### **Craighead Wind Farm**

A big thank you to all those who attended the recent public consultation events for our proposed Craighead Wind Farm (8 turbines, 48MW), in Carnbo and Dunning in November.

Information on the development is available on our dedicated website at www.craigheadwindfarm.co.uk, where there is the opportunity to view the consultation boards and provide feedback, if not done so already. The opportunity to provide feedback will be open until Friday 1 December.

We will be engaging further with the local community councils over the coming months, as we look to advance discussions in relation to our community offering – namely our proposed Renewable Electricity Discount Scheme (REDS), and community Shared Ownership, of which further information for both can be found on our website.

A second round of consultation events will be undertaken in January 2024, on Tuesday 23 January between 3.30pm and 7.30pm at Carnbo Village, and at the same times on Tuesday 24 January at Dunning Village Hall, where we will seek to incorporate, where possible, feedback from the first series of events. A further newsletter will be circulated to the local community in advance of this.





# **ALDI or LIDL - BUT NOT BOTH?**



**KINROSS RESIDENTS ANTICIPATING** the arrival of new budget food stores in the area may have to settle for only one, rather than two.

Aldi's original planning application for a new store on land at Auld Mart Road in Milnathort was submitted in May 2022. Following public consultations and discussions with the planning department, the developers submitted a revised application. The amended plans now include:

- Retention of Market House;
- Reconfiguration of the store to make it 1.1m wider and rotated by 5oC;
- Removal of a separate service yard in the interest of local amenity;
- Introduction of a more direct path from the north-east corner;
- Additional trees on the eastern side.

If it does gain approval, the development at Auld Mart Road will create up to 35 jobs for local people, as well as employment opportunities throughout the construction process and within the Aldi supply chain. Andy Doyle, Property Director says 'the new store would bring an investment of around £5.3 million into the local area, alongside providing residents with increased consumer choice.'

The Aldi application may not now be determined before Christmas, as the Council have to invite feedback on the new plans from the community and other stakeholders.

Meanwhile, a representative for London and Scottish Property Investment Management (LSPIM), attended the November Milnathort and Orwell CC meeting to update the public and the CC on the company's proposals for the eagerly anticipated retail park scheme at the old BCA site (to be known as Loch Leven Gateway).

It seems as though the plans for Loch Leven Gateway (where several retail outlets are planned) may depend on the planning permission situation with the ALDI site in Milnathort.

LSPIM had a successful public consultation phase, with most Kinross residents making positive comments about their proposals. However, analysis from a discount food retailer (who was not named) seemed to indicate that it is simply not viable for Kinross to have more than one budget food retailer.

It may make it more difficult for a development site to attract a general goods discount retailer if they do not have a discount food retailer already prepared to move in.

The result could be that Kinross-shire residents might have to make do with just one discount store, as the likelihood of getting both a Milnathort Aldi and a Lidl seems to be receding.

There was discussion at the meeting about whether the customer base in the Milnathort and Kinross area was large enough to sustain two discount supermarkets.

Cowdenbeath has a population that is not only smaller than Kinross but also has a lower per capita disposable income – and there you will find not only Aldi and Lidl, but also Iceland and Morrisons.

The catchment east of Kinross is considerable, including Strathmiglo, Auchtermuchty, Falkland and minor villages in the surround.

The building of Loch Leven Gateway would be dependent on flood defence proposals being approved. The PKC flood defence team have carried out their public consultation phase and will be reporting back to the Council by early 2024.

LSPIM are now targeting an opening of Loch Leven Gateway in May 2026. The project webpage has been updated to reflect this at https://www.lspim.co.uk/bca-kinross-consultation.

It says, 'Since we conducted the second public consultation event, at which our proposals for Loch Leven Gateway were warmly received, the Council have held two public consultation events on their flood defence proposals. We were extremely encouraged to see the positive approach being taken on the delivery of the flood defence works, which will be constructed on BCA land, and that the Council are now reporting an improved delivery timeline, saving approx. 7 months, which means that the Loch Leven Gateway development timeline can come forward too.'

'The revised timeline is now:

PKC Flood Defence Works Aug 2025 – Apr 2026 Loch Leven Gateway Construction Apr 2025 – Apr 2026 Target opening of development May/June 2026


LSPIM did not wish to provide a comment at this time.


Whichever way the decision goes, there will no doubt be a discount food retailer in this area soon. Either Kinross residents will travel to Milnathort for their food shopping, or Milnathort residents will travel up to the far side of Kinross for theirs — with, of course, the added attraction of being able to visit the other shops in the proposed Loch Leven Gateway. There are a number of competing and variable factors at play in advancing this development. The situation does not appear to be straightforward and we will continue to observe closely, with interest, progress in the coming months.













# MORE BLOOMIN' AWARDS FOR KINNESSWOOD!

IT WAS A HAPPY and hopeful bunch of Kinnesswood in Bloom members who set off for London to compete as finalists in Britain in Bloom, held in the Lindley Hall on 23 October. This awards event celebrates those groups who make positive changes to their local environment through horticultural, environmental and community action.

It seemed like a long time since the judges' August visit to Kinnesswood and even longer since KiB agreed to be one of four Scottish representatives nominated in various categories by Beautiful Scotland. The others were East Haven Together, Aberdeen Communities Together and Bonnie Blantyre and Pals.

Whatever hopes they had allowed themselves were well and truly exceeded. Kinnesswood in Bloom were awarded not only the RHS Gold Award, but also came top in the Village category and were winners of the Children and Young People's Participa-

tion Award. In addition, John Nicol won a richly deserved Community Champion Award.

John told the *Newsletter*, 'I couldn't believe it after all the awards we won. I've been working with the group for 20 years altogether. I retired 10 years ago and I basically do this full time. I work with the school children as well. I was well pleased.'

Among its many gardening initiatives Kinnesswood was recognised for their maintenance of eight community gardens around the village and the well-kept floral displays, demonstrating the good use of permanent planting.

The judges were very impressed by their visit to the school where they were shown round by articulate, knowledgeable and enthusiastic children. They also liked the displays of art and environmental work done by the children and displayed in the bus shelter.

They felt there was a strong sense of local identity and pride of place from everyone they met, exhibiting an appreciation of the village. They were also struck by the extensive use of tech-





nology to promote the work of the Bloom group and the life of the community.

Rachel de Thame, seen on programmes like Gardener's World and the Chelsea Flower Show presented the awards, commenting, 'Britain in Bloom gardening groups give selflessly of their time and energy to make their communities better for everyone to enjoy, from engaging with young people, helping to grow food for those in need or providing plant displays to inspire a sense of pride. These groups are the heroes of our villages, towns and cities and keep our country blooming."

It was a very proud group of In Bloomers who returned from London, laden with trophies.

# SARAH RANKIN COOKS



ONE OF MY favourite things about Christmas dinner is the stuffing. Whether we're having turkey or not, there is always stuffing on the table and the leftovers make for a brilliant Boxing Day Breakfast or an epic turkey sandwich.

My love of stuffing is such that I've created a whole dish – why bother with the trimmings if you're really only interested in the star of the show? This is a great option for the Twixmas days when you just can't be bothered to cook but still want something delicious. It's quick and easy and can be prepared to the baking stage and frozen in advance.

Use the best quality sausages you can find, something like a Cumberland or Lincolnshire seasoned version adds in loads of extra flavour.

### You Will Need:

250g high quality pork sausages250g venison sausages1 large onion finely diced

2 minced garlic cloves

Handful of shelled pistachios – roughly chopped

2 tbsp dried sour cherries (or dried cranberries)

1 tsp cumin

1 tsp coriander

1 tsp fresh chopped rosemary

1 pack all butter puff pastry

1 egg

1 tsp each of sesame seeds and nigella seeds

### **METHOD**

Preheat the oven to 200°C fan.

Fry the onion and garlic in a little oil until softened and sweet. Be patient. This will take about 10 minutes. Leave to cool a little.

Remove the sausages from the skins and mix together by hand. Add the spices and rosemary and a little salt and pepper. Add the pistachios and sour charging

Mix in the cooled onion and garlic and combine well. Shape into a round, flat disc and set aside.

Roll out the pastry into two equal-sized discs and place the sausagemeat in the centre of one. Brush with beaten egg and place the second disc on top and shape round the meat. Bring the sides of the pastry together, using the egg washed bottom layer to stick to the upper one. Egg wash the whole thing again all over. Place in the fridge for 10 minutes. Egg wash again and sprinkle with the sesame and nigella seeds. Bake for 20–25 minutes. Leave to cool before cutting. Serve hot, or cold with a healthy serving of chutney.

SINCE 2018 PKC has committed approximately £2m to over 400 community-led projects through the Community Investment Fund (CIF). In Kinross-shire, 10 applications sought

Milnathort & Orwell Core Paths Group £1,82

To purchase a heavy-duty, self-propelled, petrol-wheeled flail for use on core paths in the Milnathort & Orwell Community Council area.

### Kinross Bowling Club £4,750

To install disability ramps to provide wheelchair access to the clubhouse and bowling green.

### Glenfarg Community Transport Group £3,000

To help develop a website to provide information about the community minibus and associated walking and cycling resources.

### Broke not Broken £4,800

To support an infant food insecurity project, providing formula, nappies, wipes and weaning products to those in need.

### Aero Space Scientific Educational Trust £5,000

To support free school and community workshops. These workshops focus on climate change through light pollution and how to reduce our own individual and collective impact.

£40,000, against an available budget of £36,000. Panel members assessed and scored applications. They agreed to award £27,500 to 8 separate projects, as below.

These funding decisions left an underspend of £8,306.02 and elected members asked that the fund be reopened to allow additional groups to come forward and make use of the remainder. The funding portal was reopened in October. Applications will be accepted until Friday 15 December. A further meeting in January 2024 will be held when funding decisions can be made.

Pupils can now embark on the next stage of their learning; mastering the flam, 13-beat roll and other drum moves, to keep the pipers in time with the beat.









# D-DAY @ 80 - LEADERS

**NEXT YEAR IS THE** 80th anniversary of the D Day landings. Let's look at who was at the very top of the D Day 1944 planning, codenamed Operation Overlord.

Leaders are often tasked with seeing a vision that others can't. Their goal is to recruit others to pursue the dream with them.

In this particular case, the stakes could not have been higher. The fate of the world rested in the hands of generals, soldiers, airmen and sailors - men and women – who were committed to fighting for what they knew was right. Did the commitment of the leadership increase the commitment of the followers? Without a doubt. D-Day leadership qualities - commitment, honesty, integrity, a willingness to sacrifice, humility - are maybe something that we should all strive for. This is leadership at its finest.

In my last feature we looked at Winston Churchill. Now let's look at the overall military Supremo - nicknamed by all: 'IKE'.

### General Dwight D. Eisenhower

Eisenhower was the American Supreme Allied Commander in charge of all forces involved in Operation Overlord.

In June 1942 Eisenhower was appointed to command U.S. Army forces in the European Theatre of Operations, but almost immediately he moved to the Mediterranean to conduct offensives in North Africa and Sicily during 1942-43. There he gained greater knowledge of U.S. and Allied forces and personalities, including Air Chief Marshal Arthur Tedder, Admiral Bertram Ramsay, and Lt. Gen. Bernard Montgomery.

He was appointed Allied supreme commander for Operations Neptune (the seaborne armada) and Overlord (the actual landings and breakout) on Christmas Eve of 1943 and, after extensive briefings in Washington, he established Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force (SHAEF) in London in January 1944. Many of the American and British commanders, who he had known in the Mediterranean,

Anglo-American coordination.

It was no easy task. Because of his diplomatic skills, Eisenhower may have been the only American who could have operated the sometimes testy coalition so well. Relations with Montgomery were particularly strained at times, but U.S. dominance in manpower and material required an American as theatre commander. Though criticism was sometimes levelled at Eisenhower for his lack of combat experience, and his highly political orientation, the results proved the wisdom of his selection. He was, after all, manager of perhaps the most politically challenging coalition of all time, involv-


ing, as it did military and diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union.

