While the roads have been gritted and looked after as well as we can expect, the pavements were particularly treacherous during our period of Arctic weather, leaving some Kinross residents unable to easily get out and about.

This made me remember reading the fascinating book *Invisible Women* by Caroline Criado Perez. She argues that snow clearing could be considered a feminist issue.

She notes that in Sweden, roads were once cleared before pavements, a policy derived from data that prioritised

commuters in cars over pedestrians ferrying children or doing the shopping.

Studies soon showed that the practice of clearing roads before footpaths, disproportionately disadvantaged women, who are more likely to walk, over men, who are more likely to drive.

Swedish officials eventually realised that it's easier to drive through three inches of snow than push a buggy through it. A study in one Swedish town found that pedestrians were three times more likely to be injured in icy conditions than car drivers; and 70% of those injured were women.

Clearing pavements first also saved money. The cost of pedestrian accidents due to icy conditions – both in terms of healthcare costs and lost productivity – was about twice the road maintenance cost, and this dropped.

A further study in Stockholm revealed that accidents halved when the city started clearing its cycle and pedestrian lanes of snow. Interesting stuff!

If we do get another cold snap, have a look at the extensive list of Warm Spaces on offer in Kinross-shire on p17. Hopefully the pavements will be safe enough for people to get to them on foot if they wish to!

If you are interested in the future of the Salutation Hotel (currently for sale) on the High Street, you might be pleased to hear that there are plenty of ideas circulating about turning it into a community space.

I think the idea of a tourist information area on the High Street is a great one! It would be sad to see the building sitting empty for a long time as has happened with many other hotels in the past. See p23 for an interesting feature about the story of this historic building. And keep warm!

### WINDFARM PROPOSALS

In his open letter to Cleish and Fossoway community councils in November's *Newsletter*, Mike Barnacle raises many important points about the windfarm proposals for the Ochil hills. This is an area in which I have professional expertise, and I share many of his concerns.

Mike is right about the impact on the landscape. We are lucky to live in Kinross-shire, an area of great natural beauty, but also one that is not overrun with tourists. It's a well-kept secret. If we allow these new windfarm proposals to go through, the damage will start to become irreparable. The two existing windfarms will become five, of course, but that is not where it will end. Delivering the net zero will require a vastly bigger wind fleet – perhaps ten times bigger if technology improves, and 20 times bigger if it doesn't. Do you fancy more – lots more! – of these windfarms on the Ochils? Developers might but the birds and the bats may not agree.

Don't fool yourself that these windfarms will be built elsewhere. Many upland areas, such as the Cairngorms, are protected, so hilltop sites are in relatively short supply. Those close to markets even more so, so developers will push hard. With five windfarms already built here, they will argue that the landscape is already degraded. How can anyone possibly object when the landscape is trashed already? We will end up surrounded by steel towers.

There is always the temptation to take the developers' bribes — a new boiler for the church hall, new strips for the footie team — but that seems to me to be incredibly short-sighted. We should think of ourselves as the caretakers of the Kinross-shire environment. To wreck it for short-term financial gain would be shameful.

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And we'd be shooting ourselves in the foot too. While there is a great deal of propaganda claiming that windfarms are 'cheap', it simply isn't true. We can see this clearly in the effect on electricity prices, which doubled between 2002, when the country decided to go for renewables, and 2020, on the eve of the Ukraine war, when the surge in gas prices pushed them up further still.

So much of what you think you know about renewables, and in particular windfarms, is wrong. They are bad for the nation, and they will certainly be bad for Kinross-shire. Mike Barnacle and I are hoping to organise a public discussion over the whole question of renewables in the Ochils and in society as a whole. Look out for notices.


### **CLIMATE CRISIS?**

I was disappointed to see an entire page [January Newsletter, 2024] dedicated to an article based on the premise that we are in a period warmer than that of 100K years ago and that we should be doing something about it. Whilst factually correct to state we are in a period warmer then 100K years ago, the data point is not in context and appears to have been cherry picked. If we look at the temperature of ice core data beyond this to 500K years we see that around 130K years ago the temperature of the Earth was higher than that of today. There were no combustion engines or fossil fuels used then. From the data charts and there are many like them, the temperature changes appear cyclical so cannot be attributed to man or man's alleged excess CO2 emissions due to fossil fuel use: the 'polluting' gas boilers referred to.

David Cairns [CATCH] based his opening remarks on the premise that climate being the hottest in the last 100K years and ironically included a picture of the Lomond hills covered in snow. David appears to be promoting the concept of removing 'polluting' gas boilers along with the implementation of a District Heating Network (DHN) to one implemented at our expense no doubt though increased taxes such as the council tax, at £900 million by PKC and in alignment with the Scottish Government who have their own net zero agenda.

In truth he is only sharing the information about the current or up and coming consultation that will be used to rubber stamp such an initiative, through the proposed Scottish Government's 'heat-in-buildings' legislation. The climate data itself shows a different story than described by David and the Scottish Government. The Climate Cafe also uses the term 'climate crisis' and references the article David wrote.

As can be seen from the real data taken from studies of ice core temperatures and when put in context, the premise that



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




In January the Central (takeaway) marked its 35th birthday of trading in Kinross. They sent a message to their loyal customers on Facebook to thank them for all their custom over the years,

# Could the Salutation Hotel become a community asset?

AS MANY READERS WILL be aware, the Salutation Inn at 99 High Street, Kinross, is currently being marketed for sale. Given its long, rich history and prominent position, it is a building whose future use could have a significant impact on Kinross High Street.

It could also have great potential to support and enhance the Kinross-shire community through continuing to be a public gathering place and providing space for existing and new community initiatives.


In other towns around the country, local pubs have been bought through community share schemes, often as an alternative to conversion to Airbnbs or housing.

The Red Lion pub in Culross is a recent example of this, where a community purchase means the pub remains an intergenerational social space and the heart of the community.

When the owners of The Red Lion Inn in Culross announced they were retiring, villagers wanted to preserve the pub and run it to benefit local people. Profits from the community-run pub now fund electric bikes and car charging points.

Scotland's community wealth minister hailed the project as

a good example of what the Scottish Government's new community wealth building legislation is seeking to achieve.

The legislation, 'seeks to transform our local and regional economic systems to enable more local communities and people to own, have a stake in, access and benefit from the wealth our economy generates. Community Wealth Building can deliver more and better jobs, business growth, community-owned assets and shorter supply chains creating greater resilience and supporting net zero ambitions.'

Some ideas for a multi-use community building might include:

- Tourist information
- · Local heritage centre
- · Small business incubator space
- · Hotdesking areas
- Creative 'maker spaces'/ studios
- Accommodation for a Kinross-shire artist-in-residence
- Crisis support & counselling
   Many other great ideas will be out there; to get the ball rolling on



assessing the viability of a community purchase, the first step would be forming a working group of local people with passion, time and energy to talk to local stakeholder groups, seek funding for a feasibility study and register community interest in the building.

# PKC LEISURE CUTS: IS KINROSS POOL ALSO UNDER THREAT?


PERTH AND KINROSS COUNCIL are debating the future for our leisure facilities in the local area at a full council meeting on 22 January, just after this *Newsletter* goes to print. The three city-centre leisure centres – Perth Leisure Pool, Bells Sports Centre and the Dewars Centre are currently running at a deficit of £1.6m a year.

The most controversial aspect of the debate is the suggestion that Dewars Centre, which contains one of Scotland's premier curling rinks, could fall victim to the axe. Many, including Olympic curler Eve Muirhead, have expressed shock at the idea of the Dewars closure.

Perth and Kinross Council want to close the ice rink in Perth and the two other Perth leisure facilities and create a new centre in Perth (which would not include an ice rink).

At the full council meeting the councillors will be asked to consider options and ideas to bring together the provision of leisure in Perth to one site 'to ensure future affordability and provision'.

The review recommends creating one centre, which would contain a 25m, eightlane pool, fitness gym, sports hall, studios



and family play activities (but no ice rink). It is thought that it would replace the current three Perth leisure venues: Dewars, Perth Leisure Pool, and the Bell's Sports Centre.

Discussions will have to take into account the future of Loch Leven Leisure Centre as well, which is never immune to the threat of local authority cut-

backs. With many local residents feeling that Perth and Kinross Council is often 'Perth-centric' it will be interesting to see exactly where proposed cuts to the budget will be made. We hope it will not have a detrimental impact on leisure facilities provided by PKC in the Kinross area – time will tell!



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# **CAUGHT!**

### KINROSS COMMUNITY OFFICER

Police Constable Ben Samson has asked the *Newsletter* to express the appreciation of Police Scotland to those members of the public whose information helped them track down two criminals.

