goodwood and Bluecoat.

The tour focused on 1 and 6 KOSB's actions in Normandy, France, covering the pre-battle history and preparation of the battalions, the beach landings, the fighting in and around Caen, and the subsequent break out battles in Normandy. The tour placed 1 and 6 KOSB's actions within the wider context of the Battle for Normandy, and some generic sites (non KOSB specific) were also visited, including Pegasus Bridge and the sensational British Normandy Memorial at Vers sur Mer, overlooking Gold beach.

There are numerous, immaculate CWGC cemeteries, and we vis-

ited four of those where Borderers lie, and told some of their stories. The tour concluded with an Act of Remembrance, taken by our own Padre at the very beautiful, quite small, and least visited of all – St Charles De Percy, CWGC Cemetery, SW of Caen.

The party were very kindly given lunch at Chateau Belval, where a terrible battle took place on the River Odon area, and the Regiment lost 160 casualties. They then marched into a tiny village, Estry, which we liberated, with a full French reception, and a 'Vin D'Honneur' party. Even now, the French do not forget what we did for them.



Very special for us, our evergreen 98-year-old, Douglas Baldwin of 6 KOSB, joined us for parts of the tour – an amazing gentleman. The Mayor met our bus with tears streaming down his face. It was a very humbling and emotional tour.



## Decarbonising Council Refuse Vehicles

AT A MEETING of the Climate Change and Sustainability Committee in February, Elected Members agreed to trial the use of HVO fuel (Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil) as



After some initial work on the fuel storage tanks at the Friarton depot in Perth to accommodate the new fuel, the trial period commenced at the beginning of May and will finish on Sunday, 4 August. If the trial proves to be successful, the council will consider extending the use of HVO fuel throughout all the refuse vehicles and more widely throughout the council's councils fleet of larger vehicles.

This trial is an exciting step forward for the Council, making changes that will have an immediate impact to reduce carbon emissions from our fleet. This is the first step we are taking to decarbonize our fleet, but it is a significant step and I'm confident that at the end of the trial, we will see the results we are looking for and lay the foundations for further carbon reduction measures going forward.

The hope is that through this trial we can gain experience in the use of HVO as we seek to embrace measures to move away from traditional fuels, including rolling out the use of HVO fuel to our larger vehicles over 3.5 tonnes. This will provide a considerable step forward in reducing the Council's carbon footprint generated by its larger fleet vehicles, without the need for significant capital investment, to introduce the use of Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil (HVO) as an alternative to diesel. Changing the type of fuel we use will allow us to reduce CO2 emissions from our HGV fleet by up to 90%.

It is estimated that the Council's fleet creates over 2,690 tonnes of CO2 each year. Replacing the Council's cars and vans with electric vehicles could also help reduce the Council's carbon footprint by 600 tonnes per year but will be more challenging as it will require a significant amount of investment in the vehicles and supporting infrastructure.

#### Westerloan, Milnathort

THE RECENT HOUSE fire in Westerloan which led to the closure of the road clearly showed the vulnerable position residents relying on Westerloan to access their houses are in. I and many others protested



when the planning application for the Pitdownies housing site was lodged as all the traffic from these new houses would need to use Westerloan as their access. This also applies to the Pacehill housing site. I said that the requirement of a road linking the Pitdownies estate to Stirling Road should be a planning condition to both relieve traffic pressures in the village centre and allow an alternative access route if Westerloan was closed for any reason. I was told my request was an unreasonable ask of the Pitdownies developer. Now we can all see the problems local people have encountered with the closure of Westerloan. I am of the strong opinion that we can't allow developers to build more and more houses without insisting they provide the necessary infrastructure to accommodate them – in this case the greatly increased traffic volumes now totally dependent on Westerloan.

#### **Verge Cutting**

I AM ALREADY getting complaints from drivers trying to exit onto roads like the A91, the A977, the B9097 and the B996 that their sight lines are being blocked by tall grass and vegetation. One of the outcomes of this year's budget cuts is that the verges on road entrances are only being cut once a year rather than twice. The Council have been trying to delay the cutting until the middle of the summer to get maximum effect.

#### **Road Drains**

THE COUNCIL USED to have a drain cleaning rota where all road drains were cleaned out as part of an rolling programme. Through budget cuts this has disappeared and now drains are only cleaned out when the Council are told they are blocked or nor operating as they should.

I think there is a strong case for a drain-cleaning rota to be reintroduced. We should concentrate on road drains in known flood problem locations — this is still done but only in a small number of areas. There are surface water drainage problems I know about in Glenfarg, Milnathort, Kinross, Keltybridge and Portmoak. I will try and find out what it would cost to get at-risk streets covered and have them included in next year's Council budget. To send out the gully-emptying vehicle to clear blocked drains here, there and everywhere when reported must be both costly and inefficient.

#### **Occupational Therapy**

THE OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY service at PRI has been struggling to cope with a surge in demand due to increased throughput and increasing complexity of people being admitted. This has been exacerbated by a number of vacancies within the service. Some of these vacant posts are out for recruitment, and some are being held to support staff being redeployed.

This is having a serious effect on patients trying to access the service, even those who have been identified as a priority. There is also a lack of Adult Social Work & Social Care OT capacity for assessment for aids and adaptations. This has impacted on waiting times (currently over 400 people) and the service not being able to meet response times for non urgent cases. I know of cases where people, although classed as being a priority, have been waiting for nearly six months to get assessed for adaptations to their homes.

#### 202-Bus Service

THE 202-BUS service between Kinross and Tillycoultry has been very disappointing following its allocation to a new service provider. The buses on the route have regularly broken down, been replaced by



inappropriate vehicles, missed bus stops, been late or never turned up. I have been working with the Glenfarg Community Transport Group, to facilitate the fantastic work, they are doing, and they have agreed to take on the 202-bus service. To do this, they have been liaising with Fossoway Community Council who are getting volunteer drivers trained, so that they can help with the service. From what I have heard, the volunteer drivers love what they do, and they go out of their way to help passengers, taking and collecting them from Sainsburys and even dropping people at their homes. So, if you have a driving licence and fancy driving a small bus for a while, why not volunteer.

#### **Community Minibus Policy**

HISTORICALLY, PERTH AND Kinross Council have disposed of Community minibuses by auction once they have reached a pre-determined age. This policy was changed at a recent committee meeting which I took part in. The council have now decided that they will not sell the vehicles at auction but will donate them to Community Groups. I think this is a fantastic step forward and said so at the meeting.

When Glenfarg Community Transport started, they basically used a community minibus to take residents who were housebound to a coffee morning held every Thursday morning in the village hall. This service grew and grew with field trips to supermarkets, IKEA, and other attractions, until they were ready to take on a school run and the 55-bus service.

I believe that this model can be rolled out to other communities across Perth and Kinross, however, the sticking point for me has always been the need for the community minibuses to be available when needed. If the Council can gift minibuses to the fledgling groups to allow them to have dedicated use of them, then who knows, perhaps other groups can take on their own bus services.

My role in this has been to work behind the scenes challenging officers to commit to allowing an untried and untested group to run a public bus service, helping to obtain funding for the service and to encourage and support the change of minibus policy. The two people who have driven the Glenfarg Community Transport Group forward and who made all this all this possible are two Glenfarg residents. The first of these is Drew Smart, who believes passionately in community transport and wants to move at a very rapid pace to implement change. The second is Douglas Fraser, who from what I have seen is the steadying hand ensuring that all the necessary paperwork, finances and logistics are in place. They are a couple of stars, so well done gents.

#### **Perth and Kinross Community Campuses**

IT WAS A decision of the Council Administration that there was need to find a way to use Council assets much better. This was particularly the case with the Campuses funded under a PFI contract. Loch Leven Community Campus for example is costing the Council £4,000,000 a year!

I am pleased that this has made good progress, and the Campuses are now overseen by a new Strategic Lead Officer with specific responsibility for Property and optimising use.

Kinross is the first to be assessed, partly because it is the only Campus that is the sole Council-owned building in our ward, barring Primary Schools. The Strategic Lead is gathering information on usage throughout the campus and on the booking system and processes. In the budget in March the Independent Groups proposed a small fund of £50,000 which might kick start exploring adaptations which might be needed to enable better usage. This was accepted at Council. This process is going some way to acknowledgement that this is an issue and steps to remedy imbalances are sought. Loch Leven Campus is now 14 years old.

#### **Broke Not Broken**

AT A MEETING I attended, it was pointed out that Broke not Broken were looking for somewhere to pack their parcels for those in

need. The group have been using accommodation which required them to pack up their work each evening and to start again in the morning. The strategic lead for property at the Council intervened at my request and I understand that a room has now been found at the Campus which will allow the group to set things up and to keep them running. The next phase is to try to find a space which they can use on a permanent basis.

#### **Additional Support Needs**

I HAVE BEEN inundated with requests for help from parents who are struggling with the Council's systems relating to additional support needs. As a result, I joined the Council's Learning and Families Committee and managed to wrangle a place on the Councils Learning and Families Executive Sub-committee. The experience has been eye-opening to say the least. Behind the scenes I am doing my best to implement changes. I will write more fully on this next month.

#### Flooding Event on 29 May

KINROSS-SHIRE WAS HIT with a flooding event on 29 May with rainfall believed to equate to 60-90mm of rain in an hour. The main areas badly affected were Bowton Road, Smith Street and Cleish. One property was reported as having internal flooding. Council officers are investigating and I have asked for all the drains in these areas to be cleaned as a priority.

#### **Burglary and Vandalism**

IT'S DISAPPOINTING TO have seen a number of rural crimes in the area. The graffiti at the Hatchbank Road bus stop and dog bin by mindless idiots is infuriating. Sadly I have noticed a spate



of graffiti on a number of road signs, not just here but also along the road toward Falkland, so it is quite possible it is chancers who are driving past who decide it's a good idea. Furthermore, there was a burglary at a house near Cleish a few weeks ago. This is particularly upsetting because house break-ins are thankfully rare, and rural crime tends to be targeting farm gear such as trailers and quad bikes. Whilst of course all crime is awful for the victims, it is particularly violating when people break in to your home. We thankfully have good local police officers in Kinross and so I do hope the perpetrators are brought to justice.

