Climate Crisis and Wind Farms

THE WIND FARM APPLICATIONS in our area have certainly stirred up emotions; the letters to our *Newsletter* are a testament to this. I'd like to add my thoughts. For the record: I am not a scientist, but for over 40 years I have been worried about the way we are degrading, polluting and changing our planet and this worry is only increasing. I don't think there is much doubt that humans have a negative impact on Earth; but how exactly this pans out is anyone's guess. It is not just global warming; it is also the amount of waste (plastic) we generate and the amount of harmful substances we release. There is a lot of uncertainty and some use that to argue that it will be ok in the end. I disagree profoundly.

For decades the western world has broken its promises to reduce carbon emissions. Our greed for ever-bigger cars, holidays by air, more fast-fashion, cheap stuff from China and cheap food from all over the world shows no sign of abating.

It is not our generation that will suffer. At the moment people living in fragile ecosystems such as in sub-Saharan Africa are suffering from drought and famine; a situation that is at least partly caused by the West. This crisis will not stay abroad: next up to feel the impact will be our children and grandchildren.

I don't like wind farms either: I don't like it that the profit goes abroad, that we have no manufacturing capabilities any more to produce the turbines here and I don't like the sight or the sound of them. But we need swift action to ensure the generations coming after us have a future. We simply cannot carry on using fossil fuel. Tell me, all of you who are against wind energy: what is a credible alternative? Nuclear energy? Or just building wind farms in someone else's backyard?

Don't Look Up


IT IS ALWAYS EASIER to believe that there are no problems, and we are safe to enjoy our way of life without undesired consequences. And as our news is filled with world catastrophes and political conflicts, there is a great need for positive news. Positive news however is not pretending there's no crisis (as brilliantly exposed in Adam McKay's 2021 film "Don't look up"), positive news is about right solutions to actual issues.

In response to the letter "Climate crisis?" in the February issue, I'd like to point out a few flaws in the author's arguments as a climate change denier.

For anyone new to this topic – the article used ice core data of paleoclimatic temperature variation in the Pleistocene era, with the warmest peaks (3°C) higher than the present temperature (1.5°C) to support the claim that the current climate change is not anthropogenic and is going to end. The author refers the reader to a website, which hosts all the usual climate change denier material aimed at mal-informing (purposefully misinforming the public to create confusion and apathy).

Before we get to the data interpretation in the context of observed climate variability it is important to mention that all temperature ice core data is estimated based on isotopic oxygen content in different ice layers, a so-called proxy, and it is subject to considerable uncertainty. In addition, the ice core data for the last 20 years is not reliable because 'the snow that falls on the ice sheet needs time to form into solid ice' (www.carbonbrief. org/factcheck-what-greenland-ice-cores-say-about-past-and-present-climate-change/). For that period, we need to refer to the measured temperature data.

The data on the graph from the letter mentioned above is no longer available on the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency (NOAA) website. I present below data from Greenland ice cores based on the Carbon Brief website (all glaciologists observe similar patterns of data from the Northern hemisphere). Looking at the last 11000 years we observe that temperature varied, and the current level is indeed not the highest, but the past warming occurred over two thousand years (from 10000-8000BC). Slow warming during interglacial periods was caused by the gradual changes of the earth's orbit relative to the sun. This contrasts with the current warming rapidly progressing since the industrial revolution, linked closely with an increase of carbon dioxide concentration in the atmosphere. This is a result of human effect on environment, predominantly due to burning of fossil fuels (so called greenhouse gas effect). The global average temperature is projected to continue and in 2050 overtake all the interglacial levels, only 26 years from now (modelled data presented on the graph below).



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This is known to many of us, but the confusion caused by climate change denial still persists hence it is important to recognise reasoning behind misinterpretation which is linked to the vested interests of fossil fuel corporations. The period that we live in now is known as Anthropocene with predominant human influence over the climate and environment. There will be no 'natural' decline in temperature (as in the past) but there is still hope if we acknowledge the situation and do something about it. As Sir Attenborough said, 'the future of humanity and indeed, all life on earth now, depends on us'.

Wind Farm Survey Report 30/1/24

(Presented at Fossoway CC meeting 6/2/24)

I WOULD LIKE TO caution the CC against reading too much into or basing a planning stance on a survey that has elicited 110 responses from 939 households (11.7%), although that is not a bad %, as surveys go. I note that approx 63% of those respondents were hitherto not aware of the Kinross-shire proposals, so are probably not folk normally engaged with the CC and/or planning issues, so from that perspective it has probably served a useful purpose.

I am rarely critical of our CC and the work you do usually carries my full support, as a former Chair, Secretary and Treasurer many years ago and also of course, during my 23-year stint as PKC elected member for Kinross-shire.

As you should know from previous emails on this matter, I had requested a sight of the questions before they were circulated but this was not forthcoming. The survey put out failed to outline the background to previous windfarm consents in the Ochil Hills, the fact we already have three large windfarms and that another three are proposed. There was no mention of the existing Local Landscape Area designation for the Ochil Hills in LDP2 and current PKC supplementary guidance specifically seeks to avoid proposals for turbines having an adverse impact on the special qualities of this sensitive environment, particularly cumulative impacts.

The survey also failed to mention the aspiration, unanimously endorsed by the CCs at the first historic meeting of the Kinross-shire Local Committee on 20/1/22, for the Ochils to be a Regional Park and for PKC to be pressed on that matter. I argue that further windfarm developments will seriously weaken that aspiration.

As you know, I have stressed that so-called 'community benefit' from industrialising our hill landscapes is a separate issue to planning consent. Since the Craighead proposal is on the site of the previously refused Mellock Hill proposal (after a public inquiry and CC objection), I fail to understand why the CC would not indicate an intention to object in due course, given the increased height of the turbines proposed.

I reiterate my call for our CC's to press PKC's elected members to ensure that these latest proposals are the subject of a conjoined public inquiry, as previously occurred, in order that the cumulative effect can be fully debated in public forum.

Just to conclude, as Chair of FCDTrust, I have circulated my 'open' letter to yourselves and Cleish CC of October 2023 to members of the Trust and also the Minutes of the Trust meeting of 15/11/23 when this windfarm issue was discussed; in order to get members' views on my intention to frame an objection in due course, to the Craighead proposal on planning grounds and to press for such an inquiry, on behalf of the Trust.

49 members were circulated and 14 responded, 9 in support of my stance, 3 opposed and 2 abstentions (a 28.5%) response [updated since CC meeting].

In Response

This sad and disappointing tactic is misplaced and repeatedly the first objection employed by members of the anti wind farm lobby when onshore developments are proposed, seemingly in the misplaced belief that the more often it is parroted, the more likely it is to be believed.

Secondly and perhaps less forgivable is the patronising use of the statement by Mr Montford that: 'So much of what you think you know about renewables, and in particular wind farms, is wrong.' Wow!

Rewind to the successful movie 'A Few Good Men', where Jack Nicholson loses the plot and attempts to berate and belittle Tom Cruise by shouting at him in the courtroom scene that: 'You can't handle the truth!'

The residents of Kinross-shire are more than capable of analysing and assessing situations which affect the area in which they have chosen to live, be that for more than a century or in setting up a new home.

The polarised wind farm debate is not improved by the contents of Mr Montford's contribution. Any points which he may have wished to genuinely express must be set against his use of unfortunate and patronising language which should be avoided if he wishes to advance his own personal views and gather support.

ANDYSMANCLUB ARE A MEN'S suicide prevention charity, offering free, peer-to-peer support groups across the UK and online. They want to end the stigma surrounding men's mental health and help men through the power of conversation.

They have over 120 support groups nationwide, running every Monday from 7pm. In these groups, men can open up about the storms affecting their lives in a safe, judgement-free and non-clinical environment. Clubs are designed to be free of pressure, men can simply speak or listen as they wish.

With over 2800 men using the sessions every week, and an army of 900+ volunteers, the movement continues to grow each week. They firmly believe in the power of talking.

Established in 2016 by Elaine, Andy's mum, and Luke, Andy's brother-in-law, the aim of the club is to provide men with a safe space where they feel comfortable to talk and open up about their experiences in a room free of judgment.

The Kinross branch opens on Monday 18 March at 7pm at the campus, welcoming all men over the age of 18.



Arts@StPauls will give demonstrations and artists will answer questions. KYTHE are hosting a drop-in, games and music in the lecture

hall and KLEO are planning entertainment in the drama studio.

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GLENFARG BUS – FROM DEARTH TO PERTH!

IN JANUARY, GLENFARG COMMUNITY

Transport Group launched its extended service 55, created as a response to the withdrawal of services by regular transport companies and now running hourly from Kinross to Perth via Glenfarg.

The first few weeks were run as a soft launch to see if the timetables worked and allow the drivers to familiarise themselves with the route in and out of Perth. The new service has already proven popular with around 700 passengers per week making use of the service.

It had been hoped that the bus could get to Perth Royal Infirmary, the Pool and Retail Park on demand, but that has proven difficult due to long-term road works in a number of locations. It has been decided to scale back on these ambitions until spring, when the introduction of the MooveFlexi App will allow passengers to see where the buses are.

In the meantime, the 55 will deliver passengers to Canal Street and the Bus Station. Those heading to the hospital can connect at Mill Street with Stagecoach Services 1 (to PRI) and Service 2 (from PRI) which run every 15 minutes.

In Perth, the 55 bus picks up at the Bus Station Stance 1 at 20 minutes to the hour and Mill Street (stop G for Glenfarg) then Scott Street outside St John's Shopping Centre and opposite The Twa Tams at 15 minutes to the hour. Departure from Kinross P&R for Perth is also quarter to. The full timetable is at *GlenfargCT.co.uk* or use QR code on the advert on p6. This timetable will always be the most up to date and may change as the new service evolves.

SINCE THE UK LEFT the European Union, UK citizens will not be able to vote in the European Elections in June 2024.

However, European citizens living in the UK, are in some cases eligible to register to vote in these elections. Many have made their home in Scotland and indeed in Kinross-shire.

If you can, register and vote. Whether or not the UK is part of the EU, our nearest neighbour has a lot of influence on our society and economy; and on your home country, wherever that is.

There will be repair volunteers in the following fields:

- Textile and wool
- Jewellery
- Laptops (software)
- Other electronics (radios etc)
- Chairs (wicker, upholstery)
- Small wood objects
- Bikes

Not all repairers will be able to attend all events so they will advertise in advance of each event. At The Better Place to Live Fair there'll be details of the first event at the Climate Cafe stall.

In addition there will be demonstrations of things like basic bike maintenance, tool care, visible mending.

A repair cafe is for basic simple repairs and the idea is that participants help to repair under supervision of experienced repairers. Not all items are repairable, however. More complex repairs will be referred to local professionals.

It's an ongoing learning process. If you have nothing to repair,



just enjoy a cup of tea or coffee. Or lend a hand with someone else's repair job, if you wish.

STRAP YOUR BIN SHUT!

PKC WASTE SERVICES have announced a new measure to prevent grey bin spills. They said, 'Due to the lighter contents of the grey

bin, there have been reports of bins blowing over due to high winds, spilling their contents and creating litter.'

In an attempt to prevent the new grey bins strewing their contents across pavements and roads, they are making free bin straps available to all P&K residents, courtesy of the



Scottish Government's Recycling Improvement Fund (RIF), administered by Zero Waste Scotland. The straps do not require installation – they simply attach to the back handle of the grey bin and hook over the front. The straps can then be briefly unhooked by bin crews to allow them to empty the bin.

You can collect a bin strap for your grey bin only at all Perth and Kinross Libraries and all recycling centres. There is limited stock, meaning only one bin strap per grey bin. Approximately 2000 straps are available, with more on order and expected to arrive shortly.

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M90 IMPROVEMENTS THROUGH MARCH

AMEY IS UNDERTAKING a £1.3 million project improving road safety on 1.6 miles of the M90 near Glenfarg.

This news will be welcomed by those members of the public who have expressed anxiety at the increasing number of road accidents along that same stretch.

The project will see improvements made to the vehicle barrier restraint systems on the central reserve of the M90, between the footbridge at Glenfarg and the B996 overbridge. The work, which

began mid-February will take place overnight between 8pm to 6am from Sunday to Thursday each week until Friday 29 March.

There will be overnight closures of lane two, both northbound and southbound. There will also be overnight lane one closures with the hard shoulder in operation for traffic. Traffic management will be lifted at 6am before being reinstated at 8pm.

All schemes are weather-dependent and may be cancelled or rescheduled if weather conditions are unfavourable.



PRISON ART AT ST PAUL'S

AN EXHIBITION OF ARTWORK by Perthshire prisoners is being brought to Kinross by SSAFA Perth And Kinross – The Armed Forces Charity – with support from Arts@ StPaul's.

They are excited to announce a new venture, working with veterans inside HM Prison, Perth, and the Open Prison at Castle Huntly. The exhibition shows a range of artwork they have created whilst in detention and this will be the first time it is seen outside in the community, hence the title INSIDE OUT.

SSAFA helps the families of all armed forces personnel and veterans. The support offered is non-judgemental and holistic. Last year SSAFA P&K trained volunteers carried out 88 cases, covering a wide range of issues. Their small team of volunteers do this work, and whereas their core business is face-to-face case-working in clients' homes, 'Prison In-Reach' is also very much part of their remit.