In April 2023, two males in a blue van were seen acting suspiciously



on various farms in the Kinross-shire area. The incident received a lot of local attention at the time, resulting in a great deal of information from the public. Following police enquiries, two men were identified and are now being charged with multiple offences.

Police Scotland told the *Newsletter, 'Two* men, aged 31 and 22 will be reported to the Procurator Fiscal in connection with offences relating to the intention to commit theft after a series of incidents at farms in the Kinross area. The incidents happened at various farms across the area in April 2023.

The 22-year-old man has been arrested and charged in connection with the incidents. The 31-year-old will also be the subject of a report to the Procurator Fiscal.

# **NEW COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH GROUP FOR KINROSS-SHIRE**

KINROSS-SHIRE SPEEDWATCH ARE A new local community spreedwatch group that has been set up to help monitor driving standards within the Kinross-shire area.

They held their first meeting at the Milnathort Town Hall in December, and received a great presentation from the Community Police Officer PC Ben Samson which gave all the required information on what is expected of a community speedwatch group and what forms need to be complete and checks that will be performed before a volunteer is approved to be involved in community speedwatch activities.

Typical speedwatch activities include placing the cardboard police officers in appropriate places across Kinross-shire, using speed monitoring equipment in a threeperson team to log vehicles travelling over the speed limit as per the guidance set by Police Scotland, recording the necessary information and passing this information on to Police Scotland. They will then notify the owners of the vehicles by letter that they have been observed by the community speed watch team of being in excess of the speed limit.

The point of Kinross-shire Speedwatch is not to catch as many excessive speeders as possible or for there to be any prosecutions but to increase awareness of what the speed limit is, to help drivers to observe the speed limit and the importance of doing that and to help ensure our towns and villages are kept safe and absent from road traffic accidents caused by excessive speeds. Success will be when Kinross-shire Speedwatch has

> no notifications or very little to send to Police Scotland and not the opposite!

They are currently in the process of ordering all the safety equipment we require and will be conducting training sessions as soon as it arrives.

A spokesperson told the Newsletter, 'We are still looking for volunteers, so that we have enough to cover the whole of the Kinross-shire area. Volunteers will not have to carry out speed watch activities in their own village/town. If you would like more information or to become a volunteer please email speedwatch.ks@gmail.com for more details.'

### **NEW GLENFARG BUS ROUTE IS A HIT!**

**GLENFARG COMMUNITY TRANSPORT GROUP'S** new extended 55 service, launched in January and running hourly from Kinross to Perth via Glenfarg, has already proven itself a hit with passengers.

The first few weeks were run as a 'soft launch' to see if the timetables worked and allow the drivers to familiarise themselves with the new route in and out of Perth. However, it has proven popular almost immediately with around 600 passengers per week making use of the new route.

It had been hoped that the bus could get to PRI, the pool and retail park 'on demand,' but it has proven difficult to keep to that schedule due to long-term roadworks in a number of locations.

These ambitions have been scaled back until spring and the introduction of the MooveFlexi App, which will show service punctuality to passengers. The service will also appear on real-time destination boards where available (coming soon to P&R, Kirkland's, Milnathort Church St and Glenfarg Copperfields).

In the meantime, the 55 will deliver passengers to Canal Street and the bus station, and those heading to the hospital can connect at Mill Street with Stagecoach Services 1 (to the hospital) and service 2 (from the hospital) which run every 15 minutes.

In Perth, the 55 bus picks up at the bus station stance 1 at 20 minutes to the hour and Mill Street (stop G for Glenfarg), then Scott Street outside St John's Shopping Centre and opposite The Twa Tams at 15 minutes to the hour. The full timetable is at *GlenfargCT.co.uk* or scan the QR code on p6. This timetable will be the most up-to-date and may change as the new service evolves.



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# **SARAH RANKIN COOKS**



I CANNOT COOK rice to the correct volume. Regardless of how often I do it, I always cook far too much. The happy result is that there are often leftovers, which are a vehicle for all kinds of fantastic flavours and base for quick suppers and breakfasts.

Bibimbap is a Korean breakfast dish that will wake you your tastebuds for the day, but you can serve it at any time. Its beauty is that you could top it off with whatever you like so it's a great way to use up leftover veg and meats too. I make mine with carrots, edamame, mushrooms and kimchi from a jar. This is a crunchy, spicy fermented cabbage relish which tastes a lot better than it sounds.

I then add chopped spring

onion, a crispy fried egg and dollop on a large spoon of homemade crispy chilli oil. This is a base recipe you can add whatever you like to, but the chilli oil, crispy egg, spring onion and fresh coriander are constants.

Simply heat your rice thoroughly – the microwave is the best place for this – add your toppings, and enjoy immediately.

## **BIBIMBAP**

### You Will Need

### **BIBIMBAP**

(Serves 1)

125g cooked rice

1 spring onion, sliced

1 egg

Half a jar of kimchi

1 tbsp of crispy chilli oil – recipe below

Few fresh coriander leaves

### **CRISPY CHILLI OIL**

(Makes 2 small jars of crispy chilli oil)

2 shallots

1 garlic bulb

750 ml vegetable oil

100 g chilli flakes

2 tbsp soy sauce

1 tsp black pepper

2 tsp szechuan pepper – optional

1 star anise

1 tbsp caster sugar



Thinly slice your shallots and garlic. Heat the veg oil in a large pan and add the shallots. Simmer gently for 10 minutes. The shallots should begin to turn golden.

Add your garlic, then simmer for another three minutes until your garlic has gone crispy.

Don't let anything burn, or go too dark as it will taste bitter. Use a slotted spoon to remove the shallots and garlic and drain on kitchen paper.

Add the chilli flakes, soy sauce, pepper, star anise and sugar to a large bowl.

Strain the oil through a sieve into the bowl

and stir everything together.

The oil should still be hot enough to sizzle the ingredients. Add the garlic and shallots and cover.

Leave overnight to infuse and then store in sterilised jars. They will keep in the fridge for around a month.





# THE SALUTATION HOTEL: A WALK THROUGH HISTORY



WOULD A 17th-CENTURY time-traveller recognise any buildings in Kinross today? Well, parts of the Salutation Hotel might seem familiar. The oldest section (in black on the plan) is a three-story house with an octagonal stair tower, dating from the late-16th or early-17th century. It would originally have been entered through a secure gated courtyard with access to the stables and rear yards as well as to the main entrance door at the foot of the stair tower. The modern door still opens onto the turnpike stair which provided access down a few steps to the kitchen or up to the family apartments and attic rooms. The form of the chimney stacks suggest that the roof was originally thatched.




We look at the history of one of the most historic buildings in Kinross – one which may be about to undergo yet another transformation

The hall to the east (in grey), originally two stories high, has a different alignment and floor height from the front block and was added later to create a downstairs dining parlour and additional bedrooms.

Originally part of a much larger property which included houses, a maltbarn, maltkiln, 'coble' (for steeping the malt), corn barn, barn yard and 1½ acres of toft land as well as 2 acres elsewhere, the house could have sustained a large household which entertained in style as well as providing wheat, flour and bread for sale. It may even have functioned as an inn

Built by a member of the prolific and well-off Steidman/ Steedman family, it apparently remained in the same ownership for six generations. However by 1695 much of the land had been sold off and by 1721 there were new owners, William White and Elizabeth Dempster. They updated

it with large sash windows an elegant new street door incorporating their initials and the date (still visible); they must have been frustrated when forced to site the door off-centre to avoid the earlier fireplace! Around the time of the Jacobite rising in 1745 the house was auctioned to a Mr James Stewart and tenanted 'John Meldrum, innkeeper',

the first secure record of it as an inn. It was sold again in 1799 and has changed ownership many times since then.

At some point the northern part of the plot, including 'dwelling house, brewhouse, yard, midden-stead, maltbarn, oven and half of the adjacent close', was sold separately from the main house. In 1725 the owners were David Mories and Margaret Simpson: the lintel dated 1729, now in the courtyard, was originally above an upper window and presumably records an upgrade to their 'dwelling house'. The whole stable block was demolished around 1970.

In spite of many changes, our time traveller would still recognise the core of the Salutation they once knew.

His passion for nature really shows through with his photographs. He is inspired again and again by the fantastic diversity of the visiting wildlife.





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# Three Million On The Move

### The Mass Evacuation Of Children On The Eve Of War

IN THE RUN UP to D Day 80 in June, readers might like to think about what it was like for little ones in Britain during the war.