#### **Fire Scotland Consultation**

THE SCOTTISH FIRE & Rescue Service is undertaking a national consultation on the future of fire and rescue services. The consultation document, which is thankfully quite an easy read, highlights the change in the role of the fire service in recent decades, with a large fall in house fires, but an increase in other issues such as flooding. The consultation is seeking views on how best to reflect this change including (possibly) the location of fire stations and the job profile of fire crew. Whilst it is not yet making detailed proposals, it is important that those who value the Kinross Fire Station make their views known. A reminder of this was the recent fire in the centre of Milnathort. #### **Flooding In Kinross**

POIGNANTLY REFLECTING THE changing role of the fire service, PKC officers visited Kinross Community Council recently to discuss establishing a local resilience resource in the town, to deal with situations such as flooding and snow. Only the following day I was driving to Perth for a council meeting in glorious sunshine, only to return to flooding in Kinross which came about after a very short, but heavy rain period. A sad sign of our changing climate. A









number of people have been in touch about this and it seems from council reports that Kinross-shire saw the brunt of this downpour. I was also advised that despite the flooding, most of the drainage was working correctly but the sheer volume of water meant it took a while to clear. For example I noted flooding on the B9097 at Cleish Mill, something I don't recall having seen before.

#### Road Safety in the Muirs area

I AM STILL trying to get an update on the Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) which are meant to be going on the Muirs. Regarding double yellow lines at the corners of Broom Road I understand are in process, but timescales are still to be confirmed and I am trying to get some clarity on this. I have also been contacted about speeding on Acremoar Drive. This I believe will be subject to the 20 mph national roll-out, but I will discuss with the road safety team what else can be done to reduce speeding in this area, and advise the police who are responsible for enforcement. I would also the use this as an opportunity to again plug Kinross-shire Speedwatch (https://www.facebook.com/KSspeedwatch).

# Liz Smith, MSP

JUNE HAS BEEN an unprecedented month for mountaineering. Whilst snow occasionally falls on the mountain tops in June, it is most unusual for this to happen on several consecutive days. The records of last 30 years show this to be the case



so it is little wonder the mountain safety groups are warning of the dangers.

I can only recall one occasion in my lifetime of climbs on what was a wild snowy day on top of the vast summit plateau of the isolated Ben Alder in June 1986. It is a reminder to us all that while winter mountaineering is an advanced skill in itself. Even climbing mountains in the summer requires basic knowledge and understanding of navigation, gear, and what to do when things do not go to plan.

We must always ask ourselves — would we still have the knowledge and confidence to safely descend a mountain if the fog came in and visibility lowered considerably. Indeed, what we have seen this June are days with whiteout conditions. This is when snow, wind and fog combine to create an environment where everything around you becomes completely indistinguishable and is testing for even the most advanced mountaineers. It is not unheard of for these situations to be considered so dangerous that mountain rescue teams will postpone their rescue operations for casualties out of safety for its own volunteers.

Outside of winter conditions, Scottish Mountain Rescue and Police Scotland put out a rare statement warning against the terms 'easy' or 'beginner' Munros that we are now continually seeing online. Tayside Mountain Rescue reported a 500% increase in rescues from Ben Chonzie alone which they attribute to these terms being used frequently on social media platforms such as YouTube and Instagram. These statements are misleading because a Munro is only as easy as the experience of the walker and the conditions one finds themselves in. Many so-called 'safe' mountains such as Ben Chonzie may appear flat and grassy in clear conditions, but with little visibility these mountains become featureless, vast plateaus which expose walkers to the full impact of the elements and with scarce cover; sometimes the 'easiest' Munros can become the most disorienting of all.

Scottish Mountain Rescue recently published its annual statistics report for 2023 which showed volunteers of the service clocked up 32,762 hours over the course of last year, responding to 572 independent incidents and assisting 677 individuals, with callouts occurring on 278 days of the year. These figures match the trend of ever-increasing total callouts each year and it is putting the time and budgets of mountain rescue at breaking point. It is therefore crucial that we all do our bit in increasing awareness of the dangers

associated with the Scottish mountains and the skills required in summer, winter, and, of course, even those rare occasions like now when we get winter conditions in summer.

Please take the greatest care when you venture into the mountains.

The children loved trying on the police uniform, speaking with officers and getting to have a play in the van. A very enjoyable day in the sunshine, thanks for having us.

#### **Update: Fly-Tipping**

After a joint investigation involving officers from Blairgowrie, Police Scotland and members of the Safer Communities Team at PKC a 36 year old male has been reported to the Procurator Fiscal for a number of fly tipping incidents within the North Perthshire area.

The illegal dumping of waste is a blight on our communities and countryside, and we will investigate all reports of fly-tipping. Fly-tippers face fines of between £500 and £40,000 and can even end up with a criminal conviction. #### **Fatal Collisions**

Since 2021 there have been 25 fatal collisions within Perth and Kinross LPA, approximately 1/3 of these have occurred on the A9, as such dedicated patrols are allocated to the A9 nationally on a daily basis. The majority of fatal and serious collisions occur on fast roads (national speed limit), as such Road Policing Officers are tasked with patrolling these roads, all of which link our local communities.


Road Policing officers also patrol within the communities of P&K giving particular attention to areas such as schools. Whilst patrolling the fast roads, officers focus on education and enforcement based on the Fatal 5 offences: Speeding, Careless/Dangerous Driving, Using a Mobile Phone, Not Wearing A Seat Belt and Drink/Drug Driving.

## WHAT TO DO WHEN BITTEN



- Never use oil, a match, vaseline, or any other unsuitable products. This will irritate the tick and cause it to regurgitate bacteria into the wound.
- ✓ Ideally, use a tick remover tool. These are designed to avoid squashing the tick's body.
- Alternatively, use fine-nosed tweezers. Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull gently and firmly upwards. Do not twist or jerk.
- After removal, wash the skin and hands thoroughly with soap and water.
- Check your whole body for any other ticks. Monitor symptoms, which could be delayed.
- If you have any difficulty removing the tick, contact your pharmacist or GP surgery for advice. If out of hours contact 111.



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# THE CAMINO

#### **WINNING WAYS**

**FOR ALMOST 14 YEARS**, we have been heading off for a week at a time to trek along a section of the Camino De Santiago de Compostela. We can never agree why we started it. A book we read, someone we chatted to, a story we heard or a TV programme? What ever it was, myself, my husband and his sister decided that we would have a go.

If you have never heard of The Camino, in a few words, it is an ancient pilgrimage journey crossing from Le Puy en Velay, through France, across the Pyrenees and on through Spain to Santiago. It is 1600kms long.

We like to walk, and quite honestly we started out on it as a jaunt, and the last 100km is not too testing. We had absolutely no idea what an impact this 'walk' was going to have on our lives. It would take much more than this article to explain all of that to you, but suffice to say that it changed all of us, bound us in friendship and love, and enabled us to meet some of the most extraordinary 'ordinary' people and our own life challenges.

The book that we always recommend is written by Richard Frazer, a Church of Scotland Minister from Edinburgh. In *Travels with a Stick* Frazer tells us that 'you think you are doing The Camino, but the truth is The Camino does you'. This was true on our first trip, and has remained true on every trip. We have always done it in week-long sections, but others do the whole thing, taking about six weeks out of their lives. Whatever way it is done, it will have a profound effect.

There was just one small section that we had left out, the hardest section, starting at St Jean Pied de Port and ending at Pamplona. Only my sister in law and I wanted to do the walking - my husband became the tour planner. For some mad reason, we decided to squeeze five days into three, and set ourselves a very daunting task. Day One: 27km of up, up and up hill to Roncesvalles. We chose the steeper and harder Napoleon route in hope of fabulous views at the top. But we only met wind, rain and thick clouds. Was it disappointing? Not really, because everyone had the same experience, and we laughed a lot and looked like hump backed crows for much of the day, with ponchos covering our day sacks. Day Two: 30km of more up, and quite a lot of brutal down. We were grateful for the lack of rain, as slip sliding down those paths would not have been funny. We arrived in Akaretta (a tiny village with one gorgeous house, which we stayed in.) We were exhausted, but exhilarated, because the hardest part was behind us and a bottle of red was included with our meal.

Day Three was a reasonable 15 kilometres and the sun shone most of the day. We were supposed to virtually float into Pamplona, if we took the scenic route. But, we met an old man with a t-shirt saying KIWI on it. Shrewdly I guessed him to be from New Zealand, and he said we must climb a little hill with a



beautiful church, and an ancient bell. A Camino detour. That detour became our magical Camino moment. We encountered a gentle religious sister, who told us the story of the church, how thousands before us left their prayer requests the wall, how we could climb the spiral staircase, see




glorious panoramic views, and ring the wondrous bells. She told us that they never throw out the prayers, when the winter comes and the pilgrims are long gone, she and the other nuns scoop up the prayers, and pray silently for the peace and longings of the pilgrims. It was a very emotional, and special moment. We gave our cares over to them, and strode on down to Pamplona.

Our three testing days were over, and once again we bade farewell to another experience filled section of the Camino De Santiago de Compostela. Go if you can, but if you can't, know that every part of life is a Camino, that we are all on, which is what makes life an extraordinary adventure.

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

**Present** at the meeting held on 4 June were CCllrs S Bruce-Jones, T Lamb, and N Marchant, Assoc CCllr C Farquhar; Cllrs N Freshwater, R Watters and 13 MoP.

**Apologies**: CCllrs A Cheape, G Pye; Cllrs D Cuthbert and W Robertson.

**Declarations of Interest**: CClr Cheape has declared an interest regarding planning application *24/00744/FLL*; CCllr Bruce-Jones has declared an interest in the Seamab issue as the company for which she is a director is linked to some of the construction work.

#### **Community Police Report**

From 7 May 2024 (last meeting) there have been approximately 28 calls to the Police from the Fossoway area and no crimes recorded on Police systems. Over the last month roads policing officers have been carrying out speed checks on the M90 at Junctions 5 and 6 which has resulted in drivers being reported for speeding offences.

MoP raised concern regarding speeding on B9097 and noted that a Land Rover had recently gone through a hedge and landed in a field. CCllr Bruce-Jones responded that the road is on the priority list of works for PKC.

Some residents have raised a concern about the police driver training using the A977 and local roads and excessive speeding. MoP also asked if motorbikes could be monitored on A91 over weekends. CC will raise with PC Samson.

#### **Matters Arising**

#### Windfarms

#### ECU00004654 Brunt Hill Windfarm

The CC has confirmed that as a named consultee we can submit a response of greater than 8000 characters. The CC has sought and been granted an extension of 28 June deadline by the ECU to 26 July. We have also requested a similar extension from PKC for the 14 June deadline but have had no response. This will enable us to consult with the community on our intended response at a proposed EGM in Tuesday 9 July, Crook of Devon, 7.30-9pm. Note that the only agenda item will be our response to the windfarm application.

The CC is currently reviewing the 184 documents against an issues report that we have developed from the CC survey. Issues include: impact on landscape; cumulative impact; environmental impact; connection to the grid; flicker and noise; construction impact with a focus on Carnbo; archaeology and cultural impact; use of local materials in construction; operational impact on local airfields; walkers; recycling of materials at end of life. As part of our response to the ECU we can submit a list of residents who are in support of our response.