Last year in a conversation with Mr Hodge, Governor in Charge at Perth, it was felt that art as a therapy for prisoners would be very beneficial and help pass time in a productive and creative way.

A volume of work was produced and, when they realised the potential to display it outside of the prison, Branch Chairman Andy Middlemiss consulted Anne Taylor at Arts@StPaul's. This was her reaction:

'Andy presented us with a large pile of work on paper of different sizes, mostly painted in acrylics. I could see immediately that this was not the result of art lessons. Rather it was all about individuals creating something of their own. Some of the work is figurative, some naive in style, and other pieces purely abstract. I felt that much of it was a powerful expression of memories, dreams and emotions that have, in the act of creating them, likely given an emotional release to the maker. That is in part the therapeutic value of creating a piece of artwork, but to value this enough to put it on display in the commu-

nity should also be recognised, as a way in which we can encourage self-worth and self-esteem.'

'How to display this work? It needed to be presented in a way in which we could hang it as an exhibition, but the cost of mounting and framing would be prohibitive. So on a visit to the Art Centre in Kelty I discussed this with owner Staig. From under the counter, he kindly produced a pile of surplus card mounts, and the solution was found.

'Andy took the collection of mounts to the prison at Perth, so the artists in question could learn how to present their work in a card mount. We hope to be able to adapt our hanging system at St Paul's to

display a good body of the work and the rest can be viewed from a browser.'

We are also grateful to Colonel Johnny Clavering, locally, who secured a generous donation for this venture, from a trust he works with. Some of the artwork was previously on display at the concert held in Kinross Parish Church in November. However, this will be the first time it will be exhibited in total.

The upcoming exhibition work has several purposes and aims:

Firstly, it will put on public view the veterans' artwork, and we hope that this, in itself, will be of value.

For the plot buyers, there is also the option of construction project management through local business, Thomson Project Management. They can provide a range of services for self-builders, from budget costing to sourcing tradesmen/materials and handson site management. This can be for the whole build or specific build stages.

Balado is just a short drive from Kinross and is conveniently located near the M90 motorway, it provides easy access to Perth/ Dundee to the north and Edinburgh to the south, making it an ideal location for commuters!

PORTMOAK 2024 – THE BALL STARTS ROLLING!

WHO DOESN'T LIKE a get together – especially when it is within walking distance, does not have to be booked six months in advance and often costs less than a tenner?

Last year Portmoak once again held a successful festival focused on providing a range of events which might bring the community together in a variety of ways. The Portmoak Festival has been running for about 20 years. It is not a fundraiser, but just tries to cover its costs by offering low key events organised as simply as possible. If you have even a little time to help organise an event or to help, please get in touch with the organisers — they'd love to meet you and get you involved for as much or as little time as you have available.

One less low key event last year was the Sarah Rankin cookery demonstration which was quickly sold out. Organisers say they 'never doubted that it would, and Sarah was generous with



her time in working with us to get the best set up'. Other community members pulled out the stops to offer hospitality to the sudience with a glass of wine and some canapes to get things warmed up.

The audience enjoyed hearing Sarah tell her Masterchef story as well as show off and share a few recipe ideas, and hear how her business and book are coming along. It also allowed us to experiment with online booking, and to introduce a card payment system.'

Another new idea was a Climate Conversation Café with a focus on domestic energy and vehicles. Everyone knew some-body who was doing something and wanted to hear it from the consumers as opposed to politicians or salesmen. Several folk had got air source heat pumps, some had solar panels and were embarking on batteries and others were totally sold on their evs, and could share experiences of getting a charger installed in their driveway. Some were even able to share data on savings they had made since installing various new climate-friendly solutions. We had asked Joanna Lockhart, a local architect with a good knowledge of energy efficient building approaches and she was able to give her reflections on what she had heard from us



and made some sensible comments on ensuring we are strategic about changes.

'Women who Whittle' sessions in the Community Orchard were introduced by the local Portmoak Woodland Group, helping women to carve a small object from a piece of wood. There was Jazz in the Orchard and a great jazz night with Dave Batchelor and Friends in the hall. There were fabulous raffle prizes as ever, sourced by another very helpful and obviously persuasive member of the group.

It was delightful that two different groups ran the popular Pudding Club and Afternoon Teas as well as ever, that a wonderful exhibition of children's wildflower art was mounted in the hall, that the under 5s were able to join in their own festival event. In the background Kinnesswood in Bloom were busy making the village beautiful for the Britain in Bloom competition. And having the village looking good has always been an important backdrop to various festival events.

A spokesperson told the *Newsletter*, 'Many thanks to all who contributed in any way – you know who you all are, that local events need a whole load of different talents, and that many hands make light work. From planning to admin, from money to gathering raffle prizes, framing and hanging exhibits, making puddings, engaging extra servers, setting up PA systems, moving tables, cleaning the hall, printing tickets, selling tickets, coming along and spending a bit of money... Please volunteer to help this year – all ideas welcome for events with a difference!

We are starting to get going for 2024 with the first two weeks of June lined up. There have been a number of suggestions for events but we do need some fresh blood to organise these, or existing local groups to take one on. FLYTIPPERS BEWARE...

PKC HAVE ANNOUNCED the renewal of their campaign against the dumping of illegal waste. Flytippers in the area have been warned they will be investigated and prosecuted.

The council investigates every report of fly-tipping they receive and prosecutes whenever possible. They also have the power to issue fixed penalty notices of £500 for smaller cases.

Fly-tipping is a serious environmental crime. It scars our landscapes and pollutes the environment, costing the council thousands of pounds every year. As part of last year's council budget, recurring funding of

£90,000 a year was agreed to help improve the approach to tackling the problem.

The Safer Communities Team, Waste Team and wider Environment Service developed a plan to work closely together to improve the council's response, and a dedicated member of staff was recruited to prevent fly-tipping and pursue offenders.

This improved approach is already seeing positive results. Between 31 August and 31 December 2023:

• 74 reports of fly-tipping were received



- 51 cases were accepted for formal investigation (the rest could not be classified as fly-tipping after initial investigation).
- 15 fixed penalty tickets were issued.
- Two people were reported to Police Scotland for a total of nine incidents of fly-tipping.
- Two people were reported to the Procurator Fiscal.
- Four warning letters were issued.

 74 fly-tipping sites were restored. Mobile cameras are being deployed at hot spots in a bid to catch criminals in the act.

Councillor Grant Laing said: Illegal rubbish dumpers should know that we will investigate them, gather evidence and prosecute whenever possible. Fly-tippers can end up with a £500 fine and, in serious cases, they will end up with a criminal record.

'There is absolutely no excuse for fly-tipping.'

Climate Change and Sustainability Convener, Cllr Richard Watters, added: 'We are confident this approach to

fly-tipping will continue to produce positive results for communities, ensuring tippers will be deterred and the appearance of our beautiful countryside and towns will be maintained.

'I would encourage all members of staff to report all incidents of fly-tipping in their communities so we can investigate and hopefully bring the culprits to justice.'



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

Toasted bread is as underestimated a food as you will find. It can transform even the most basic of ingredients from a snack into a meal.

Thinly sliced melba toasts take a shop bought pâté from pedestrian to elegant with its light and delicate crunch. A thick cut sourdough rubbed with garlic and butter and pressed onto a griddle pan transports the humble sliced tomato. And soft boiled eggs are nothing without soldiers.

A good quality ham is essential for this one, sim-

mered with bay, peppercorns, thyme and celery. Use the fabulous stock and any leftover ham as the basis for a wonderful lentil soup. The wild garlic is already appearing round by me, but if you can't get hold of it, you can use chives instead.

HAM AND WILD GARLIC BECHAMEL TOASTS

You Will Need

(Serves 4)

4 thick slices of cooked ham
4 thick slices of sourdough
1 garlic clove
50g butter
50g plain flour
150ml milk
Grating of nutmeg
Large handful of wild garlic, blanched and dried on kitchen paper (or bunch of chives prepared in the same way)
1tsp English mustard
3tbsp grated gruyere
Salt and white pepper

Peel the garlic clove and rub across both sides of the bread. Butter each side lightly and place on a griddle pan with a weight on top and grill until nicely toasted on both sides. You can pop them under the grill if you don't have griddle pan.



Meanwhile, melt the rest of the butter and add the flour to make a roux. Slowly add the milk to make a thick bechamel sauce. Add the Dijon mustard and season with salt and pepper and a grating of nutmeg. Roughly chop the wild garlic (or chives),

and add to the sauce, off the heat.

Place thick slice of ham on the toasted bread, and spoon over a generous amount of the sauce. Sprinkle over the gruyere and place under the grill until bubbling and browned. Eat immediately and enjoy!





LOOK AT YOUR LABELS!



WE ALL KNOW THAT buying food that is produced locally is better for the environment than food that is flown all over the world. But what do you know about the carbon footprint of your clothes?

Did you know that the fashion industry (clothes, no other textiles) produces between 8 and 10% of all global emissions? This is more than the aviation industry and the shipping industry combined. The clothes on our back come with a very high hidden price tag, even though you can buy a summer dress for under a tenner.

Out of the 3.1kg of textile waste each Briton produces every year, only 0.3kg are recycled and 0.4 kg are reused. The rest goes into landfill. Textiles are said to be the world's second biggest polluting industry, responsible for 92 million tonnes of waste annually. Not all textiles are breaking down in the environment and herein lies a problem.

On a very simple level, we can divide textile fibres in 'natural' fibres and 'man-made' fibres. Examples of natural fibres are cotton, linen, hemp (plant-based) and wool, alpaca fleece, silk and others (animal based).

Man-made fibres (viscose, rayon, Tencel, acrylic, polyester) are made in a factory. The raw materials for these fibres are either from the natural world (viscose is made of wood, so is Tencel) or from oil, such as polyester, polyamide, nylon and acrylic.

The official name of polyester is PET – the same material plastic bottles are made of. Polyester is cheap, easy to wash, with a good drape, light and strong and this makes it desirable for the fashion industry. Often blended with other materials, it is now so ubiquitous that the proportion of synthetic fibres in our garments has doubled since 2000, rising to 60% in 2019.

The difficulty with clothing ourselves in plastic is not just what happens when the garment is made or discarded. Just by

wearing and washing, polyester sheds microfibres in large amounts. Results of research done by Plymouth University indicate that one person could release almost 300 million polyester microfibres per year by washing their clothes, and more than 900 million to the air by simply wearing the garments. This is especially true of fleecy jackets, popular garments in our Scottish climate. Thirty-five per cent of the microplastics that enter the ocean come via synthetic textiles and as a result, over seventy per cent of fish caught at mid-ocean depths in the Northwest Atlantic have microplastic ingested. These are staggering statistics and don't include the environmental and social harms done by producing cheap fast fashion.

Often, we think that a problem is too big for individual action. But you can do something:

- Buy less: buy better;
- Buy second hand;
- Dispose of your old clothes responsibly;
- Avoid man-made fabrics such as polyester, polyamide and acrylics;
- Learn how to take care of your textiles, including mending.

Come to the Repair Café we hope to start later this year to learn to take care of your clothes!

ANDREW'S CYCLING PHOTOGRAPHY IS A REAL AWARD WINNER



TO BE NOMINATED FOR the Mark Gunter Awards would be a career highlight for some photographers, but at just 19 years old Andrew Leinster didn't know the awards existed when he was nominated for one.

Andrew started his journey into photography and design at Kinross High School, with support from the Technologies department, who he says helped him enormously.

Andrew's bedroom walls are covered in photos from Grand Tour races, big road scenes, and 'a lot of mountain bike stuff'. After an injury that stopped him racing back in 2020, he borrowed his Dad's camera and began uploading pictures of his friends messing about on their bikes to Instagram.

Andrew told the *Newsletter*, 'In 2020 I was injured and I couldn't ride for a while. I was also falling a bit out of love with racing,

having done it for so many years, and I just needed something new.

"I borrowed my Dad's camera and went out with a group of friends on the bike, and just captured what we were doing and put it on Instagram. I couldn't ride much, so I just took pictures of them doing jumps and digging trails. My Grandad is a professional cycling photographer as well, so he's a bit of an inspiration to me.'

Then Andrew started going to cycling events. When he needed to borrow a laptop charger, Grant Murdoch from the SDA invited him into the SDA cabin and Andrew, 'just sat in the corner, aged 17 and quite intimidated, editing pictures.'

His photos didn't go unnoticed and after a recommendation from Grant, Scottish Cycling asked Andrew to take photos at the Scottish Championships.

'That was my very first mountain bike work. I was super excited and spent all week researching what I needed to do, packing my bags etc. I remember not having a camera bag at the time, so I just emptied all my maths homework out of my rucksack, wrapped my cameras in hats and chucked them in!

'Since then I've shot every single SDA race I've been able to get to, plus a heap of events for Scottish Cycling, and I guess it was all off the back of starting that Instagram page!"

Perhaps the simple message here is that life is all about giving new things a go! Andrew told the *Newsletter*, 'Seeing how other photographers have done and trying to do that myself has been what I've been trying to work out, so to be listed alongside them for this award is really cool! There are some people who I hadn't heard of, but I

now follow them and can take inspiration from them too.'