On 1 September 1939, two days before war was declared, the evacuation of children began. It was the largest movement of people ever seen in Britain. Most travelled by train with their schools, and went to live with foster parents. The mass exodus of civilians in Britain during the Second World War was designed to protect people - especially children – from aerial bombing, by moving them to areas thought to be less at risk. In the summer of 1939, more than 3 million children were evacuated from the big cities in 'Operation Pied Piper', while most parents stayed behind to work and help out with the war effort. Yes, that number was three million!

For many children, this was a time of great upheaval, and the transition from one region to another was extremely stressful, as you can imagine. Children were lined up outside schools and stations, clutching small

Britain would invaded. With German air attacks underway, families in southern and eastern England were felt to be on the front line.

More children were evacuated, again, often from areas where they had previously been sent for

safety. Many of those who remained witnessed dramatic aerial dogfights between British fighter aircraft and German bombers during the Battle of Britain.

'We marched to Waterloo Station behind our head teacher carrying a banner with our school's name on it. We all thought it was a

holiday, the only thing we couldn't work out was why our mothers were all crying.'

Everyone living on the front home Britain in had to cope with shortages of food and clothing. People were encouraged to grow their own vegetables and to try

new recipes. Children joined in, growing vegetables at school and at home.

The war also disrupted the education of many children. Over 2000 school buildings

were requisitioned for war use. One in five schools was damaged by bombing, and air raids frequently stopped lessons for hours at a time. Although many schools were evacuated during the war, others chose to stay open. Cellars and basements were converted into makeshift classrooms. Teachers, books, paper and equipment were all in short

After the war ended, family life remained disrupted for many months, and sometimes longer. Evacuees who had stayed in the country now rejoined their families after years of separation.


Fathers returning from the forces seemed like strangers to children, who had never known them. For children who had lost parents or loved ones, or had been made homeless by the war, life would never be the same

For those wanting a bit more, there is a lovely novel about this.

Goodnight Mister Tom is a children's novel by English author Michelle Magorian, published by Kestrel in 1981. Set during The Second World War, it features a boy abused at home in London, who is evacuated to the country at the outbreak of the war. In the care of Mister Tom, an elderly recluse, he experiences a new life of loving

Comparing all this, we have a lot to be grateful for today, don't we?

backpacks, with gas masks and one toy each, identified only by a name tag. After the tears and goodbyes, it was off to the scary unknown: to families they'd never met, and to places they'd never even heard of.

Evacuation was an adventure for some who had never seen the countryside, but others were homesick and unhappy. Foster parents were often shocked by the lack of hygiene and poor diets of inner city children.

During this early period, known as the 'Phoney War', the expected air raids did not materialise. Many evacuees went home. In 1940 however, the invasion of France and the start of air attacks on Britain led to a second wave of evacuation. After the fall of France in 1940, there was a real fear that



Glass Recycling: With the recycling centre at Bridgend closed on Tuesdays and Wednesdays and closed from 4pm on other days due to budget cuts, it is more difficult for those wishing to use the glass recycling containers there. We have



also lost the glass recycling point at Sainburys. It was clear over the Christmas and New Year holidays that we really need better access to glass recycling points. With a view to this I have written to the Council and asked if the fencing at the Bridgend site could be reconfigured so that the recycling containers can be located outside the yard. This would allow access for users at all times. They have responded saying that this would not be easy as it could create blockages in the one way system. However they have agreed to hold discussions with Sainsburys to see if they would allow the Council to locate glass recycling bells in their car park. We really need to increase the glass recycling capacity locally.

**Empty Homes:** Kinross-shire has the smallest number of long-term empty homes in Perth & Kinross with 25. Almond and Earn have 51 and Highland have a surprising total of 124. There are 775 long term empty houses with Perth & Kinross. These houses will now have to pay double the normal council tax to encourage their owners to put them back into use.

Loch Leven Heritage Trail: As you may be aware TRACKS have been seeking funding to carry out phase two of the trail upgrade from Vane Farm to Kinross. I am delighted to report that we have been successful in our funding applications with grants being awarded from Paths for All, The Gannochy Trust and Perth & Kinross Council. It is hoped the work will be carried out in the spring of this year. The total cost of the path widening, resurfacing and remedial works comes to nearly £200,000.

**Aldi Application Milnathort:** I get asked regularly about the Aldi planning application on land in Auld Mart Road, Milnathort. The latest position, according to the planning department, is that nearly all the information requested from Aldi has been provided. However there are still some Transport Planning issues outstanding. A decision on the application should be reached by the end of February.

I have not been told what the likely recommendation on the application will be.

### Is Democracy Dead?

I am apolitical when it comes to party politics. My view is that people need to work together to get things done. I think party politics gets in the way of that.



In Kinross-shire, we are lucky to have four elected members who park party politics in Perth and work together locally. However, I do feel the need to take a pop at the current Scottish Government when it comes to development planning, as I think the current planning system completely undermines local democracy.

The way it currently works is that the Scottish Government require each local authority to prepare a Local Development Plan (LDP), which in theory is the measure used to judge each planning application received by the local authority.

Preparation of the LDP is a huge and costly exercise, which takes several years to complete and currently has a budget of £1.4m per year. Once prepared, the LDP goes to full Council where it gets debated and a finalised copy is produced. This means that



the LDP produced at this stage, reflects the democratic view of the people of Perth and Kinross.

The LDP which has been produced by the Local Authority, then goes to the Scottish Government, who tweak it to suit their agenda, thereby changing the document and this is where the wheels start to come off in the process.

When a planning application is received by the council, it is validated and then considered against the LDP by planning officers and should it be an uncontroversial minor application, then it will be determined by officers under powers delegated to them by the Council.

If it is a major application or a controversial minor application, it is then put before a committee of 13 elected members who consider its merits and then either give it permission or refuse it.

At this point, a heavy bias is introduced, in that the law allows developers to appeal a refusal decision to the Planning and Environmental Appeals Division of the Scottish Government (DPEA). However, should the application be approved, there is no process for objectors to appeal the decision.

The DPEA appoint one officer to look at the application and to determine it. Their decision is final.


An example of this process was an application to develop a site of 10 houses in the Back Crook area of Crook of Devon.

This application was considered by Fossoway CC who objected to it, as did other residents, so the application came to the Planning Committee, who voted to refuse it. The applicant appealed this decision and it went to the DPEA, who approved it. I think this is undemocratic and makes a mockery of the millions spent on the LDP.

### **Post Office Scandal**

Talking of undemocratic, I have been watching the Post Office scandal play out with fascination. The stories which have been coming out of it are heartbreaking! There are some interesting









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techniques used by the Post Office to deal with the complaints that people raised.

For example, there is one scene where a representative of the affected sub-postmasters, plus one other person is met with a team of eight Post Office representatives in a meeting (presumably intended to intimidate them). Another example is where the Post Office senior management decide to carry out an external review, only to drop it when it starts to come to uncomfortable conclusions. I think these techniques are very sad, and unfortunately, recognisable more locally.

I feel sorry for the people who work for the Post Office at lower levels. It must be very hard for them watching this play out. I think they do an incredible job, delivering our post regardless of the weather.

### **Council Budget**

The Council considers its budget on 28 February. The process is in full swing as I write this and it is not looking very good. There will be some hard choices to make to balance the books. Needless to say, I am deep in the process and it will be very time consuming!

### **Curling in Perth**

One of the issues to be considered in the budget process is the arm's length organisations which the council owns and uses to provide services.

These consist of Culture Perth and Kinross, who provide library, museum and other services; Perth Theatre and Concert Hall, who run the cultural programme out of Perth Theatre and Perth Concert Hall; Live Active Leisure, who provide sports for the Council and operate a number of facilities in the area, including Perth Leisure Pool, Bells Sports Centre and the Dewar Centre. These three facilities are currently running at a deficit of £1.6m a year, so something must be done to resolve this. As I write this, there is to be a Full Council meeting on 22 January, where a debate will be had on the way forward for these facilities. It is important that there is a curling facility and swimming pool in Perth, although I do struggle with the fact that many of the rural swimming pools (including Kinross) were built by public subscription. Likewise, the curling rink in Kinross was saved from closure by people digging into their own pockets and raising external finance. It will be an interesting debate.

The Scottish Government has made tackling child poverty its number one priority and one of the ways in which we are trying to have an impact is through the introduction of the Scottish Child Payment. I welcome the latest figures showing that child poverty has reduced 5% in 2023/24. The Scottish Child Payment, which provides £25 per week to every eligible child, is estimated to lift 50,000 children out of relative poverty in 2023/24. The cost of living crisis is continuing to affect households across Kinross-shire, and families are facing even greater challenges, with many struggling to make ends meet. The Scottish Child Payment will therefore be even more vital at this time of the year. 7,250 children across Perth and Kinross-shire are already benefiting from the Scottish Child Payment, which represents a cash injection of £10,157,115 directly into bank accounts in Perth and Kinross-shire.