We are actively seeking more input from our community especially Carnbo in particular regarding compensation funds during the construction phase.

**Joint CCs Sustainability Group:** an article has been published in the *Kinross Newsletter* explaining how the group of CCs plan to work together specifically in relation to Community Benefit.

#### **Community Development Trust**

The Trust has now received the funding for the development of a Community Action Plan and Local Place Plan and is actively working with a consultant. A MoP has noted that we do not have maps of our local pathways, and this could form part of our CAP. Funding is being requested for benches and tables in Waulkmill Park. The Fossoway Primary School children are producing possible designs for an upgraded playground at Waulkimill. As part of this the children have made us aware of the fact that the current playground is not wheelchair accessible. The CC has written to PKC regarding this.

Scottish Land Fund Stage 1 application form for funding for the feasibility study for community purchase of Blairingone School has been submitted. PKC have already provided £5,000 towards this from the vacant property fund.

At the Kinross-shire Committee meeting in May PKC gave an update on the Blairingone School regarding valuations. PKC have given a strongly worded letter to the District Valuer stating that if the valuation was not received by 24 May a formal complaint would be made. The Trust has received a structural survey. The future of the school will remain on the CDT agenda until the Trust makes a final decision. CCIIr Carter asked if the Government funding for Perth city could be used for projects like this. ClIr Watters replied that the monies had to be used for Perth City.

# Road Safety in FDCC Area Including A977 Mitigation Measures

**Carnbo:** No update. MoP reported that they had the duck race last weekend and residents had to walk on the A91 due to verges being overgrown and no footpath.

**Drum Crossroads:** Residents' concerns have been submitted to PKC and we are awaiting a response.

#### Road Improvement Projects in Ward & Kinross-shire:

At the Kinross-shire Committee meeting on 16 May a verbal update was given by PKC Traffic and Network Services (which is split between two divisions: one dealing with road safety and the other with active travel.) A presentation was given by Brian Cargill who explained that due to a lack of human resources they have fallen behind in rolling out TROs on the priority list. The reasons are threefold: firstly the roll out of national 20mph strategy for Scotland which has to cover the whole of PKC and will result in 23 new 20mph limits by the end of 2025 just in Kinross-shire. This national campaign involves a consultative exercise for the council to assess where

the new 20mph limits need to be implemented. Secondly is the implementation of the National Pavement Parking Ban. The council are having to assess all roads in PKC to determine where the hotspots are for parking and whether or not they can safely allow on street parking. Lastly, they are concentrating on the mitigation measures required for the A93 & A94 following the construction of the new Tay River Crossing. They have consulted with A93 and A94 residents on mitigation methods to make the route unattractive for HGVs and this includes cushions. CCllr Buce-Jones questioned the ongoing mitigation measures for the A977 which are still not fully completed and their priority. CCllr Bruce-Jones has asked for a full report on traffic movements on A91 and A977 to assess if the mitigation is achieving what it was set out to do. At the next meeting of the Kinross-shire Committee in August Daryl Mckeown, head of road safety, will be giving a detailed presentation on progress. The three new issues will not replace current priorities, but they are resource constrained. Cllr Freshwater agreed to bring a briefing on the new 20mph Scotland policy to the August CC meeting.

## Fossoway Area Transport – 202 Bus Service & Community Bus

The 202 continues to be late and sometimes doesn't run. CCllr Carter noted that currently our district has no bus service on Sundays. There will be a public meeting (hybrid) of the Community Transport Group, chaired by Cllr Cuthbert, on 27 June at 7.30pm in Loch Leven Campus, where progress on the 202 bus service will be shared.

#### **Crook Moss Travellers Site**

Associate CCIIr Farquhar met with Tracey Ramsey from PKC in May to discuss and agree a way to improve engagement with the Crook Moss traveller's community. Associate CCIIr Farquhar reported that Tracey was very keen to improve relationships with the community and will be joining her in hosting an event on 19 June for the traveller community. CCIIr Cheape, Associate CCIIr Farquhar and Tracey intend to visit the site next week. Three main issues are that the fence needs to be repaired, rubbish needs to be collected and to stop burning of caravans.

#### **Seamab School Construction Work**

CCIIr Lamb and Marchant met with MoP and separately with Seamab School to discuss issues raised at our last meeting.

We were provided with assurances that the safety of the children during construction had been carefully considered. There has been a structural survey of the bridge and Network Rail is aware of the construction work. Mr Provan, Chief Executive, has fed back to the education staff to be vigilant about keeping children away from the side of the bridge that overlooks a resident's garden. The contractor has confirmed that there have been no issues to date with asbestos or lead piping and that there has been no breach of any sewage pipes. Algo have volunteered to have regular sessions with a neighbour group. There will also be a construction office and a mutually agreed time slot to keep neighbours up to date on issues that arise. Algo will also inform neighbours in advance of any heavy equipment coming to the site.

PC Samson has confirmed that the Police have been called to the school on eight occasions since May 2023. They were last called to the school on Friday 24 May although a MoP advised that there had been two more instances since then. The MoP understands that Police Scotland have instructed him that if children abscond, they should stop all machinery and secure everything for the safety of the children.

MoP has notified PKC enforcement that builders were working on Bank Holiday Monday which breached condition 13 of the approved planning application. PKC have raised an enforcement enquiry.

#### King's Portrait

We are still waiting for a response from Crook of Devon and Carnbo Village Halls.

#### **New Business:**

#### **PKC Draft Active Travel Masterplan for Kinross-shire**

The draft plan was presented to the Kinross-shire Committee on 16 May. There were comments that there was not enough emphasis on public transport and the west of Kinross-shire was not covered sufficiently. It was raised that there was a need for a high level strategic east-west and north-south corridor through Kinross-shire. Cllrs are providing feedback and hope to have a final plan in place shortly. It was noted that NPF4 Policy 13 requires an Active Travel Plan and that this should inform LDP3.

#### **Hydro Fund**

The new Fund is now live and applications can be made via www.foundationscotland.org.uk/apply-for-funding/funding-available/rumbling-bridge-hydro-community-fund

#### **Replacement Footbridge over River Devon**

The Fossoway Community Development Trust has now taken over the replacement bridge project and has an active working group looking at the possible purchase and use of an old Rennie Mackintosh bridge.

#### **Crook of Devon War Memorial**

Mike Barnacle, Chair of the Fossoway Community Development Trust has advised that PKC Bereavement services are going to carry out repairs and cleaning.

#### Japanese Knotweed

A MoP has informed the CC that there are several patches of Japanese knotweed growing along the banks of the Devon between Crook and Rumbling Bridge. Last year, they flagged the issue with SEPA, PKC and several others but got nowhere. They have asked if the CC can help raise it with the correct organisation. Cllr Watters will look into this and report back to the CC.

## Safety of Lithium Batteries Ion Batteries, E-bikes and Scooters

The CC had received an email from Ron Bailey, researcher for Lord Don Foster, who is seeking our support for his campaign to improve the safety of lithium batteries (used in e-bikes and e-scooters) and their disposal. Lithium battery fires are on the increase – there have been over 1000 in the past few years, nearly 200 injuries and a dozen fatalities. Homes have been destroyed. The cost to the UK runs into £billions. The Bill if passed would require:

- Third party independent testing of e-scooters and bikes before entering UK market
- Government to establish regulations for safe disposal of used lithium-ion batteries
- Agreed processes for the safe access, charging and storage of lithium-ion batteries.

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The CC agreed to provide an email supporting the draft bill.

#### Agree Dates For Next Year's CC Meeting

It was agreed that the CC will continue to hold meetings on the first Tuesday of every month rotating across the village halls. A schedule of dates and locations will be circulated to Halls and published on Fossoway website and the CC's Facebook page.

#### Consultations

The significant workload associated with the wind farm applications means that the CC will not be responding to any further consultations until September 2024.

#### PKC

PKC would like you to share your thoughts on the Consultation Draft Mobility Strategy and Action Plan to help finalise the work prior to adoption. PKC Officers will be attending the Kinross Farmers' market on 22 June to engage with residents. Draft Mobility Strategy — PKC Citizen Space — Citizen Space (pkc.gov.uk)

Consultation closes on 28 July 2024. CCllr Lamb will respond on behalf of the CC.

#### **Scottish Government**

Meeting our 30 by 30 biodiversity commitment on terrestrial and freshwater sites: seeks views on the legislative proposals to support the implementation of 30 by 30 (protect 30% of our land for nature by 2030.) The aim is to create flexibility around designated sites and increase proactive management of important areas for biodiversity. CCIIr Carter has responded.

#### CC Business - meetings attended

**CCIIr Bruce-Jones** – Kinross-shire Committee 16 May – noted that the Committee has funds and is seeking CC proposals on how this money could be spent for their August meeting.

**CCIIr Lamb:** 13 April with MoP regarding Seamab School, 20 April Seamab School, 13 May with Glenfarg CT and Muckhart **CC secretary;** 15 May online meeting with PKC and Glenfarg.

**CCIIr Marchant:** 13 April with MoP regarding Seamab School; 20 April Seamab School.

**Associate CCIIr Farquar:** 23 May with Tracey Ramsey to discuss engagement with Crook Moss traveller community.

23/02142/FLL Siting of two holiday accommodation units and associated works, Chapter House, Fossoway. The CC had previously objected, and no further comments are being made.

#### **Planning Applications**

24/00597/FLL Change of use of agricultural land to storage yard (Class 6), siting of storage building and containers, formation of vehicular access, erection of fencing and associated works at land 60 metres north west of Woodbine Cottage, Drum. The CC submitted a neutral comment.

23/01224/FLL Erection of 29 dwellinghouses and associated works (phase 1 – allocated site H53) at Land 80 Metres north west of Huize Baahock, Powmill. The CC was notified by PKC of revised drawings, but has not made any further comments. We were also made aware of a Powmill Residents group objection letter that was sent to PKC concerning the siting of the substation.

24/00744/FLL Erection of a dwellinghouse and associated works at land 250 metres south west of Broomhill House, Station Road, Crook of Devon. This is an update of planning application 23/01961/FLL which the CC objected to and was refused by PKC. The CC agreed to object to this new application on the same grounds.

24/00752/FLL Erection of a dwelling house and associated works at land 50 metres south of Craigton Farm, Rumbling Bridge. PKC approved an application for a temporary home on 5 December 2023 under application 23/01213/FLL. This is now an application for a permanent house on the land as the applicant states that the business is successful and sustainable. The CC will make a neutral comment – seeking the removal of the temporary accommodation, and a business case that clearly demonstrates the long term financial sustainability of the farm supporting the requirement for a permanent residence.

