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Queen of Quaichs

'Sir, never talk of your independency, who would let your Queen remain twenty years in captivity and then be put to death without your ever attempting to rescue her ...' (Samuel Johnson, 1773)

That Queen spent a year (1566-67) imprisoned in a cold, stone tower on a tiny island in Loch Leven. The word 'quaich' was then in common use; a shallow, bowl-shaped, drinking-cup. Thus citizens of Kinross and Milnathort came to name the two main rivers whose journeys end at Loch Leven the North and South Queichs.

Today the Queichs share more than a word; both have sewage-works, purposefully located, close to their discharge into the Queen of Quaichs.

Clean water is drawn-off and chemicals added, to 'wash' the sewage. The 'treatment water' is then returned to the river, or alternatively discharged directly into the Loch.

Both Queich sewage-works are enclosed behind high fences.

Who owns and runs them? Is it Scottish Water, or some Private Finance Inititaive (PFI) contractor? Are they un-manned?

What 'monitoring' of their continuous effluent is undertaken and recorded?

Take a stroll along the North Queich; machete in hand.

The water upstream of the sewage-works is fresh and clear. But by the time you've crossed the road

and followed the bank for 200 paces, a

very different river it is.

Dead; nothing alive in it. Is that a branch there, just below the surface? Lift its end out. What is that disgusting, brown, slimy stuff it's coated with? Wherefore art thou

And still they – the usual gang – call their meetings to discuss 'The Quality of Water in Loch Leven'; just as they've been doing for decades past. Careful never to mention, the hundreds of new houses, planning consented; nor their over-flowed, under-maintained, combined-sewer 'agreements'; nor the sewage-works, with their very own 'CSO's. No-one's drinking from the Queen's Quaich, today.

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

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


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GREEN LIGHT FOR AERO SPACE



FOLLOWING A RIGOROUS ROUND of business bids considered by the Tay Cities Region Deal Joint Committee, Aero Space Kinross (ASK) has received exciting funding news, that the ASK business case has been successful and funding of £1.6 million from the UK Government has been officially approved.

Plans for this uniquely themed aviation, astronomy and space flight centre are well under way with Tay Cities Region Deal funding now approved and a plan in place to site it at the former MOD/NATO Satellite Communications Station at Balado Bridge.



Utilisation of existing buildings will help minimise carbon impacts as will conversion of existing fossil fuel-based energy sources to renewables.

Chairman Alisdair Stewart told the *Newsletter*: 'We are really delighted to hear we have a formal acceptance of our Tay Cities Region Deal business case.

'Coming shortly after our successful ASK bond offer campaign, where we raised £250,000 – we are now well on our way to making this a project a reality and are fully focused on securing the further funds needed to progress the project.'

UK Government Minister for Scotland, Malcolm Offord said: 'Aero Space Kinross is achieving the first steps in its mission to deliver a unique and exciting new visitor attraction and science centre.

'This will educate young people and encourage them explore new horizons, while creating jobs and bringing investment to the region.

'The UK Government is supporting the project with £1.6 million as part of £2.4 billion investment in levelling up across Scotland'

KGV PAVILION 'PROGRESSING WELL'

THE KING GEORGE V Playing Field Management Committee is delighted to report that the major building extension works and refurbishment of the KGV's sports pavilion at the Muirs Playing Field in Kinross is progressing well and over halfway to completion.

Watching the project develop from architectural plans into a tangible three-dimensional structure is very exciting and gives a real feel as to the size and extent of what will be a marvellous new community asset.

The project will see the number of the pavilion's ground floor team changing rooms and showers increased

from four to six, with separate individual changing facilities for referees. There are also individual changing facilities for

those who require them.

Upstairs the clubhouse social area is being extended out over the new changing rooms, increasing in size to provide a social and function space capable of accommodating larger functions of up to 120 guests. It will also provide viewing terraces overlooking the rugby and hockey pitches, and a large open terrace recreational space.