The original date set for D-Day was 5 June 1944, but an unseasonably rough weather forecast forced a reconsideration. Eisenhower accepted the optimistic assessment of Scotsman, Group Captain J. M. Stagg, the chief meteorologist, who called 36 hours of decent weather over the sixth of June. Though concerned that the first landing waves would be isolated ashore, with insufficient strength to repulse German counterattacks, Eisenhower felt justified in proceeding with Op. Overlord. The order was issued at 0415 on 5 June, and at that point the process became irrevocable.

'No one present disagreed,' Eisenhower recalled, 'and there was a definite brightening of faces as, without a further word, each went off to his respective post, to flash out to his command the messages that would set the whole host in motion.'

But what is fascinating is the letter General Eisenhower wrote and had ready: 'In Case of Failure.' In part, it reads,

> 'My decision to attack at this time and place was based upon the best information The troops, the air and the Navy did all that bravery and devotion to duty could do. If any blame or fault attaches to the attempt, it is mine



In the great course of this war, he was willing to accept full blame for its failure. No excuses. No wavering. No lack of integrity. A man full of valour, grit, and resolve. He knew what was right, and he was committed to doing it.

Just before the off, he had this message sent to all ranks:

'Your task will not be an easy one. Your enemy is well trained, well equipped and battle-hardened. He will fight savagely... but I have full confidence in your courage, devotion to duty and skill in battle. We will accept nothing less than full Victory! Good Luck! And let us all beseech the blessing of Almighty God upon this great and noble undertaking."

Eisenhower toured the Normandy beaches shortly after D-Day, observing the massive movement of U.S., British, and Canadian forces driving inland.

He was awed seeing at first-hand the massive necessary logistical network, such as the Pluto oil pipeline and the Mulberry harbours. He was accompanied by his son John, a newly commissioned second lieutenant, who had just graduated from West Point Academy on 6 June.

As the Allies rolled across Western Europe. Eisenhower had to balance Allied priorities, rather than pursue American interests. Anglo-American fortunes under Eisenhower were almost uniformly successful, excepting the ill-fated airborne assault into Holland in September, and the surprise German offensive in the Ardennes in December. At year's end of 1944 Eisenhower was promoted to General of the Army.

Gen. Eisenhower earned his fifth star as Supreme Commander of the Allies — one of only nine men to ever hold a 5-star rank. As the Allies Commander, Eisenhower was considered the most powerful military man in the world.

A good friend of mine, the ex-army, military historian Rob Lyman, known to some as 'Mr Burma Campaign', wrote recently:

'Experience of war between 1941 and 1945 showed that successful generalship requires four critical characteristics: leadership, strategic sense, intelligent energy and originality. What is abundantly clear is that generals who possess only one or a pair of these characteristics will never achieve what Sun Tzŭ lauded as a 'Master of War' or what Clausewitz called a military 'genius'.

Ironically, his Jehovah's Witness parents had been strict pacifists.

'You have got to have something in which to believe. You have got to have leaders, organisation, friendships, and contacts that help you to believe that, and help you to put out your best.'

Eisenhower's retirement was short-lived. He was recalled to active duty during the Korean War, commanding NATO from 1950 to 1952. How-

ever, the politically astute supreme commander already had been mentioned as a potential presidential candidate. He declared himself a Republican, and was elected 34th president of the United States in 1952. His immediate priority was concluding an armistice in Korea, which was accomplished in July 1953, with back-channel threats to use nuclear weapons. However, as Commander in Chief, he was again faced with terrible challenges – in this case Communist refusal to repatriate all POWs, and he may have left as many as 8000 US and United Nations personnel in captivity, because the Chinese and Soviets would never admit to holding them.

Eisenhower was re-elected President in 1956. He was a great leader- right man at the right time in the right job. D day operations were a success, largely because of 'Ike's' will, leadership, determination and his ability to make people get on with each other. How we could use him in the Middle East right now.



### **Rural Recycling**

A number of constituents have been in touch regarding recycling in rural areas including Fossoway and Portmoak, following the reduced hours of the recycling centres across Perth & Kinross.



Whilst most households have wheelie bins at their home for refuse and recycling, some properties do not. This is because either there is nowhere a wheelie bin can be stored, or because of vehicle access difficulties or that it is uneconomical to make the collection. In some instances, larger bins are provided for a group of houses, or where this is not an option, pink refuse sacks are provided for rubbish to be collected. This means that in some cases, the only option for people to recycle is by taking the materials to the recycling centre or a recycling point. This can be a great inconvenience, particularly for those who would like a garden waste bin, given the difficulty in transporting and storing the material. Some weeks ago I wrote to council officers about what might be done to improve the situation or what options might be viable and I await a response.

### **District Heating for Kinross**

I was happy to write and co-sign a letter with the my fellow ward councils in support of the proposals for a district heating system for Kinross, which would generate heat using an industrial heat pump in Loch Leven. Many readers will be aware of the campaign by CATCH Loch Leven which has been in action for some time. Such schemes exist in places like Denmark, where district heating system are commonplace. The fundamental principle of such a system is you have a facility which provides heat for a number of buildings, rather than needing a boiler in every single home. This reduces both cost and carbon emissions. I do not underestimate the scale of the challenge of this project, but the letter sent supports the possibility of moving the project to the next phase and undertake a detailed feasibility study. Well done to David Cairns and the team at CATCH for their efforts so far.

### Cycling Facilities at Kinross Park & Ride

The resurfacing of the Park & Ride facility in Kinross was very welcome, but when it happened last year, the cycle lockers were removed. I seemed to recall that whilst it was a bit bashed, the lockers were quite serviceable and I had recently used them myself. Since May last year I have been trying to get to the bottom of what happened to them but the conclusion seems to be that they were beyond repair. This month I asked for an update from the council and received a response from the local Sustrans Scotland officer. There are proposals to install some open bike lockers together with some bookable secure lockers, which would require planning permission. These are app controlled and currently being trialled by Glasgow City Council. PKC are wanting to learn the outcome of the trial but I believe it is very important that bike lockers are reinstated at the Park & Ride.

Council Budgets 2024: The Council are now looking at the budgets for 2024 and it looks like there will be even more cuts in services. We have already seen reductions in the opening hours of the Recycling Centre in Bridgend from last



year's budget but even deeper cuts are anticipated in the 2024 budget. I got the first warning of this at the November meeting of the Kinross-shire Committee – see below.

Grounds Maintenance: A verbal report was presented at November's meeting of the Kinross-shire Committee detailing proposed changes in how our open spaces will be maintained going forward. The officer speaking to the report said that in order to substantially cut spending on grounds maintenance and also to increase bio-diversity there will be a large reduction on the amount of grassed areas which will be cut. These include Kirkgate Park, Kirkgate Cemetery and grassed verges on roads throughout Kinross and Milnathort. I wasn't given the full details but on first hearing my response to the officers present was that this could be a very hard sell. Kinross-shire residents take a real pride in their communities. If maintenance is reduced it is easy for areas to look run down and neglected. We already have sections in our parks which are left uncut and these tend to become 'no go' parts of the park due to the danger of dog waste amongst the long uncut grass. I am in favour of increasing our bio-diversity but not at the expense of our towns and villages looking uncared for. The improvements carried out on the verges at the Kinross Park & Ride and Junction Road are excellent examples of a managed way to improve bio-diversity. If we are going to stop maintaining grassed areas this has to be managed and they can't simply be abandoned. I would welcome your comments on what is planned. Winter Road Gritting Schedules: The winter gritting programme for Kinross-shire roads are as follows;

- A977, A91 and A913 Complete morning de-icing by 7.30am and monitored and gritted as needed until 9.00pm
- **B996 and B9097** as above
- Other less strategic routes no pre-salting but kept open as capacity allows



## Strategic Active Travel Routes for Kinross-shire and Glenfarg

Following an Active Travel Strategy report that was presented to the Tactran (Regional Transport Partnership) board in mid-September, I have had numerous



Active Travel routes are paths that connect our settlements, providing people with the opportunity to use sustainable transportation methods to get around.

The main issue seems to be the lack of active travel projects developed to the required level for inclusion in the Tactran strategy document. To address this, I proposed a motion to the Kinross Committee, seeking approval to use the committee's available funds to hire a 'paths officer' to begin developing strategic Active Travel routes in and around Kinross-shire, as well as connecting to Active Travel Routes in Fife, Clackmannanshire, and Perthshire. The motion received unanimous approval.

The outcome of the motion is that Council Officers will provide a report to the committee at the next meeting, presenting options on how to implement this plan. Having 'shovel ready' Active Travel projects will increase the chances of Kinross-shire and Glenfarg receiving their fair share of the projected £320 million annual allocation from Transport Scotland for Active Travel projects.

### Addressing the Climate Emergency

Perth and Kinross has been recognised as one of 119 cities and local authorities across the globe to receive a 'A' rating for environmental action from the CDP. This award recognises the significant efforts undertaken by the council to address the climate and biodiversity emergencies. In 2019, the council received a D-grade from the CDP, but this improved to a B in 2022 before achieving the highest grade possible this year.

This demonstrates our climate leadership through concerted and effective action. The grading acknowledges the enormous commitment and progress that has been made in Perth and Kinross regarding awareness of the climate and ecological emergency, and how we are addressing it. This grading shows that we are moving in the right direction, however we know that there is still much more work to be done, which will continue to be challenging, especially given the current financial environment.

In demonstrating this commitment the Council received another award. Riverside Primary School in Perth won a prestigious award for its innovative environmentally friendly design at The Learning Places Scotland Awards ceremony in Glasgow.

Riverside is the first primary school in Scotland built to Passivhaus standards, where energy-saving measures are integral to the construction of the building. Showing our commitment to give our children and young people the best start in life, by providing a fantastic place for learning.

The Primary School is a state-of-the-art building, and I am sure it will be held up as an example for buildings across the country in years to come.

Finally, I would like to wish all the readers of the *Newsletter* a wonderful Christmas and Happy New Year.

SMALL BUSINESSES ARE THE beating heart of our local communities yet, as everyone knows, they are having a really tough time right now, not just with concerns about the cost of living and the downturn in consumer footfall but also because of worries over business rates and the possible imposition of a visitor



levy. Regrettably, in retail, they are also facing a rising tide of shoplifting.

It is an all too common misconception that shoplifting is a victimless, petty crime. It is not. Goods stolen from stores mean less money available to pay the wages of staff and enhance their wellbeing at work, less money to make refurbishments and possible increases in prices to compensate for the lost revenue – exactly the opposite of what people can afford during a cost of living crisis. Sadly, the current evidence shows that shoplifting cases are generally the work of repeat offenders who make return visits to the shops in question. Naturally, this increases the anxiety and fear of verbal or physical abuse against staff.

The Scottish Retail Consortium tells us this has become a daily concern for many people working in retail. Stolen goods might appear to be a drop in the ocean in the world of retail, but they accumulate to eye-watering levels. Shoplifting cost retailers in Scotland £90m last year, a figure so alarming that Primark revealed they were forced to reduce their adjusted operating profit margin from 8.3% to below 8% when factoring in rising cases of theft.

Evidence put forward by the Scottish Retail Consortium and the Scottish Grocers Federation suggests organised crime is predominately to blame. They are also concerned that the police do not have adequate resources to deal with the offenders. It is unsurprising then that gangs, moving from town to town, are taking advantage of this. Indeed, the British Retail Consortium reported that nearly three-quarters of serious cases of crime in a major retailer were not responded to by the police. The figures of incidents in Scotland — 70-80 per day - is likely much higher than reported as we can only expect that businesses will opt not to report low value crimes to the police because they know it is unlikely anything will come of it.