#### **Community Greenspace Team**

According to provisional figures from the Met Office, the UK had its warmest May on record, together with it being a wet spring for many of us. As a result, grass in many of our green spaces in Perth and Kinross has grown more vigorously than usual for this time of year. In addition, we are experiencing staffing pressures in our ground's maintenance team, which are also impacting on service delivery. Therefore, you may see long grass, excess growth or longer edges on green spaces, while we continue to work on the grass cutting schedule in an effort to ensure every community receives a similar level of service.

These issues are unrelated to the extension of our Grow Wild trials for grassland management and once the grounds maintenance team have caught up on grass cutting schedules, the regular cut areas and Grow Wild areas should be distinct from each other, enabling communities to see and comment on the Grow Wild areas accordingly.

Additionally, the information on the grassland management page of our website (www.pkc.gov.uk/wildlife) has been recently updated to incorporate more background detail about the previous successful trials, as well as a link to a more interactive map about the new Grow Wild trial areas — Grow Wild Sites 2024 (arcgis.com). In due course more information about Grow Wild will be added.

A resident contacted the CC, local PKC councillors, local police, and Davidsons Chemist to complain about a delivery van constantly parking on the pavement directly outside the chemist and causing a potential hazard to pedestrians. The police response highlighted points to consider which are: this vehicle will be delivering controlled substances. How long is it parking for? Is it impeding pedestrians preventing passage? Is it increasing the risk for pedestrians stepping into the road at the crossing? Is there suitable parking nearby?

It was also asked about who is responsible for enforcing the new restrictions on pavement parking. The police responded that enforcement is the responsibility of PKC.

#### Parking on H-bar on Church Street

A resident posted on social media a vehicle parking on the H-bar on Church Street, which was then shared with the local police for comment. The police responded with:

'A white line is advisory and non-enforceable. The default consideration would be inconsiderate parking and causing obstruction? Each incident would be assessed on its own. If it's a significant and ongoing issue, then I would signpost to PKC for yellow paint and prohibitions on parking. We will of course provide passing attention.'

Cllr Robertson responded that yellow lines were requested to PKC approximately two years ago and in his most recent follow discussion with PKC officers, the reason for not painting yellow lines was due to objections from local residents.

In light of the recent discussion on people parking on the H-bar at last month's CC meeting and this recent discussion, Cllr Robertson will request that PKC officers look into this issue again to determine whether local resident objections are still valid.

#### **Cycle Event Red Flags**

Residents will have noticed that there is a semi-regular Time Trial Cycle event through Milnathort on the Thursday evening, and most recently there was one on Sunday morning. A local resident commented on social media what the red flag that the marshals were waving indicated to drivers, were they to stop, slow down or to distract the driver from the cyclist.

One of the CC's observed a marshal standing on the roundabout outside the town hall as well as marshals with red flags standing on each junction off the roundabout. Although it was quiet it was also raining lightly, and the CC observed two cars manoeuvring around the roundabout with the marshal still in the middle of the roundabout. Although there were warning signs up about the event there was nothing to indicate who had organised the event and unlike other local events there was no notification to the CC or posts on either of the various local social media pages to inform residents in advance that the event was happening. After some digging the CC member was able to email the organiser of the event, but the response was lukewarm and did not indicate in any way that they felt the roundabout marshal was unsafe. The email has been forwarded to the local community police for comment.

#### Traffic

#### **U219 MILNATHORT**

Temporary traffic regulation effective from 16 July 2024 for a period of four days.

The order will temporarily prohibit all vehicles from driving, parking and loading (both sides) on the U219 Milnathort from its junction with the U227 (308006, 704662) to the junction with the private access to the property known as Ledlanet House (308244, 705544), a distance of 1.47 kilometres or thereby. From 20 July 2024 for a period of five days.

The order will temporarily prohibit all vehicles from driving, parking and loading (both sides) on the U219 Milnathort from its junction with the C413 (309851, 705924) to the junction with the private access to the property known as Nether Craigow (309077, 705786), a distance of 830 metres or thereby.

Pedestrian and emergency vehicular access to premises will be maintained.

#### **Wester Loan**

PKC as traffic authority being satisfied that there is a likelihood of danger to the public due to a dangerous building hereby prohibit all vehicular traffic on the following length of carriageway.

The order will prohibit all vehicular traffic on Wester Loan, Milnathort from its junction with Victoria Avenue (312076, 704892) to its junction with the A91 New Road (312055, 704710), for a distance of 188.40 metres or thereby.

Access for emergency vehicles will be maintained.

Alternative route for vehicles is via – VICTORIA AVENUE – A91 NEW ROAD – B996 PERTH ROAD – C420 – U228 – C499 – NORTH STREET

The fire at Wester Loan and the subsequent road closure, as detailed above, has highlighted the number and type of vehicles that use this road and specifically the number that are traveling up Victoria Avenue against the one-way restriction. A number of audience members highlighted that it is not just locals using this as a shortcut instead of the official diversion, but also delivery vans and construction vehicles. The CC would expect all residents to adhere to the official diversion and highway code to ensure road and pedestrian safety is observed and to ensure as little impact to the local residents while the diversion is in place.

It was also raised that the construction company tasked with making the building at Wester Loan safe have been asked daily whether they can reduce or even remove the barriers to allow traffic to pass and help ease the traffic situation.

The response from one of the PKC councillors present, was that when it is safe to move the fencing then, and only then, will it be moved back or removed completely and not before. The safety of residents, pedestrians and drivers is paramount, and the CC backs those that are making the decision, do so for the right reasons and do not put safety above convenience in their decision-making process.

#### **Core Paths Update**

Kevin of The Core Paths Group has been out the last two weekends, flailing and cutting back branches on the paths along the golf course, continuing up to the A911. We also flailed the paths going west towards Burleigh Castle and the field at Burleigh Castle itself.

Alistair MacLeod from PKC Community Greenspace and Kevin Heneghan waymarked Core Paths last month.

The infilling of the depressions on the Core Paths will take place over several evenings this month.

# Comments And Questions From The Floor VAS – Vehicle Activate Speed Sign

An audience member asked if there were any plans to add a VAS sign to the entrance to North Street, as numerous new signs have been erected in Milnathort. Cllr Robertson indicated that he believed there is one proposed for that location and will find out for certain from PKC officers if this is so and when it will be placed.

#### **Road Closure Announcements**

In today's road closure announcements, there were a number of references to unclassified roads — Uxxx, with very little information to actually determine where on the road is being referenced. The PKC councillors were asked whether there was anything that could be done to provide more information to these road closure announcements. Cllr Cuthbert responded that PKC officials are training new software related to determining the exact position for all road works and this might help with adding more detail to the descriptions and if we wait and see the outcome of using the software, no further action may be required.

#### **Councillors' Reports**

**Cllr Robertson:** From a meeting on the PKC scrutiny committee, a report on occupational therapies highlighted the long waiting list for occupational therapy assessments, with over 400 people on the waiting list. There is a nationwide shortage of occupational therapists, and short-term contracts being offered as there is no guarantee of funding from NHS Tayside.

Cllr Cuthbert added that they had previously asked Perth college to investigate running courses for any jobs that were short staffed in the PKC area that have been hard to fill, and the response was that they already do this.

Cllr David Cuthbert PKC typically sell off any minibuses after a certain number of years, but are looking to give these to local community groups that may need them as the resell price is small.

PKC are also looking to purchase a bus and lease it to Glenfarg Community Transport as this will be much more affordable for GCT and helps to enhance the already excellent service from GCT, who will be expanding their service to cover Tillicoultry in the near future.

The next meeting of the Kinross-shire Transport Committee will be 27 June, at 7.30pm in Loch Leven Campus.

#### **AOB**

Kevin will speak to the landowner about spraying the giant hogweed that is sprouting up along the Back Burn. The landowner has previously sprayed the giant hogweed and has indicated they would be more than happy to do so again due to the risk that these weeds pose.

The next meeting of Milnathort Community Council will be on Thursday 8 August 2024, 7.30pm at Milnathort Town Hall. There is no July meeting.

# Kinross Community Council News from the May Meeting

**Apologies** had been received from CCIIrs B West, E Leslie, K Spain and PC B Samson.

#### **Police Scotland Report**

There have been approximately 88 calls to Police from the Kinross area with 16 crimes being recorded on police systems within this period.

12/05/2024 Failure to provide a specimen of breath for analysis; threatening or abusive behaviour; possession of a knife; careless driving (Travelodge, Kinross Services) 1 x charged and reported to the Procurator Fiscal

14/05/2024 – 19/05/2024 Vandalism (MO – scratch a vehicle), (Green Hotel car park, Kinross) Subject to live investigation 19/05/2024 Vandalism (MO – Smash a glass window (Avenue Road, Kinross) 1 x charged and given a recorded Police warning 20/05/2024 Theft (MO – steal and use a bank card) (Day Centre, High Street, Kinross) Subject to live investigation

Community officers continue to make efforts to conduct speed checks across the area during patrols and on 9 May 2024, roads policing officers were on mobile patrol at the Muirs near to Sunnypark, Kinross where they observed a driver to be using their mobile phone whilst driving. The driver was subsequently stopped and charged accordingly.

On Thursday 2 May 2024, PC Samson and PS Craig attended Kinross High School to speak to a modern studies class who were learning about the work and role of the police.

#### **Community Resilience**

CCIIr McKay welcomed Frank Campbell, Parking & Civil Contingencies Officer, PKC, to the meeting advising he had asked to attend to highlight community resilience and discuss the possibility of setting up a local group.

Mr Campbell advised that PKC were working with social care partners and the emergency services in respect of community resilience and he was looking for the CC's opinions and thoughts on the possibility of setting up a community resilience group in the area to carry out welfare checks on the elderly/vulnerable, distribute sandbags during difficult times, whether that be flooding, power outages, storms.

Mr Campbell advised that SSEN were setting up resilience groups, which will be managed by PKC, to provide equipment (e.g., generators), battery packs, hi-viz vests, torches, urns etc for the community, with PKC providing funding for establishing and supporting the resilience groups in terms of training (first aid, water safety). In order to set up such a group, a plan had to be drawn up, specific to the local area, and help would be available to do this.

CCIIr Willisher asked whether Kinross was part of the Perth and Kinross plan and had a couple of initial questions: What could we do? Where would the equipment be stored? What about insurance?

Mr Campbell replied that Kinross would be in the generic Perth and Kinross plan, but each local area's plan would be an appendix to that plan. He did not see an issue with storage and would work with the group in regard to this. Insurance would be via the CC insurance, which is ultimately PKC's insurance.