A new main entrance atrium is being built which will house

a new accessibility lift to the upper floor, enhancing the building's appearance and functionality.

There is also a much-needed increase in accessibility. Downstairs offers new, accessible changing rooms, showers and toilets. The new lift to the upper floor plus new accessible toilet upstairs completes the changes.

Unfortunately, the £19,000 cost of the new accessibility lift installation is not included within the £280,000 main project budget and the KGV is actively pursuing additional sources of funding to pay for the lift. They have successfully raised £6,000 thus far and would welcome donations or sponsorship from local organisations, companies and from the community to help make up the deficit.

The project reflects the KGV's ongoing commitment in providing sporting and recreational facilities at the Muirs, for the use of the wider Kinross-shire community and not just for the rugby and hockey clubs who currently use the pavilion facilities.

SECT TO OPEN MEMBERS-ONLY SHOP AT INDUSTRIAL ESTATE?

A CONTROVERSIAL RELIGIOUS group has lodged plans to open a members-only convenience store at the Bridgend Industrial Estate. The only people permitted to use the shop will be members of the Plymouth Brethren Christian Church: it will not sell to residents of Kinross if they are not church members.

The shop will have no shopfront or retail signs, and will display 'members only' on the front.

Campus & Co, which is run by the Plymouth Brethen Christian Church, has plans to construct of two units on the Bridgend

Industrial Estate. Their current Perth branch at the Inveralmond Industrial Estate will close.

According to the planning statement Kinross has been chosen by them due to its close proximility to both Perth and Kirkcaldy. It states, 'The

size of the congregation cannot justify multiple facilities in both Perth and Kirkcaldy and

with the geographic spread of the house-holds in congregation Kinross presents an ideal location for this facility'.

It will serve between 80 and 100 households thoughout Perth & Kinross and Fife.

All profits from the shop will be donated to the Caledonia One School Global in Alloa, which is run by the group.

The planning statement says the group are 'providing retail members clubs for household goods so that the profits from wholesale-to-customer prices can support the running of schools.

Campus & Co is run by volunteers and mostly sells food produce and essential items, with customers able to enjoy a free coffee while they shop.

A spokesperson said, 'Proceeds from the new store will be an important addition to our goal of delivering enriching benefits from the communities in which our members live and work.'

PKC is to consider the application in the next few weeks.

David Conner Joins Board Of Scottish Men's Sheds

THE SCOTTISH MEN'S SHEDS Association (SMSA), has announced the appointment of the former Chairman of Kinross & District Men's Shed David Conner to its board.

David, who has run several businesses, was Chairman of Kinross & District Men's Shed for four years until recently

stepping down to enjoy retirement and travel with his wife.

David joins seven SMSA Trustees to further extend the hub's reach of regional support to over 200 Scottish Men's Shed groups and represent as the voice of the Men's Sheds Movement. David (69) said: 'I am delighted to be a part of this very important membership body.'



'I look forward to representing the SMSA as an ambassador for my region to support developing and existing Men's Sheds groups using my learned knowledge and experience."

SMSA Chief Executive Officer Jason Schroeder added: 'Our Trustees all give their valuable time to run Men's Sheds in their own communities. I have known and worked with David and his Shed for many years and I am grateful that he is volunteering his time to bring his strong expertise to our Board and the Movement we support and represent.'

WHO ARE THE PLYMOUTH BRETHREN?

LED BY AUSTRALIAN Bruce Hales, the church was formed in Plymouth in the early nineteenth centry and serves over 50,000 members globally. Their website describes them as 'family orientated' and believe the Holy Bible is 'the true word of God.'

Former members of the church have described the group as a 'cult' with some ex-members saying they have been estranged from their families after leaving the religion.

Although it practises 'separation' brethren businesses can employ non members of the church and are privately owned. Members are encouraged to socialise with those inside the faith, but told to use 'judgement' when communicating with those outwith.

FOSSOWAY TENNIS CLUB COACH Alessia Palmieri has been named the British Tennis Development Coach of the Year for her work in attracting and developing Scottish talent.