Andrew is currently studying product design at Dundee University. But after that? He says, 'After uni it's definitely something I'd like to consider doing, either full-time or alongside another role. But it's definitely something I want to pursue!'

NO LEAP IN THE DARK!

An update to the Kinross-shire Civic Trust Raingardens project

BACKGROUND

Kinross-shire Civic Trust (KCT) has embarked on its third biodiversity project in three years. The primary aim this year is to improve wetlands in Kinross to promote an increase in the amphibian population. There has been a significant drop in amphibians in the UK. There has been, for example, a 68% decline in common toad populations in the UK over the past 30 years. One of the biggest factors contributing to declines in Scotland's native amphibian and reptile populations is habitat loss. Thanks to the Communities Nature Fund from Perth and Kinross Council, KCT has been able to move forward with this project to reverse, in a limited localised way, habitat loss in the Kinross-shire area.

The main thrust is to further develop the three wetlands areas. These are:

- Church View Wetland: Enclosed by a fence and now with a bench, this wetland was becoming clogged up as bullrushes had overtaken too much of the free water.
- Flood Plain: Last year a pond fed from groundwater was created, and some wetland plants introduced.
 Also, a bench was made overlooking the area. Already, the pond has been populated by a wide variety of species of flora and fauna but it needs further development.
- Clash Burn Wetland: The free water here, like the Church View Wetland, needed de-clogging.

The wetlands are in the Junction Road area of Kinross.

PROGRESS TO DATE

The free running area of water has been greatly increased by the removal of the invasive bullrushes. The effects of creating more open water is to encourage different flora to inhabit the area as well as amphibians and other fauna.

Flood Plain

The pond created last year has been widened considerably and in a safe way with graded sloping down to the groundwater that feeds the pond. In the spring the area will be planted with wetland plug plants and, over time, it is confidently anticipated that there will be an increase in the amphibian population. Where species start to thrive, they can have positive effects on other species. A second smaller pond has also been created close to the larger pond created last year. It also is fed from the groundwater.

An additional investment to help our amphibian neighbours is in the form of ladders in the ten drains along the edge of the road adjacent to the flood plain. Amphibians can become victims when rainwater washes them down drains. The amphibian



ladders provide a way to make their way out and return to their new habitats.

Here, the free water has also been declogged and the burn now flows in the right direction. Two groundwater-fed ponds have been created.

Concluding this year's Wetlands projects

There will be a planting day in the flood plain in the spring. This will be around the enlarged pond and the newly created smaller pond - the new habitats for the amphibians. It is crucial that these habitats meet the needs of amphibians in terms of water quality, which is provided by the groundwater, and the vegetation and surrounding land area to support their breeding, feeding and shelter requirements. With advice and guidance from Danièle Muir of Tayside Amphibian & Reptile Group, and overall design input from Brian D'Arcy, this year's project will move to its final stage during the spring. The plants being introduced will be totally native and will also seek to encourage other fauna, including pollinators.

One fundamental point of the wetlands/flood plain area is that it acts as a sink for excess rainwater to help prevent flooding to our roads and buildings. Developing the wetlands further will improve biodiversity with environmental benefits as a whole increased.

The KCT would welcome support from people interested in the environment as this and other projects are taken forward.

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LOGISTICS IN THE 1944 NORMANDY CAMPAIGN



Amateurs study tactics. Professionals study logistics.

Field Marshal Rommel

NUMBERS

IN THE EARLY HOURS of 6 June 1944, an armada of 5,333 Allied ships and landing craft, manned by 150,000 seamen, transported 130,000 men and 20,000 vehicles (including tanks) across the Channel, to open up a decisive breach in the Atlantic Wall, which the Germans were manning and defending with their lives.

LOGISTICALLY, HOW ON EARTH WAS THAT DONE?

LOGISTICS PLAYED A KEY role in the success of Operation Overlord, the Allied invasion of France in June 1944. The objective of the campaign was to secure a foothold on the mainland of Europe for further operations. The Allies had to land sufficient forces to overcome the initial opposition, and then build them up faster than the Germans could respond. Planning for this operation had begun in 1942. The Anglo-Canadian force, the 21st Army Group, consisted of the British Second Army and Canadian First Army. Between them, they had six armoured divisions (including the Polish 1st Armoured Division), ten infantry divisions, two airborne divisions, nine independent armoured brigades and two commando brigades. Logistical units included six supply unit headquarters, 25 Base Supply Depots, 83 Detail Issue Depots, 25 field bakeries, 14 field butcheries and 18 port detachments. The army group was supported over the beaches, and through the Mulberry artificial ports, specially constructed for the purpose.



All these factors below, and more, had to be planned for in detail and from a long way out from D day 1944...

Manpower / Camps / Feeding

Planes / Shipping / Landing Craft

Manufacture In Huge Numbers Of Combat Supplies: Weapons / Tanks / Vehicles / Fuels / Ammunition / Rations / Supply Systems

Medical / Recovery / Rail / Ports

Postal / Signals / Intelligence / Deception

Homefront

With 36 divisions eventually on the continent, the Allies needed 20.000 tons of food, fuel, ammunition, and equipment every day, to be crossed over the Channel on shipping, and up a beach head, until Cherbourg was re-built, and Antwerp seized – much, much later.

The build-up to D-Day was undertaken by Operation Bolero, a

logistical effort of unprecedented magnitude. Sailing on now-secure sea routes, the U.S. Navy and merchant marine took 1,200,000 troops to Britain, where hundreds of camps and bases were established, and supplied with everything, from chewing gum to bombers. Britain's existing infrastructure was inadequate to support the massive effort, so a thousand locomotives, and 20.000 freight cars were shipped from the United States, plus material for hundreds of miles of additional rail lines. Transatlantic shipments increased to the point that some 1,900,000 tons of supplies reached Britain in May 1944 alone, showing the scale of logistics.

The manpower required to meet the needs was enormous. Less than one-quarter of the Allied troops in France were in combat units, and only about 20 percent served as infantrymen. A four- or five-to-one 'tail to tooth'' ratio was not unusual in other theatres of war, either. In mechanized warfare, fuel and oil were essential to success, and Allied logisticians solved the problem of adequate petroleum supply. They designed and built the Pipeline under



the Ocean (PLUTO) to pump the lifeblood of tanks, trucks, and all other motor vehicles directly to Normandy.

Other innovative projects involved prefabricated piers called Mulberries and block ships. The latter were 28 merchant vessels, intentionally sunk to provide breakwaters for artificial piers. Most were old, worn-out vessels dating from as early as 1919, though a few were 1943 Liberty ships. In all, 326 cargo ships were involved, including two hundred American vessels.

In the 27 days following 6 June, the Allies poured massive amounts of men and material into Normandy. As of 2 July, a million troops, representing 25 divisions (thirteen American, eleven British, and one Canadian) had come ashore. They were supported by 566,648 tons of supplies and 171,532 vehicles. These are mind boggling numbers, you will agree.

I HAVE WRITTEN to the Energy Consent Unit at the Scottish Government in relation to the three wind farm proposals in the Ochil Hills. The proposals concern Craighead and the adjacent Brunt Hill wind farms above Carnbo, as well as Windburn



further to the west between Alva and Blackford. There is a need for the Energy Consent Unit to consider all three applications in line with the latest Scottish planning framework (NPF4), where Policy 11 states the need to look at the 'cumulative' impact of wind farm proposals. I requested that all three applications be determined within the same system, looking at the overall impact of all the proposals. Currently, Brunt Hill and Windburn will go through the Energy Consent Unit, while Craighead will be determined through the Perth and Kinross Planning system due to its size being less than the threshold of 50 MW, which automatically sends the application to the Energy Consent Unit.

At the February meeting of the Climate Change and Sustainability committee, the 'Fleet Decarbonisation Update' report for Perth and Kinross Council was approved. This included



the recommendation to move the Council's refuse collection lorries from diesel to HVO (Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil). Initially, there will be a three-month trial period to ensure there are no unforeseen consequences in switching over, especially due to the extensive and rural geography of Perth and Kinross. Making the change to using HVO as a fuel is relatively straightforward, with no need for any vehicle conversions. Once the diesel tank is empty, it is filled with HVO fuel and is 'ready to go'. The benefit of moving to HVO is the reduction in the fleet's carbon footprint, leading to a saving of 725 tonnes of CO2 per year. This provides an immediate and considerable step forward in reducing the Council's carbon footprint generated by its larger fleet vehicles. This is a transitional move, as the council will still be looking at the potential of using other green fuels, such as hydrogen.

The Update also instructed officers to prepare to move all our lighter fleet vehicles under 3.5 tonnes to electric, starting in 2025. These recommendations will significantly advance the decarbonisation of the fleet overall with a pragmatic and measured approach, leading to around a 50% reduction in our fleet's CO2 emissions.

At the latest Kinross-shire committee, there was unanimous approval for the sustainability consultants and engineers, ARUB, to produce a Kinross-shire and Glenfarg Active Travel masterplan. The expectation is that a draft will come before the committee for approval at the next meeting on 16th May. This will help


put the area in a good position to make use of the substantial Transport Scotland money earmarked for Active Travel, which will be administered through the council. Thanks to Tactran (Regional Transport Partnership) for agreeing to fund this and to Council Officers for making this happen within such a short timescale.

The report will initially look at some 'quick win' routes that can help improve the path network in the area. Over time, as we see the masterplan materialise on the ground, we should start to see an extensive network connecting settlements within the area, as well as joining with similar routes in Fife and Clackmannanshire. There is also the potential to have a route connect Glenfarg to the Bridge of Earn to Newburgh Active Path, currently being built by the Perth and Kinross Countryside Trust, utilising the two historic rail tunnels north of Glenfarg, a potential route that has a lot of local support.

Kelty at Gairney Bank. I have been campaigning for this missing sign for some time after the three other signs appeared at Gairney Bank & Bridge. The reason for the delay was due to their being challenges with utilities pipes under the road and presumably making sure that the new sign did not interfere with this. Roads officers have advised that installation should be fairly quick as it is solar powered and does not need wired into the mains. I have also again asked officers to look for the missing speed limit sign which has been absent from the same location, with a view to being reinstated.

Speedwatch equipment purchased

It is great to see that momentum is gathering for the community speedwatch. This was operating some years ago in Fossoway but the equipment was lost with the merger of Scotland's police forces. Therefore it was great to see the new equipment on show at Milnathort & Orwell Community Council (MOCC) this month which was bought with public grant funding. MOCC is now taking the lead for the scheme for the whole of Kinross-shire and a good number of people are signed up and have taken the training. It's taken quite a bit of campaigning to get the critical mass of volunteers, over the past 18 months so it is good to see it starting.


Portmoak paths narrowing

A resident attending Portmoak CC this month raised the problem of the paths narrowing due to foliage debris build-up. This has been a growing problem for some time. I have written to roads officers to see if that could be looked at with a view to restoring the usable width of the path. Given that this is something which I don't think there is done annually I hope that action can be taken soon. It was also reported that there are overgrowing hawthorn bushes by the Bishopshire golf course impinging on the path. It is not clear who is responsible for this but I have made some enquiries.

Roads disruption in Kinross and Milnathort

Many readers will be aware of the delays that have occurred due to roadworks in Kinross and Milnathort as part of the Virgin Media fibre broadband upgrades. All ward councillors have received complaints about this and so a meeting was held with Virgin this week to discuss the situation. It seems that there was some miscommunication about the plans leading to confusion. Hopefully the works shall be finished in the next few weeks and the installations will mean increased choice of fibre broadband









options available. Questions have also been raised about whether or not further operators might come along and want to install more equipment in the same area leading to future disruption. Whilst it is not 100% certain, it is hoped that the combination of the Openreach and Virgin infrastructure would be sufficient for most providers to offer a good competitive services for the foreseeable future.

Cleish Bus Service

A fellow resident of Cleish has been in touch having carried out a useful survey of local residents asking about their desire for a bus stop/service in the area. Cleish is one of the few villages in Kinross-shire that has no bus service (other than school bus services). If memory serves me correctly, there was a bus service in the past which was replaced by the subsidised taxi services (DRT). Unfortunately, we now have very limited taxi options in Kinross-shire which limits both DRT and wider taxi use. Cleish also presents a challenge in that it is essentially an 'island', as its three roads (Cleish Hill, B9097 and Hardiston road) do not pass through any other villages, and are not interconnected, so critical mass is a challenge, with the nearest bus stops being Hatchbank or Balado. That said, I think we need to look at how the public transport service options might be improved.

Road Safety Issues:

There has been progress on a number of road safety requests.

Reduced Speed Limits to 40mph have been introduced on the A911 between Scotlandwell and Auchmuir Bridge.

Before the end of March new 40mph buffer strips should be installed at Blairingone, Crook of Devon and Drum.

New 'Give Way' signs have (eventually) been erected at the Burns Begg Street/High Street junction in Kinross.

The long awaited bollard between Lathro Lane and Dalwhammie Street (to stop people from driving through here) should be installed in the next four weeks.

The double yellow lines requested for outside The Sycamores on the Muirs are in the programme for the new financial year.