Newly released figures show the real difference that devolving social security powers can make to people's day-to-day lives. The recent survey found that 97% of recipients of people across Scotland received their payments on time, 90% said their experience with staff was 'very good' or 'good' and 93% feel they were treated with kindness. In Perth and Kinross-shire, 91% of respondents rated their overall experience with Social Security Scotland as good or very good.

The Scottish Government has built a welfare system rooted in dignity, fairness and respect; whose foundational principle is to help and support the most vulnerable, in stark contrast with the DWP. That is not to say that they always get it right first time. They are a new organisation and are dealing with a huge transfer of information that the DWP gave to them overnight. My office remains available to assist in any cases where constituents are facing delays with Social Security Scotland transfer cases.



I have all my Grandfather's letters home from the trenches in Flanders to his Mither in faraway Scotstoun. Crisp as the day she opened them, the pencilled lettering in his immaculate copperplate is faded — calligraphy he learnt before leaving school at the age of twelve for work in the shipyards.



John George Stant was a volunteer. His letters chart a five year descent from idealistic young recruit certain that the war would soon be over because 'the Hun' wouldn't dare fight, through grinding despair at the mess and misery, to numb disbelief when an officer rode up and told the men that the war was over.

He'd reached the rank of Sergeant and had much to live for on his return. He was due to marry his sweetheart Jenny. He had kept up his mandolin and banjo skills throughout the war, getting new strings posted to the war trenches from a Merkat Cross music shop at a speed which would challenge today's Royal Mail. And he was keen to find out more about the new movie star Charlie Chaplin as Jenny kept saying how funny he was.

Johnny had every reason to imagine he'd be back soon and able to move into a family 'Home fit for heroes'. And he knew that 'the Boss' who had visited his mother – and fiancée – regularly throughout the War had promised them that his shipyard job was



waiting. If Johnny was jealous of these visits he kept his counsel, instead sending detailed instructions about how important it was to polish the brasses to make a good impression before 'the Boss' arrived for his visits.

But in reality his job had been given away. And unemployment loomed as a grim prospect. So he opted for paid work as a soldier, joining the Army of Occupation in Germany post-War. How he must have dreaded his reception that Christmas, billeted on a German family as their nation lay in ruins. But far from hostility he found kindness — and surprises. He wrote home in astonishment at the way his hosts dragged a tree from the nearby forest and covered it with candles. "It could go on fire any moment" he told his Mother. And under the tree he found a present, carefully wrapped, and labelled for the Scottish lad so far from his home and family.

I wish I knew those Germans' names. I'd love to trace their descendants and thank them for their family's kindness. There's was surely the Christmas message we can all embrace whatever our beliefs: a welcome for strangers. A conviction even in the darkest times that more unites than divides us. And an acceptance of the futility of war.

I wish you and yours the blessings of the season and a happy and peaceful New Year 2024.

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# **ACTION HEROES**

### WINNING WAYS

THIS WEEK I HAVE noticed that in spite of all the disasters and dramas going on in the world, there are still many stories of a heroic nature. There are countless people, who value life and its wonders, and really do appreciate it, in all its many facets, even when the world might think that that life is not worth living.

None of us could have missed the ongoing saga of Mr Bates vs The Post Office. It is a classic case of determination, and to quote Winston Churchill:


'Never, never, never, never, never, never, never, give up'!

Seven 'nevers' and only one 'give up'. It was said to be his shortest speech, but carried a big punch. Mr Bates, Mrs Jo Hamilton and all of the brave postmasters knew that the truth matters and it is worth fighting for.

Doris Haddock was an American woman of 94, who gained fame for herself by walking coast to coast across America. Next, she ran for Congress. She started walking because she wanted to change the system that only rich people are able to run for Congress. She took as her role model Mahatma Ghandi, because he too was a simple man of non-violence, who walked across India to draw attention to his cause. Her slogan was 'You are never too old to raise a little hell'.

Then comes the story of a young American called Aaron Earlston, who wrote a book called Between a Rock and a Hard Place. He is an outdoor sort of person, used to climbing, hiking and camping. But on this particular day, he did not take the usual precautions, because he was just out for a simple sort of strolling day. He was walking in a canyon, but dislodged a huge boulder, and managed to trap his right hand in an impossible position. He knew that he was sitting in his grave, if he didn't do something for himself. Using his camping knife, he actually cut off his own hand, and managed to walk to his truck, where he was rescued, thanks to an extraordinary train of events, making this book a 'must read.'

I have listened to Aaron talking, and he genuinely believes that he isn't extraordinary in any way, that we all have these superhuman qualities for self-rescue, if our desire to escape is strong enough. He says that the experience is something that he is now immensely grateful for, and if he could turn the clock back, he wouldn't change what happened, because of all the



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things that he has learned through this one incident. He now has a false hand, which he has designed himself, not a pretty thing, but incredibly useful with removable gadgets, which he markets for others who have lost limbs.

This story got me thinking about other unsung heroes: Victor Frankl who survived life as a POW, in order to help people understand better how the mind works: Ed Jackson the rugby player who lost all four limbs, and now is one of the best and bravest quadriplegic climbers in the world: Olivia Giles,a young Edinburgh lawyer, who also lost all four limbs through sepsis, and funded her own charity providing prostheses for people in Malawi and Zambia. Let's think about Joe Simpson who crawled off Mount Sula Grande with a broken leg, having been given up for dead. His book Touching the Void has many lessons about survival and forgiveness that could instruct us all, even if we never set foot on a mountain track.

Look hard enough in your newspapers and you will spot real life heroes who simply refuse to give up in the face of adversity. If you think about your friends, neighbours and family, you will know some heroes of your own. Ordinary people who have never hit the headlines, but who nevertheless have done extraordinary things, all of which would make great and inspiring stories.

### **Police Report**

From 5 December 2023 (last meeting) there have been 33 calls to Police from the Fossoway area and 2 crimes recorded on Police systems. On 14/12/2023 Roads Policing officers were carrying out speed checks in Carnbo where they issued a driver a ticket for speeding.

Roads Policing officers have also been out on the M90 near to junctions 5 & 6 following road traffic collisions. During these incidents various drivers have been charged for careless/dangerous driving, having bald tyres and driving whilst unfit through drink/drugs.

On 13/12/2023 PC Samson and PS Craig attended at the regular 'Carnbo Coffee & Chat' at Carnbo Hall for an informal visit to speak to the locals in the community. This was well received by the community.

### **Matters Arising**

#### Windfarms

The CC has organised a public meeting for 30 January 2024 at 7.30pm in Carnbo Village Hall where we will share the findings from our wind farm survey.

### **Community Development Trust**

An external funding request for monies to support the development of a Community Action Plan/Local Place Plan and website for the Trust has been submitted to PKC. A Trust member has submitted a fee exemption form to the ICO and is preparing a data protection policy for the Trust. The next meeting will be in February.

### Road Safety In FDCC Area inc. A977 Mitigation Measures

**Drum Crossroads:** PKC notified residents that their traffic signal contractor has had staffing issues which has delayed the installation of the equipment approaching the winter shutdown. They therefore decided that it is best to delay this work until the New Year. The installation will now commence on Monday 8 January and they hope to be in a position to switch on the junction between 15 and 17 January. For the contractor's safety, 4-way temporary traffic signals will be used during this time.

Following the switch-on, the only outstanding work will be the installation of the surface material around the maintenance areas. Due to the type of material being used, it is not recommended to lay it in current temperatures and therefore they will arrange for this to be completed once temperatures rise. This should be able to be completed with minor disruption.

### **Speed Watch**

CCllrs Bruce-Jones and Lamb attended a meeting of Speedwatch volunteers organised by Milnathort CC on 12 Dec. It seems like at last this is going to happen. There are potentially 20 volunteers either in the pipeline or ready to apply. Funds have been secured to cover costs for the first camera and ancillary equipment needed for the Volunteers. Milnathort CC is happy to order and store equipment. PC Ben Samson is going to co-ordinate and get this up and running channelled through Allan at Milnathort CC Unfortunately much of the information and vetting information already submitted has been found to be corrupted so all applicants will have to start again from scratch. Email addresses

of those interested will be sent to PC Samson who will reissue the vetting forms for completion. It was also suggested by CCIIr Bruce-Jones and agreed that further grant funding be looked at now for a second set so that two teams of three could be out and about simultaneously around Kinross-shire.