It is very concerning that businesses including the Co-op are choosing not to open branches in some areas because they have been designated "no-go" areas for their stores. I know from first-hand account through my contact with businesses in Perth and Kinross that anti-social behaviour is a growing nuisance that they should not be expected to deal with on this scale.

We all want to see a flourishing high street in our small rural towns but this significant, and rising, problem is just one more good reason for prospective businesses to decide against opening their doors, just when our communities need it most.

# John Nicolson, MP

I HAVE A CONSTITUENT—let's call him Jim. Jim and his wife Mary have never been in debt. They're prudent with money and have always had a clean credit history—something they're proud of. But that all changed when they became entangled with an energy company called OVO.



Jim and Mary are not and never have been OVO customers. And yet out of the blue, OVO began bombarding them with bills for a non-existent account. Jim and Mary tried to be cooperative, phoning OVO repeatedly to explain that they'd never had an account. On the phone OVO representatives were courteous. But that didn't stop the bullying, threatening letters.

Jim's ill health was known to OVO. The company were also aware that their incessant letters were causing him enormous stress. Jim then suffered a heart attack. Now, no one can say for sure what role OVO played in that. But as Mary says:

'Jim just found the situation so harassing. The letters were aggressive and threatening. We couldn't understand why they wouldn't leave us alone.'

Jim and Mary contacted my office. My constituency team have since spent scores of hours speaking to OVO representatives by phone and e mail. Initially we got apologies and guarantees the harassment would end. But then OVO stopped returning our calls too.

I used to be a presenter on BBC 'Watchdog'. I know how powerful a tool public shaming can be when used against bullies. There's nothing thuggish companies hate more than being kicked in the profit margins. So, I took to social media. I told the world what OVO was doing to Jim and Mary. My friend Carol Vorderman retweeted the story. People from across the country wrote back telling us of almost identical experiences – harassment by OVO over non-existent bills. Finally, a high heid yin from OVO called. And for the first time we got a number – not a switchboard – we could call back.

I can't fault OVO's Katie who took up our case at this point. She apologised. Jim and Mary now have financial compensation. OVO have promised my team the couple will be harassed no longer as their 'account' is now closed. And I have secured a charitable donation from OVO which I will give to poverty charities in my constituency.

I am, of course, pleased for Jim and Mary. They just want to be left in peace. But what does this story tell us about consumer protection in this country? It tells us, I think, that energy privatisation has produced a plethora of dodgy privatised companies. Some are immune to pressure as they've no reputation to lose. We know too that the watchdog put in place to protect energy consumers is useless. Companies like OVO have a track record of harming the credit scores of perfectly innocent parties, by chasing up phantom debts such as Jim and Mary's.

But for me the biggest lesson is that utilities should exist for the public's benefit not to be milked for profit. We should renationalise them all.

#### **IDENTITY THEFT**

**Identity theft** is when criminals get access to someone's personal information. They then use it to steal their identity.

They could then pretend to open bank accounts, get credit cards, loans and mortgages or to claim benefits.

They could even take over someone's accounts and change the address.

They can steal someone's name and reputation. Then they can use this to make money.

#### **How The Fraudsters Operate**

Here are a few ways which these criminals work:

- They search through rubbish to find bills or bank statements
- They target flats where shared mail boxes make theft easier
- They bribe or rob postal workers or purchase the information from other criminals
- · They search through unattended bags.

#### **Warning Signs**

There are a number of warning signs to look out for:

- · If you get bills or invoices for goods you have not ordered
- If you get collection letters for debt that isn't yours or
- There are transactions on your bank or credit card statements that you do not recognise
- Important documents such as your passport or driving licence may have been stolen.

#### **Take Action**

There are a number of steps you can take to avoid falling victim to identity theft:

- Keep all your important documents safe and secure
- When using a credit or debit card, make sure it's never out of your sight
- Cash machines may have been tampered with. Your cards could be skimmed and cloned
- Never give out your personal details when you're contacted by phone, fax, post or email
- Always offer to ring back any suspicious callers but check the phone number you are given
- When throwing out documents which contain personal information try to shred them so that nobody could read your personal details
- Always check your bank and credit card statements.
   Report any transactions you don't recognise, even small amounts
- Close all accounts you no longer need
- Move your mail when moving home by arranging with the post office to forward your mail to your new address
- · Get organisations to send to your new address.

#### If You Think You're A Victim

If you think you might be a victim of identity theft, don't delay:

- · Contact your bank or building society
- Keep a record of all communication
- Report the matter to the police and note the crime reference number
- Request a copy of your credit report (such as Equifax or Experian) - you can ask for incorrect information to be removed

# NORWAY IN A NUTSHELL BUT NOT ON A BUDGET!

#### **WINNING WAYS**

WHEN PLANNING A TRIP abroad, I usually have two simple rules. The first is that I don't want to go anywhere that is colder than where I live, and the second is that it shouldn't be more expensive than home. I broke those two rules resoundingly some time ago. We went to Norway. I must admit that I had never had any inclination to go Norway before. I quite liked the idea of fjords from my old school geography books, but in my ignorance that was about it. But circumstances do change, and we got an e-mail from friends posted to the Embassy in Norway, to say that they were leaving soon, and if we didn't visit them now, we would have missed our chance. We were originally going to go to Oman, which would have been fine, but we switched directions and headed for Norway.

The journey was easy, and the public transport enviable and fantastic. Everything works. Trains, trams and buses turn up and leave at exactly the time it says on the board. Our friends met us, and we spent a couple of delightful nights with them. We were invited to a Norwegian friend's house for dinner. There were twelve people round the table, 8 of them Norwegians, and the entire evening was conducted in flawless English. Can you imagine that at home? Indeed, most of the people round the table could also speak French and German with ease, and it left me thinking for the umpteenth time about how we tackle the teaching of languages in our country.

The Norwegians love The Brits though, as we discovered when we went to visit The Resistance Museum. What a story that was! It is hard for us to imagine what it must have been like to have been occupied during the war. All of their young men were involved in the resistance movement, although they had to learn the hard way, as the German war machine was so much more sophisticated, and initially they were easily discovered. But improve they did, and made ready for the support they received from Britain. Churchill is a huge favourite and a national hero in Norway.

Our trip was called 'Norway in a Nutshell' and we travelled on boats and trains and planes to get a taste of it. The fjords are truly breathtaking. A train took us to the Hardanger Plateau on top of the glacier. It was bitterly cold and very, very beautiful. The train progressed through many tunnels, and again I marvelled at the ingenuity of the engineers, who design these extraordinary routes

t h r o u g h inhospitable terrains. When you see these enormous mountains, it is possible to feel very small and insignificant.

We had booked into a beautiful hotel in Flam, only yards from the most beautiful fjord. We were a bit early in the season, but it was a surprise to be the only residents in this 120 bedroom giant of a place. Quite surreal! If you've ever seen The Shining you'll know what it felt like. On to Bergen, which is a lovely bustling port town, with fresh food, fish markets and intriguing little alleyways of wooden houses, built very closely together. I have to say that it was incredibly expensive, and we were working on practically double for everything. We didn't buy our usual fridge magnet souvenirs, or anything that could be bought in the U.K. I think Norwegians are doing very well, because they are out and about eating, drinking and making merry. They have stayed resolutely out of the EU, and so have a disregard for health and safety rules! That was quite refreshing in a way. We even saw a nursery school outing with the children playing around, with steep drops all around. However, their caretakers were definitely in

charge, in a very relaxed sort of way, and the children seemed to realise their limits. Our friends told us that Norwegian children do not sit in watching T.V. In the winter they are sledging, skiing or skating, and in the summer they are cycling, walking, sailing or some other sporting activity. Apparently work/life balance is not an issue, as most people finish work by 4pm and then have light until midnight to follow up on all their hobbies, and sporting activities. They are not into binge drinking, because the booze is just too expensive!

I was thinking that Norwegians would love Slovenia, because Slovenia is as pretty as Norway, but everything there is much cheaper than it is here. And consequently it would be like a free paradise to them! Ah well.... each to their own!

# **KEEP WELL THIS WINT**

KEEPING WARM in winter is especially important as we get older as changes to our bodies often mean cold weather and winter bugs affect us more than they used to. The good news is there are things you can do to stay warm and well.

A little bit of activity now and then is a great way to help you keep warm, as well as help you maintain strength and mobility. So try not to sit still for more than an hour at a time.

#### Eat well

IT CAN SOMETIMES be difficult to keep up the motivation to prepare meals. But it's good to try and keep to a routine where you can. Hot food and drinks can help you to keep warm, so try to have one hot meal a day and as many hot drinks as you can.

Try to have a range of foods in your diet and try to eat fruit and vegetables each day – frozen and tinned vegetables can be just as good as fresh. It's also a good idea to keep your cupboards stocked with some basics just in case you can't get out to the shops – whether due to illness or bad weather.

The main thing to remember is that it's better to eat a bit of what you fancy than to eat nothing – even if it's just a slice of cake.

The British Dietetic Association (BDA) has some tips for saving money on your



food waste, as well as some budget meal ideas. If you're worried about being able to afford food, the **BDA** website

also has some information on local food banks and useful helplines.

#### **Get your winter vaccinations**

RESPIRATORY VIRUSES are more widespread in winter, so it's especially important to get your vaccinations. Vaccinations are particularly important this winter as flu & coronavirus levels are expected to rise.

If you're aged 65 and over you might be eligible for a coronavirus booster jab. And it's not too late to have your first jab if you haven't yet. You're entitled to a free flu jab from the doctor or pharmacist if you:

Are aged 65 or over

- Care for someone, such as a friend or family member
- Are under 65 and have a serious long-term health condition
- Live in the same house as someone

who is immunocompromised

• Are in long-stay residential care.

When you get your flu jab, check if you're also eligible for the pneumo vaccine, which helps protect you from pneumonia, and the Shingles vaccine.

#### Make sure your home is warm enough

TRY TO HEAT your home to a steady and comfortable temperature throughout the day in the rooms you use most, such as the living room and bedroom – usually around 18°C (64°F) is ideal. If there are rooms you don't use, like a spare bedroom, turn off the radiators in that

room and close the doors. This will help you save on energy costs while keeping warm in winter.

At dusk, close all the curtains and keep the windows closed to help keep heat in when the weather's at its coldest.

If you have wood or laminate floors, you may want to consider putting rugs down to insulate your home.

If you're having trouble with the costs of heating your home, you might be entitled to government support.

#### Help with the cost of living

YOU MIGHT BE entitled to some support, such as Pension Credit or Attendance Allowance, which could help you stay on top of your finances.

#### **Stop the spread of germs**

AS WELL AS getting vaccinated, there are some other simple measures we can take to reduce the spread of illness. Regularly washing your hands with soap and water is one of the best ways to stop germs from spreading.

YOU CAN ALSO:

- Catch coughs and sneezes in a tissue
- Choose to wear a face covering in busy indoor spaces, like shops
- Leave windows ajar to let fresh air circulate when meeting people
- Avoid close contact with people who are unwell.

It's a good idea to keep some hand sanitiser with you when you're out and

about in case you can't access a sink or bathroom to wash your hands.

Wrap up well

WEARING PLENTY of layers is the best way to keep warm in winter. If you're heading out, make sure you take some extra layers – even if you don't need them immediately. It's a good idea to be prepared because the temperature can drop significantly when the sun goes in.

Wearing several thin layers will keep you warmer than wearing one thick layer, as layers trap warm air between them. Our bodies react to the cold by redirecting our blood away from our hands and feet and towards our vital organs, so part of keeping our hands and feet warm is about keeping our whole body warm.

#### Stay stocked up

IT'S A GOOD IDEA to make sure you're prepared – winter weather can be unpredictable and can stop you from getting out and about.