CCIIr Wells asked if there were any other groups in Kinross, and Mr Campbell advised that Broke Not Broken may be an option, as they had been fantastic during the pandemic.

CCIIr Mckay commented that there had been feedback previously and liability and insurance were the main obstacles as people were worried that they would be personally responsible. She commented that if a group were to be set up, a lot of volunteers would be required, and she did not wish to add pressure to anyone.

Cllr W Robertson commented that it would be useful to hear what was proposed, and he believed there was a list of vulnerable people in the area; it would be helpful to get sight of this. In response Mr Campbell advised that there were a number of lists but unfortunately it was not possible to get access to them. Cllr Robertson suggested putting an advert in the next edition of the *Newsletter* to gauge interest in a community resilience group.

A member of the public suggested it would be beneficial for any group to plan for three specific scenarios and for boundaries/safeguarding. In response to a question from CCllr Freeman, Mr Campbell advised that funding was non-recurring so it was unlikely that PKC would take on the maintenance of equipment. He also confirmed that volunteers would be there to reassure worried residents, they would not be expected to go into burning buildings etc to rescue residents.

CCIIr Freeman asked about the timescale for using the available funding and was advised that there was no timescale – it would be available until it ran out.

CCIIr Mckay confirmed that the CC would be willing to look at options and asked if there was a group set up in another area which they could speak to. Mr Campbell suggested speaking to the Blair Atholl group, and agreed to pass contact details to the CC.

Cllr R Watters commented that there had been discussions about an asset register for resilience groups and asked where this was – Mr Campbell advised that Fire Scotland have the register and he was trying to get access to this.

It was agreed that an advert would be included in the next edition of the *Newsletter* with a date for a meeting. It was also agreed that a separate email address be created for this purpose.

On a separate topic, Cllr Robertson asked what could be done to stop people from parking on zigzags and Mr Campbell suggested changing these to double yellow lines.

CCIIr Mckay thanked Mr Campbell for coming along to the meeting and confirmed that the CC were happy to be a link to the proposed group. CIIr D Cuthbert confirmed that he was also happy to be involved.

# Matters Arising Gallowhill Road Access

CCIIr P Chan enquired about the access to Gallowhill Road and the possibility of reducing speed limits. CCIIr Robertson advised that there are proposals from Scottish Government to reduce speed limits to 20mph and PKC offices are currently reviewing all streets to see if they are suitable for this. An announcement is due at the end of the month. He thought that PKC would be considering Gallowhill Road as part of this, and he hoped that the new Speedwatch campaign would also help to reduce the number of cars speeding in the area.

Cllr Robertson advised that he had met with TRACKS recently to see if a number of roads in the town could be made more pedestrian/cycle friendly, and if so, Gallowhill Road could be made into a 'green route' which would reduce the speed to 40mph. A request to make Gallowhill Road a green route previously had been refused.

In response to a question from a member of the public with regard to the connection of VAS in Gallowhill Road, Cllr

Robertson advised that PKC were still waiting on the signs being connected to the electricity.

#### **Pavements**

CCIIr Mckay raised the issue of the state of the pavements in the town and the number of potholes etc. CIIr Cuthbert advised that a mechanically operated sweeper is scheduled to visit on a daily basis but due to staff shortages this had not happened. Appointments had now been made and hopefully we should start to see improvements soon.

#### **Kinross Town Centre**

CCIIr Mckay questioned the narrowing of the barriers and CIIr Cuthbert advised that replacement barriers had been ordered and PKC were to check whether these had been delivered to Tayside Contracts. CIIr Cuthbert agreed that the area needs widened but that would mean road safety teams being involved and their work had been diverted to 20mph work instead.

There are currently 105 jobs on the work list and these need to be prioritised. In response to a question with regard to the impact of the shared space with regard to pavement parking, Cllr Cuthbert did not know the answer to this.

CCIIr Wells commented that the issue may be helped by the removal of the parking restrictions at the bottom of the High Street.

CCIIr Mckay commented that Springfield Road was due to close in July for 3 – 4 weeks for works.

CCIIr Wells enquired about the additional spaces in Millbridge Hall car park and while there was no update, CIIr Cuthbert advised that the current spaces were slightly smaller than they should be and any redesign works may result in a reduction of the number of spaces.

Cllr Robertson raised a concern re a slight sightline issue with the two vans parked on Clashburn Road and was advised that as the vans were parked on private land, there was nothing the CC could do about this.

CCIIr Chan enquired about the repair of the wall at Greens and was advised by CCIIr Willisher that the wall would be repaired once the insurance money had been received, and a team had been put together to repair it.

#### **Reports from PKC Councillors**

Cllr N Freshwater advised that the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service had recently issued a consultation: Shaping Our Future Service: Your Say and he asked for the link to be included in the minutes (Shaping our Future Service: Your Say | Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (firescotland.gov.uk)).

It was suggested that the CC review the consultation and submit a response.

Cllr Cuthbert advised that there had been two objections to the South Kinross Flood Scheme and if the objections cannot be resolved satisfactorily, then they would go to a public hearing. It was not possible to find out what the reasons for the objections were.

Cllr Cuthbert also advised that there would be a public meeting of the Community Transport Forum on 28 June (7.30 pm, venue likely to be LLCC) with regard to public transport provided in the area. It was noted that the 202 service was not

reliable and discussions are ongoing with the hope of Glenfarg Transport taking over the route.

It was suggested that this may be evidence that the route was required and could be used to show bus operators this. CCllr Mckay also commented that the Ember service was excellent, with travellers having the opportunity book online, as well as track the services.

Cllr Cuthbert advised that the play park at Weaver's Gait was in a temporary position and once the 100th house had been built/occupied, the park would be moved to its permanent position.

Cllr Robertson advised that a resident had contacted him to ask if it would be possible to fund seats/benches along the Old Railway line and he confirmed that funding was available. CCllr Mckay advised that this was spoken about when the land/park was being renovated and she was happy to submit an application. There was also a suggestion for seats/benches on The Muirs/road to the Health Centre and near the fire station. Cllr Robertson also advised he had been reviewing the PKC LDP and suggested that a new community hospital be proposed as people often need palliative/recuperative care and often have to travel outwith the area which causes additional pressures/stresses on family. It was agreed that this should be looked into

Cllr Watters advised that he had been contacted with regard to issues with paths in Lathro Meadows (Latch Dubh Lane) and that there were no paths on the Persimmon Homes plans. He advised that a PKC Enforcement Officer had pre-empted issues and had been chatting with Persimmon Homes who had already agreed to do this.

Cllr Watters also advised that a new bridge had been placed near Persimmon Homes and in response to a question from Cllr Robertson, he confirmed that once adopted, PKC would be in touch with Persimmon Homes.

Cllr Watters advised that the draft transport plan was out for consultation and also reported that PKC's trial of using vegetable oil to fuel refuse lorries appeared to have been successful with no issues being reported. PKC are to review the trial with a view to moving all vehicles over 3.5 tonnes to use vegetable oil as fuel.

Applications for both windfarms had been logged with the energy conservation unit. There was a meeting arranged for the end of June re the wind farm at Braco. An email re a memorandum of understanding with regard to distribution of funds has been sent to CC and all agreed to sign this.

Members were advised that the PKC report *Let's Talk Transport* is available (https://consult.pkc.gov.uk/communities/lets-talk-transport/) and it would be beneficial for as many responses to be submitted as possible.

#### **Reports From CC Representatives**

CCIIr Willisher reminded those present that last year, PKC had stopped the Green Hotel from having a beer tent last year but that they had now given approval (for 3 years) for the same over the summer months. While CCIIr Willisher was pleased to see the space being used, he advised that he had been asked by the Sir Alan Smith Gardens (SASG) residents association to raise an issue with regard to the facility, which is adjacent to their homes.

CCIIr Willisher advised that the main concern related to the safety of children (some who appear to be as young as 3 years old), who are left unsupervised by the parents, as they are not allowed inside the enclosure, to play in the field. As you would expect, the children tend to gravitate towards the fence surrounding the pumping statement to play ball games, which inevitably means the balls frequently cross the boundary into SASG or go into the locked pumping station enclosure. This results in children regularly crossing the wire fence as well as climbing the pumping station fence to retrieve balls and an example was given of an

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incident the previous weekend when a young child followed an older child over the fence and into the road when a delivery van was travelling in excess of the speed limit, and it was only sheer luck that a serious accident was avoided.

In response to a question from CCIIr Mckay, CCIIr Willisher advised that concerns had been raised with the Green Hotel last year without success so they had not spoken to them about the current issues. CCIIr Mckay confirmed she would speak to the hotel on behalf of the resident's association.

While the SASG residents acknowledged that PKC had approved a noise management plan, which will be monitored closely by SASG residents, and the residents were mainly supportive of the application, it was noted that there now appeared to be a smaller marquee in the park which housed a pool table and therefore invited a different type of clientele to the park, and the CC were asked whether this complied with the planning approval which was granted. Concerns were also raised that with the forthcoming football competition, there would be TVs installed in the marquee, again increasing noise levels.

Cllr Freshwater advised CCllr Willisher and the residents association to raise their concerns with the Planning Department at PKC since any activities that are to be held in the Market Park would have needed to be listed on the planning application. Cllr Robertson agreed with these comments and suggested that the hotel management did not have total sight of what was happening in the park at all times. He also commented that if there serious concerns raised with regard to noise, licences can be revoked.

A member of the public commented that there was a duty of care to measure noise levels but they had no information as to how often this was taking place. They went on to advise that there are a number of vague statements made by the Green Hotel in their planning application such as children only allowed until 9pm and permitted access was only allowed if they were 'accompanied' by an adult – there is no specific instruction as to who this adult should be, e.g., a parent/guardian.

The hotel are advertising all types of events but there is no evidence of bouncers or gatekeepers and no indication of noise levels reducing after 11pm (as per the application) or being checked. Cllr Robertson commented that PKC can provide noise level checking equipment to residents to check on these levels and report back. He advised that there had previously been issues with other establishments whose events/customer behaviour were affecting the lives of nearby residents.

CCIIr Mckay suggested that the resident's association look at the myPKC portal (https://my.pkc.gov.uk) where they would be able to record their concerns.

CCIIr Willisher advised that he would contact PKC with regard to the marquee, liquor licence and noise levels and report back.

In response to a question from Cllr Robertson about the removal of the fence around the pumping station, a member of the public advised that the screening hedge planting appeared to be incomplete. Cllr Cuthbert advised that he had asked about the adoption of the road but had heard nothing further so he will chase for an update.