#### **Yellow Grit Bins**

A yellow grit bin has been requested for Craigend Rd., in addition to the two requested for the Aldie Rd. Concerns were raised by MOP that some side and minor roads were not gritted or cleared. Regarding community clearance question was raised about the ability of farmers to use red diesel in their vehicles on public roads to carry out snow clearance.

### Fossoway area transport – 202 bus service

Constructive meetings have been held with PKC and Glenfarg regarding Glenfarg and the Fossoway CDT jointly taking on a local community bus service. A further meeting of the Trust and CC is planned for 4 Jan 2024. There will be a need for more volunteer and employed drivers and more buses and community input on a timetable. No negative reports on the 202 bus running with the new 14 plate longer wheelbase vehicle.

### Note of Concern Regarding CC Review of Planning Applications

An email was received from a MoP regarding their concern that a CCllr had an interest in a recent planning application. CCllr Marchant replied to the MoP pointing out that CCllr members raised any declaration of interest at the start of all of our meetings and then did not participate in any verbal or written communication regarding the application. In this instance the CCllr had not attended the meeting and had raised a declaration of interest with the Chair via email prior to the meeting. CCllr Marchant assured the MoP that CCllrs always acted with integrity for the benefit of the Community.


### **New Business**

PKC new Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils comes into force this month CCllr Pye has reviewed the document and reported as follows:

A new section listing issues that are \*NOT\* PKC's responsibility, including: complaints (see later), internal issues, business we choose to be involved in, our own policies and procedures, IT support for virtual meetings, legal advice, insurance for third parties.

Next election is 6 November 2025 then every three years on first Thursday of November. 16 and 17 year olds can vote in CC elections. Candidates now only need a witness, no longer a proposer and seconder.

Number of co-opted members may not exceed a third (rounded)

of the \*maximum\* number of members, i.e. 8 / 3 = 3 in our case. Co-opted members still must wait 12 months before becoming full members.

**New Complaints Section:** CCs are exclusively responsible for dealing with complaints; any sent to PKC will just be handed to us. There's a guidance note on how to handle them, however this has not been updated for a long time.

New section on Virtual/Hybrid Meetings: We can do them how we like and don't have to include the public. \*BUT\* we must still publish the agenda as usual (in advance) and allow people to "address the meeting" in advance or during the meeting in any way we see fit. Minutes are to be taken and published as usual. Recording is only allowed if all present agree, and must be destroyed once the minutes are approved.

Accounts need only include spending the admin grant. Our electorate has increased from 1,535 in 2019 to 1,613.

Importantly we now only need to wait for three months after an election before we can co-opt someone else. However, this change will not come into force until after the next full election.

**Kinross Banking Hub** – Age Scotland reached out to us to see if we would be interested in sharing our banking challenges with a BBC reporter. Cllr Watters and CCllr Marchant agreed to have a chat with the reporter. Date to be arranged. Further analysis of why people use banks is required and implication that current policies on closures are discriminatory.

### Proposals for a Heat in Buildings Bill

Like many other countries, Scotland has a legal target to reach 'net zero' greenhouse gas emissions. The way we heat our homes, workplaces and other buildings is the third-largest cause of greenhouse gas emissions in Scotland. There is no way to meet our legal obligation to reach 'net zero' without changing the heating systems in the vast majority of our buildings.

The purpose of the consultation is to make public aware of Government proposal to make new laws around the heating systems that can be used in homes and places of work, and to invite your views on those proposals. This will have a significant

### **Notes from the November Meeting**

### **Police Scotland Report**

Whilst no-one from Police Scotland was able to attend the meeting, a report had been provided. Since the date of the last meeting (24 October 2023), there had been 100 calls to Police from the Kinross area, resulting in 29 crimes being recorded on Police systems. This included 12 crimes for thefts at Sainsbury's in Kinross. Officers are investigating these reports. A 36-year-old man has been arrested and charged in relation to six shopliftings with the stolen value reaching around £2000.

Community officers continue to carry out speed checks across the area during patrols.

### **Matters Arising**

### Proposed New Pharmacy, 145 High Street, Kinross

CCIIr Mckay welcomed Raymond Kelly and Kristopher Archibald to the meeting advising attendees that they were here to present and discuss the background to their application for a new pharmacy in the town.

The meeting was advised that Mr Kelly and Mr Archibald had more than 20 years pharmacy experience, having owned/run pharmacies across the area, as well as in Kinglassie and Falkland, with residents from further afield using their services.

Mr Kelly advised that he and Mr Archibald had undertaken some preliminary work to determine how busy the current pharmacies are, and what services they provide. Their findings showed that it would be beneficial for the town to have another pharmacy to meet the needs of residents, particularly due to the current strain on GP practices and the increasing number of new homes in the area, and they therefore asked to come along to the meeting to hear comments and thoughts on their proposal from attendees. CCllr Mckay confirmed that there had been positive comments on the Facebook page and she would welcome another pharmacy

to the town. In response to a comment from CCIIr C Willsher, who felt that the potential location was wrong, the meeting was



advised that a suitable venue needed to be identified prior to submitting an application. CCIIr M Wilson asked if consideration had been given to supplying an automatic dispenser, like the one in use in Milnathort, Mr Kelly advised that while this is something they may look into, they were looking to provide a service where residents could access professional advice, without having to make an appointment with a GP.

Mr Archibald, in response to a question from CCIIr S Wells, confirmed that they would be operating as an independent company, something which had to be set up to progress their application. He went on to say that the pharmacy would be known as a pharmacy first plus as they would be able to prescribe medication for a range of illnesses/infections as well as offering vaccination services. They confirmed that they were unaware as to whether other pharmacies in the town offered this service. In response to a question from a member of the public about employment opportunities, Mr Kelly and Mr Archibald confirmed that there would be a range of opportunities available including dispensers, delivery drivers and technicians. Employees would also be given the opportunity to undertake training allowing them to progress their careers. They both confirmed that they would need to look at the requirements for being a living wage employer but that pay ranges would be wide ranging and increase as employees progressed.

Prior to submitting a joint application, with Tayside Health Board, a survey will be issued asking for comments on whether another pharmacy is required and whether there were any other services which residents would like to see being provided. The survey will conclude in March 2024 when the application will be submitted.

CCIIr Mckay thanked Mr Kelly and Mr Archibald for coming along and Mr Kelly confirmed that he would forward the survey link which could be circulated. He also confirmed that Mr Archibald and himself would be delighted to come back to a future CC meeting to discuss the matter further.

### **Broke Not Broken**

CCIIr Mckay introduced Annie McCormack to the meeting, advising that she had asked to come along to update members on the work that the group had undertaken.

Ms McCormack advised that the group had provided over 2000 food parcels, supporting more than 2600 children in 2021/22, an increase of 70% and 31% on the previous year. Referrals to the organisation came from a range of organisations including social work, housing tenancies and schools, as well as self-referrals. In 2022, a total of £82,000 had been spent on vouchers and both perishable and non-perishable items, and while they had received a donation from the Thomson Trust, most had come from the community. However, it is expected that more will be spent this year, although donations are reducing, mainly due to the current cost of living crisis. It was noted that 80% of users were women. While the organisation offers food parcels and energy payments, they also offer a wide range of services including counselling, organised trips during school holidays and support groups. January and February tend to be the busiest months. They

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In response to a question from CCIIr Willsher in terms of what the CC could do to help, Ms McCormack asked for residents to write to MSPs asking what they are doing to help. She said that the system is not keeping up with the increase in requests for help, the eligibility criteria is not fit for purpose, and particularly highlighted that PKC has no poverty strategy and any funding for this is not spent in a strategic way. Structural change is required. It was also suggested that the CC reminds residents to purchase something which can be donated when they are doing their shopping (there is a list of suitable items in Sainsburys). CCIIr Wells asked if it was possible to tap into unused Nectar card points and Ms McCormack advised that they could not do this, but that there was a gift card which sat in Sainsburys which people could add funds to. The CC were not aware of this and agreed to advertise this more prominently.

Cllr R Watters asked if any difference had been made following last winter's energy payments and Ms McCormack advised that there had been 35 referrals last week alone.

In response to a question from CCIIr W Freeman about contacting bakers etc regarding receiving unsold produce at the end of the day, Ms McCormack confirmed that they had done this during Covid but this had stopped as recipients had felt that this made them feel like second class citizens.

On behalf of KCC, CCIIr Mckay thanked Ms McCormack for attending to update them on the work of the group.

### **Matters Arising**

**Parking:** Cllr N Freshwater has raised several issues regarding parking in the shared spaces with PKC and these have been added to the list for the road safety programme.