Think about stocking up on cold and sore throat remedies as well as food. Your pharmacist can give you advice on what might help if you're feeling under the weather. You might also want to get big bottle of water in case the water supply is interrupted.

can also help to keep a list of important contacts, such loved ones as emergency numbers, by the phone in case you need them



#### Be aware of your heart and circulation

THE COLD CAN increase the risk of a stroke or heart attack, as well as hypothermia. If you think you or someone else is experiencing any of these symptoms, call 999 (or 112 from a mobile) immediately and ask for an ambulance.

For a stroke, think FAST:

- *Is the face drooping on one side?*
- Can the person raise both arms and keep them there?
- Is speech slurred?
- Time to call 999 if you spot any one of these signs.

Many people experience severe chest pain during a heart attack - but the symptoms can be different for different people.



### **Community Council News**

The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. Where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

# Kinross Community Council News from the September Meeting

**Present** at the meeting on 26 September were CCIIrs L McKay, W Freeman, H Phillips, C Collins, T Stewart and S Wells, CIIr D Cuthbert and CIIr N Freshwater, Mrs C Aird and 3 members of the public

**Apologies:** CCllrs E Leslie, M Wilson, Cllr R Watters and W Robertson and Police Scotland.

CCllr W Freeman declared an interest in the discussion about town twinning.

#### **Police Scotland Report**

86 calls to the Police from the Kinross area with 15 crimes being recorded since the August 2023 meeting.

#### **Crimes Of Note (since last meeting)**

06/09/2023 Tender counterfeit currency (Giacopazzis, Kinross) Subject to live investigation.

15/09/2023 Theft by housebreaking (Seaforth Drive, Kinross) Subject to live investigation.

Enquiries continue into the spate of vandalisms to cars in Kinross and this is currently subject to a live investigation. Traffic statistics Community officers are aware of regular areas where there are complaints about speeding in and around Kinross. These have all been added to their speeding matrix. Speed checks across the area will continue during patrols.

### Potential Kinross Community Action Plan (Bruce Crawford)

CCIIr Mckay welcomed Mr B Crawford to the meeting and asked him to speak to the meeting.

Mr Crawford gave some background information, advising that in the late 1990s, Kinross Strategy proposals had been put forward and had been well supported in the community, and PKC had created a plan in 2017 but it had been decided that it was not granular enough.

In trying to improve the area, Mr Crawford advised that Kinross-shire Partnership had previously considered creating a plan but had stepped back due to The Big Conversation work but that the time was now right to reintroduce such a plan, the purpose of which is for members of the community to come together as one and to request funding from PKC to improve the services and introduce projects into the community and have shared ownership of these projects. He also advised that Government agencies are leaning on action plans to determine whether potential projects have support from communities prior to implementation.

In considering whether it was appropriate to create a plan, Mr Crawford advised that he had recently met with CCllrs McKay and Freeman, Cllr D Cuthbert and Lesley Campbell, STAR Group Senior Consultant, to determine who would be the most appropriate body to lead on the work in setting up of a potential Community Action Plan (CAP) for Kinross. Mr Crawford had also spoken to STAR Development Group (https://stardevelopmentgroup.org/), PKC's preferred organisation to undertake any such work.

STAR has extensive experience of working with rural and small-town communities to prepare CAPs. They originally designed the process of CAPs for communities approximately 25 years ago, and it has now become widely used as a way of communities becoming more proactive in shaping their own future.

Their process of CAP has won several awards for its approach to community engagement and more importantly communities have found the process a sound platform for delivering, successful projects, raising and allocating funds, developing partnerships, and influencing decision making, and as such, they believe that the

process of preparing the CAP is as important as the final Plan, and that it is done in a way that encourages participation, strengthens existing organisations, and forges partnership working. The resultant Plan is therefore truly community owned, and gives a mandate for Community Councils, Development Trusts, and other community bodies to deliver priority projects and actions.

If the decision to go ahead with a CAP was agreed, STAR (or another group) would be involved in the process for around six months undertaking several activities to produce the plan. These include working with a local steering group, undertaking a survey and analysing the results of this, arranging, and participating in community conversations (stakeholder/focus groups), the creation of a community profile (facts and figures, assets, activities, services etc), holding an interactive open day event to feedback results of the process and finally, the production of a CAP. This work obviously comes at a cost and in response to a question from CCIIr S Wells, the meeting was advised that STAR (or another group) would apply to PKC for funding, as would KCC, and if successful, the funding would be paid to KCC to pay the group undertaking the work.

Mr Crawford advised that the deadline for submitting an application was fast approaching (14 October) and that KCC would need to move quickly. As such he had populated the application form to help KCC meet the deadline should they wish to go ahead with the funding application. Cllr D Cuthbert commented that if KCC did not apply for the funding, it would be given to another area. The CAP may also help with LDP3.

CCIIr C Collins expressed his frustration at not having had the information prior to the meeting and also at not being invited to the initial meeting. While he was not going to object to KCC submitting an application, he said it felt like a fait accompli. CCIIr Wells asked what happened now, should the CC vote whether to go ahead with the application, to which CCIIr Mckay agreed and asked the CCIIrs present for their views with members agreeing unanimously that the CC should submit the funding application. CCIIr Collins agreed with the decision, on the understanding that his concerns were noted.

CCIIr Mckay thanked Mr Crawford for presenting the information to the CC, with Mr Crawford confirming that he would be happy to help in this project in any way the CC felt. It was also noted that other CCs in the area could apply for funding.

CCIIr Freeman agreed to submit the application on behalf of the

**Wind Farm:** it was noted that the company attended the Milnathort CC meeting on 28 September.





#### **Community Council News**

CC Bank Account: there was currently £236 in the account, and it was agreed that CC would arrange wreaths for the Remembrance Parade and purchase a camera to cover the defibrillator with the remaining funds. Sourcing of extra funds ongoing. Quotes were to be obtained ASAP. In response to a question from CCIIr H Phillips, the meeting was advised that the CC had been unable to spend the whole grant from PKC previously due to issues with changing the bank mandate signatories due to the retirement of the previous treasurer.

#### **Kinross Town Centre**

CCIIr Wells advised that new parking signs had been erected at Curate Wynd and Mill Street Park advising that vehicles could not park for more than 72 hours consecutively, otherwise they were liable to a £100 fine. CIIr Cuthbert commented that the parking bays required to be marked out and agreed to contact PKC regarding this.

CCIIr Mckay and CIIr Phillips commented that the CC were not receiving notifications as often as expected and agreed to contact PKC to ensure that the email address was on their mailing list.

CCllr Mckay also raised concerns about a drain cover in Springfield Road. CCllr Cuthbert agreed to investigate this concern.

#### **Planning Matters**

#### **Applications Received**

Prior to discussing the applications submitted to PKC, CCllr Collins advised that he had been successful in requesting extensions to submitting comments on three applications, namely 54-56 High Street, Burleigh Sands golf range and Loch Leven Fisheries Pier. 23/01349/FLL Part change of use and alterations to building to form 10 short-term let accommodation units, 54-56 High Street, Kingos

This application is for bed-and-breakfast type accommodation in the High Street. In response to a question from CCllr Collins about access to the accommodation, CCllr Wells advised that this would be via the car park. CCllr Mckay raised concerns regarding the lack of disabled access, and apparent lack of windows. It was also noted that ten parking spaces would be lost. After discussion it was agreed that CCllr Collins would submit an objection on behalf of the CC. 23/01413/FLL Formation of access road, land 60 metres

southwest of Baltree Farm, Hatchbank.

An application had been submitted for an access road through woodland to the greyhound rescue centre and it was noted that

this woodland was classified as 'ancient' (since 1750) and is therefore meant to be protected.

The CC discussed this application, noting that Kinross-shire Civic Trust had submitted an objection. The CC felt that the application did not match the land photography and that, while they supported the application in principle, there was enough room elsewhere in the car park. It was agreed that CCIIr Collins would submit an objection on behalf of the CC.

23/01341/FLM - Mixed use development comprising golf driving range (class 11) with café (class 3), retail unit (class 1A), formation of vehicular access and parking, landscaping and associated works, land 240 metres northeast of Lethangie Waste Water Treatment Works, Kinross.

It was noted that the Kinross-shire Civic Trust had submitted a 'neutral' comment about this application and the CC agreed to the same

#### **Other Planning Matters**

Cllr Cuthbert advised that PKC officers were currently monitoring the use of the recycling centre and the situation will be reviewed in due course.

#### **Reports from PKC Councillors**

**Clir N Freshwater** advised that complaints had been received about rubbish piling up in the garden of a property in Mill Street. PKC have spoken to the tenant and asked for this to be removed. There is a VAS missing from Gairneybank – this has been reported to PKC but no response yet.

The issue of a pedestrian crossing in Balado has been added to the topics for discussion at the road safety meeting next month. An update will be given in due course.

The VAS in Gallowhill Road is still not working. Cllr Cuthbert is to chase this up.

#### **Reports from CC Representatives**

CCllr Wells – raised concerns around speeding at the lower end of the High Street. There were no speed limit signs on the road (20mph) and while a survey had been conducted, she had not seen any results. She also highlighted concerns about private parking signs which have been erected, by residents, in Millbridge Hall. These are not enforceable.

CCIIr Collins advised that he had not yet sent the email about bin protection and would do so as soon as possible.

CCIIr McKay advised that PKC arboreal officers are looking into what can be done about the trees in Gairneybank and at LLHC which had been cut down. An update will be given at a future meeting.

The railing at the bottom of Kinross Primary School at Bowton Road needs replaced. Also requested a 20mph limit in Bowton Road. PKC are looking at the parking situation at the school. The car park is regularly full of parents' cars. There is also an issue with cars parked on zig zags outside of the school. Concerns had been raised regarding a tractor travelling between Kinross and Milnathort at more than 40mph. To reduce vehicles travelling at speed, she wondered if it would be possible to purchase stickers and would email PC B Samson direct.

CCIIr Freeman advised that Kinross-shire Committee were looking





for a CC representative to join the group. He is happy to continue in that role if the CC were content for him to do so. This was agreed, and CCIIr Freeman will advise the CC if he is unable to attend meetings, as necessary.

PKC have been in touch following a request from the mayor of a small town in the North of France which have submitted the request. The request was briefly discussed, and it was agreed that CCIIr Freeman would obtain more information before a decision was taken. All other correspondence had been forwarded to the

#### **Police Report**

PC Ben Samson attended and reported on recent crimes. 3 October: Driver collided with another vehicle on the A91 Milnathort to Yetts o'Muckhart road and failed to stop or report. Driver charged. Between 5 and 6 October a theft by housebreaking at Moubray, Crook of Devon. On 12 October a driver failed to pay for fuel at Fossoway Garage. On 23 October there was a house breaking with intent to steal at Nineacres Camp Site, Crook of Devon.

With reduced speed limits now in force in Carnbo, residents are keen that speed checks will be done. PC Samson said it would be added to the list. CCIIr Marchant reminded PC Samson that it was important to do them during school time.

MoP asked about Knockhill traffic speeding along A823 and making noise. Police will add it to the list during events.

MoP observed that the B9097 is a training road for Police - a lot of bikers are exceeding the limit passing the 40mph Peat Gate area about 10.30am and back at 3.30pm. There are five blind entrances along the road. CCIIr Bruce-Jones added that there are discussions with PKC about extending the 40mph limit and also making the sign bigger as well as possibly extending the 30mph limit and creating a footpath along part of the road's length.

#### **Minutes Of The Previous Meeting**

The minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed and amended to include the reference to the open letter that the CC had received from Mike Barnacle regarding his concerns and objection to onshore wind farms in the Ochils. A copy of his letter was made available to those at the meeting and can be found in the November issue of the Kinross Newsletter. With this amendment the minutes were signed off.