Staff shortages in the Council's Road Safety Team has caused delays in the delivery of many of the road safety requests.

Speedwatch

The Kinross-shire Speedwatch initiative is very close to going live. It is being co-ordinated by Milnathort & Orwell Community Council. We were shown the speed gun that will be used at their February meeting. If you are concerned about speeding in your area and would like to join the speedwatch team please let me know and I will pass your details on.

Citizens Advice Bureau

The latest report from the Perth & Kinross Citizens Advice Bureau on enquiries from Kinross-shire shows a big increase in requests for debt advice. The figures are as follows as a percentage of total issues;

Benefit enquiries 40% Previously 17%
Debt enquiries 17% Previously 27%
Utilities support 7% Previously 18%
Charitable enquiries 7% Previously 8%
Employment enquiries 6% Previously 5%

The total number of people contacting the Perth & Kinross CAB in the last quarter of 2023 was 6710. 48% of those were contacting the CAB for the first time.

SINCE I LAST wrote in the *Kinross Newsletter* a number of things have changed. The days have been getting longer, but the less said about the weather, the better. On a personal level, I have been appointed by the First Minister as Minister for Agriculture and Connectivity. I am honoured to have



been chosen by the First Minister to take on this role and I am well aware of the challenges ahead. We must not forget that in this time of changing climate and much greater prevalence of wildfire because of climate change, it is the keepers and shepherds on these estates who are in fact the unsung heroes and standing armies that protect our hills glens and indeed properties in the event of wildfires that we witnessed all too many of last year. Unfortunately, we can expect more of these events, so we must make sure we have a resilient community able to tackle it when the time arises that we need them.

Going forward, I will also be involved in steering the Agriculture and Rural Communities (Scotland) Bill through Holyrood. This is a vital piece of legislation which will provide vital ongoing financial support to our rural communities, including farming, forestry, and rural development support.

Although I was born and raised a Letham boy, I have been passionate about rural affairs from a very young age. I then made my career in the rural hills of Perthshire before being elected to represent this area in our national Parliament. I look forward using this experience in my new role and I look forward to working with all interested stakeholders going forward. That being said, I am still delighted to attend events and carry out my role as an MSP to serve the residents of Perthshire South and Kinross-shire.

I'VE BEEN VISITING Palestine and Israel for decades. As a journalist I interviewed many of the big players – Benjamin Netanyahu, Yasser Arafat, and memorably the great Edward Said, amongst many others.

My first visit was during the first Gulf War. Saddam Hussein was firing his crude

'scud' rockets towards Israel. He was at the height of his powers but his missile strength was shown to be far from mighty. The Western Allies were set to drive him from Kuwait and inflict on him his first ignominious defeat.

Would this be the moment, many asked, for the Palestinians to be offered a comprehensive peace which would offer them a state with clear and agreed borders? Israel would have to offer concessions – a withdrawal from occupied Palestinian land and some right of return for refugees. But surely everyone could see that peace was the prize?

I made a documentary for the BBC exploring the options. I warned that should Israel and its Western allies not seize the moment, the Palestinians might be forced into the arms of an extremist – but then obscure – group called Hamas.

I think we all know how events played out.

It has always struck me how much Israelis and Palestinians have in common. Victims of dispossession. Warm and hospitable. And passionate about education as a means of self improvement. Both sides have their extremists including religious extremists. But they are Mediterranean peoples. Islam in Palestine isn't remotely comparable with the Saudi model. The Palestinians have had senior female leaders like Hanan Ashrawi. And as anyone who meets leaders of Palestinian delegations around the world will know, their stance is moderate and internationalist.

How then to find words for the tragedy which has engulfed the Palestine people today? As I write Israeli bombs have killed 29,000 people. 9,000 children have died. The death toll per head of population is greater than any conflict since the Second World War. Gaza lies in ruins. But the world looks on paralysed.

I vividly recall Palestinians in refugee camps clutching the keys to houses their families were forced to flee in what is now Israel, when advancing Jewish troops spread terror. Palestine was then a 'British mandate'. And Palestinians would, along with their old fashioned keys, show me their house deeds guaranteed by the United Kingdom and stamped with the mark of the crown.

We owe them. At the very least we owe them our voices raised in outrage at the collective punishment they are now enduring in defiance of international law. We owe them... And that is why I joined my SNP colleagues in the Westminster Parliament demanding an immediate ceasefire. I hope we can find common voice to condemn the collective punishment of innocent civilians.

We know we can't force Israel to stop bombing. But we can apply pressure. Silence is tacit acceptance of Israel's actions.

I can't, in good conscience, remain silent. Embarrassed silence will not save lives. It's time for our voices to be heard loudly and unambiguously. Enough bombing. Enough slaughter..

MY EMAIL INBOX was full of Mid Scotland and Fife residents who were furious at Perth and Kinross Council's proposed plan to axe curling and swimming from their long-term plans. The plan would mean merging Bell's Sports Centre, the Dewar Centre and Perth Leisure Pool, with the aim being to build a new facility



in the city. However, Perth and Kinross Council's new plan did not include a swimming pool, ice rink or indoor bowls rink.

Some of Scotland's senior Olympians, such as Eve Muirhead, rightly expressed concern about this as did many parents of youngsters using the facilities. Several of them wrote to me as Convenor of the Cross Party Group on Sport to express their dismay.

In advance of the meeting among councillors on the issue, Murdo Fraser and I sent a joint letter and I am pleased to report that following pressure from ourselves and the public, the proposal was overturned, and a statement was released saying that the council would now include an ice rink, as per our calls. Vincent Bryson, head of Scottish Curling, made an inspiring presentation to councillors and I know he, too, is delighted at the change of plan.

Sports like curling and swimming are vital in terms of encouraging fitness, reducing barriers and fostering a sense of community. I believe that the council were making a huge mistake with this move, with disappointment and shock echoed by many residents across the region and beyond. It was even more baffling that this proposal was being considered after the extraordinary success Scotland has had in Curling recently on the world stage. The part this facility has played in generating this success cannot be overstated and Perthshire Olympian Eve Muirhead was right to criticise the move. The Dewars Centre is the heart of curling in Scotland, which also happens to be the historic home of the sport.

At the end of January, I was delighted to visit Dewars alongside Murdo Fraser and Councillor John Duff. The ice-rink was well attended by people of all generations and absolutely buzzing with enthusiasm. This is exactly why we need Dewars.

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NEWS FROM ETHIOPIA

WINNING WAYS

I AM WRITING THIS from the Ethiopia Medical Project (EMP) in the Buccama Health Centre, in deeply rural Southern Ethiopia. Every year is a little different but this year the world seems particularly disturbed by war, disasters, famines and political upsets.

Usually when we come here, we spend a day in the capital Addis Ababa after the long flights out, and then set off for the Health Centre by road. This year there were very real tribal disturbances, and for about three nervous days, we were advised not to travel – bands of armed rebels were stopping vehicles at roadblocks they had set up, and setting fire to them. Thankfully, things calmed down, and we did in fact set off by road down a safer route. We arrived here in one piece with all our bags and baggage of donated equipment and clothes intact. Phew!

As we arrived on a Saturday, when the world is quieter, our welcome was a little mute, which was a good thing for our newest fellow traveller and volunteer helper, my fabulous sisterin-law Carol. Her eyes have been out on organ stops since she got here, at all the novel sights, scenes and extremes.

There is a surplus of bananas this year, and we could live on bananas alone. Carol offered to make banana bread, and that became a very popular thing. While she was winging it without scales, no recipe and a local oven with one setting – hot – the call came in to attend a circumcision of a local boy aged 10. As a new visitor, she was given pride of place as honorary Godmother to observe the procedure. The brave little patient said not a word! All the male relatives come to witness the ceremony and ride away with the child on motorbikes making an enormous and noisy fuss.

That done, we were sitting down to a quiet lunch when an emergency pregnancy arrived at our clinic. The girl was 26 weeks pregnant with pre-eclampsia and had to go immediately to hospital. Our intrepid Sister Haimanot set off with the girl, the midwife, her mother and us in the ambulance – sirens blaring.

During our first week we were delighted to find the work going on apace:

- The new maternity wing which we commissioned last year is almost complete.
- The Podoconiosis Unit is well used, three times a week, with 500 people per week attending for foot washing, education and treatment if needed. (Podoconiosis is known as a Rare Neglected Tropical Disease of the feet and legs, occurring in very particular regions of the world among subsistence farmers.)
- Our prolapse mothers are also being incredibly well looked after.
 Uterine Prolapse occurs with great frequency here, but help is at
 hand. Whenever a woman turns up with the problem, she gets
 treated straight away, either with a pessary, or the offer of surgery.
 Although you might consider Ethiopia Third World, in this instance
 there is no waiting list for a pessary, and a maximum of three



weeks for surgical repair. That is quite amazing when you consider waiting lists for the same condition in Scotland!

Apart from these successes, the need is still huge, and fairly overwhelming. The cost of living is soaring; EMP pays the salaries of 27 hard working people. We are struggling to keep that going but we feel we must. For example our top midwife is asking for a salary increase, which will only bring the salary up to £204 a month, including overtime.

If we don't implement increases, the staff will be forced to leave. That is why we at the Ethiopia Medical Project (EMP) are determined to keep this wonderful little place central in our hearts and minds. We have to find the extra help.

Renewed thanks to our Kinross friends and faithful supporters for your interest, help, standing orders, gifts and kindness — you can't know how much it means to the wonderful people here, who in many cases have the clothes they stand up in and that's it. You rarely see them, however, without a smile and a laugh.

For your diaries please — I am running an Ethiopia charity concert in the Loch Leven Kinross community campus assembly hall on Saturday 22 June at 6pm, with (very kindly) Leven Voices and the wonderful Edinburgh-based Capital Concert Band. We do have a surprise star guest, solo performance, booked too! More details later. Sorry you've had it so cold, wet and miserable, I hear recently — it's only 24°C here today, and the African sun is splitting the sky! Back in early March.

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LOOK AFTER YOUR EYESIGHT



WORLD GLAUCOMA DAY is observed on 12 March every year. This day is observed worldwide as part of the week set aside to raise awareness and eliminate blindness caused by glaucoma.

Glaucoma is the name of several eye diseases that can cause vision loss by damaging the optic nerve. Often the diseases develop slowly and don't cause any pain, which makes it easy to ignore until it's too late. Blindness caused by glaucoma is irreversible. However, the disease is treatable if caught early.

Damage caused to the optic nerve by glaucoma can be treated to halt the progression of the disease or, at the very least, slow it down. While there are some causes of glaucoma that have a sudden onset, most of the time, these diseases develop gradually and can be caught in time to prevent blindness.

The leading cause of glaucoma is a buildup of fluid that causes an increase in pressure in the eye. Glaucoma disease is caused when the aqueous humour — a natural fluid produced by the eye — fails to drain out naturally from the eye.

Usually, the fluid drains out of the eye and is replaced with fresh aqueous humour, which the eye produces constantly. However, if something is wrong with the drainage angle, then the fluid will be retained in the eye, and over time, the fluid buildup will increase the pressure on the optic nerve. The fibres

on the optic nerve start dying as a result of the pressure. Over time, all the fibres die, causing total, irreversible blindness.

What Are The Warning Signs?

Seeing halos around lights, vision loss, redness of the eye, and tunnel vision are some of the warning signs of glaucoma.



Fossoway Community Council

News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting on 6 February were CCllrs N Marchant, S Bruce-Jones, A Carter, G Pye; Assoc CCllr C Farquhar; Cllr R Watters; 10 MoP.

Apologies: CCllrs A Cheape and T Lamb; Cllrs D Cuthbert, N Freshwater and W Robertson.

Police report

From 2 January 2024 (last meeting) there have been 48 calls to Police from the Fossoway area and 3 crimes recorded on Police systems.

Between 30 and 31 January, three sheep were stolen from Solsgirth, Blairingone. Investigation is ongoing.

On Saturday 3 February 2024 traffic officers were on mobile patrol on A977 Main Street, Powmill where they recovered a stolen vehicle.

Over the last month local officers from Kinross have been carrying out speed checks at Crook of Devon and Carnbo amongst other areas. During this tickets have been issued for various road traffic offences as well as drivers spoken to and warned.

CCllr Pye noted that the Solsgirth incident had also been reported by the Rural Alert system, which several present were not aware of. To sign up visit: https://www.ruralwatchscotland.co.uk/#SignUp

Matters Arising Windfarms

The CC held a public meeting on 30 January 2024 at 7.30pm in Carnbo Village Hall where the results of the wind farm survey were shared. The meeting was attended by 10 MoP and Cllr Watters. The results have been posted on the CC website www.fossoway.org and the posters were made available to view at this CC meeting and will also be available at the next CC meeting in Moubray Village Hall.

The conclusion of the report notes that the survey was distributed to all households in Fossoway District and 110 responses were received equating to 11.7%. The majority of households who responded support renewable energy but opinions were strongly divided on onshore wind farms in the Ochils; with opponents concerned about the impact on the landscape and supporters believing they are essential to halt climate change.

The findings have provided good insight into residents' concerns during construction and operation of any wind farms that receive planning permission. This information will inform all Community Council responses to any planning application. If any application is successful the survey findings on possible use of community benefit funds will be used in any discussion with planners and developers.