#### **Licensing Applications**

While no applications had been received, CCllr Wells enquired about the fast-food van which had appeared in the town. CCllr Mckay advised that she had contacted PKC for more information about this but she could not be given any information without submitting an FOI request. CCllr Wells advised that the application was dated 19 April but it was noted that the CC had not received a request to comment on the application.

#### Correspondence

While all appropriate correspondence had been circulated to Members, CCllr Mckay raised the issue of bike storage/shelters at Mill Street and while she had previously invited residents to attend a meeting, they had not taken up the offer. After discussion, it was agreed that the residents should be advised to contact Cllr Watters.

#### **Matters Arising**

# Kinross-shire Committee Update, and Tayside Active Travel Master Plan:

PCC members had been reviewing and discussing the Tayside Active Travel Master Plan, with a focus on the Kinross-shire Active Travel Plan. Both the Chair and the Vice-Chair had attempted to join the scheduled ARUP (the contractors) meeting on 27/03/24 but had not been able to and had had no response from ARUP on this. As a result, there are currently omissions about connecting routes through Kinross-shire and Portmoak. PCC views on the Active Travel Master Plan are yet to be included in the Kinross-shire plan, as there had been no response from ARUP contractors following the March meeting. Cllr D Morris would be raising this at the KLC meeting on 16/05/24.

Cllr D Cuthbert commented on the upcoming KLC meeting on 16/05/24 and agenda items: the Kinross-shire Active Travel plan was a working document and would be discussed as the last item on the agenda. Lots of comments were expected and views would be welcomed, the document was still very much in draft phase. A roads update would also take place. Update on Blaringone Primary School, where a Community Asset Transfer was taking place and KLC were involved acting as a shield or buffer to protect the project, as there had been many delays, and KLC involvement was intended to time to put pieces of the project in place. Financial update outlining £50K of KLC funds which have become available from another project, so KLC will discuss this and try to identify other projects which could benefit from the available funds. Final update on South Kinross flood protection scheme: there are two objections to the flood scheme which need to be discussed and negotiated, and it is hoped these will be withdrawn. The building of an affordable supermarket can only be progressed at the BCA British Car Auctions site only if the flood protection is in place. Cllr D Cuthbert couldn't comment further as he sits on the Planning Committee.

#### **Road Safety Action Update**

Speedwatch was covered in Police Liaison update (see Item 5a). Chair reiterated that if there is enough uptake, we can get some traction on highlighting issues of speeding along the A911. Cllr D Cuthbert highlighted that people from any area can move to another area should they have concerns about visibility within

their local criteria, or can choose to stay in their own locality if they prefer. It was felt that most people had concerns about their own area and would be happy to work locally.

Cllr K Donaldson flagged the problem with the B9097 road surface which was badly needing resurfaced. Previous patching was already breaking up.

Cllr A Davidson had noticed on Portmoak Community FB page requesting signage for Children Crossing near Portmoak Primary School, as there were concerns about disregard by car drivers to children in the area. Cllr D Morris a crossing point around the Kinnesswood shop. One suggestion discussed was the creation of a extended shared use zone along the centre of Kinnesswood, similar to what is seen in Kinross centre from the roundabout down the High Street where a long part is 20mph. There is no single formal crossing point between Milnathort and Leslie. Chair agreed, thought speed pavements were the best solution, where speed cushions really had minimal effect.

#### Scotlandwell To Portmoak Church Path

The Chair had issued further communication this week, including the landowner of the lower Southern section between Church and Scotlandwell. Cllrs had been CC'd on this. It was hoped this would gain traction. Chair had initiated communications with TRACKS, arranged a meeting for an onsite meeting w/beginning 20/05/24. It was thought that half a path was better than no path and PCC were keen to progress as quickly as possible another section of off-road path before any possible funding was withdrawn. The crossing that is proposed will be a stand-alone section. Cllr W Robertson agreed and referred to the LLHT which was built in sections and partly delayed due to landowner objections. Cllrs K Donaldson and the Secretary were in agreement. The PCC members and Cllrs were in agreement to move forward with the path section between Community Woodland and the Church.

#### Play Facilities At Scotlandwell Green

The Chair had received correspondence from coordinator Susan Whyte at PKC Greenspace Communities. The work was supposed to be commencing in Jan/Feb 24 and tree surgery work was completed. However, the rain in the early part of 2024 had delayed the work as the ground was too wet to proceed. Now the tender process was delayed. Unfortunately, the Portmoak Gala has had to have been relocated in anticipation of the facility upgrade commencing. There is likely to be frustration and disappointment from Gala organisers that time, effort and money have been spent needlessly relocating the gala to another site along Grahamstone when work has been delayed until after the gala date. It was felt PKC Greenspace had dropped the ball on this item. Cllr D Cuthbert agreed and commented that delays were also happening in Davies Park in Kinross where work was being delayed until the end of the summer. Funds had been made available by ScotGov for playparks and there has been a surge in applications for play facility upgrade all across Scotland and the tender process was now being delayed as a result of the volume of tenders. Suggested looking at any local construction firms who may be able to step in. Chair hoped that work would start soon when the ground was dry during the summer months and not delayed again.

#### Portmoak Church – The Future For The Church And Car Park:

No significant move forward. The Chair thought it would be prudent to look for local funding opportunities like the Westfield fund. Cllr D Cuthbert supported the idea of moving forward with obtaining valuations and funding opportunities and supposed this would be another Community Asset Transfer from Church to Community and advised the value of having a Community Development Trust to handle projects like this. CCllr D Morris confirmed Kinnesswood Development Trust were moving forward the project for the acquisition

of the car park. Chair suggested that funding initiatives could start even without a valuation, with any surplus used for other community projects. Cllr D Cuthbert suggested D Morris raise the question at KLC meeting. Lee Haxton is the Officer at PKC who manages Capital Asset Transfers. CCllr D Paterson recalled at a previous meeting on this item, it had been indicated by Church representatives that it may be possible for the community to obtain a part of the Glebe. Chair deferred to KDT as the group who were managing this project. COS would be looking as a charity to raise a fairly substantial amount of money for the sale. Cllr W Robertson expressed minimal concerns due to the good communications between the Trustees and the KDT, and thought funding was likely to be available, and the Trustees did understand the importance of the car park to the community. They also did not want to see the Portmoak Church fall into disrepair, so it was also important to have the church in a position for development. PKC Planners have confirmed that the car park would not be looked at for housing.

#### **Sustainability Group Meeting: Update:**

Cllr D Cuthbert flagged two applications received by PKC for windfarms in the Ochils, one through the Energy Consents Unit which will come to committee in August and one that had come direct to PKC. Secretary did not have an update, pending next meeting on 19/06/24 but had recently reconnected with the Renewables Sustainability Group. CCllr D Morris commented on a public meeting he had attended at the Campus in Kinross, it was a public meeting, there was no discussion about benefits to the communities, there seemed to be suggestion of considerable opposition to the windfarms, and that that the financial benefit was a massive bribe to keep communities onside and not object to planning. The wind turbines are going to be colossal to reach into the laminate air flow. In Norway they consider construction of windfarms on hore as ridiculous due to the uneven flow of air. There is going to be a significant move to off-shore wind. Cllr D Cuthbert said the purpose of the CCs getting together is to ensure that, if consent is given, then all the communities benefit. Three applications in the Ochils are likely to be forthcoming. NPF4 makes consent much easier and planning legislation may determine likely outcomes and make it more difficult for communities to resist. The Secretary commented that it was important to be in the discussions in a neutral framework, despite both sides of the argument for and against on-shore and off-shore windfarms. Developments in the Ochils are likely to be visible from most parts of Portmoak which was a visual issue, but we should continue to engage so that if planning policy was pushing the projects forward the community did not miss out. Cllr W Robertson suggested connection for the proposed windfarm would run through Portmoak to Westfield and was likely to be an overground connection

#### Scotlandwell Footpath Between Wellside Park & The Green

Issue with ironwork has become raised on the footpath and perceived to be a hazard. Local residents are looking at putting in some reparations themselves. Chair thought that it was not a good idea for residents to attempt any fix to the path as they may become legally responsible for the it and it should be the responsibility of the Council. A PKC planning letter from 17/01/14 stated the path would be adopted by PKC when Wellside Park was adopted. Residents would be responsible for any defects or repairs on a non-adopted scheme. Further consultation has shown that PKC Roads officer visited roads twice, to note defects for snagging, second visit was after these defects were remedied. Two questions need confirmation: the status of the Wellside Park adoption by the council. And secondly why the path between the Wellside Park and the Green has not been adopted. Developer has received bond back.

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CCIIr D Paterson: as a developer has to do a road bond, councils only adopt a finished article, if road is up to standard required by council. CIIr W Robertson was doubtful that the road had not been adopted. PKC would not have returned the bond if the road wasn't up to standard. W Robertson asked that the CC leave the issue with him to pursue further questions and information on the status and best way to proceed.

A resident of Wellside Park provided some context: PKC have never done any work on the path, but they did extend the path to the Well Park. The resident was the last house to buy in 2016 and no work had been done since then, the last planning approval advice states footpath between plots 9 and 10 should remain free from obstruction and shall be maintained by the applicants or their successor. Path sits within the communal part of the properties. The resident had made a request to PKC that because the path is used by the community and it was intended to be used by community that some contribution be made by the council for reparation. 16 out of 18 houses had agreed to proceed reparation work but some had raised concerns, which had then created doubt about the status of the road adoption also. The resident commented that on the latter point it seemed odd that there were regular bin collections, road sweeping and maintenance of lighting if the road wasn't adopted. Their deeds do state it was the responsibility of the developer to secure the road adoption. The Chair thanked the resident for their contribution and understood the concerns. It was agreed to leave the issue with Cllr W Robertson for investigation. The Chair reiterated the initial planning consent that path itself be adopted when the principal road was adopted. There was agreement that need to establish if the road is adopted, and clarification about the responsibility for the path going forward.

#### **Police Reports:**

Mark Craig, Kinross Police Sergent, introduced Ashleigh Community PSYV role, also known as the Cobras. If there are any events on, please speak to Ashleigh. About 10 calls to local Police in the last month, of note only a residential house breakin on Leslie Road, currently under enquiry with good lines of enquiry so hopeful for a positive outcome. Half-marathon last week went quite well. A quiet month otherwise.

#### **Community Speedwatch:**

Alan Macrae of MOCC has taken the lead. Chair was able to explain that Portmoak has created a Portmoak Community Speedwatch page with link to MOCC, where potential volunteers can be coordinated. Link to MOCC to coordinate any volunteers directly. Seem to be a lot of local Portmoak residents who are keen to participate. Alan Macrae has offered to do a presentation when enough numbers of volunteers are registered. PCC members felt that speeding had got worse in recent months and hoped residents would get involved. The Chair hoped that the Speedwatch would gather data that may identify hazardous areas. The Police liaison were encouraged by this. Willie Robertson thanked Mark for his contribution. Cllr W Robertson highlighted complaints he'd received from residents about speeding on Leslie Road, and requested some surveillance on that road. Mark Craig agreed to add this item to the police patrol. Cllr D Cuthbert also thanked police on behalf of residents who had commented that the police had been more visible checking speeds. The Chair thanked the Police for attending.