#### **Matters Arising**

Craighead Wind Farm Orbit/Galileo, represented by Alex Orr, Jason Morin and Cris Thacker, gave an update on their application. The number of turbines has been reduced again to eight with a mixture of 180m and 200m tip heights. Since the total output would be up to 48MW the application can now be submitted to PKC rather than the Scottish Government, and a Pre Application Notice (PAN) outlining plans has already been submitted to PKC. Most site surveys have been done, along with baseline noise measurement.

There will be public meetings in Carnbo Hall and Dunning Hall with further meetings in January. The Community Benefit is still expected to be around £240k/year. Galileo are talking to Octopus Energy about a scheme for reduced power prices using some of the Community Benefit – more details later. In the New Year there will be details of a share purchase scheme - 10% ownership will be offered to the immediate community.

A MoP noted that existing sites elsewhere are currently having their turbines replaced with larger ones, and there are concerns about the possible recyclability of the old machines. Would this be an issue here? Mr Morin said that this scheme would have a planned life time of 40 years, and it's too early to know what materials would be used to construct the turbines. Mr Morin confirmed that any future replacement of wind turbines would require a new planning application.

Another MoP asked about how the turbine parts would get on site as access from the Devon Road would be very difficult – the plan is to access the site from Carnbo.

CCIIr Bruce-Jones asked whether the Community Benefit is part of the Planning Application. It's not but Galileo would expect to agree a statement of intent in parallel with the application, however build will be some years after approval so it's hard to be precise.

#### Wind Farms (General)

Mike Barnacle, via email, has reiterated his strong objection to any of the three proposed wind farms in the Ochils and is concerned that the CC will not represent his views. The CC is in the process of distributing a survey to gather the community's views on the two windfarms that are in the Fossoway District. The survey offers the opportunity for free text responses, and the CC can be emailed directly with additional views at fossoway.cc@gmail.com.

In addition the CC has created a wind farm information page on www.fossoway.org which covers all of the current Ochil wind farm proposals, and will have a link to the Friends of the Ochils group. When the survey closes the CC will collate all of the responses and present them to the Community in January 2024 when there will be further opportunity for comment and discussion. Finally the responses will be used to inform the CC's comments on all the wind farm planning applications. If any of the schemes are approved, then a group independent of the CC will need to be set up to handle the Community Benefit.



#### **Community Council News**

CCIIr Bruce Jones noted that the Brunt Hill wind farm has also been reduced to 18 turbines.

Copies of the agreed EICS will be lodged at Carnbo Village Hall and Loch Leven Library.

A joint group of local PKC Community Councils that would be affected by the schemes is being set-up and will meet in January. One of their first actions is to receive a presentation from 9CC, a group of nine communities in Cumnock and Doon Valley area of Ayrshire who handle Community Benefit from wind farms (https://9ccg.co.uk/).

A MoP asked whether anyone is looking after the Ochils? Cllr Watters wondered if there is actually any connection between approvals made by the Scottish Government Energy Consent Unit and PKC that would consider cumulative effect.

#### **Community Development Trust (CDT):**

The next meeting is 15 November. A business case for the Community Asset Transfer of the Blairingone School is being prepared by a working group led by Marion Anness who reports that funding is being sought to enable preparation of a proper Business Plan to obtain substantial funding. One of the ideas is to turn the school into a respite centre. Renovation is intended to be done to a high level including green energy.

#### **Community Action Plan and Local Place Plans:**

CCIIr Marchant is working with PKC officers on the development of a Local Place Plan (LPP), including demographic information provided by PKC, which would be considered as part of LDP3 preparation. It has been agreed with PKC that a joint funding application with the Fossoway CDT will be made to fund a consultant to help the development of a Community Action Plan (CAP). A LPP will be developed from the CAP which will be registered with PKC and inform LDP3. The LPP will be prepared before Sept 2024. Both the CAP and LPP will require engagement with the community. After LDP3 comes into force, any planning applications must be considered in the context of the LPP.

### Road Safety in FDCC Area (Including A977 Mitigation and Carnbo): The Carnbo VAS is now operating at 30mph.

PKC have advised that the Drum crossroads works will now be commencing Monday, 6th November. This is due to the contractor dealing with emergency work from the recent flooding which has delayed the works programme. It is expected that the works will take approximately five weeks, including the time required to install the traffic signal equipment. Residents have been letter dropped with this information. There will be an extension of the 30mph limit and a 40mph buffer added.

PKC have also advised that the main construction work at Crook of Devon School Road Junction has now been completed with only a couple of small outstanding jobs to be undertaken, including new road markings and general site tidying. There is some concern from the community about the lack of a link between the two sets of lights. It is likely that the proposed realignment of the junction by the Shell Garage will be dropped and the budget re-allocated to other schemes on our list.

A MoP asked why there are no 20mph limits in our area unlike in other Council areas. It was thought that it would not be possible to have a 20mph limit on the A977 itself, but PKC does have 20mph limits on other roads.

PKC have advised that an engineer has attended the Powmill and Kinross Green crossing and the audible signal at both sites should now be operational.

### Fossoway Area Transport incl. Transport Group and 202 Bus Service: CCIIr Lamb reported that the 202 Service is now improved in

reliability, timekeeping and performance with deployment of better vehicles. The challenge now is to restore the public's confidence in the service and help to improve the usage. A MoP asked if timetables could be published more widely – the CC intends to add them to Facebook and website.

A MoP noted that some of the buses have reduced connectivity and hence their ticket machines don't work hence passenger statistics (and revenue!) are lower than they should be. Discussions continue with the Glenfarg Community Bus Group.

#### Frequent Power Cuts in Fossoway District.

CCIIr Bruce Jones had spoken to Mark Westwood, SSE Customer Relationship Manager, who advised that they have discussed this issue with the Network Integrity manager, and he has confirmed his awareness of the faults and provided cause for each. The Milnathort circuit has been problematic over the years, mainly due to how far it travels – it has four different circuit breakers meaning the customers at the end (which are the ones in question) will see every issue. However, over the years, SSE has carried out various works including installing new covered conductor and bird flight divertors to resolve the issues. The North Investment and Planning Manager has confirmed that it is SSE's ambition to refurbish every overhead line circuit during the next eight years. This will involve replacing rotten poles and replacing old conductors where required. CCIIr Pye reminded the community about SSEN's Priority Services Register: available to over 60s, those with children under five or who are disabled. www.ssen.co.uk/power-cuts-emergencies/priority-services/

#### **New Business**

#### **Traveller Community**

CCIIr Bruce Jones reported nearby residents have raised concerns regarding two recent fires this month both of which appeared to be burning of mobile caravans resulting in thick noxious smoke. CCIIr Farquhar is trying to re-establish a rapport with the Community although it might be difficult to achieve.

A MoP reported that the fence along the east side of the site is being dismantled and rubbish is amassing along the fence line. The CC will write to PKC's Traveller Liaison Officer (Cllr Watters agreed to get their name) and also maybe Planning Enforcement as the boundary of the site was a condition of its approval.

#### Incineration of Waste, Crook of Devon

The PKC Environmental Protection Officer has responded and advised that the deposit and burning of waste at this site does indeed fall within their remit. They made an initial visit to the site this week and have spoken with the owner. They are currently investigating with a view to resolving the waste management issues on the site and will update us when they have more information. SEPA have also attended. Since the visits there have been no further fires.

#### **Democracy Matters Phase 2**

Democracy Matters conversations have already started to explore whether far more decisions could be made by communities themselves. This is a key and connected part of the wider Local Governance Review which is looking across all of Scotland's vital public services to consider how power and resources should be shared between national and local government.

#### **Meetings Attended:**

#### PKC Planning Users Forum 25 Oct 2023

CCIIr Marchant attended the meeting along with representatives from Community Councils, Kinross Civic Trust, Developers Agents, and Glenfarg Community Bus Group.

The aim is to have regular meetings with PKC planners as we develop LDP3, exchange views and get a better understanding of the planning system and how decisions are made. Topics discussed were the development of LDP3 and how planning applications are dealt with by PKC Development Management.

PKC confirmed that NPF4 policies now take precedence over PKC LDP2 polices and as part of the LDP3 process will be adopted by PKC. In the future PKC will only have policies that focus on specific local authority requirements and guidance i.e., the Loch Leven Catchment Area. LDP2 expires in 2027 and LDP3 will then be adopted. There will no longer be a Tay Plan.

#### **Councillors' Reports**

**R Watters:** The new Active Travel Plan does not mention Kinross shire in any way at all. Perth has 25 active travel routes that are being strategically developed and some paths simply stop at the Kinross shire boundary. When this plan comes up for consultation Cllr Watters encourages the CC and the whole community to comment on this omission.

#### **Planning Applications**

23/01265/FLL Siting of a container for storage use (in retrospect) at Waulkmill Park, Waulkmill, Crook of Devon, no CC comment.

23/00491/FLM Formation of leisure development comprising erection of 124 holiday accommodation units, community hub with reception/leisure/retail areas with other associated uses, formation of vehicular access, motorhome stances, SUDS ponds, treatment plant, parking, landscaping and associated works at Whinstone Quarry, Devonshaw, Powmill.

The application has been revised to amend the storm drainage layout; the reception lodge has an air source heat pump; all lodges have a brown exterior; a right turn lane has been included on the A977; spaces for local visitor parking; a revised Biodiversity Management Plan — many of these changes were suggested in the CC's previous neutral comment.

A MoP commented that proposed drain size increase won't help as it only leads into smaller field drains; creation of the right turn lane would not significantly help with increased traffic and the plans require felling trees. The proposed translocation of rare flora would not enhance the biodiversity. There was further discussion from those present about whether it was realistic to believe that there wouldn't be a significant increase in traffic due to holiday makers going out each day, given the lack of facilities on site. It was also noted that since quarrying at the site stopped in 1980 and the rest of the site wasn't part of the quarry workings anyway, it may not be valid to describe this as a brownfield site anymore.

Since the community is divided between a desire to clean up the site, with some sort of development versus the impact of such a development on the environment, the CC decided to ask for a deferral of the application to allow further discussion at our meeting in December.

#### AOCB:

Jim Duffy, a member of the Hydro Fund Committee, said that the fund would welcome grant applications. John Wheatley has left the committee and Trudy Duffy can no longer act as the CC representative, so the committee would like more members.

Cllr Bruce-Jones mentioned that the Kinross-Shire Community Investment Fund has been re opened. There is about £8k left in it. Trudy Duffy is on the Committee. Details from <code>cif@pkc.gov.uk</code> The CC received an email from Broke not Broken asking for our help in making the community aware of the good work that they do and with their agreement we posted information on our Facebook page.

The CC expressed their thanks to Trudy Duffy who has been a member of the CC since 2006 and the Chair since 2015. The CC presented Trudy with a cherry tree in recognition of her long service.



## Portmoak Community Council Annual General Meeting

#### **Matters Arising**

H54 note in last minutes for clarification 'The CC have asked the Cllrs to raise specific policy clarification with PKC Planning in respect of affordable housing provision, as this appears to be at variance within Portmoak, in comparison to surrounding Kinrossshire CC areas.' This point has not yet been clarified, particularly in relation to the novel self-build affordable housing plots posited for the H54 site. Chair to action and clarify the specific policy for this means of provision of affordable housing. PCC will qualify for a grant from PKC £287.34, to total exactly £700 at start of financial year.

#### Chairman's Letter (Abridged)

ANOTHER COMMUNITY COUNCIL year, 2022 – 2023, has passed and while we can perhaps finally look back on 'what we did during lockdown', every member of the Community will undoubtedly be feeling renewed pressure from the impact of the additional cost of living crisis. Hybrid Community Council meetings have continued, with a mix of both online and 'in-person' meetings. There is no doubt that, irrespective of format, Community engagement at the meetings remains limited. Hopefully the Portmoak Community Page and the *Newsletter* continue to represent an additional means of communicating information, minutes, events and issues of local importance. Sincere thanks to ClIr S McGregor.