CCIIrs Bruce-Jones and Marchant listened to the Planning and Place Making Committee meeting on 10 January where the Committee was made aware of the PAN application for the Craighead wind farm. This was purely to make the committee aware of its existence and there was no actual planning discussion. The CC had sent an email CC'd to our CIIrs regarding concern of cumulative impact and how other wind farm proposals would be considered that did not go through the PAN process and also to raise awareness of our survey. CIIr

Cuthbert raised this and asked planning officers to liaise with us as we had a lot of information from local residents.

Two other Cllrs made comments - concern regarding how construction traffic would be managed, light pollution; and the visual impact as this Cllr believed the area could become 'blighted' with these tall turbines.

The report has been circulated to other CCs in the area, the currently active developers (Galileo and ePower) and Local Councillors.

Mike Barnacle cautioned the CC not to take too much notice of the survey given the small percentage (12%) of respondents, although as the survey showed that 62% of respondents were not previously aware of the proposals that is a useful result. There were a number of deficiencies of in the questions, including failure to mention the history and cumulative effect. Mike Barnacle encouraged the CC to press Local Councillors to arrange a public enquiry.

The seven CCs in the area surrounding the proposed wind farms have formed a "Sustainability Group" with the intention that a combined approach to the Wind Farm developers will enable a more substantial community benefit to be achieved. As yet the group is in the early stages, CCllrs Bruce-Jones and Lamb have attended the startup meeting, and although the group has drafted a Memorandum of Undertaking for the membership, this CC does not think it is ready to be agreed yet. We will feed back comments to the Group.

Community Development Trust

The Trust has been awarded funds by PKC for the development of a website and community engagement prior to the start of the Community Action Plan and Local Place Plan process which we anticipate will also be funded by PKC. The Blairingone school project is progressing, and meetings have been held with DTAS and PKC to support a financial feasibility study. We are still waiting for PKC to provide a valuation of the property for lease or purchase.

A request for start-up funding has been submitted to the Kinross-shire Fund. Next meeting of the CDT is 20 February.

Road Safety in FDCC area including A977 mitigation measures Drum Crossroads

The traffic lights are now operational, and appear to be making a difference. Sarah has asked for the 30mph limit to be extended to the start of Drum, which is currently progressing through the legal process. There have been some negative comments on social media about the new lights, so the CC



proposes to make a statement about the thinking behind the mitigation measures. The time is now right to look at the performance of the currently implemented measures and decide what might be done next. It would be very useful to ask PKC to study the makeup of the traffic and whether it is local traffic or through traffic.

Speed Watch

Due to the unfortunate loss of the previous approvals of the volunteers, progress has been held up pending the Police redoing the approvals.

Fossoway Area Transport - 202 Bus Service

The 202 bus continues to run hourly; however, as Stagecoach have now decided to extend the route at Dollar to the Ness turning circle, services are being seen to be running later than scheduled. This adds up over each morning and afternoon schedule to some delay. However, the bus does usually arrive at some point and the tracking system is operative for most services. There is an intention to replace one of the buses with a model that is more suited to rural roads. CCllr Lamb attended meetings with Fossoway CDT and also Glenfarg Community Transport and continued discussions as to a way forward for a more reliable and efficient transport service in the near or distant future. Discussions with these parties as well as PKC continue.

Yellow Grit Bins

The previous requests are being processed, but there is no guaranteed timescale.

New Business

Consultations

Financial Conduct Authority: Access to Cash

The CC will be responding to this consultation with a focus on how assessments to access to cash services are performed in locations which cover a wide geography with limited public transport.

Scottish Government: Democracy Matters Phase 2

The consultation paper proposes communities get together to discuss how they want they community to develop and how they engage with organisations like PKC. As we have already formed a Development Trust and last summer organised several Big Place Conversation engagement events, the CC has decided not to respond.

Proposals for a Heat in Buildings Bill

Like many other countries, Scotland has a legal target to reach 'net zero' greenhouse gas emissions, which cannot be achieved without changing the heating systems in the vast majority of our buildings. The survey closes on 8 March. and can be found at https://consult.gov.scot/energy-and-climate-

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change-directorate/proposals-for-a-heat-in-buildings-bill/. The CC is preparing a response, but urges the public to submit their own views too.

Green Living Fund

Voting goes live from 12 February 2024 until 1 March 2024. All residents will have the ability to vote on what the budget can be spent on. The MOCC Core Paths group have submit a request to help fund the storage for our equipment. Receiving these funds will help the volunteers to continue clearing the core paths and ensuring they are passable and maintained for our everyday use.

Virgin Media / Diona Roadworks

A couple of weeks ago, Diona were working in Croft Wynd – short or no notice of works given to the residents, they started work early in the morning, and blocked people's drives.

The attitude of those working was not nice towards the residents, they reluctantly stopped work to allow residents out of their driveway to go to work etc. They have left a zig zag

of new patched tar on the pavement and the quality does not appear to be of the same quality as is currently there. They also came back on Sunday morning to finish off what they were not able to do earlier in the week as they were moving to a new site, Springfield Road on the Monday.

Last weekend the Stirling Road area had its broadband service cut for three days due to Diona snagging the Openreach cable and pulling it out of its connection. Originally the Openreach engineers suspected it was one fault that would be corrected by the end of the day. However, it was not fixed until the end of the third day as it appeared that Diona had caused four faults on the Openreach cables.

When the Diona workmen were approached, they were rude, very confrontational and tried to blame Openreach for having a cable in the way.

Cllr Watters, asked for all issues with Diona to be sent to him as there was a meeting with Virgin and Diona planned at the council.

The Diona workmen indicated that they will be back on South Street and the new houses in Curlers Way.

Milnathort Primary School Update - provided by Laura Watson

The pupils are continuing to support the road safety campaign and currently have a cardboard cut-out police officer, PC Kirsty that they will be putting out into the community and monitoring the impact.

The school have started a Wellbeing Wednesday to help promote physical and mental wellbeing, and the sports committee are looking at other extra-curricular sports. The P6's have started their skiing and the P7s visited the curling rink at Perth. They are also exploring the sport of Boccia, which is an accessible version of bowls.

The school had a visit from the PKC countryside trust, they are advising on what trees to plant around the school and helping with the outdoor curriculum.

Core Paths Update

In the process of ordering stone to infill the hollows on the Core Paths.

Waymarking

Waymarking Paths MTHT/131 (Hattonburn); MTHT/133 (Pacehill).

We'll liaise with the landowner and then organise a weekend task to waymark both paths.

Core Path - MTHT/127 Standing Stones

This Core Path has been ploughed over and effectively obliterated. A Core Path in Scotland is a designated route established by local authorities under the Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2003. Core Paths have an extra level of legal protection, as authorities have powers to keep these paths free from obstruction, even if landowners refuse to act. Dave

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Stubbs at PKC reports the case is still open, and officers have written to the landowner on several occasions regarding the obstruction to the Core Path but had no response. PKC will continue to pursue.

Potential Projects

Core Path running from footbridge beside golf course to Burleigh Road. There's a need to remove rocks and level out to allow flail to cut path.

Surfacing of boggy section of Path running west from Crow Wood. These are big undertakings and would need a contractor to do the work. We'll look at packaging both jobs together into one quote/funding application. The CECF (Community Environment Challenge Fund) may fund up to £10k but would require match funding.

The **Core Path at Stirling Road** was flailed on 18 December, the first step in re-establishing the Core Path.

Quote for the re-build of the wall east of Burleigh Castle has been received and is being considered.

PKC Community Greenspace have been given some money for groups who wish to improve biodiversity in their local area. We're applying for wildflower seed and a 10-sapling tree pack. Credit to PKC for cleaning up fly-tipped materials at Arlary Core Path.

We've applied to the Green Living Fund to pay for safe storage of the flail and the other equipment we use. We're through the first round, but our project is one of many that the public vote for, so there's an element of competition – if we don't get enough votes, we don't get the funding. We'd be so grateful if you could vote for Milnathort Core Paths Group. It's very easy, you don't have to register, you can just sign in with your Google or Facebook account or your Mygovscot account. Speedwatch

The 'speed gun' has been purchased and received, we will be scheduling training soon with Police Scotland.

We will also be running a logo competition inviting all the local primary schools to enter.

When set up we will be going out in groups of three, typically in areas we do not reside in. Details of any vehicle that is over the speed limit by a predefined value provided by Police Scotland will be noted, with car details and registration. Police Scotland will then use this information to contact the owner to let them know they were observed travelling over the speed limit. Presentation On New Kinross Pharmacy

A new pharmacy is proposed for the south of Kinross on the High Street, it is hoped that it will help take some of the burden from the Milnathort pharmacy where customers are travelling from Kinross, due to there being only one pharmacy in Kinross. They are hoping to provide not just the Pharmacy First but also Pharmacy First+ service. The owners are existing pharmacists in Kinglassie and Falkland and see that the Kinross-shire area needs another pharmacy to help the customers and the existing pharmacies which seem under pressure from the size of the area and the recent new builds.

There is a process that needs to be followed before a new pharmacy can be opened, which involves a consultation with the public to understand the need, then a hearing with the health board on the outcome of the consultation, before the health board will give a decision on whether the pharmacy is granted. From the start of the consultation to the granting of the pharmacy to pharmacy open is expected to take at least six months.

Bin Frequency collection – new grey recycle bin

The frequency of collection of the grey bin is not enough, people's bins are filling up very quickly, where these bins are only collected once a month however the green bin which is now not so full is still collected twice a month. This isn't the case for everyone, but can something be done to change the schedule.

Cllr Watters responded that the council will take a couple of months to review the data on the collections and will make a decision then as to whether any changes are needed, they do not want a knee jerk reaction that might require changing again at a later date.

Comments and questions from the floor

It was asked what would be happening about the core path around the field behind Carrs Billington and specifically the option of changing the path so that it exits at Mill Lade. This



is hopefully to be an alternate path for school kids back and forth from the new housing estate at Curlers Crescent to the primary and high school. The existing Core Path requires a crossing over the Fochy Burn, and exits at the field entrance just at the motorway slip road. Kevin responded that the landowner and farmer have a proposal which they planned to review late last year but this was cancelled due to the weather, so he will reach out to the landowner to understand what their plans are.

Councillors' Reports

Clir Cuthbert: Kinross shire committee will be held next Thursday 15 February. Some of the topics to be discussed are; road safety, Jackie Pepper will present on Care packages in Kinross.

Clir Watters: If you are lying in bed on bin day and get a whiff of a fish and chip van smell, unfortunately this is likely to come from the bin lorries as PKC expand their de-carbonisation of their vehicle fleet for larger vehicles. These large vehicles like bin lorries will change from diesel to vegetable oil, with the hope of moving to hydrogen.

The report for the strategic path network for the whole of PKC originally missed out Kinross-shire was previously missed out. The Kinross-shire Committee funds were earmarked to help identify areas of improvement across Kinross-shire to catch up with this omission, which will provide recommendations to produce a Kinross-shire wide path network plan that will also join together with the Fife network. Tactran have now offered to pay for this so that it will now not use KC funds.

Clir Robertson: We are hoping that as part of the 2024 road improvement activities the most dangerous crossing in Milnathort, the zebra crossing at South Street will be earmarked for replacing with a pelican crossing.

The budget will be difficult everything is up for review including grass cutting reduction, gritting on roads, and street cleaning. I recently wrote to NatureScot, when I was younger I would regularly see water voles on the North Queich, however they have no record of them being on either the North or South Queich's. Water voles are a barometer species.

Clir Freshwater: Road safety, there is a list of 120 projects in Kinross-shire with a review of what is being actioned and what is not being done in 2024, specifically the crossing on South Street.

AOB

Christmas lights: Thanks to all those that helped to put up and take down the Christmas tree and lights around the village, we hope to grow the number of lights each year.

Kinross-shire Committee: this will be next week, and Neill asked for the topic of cemetery provision to be brought up, however the person who would be speaking to this subject is currently off sick.

Solid, 10 year old trampoline. New safety net, but missing safety pad to cover springs (circa £50 to replace).

On 21 January 2024, local officers from Kinross were on patrol in High Street, Kinross when they stopped a car as it had no insurance. The driver was charged accordingly and car seized.

PC Samson and PS Craig have carried out visits at Kinross Day Centre and Rachel House hospice in Kinross in the last month, both of which were positive for engagement with the local community.

Matters Arising

Dog Fouling: Cllr D Cuthbert requested any incidents (where/ when) to be reported to him and he would follow this up.

Drain Cleaning: Cllr Cuthbert confirmed he had reported this to PKC and advised that cleaning was undertaken on a rotational basis. He requested that incidences be reporting using the myPKC portal.

Potholes: CCIIr P Chan reported a pothole around the drain at the Wilson Court junction which is causing drivers to service out to avoid it.

Kinross Town Centre

Burns Begg Street: lines had now been painted onto the road, and were slowing drivers down, the lines were already starting to chip off.

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Traffic Wardens: wardens had attended the town centre in the first week of January (evenings) but had not witnessed a lot of traffic. A request is to be made to ask them to attend again.