#### **Planning**

#### **New Applications:**

24/00522/FLL Formation of hard standing and erection of a garage/workshop, The Lindens, The Cobbles, Kinnesswood. PCC had looked at the plans. No substantial concerns. Comment that that the proposed garage was totally disconnected from the

main carparking area and appeared to be more of a workshop. CCllr D Morris had not looked at the application but commented that the existing garage was considerably separated from the house at present. The Chair proposed no comment from PCC. No comment from other meeting attendees.

24/00691/FLL, Installation of replacement windows and solar panels, Allandale, The Cobbles, Kinnesswood.

PCC had reviewed the planning applications. The Secretary confirmed the application was in the Kinnesswood Conservation Area. There was some discussion about the orientation of the panels. The Chair agreed to try and view on-site and make comment if necessary.

24/00245/FLL Part change of use agricultural building to dog breeding facility, land 40 metres north east of Glenheart Farm Glenlomond.

Additional new application highlighted by Treasurer. Secretary apologised for the omission and would investigate. PCC will review and discuss and make representation as necessary.

#### **Planning Decisions**

#### **Progress with Developments**

Westfield Community Liaison Committee: Cllr K Donaldson had attended recent meeting. Firing and testing this year, pending operation starting in 2025. At a recent meeting in Ballingry it had been discussed that the Westfield site would be used to collect electricity from Ochils windfarms before transmitting it onto other southern parts of the UK such as Northumberland and Norfolk. Cllr D Morris commented that there was no discussion on prospective power lines bringing power to Westfield and it should be considered if these would be underground or overground through Portmoak. Cllr W Robertson commented that he had posed this question to Ochils Wind Farm Developers and had been told incoming power lines would be over-ground.

**Westfield Paths Feasibility Study:** D Morris suggested this needs to be wrapped into the ARUP Discussions.

#### **Paths Group Update**

Current project underway for the top of the Cobbles to put in a large drain which will cost around £10k, fundraising is under way.



The early days of June, however, brought the saddest news to members, when they learned that their dear friend and club member, Mary Nobbs, had passed away after an illness. Mary was a longtime,




Mary enjoying her art

Rugby Kinross Club members helped to put up the hanging baskets around the town. We are very grateful for this ongoing support.



# Trees in Conservation Areas and Tree Preservation Orders

Trees in Conservation Areas and trees or woodlands that have been granted a Tree Preservation Order (TPO) are protected by law. Anyone wishing to carry out management work or remove a tree in a Conservation Area or protected by a TPO needs to get permission from the local planning authority.

The legal protection is for trees with a stem diameter of 75mm measured at 1.5m from ground level.

It is an offence for any person to cut, lop, top, uproot, wilfully damage or destroy any tree located within a Conservation area or covered by a TPO unless notification has been made to the local planning authority and consent has been granted.

Formal action can be taken against persons who have carried out unauthorised works to trees covered by a TPO or in a Conservation Area. A Tree Replacement Notice may be served and in certain cases offences may be reported to the Procurator Fiscal and can result in fines up to £20,000.

Conservation Areas and trees and woodlands covered by TPOs, together with other heritage features such as Listed Buildings, can be found on PKC's interactive heritage map at: pkc.gov.uk/heritagemap

Sunnypark Woodland was granted a TPO last year. The other TPO in Kinross is called Gallowhill Road, but it really covers Mavisbank and Whinfield Gardens.

Kinross Conservation Area is larger than you might think. It covers the High Street from Sandport up to the area around 22 Muirs and many of the streets and properties off to the sides. It is worth checking.

We have written a few times about the ponds that have been created at the South Queich flood plain, which we hope will provide new habitat for amphibians in particular. However, with habitat creation comes other issues. Imagine a couple of frogs wandering over to set up home in the new ponds only to be washed down one of the 13 drains surrounding the flood plain. Game over? No, not thanks to the creations of Trevor Rose who has made it possible for amphibians to use ladders to escape and continue their journey to the new ponds! We and the amphibians are grateful to Rose Design Services.

On 20 May the Trust hosted another planting day at the ponds with some hardy volunteers planting dozens of wetland plug plants. Even after four weeks it is worth a wander to see how the ponds are progressing. This was a successful day and thankfully the Scottish weather was kind to the dedicated volunteers. In October there will be another planting day and this will be announced in due course.

A final couple of points. Firstly, the work carried out by Kinross-shire Civic Trust on the Raingardens Trail is aimed at replacing habitats lost which has led to a severe drop in the numbers of amphibians. There has been a 68% reduction in common toad in 30 years. Secondly, without volunteers this work cannot proceed.




Our annual awards evening took place at Kinross Church Centre on the last Friday evening in May.

#### **Broke not Broken**

Over the past month we have been lucky enough to be invited to attend a few local summer markets.

Portmoak School Fair and Milnathort School Fair gave us the opportunity to chat to families about what we do and raise awareness of the support available in the hope it could break down some of the stigma accessing support can have.

We also gave an informative referral agents open day. It is a great way to share information about our projects but also to enable referral agents to meet each other and share learning and knowledge.

As summer heats up, so do our summer projects. Alongside the ongoing food bank support and energy support we also have Tuesday Trips, School Uniform bank and our new Summer Child Payments support. 73% of families accessing our support are not eligible for free school meals. Families are held back by policies such as the two child limit, benefit caps and levels of social security not meeting the costs of food and energy. This summer we will be supporting families referred to us with £100 voucher payment per child to support them over the summer holiday period. We will be monitoring the impact of these payments and sharing this with local authority and Scottish Government.

As we get to the summer months and the weather has improved, the club members have managed to get a great deal of flying done. Almost all of it took place without a bin bag for the journey home!

One of the members has been flying his large aerobatic biplane with very impressive results. Although he is still a little nervous to try some of the more advanced manoeuvres, we are hoping to see the full suite soon!

Aerobatics is something that is popular with RC models and there are several classes of aircraft that competitors can enter, the most popular being the F3A class where the aircraft are no longer than 2 metres and must not be heavier than 5kg. Pilots must perform a series of figures in front of a panel of judges who award marks based on the skill displayed.

One other local club (Glenrothes) is holding a Big Scottish Fly-in at their club in early August and some of our club's committee are helping out with the organising of it. This will also give the club more insight into what is involved in organising a big open day.

# Portmoak Community Woodland Group

Something they often say at the end of gardening programmes is, 'remember to take time to sit down and enjoy your garden!'.

It is a message we should remember in our two community woodlands. We are often so busy pulling birch, pruning apple trees and so forth, that we forget to stop and absorb what is going on around us.

The Portmoak festival in June helped to put that right. As part of our contribution to the programme, we organised two bird song walks in Portmoak Moss, led by Scott Paterson, of Kinross Ecology.

Scott was great at helping us to identify which birds were singing and calling and also to figure out what the different species might be communicating to each other, whether it was about territory, mating or something to be alarmed about in the undergrowth.

Meadow pipits were very active in the centre of the peat bog, great spotted woodpeckers drummed on the trees and song thrushes sang brilliantly and inventively.

They were not the only ones with something to sing about; we had a lovely open air concert in the community orchard in Kilmagad

Wood. Vicky Gray and Sean McLaughlin, from Scotlandwell, organised the gig which featured a fantastic line-up of a dozen singers and instrumentalists performing traditional Scottish tunes as well as songs by the likes of Neil Young and Eric Clapton. This was Portmoak's answer to Glastonbury. The audience brought folding chairs and sat around in the sun for an afternoon of great music.

Across the road, in the village hall, there was an exhibition, by Portmoak Primary School, of beautiful pictures and craftwork inspired by the birds they have been learning about this year. It included photos and a write-up about the nest box project we did with them in February.

There is some good news on that front because the first blue tits have moved in. Again, you need to take a bit of time to stop, look and listen.

There was another chance to do that at the very end of June. As a result of our involvement with the Tayside Biodiversity Project we held a guided walk to tell us about swifts on Sunday 30 June. The birds were once a common sight in the area, and we hope to find out what we can do to encourage them to return. It is free and open to everyone.

Please keep in touch by checking out our website and joining us at our regular meetings at 7.30pm on the third Tuesday of the month. They generally take place in The Well Inn but, on fine summer evenings (ha, ha), we relocate to the orchard.

Members of the club are immensely proud that Rotarian George Lawrie has been awarded the British Empire Medal (BEM) in the recent King's Birthday Honours for services to Rural Perthshire. George, twice past president of our club and presently secretary,



personifies the 'hands on' service to charitable and/or voluntary activity that this award recognises, and also the Rotary motto of 'Service Above Self'. Well done George, thoroughly well-deserved!

At a breakfast meeting on 21 May, Rotarian George Lawrie showed us some fascinating archive film covering Kinross Show. The show, held on the second Saturday in August every year, is a big event for the farming community and a popular family day out for local and surrounding communities.

Kinross Show is run by Kinross-shire Agricultural Society, which was formed and ran its first show in 1830. The main attraction at the time was working horses. The film showed scenes from 1954, when it was held at Balado Airfield. These were the early days of agricultural mechanisation and when everyone dressed up smartly for the occasion. We saw scenes from 1965, 1987 and 2020, with the venue moving to the grounds of Kinross House in 1961 and, more recently, to RSPB Loch Leven. We observed the growing popularity of continental breeds, bigger and more elaborate farm machinery, and spotted many well-known characters over the years. This year's show – the 194th – will be held on Saturday 10 August. Look out for our stall!

On 10 June we were visited by Lyndsay Stobie and Will McLean from CHAS (Children's Hospices Across Scotland). We are proud to have supported CHAS in a variety of ways since 1995; before Rachel House even opened in March 1996! We were reminded of the dedicated work carried out by staff and the huge impact this has on patients and their families. The building in Kinross is now nearly 30 years old and needs have increased and changed during that time. The building requires refurbishment and more modern clinical facilities. At present, 37% of income comes from the Scottish government, 12% 'other income' and 51% from fundraising. Lookout for ways in which you can contribute to their essential and admirable work.



It is always a pleasure welcoming them and, over the years, has been an honour even in terms of wins. This year was Dollar's trophy.