CCIIr E Leslie and CIIr R Watters advised that they had spoken with several business owners in the High Street and all had supported the removal of the 1hr parking restrictions as this caused issues for customers, an example was given of customers of the Funeral Directors being issued with parking tickets. Businesses had confirmed they would be willing to give statements in support of the recommendation.

With regard to the issues highlighted at the previous meeting re irresponsible parking causing issues for a disabled resident, Cllr Cuthbert confirmed he had walked around the town to see the problem for himself, and he was now chasing PKC officers for a date for them to visit. An update will be given in due course.

**Bus Shelter (Kirklands Hotel):** Cllr Cuthbert advised that there has been a delay in replacing the bus shelter due to an issue with the final amount for the claim.

**Banking Hub:** Cllr R Watters advised that Cash Access UK had requested a meeting (Cllr Watters will attend the meeting) and an update will be given in due course.

**Walking Bus:** The meeting was advised that this had been scrapped due to a lack of volunteers.

### **Kinross Town Centre**

Parking: further to the discussion in item 8, members were advised that an email had been received from a resident highlighting parking concerns and it was agreed that the email would be forwarded to Councillors. Cllr Cuthbert commented that a request could be made for PKC parking wardens to visit in the evening. He also commented that a new parking restriction was being introduced across Scotland where it would be illegal to park on pavements.



### **Other Planning Matters**

22/01004/FLL - erection of a retail unit (Class 1), formation of parking areas, landscaping and associated works (LDP site E21) at Auld Mart Business Park, Kingfisher House, Orwell Road, Milnathort, Kinross

There was a general discussion about the applications for Auld Mart Business Park and the BCA site and it was felt that while it would be beneficial to have a choice of retail units (Aldi/Lidl) in the town, there was an impression that there was only support for one.

In respect of the revised planning application for the proposed retail unit at Auld Mart Business Park, there was a discussion around this and in response to a question from CCIIr Leslie, it was noted that the CC had not yet submitted any comments on the application. The CC had been given an extension to allow them to submit any comments if they so wished. Following discussion, a decision was taken to vote on whether to support the application or not. Members voted in favour of supporting the application (8 votes) with one member voting against. It was also noted that while one CC member voted in favour, they felt that the location was wrong.

### **Reports From PKC Councillors**

Clir Cuthbert advised that he had completed a walkabout in the town centre following the issue raised by a disabled resident regarding cars parking at dropped kerbs etc and he will chase up PKC about its findings. He also commented that there had been a recent announcement where Scottish Government may start to charge up to double the amount of council tax for second homes, which may affect several residents.

Kinross Newsletter Fund had recently made seven funding awards to local groups.

Glenfarg Transport Hub had recently purchased e-scooters with the Civic Trust providing funding for bike storage/shelters for customers waiting on buses.

**Clir R Watters** advised that survey markings had been put down at the bridge connecting Milnathort and Kinross CC areas.

He also reported that flood defence mechanisms had been discussed by PKC the previous day and it had been agreed that

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the culvert behind Montgomery Way would be redirected.

Cllr Watters advised that the options for the BCA site were being looked at, and that there had been an increase in costs regarding flood prevention. It is hoped that the flood work will be complete by 2025 but it should be noted that any application for the BCA site may take 3-4 years to get through the planning process.

Cllr Watters also advised that a report on several options regarding regional transport would be put to the Kinross Partnership Committee in February 2024 and an update will be given at a future meeting.

### **Reports from KCC Councillors**

**CCIIr T Stewart** advised that his farm had received two green bins a few months ago and had received a smaller bin yesterday and asked for advice as to who to speak to about this. He was advised to report this to PKC via their portal and he agreed to do this.

**CCIIr S Wells** reported an increase in the amount of dog fouling in the area and although she has reported this to the dog warden, CIIr D Cuthbert asked her to forward him the details and he would also report the issue.

CCIIr E Leslie asked if it would be possible to have double yellow lines painted outside the primary school to deter motorists from parking there and CIIr Cuthbert advised that this request was on schedule of works for the road traffic programme. CCIIr Mckay commented that there had been an incident the previous day where an ambulance could not access the tennis club due to parked cars.

**CCIIr W Freeman** asked that sub-committee membership be added to the agenda for the next meeting, with a sub-group for planning to be added to the list.

**CCIIr L Mckay** asked for an update on drain cleaning and was advised by CIIr Cuthbert that this is undertaken on a rotational basis and he would investigate whether any issues had been reported.

CCIIr Mckay also commented on the dangerous parking which had been witnessed during the successful festive market in the Muirs/Springfield Road areas.

### **AOCB**

### **PKC Grev Bin**

In response a question from a member who sought clarification on whether medication blister packs should be placed in their grey bin, Cllr Robertson advised that information provided by PKC should be followed.

### KOSAG

David West from the group advised the meeting that the group were close to finalising the second stage of their application regarding their Community Asset Transfer application and it was hoped to submit this prior to Christmas. The group will continue to keep KCC updated on their progress.

### **Remembrance Parade 2023**

CCIIr Mckay thanked everyone for their support and help in making the Parade successful. She also thanked Lodge St Serf for the use of the hall to provide refreshments to the community. The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be on 27 February 2024 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall. All are welcome.

The January meeting was cancelled.

### **Matters Arising**

### **Keltybridge Pavements**

There was a site visit by PKC Roads Manager Garry McConnel where it was discovered that the pavements in Keltybridge have not been adopted by PKC.

### **Keltybridge Drainage**

The drain at Borrowdale remains blocked. Scottish Water closed the excavation as the drain runs under the nearby private road and so is not within the jurisdiction of Scottish Water or PKC Roads Department.

### **Cleish School Sign**

The PKC Education committee is looking at removing the sign and replacing with one which is more appropriate for the area.

Crimes of note since last meeting:

25/09/23 – Driving whilst unfit and careless driving (B9097, Cleish Road). Driving while unfit through drugs / failure to negotiate left-hand bend and left road into a field. One person charged and reported to the Procurator Fiscal.


20/11/23 – Wilful Fire-raising (Fruix). Motor vehicle set on fire. Subject to an active investigation.

Traffic units have recently been carrying out speed checks in the area most notably on the M90 at junction 5. During this period tickets have been issued for speeding and a driver charged with driving under the influence of drugs.

### **Broadband Update**

### **Blairadam Area**

The final phase of the Keltybridge and Blairadam Fibre Project is now underway, with funding secured to connect the remaining 12 properties. Openreach has started the survey work and will be providing an update in the near future on estimated timescales. There are 2 remaining properties in the area which are excluded from this project due to being part of the R100



rollout scheduled for later in 2024, however it is hoped that these properties will be pulled into the new Openreach project as they are served by the same access point.

### Cleish Area

Deployment is progressing, but there are a small number of properties around Cleish Castle which may not yet be connected. Kinross-shire Committee

The CC Chair provided an update from the latest meeting:

PKC is adopting a "No Mow" strategy in PKC Parks and Verges to reduce costs and improve the environment for wildlife. The CC raised concerns that verges at junctions would still be mowed to ensure safety for vehicles. Advice was to use the PKC Portal to report any junctions where growth on the verge was causing a road safety issue.

A future meeting will be looking at the planning process and how the community and CCs can engage with the planning process.

### Drainage

### Cleish

Flooding in the village resulting from water and mud run off from a nearby potato field has resulted in extensive erosion of the recently repaired road surface leading to Cleish Cemetery, raising health and safety and access concerns. Resultant water build-up in the cemetery car park endangers the stability of the stone wall, already in a poor condition due to tree root damage. PKC are liaising with landowners with a view to improving flood resilience going forward. However, it is noted that saturation of the ground is currently preventing remediation work being carried out.

### Keltybridge

The entrance to Middleton Park regularly floods during heavy rain as the nearby drain appears to be unable to deal with the volume of water. The drain appears to be partially blocked, or restricted as the water does eventually clear after about a day.

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Despite intervention and excavation by Scottish Water during November and December 2023, the flooding problem remains as water is not flowing away from the drain on the main road at the corner with Borrowdale.

### **Financial Update**

Financial balance is £604.06 which includes the PKC top up of £290.38 received into the bank account on 7th November. Wind Turbine Applications on the Ochil Hills

Charles Maclaren provided a report from a meeting with the local windfarm group where a successful community organisation in East Ayrshire presented how they had grouped together the 9 local Community Councils to negotiate collectively with the windfarm developers to provide the best benefits for all the local community areas. It was clear that the local community councils in the Kinross area can learn from the approach taken by the East Ayrshire group. The Cleish and Blairadam Community Council will canvas the local community to gauge interest in joining a similar local initiative.

### **Local Place Plan**

Sean Gordon attended the PKC Planning Users Forum where the Local Place Plan was discussed. The Local Place Plan is the most effective way that a local community can express their vision for the future of their local area as the council is required to take into account any existing Local Place Plan when looking at planning applications.