Mill Street Parking: drivers are parking over dropped kerbs and on pavements and Councillors were asked what could be done about this. The meeting was advised that if there were no lines then PKC have no authority over this, although parking attendants could be advised. A member of the public advised that there were two types of dropped kerbs — one which is put in front of a property and the other at a pedestrian crossing. It was also suggested that road traffic officers from Police Scotland are the only officers who could issue fines for this.

It was suggested that Kinross in Bloom be asked to place planters there to deter parking.

Bike Storage, Park and Ride: Cllr N Freshwater advised that the bike storage facility at the park and ride was missing, and PKC were looking to implement a 'smart storage' option.

Millbridge Hall Car Park: CCllr Wells advised that the car park requires several repairs and was advised that these should be reported via the myPKC portal.

Car Park behind Hunters: had now been power washed resulting in the parking bays being clearly seen.

High Street Parking Restriction: CCllr Wells asked for an update on the timescale for the removal of the restrictions. Cllr Cuthbert advised he did not currently know the timescale but that he was meeting with PKC in a few weeks and would be asking for an update.

Cllr Freshwater suggested a meeting be arranged between PKC, the road safety teams and KCC to discuss the list of concerns in the town, and it was agreed that Cllr Cuthbert would circulate list for the CC to review and update.

Councillors' Reports

Clir Cuthbert advised that there had been a full meeting of PKC the day before where several items had been discussed, including the potential closure of leisure centre facilities, as well as the budget for 2024/25.

Reports from KCC Councillors

CCIIr M Wilson enquired about the cleaning of road signs and CIIr Cuthbert confirmed he had asked PKC about this previously, but it was not something they would routinely undertake.

CCIIr P Chan advised that the metal barrier at Gallowhill Road/ Lomond Place was on an uneven surface and asked if this could be levelled. He was advised to report the matter via the myPKC portal.

CCIIr Mckay commented on the size of the grey bins advising that they were not big enough. CIIr Cuthbert confirmed that PKC were evaluating this issue and that they would be refusing to empty any bins with 'illegal' contents. He also advised that it was possible to order another grey bin, noting that they were currently out of stock.

CCIIr Mckay also advised that the Davies Park upgrade was on track for Spring.

CCIIr Mckay enquired whether it was possible to fit traffic cameras in the High Street and in Millbridge Hall car park. CIIr Cuthbert felt that this could be done and suggested CCIIr Mckay write to PKC.

CCIIr Mckay, on behalf of CCIIr E Leslie, queried where the 'Keep Clear' signs for the primary school were on the list of works to be undertaken in the town.

CCIIr Freeman advised that he had renewed the Data Controller licence on behalf of KCC. He has been unable to progress the purchase of a camera for the telephone box due to KCC not receiving their budget from PKC.

Correspondence

CCIIr Mckay advised that an email had been received from a resident of the flats near Mill Street car park regarding the possibility of improving the cycle infrastructure improvements at the car park.

The resident advised that they have a number of neighbours who use bicycles but there are no storage facilities so the bicycles are kept on stairwells, in cupboards and in the flats themselves. They feel that the area would benefit from utilising the Cycle Storage and Parking Fund (Residential Cycle Storage and Parking Fund — Cycling Friendly — Our Programmes — Cycling Scotland) to allow for the installation of a shelter for residential use, including other nearby and surrounding flats.

The resident also feels that with Mill Street being one of the largest central car parks in the area, it is frequently abused by frequent pavement parking, and has no provision for electric charging or any bike shelters or other even basic storage, and they had therefore contacted the CC for advice on how to progress this matter.

Members agreed with the residents' points and it was agreed that they should be invited to a future meeting to discuss their concerns further.

CCllr Freeman advised that an email from a representative of Glendale Security Systems, based in The Muirs, had been

received. The representative advised that while the company had been going since 1990, it had recently been taken over by the owner's daughter and she was looking for the community to support her in her business. The email had been passed to *Kinross Newsletter* for them to contact the new owner about a possible article.

It was noted that several meetings were arranged for the next few weeks and it would be beneficial for the KCC to be represented. These meetings were:


News from the December meeting

Present at the meeting on 12 December were Cllrs N Freshwater, W Robertson, R Watters; CCllrs A Miller, D Morris, A Davidson, S McGregor, K Donaldson, D Paterson; and 2 members of the public **Apologies**: Cllr D Cuthbert.

Matters Arising

Kinross-shire Committee Update

The Vice-Chair had attended the KC meeting on 23/11/23. It was a satisfactory meeting. One of the main issues was the absence of Kinross-shire from Tacktran planning maps for building connected path networks and this was recognised as



requiring resolution. PKC to bring a plan of action for the first KC meeting in 2024. Cllr R Watters flagged funds that the KC has from 2023, and 2024, to use that money up to the Tacktran funding. Sustrans funding to be allocated. PKC Officer to drive forward these projects for Kinross-shire.

Road Safety Action Update

PCC had received a communication from Bowhouse residents regarding the proposed and agreed 40mph speed limit between Scotlandwell and Bowhouse, still awaiting action from the first meeting of the KC, some 24 months previously. Cllr W Robertson had approached PKC Roads but had received notification that the project would be delayed until the end of March/April 2024 as a Road Safety Officer had resigned from the team and this would cause delays with implementation of projects. Cllr Robertson had been told that funding would be used to secure another position to the Roads Safety team. There was concern that funding for this position was only for 1 year, and that the position would not be filled. Dept Chief Exec had promised to resolve the issue. The Chair did not accept that PKC resourcing and funding to be the major reason that the Bowhouse 40mph limits had not been actioned. Cllrs W Robertson and D Cuthbert and N Freshwater met with Daryl McEown to outline priorities and one of these priorities had been the 40mph limit signs, at this meeting the reason given for the delay was that legals had not been actioned at that point. The Chair pointed out the legals are now complete and the signs are scheduled to be put up at end of March/April 2024 so he considered that the work should now be completed. Residents attending the call asked what the route of escalation would be if the March/April 2024 action date was not met? Cllr W Robertson suggested that escalation would be via a local Member of

Parliament. As a first line Cllr W Robertson suggested that PCC and Residents write to Chief Executive at PKC with a complaint on this issue, with CC to the Cllrs.

The Chair thanked Cllr K Donaldson for putting together wording for GDPR for Speedwatch which will assist with moving project forward.

Cllr D Morris raised issue of painting of yellow box to be painted on the road at Bruce Road and Bishop Terrace junction to prevent parking where there was a crossing for the Primary School children had a crossing


Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path

Entire upper section of path, from Community Woodland to Church, is likely to receive support from the landowners with a feasibility study the next step. It was agreed that to complete the upper section would improve the path, even if the lower section from the Church to Scotlandwell was not yet completed. If the entire upper section was approved, then the Chair would write to the landowner with regard to the lower section. There has been no response from the landowner at all to any communication from PCC. Cllr D Morris had suggested there would be additional funding for strategic routes and this was one of the strategic routes identified to the Tacktran map.

Play Facilities at Scotlandwell Green

It was thought work would commence in early 2024 which is welcome news. There was a commuted sum from H54 and enhanced funding from ScotGov for the play facilities, The Chair had requested the commuted sum be ringfenced for other community projects in Portmoak. Many other worthy causes in Portmoak could benefit from the commuted sum. Cllr D Cuthbert sent the details of the planning report and this had indicated the commuted sum funding must be used for the ongoing upkeep of the play facilities. There was discussion about the allocation of





the commuted sum for the play facilities only when it could be used to benefit many worthy projects within Portmoak. Funding for the play facilities is already in place with 25 years lifespan. Cllr W Robertson has written to PKC to enquire if any alteration to the policy is possible. The Chair thought the allocation was pointless given that the playpark was about to be upgraded from other funds. Cllr R Watters advised that from a legal perspective the commuted sum must be spent as directed, after 10yrs the money is paid back to the developer. It was suggested that a local campaign to identify another piece of equipment that the children would like to have and use the money rather than lose it.

Portmoak Church – the future for the church and car park

Chair outlined the potential problem of the loss. November meeting agreed to have a Community Consultation meeting to see what could be done with the church building. Community Consultation meeting was likely to be sometime in January 2024.

Sustainability Group Meeting: report from last meeting 21/11/23:

PCC members had not managed to attend the last meeting regarding windfarms proposed in the Ochils. Cllr R Watters outlined on the possibility for Community Councils to collaborate and ensure payback for their communities that would ensure local improvements. If all the developments proceed then seven CCs stand to benefit with funds allocated on a sliding scale with many options that need to be discussed, researched and agreed carefully.

New Matters

Updated Scheme of Establishment for CCs from 1 Jan 2024

The CC does not need to formally adopt the new Scheme of Establishment, it would automatically come into effect on 1 January 2024. The SofE document is available at PKC website if members of the public would like to view it.

Kinross Half Marathon 2024: Road Closures on Sunday 12 May 2024

Notice had come to PCC about the forthcoming event in 2024. The 2023 event seemed to have been run very smoothly and PCC would continue to liaise with the organisers and support where possible.

Reports

Police Reports

Police liaison had not been available to attend the meeting and had sent their apologies.

Planning

New Applications

23/01999/FLL Erection of storage shed Causeway Cottage, Scotlandwell

PCC members had reviewed the application and had no comments on the application.

Existing Applications

22/01191/FLL Erection of 16 dwellinghouses (three with detached garages, one with detached garage/ancillary accommodation), formation of six plots for affordable dwellinghouses, formation of SUDS pond, landscaping and associated works, land 100 metres south east of Cragton Villa Rost Gardens, Scotlandwell.

Cllr D Morris had attended the planning committee meeting. The H54 development had been approved in principle. The Chair had subsequently corresponded with PKC planning regarding his reservations about the site investigation, as there were significant risk concerns that had not been dealt with in the planning application. A response had been received from D Littlejohn stating note had been taken of the Chair's letter. PCC hoped PKC did not ignore the knowledge base of locals. Cllr K Donaldson suggested that PCC write to ScotGov to flag that the peat removal issue had not been properly addressed. Cllr D Morris felt PKC were deliberately misleading the Cllrs in as much as from a planning point of view it was irrelevant what soil formed the first metre, the investigation had shown 'peaty soil' which was unsurprising as the field had been farming land. They were hiding behind SEPA in making this statement. D Morris raised concerns about the competence of SEPA. The Chair was particularly interested in the supporting documents which show peat. Ground gas was also a concern, as it has led to the demolition of properties in other areas of Scotland. Additional investigations and work need to be done on the site.

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Cllr W Robertson reminded the meeting that H54 was in the LDP2, as agreed with the community. If PKC had refused the application every chance it would be passed at appeal. Cllr D Morris suggested that at the time the LDP was drawn up there was no knowledge of the substrate or soil type. At the time of the creation of the LDP, there was no opposition in principle to the use of the site for building. On the affordable housing plots on the site, these were also still an issue, which made the H54 site a test site for the policy. Cllr R Watters highlighted that it was important to make affordable housing affordable in perpetuity using mechanisms such as careful burdens on the properties, shared equity, help to buy, affordable housing plots were only one aspect.

The Chair asked the assembled meeting to agree if PCC should remove the item from the agenda or retain it and take it forward to the Scottish Government. The PCC members were in agreement with this approach to take the planning application to the Scottish Government.

Broadband Update

Blairadam Area

The final phase to connect up the remaining properties in the Blairadam area has moved into the design and planning stage with Openreach. The next update on the project is due from Openreach in April and it is hoped that the project will be completed later this year.

Drainage

Cleish

There has been no progress to remediating the drainage problems raised at the last meeting; this has been due to the continued bad weather and poor ground conditions.

In addition to the flooding referred to above there may also be a blocked culvert in an adjacent field – the CC will investigate and speak to the landowner to see if this problem can be rectified.

A fresh drainage issue has been identified in Cleish main street where a recently repaired gully has stopped draining water and is now flooding, and causing further problems as the road around the gully is eroding. This issue was raised with Cllr Watters who attended the meeting and inspected the problem.

It has been noted by several members of the community that the drainage problems are causing problems with access to the church and graveyard.

Keltybridge

The gully at the foot of the Dullomuir Farm Road continues to cause problems with flooding, and during winter this area of the road and pavement was completely iced over, leading to

one of the residents of Keltybridge falling and being seriously injured.

The Community Council sent best wishes for a speedy recovery. Sean Gordon spoke to the PKC Roads Department in early January, and they agreed that the drain needed to be repaired so that it functioned correctly. Cllr Watters will speak to the roads department to determine a likely date for this work.

Local Place Plan

As noted in the minutes from the previous CC meeting, the CC would like to explore the possibility of creating a Local Place Plan for Cleish & Blairadam, to reflect the views of the community on how they would like the community to develop over the coming years. The Local Place Plan is the most effective way that a local community can express their vision for the future of their local area as the council is required to take into account any existing Local Place Plan when looking at planning applications.

The Local Place Plan for Cleish and Blairadam would need to be submitted by September 2024 to be considered as part of the next PKC Local Development Plan which will run from 2027 to 2037.

Cleish and Blairadam CC plan to canvas the local community in the coming months to gauge interest in developing a Local Place Plan for Cleish and Blairadam, and in the meantime if you have an interest in helping develop or contributing to this plan please reach out to the CC at: cleishandblairadamcc@gmail.com

Windfarm Community Benefits

The CC attended a meeting with the sustainability group which is looking for a way to have the local Community Councils work together to coordinate our negotiations with the wind farm developers in relation to the benefits and community funding which is made available as part of any windfarm development.