PCC completed the 2022-23 year with five members, who represent all areas of the PCC catchment. We would however ideally like to fill all vacant CC allocation, so that as broad a spectrum of the community is represented as possible.

I would once again extend an invitation to any member of Portmoak willing to give up a couple hours per month to consult on issues arising and to try to make our community a better place to live.

It is unfortunate to report the frustration of both PCC and the wider Community that once again, recurring agenda items have not been adequately resolved. Progress has been made, despite it being slow. However, the progress is tangible, the items worth pursuing.

The Kinross-shire Local Committee has been renamed the Kinross-shire-Local Council and has evolved, following its trial. Meetings continue to be held every two months. With representatives from the CC's, Councillors and PKC Officers, the stated purpose remains to permit partial Local devolvement of certain PKC decision-making powers, to a more local level. PCC members agree, it continues to represent an excellent platform for issues which affect the whole of Kinross-shire.

Road safety and speeding continue to dominate the agenda. A significant issue remains the failure of PKC Roads Dept to implement the 40mph speed restriction order from Scotlandwell to the Bowhouse development on the A911, despite this being passed at the Kinross-shire Local Council Committee meeting in February 2022. Although assurances were received from PKC that signage placement would be implemented by the 'end of Summer 2023', the signage has not materialised.

The Portmoak Road Safety Priority List also continues to be a topic of frequent discussion. Despite efforts of PCC to prioritise this there has been an absence of return correspondence from PKC.


Widespread frustration remains within the community regarding the failure of speed reduction measures and signage. . Many believe it is only a matter of time before a serious accident occurs. Following the acquisition of equipment, the Community Speedwatch project can finally press forward. There has been

good volunteer response and it is hoped that volunteer groups can be recruited. Once training has been provided it is hoped the Speedwatch campaign can be passed to individual co-ordinators. If you wish to be involved, please contact us (chair@portmoak.org).

Over the last year the CC have reviewed and discussed a number of Planning Applications and raised issues where perceived planning contraventions may have occurred. Individual representations have also been made and PCC welcome this. Of particular note is the enhanced consultation powers of the CC's in the Planning process. This does however place additional responsibility on the CC members to be attuned to local concerns. The CC would like to thanks people in the community for conveying opinion the CC would strongly recommend they continue to do so. The LDP zoned H54 site in Scotlandwell continues to represent an application site of significant local concern and has extended beyond any reasonable planning consultation period. The policy clarification requested from PKC in this letter of last regarding the 'novel' self-build affordable housing provision and allocation on this site in comparison to surrounding Kinross-shire CC areas remains unanswered. This scheme has raised issues of environmental preservation, conservation village status, and issues of affordable housing provision.

The CC continue to participate at the liaison meetings for the Westfield Energy Recovery Facility. Issues regarding road signage, access road deterioration, vehicular movements are often discussed, and it is understood road safety signage is due to be installed.

The long-standing requirement to provide a safe public 'off-road' path connecting the villages of Scotlandwell and Kinnesswood does however appear to have taken a further step forward this year. Communication has been received from the Elders of Portmoak Church confirming their support for the Path initiative. The Woodland Trust have also given permission and positively endorsed the use of their land along the side of the A911. With regard to the lower path section from the Church to Scotlandwell, PCC have tried to contact the landowner for an

update, but had not been successful. It is hoped that the project can be finally driven forward. The Paths Group in Portmoak continue to work on path maintenance and vegetation clearance. The proposed path link from Lochend Farm to the Heritage trail, which was delayed, appears to have been resolved.

The future of Portmoak Church and Car Park: PCC have received communication from Church of Scotland that a congregational meeting will be held in December where members will have the opportunity to vote on the church closure. It has been suggested that the CC organise a follow-up meeting for the community in early January, to raise and discuss ideas around the future use of the Church building. Any project would need to be made under a Community Development Trust. Given the lack of adequate parking provision and the increasing prevalence of local events, the potential loss of off-road parking provision has been raised as a significant local concern. PCC are also trying to discuss options for an extension to the Portmoak Church graveyard.

Given the recent flooding, the Portmoak Resilience Plan is in need of review. It is intended an outreach programme to previous contacts and co-ordinators be implemented to assist. The long overdue upgrade of the Play facilities at the Well Green in Scotlandwell have been agreed and it is hoped these will be implemented early in 2024. A replacement of the goalposts and scheduled grass maintenance have also been requested. PCC welcome the clear success of the Portmoak Festival and Gala and it is hoped this will continue next year. Congratulations also to Kinnesswood in Bloom for the fabulous placing in the RHS Village competition. PCC would like to extend thanks to all of the volunteers and groups who continue to maintain the Community woodlands, orchards, paths, gardens, flowerbeds, Hall, Well & Wash-house.

I would like to thank all of the current CC members and Cllrs for their patience and valued assistance over the past year. I would extend an invitation to all members of the Community, to continue raise issues and engage fully with any CC members – your opinion really does matter!

# Portmoak Community Council News from the October Meeting

**Present** at the meeting were Cllrs W Robertson, R Watters; Cllrs A Miller, D Morris, A Davidson, S McGregor, K Donaldson, D Paterson and 2 members of the public.

#### **Matters Arising**

#### **Kinross-shire Committee Update**

The next meeting of the KC will take place on 23/11/23. Cllrs D Morris and A Miller to discuss agenda in advance.

#### **Road Safety Action Update**

Bowhouse speed limit implementation is believed to be imminent, Cllrs W Robertson and R Watters confirmed that the works order for this had been initiated. The Chair had in passing spoken to residents of Bowhouse some of whom had expressed frustration that the speed limit had not yet been actioned and wondering what power the KC had that the project was taking so long to implement. Cllr W Robertson affirmed that the order was top of the list for action at Transport meetings. The Chair requested the assistance of the Cllrs in obtaining a specific timeframe from PKC. Cllr D Morris raised again the request for a painted yellow box at the bottom of Bishop Terrace, a school safety action which had also been agreed some three or four years ago and this had been raised with Daryl McEown at KC meeting earlier this year. Cllr D Morris had photos of vehicles parked right up to the red crossing strip on road and these obscured visibility for children crossing at the designated point. Cllr W Robertson requested D Morris to forward him the photo and he would raise this with PKC Roads.

#### **Road Safety Priorities**

The Chair flagged that PCC were still to receive a response clarifying the road safety priorities list that had been returned from PCC to head of PKC Roads several months ago.

#### 50 Kinross Newsletter

#### Flood Debris Cleaning at Scotlandwell

Following communication from Cllr Robertson, the Chair had made enquiries and it appeared there were at least 16 responsible residents using the Sandy Lane, from where a large amount of the flood debris on the A911 road originates. There are problems firstly from old drain systems not coping, and secondly the sediment flowing off the hill blocking the drains. Funnelling water off Sandy Lane may be tricky but it would be useful for PKC Roads to have a site visit if possible. The debris on the road may create a problem as when dry, it creates a potential skid hazard at the junction corner. Cllr W Robertson commented that PKC are being responsive and coming out to clear drains and sweep roads, but ideally trying to find a solution to stop it happening would be better in long term. The Chair highlighted that this situation is exacerbated by a noted increase in severe weather events. Cllr D Paterson commented that silt lying on roads had recently caused flood water to divert across road away from a drain and into a resident's property in Scotlandwell.

Comment was made about flooding through Kinnesswood and along the Leslie Road. Cllr D Morris commented that even though drains were regularly cleared, during a heavy rainstorm the water picks up gravel and sediment so even clear drains fill up very quickly. D Morris felt there was work that could be done to make the Bishop Hill more stable and resilient. He had completed a response on Kinneston Long Term Forestry Plan and the felling of the sitka spruce plantations could lead to more rapid water run-off. D Morris had suggested that instead of replanting in the upper sections, the woodland should be allowed to regenerate naturally. Chair thought that surface water management formed part of the Kinneston Forest Plan and this needed to be checked. Lower down the hillside, at Bowhouse there was a block of woodland through which Cllr Morris had suggested a path could be constructed as part of a programme to connect to Bowhouse to Scotlandwell by an off-road walking and cycling route.

#### Speedwatch

PCC now have a list of names and a possible coordinator. There was a good response. Mark Craig from Police Scotland attended the meeting and suggested that experience had shown that initial numbers of volunteers tended to decline as the project progressed to the registration and vetting process. Police recommend Speedwatch volunteers do not work in their own areas as local frictions could occur in the event of someone local being caught speeding. This aspect had been previously discussed and there was still support for local campaigns. The Chair raised concerns about the sharing of telephone numbers as the volunteers would be managed through mobile communication. Cllr K Donaldson indicated that his wife was a Data Protection officer and could advise on an appropriate basic GDPR data protection wording. The Chair asked Mark Craig to clarify the registration process: delays could occur during the vetting process and getting individuals to supply identification and forms. These were sent to Tulliallan Police Scotland's Corporate Headquarters and then fed back to successful applicants. Training would be provided but not a certification. Once vetting and training was provided, police would check suggested areas for safety before speedcheck activities could commence.

#### **Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path**

PCC will continue to try to communicate with the landowner and Chair will advise CC Cllrs and Secretary in next stage of correspondence.

#### Play Facilities at Scotlandwell Green

PCC had returned the consultation results to the landscape architect at PKC. Works are unlikely to commence until the new year.

#### Portmoak Church – The Future For The Church And Car Park:

A meeting to vote on closure of the Church was to be held at the Church on 10/12/23 which coincides with a normal church Sunday. A follow up public meeting is suggested following this in January 2024 to discuss next steps for the church building, grounds and car park. PCC felt the car park was a necessity to the community, Village Hall users and functions and for visitors to area. It was also necessary to discuss and work out what could potentially be done with Church building. It was not felt that closure was imminent.



Windfarm Action Group – report from meeting w/beg 02/10/23: Cllr K Donaldson attended a recent meeting. There are no planning applications submitted yet for the three windfarms, it is all in preplanning. CARES (Community & Renewable Energy Scheme) this group reviews money that is available and distributes it to the communities. The objective of the Windfarm Action Group is to try to get CCs together to build a consensus of how to channel money. K Donaldson would circulate his notes from the meeting.

#### New Matters

#### Planning Forum Meeting on 25/10/23 in George Hotel

It was felt this was an important event to attend. The Secretary, D Paterson, and K Donaldson were available to attend this and would agree who would participate and report back.

#### **Scotlandwell Shop and Disused Petrol Station**

A resident had raised concerns about the condition of the petrol station and the old petrol tanks underground. Cllr D Paterson was keen to allay concerns about the disused petrol station. PCC had approached PKC for more information and had received a satisfactory response from the PKC Petroleum Officer as to the decommissioning of the site. The removal of any above ground items is down to landowner circumstances and the intended future use of the land. A further response from the Contaminated Land Officer at PKC confirmed that with regards to a former petroleum site, the Contaminated Land team would only investigate a site if we believed there was a high risk to human health. PCC consider the concerns have been been adequately answered by the correct authorities.

#### **New Applications**

23/01355/FLL Extension to dwellinghouse, Greenside Of Arnot Leslie Glenrothes. No CC comment.

23/01471/LBC Alterations to roof Colmslic Main Street, Kinnesswood, Kinross. No CC comment.

23/01520/FLL Erection of a dwellinghouse, fence and gate, formation of driveway, parking, landscaping and associated work. Land 50 Metres North West Of Newlands Wood, Newlands Farm, Wester Balgedie, Kinross.

The applicant and landowner attended the meeting. The new build was a small home being built on the farm for a member of the family, as an affordable option to purchase of a house on the market. There were existing hut type buildings on the site. PCC noted review of the plans showed a small two-bed property was proposed. Woodland on the site will not be cleared. The applicant hoped a letter of Support from PCC could be provided based on creation of an affordable home. The Vice Chair proposed a letter of support regarding the creation of Affordable Housing provision and this was agreed. PCC also appreciated that the owner had come along to represent on the application.