Palmieri, who was nominated after being named Tennis Scotland Development Coach of the Year, was presented with her prize at the LTA's annual awards ceremony at the National Tennis Centre in London on 4 July, 2023.

The 31-year-old was recognised for the work she has done at Fossoway to transform the single-court club into a hive of activity in the Crook of Devon community, with membership numbers soaring.

Speaking at the ceremony, which was also attended by Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Gloucester, Alessia said, 'I'm over the moon – it's so nice to be noticed as a small club and for all that I've worked towards over the last few years. It's amazing really. I am lost for words because I honestly didn't expect it.'

CASTLE CAMPBELL FINALLY OPENS

HISTORIC ENVIRONMENT SCOTLAND (HES) announced that the castle and its gardens in Dollar are reopened as of Saturday 22 July. This will give people the opportunity to explore one of Scotland's best-preserved tower house castles.

Access was restricted in 2022 by site managers HES, after inspections found repairs to the masonry were necessary.

'We are delighted to reopen Castle Campbell and Gardens to the public,' says Craig Mearns, Director for Operations at HES.



"Our teams have been hard at work ensuring that visitors are able to experience the beautiful tower house castle, one of the finest in Scotland. Visitors can also get onto the top of the tower to admire the surrounding views.'

While Castle Cambpell is one of several HES sites that have recently reopened, about two dozen others remain closed. At other locations, the fear is that masonry could collapse and potentially injure visitors.

Castle Campbell is now open seven days a week until 30 September from 9.30am to 5.30pm.

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BLAIRINGONE SCHOOL TO BECOME COMMUNITY HALL

MEMBERS OF THE FOSSOWAY Community Development Trust Ltd voted in June by a clear majority of 25 to 9 in favour of a community buy-out of the former Blairingone School Buildings (in excess of

They have submitted a Community Asset Transfer Form to PKC that is currently being considered and further meetings are to take place with PKC officials regarding this.

They have to produce a Business Plan, which is currently being worked on. Their initial proposal is for the Trust to pay a peppercorn rent, because of the state of the building that is PKC's legacy, with a view to purchase in due course.

The Trust is a registered company, limited by guarantee, with no share capital and non-profit making with charitable status. They are currently trying to open a co. bank account and then intend to apply to the Kinross-shire Fund for start-up funding.



Several applications for grant funding Blairingone School are in process, with the intention of converting the building

to a community hall, bearing in mind that Blairingone has been stripped of all services in recent years.

PKC Opens Nature Restoration Fund

FOLLOWING THE SUCCESS OF last year's Nature Restoration Fund allocation, PKC is again inviting applications for funding of projects that address the drivers of biodiversity loss: over-exploitation of the natural environment; habitat loss and fragmentation; and invasive non-native species. The fund supports projects of a minimum of £1000 that meet the purpose and themes of the fund. This year there is no upper cost limit to the fund. Projects that contribute towards the delivery of a nature network are welcomed. Applications must be submitted by 20 August.

Projects should aim to achieve one of the following outcomes: Habitat and species restoration Freshwater restoration



Coastal and marine initiatives which promote restoration, recovery, enhancement or resilience.

Control of invasive non-native species (INNS) impacting on nature.

Urban: Enhancing and connecting nature across, and between, towns and cities.

NO LONGER JUST APPEALING to the farming community, the delights of the agricultural show now have a much wider appeal.

What's not to love about dog shows, sheep-shearing, a decorated welly competition and tasty food stalls? A fun day out at an agricultural show has been part of our rural life in Scotland for 200 years – records now show that they are as popular now as they ever were. In fact, agricultural shows have had record attendance this summer so far.

Celebrating farming, marvelling at champion livestock and enjoying home-grown produce and crops is not new. Today, however, the biggest pull is the show itself.

Figures show that in 2023 the Royal Highland Show broke records with 217,000 people visiting, to see the world sheep-shearing championship and chainsaw carving demonstrations, among many other events.