There are good examples from around Scotland where groups of Community Councils have come together to collaborate and to negotiate a better deal for the community, and the Cleish & Blairadam Community Council would like to explore this option. With this in mind we will shortly be surveying everyone in the local area to understand how the community would like to proceed, and to gauge the interest in our CC joining with the nearby CCs for the overall benefit of the community.

The goal will be to complete the survey before the next CC meeting where the results of the survey will be shared, and a decision will be made on how to proceed.

The next Cleish & Blairadam Community Council Meeting will be held on Monday 22 April, at 7.30pm in the Tabernacle Hall in Keltybridge. Please note the change of venue as we are now restarting the practice of holding the CC meetings in alternating locations to better serve the community.

Glenfarg Community Council

News from the January meeting

Present at the meeting on 8 January were: CCllrs Fraser, Pilmer, Christie, Murray, Ponton, MacLeod, Smart, Cllr Freshwater, and four MoP.

Apologies: Cllrs Cuthbert and Robertson, PC Samson

Police Report

In PC Samson's absence CCIIr Pilmer advised on the following: 28 calls and two crimes reported.

Overgrown Path

CCIIr Pilmer reported that he had inspected the area of concern in relation to a footpath from Copperfields to Callford Brae adjoining Main Street. The footpath has become overgrown with vegetation and needs being landscaped. Photographs and a written statement were passed on to CIIr Robertson who was to pass the matter on to the relevant PKC department for remedial activity to be carried out.

Meetings

Speedwatch Meeting

CCIIr Ponton had attended a local Speedwatch community meeting recently and reported that it was very positive with funding in place. A Speed Monitor device is planned for purchase and the next stage is for members of the community to be encouraged to apply for a volunteer's position. Trainee positions are looking to be filled (a pool of as many as possible) and they would operate in local areas. The matter is to be advertised locally through media and will outline the recruitment process and likely subjects e.g. H&S, GDPR, use of equipment, what to do and not to do, on-line training, discussion with the Police. Further information will be made public nonetheless, a website to assist is www. communityspeedwatch.org. It was discussed further about engaging with the local primary school to design a poster for public display.

Sustainability Group Meeting (Wind Turbines)

CCIIr Ponton reported that the SG meeting had a visit by another CC group to share information regarding the setting up of a combined group with the aim of communicating and negotiating with potential energy developments. Glenfarg is working with another six neighbouring CCs to find the best way forward for the community.

Kinross-shire Meeting

CCIIr Smart reported that he had attended the meeting on behalf of the GCC and that the topic of biodiversity and maintenance was raised. CCIIr Smart outlined that PKC had vision of 'cutting back' on the amount of grass and other vegetation activities that it carries out that in turn would or could create a more biodiverse existence for its many greenspaces within P&K. Whilst the benefits could be realised - rewilding, plants, birds, maintenance costs, direct labour reductions, it was met with a concern that areas of greenspace could become overgrown and unkempt. It was noted further that green areas relating to road way footpaths with verges and junctions' 'line of sight' for pedestrians, other vulnerable groups and vehicle users may be compromised with safety as a fact of being at risk. The vision was met with concern and that in our area it would need to be monitored such as our local junctions and path ways, our Wallace Park, and other areas. CCIIr Smart reported further on a discussion about a network of paths featuring north/south and east/west in the area as a vison for a national path route.

Scottish Water Glenfarg Water Treatment Works upgrade

CCllrs Fraser and Christie are part of the Liaison Group, along with representatives from Scottish Water and the project team, who in turn reported on a recent meeting. Notes of the meeting are available for reading on the Community Council page of the Glenfarg.org village website. CCllr Fraser confirmed that this would be the relevant reference point for information relating to the topic and that it was conveyed to the area through email and social media. CCIIr Fraser commented on the willingness of Scottish Water to listen to concerns plus the objections from the original planning application and to work with PKC Planning to address all matters. Matters such as a footpath extension from Church Brae to Glendy junction, locating a parking area on Church Brae/Lomond Bank and the possibility of a Community Benefit Fund were raised too. It was understood at this GCC Business meeting that no formal planning approval has been granted to date. The GCC believes that the matter is pending and that we should be notified of a PKC Planning decision mid to late January 2024 at the earliest.

Lochelbank Wind Farm Panel Meeting

CCIIr Pilmer reported that, at the last LWFP business meeting, chaired by Foundation Scotland in November 2023, a funding application on behalf of the local Scout Group had been made for: the purchase of a Steel Shipping Container, the requisite associated works and that its proposed siting would be within the grounds of the Village Hall. CCIIr Pilmer confirmed that he had not supported the funding application and offered an alternative solution but that the matter was still pending given the facts that the funding application was not made known formally to the newly formed Trustee committee for the Village

Hall nor that a Planning application had been submitted to PKC Planning. The new Chair of the Village Hall Trustees, who attended the GCC business meeting, confirmed that the matter was unknown and that he would contact Foundation Scotland directly. He requested CCllr Pilmer to forward on to him the contact details of Foundation Scotland's LWFP representative. **Addendum:** A Lochelbank Community Fund Grants Poster is displayed in the GCC Notice Board and the next round for Funding applications will close on Tuesday 13 February. Thereafter the other dates are Tuesday 18 June and Tuesday 24 September 2024.

Flooding Issues

CCIIr Christie and R. Stewart PKC (Flooding) had carried out a walk and visual survey of The Avenue and related areas where water is flooding through gardens, encroaching properties, and affecting the Greenbank's Road, Avenue and Crescent and the Main Street too. It was discussed that drains, gullies, culverts sump or sumps require to be inspected and cleaned with a particular requirement for drains to be inspected by a camera survey. Some work was believed to have been carried out although further work is now a necessity. It was confirmed that another area of flooding exists at the junction of Main Street and Marinden Park whereby Scottish Water had attended. However, it is believed that drainage is a factor to this problem and that it will require to be addressed by PKC. A bilge pump was discussed as a public asset for use in an emergency by known/possible property/properties once again. However, it was noted that a property's owners in Greenbank Road had now purchased their own piece of equipment to alleviate a potential flooding threat. Update for March GCC business meeting.

Village Inn Update

A member of the public gave an update on the latest news about this topic. That the existing liaison group between the Village Hall Trustees, Village Inn representative and GCC's CCllr has been suspended. The reason being, because on behalf of the Village Inn group working in association with the new Village Hall Trustees, a new architect has been engaged along with a surveyor for part of the Village Hall Schoolhouse to have a report and drawings constructed to give a vision on a future relationship with the community facilities. This was met with approval by those in attendance and it is hoped that a new vision can now take place formally with the public being invited for comments. Another update will be forthcoming at the next GCC business meeting.

Glenfarg Transport Group

CCIlrs Smart and Fraser reported that the GTG is continuing to go from strength to strength. GTG have recently received excellent coverage in the media and that the community





bus ownership was being increased with another vehicle now amounting to six. Passenger weekly use numbers had increased with the number of 400 being recorded recently. CCllr Smart stated further that early in 2024 the CTG plan to operate a trial for an Hourly Service to Perth with flexibility built in allowing for drop off/collection places. It is hoped that the Scottish Government Minister for Transport will make a visit and that more community trips are planned for a social aspect timetable – Stirling, Livingston, Glasgow SECC. More information to follow at the next Business Meeting.

A member of the public commented further about the advertising revenue for the village newsletter and that to date, for 2024, there were 12 subscribers. It is hoped that more advertisers will come forward because advertising assists with the financial upkeep of the Newsletter.

A discussion took place regarding the funding of the Christmas lights and that it is an expenditure that is becoming costly year on year. Cllr Freshwater was able to advise on how our neighbouring community of Kinross funds its Christmas lights and this was noted. It is hoped that we can source funding for our Christmas lights to allow us to spend our budget more frugally.

AOCB

A member of the public offered services, on behalf of his local Church, from a community benefit Rapid Response team. The RR team has responded to community issues in the Perth area previously – flooding and working with the Fire & Rescue service to provide community aid as volunteers. Specifically, for the Glenfarg area, an offer was made to monitor and to grit/ salt the Glenfarg to Duncrievie road for the removal/abeyance of a frosty/snowy road surface. This has come to light due to a car sliding into a ditch around the double S bend area located towards the village entrance/exit in the vicinity of the 30mph village signage and bordering the Copperfield's footpath to Duncrievie. The offer was met with agreement nonetheless, because the roadway is under the ownership and jurisdiction of PKC it was noted that the road (C Class) would be salted but on a descending scale of priority. The matter was discussed and that PKC should be approached for comment and advice. CCIIr Fraser thanked the member of the public for the community offer then stated, that for the record, pavement gritting that is carried out by volunteers, within the village, that they had to be on an approved list and covered by insurance for this activity. This may well extend to the offer by the RR team if agreed. Further investigation about the offer is to be enquired about and that he instructed the secretary to contact PKC for advice and report back to the GCC and the member of the public.

The next meeting of Glenfarg Community Council will be on Monday 4 March 2024.

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WILDLIFE CRIME

WILDLIFE CRIME IS ANY illegal act in Scotland affecting certain birds, animals, and plants including their habitats. It includes the illegal disturbance, destruction, theft, and sale of animals and plants both in the countryside and urban areas, and also the damage and destruction of protected habitats. Wildlife Crime poses significant harm to the species targeted by the criminals, as well as the communities who rely on wildlife for employment and tourism. Some examples of types of Wildlife Crime include:

- Damage to Sites of Special Scientific Interest
- · The disturbance of sea mammals
- Illegal use of traps and snares
- · Illegal cockle picking
- Removal of birds' nests from the eves of houses at certain times of the year.

There are currently seven specific Wildlife Crime Priorities in Scotland and the UK.

- Bat Crime
- Badger Persecution
- Raptor (Birds of Prey) Persecution
- Freshwater Pearl Mussels Persecution
- CITES (Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species) Issues
- Poaching
- Cyber Enabled Wildlife Crime

Although any officer can investigate wildlife crime, every Division in Police Scotland has a Wildlife Crime Liaison Officer and there is also a network of part-time Wildlife Crime Officers across the force.

These officers can be contacted to report a crime or to seek advice on wildlife crime matters. Call Police Scotland on 101 to report a wildlife crime or email us at *Contactus@scotland.pnn.police.uk* If you suspect a wildlife crime is/has taken place

DO:

- Report any suspicious activity as soon as possible to Police Scotland on 101 or 999 if it is an emergency, and ask to speak to a Wildlife Crime Officer if one is available
- Take note of the date, time, and weather conditions
- If possible, identify a map reference using the My Three Words app, or ideally a GPS reading of both the incident scene and location from where you witnessed the incident
- Note a description of person/s involved including gender, age, height, clothing, etc.
- Write down any vehicle registration numbers, make, model, and colour that may be involved
- Identify other witnesses and obtain their name and contact details
- If possible, video or photograph the scene, or make a rough sketch
- Cover up any suspected poisoned baits or victims to prevent any animal or person from coming into contact with them.
- Do report. Even if you are not sure report the incident. The evidence of wildlife crime is not always obvious.

DO NOT

- Do not disturb the scene by moving items or walking about unnecessarily
- Do not touch dead animals or birds, especially if you suspect that poison may have been used
- **Do not interfere** with legal countryside practices such as the legal use of traps and snares, hides, high seats, and shooting butts.

NEVER:

 Never approach suspects or intervene if you suspect someone is committing a wildlife crime – you may put yourself in danger. The Crown Office & Procurator Fiscal Service also has a dedicated Wildlife and Environmental Crime Unit; working together we aim to ensure our officers are trained to the highest level to ensure thorough investigation and prosecution of wildlife crime.







We also celebrated Valentine's Day. Our dining room was decorated with hearts, flowers and some very tasty chocolates. Everyone should have the feeling of being loved.



Saturday 16 March, Cupar to Hill of Tarvit Circular

From the centre of Cupar the walk proceeds south east to Tarvit Farm and continues to the Hill of Tarvit. Passing Scotstarvit Tower, we then travel north along rough paths and field edges, returning to Cupar along the banks of the River Eden. Booking is essential. Walking poles recommended.

Sunday 31 March, Crieff Hosh-Knock-Hosh

A circular, undulating walk through attractive woodlands, eventually ascending 250m to the Knock which affords panoramic views across Strathearn. Booking is essential.





Crook and Drum Growing Together

As the snowdrops appear in mid-February, we look forward to another growing season in Crook of Devon and Drum. Crocuses will follow in the new

bed at the village hall, followed by dwarf daffodils in our planters and the community orchard. We are planning an interpretive sign for the orchard area, with funding from the Fossoway Community Benefit Fund.

By the end of March, we'll see many daffodils around the village, including 2000 new native ones around the edge of Waulkmill Park. These are part of our plans to encourage biodiversity, with more trees, and suitable flowers for pollinating insects.

PKC are making some plants available to Bloom groups to help with this aim, including some shrubs and native hedging, as well as wildflower seed. We have also been lucky to be granted eight fruit trees from the Tree Council's Golden Orchards project. They will be planted around the middle of March, once the positions are agreed with the Council. We will also include suitable plants such as marigolds in our planters this summer, to look attractive while being suitable for insects.