The Local Place Plan for Cleish and Blairadam would need to be submitted by September 2024 to be considered as part of the next PKC Local Development Plan which will run from 2027 to 2037

The Cleish and Blairadam Community Council will canvas the local community to gauge interest in developing a Local Place Plan for Cleish and Blairadam.



### **Planning**

Under the new guidance, an objection by the Community Council automatically refers an application to the Planning Committee; otherwise, it requires 6 objections from separate households to refer an application.

23/01565/LBC Installation of replacement roof window and garage roof covering, Middleton House, Blairadam, Keltybridge. 22/02113/IPL Erection of a dwellinghouse (in principle) land 30 metres north east of Craigbank House, Cleish.

22/02018/FLL Siting of 2 holiday accommodation units, stable building/log store, 3 sheds and garage, formation of access road and associated works (in retrospect) land 190 metres north-west of Blairfordel Farm, Kelty. This land is already subject to multiple enforcement orders for PKC for unapproved development.

23/01706/FLL Change of use of woodland to form extension to garden ground and erection of garage, 8 Abbot's Wynd, Keltybridge, Kelty. This land is subject to enforcement notice. The CC will object.

### **Applications Refused**

23/00532/FLL Erection of a dwellinghouse and associated works land north of 31 Main Street Keltybridge. This application was opposed by the CC and attracted a large number of objections from the local community. The refusal has now been referred to the PKC Local Review Body and is on the agenda for the 18 December Meeting. This site is also subject to an enforcement notice as a condition of the planning consent of the previous development of No 29 & 31.

### **Blairforge**

The land around here is subject to a number of enforcement orders by PKC for breaches of planning.

Residents of the development known as Purple Meadows raised concerns about their interactions with PKC planning, particularly in relation to the recent attempt to enforce the removal of unauthorised structures on this land. The advice given was that any attempt to develop or build on this land must have the appropriate planning permission from PKC, so any developments

should be applied for so that the relevant planning process and legislation can be followed.

The local councillors also suggested that the residents submit for a pre-planning enquiry for the whole site to understand any planning concerns.

### **Village Updates**

A number of properties still have not received their grey lidded recycling bins, but it is understood from the attending councillors that the distribution of these bins is still a work in progress.

The next meeting of Cleish & Blairadam Community Council will be Monday 5 February, at 7.30pm in Cleish Village Hall. It is hoped that with the imminent arrival of fibre broadband at the Tabernacle Hall in Keltybridge that the CC can once again begin meeting there on alternating dates in 2024.

### WINTER ROAD SAFETY

### **Advice For Pedestrians**

- Dress for the weather by wearing reflective or bright-coloured clothing so other road users can see you when it's dark or visibility is poor
- If you are walking home late at night, make sure someone knows where you're going and when
- Vehicles can take up to ten times longer to stop on slippery road surfaces so take extra care crossing the road
- Stick to pedestrian crossings
- If there are no crossings nearby, find a place with a clear view and wait for long gaps in the traffic before crossing the road
- Don't cross the road between parked vehicles, unless it can't be avoided then take extra care (look out for vehicles that suddenly pull out or reverse)
- Never cross the road behind a bus
- If there is no pavement, keep to the right hand side of the road so you can see traffic coming towards you.

### **Advice For Cyclists**

- Make sure your bike can be seen by people on the road
- Use a good set of front and rear lights (white at the front, red at the back)
- Wear clothes that help you be seen on your bike, such as bright and light reflective items
- Pay attention to road signs, markings and particularly red lights
- Do not cycle on the pavements, they may be slippery and can also endanger pedestrians
- Be mindful of the effects poor weather can have on other road users
- Make sure you know about the dangers around you
- Cars can take twice as long to stop in wet weather
- Braking can be unpredictable in ice and snow.

### **Advice For Drivers**

- Make sure your car is ready for winter
- Check that your tyres, brakes, windscreens, wiper blades and windows are free from defects and clean
- Drive to the road conditions. Road conditions can change



- without warning, stopping distances will be affected by the weather
- Make sure your windows are clean and aren't misted up
- Make sure there is no snow and ice on your windows before you drive
- When the roads are icy, drive at a slow speed in a high gear
- Accelerate and brake very gently
- Driving distracted (for example, using a Sat Nav) can cause additional stress. It is dangerous to yourself, passengers and other road users.





THOUT AGE SCOTLAND C Kinross-shire Trishaws are busy making

plans to restart our rides at Easter time – or sooner if the weather allows. We are recruiting new pilots to ride the bikes this year.

Rides are usually Monday to Friday (mornings and afternoons) but if we can get enough volunteers available at the weekend, we could open up another opportunity to take more passengers.

All of our bikes are e-bikes so little fitness is needed. Volunteers should enjoy helping our passengers to get out and about in the local countryside to admire the views and feel the wind in their hair.

An interest in others, sharing stories and meeting people is all that's required. Full training is provided to all volunteers and the minimum commitment is to deliver one ride a month.

We also had a carol concert on Tuesday 19 December with Margaret Sikora and Rosemary Tolson. Everyone enjoyed a great afternoon.




The coffee bar has been very busy recently and, as well as our regulars, it has been nice to see visitors to the area coming in and enjoying the service.

The Parent Council enters the third term of the 2023/24 academic year after a busy first six



We look forward to a busy term ahead.





### Raingardens Update


The Trust has been successful in obtaining grant funding to carry out additional planting in the peripheral areas of the Kinross Park & Ride. This should result in improved visual amenity and biodiversity.

Further works will take place in the coming months in the wetland areas just off Junction Road. An existing pool will be widened and deepened, and an additional, smaller pool will be created. This should create an improved habitat for amphibians. More wetlandloving plants will also be put in place. Excavations to create the pool will take place from 7 to 10 February.

The wetlands at Junction Road are a floodplain and these works will assist in preventing or reducing flooding in and on man-made structures such as roads and housing.

### Kinross Historical Society

The January talk on The Fife Pilgrim Way was given by Iwan Thomas from the Fife Coast and



Historically there were four different routes through Fife starting off at Queensferry and going through towns like Dunfermline and Scotlandwell on the way to St Andrews. Queen Margaret, who became a saint, assisted pilgrims on their way providing such things

as boats to cross the Forth. Along the routes were inns, chapels and alms houses offering resting places.

Pilgrims would buy badges which they wore and indulgences which offered protection. This was seen as corrupting the church and the Reformation of the church saw the end of pilgrimages.

Scotland's Pilgrim Routes Forum has started setting up various pilgrim routes around the country. The last 30-40 years has seen a revival of interest in pilgrimages although perhaps not for the same reasons as in medieval days.

The Fife Pilgrim Way idea was started in 2012 and funding was acquired by 2017. It was ready to open in 2019 but the Covid-19 outbreak in early 2020 stopped the big launch. The ideas behind it were to encourage visitors to inland Fife and to help to connect people with the environment. The route cost nearly £1 million, including the cost of path laying, fencing, gates and signage.

The route doesn't match any of the old routes but can be started from either Culross or North Queensferry, finishing in St Andrews. It crosses old industrial areas, built-up roads, beautiful countryside and historic villages. It is about 64 miles long in 7 key sections which can be done individually. It can be done easily using public transport.

Community involvement has been, and continues to be, important. Future plans include 'champing' which would get churches to open up for pilgrims to stay overnight on their journeys, keeping the path maintained in good condition and improving signage. The long term plan is for community ownership and collaboration with volunteer support.

Iwan Thomas recommended *The Fife Pilgrim Way* by Ian Bradley to anyone who wants to know more.

Anne Milburn gave the vote of thanks, saying that many members were walkers and would really benefit from walking the Pilgrim Way with its fascinating sense of history as outlined by Iwan Thomas.

### **Broke not Broken**

Happy New Year from all of us at Broke Not Broken. As our volunteers hit the ground running this January with meeting the increasing demand for support, and running projects to help those living with the effects of poverty

across Kinross-shire, we are also reflecting on 2023.

'Busy' may be the over-riding word from last year, but also a real sense of community building within our projects; friendships growing and a lot of fun and laughter!

As a team we were completely blown away by the kindness and generosity right across the community, from local groups and individuals who supported us in the lead up to the holiday period so thank you!

On 3 December we held our Christmas hamper pack which were wrapped and packed by members of the community who kindly donated their time. We made and distributed 159 Christmas hampers this year They were filled with Christmas treats, vouchers for Baynes, Winton's fine foods or Hunter's butchers and local supermarket vouchers, most of which were delivered the same day by volunteers who braved the challenging weather conditions we had that weekend. Thanks to the Green Hotel for their kind donation of the space for the day.