It is estimated that it brought in about £40m of business to the Ingliston area.

The Association of Show and Agricultural Organisations estimates that about 7 million UK people – around 10% of the UK – visit agricultural shows. A 2018 study of the Royal Welsh Show revealed that 39% of visitors to the show had no personal connection with agriculture.

The Kinross Show is one the highlights of the year to the many people who look forward to a great day out, even if they are without an iota of knowledge about farming. There is so much to look at and to enjoy, even for those of us who can't tell a woolly sheep from a goat.

Local agricultural shows are of reciprocal benefit to those who have relocated and the producers that want to meet

them. Newcomers come along to see what's going on and buy the delicious produce on offer. In return they get an introduction to their local area, with plenty of stallholders around to explain to them about local projects and enabling them to find out more about what happens in the locality. All this is a great help to those who have moved into a rural setting and want more opportunities to learn about and take part in local life.

There are chances for everyone to get involved with craft competitions that anyone can enter, and plenty for children to get involved with too. The delight on a child's face when their dog wins the prize for the 'Dog With The Waggiest Tail' has to be seen to be believed!

Anyone is welcome to participate in crafts events as well as the traditional farming categories.

Importantly, agricultural shows enable people to reconnect with farmers and understand how their food is made, something that society can often be disconnected from.

Shows encourage us to shop local, with delicious food stalls beckoning us in with their most sumptous products. We are becoming more interested in how food is reared and produced and, ultimately, more health-conscious than we once were. We want ingredients that come from trusted sources. This is the place to find those stallholders and talk to them about their provenance.

If you've never been to an agricultural show, give it a try. You won't be bored and you won't be disappointed!

AT KINROSS SHOW 2023



HOME-SPUN EDUCATION AND entertainment will be at the forefront of next week's Kinross Show which the organisers pledge will be a celebration of farming and rural life within Kinross-shire.

'With more of the community than ever involved this year coupled with strong livestock and horse entries, I hope that visitors can enjoy this chance to look at farming through a different lens,' said Dora Smith, president of Kinross-shire Agricultural Society (KAS).

Following on from a revamp of the catering in 2022 the focus on local food choices will continue and for the first time ever there will be a live butchery and cookery demonstration. Past President of KAS, Ewan Paterson, has teamed up with Kinross' very own Masterchef runner-up Sarah Rankin to showcase the process involved in butchering a prime lamb. Sarah will then cook up some delicious dishes from the grass-fed lamb, kindly donated by Fossoway Farms.

Sarah told the *Newsletter,* 'I've had a really busy few weeks of shows and fairs recently, and I'm really looking forward to my first on home turf! I'll be cooking at the Kinross Show this August with Ewan Paterson of Allan's Butchers in Auchterarder. Ewan will be demonstrating lamb butchery and I'll be creating a few dishes based on the cuts he'll be telling us about.

'I can't wait to be part of the show which I've been attending as a guest

for many years. The demo will be free and the timings will be announced in due course on my socials and in my newsletter so be sure to sign up so you don't miss out! I'm looking forward to seeing you there.'

Within the livestock area, it is the sheep classes that have gained popularity in recent years, new classes were added for emerging breeds, the commercial classes are well supported and with Kinross being a tremendous showcase ahead of the sales season, strong competition exists in both Blackface and Mule classes. This continued rise in numbers was making it





a challenge to provide enough pens for all the entries. Thankfully a successful application to Perth and Kinross Council, Community Led Local Development fund, secured enough money to purchase 500 new sheep gates which together with loaned gates will secure the future of the sheep section.

Further funding from the Kinross-shire Fund will support the cost of marquees and

the Childrens' Education Tent was a beneficiary of the Moto Community Fund so younger visitors can be sure of many ways to learn about farming and will have the opportunity to work with a local artist to create a mural of rural life in Kinross-shire.