Edinburgh South came to Loch Leven's Larder in a switched fixture as their ground was completely flooded under 2ft of water. Batting first Edinburgh found the early going hard as they lost regular wickets. A strong middle order stand helps as they finally reached 133 for 9 wickets. Kinross-shire made a strong start but found the middle overs tricky and lost several key wickets in only 20 balls. A valiant rear-guard fightback almost succeeded but in the end Kinross-shire fell 29 runs short.

The much-anticipated David Roe Memorial Test match takes place on 22 June and will be featured in next month's Newsletter.

#### From The Archives

Back in 2006 the club had launched our first juniors' season and entered the Cricket Scotland Under 13 National Cup competition. Having raced through the qualifying rounds we reached the finals weekend and played Edinburgh Carlton in the semi-final. With almost no issues we won the match and were in the cup final against favourites, Grange. In a tight match

Kinross won in the final over. The quality of that winning side was fully recognised the following year as five of the players were selected to play for the Scotland U15 team in the European championships in Denmark. In 2007 the club won both the U13 and U15 Scottish National titles on the same day. A feat that has never been repeated.

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

# Join Us For Discovery Day!



August in Kirkgate Park, will a range of stalls and activities for everyone to enjoy. We will be inviting other organisations that we work with, so there will be plenty to learn about the loch. The event is completely free so please don't hesitate to come along! We will be hosting other activities throughout the holidays, so keep an eye on our socials and for any posters with more information.

We will also be officially opening our new hide, which is between the Pier and Vane Farm, so please come along and have a look out.

Over the spring and summer we have two groups of insect volunteers our every week surveying Burleigh and the old railway line. They have already been spotting plenty of damselflies such as azure, large red and blue tailed, and plenty of bumblebees as well, with large numbers of buff-tailed and red tailed. Sunny warm and calm days are the best for looking out for flying insects such as these, so if you fancy going out to spot some yourself that is the best time to do it.

St Serf's island has been the focus of our nesting bird monitoring this year, targeting Tufted Duck nests to monitor productivity and predation. Mid-June was when the first tufty nests started hatching, so keep an eye out for them and their broods of ducklings across the loch. The island is also home to hundreds of nesting gulls, herring, lesser black-backed and greater blackbacked gulls, all of which will have young fledging by July. This year we also welcomed back a colony of black-headed gulls to the island. These nesting slightly later than their larger counterparts, and have some young still not quite fledged.

Another exciting species to spot over the summer are ospreys! Loch Leven is a favoured fishing spot for these birds, so we will be offering pop-up events to help people spot them. Our seasonal staff will also be hosting pop-up events over the weekends, such as pond-dipping/bug hunts/bird watching. So keep an eye on our socials for any updates, and if you see them don't hesitate to say hello.

Please remember that this time of year our water access states

NATURESCOT WILL BE hosting our annual Discovery Day on 17 to only launch from Burleigh or Kirkgate, and to stay 200m from the shoreline and away from the islands. This is to minimise disturbance to breeding birds and birds with young. We also ask, following SOAC, that nobody has any open fires, fire bowls or disposable BBQs on the reserve, as we have already experienced a large amount of scorch marks where vegetation has been damaged. SOAC recommends using a camping stove if you are wishing to cook.

## The Birds And The Bees

THERE HAS BEEN LOTS of activity happening here at Loch Leven since our last *Newsletter* column, with lots of chicks being seen at the reserve. The first black headed gull chicks have been seen recently on the islands and rafts from the Carden hide.

The majority of lapwing nests on the reserve have now hatched, and some of the lapwing chicks are starting to get very big now, and early in June we saw our first chicks make some small flights. It is hard to believe that just a few weeks ago they were just balls of fluff.

In the woodland we have been incredibly lucky to watch two tawny owl chicks in some of the branches close to their nest. In this 'branching' phase where they are not ready to fly they have

been sitting patiently in the trees waiting for their parents to feed them at dusk. The great spotted woodpecker chicks have also very recently fledged and can be heard making quite the racket as they call to their parents.

The wildflower meadow has finally started to bloom with flowers such as red clover, yellow rattle, buttercups and birds foot trefoil forming a blanket of colour providing feeding opportunities for lots of bee and butterfly species. Our practical volunteers have been working really hard on managing vegetation in the picnic area and along the paths while also tending to our gorgeous cottage garden which is finally awash with the colours of lupins and herb plants.

We've also been busy putting together our events program for the summer. Our Big Wild Summer self-guided trails started at the end of June and will run until the end of August. They're a really great way of getting the whole family exploring in nature, and are available to purchase at the reserve. We have two fun activity packs to hire too, for £3 each. The first is our pond dipping kit which provides you with everything you need to explore the ponds here at the reserve. The second activity pack we have to hire is our Explorer Backpacks, these contain mini binoculars, a magnifying glass, ID sheets and activities- all essential items for a young wildlife enthusiast to enjoy a visit here. We also have our Sensory Backpacks available to use for free, for both children and adults.

We've got lots of events for all ages coming up too, so do make sure you check out our events page (https://events.rspb.org.uk/lochleven) to find out more information and book your space. Currently planned we have our second-hand book sale on until 4 July, Optics Weekend on 6 and 7 July, The Tempest by the Festival Players on 20 July, Wellbeing walks in July, August and September, Bat Walks in August and September, and the Big Wild Pyjama Party on 2 August. We're hoping to add lots of more events to the planner soon too (hopefully including craft workshops), so watch this space and do keep an eye on our events page.

# **Troupers Trooping On**

I'M PLAYING THE TROOPING of the Colour on iPlayer and watching it out the corner of my eye as I write this, funny the things that become of interest as you get older. The music from the pipes and drums of the Irish guards is helping me focus and if I'm lucky I can bring through their good rhythm to my writing.

Dare I say we are up to date with jobs on the farms, (this never really happens) but a bit of the silage has been made, the neeps went in mid-May and on inspection this morning they are peeping through, I can just start to see the emerging green rows and that's such a relief. The sunflowers went in the week after and their germination seems to be a bit longer. I walk the field every day looking for the seedlings to appear, but so far, it's a bit like a watched kettle never boils. Another job off the list is the ewe hoggs getting clipped, some of these were in the group that had a hard time with worms during the winter. The tough time was evident in their fleece as it didn't have as much rise, making them a bit stickier to shear. Thankfully the shearers take a lot of care so got the fleeces off okay with not many cuts. With their wool off, they will hopefully go on a bit of a growth spurt.

We did manage a holiday to catch up with our younger son who is studying in Stuttgart. We went early to avoid the price hikes of the airfares during the Euros and explored a bit of the Black Forest region as well as the city. The sun was up sharp on the balcony of the hotel every morning and shone brightly all day, it's a good climate for farming and we saw lots of good cereal crops as well as livestock outside on lush grass. We hired bikes one day and were lucky to buy cherries from an orchard honesty box. They were juicy and delicious picked straight off the fruit trees on the south-facing slopes. The sun and land in Germany are most certainly used for food production, we didn't see any solar panels in an agricultural setting. It does make me wonder why we may turn good agricultural land in Scotland over to solar farming when we have so little sun. How can it be efficient?

In the city we travelled on the tube, it was fairly busy and we stood up on quite a few journeys. Since all my operations my core strength has disappeared but Fraser noticed I was quite good at keeping steady without holding on. I explained to him that it was probably muscle memory as we used to do a lot of this when I was a student working at Wester Aldie. Most days I would stand on the trailer on the back of a tractor whilst heading down to the fields. If you wavered you got teased, so I mastered a slight knee bend, flexible ankles and staring straight ahead, this usually worked to keep me steady. It's over 30 years since



my year as an agricultural student and I'm so grateful they gave me the opportunity. Every day they taught me something new, from milking to rearing calves to fencing. I was the first girl they had ever employed and I wasn't very technical so some days were tough, the mower went through the fence a few times, my trailer of gravel landed in the ditch near Carnbo and my reversing skills took a bit of work. But Andrew and Eunice were patient and encouraging so every day I returned determined to make a good job and not get teased.

Onto the final paragraph here and the Royal family are assembled on the balcony of Buckingham Palace for the fly-past. Knowing the King and Princess of Wales are both going through treatment for cancer, like I have, I'm watching them carefully. I think I recognise the look of gratitude in their eyes, it is clear that being with their family means the world to them and I hope that, like me, they continue to regain their health and, like the ewe hoggs, can start to put the tough times behind them.

## Is It Summer Yet?

**IS IT SUMMER YET?** I have everything crossed that by the time you read this, summer has appeared and that we've seen the end of the cool days of June... I can but hope.

I don't know about you, but since I planted my annuals at the beginning of June, they've just sat there, glum-like, waiting on a bit of heat. On the plus side, they should flower until later in the season, giving colour for longer.


So, what's on the cards this month then? As some of my seedlings have been quite slow to bulk up during May, I'll continue to plant these out in the garden as they become ready. Rudbeckia (usually super reliable) and statice have sat around for ages, not growing at all from their post pricked-out size... I'm blaming the weather. The statice seedlings have now been told to get their big girl pants on and I've chucked them outside in their tray to get on with it. Hopefully they'll get big enough to plant out in the near future.

An advantage of the cooler weather I've found is that the weeds seem to have slowed down a bit. Don't get me wrong, there's still a never-ending amount of weeding to do, but it's at a manageable level at the moment. Same with watering... currently not too onerous, but that could change very quickly. I tend to water my hanging baskets every day, and tubs every other day or so, depending on the weather.

If you're a regular reader, you may remember that my hanging baskets over the last couple of years have been fairly disappointing. Well, I think I may have cracked it this year. I planted slightly more plants in them and have been religiously watering and feeding them — they're starting to bulk out and get a few flowers, so I'm really pleased. I think the cooler weather may be helping them to grow in a more controlled manner too.

July is still a great time to sow some biennials for next year – foxgloves, sweet williams, lunaria and hesperis are favourites







of mine. The sweet williams i grew last year are just starting to flower and the foxgloves are romping away quite nicely just now. Biennials are a great way to fill the 'flowering gap' between spring and summer bedding plants, easy to grow and well worth doing.

Now is also a good time to be sowing perennials which will come back year after year... growing them now gives them a bit of time to establish before the winter sets in. I cheated a bit this year and ordered some very cheap plug plants (I get a lot of Facebook ads) as I've got it into my head that I want to create a proper herbaceous border at the back of my garden. The border is currently home to two very large, woody shrubs that will need to be dug out, some fairly decent plants that can be replanted and a copious amount of invasive weeds and brambles. Watch this space.

In summary, weeding, watering, sowing and planting are the watch words for July in the garden. Also, keep an eye out for any early bird offers for spring bulbs which can be planted in the autumn. And don't forget to have a seat, relax and enjoy the fruits of your labours... if it ever warms up!