We are also going to be working with Fossoway Primary School, to advise them about biodiversity and growing some edible plants.






Soroptomist International of Perth

SI Perth President Jean Black welcomed Soroptimists from SI Perth, guests from SI Clubs in Aberdeen, Dundee, Easter Ross, Paisley and an associate member, to our February club meeting. Alison Harrison introduced the speaker, Sandra Jones, from the NSPCC, whose presentation informed us about the work and activities of the NSPCC, formed over 130 years ago, to keep children safe. The date of the meeting, 6 February, had been chosen specifically for this presentation because it coincided with the International Day of Zero Tolerance to Female Genital Mutilation.

Sandra explained that 90% of the income of the NSPCC comes from donations, which enable the organisation to provide a 24/7 Childline service. Other important areas of work include campaigning and





examples include the Speak Out, Stay Safe programme, which is a preventive programme taken into schools, offering workshops and speaking at assemblies. Sessions teach children to recognise abuse and neglect, encouraging and giving them the confidence to speak out in such situations. These workshops are year specific, tailored appropriately to the respective ages of children. On average, for every primary school class, two children will have suffered abuse or neglect.

In addition to Childline, another telephone service exists for adults concerned about children. This is called NSPCC Helpline. It costs £4 to answer every call. Sandra said that, by the end of her presentation, 80 children would have made contact locally or nationally. The organisation had dealt with 10,119 cases in the last year. Currently, they can answer only 3 out of every 4 calls.

Thanks to the work of NSPCC, the Online Safety Bill will now be considered by the House of Lords and 80 businesses, with an NSPCC presence. The NSPCC needs more counsellors and the cost for each one is £1,600. Typically, a new volunteer will support 200 children in their first year. A few examples of the type of activity someone might become involved with by volunteering included Book Scheme Co-ordinator, Co-ordinator for fundraising fashion/ special events and Co-ordinator of Volunteers.

Another campaign taken into schools features a character called 'Pantosaurus', who engages with children to 'Talk Pants', teaching them that their bodies belong to them and again, to speak out about concerns. The vote of thanks was given by Alison Harrison.

This year the school are celebrating local birds and that ties in with curriculum work on migration and coping with climate, which several classes are doing.

Kinross and District Men's Shed offered to make the nest box kits; bird box experts David and Linda Gibson supervised the design and installation, while members of our woodland group and staff from Woodland Trust Scotland helped out on the day.



Teachers, teaching assistants and a number of parents accompanied three groups of children on the walk from the school to the 'workshop' in Portmoak village hall. Then they watched as teams of us climbed ladders to fix up the boxes. The pupils had decorated them with beautiful pictures of nature, so not only cosy homes for the nesting birds but an art exhibition to enjoy if you are in Kilmagad Wood.

It was organised by PCWG member Dave Batchelor, who began to plan the event last summer and was delighted everything worked out: 'It was as perfect an example of a whole community coming together as you could imagine. Even the weather cooperated'.

Lunch for the Men's Shed, et al, was provided by the group. There was lots of soup and home baking, not to mention hot fruit crumbles. They have been a feature at all recent events.

Over the past month dozens of crumbles, with ever more exotic fillings, have been created by group member Marje Smith. That might explain why we have had lots of volunteers helping to pull birch out of the Moss!

We are grateful to both the Bog Squad and NatureScot for giving a day each of their time. There was a team of 11 from the Bog Squad and 8 from NatureScot which, together with our own volunteers, amounted to a fantastic 93 'person hours' of labour put into the bog restoration work.



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
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

Bonding Time For Goldeneye

MARCH IS THE PERFECT time to get out around the loch as we make our way into Spring. Snowdrops are already out around the trail with dandelions looking like they'll be opening up soon. Goldeneye have started displaying, and the sounds of bird songs are getting louder as birds start looking for nesting territories and mates. Mute swans get extremely territorial, and you'll often see pairs chasing each other on the water.

In February we had a fantastic nest box making event on Valentine's Day, with 30 nest boxes being made and taken home, which will hopefully provide a safe space for a pair of garden birds. With the Easter holidays fast approaching we are working on more free events to be held at Loch Leven, so please keep an eye on our social media for updates on this.

Our volunteers were a great help at the nest box event, using their immeasurable knowledge to help visitors with tool use and explaining the importance of helping wildlife. They are also busy working on some willow anti-erosion defence on

the South Queich, helping to stop the river banks from washing away during high rainfall.

Our Trout in the Classroom project is underway again this year, with Kinross, Milnathort, Arngask and Portmoak primary schools all having classes involved. Each class was given a tank with 75 Ova (Brown Trout eggs) and were tasked with monitoring there progress. Late February the eggs had all started hatching into tiny Alevin, and in the first week of March we will be heading out to local water sources, all of which lead back into the loch, to release them.

As the weather starts to get nicer and the loch starts to get busier, we know a lot of people enjoy comping or paddle boarding, and we highly encourage people to follow all SOAC guidance and our own local guidance to protect the nature reserve. If you're camping please do not have a fire, bring a proper camping stove and keep it off the ground, and keep an eye out for our change of water access coming in April, where we ask people to stay away from the shoreline to avoid nesting birds and young broods.

NatureScot is hiring two seasonal reserve officers to help with public engagement, habitat management and protecting the reserve this year. One post will be full time from April to October and the other will be part-time from mid-May to mid-September.

A MESSAGE FROM NATURESCOT

There is currently no water access on the loch until April. This means no kayaks, paddleboards, swimmers or any variation on those! This is to protect the massive population of wintering wildfowl. We must do everything we can to protect them from any disturbance. Thank you in advance for your co-operation.

These posts will cover weekends, to ensure that we have a staff presence on site during busier times, engaging with visitors, answering questions and encouraging responsible behaviour. There will also be opportunities to get involved with practical management and wildlife surveys. Pining For Spring



DESPITE THE BITTERLY COLD winds and the snow dusting the hills surrounding the loch reminding us winter is very much still clinging on, it's exciting to see the signs of spring starting to take light. From bursts of white snowdrops spreading throughout the woodlands to bird song filling the air as they warm up for breeding season, these familiar signs never seem to get old. In addition to these beautiful springtime sights, we've had the joy of having incredible bird of prey sightings recently with a sparrowhawk, peregrine, short-eared owl and five buzzards at once, all having been spotted flying across the reserve on the hunt for food. On the wetlands we have seen familiar sightings of large numbers of teal, wigeon and, at least 280 curlew as well as a regular visit from a little egret. Goldfinch and greenfinch have also become quite regular sightings in our woodlands, along with several hare bounding through. We have additionally had a very exciting visitor to the reserve who has been spotted numerous times on our wildlife cameras, a pine marten.

As we begin the ramp up to the breeding season, our reserve team have been hard at work making sure the reserve fencing is secure, clearing vegetation and brush cutting around the site to ensure that the vegetation levels are the perfect height levels for our incoming visiting lapwings. Our volunteers have also been tirelessly working to develop the new Sensory Cottage Garden which is starting to take shape beside the front woodlands as

you head towards the Visitor Centre from the car park. The plans for this look spectacular so be sure to keep your eye out for its development as their work progresses.

In the cafe, the team have been busy coming up with new creations and are looking forward to introducing some delicious new recipes in time for Easter. In the shop, we have also just received some gorgeous new stock with new stationery, scarves, and gifts just in time for Mother's Day. Why not come check it out and grab a cheeky wee slice of one of our delicious new cakes while you're here?

As we move into March we are looking forward to our new March Mystery Trail, running from Saturday 2-Sunday 24 March at just £2 per trail sheet, which can simply be purchased from the visitor centre on the day. Can you follow the trail and work out what our mystery creature is?

Our second-hand book sale is also returning in March, from Tuesday 12 March until Tuesday 9 April, with some fantastic new stock. Farming

Nappy Feet

IF YOU'VE SEEN ME in the supermarket buying nappies, I can explain, it's part of the process of picking up the pieces from the wet and stormy weather that hasn't eased for months.

Looking back to last autumn one of the highlights was celebrating Mum and Dad's golden wedding anniversary. Their wedding day in 1973 was dry and sunny, the reception was held on the banks of Loch Lomond and it made the perfect backdrop for photos, so we booked a meal at a lovely restaurant overlooking the loch on the 6th October to bring all the family together to celebrate. Fifty years on however and the weather was a different story, we almost didn't make it as floods had washed away a bridge and fallen trees closed nearly all the roads. Six months have passed since then and we've experienced another two storms and have not had many consecutive dry days since. The rain has just kept coming at us, it's been relentless and on the farm it's livestock that have suffered.

In between showers, a wee bit of fencing has been achieved and a 'bargain' piece of silage machinery is undergoing serious surgery in the workshop. Currently it remains in a state of deconstruction, it has been an expensive repair job but excellent wet weather project. There is no doubt it's been a very long wet winter for us all.

On a positive note, I'm quite glad to have discovered podcasts to get me through. I'm maybe at the coos tail regarding the trend of listening to these audio conversations from an app on my phone, but I'm most definitely hooked. I've picked off most of the ones I can find to do with motherhood, I love these ones, where celebrities share their experiences of parenting or the juggle of daily life, spinning plates kind of stuff that I can relate to. But then last month I stumbled on the podcasts that are produced by the farming community, quite a few presented by Scottish farmers, talking to each other about their own unique farming systems and challenges. The relaxed nature of the podcast makes it feel like a chat and I feel the guests open up, often revealing the inner workings of their businesses and explaining how they cope with their farming life. It's a cross between a training session and an episode of Graham Norton with the entertainment and banter meaning non farmers are listening too. What a privilege to be a fly on the wall to these conversations and what a great way to promote our industry authentically.

But back to the rain which has been especially hard on our sheep, a batch of 140 ewe lambs suffered badly, they got too thin and we just couldn't get them to start to thrive. We lost a few and vet investigation showed it was pneumonia that killed them but a high worm count that was making them

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thin. We've treated them and moved them to a fresh field but they will be much smaller when they go to the tup due to this setback. The hybrid tups that we purchased last August for the late lambing flock worked hard but of course the fields were sodden all the time and this had an impact on their feet. Both tups that were running in the wettest field came out from the ewes in January but are still lame this week. So in an unusual move we have brought them inside to let them rest for a few days on straw and then turned each one up. We trimmed the hoof, cleaned it up, applied copper sulphate to promote healing and then wrapped it up in the size 5 nappy. It's the perfect bandage, super absorbent and the wee sticky tabs hold it in place whilst I wrap it up completely with duct tape. The sore feet are now dry and will get a chance to heal up properly I hope. If we are lucky, spring will bring in a different weather front to ease the pressure on our stock and I think I'll have to purchase a pair of earplugs to keep up on the podcasts during lambing.



Obituary

Iain Woodhurst Dougal Forde, FRIAS

10.11.38 - 7.12.24: by Susan, his wife of over 62 years

IAIN WD FORDE was an architect, an artist, a jazz musician and a writer in Scots. He was an Edinburgh man: born, brought up, educated, and practised architecture in Edinburgh.

He designed Causewayend, the house we built in Scotlandwell, when we came to live in this beautiful part. Later – being Scottish vernacular, as well as Scandinavian – it was included in the Scotlandwell Conservation Area as fitting in with the 'fermtoun', and he also had a hand in other Portmoak houses. He liked to construct on the smaller scale as well: from garden seats and tables through sawhorses and raised beds to climbing frames, sit-outeries and sheds – especially log ones. A keen gardener he worked hard to turn the former Wellside Motors car park into a place of trees, bushes and flowers, with a cage for vegetables, and supported Scotlandwell in Bloom.

Many of his paintings and sculptures were exhibited by the Scottish Society of Architect Artists, including some in Venice and Paris. Others are in the house and the garden. He played the pipes at school with the Cadet Corps and as a jazz drummer in Edinburgh bands from his schooldays, including with Mike Hart, founder of the Edinburgh Jazz Festival, and lastly in our son's hand

He studied the Makars (the older authors in Scots, such as Henryson) at school — although speaking Scots was frowned on in those days. He listened to Scots on building sites and, feeling 'robbed' of his own language, started writing in a strong authentic Scots, to show the capability of a language with over 50,000 words (many languishing in the dictionaries) and its own grammar and spelling. Scots had continued in speech,



poetry and song but written Scots prose such as essays and novels was needed. From the 1980s when he published the first modern Scots novel *The Paix Machine* (sci-fi) he read, wrote and translated Scots, especially well-known works from authors who might have written more in Scots if it had still been the national language.

Twenty books later there were novels, translations, essays, children's tales, cartoons (some printed in the *Newsletter*), 'beginners' books — and a display board on Historic Scotlandwell in the garden. Some books were original novels, in Scots only; some were exact translations of well-known classics like *Treasure Island*; others had Scots and English on opposite pages; the stories for children are in Gaelic, Scots and English and have audio CDs. He contributed regularly to *Lallans* magazine.

lain loved Scotlandwell and Portmoak with its good neighbours, its Moss, its fine hills, loch, burns, and fresh air, which allowed him, and me, 20 very happy years here together.