Taking the reins in the main ring will be a Polo demonstration from Kinross Polo Club based at the stables of Thom





Bell, North Kilduff. Known as the game of Kings, the sport of Polo is the oldest ball game in the world and this is a rare chance to see it in action. With commentary provided to explain everything the ponies and riders will also play a short match.

'Looking back to days gone by and previous Kinross Shows has been a theme of my year as President,' comments Dora. 'Therefore, I'm delighted that a mini exhibition of memories will take place on Saturday in conjunction with Kinross Museum.

'On display will be photographs and films of previous shows and for the first time in many years we will have the Interbreed and rotating cups to present to the prize winners.

'I look forward to welcoming one and all to RSPB Loch Leven on Saturday 12 August,' she added.










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cooking with sarah rankin



You will need:

SERVES 2

300g chanterelles

25g butter

1 tbsp oil

1 onion, finely chopped

2 cloves garlic, minced

2 tbsp sherry vinegar

200g risotto rice

200ml white wine

750ml chicken or veg stock, warmed

50g parmesan

A few chopped sage leaves

IT IS CHANTERELLE SEASON and, if you are lucky enough to find some, this easy and delicious risotto is a great way to show them off.

When picking mushrooms only do so if you are ABSOLUTELY SURE you know what you are doing. Ingesting the wrong mushroom is a mistake you don't want to make as many can cause serious illness, and even death. So make sure you go foraging with someone experienced.

You'll find chanterelles in shady, damp areas under birch and pine and can usually hunt them out by their delicious scent of apricot.

When preparing them, don't mess around with them too much. Simply brush off any grit and trim the very end off the stalk.

Washing them in water will cause them to go soggy when cooked and remove some of that delicious flavour.



Chantarelle Risotto

METHOD

Warm the butter and cook the onion and garlic slowly until softened but not coloured. Brush, trim and slice the mushrooms – reserving a few very small ones for garnish – and add those. Cook for a further few minutes until softened and a little coloured. Turn the heat to high and add the white wine and sherry vinegar. Cook out for a minute or so until almost all the liquid has gone.

Turn the heat back down to medium low and add the oil and the risotto rice, making sure every grain is well coated in oil. Slowly start to add the warmed stock one ladle at a time, making sure that each has been totally absorbed before adding the next. All in all, it should take around 20 minutes. Stir in the parmesan and chopped sage and spoon into bowls. Crisp a few whole sage leaves in a frying pan with a little more oil. Top the risotto with more grated parmesan, the crispy sage a few small, raw mushrooms. I also added a few pickled shallots for a bit of crunch and to cut through the richness.




A Kinross-shire Flag?

Kinross High School Parent Council

The parent council for Kinross High School resigned as a group in March this year, which came as a surprise for many people. Subsequently to this, I worked



with parents and officers to establish a new parent council. Which has been a complicated process.

Initially there was a question over the funds held by the former parent council and whether these would need to be passed to the school, as this is what was stipulated in the former parent council constitution, should it fold.

I contacted the former members of the Parent Council and they were horrified at this, as it was their understanding that the parent council had not ceased but simply that the members had resigned.

When I spoke to them, they indicated that they were more than happy to provide a set of accounts and access to the bank account to the new parent council.

I spent some time discussing this with officers and eventually we agreed that the bank account for the former parent council and the funds held in it would be passed over to the new parent council.

On top of this, the previous parent council constitution was very outdated and lacked clarity on many issues. So, in essence a new constitution had to be drafted and approved.

Following a lot of work by several parents, this new constitution was presented to a meeting of the Parent Forum (parents) on the 28 June, where it was approved, along with the appointment of office bearers. So, the new parent council was formed.

I want to thank all the former members of the parent council, for all their hard work. They put a lot of effort in and did their absolute best for the school.

I also want to welcome Euan Pirie to his new role as Chair of the new parent council, George Reid (Treasurer) and Susan Pirie (Secretary), along with the 10 ordinary members and 1 co-opted member.

I did not step back fast enough, so, I also got elected as a coopted member.