#### **Existing Applications**

22/01191/FLL Erection of 16 dwellinghouses (3 with detached garages, one with detached garage/ancillary accommodation), formation of 6 plots for affordable dwellinghouses, formation of SUDS pond, landscaping and associated works. Land 100 Metres South East Of Cragton Villa Rost Gardens, Scotlandwell.

The Chair had written to David Littlejohn at PKC who had confirmed that the application would go before the Planning Committee. Chair had requested to represent at Committee to uphold the objections made about the provision of affordable housing by way of single plots for sale and other environmental issues.

#### **Treasurer CC Accounts**

Michael Bruce Way: £1677.24 PCC account: £527.95

Treasurer commented on the increasing balance in the Michael Bruce Way and suggested the Paths Group should perhaps look to purchase some equipment and use some of the surplus funds. Cllr W Robertson commented that Milnathort CC had applied to purchase their own flail and this could possibly be used by other CCs. Cllr D Morris confirmed that some funds would be used to repair the paths map in carpark in Kinnesswood, as although the map was fine, the mounting requires repair.

#### **Councillors' Reports:**

**W Robertson:** Lochend farm to Levenmouth Path. Discussions had been undertaken with the Gliding Centre about safety at the approach to the airfield over the area of the path from Lochend Farm shop over the culvert and onto the Levenmouth track. On a site visit the tow-plane had been observed to fly low enough that the trailing tug cable had hit the trees. The Gliding Club have revised tow plane safety rules and circulated these to TRACKS. These would also be sent to the Levenmouth landowner. The funds previously made available for the path had by necessity had to be returned due to the delays in progressing the project, but these would be re-granted so the path could be finished.

R Watters: has been working to get a banking hub agreed for Kinross. Criteria for the town to have a hub had not initially been met due to a basic test that failed due to the linear layout of Kinross along the loch side creating a smaller footprint that did not accurately count the number of residents or businesses within a 1km circle. Only 2900 residents had been counted in 1km circle and only 29 businesses, whereas in fact there were 60 businesses. Cllr R Watters had a meeting with the administrators who admitted that the methodology did not work well. FCA referral for consultation. Crieff is being assessed, and Auchterarder will qualify. A banking hub exists in Carnoustie.

The Chair expressed thanks to Cllrs for work in the last year.

#### **Matters Notified To The Secretary:**

Safety Barrier Upgrade Work at Friarton Bridge, Sun 15 – Fri 27 Oct: the bridge would have only a single lane and some delays should be expected at busy times.

**Portmoak Village Shop – Now Under New Ownership:** PCC commented it was good to see the shop continue as a business within the community and wished the new owners well with their new venture.

#### **AOB**

ARUP Report for development of walking and cycling routes: Cllr D Morris had circulated an ARUP report from Tactran grouping of the roads' authorities in the central Scotland council area on the development of walking and cycling routes. The report is in response to new money flowing out of ScotGov for active travel, reflecting a SG commitment of 10% of the transport budget for creation of active travel routes connecting communities to each other and to transport hubs. This is very important as it sets agenda for spending for years to come. Cllr R Watters had observed that within P&K, Kinross-shire seems to have been missed off the plan despite having a need for new paths to help connect rural communities for safe active travel. Cllr D Morris was to attend meeting on 11/10/23. PCC and Cllrs agreed the priority for the meeting should be: 1. Kinross to Ballingry with links to Kelty and Westfield; 2. Milnathort to Leslie; and 3. Milnathort to Glenfarg. Approximately £6.7M could be potentially available pro-rata. Year on year the funds will be huge, and we need to gear up to make sure the projects and funds are agreed as strategically important within Kinross-shire and in the wider picture also connecting the huge areas within P&K, such as Dundee and Angus, and enabling people to move from one area to another across boundaries,

especially where there were sections missing. Cllr W Robertson commented on the benefits to an area in making walking and cycle routes: citing the recent survey on use of the Loch Leven Heritage Trail, the results had shown increase of users of the trail from 200K to 330K users. Visitors bring money to businesses in the area, and this is reflected in the shops and facilities locally.

Portmoak Hall AGM: the Portmoak Hall AGM had been brought forward to the 19/10/23. This will be in the hall at 7.30pm. Long standing members of the committee are stepping down, which leaves a problem of volunteer numbers to manage hall and fundraise. PCC would like to appeal to locals, perhaps from local user groups. The operation of KGV Hall Committee in Kinross was highlighted whereby a member of each user group must participate in the KGV Hall Committee.

Member of public flagged the approach of lambing time and observed that around Glenlomond people seem to be taking down signs and leaving gates open. When walking in the countryside the public need to take responsibility for themselves and their actions: keep their dogs on leads, pick up litter, and close gates. Cllr W Robertson commented that PCC had done a campaign of awareness in 2021. Another member of the public raised the issue of fly-tipping. The Chair suggested that the topic be added to the PCC November 23 meeting agenda for discussion and action points.

The next meeting of Portmoak Community Council will be held on Tuesday, 12 December 2023, online via Zoom.

Did you know that your grey bin can take, for example, empty medicine blister packs, fruit nets, bread bags, film lids (from ready meals) bubble wrap, clingfilm, carrier bags and (clean) foil? Just make sure all items are empty and clean as anything contaminated with food waster is not recyclable. Put items in the bin loose – do not put them into bags.

Save smaller pieces of kitchen foil, scrunch them together into a ball with foil sweet wrappers

and foil lids before recycling - this helps when picking it up.

Please do not put toothpaste tubes in your recycling, these must go into your green-lidded bin.








#### Kinross-shire Historical Society

On 20 November, Kinross-shire Historical Society met to hear a talk by Clare Hunter, a textile artist and curator of many years, based on her book Embroidering Her Truth: Mary Queen of Scots and the Language of Power.

Having grown up from the age of five in the magnificence of the French Court, becoming French Queen, then widowed at the age of 18, her return to Scotland was a big contrast. Being Catholic and female were both hindrances to her acceptance in Scotland. Later on, as a prisoner in England, the problems of Catholics and Protestants were also of major importance not least because of Mary's potential right to the English throne, a Catholic in another protestant country.

In the sixteenth century there was a lot of moving around, crosscultural, geographic and upward mobility. Outward show was more important, clothes showed who people wanted to be and to be seen. Rich textiles were very important and hoarded like treasure. In Henry VIII's court, there were 50.000 yards of precious cloth. At that time there were several women in important positions who used fashion to effect situations using dynastic emblems and symbolism in their clothes. Visual imagery was important, delivering messages in clothes and hangings in properties.

Tailors and embroiderers created it all, the power of the ruler and the prosperity of the nation. They had to be skilled in cutting, stitching and construction. They were adept at recycling reusing fabrics. Court embroiderers could become rich.

In Protestant Scotland, the frippery of the Catholic faith was being done away with. By 1570 the General Assembly had banned fancy cloth, embroidery, embellishments and bright colours.

There are records of the sewing threads Mary was given whilst a prisoner in Loch Leven Castle but it was while she was imprisoned in England that sewing became an obsession, working with Beth Hardwick, her jailer's wife. Her correspondence was read and censored but her embroidery gave her an outlet for her anger and pain, and after her death 300 pieces of embroidery were found, not all finished.

Dr David Munro thanked Clare Hunter for the talk which gave a new perspective to the story of Mary Queen of Scots, much remembered in Kinross-shire, being told through her embroidery, textiles and clothes.

#### **Kinross Climate Cafe**

On 7 November the Glenfarg Community Group presented an inspiring talk (or rather three talks) on the wide specs of environmental initiatives in their village.



Lindsay Spence opened the presentation with a very informative introduction on different projects initiated in the last couple of years. From Swap Shop events, through Tool Library to community owned wind turbines (under construction at the moment). The most dynamic development in Glenfarg has been linked with the Glenfarg Community Transport Group who initiated the Glenfarg Community Bus services (presented by Douglas) and an exciting new ebike share (by Tara).

Starting with the ebikes - three models have been obtained on loan for six weeks, which proved very popular with different users. People of different ages used them for recreation with family, shopping and even getting to work in Perth (regular users who decided subsequently to purchase their own bikes). The project also extended to build ebike shelters with a fund from Sustrans and to provide guidance on the use and bike care. The group is now waiting for a decision regarding a grant from Energy Savings Trust to further develop the project.

Glenfarg Community Bus success is well known in Perth and Kinross. Since October 2022, they have formed a charity providing a frequent, hourly bus service initially between Glenfarg and Kinross, currently extended to Perth (via Kinross) with possible bookable outings (a trip to the House of Bruar on 25 November or a concert outing to Perth on 20 December). We were also told that in January the community bus will take over the 55 bus route as Earnside decided to 'retire'. The service is run by 11 trained MIDAS drivers of three 16-seater minibuses and one 11-seater minibus, with an additional two minibuses providing wheelchair access arriving this week.

The bus service is not only frequent, but it can also have a flexible route and collect people from remote locations in the area. This can be arranged by ringing the service on 07394 317627 (more details available on Facebook @Glenfarg Community Transport).



Group outings also can be booked on demand by contacting the above phone number.

It is very inspiring to see how much positive change has been happening in Glenfarg for climate mitigation. 



#### **CATCH – Loch Leven**

Energy costs and interest rates are putting a huge strain on household budgets, affecting everyone.

As PKC look towards how to implement the Scottish Government targets for transition to a non-carbon-based economy, achieving NetZero in a socially just way, they have published their Local Heat and Energy Efficiency Strategy. Along with all councils in Scotland, this is a key step to quantify what needs to be done and what it will take.

The headlines are quite shocking. The recent surge in gas prices has doubled the number of households in fuel poverty, afflicting over 60% of homes across the county. This is where more than 10% of income is spent on energy, reducing available money for other housing costs, or indeed food and clothing. The squeeze is hurting.

The PKC strategy talks of two strands of activity; a major insulation programme to reduce demand and the transition to renewable energy sources.

While newer-build homes perform better, some two-thirds of properties require significant work to bring them up to modern EPC standards, estimated to require some £900 million over the next 10 plus years. As it relies significantly on each household requesting grants and loans to implement their own upgrades, this will be a long, slow road to reduce poverty and carbon emissions. Many have enough debt already.

Even then, with an average investment of £20K per house in insulation, about 25% will not reach compatibility with domestic heat pump technology, which is the preferred low carbon heating choice of the government, reflected by the PKC.

An alternative approach to domestic heat pumps is covered by the PKC strategy; that of using district heating networks. District heating brings several potential advantages compared to a single dwelling heat pump, including:

- Minimal change required within the home. Existing wet radiators will still work fine, with the boiler being replaced by a simple and reliable heat exchanger bringing warmth from pipes laid in the street.
- Using plant and energy storage of industrial scale, significant
  efficiencies can be gained. For example, bulk purchase of
  electricity to drive big heat pumps, timing this when renewables
  are productive, and prices are low. With the right level of
  storage, heat can be provided when our homes need it.
- Resilience is provided by having a variety of heat sources on the network, so if something makes one route more expensive, or it breaks, you shift to another. As new technologies emerge, they can be deployed fast, and you do not get stuck with a big personal investment in something which has become quickly out of date.

 As an infrastructure investment, long term loans can be secured over 25-40 years making the cost for each consumer stable and predictably low. There are large grants available to support such schemes. Variable fuel cost is moved into stable, fixed capital costs, reducing the monthly total.

The PKC LHEES strategy identifies district heating potential centred on council buildings in town centres. This is partly about the concentration of heat demand, but also about the ability to contract and control. Serving domestic housing and small businesses brings contract and billing complexity. It is worth noting however that in Kinross and Milnathort, some 24 of the postcodes use gas above the 'viability threshold' for anchor loads to seed a district heating system, if viewed as collective (i.e. a street rather than a building). This is a community wealth building opportunity beyond the current ambition of the PKC LHEES document.