We were able to secure funding to take 100 people to the Panto to see The Wizard of Oz at the Alhambra over the holiday period and everyone who attended had a lovely takeaway afternoon tea from Heaven Scent as part of the trip. A fantastic day out which was much enjoyed by all. We are looking forward to our Tuesday trips running again in the Easter holidays.

We also distributed 80 winter warmer packs in October which have winter veg, vouchers for the butchers and, if required, a slow cooker and electric blankets. We received some lovely feedback from families using this to make several meals. These will go out again within the next month.

Throughout November and December we saw a rise in referrals for food and energy support as the cost of living continued to impact those locally and the colder weather began. We provided over 900 food supports (food parcel or voucher) during the same months. We spent over £15000 on energy payments in 2023 to support those across Kinross-shire.

The rising cost of living was reflected in the foodbank with a 37% increase in foodbank costs, food or vouchers, rising to £113,573 this past year. This reflected both more people needing support (40% increase in new households!) and the food we buy costing more. We are incredibly well supported by the community and thank everyone for this; much of the foodbank is funded by donations from those within our local community, without which we would not be able to meet the needs of those requiring support.

As we move forward in 2024 part of our focus will be on hearing from those we support and the community to improve, continue or change what we do but also to better advocate for change with councillors, local authority and panels we sit on. If you want to see change happen, we encourage you to contact your local councillors and MP/MSP to ask what they plan to do to improve the livelihoods of those living on low incomes within our community and hold them to account for this. As demand and rising costs look likely to outstrip our funding this year for the foodbank this advocacy is needed more than ever before. Our team of volunteers continue to work incredibly hard ensuring people have the essentials they need; they go above and beyond every time. However our ultimate goal is for there to be no more foodbank in Kinross; to see demand fall, not increase, year on year.

Perth District League matches have resumed after the festive break. Our teams suffered a bit of a downturn in performances which has seen them slip from second place to fourth place in the leagues.


Monday evening training sessions at the campus large games hall have resumed. They are at 8-9.45 pm and have been well attended. New





# **Dancing On Ice**



AS WE HEAD FURTHER into 2024, we're preparing more events for the coming months to get the local community involved at Loch Leven. After the great success of the Christmas character trail at Burleigh, we've been putting our thinking caps on about what other characters we can create to put around the reserve. Coming up in February we've got a nest box making event for valentines day, a drop in for the public to come along and have a go at making a box to put up in the garden for a couple of lucky love birds. Keep an eye out on our social channels for updates on other events.

World Wetlands Day falls on 2 February, and is the perfect excuse to head out to the loch and enjoy all that it has to offer. If there's ever a day made for Loch Leven it's this day! Over the winter, wetlands provide essential habitat for birds, and in the spring and summer for breeding birds. This is why we work so hard to keep the loch protected and make sure habitats around the site are up to scratch. This is a great excuse to head out and enjoy a walk around the loch and appreciate all this wetland has to offer.

Wildlife sightings across the reserve start to change as we head into spring. There are a few birds that create quite the spectacle during courtship such as goldeneye and great-crested grebes. Male goldeneye perform a complex series of courtship displays, with up to 14 different moves like the 'masthead', 'bowsprit' and 'head throw back', where the male bends its head all the way back before thrusting forward and kicking up its feet. Great crested grebes perform a courtship 'dance' on the water, a synchronised performance involving shaking their extravagant head plumes from side to side.

The finale is the 'weed ceremony', using vegetation as a prop during their dance.

Spring flowers will start to appear. Common species such as daffodils and snowdrops flower, and although nonnative to the UK they're a sure sign that spring is here! Native plants such as chickweed produces small white starlike flowers, and can actually be seen all year round. Daisies will be seen more frequently across gardens and lawns. Red-dead-nettle may begin flowering mid-February, and the ever yellow gorse is always a pleasant site. Another flower to spot is coltsfoot, a small bright yellow flower often seen along roadsides and paths. Having plants that flower early is great for early emerging bees, providing a food source as temperatures start to rise. We'll be busy with plenty of practical work around the reserve, continuing tree planting and habitat maintenance before

birds start nesting. You may see us out and about so feel free to say hello if you do!

# A Scurry Of Squirrels

At RSPB Loch Leven we are gearing up for the Big Garden Birdwatch, a citizen science project that has been running since 1979. It takes place from the 26 to 28 of January and can be carried out by anyone with access to a patch of garden or some greenspace.


All it requires is an hour of your time to watch the birds and record what you see. More details for this can be found on our website or by searching big garden birdwatch. At the reserve we have a big garden bird watch trail which has lots of information about the birds commonly seen.

The reserve has been a mix of very quiet and very busy over the past month with the weather strongly dictates the wildlife that can be seen. During the cold spell the bird feeders have been very busy with all the usual suspects including close views of redwing and fieldfare. It has been nice watching them come down to drink from the ponds. The red squirrels have also been very active. You can also see a live stream of the squirrel feeder on YouTube by searching for 'Loch Leven squirrel cam' and watch red squirrels and birds feeding till your hearts content!

Down on the reserve itself we have had days with lots of wildfowl when it's not been frozen. The main species we are seeing are teal, wigeon, mallard, whooper swan and goldeneye. The bay itself has had big rafts of tufted duck and pochard too.

There are still some pink-footed geese around the loch, however, numbers have fallen to around 2-3000 on our last count in mid-January and this is usual for this time of year as the influx from autumn has moved southwards.

There have also been some nice sightings in the last month of

peregrine falcon, hen harrier, little egret and out on the loch records of smew have been quite regular.

The volunteers have been working on a lovely new addition to our wildlife garden, constructing a cottage garden from old railway sleepers. These will be made into raised beds that will be used for growing wildflower plugs that can be planted out onto the reserve.

They've also helped with keeping our reserve well gritted during the cold spell, helping repair water troughs, sorting out some cross drains up the hill and brush cutting our predator fence.

Speaking of the hill, the sleeping giant path is now open for business again after some extensive repairs and improvements.

# **Having A Ruff Day**



AS WE TENTATIVELY TIP-TOE our way into the brave new world which is heralded by the changing of the calendar into another year, we farmers tend to take stock of the 12 months just gone and make resolutions for the 12 to come. For the backward farm report card of 2023, I think the overall teacher's comments would be along the lines of – improvements made in some areas, regression of previous forward steps in others, and overall still plenty of room for improvement and hard work required. Teacher would also probably comment on the bad habit of blaming the weather when things don't go to plan. Guilty as charged, m'laud.

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The weather is certainly the single biggest factor to affect farmers on a day to day basis. Too wet, too dry, too cold, too hot, there's always some complaint and while it can usually be justified when we moan about it, we really shouldn't be surprised when it doesn't happen quite how we would like it.

Just as the 'wrong trousers' in Wallace and Gromit leads Wallace on an uncontrolled string of events, the wrong weather can have a similar effect on farmers as we try to harness the unpredictable power of nature as best as we can to produce our various food products. We just need to have the quiet, cool, logical thought process of Gromit to help us arrive at the best outcomes. It's very easy to write it down on paper in theory but definitely not so easy to put into practice when the chips are not so much down but very much out. So there's our challenge for the year.

One thing which definitely helps with achieving the best outcome in whatever job we do is having the right tools for the task in hand, and Gromit has the extremely enviable talent of having just the right item at just the right time. This was brought home to me just the other day back in the real world (yes I do live there occasionally!).

Younger son Callum and I were trying to gather in his Blackface ewes from the fields they were grazing at my brother's farm to bring them back home to be pregnancy scanned (which will have happened by the time you are reading this). Blackface ewes can be particularly stubborn and suspicious of anything different, especially when they have, as Callum's flock has, spent their lives grazing the open high hills of the Border country.

We had set up the mobile sheep pens in the corner of the field but try as we might, we couldn't persuade them to go into the enclosure. They would go as far as the entrance then they would just stop, turn round to face us and break off in different directions.

Tempers were getting slightly frayed and the ewes were getting stressed, when local farming friends and near neighbours Norman and Calum happened upon the scene of disarray. As luck would have it, they had their collie, Ben in the pickup with them, and they offered to lend a hand. In less than five minutes the flock were calmly and steadily guided into the holding pen. No fuss, no stress. These sheep were used to being gathered with dogs on the farm they originated from, so they totally respected the presence of the dog, but that is not to detract from the fact that Ben is a very good sheepdog and Calum is a very good handler. It was like a piece of machinery working in perfect harmony, with precision. The right tool for the right job, at the right time, and not a wrong pair of trousers or a sheep-shift-o-matic in sight.