This brings us to a key point. If we act together, all expressing desire to evolve a scheme which will serve our local community, then it could happen. If we were in Denmark, it would already be up and running, effectively, covering and delivering for the whole community. Eliminating gas would stop about 10,000 tonnes of carbon emissions each year. The pressure on our climate is obvious and we can shift the needle in the right direction. District heating networks can be implemented quickly, they are not novel. The technologies, methods and experience all exist. Just like historical support for solar panels, there may be best financial offers for a good scheme going early rather than later.

The community group CATCH-Loch Leven has been working to explore and detail how a district heating scheme might work here in Kinross and Milnathort, out to the limits of the 30mph signs, reaching the whole community and bringing broad benefits.

A key question from potential partners and funders is 'does the community want this?'. Clearly cheaper heating is a good prospect, but there is a need for folks to speak out in support. If we demand action with a clear voice as a community, then it is much more likely that something good can be delivered.



#### **Recent Meetings**

John Ross, Associate Member, gave us a fascinating history of watches at a breakfast meeting in October. Although 'timepieces' have existed for thousands of years, the wristwatch evolved throughout the twentieth century, from an elite possession to common ownership, from fashion statements to investment pieces. Over the past year we have continued to see stresses and strains on local households and increases in service use. This article outlines changes that have been made to address the increased need across Kinross-shire.

#### Foodbank

From January to September 2022 we saw 1424 deliveries being made compared to 1761 in 2023. In 2022 we supported 3862 people, 1888 of whom were children, and in 2023 we supported 4609 people, 2117 of them were children. That is a 23.6% increase in deliveries, a 19% increase in people and 12% increase in children having to access food support in the home. These numbers are going in the wrong direction.

On average we spend £1018.91 on food and vouchers per week in order to meet the demand we face by the numbers of people being referred to the food bank.

We see a split of approximately 25% people receiving food vouchers and 75% receiving food parcels. It is clear that cash support provides more dignity and is preferred by households, is more useful and more flexible.

#### **Energy Support**

Since January 2023 we have delivered over £10,000 of energy support to people in the Kinross-shire area in the form of direct payment to their energy providers. This includes purchasing oil, gas cylinders, payments to pre-payment meters and payments direct to energy accounts. We continue to work with The Heat Project in giving energy advice, advocacy and clearing debt. This is funded by the Arthur Margaret Thompson Trust (AMTT) and Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro Project.

#### Parent and Tots group

This group now operates over two sessions and runs with a baby bank as part of it. The baby bank began as monthly support and now runs fortnightly. It gives parents an opportunity to access free formula, nappies, wipes and weaning foods at a cost of approximately £650 per month. This group is funded by the Community Mental Health and Wellbeing fund from the Scottish Government (CMHWB).

#### Tuesday Trips

This year we have added a breakfast element to the Tuesday Trips after observations by volunteers and community link workers that families were eating their packed lunches straight away. This has been welcomed by the families on the trips but has meant an additional cost of £110 per trip. Funded by both AMTT and Food in Holiday Programme from PKC.

#### Women's Group

With the attendance of between 15 to 25 women at each fortnightly session, we have seen a steady focus on requests for support with mental health and anti-anxiety activities including wellbeing retreats, meditation and crafts as well as accessing cultural events. Events have included wellbeing days, meditations, sound bathing, games night, and quiz night is coming up soon. Funded by Women's Fund Scotland and CMHWB.

#### Counselling

Our counsellor continues to be very busy supporting clients and people referred by the mental health nurse. She is based at the health centre and also provides sessions by phone. A change over the past year has been the counsellor referring clients in for foodbank and additional support through other services. Counselling costs, on average, are £1500 per month. Funded by AMTT and CMHWB.

#### Winter projects

To try and mitigate the costs incurred to households we run specific projects coming in to winter including winter warmers and Winter clothing, funded by Community Investment Fund PKC.

In addition, the Christmas hampers contain a mix of food treats, books, clothing, and bundle of vouchers for local shops. This year we have no funding for the Christmas hampers despite the fact that referral agents for this include HSCP, schools, council tenancy support officers and community link workers, social workers, health visitors. We are currently raising money for this through a just giving campaign.

This year two coaches will attend a local panto with families who have accessed Tuesday Trips over the past year, including afternoon tea in a box. This event is full and there is a waiting list. It is funded by the PKC Community Investment Fund.

#### Funding

We have benefitted from some excellent volunteer support enabling us to claim back over £3500 in gift aid. We have also secured funding for three years for core funding through Gannochy Trust, some of which will be used to bolster our staff roles, hopefully taking some strain off trustees and volunteers who put in a huge amount of time and energy on operational day-to-day issues. We will also be able to access support from Cranfield trust who match us up with a volunteer management consultant who help us ensure we are working in the best way possible.

#### **People**

Whilst we use statistics, data and numbers to show the level of need in our community, they do tend to hide the fact that each number is a person, a family, a child. Each number is one of your neighbours, someone shopping beside you in Sainsburys, someone walking beside you in the park, someone waiting at the school gate beside you. So here are some stories from your community, who used our services this year:

'Having kids can be expensive when on days out and I don't often take them out by myself as my wee boy can be hard work at times. Attending these trips is great for me as it is lovely to be around other families and not feel like I'm alone with the children.'

'Carrie [our counsellor] has been great support. Invaluable through an immensely difficult and challenging time. For me, and sincerely, I wouldn't be here without her!'

'I love working with lots of different women – some I already knew but got to know better and some I didn't. And the group introduced me to working more creatively and pushing me out of my comfort zone in terms of art and storytelling. I like the focus on mental and physical wellbeing and that we get there through supporting each other, having a laugh, co-operating and collaborating. I think it's good for us and good for our children to see us taking time for

ourselves, having fun with other women, being valued for being ourselves.'

At our November club meeting, held via Zoom, President Jean Black welcomed members and guests and asked Programme Action Officer Gameeda Barnard to introduce our guest speaker, Catriona Scott, Deputy Manager of the Rape and Sexual Abuse Centre, (RASAC P&K). We learned that there are 17 Rape Crisis Scotland centres, located from Shetland/Orkney right down to the Borders. The first one opened in Glasgow in 1976, Edinburgh opened in 1978 and Perth in 2006, occupying their present premises at 16 King Street, Perth.

The organisation supports women aged 18 and over, as well as

young people aged 12-18. Areas of support include therapeutic

support, young people support (12-24), family support, justice advocacy, crisis support, a helpline and befriending group support. Survivors of rape and/or sexual abuse and their supporters have a safe and confidential space to heal from the trauma of sexual violence. They offer prevention awareness services, schools workshops, community workshops, youth group workshops, campaigning and events, professional training and RASAC youth ambassadors. There is a referral form on the front page of their website. This is a secure form and goes straight to the support team. For further information contact 01738 626290 or secure

# **Coming In To Roost**

OVER THE PAST FEW weeks we have been lucky enough to have spotted waxwings outside our office in the Pier car park, around Kinross and along the heritage trail. These fantastic birds have migrated to the UK for the winter from breeding grounds in Northern Europe and Russia, mainly in search of berries. They are a very distinctive bird, with a prominent crest, black eye-mask, yellow tail-tip and wing-tips, and you may also hear there high pitched trilling 'bzeee' call when flying overhead. Always a good idea to check tree tops for them, and they can be found in flocks of sometimes over a hundred.

We've also been experiencing plenty of typical British weather, with lots of rain and high winds. During storm Babet there were at least 13 large trees down over the heritage trail that were cleared, but we always appreciate any information regarding trees down during bad weather so we can ensure we keep the trail clear.

Our weekly volunteers have been busy with winter jobs, such as tree planting, grass cutting and helping with new fencing. There's also been work clearing brambles from woodland areas, and coppicing trees in order to let in light and space for new trees to grow. They are a great help, and are out working with us whatever the weather, which has been highly appreciated the past few weeks!

I'm Sally, the new Reserve Officer at Loch Leven, having started here in October. I started straight off the back of a seasonal post on the Isle of Noss in Shetland of which I completed three seasons. I've opted for quite a change of scenery from life living with just one other person on an idyllic island covered in seabirds and surrounded by wild blue seas, back to civilisation and working at the beautiful Loch Leven, covered in wildfowl and surrounded by woodlands. So far I've been enjoying my time here, keeping busy with plenty of practical work around the reserve, and seeing my first ever waxwings! I'm often working around the reserve so if

you ever see me feel free to say hello.

Other wildlife highlights we've had recently have been long-tailed ducks, Slavonian grebes, crossbills, nuthatch and hen harrier. We have seen the usual winter spectacle of pink-footed geese coming in and out of the loch to roost, along with whooper swans and greylag geese. Other birds coming in to roost in big numbers over winter are starlings and pied wagtails, which roost in reed beds. We're also still enjoying our usual red squirrel sightings, and often spot them burying nuts, which they do in preparation for winter when food might be scarce.

# Feeding Feathered Friends



IT'S HARD TO BELIEVE that we've almost reached the end of the year, but as we move into winter, we wanted to continue having a look at the other ways in which we support nature conservation by talking about our shop. Having had Christmas stock in since July (madness we know!), it's great to see everything coming together now and feeling slightly more normal as we move into the festive period. ## **Farming**





WE ARE WELL INTO the shorter days and longer darker nights of winter now and summer seems like a distant memory. All the cattle have been brought into their winter accommodation and I think they are quite glad to be there. In their last week outside, they were a bit restless but there was plenty of grass for them to eat and they were in two of the drier fields of the farm with a decent bit of shelter, which was just as well considering the storms we have had. It does seem to have been an autumn of extremes with exceptionally heavy rainfall on several different occasions, although I think we have been fortunate and missed the very worst of the storms, here in'newsletter' country. The conditions may have seemed bad enough here but other areas were definitely more seriously affected.

The potato harvest I help with for the local barley barons went remarkably smoothly, considering the deluges of rain in October. After a shaky start we were able to take advantage of ten consecutive dry days and get the healthy crop of Maris Piper tatties safety gathered in with only a couple of minor mishaps along the way. The harvester seemed to be working very well (as was the operator!), flying along at record speed. It certainly kept us busy in the tractors and trailers carting the loads of full boxes of tatties back to be stacked in the shed. It was the day after the tatties were finished and the day before the rain started again that we got our last bit of silage baled for the season after mowing it later one night a couple of days beforehand and it turned out to be in remarkably good condition, considering the time of year.

I am currently helping our local Christmas tree magnates bring in

their harvest, which is a very different process to be involved in, certainly for me. I have done this for a few years now (although not as many years as I have helped with the tatties) and I always find it fascinating how labour intensive a process it is to get a tree from field to shop floor, as each tree is handled individually at least five times by the time it leaves the field in a pallet. The weather hasn't been too bad so far for getting this job done, which is good because it's pretty miserable out in a Christmas tree field with wind and rain lashing down, although since I am one of the older members of the team I am generally tucked up in the cosy forklift with the heater on, moving pallets of trees from the netting and palletising machine back to the yard to be loaded onto trailers!

Meanwhile, here at backward farm, the annual cycle goes on. We are now fully into the winter routine of feeding and bedding the cattle as they are all inside. The rams have been among the ewes for a few weeks now and as far as we can tell, seem to be getting on with their job quite well. We have decided to split the lambing a bit this year so there will be some lambing in March, which will be the first time for a few years we have done that. The rest will lamb in April.

The pigs are getting on with their usual task of rooting about and they don't seem to mind the rain too much but it does make the daily task of feeding them more difficult and they need straw put in their arcs more regularly during winter.

The run up to Christmas is a busy time for the retail side of the farm with all the preparations required to fulfil orders as they come in as well as attending Christmas markets.

A very happy Christmas and a good new year to everyone.