I believe that there will be a meeting of the Parent Council in September and I know they would love for more parents to join them, either as office bearers or as members. Our task will be to continue the work of the former parent council.

I am the convener for the Kinross-shire Local Committee. I see this committee as a forum where the community can meet with officers to discuss local issues and to get answers to questions they have.

The committee is a committee of Perth and Kinross Council and was formed as a pilot in 2021, with its first meeting in 2022.

There have been a few teething issues, which is normal for a pilot scheme and I am currently organising a Development Session with officers and the current members of the committee (being the Councillors and the six Community Councils in Kinross-shire).

The aim of this development session is to allow us to discuss the way the committee has been working and to look at ways of improving it.

It is also to allow us to look at how the pilot scheme can be amended, to allow Local Committees to function in other areas of Perth and Kinross, as the Council agreed to establish two more Local Committees at their budget meeting in March this year.

I see the Kinross-shire Local Committee as being very important as I firmly believe that there is currently a democratic deficit in

that there is very little locality-based decision making and this has in my view led to an over-emphasis on Perth issues.

I also see it as being a mechanism for empowering Community Councils, as I believe they do fantastic work, but get constantly frustrated by their lack of voice.

This is a continuation of the work I did with my fellow Independent Councillors to get the Council's Scheme of Administration changed so that an objection from a Community Council on a planning application would automatically trigger the application going to the Council's Planning Committee instead of it being decided by officers.

I firmly believe that the best people to decide on local issues, are local people and the more this happens, the better.

Kinross Colts

I recently met with trustees of Kinross Colts, as I am aware that the population of Kinross-shire has dramatically increased over the last few decades and I wanted to establish how this was affecting them.

Kinross Colts organise a lot of footballing activities throughout Kinross-shire. They recently added another team to the 14 they were already running and have approaching 500 members.

I see physical activity as being an essential thing for young and old, as it promotes health and fitness, which can help prevent all sorts of medical issues.

Following the meeting with the trustees I met with senior officers to discuss the issues raised.

In essence, there is pressure on the existing infrastructure, with a real shortage of winter training facilities.

I asked officers if one of the rugby pitches at the Community Campus could be converted to a football pitch, with movable goals. This would allow the goals to be moved, thereby protecting the goal area from wear and tear.

I asked for nets to be permanently on the goals at the campus and asked if goals could be erected at Wallace Park in Glenfarg, where there used to be a football pitch.

We discussed the possibility of taking out an area of the Community Campus from the contract with the PFI provider and it being rented to the Colts, so that they might create a hub and possibly establish a second all-weather pitch. This is being looked at

I raised the question of drainage at the Myre, which becomes very boggy during wet weather and suggested that the flooding team be asked to look at this as part of their planning for the Kinross flood defences.

I also asked if a solution could be found to an issue relating to the residents of Montgomery Court, whereby they are getting footballs hitting their walls and causing disturbance.

None of these things will be fixed quickly, but even the longest journey starts with the first step.

MY MUM ALWAYS REMEMBERED a wee German girl who arrived at her primary school in the late 1930s. 'Be nice to Ruth' the teacher said. 'She's escaped from an evil man in Germany.' Ruth didn't speak much English but showed my



Mum a wonderful new invention she'd brought with her on the Kinderstransport – a pen which didn't need dipped into ink. It was called a Biró.

Scotland has always opened its arms to those seeking sanctuary on our shores. I'm proud that in Ochil and South Perthshire we've recently welcomed Ukranians, Iranians and Kurds who now call our beautiful part of the world their home.

I do everything I can to highlight the plight of refugees at Westminster. Refugees like Elham. Two years ago Elham was in hiding in Kabul. He was 17 and gay. The Taliban were searching for him to kill him.

He wrote a diary about his life in hiding and published it on line. I read out extracts in the House of Commons. He described his fear and feeling of claustrophobia as Taliban thugs hunted him door to door.

No one outwith a tight circle knew his whereabouts or that he was gay. He had taught himself English and dreamed of escape to the UK. But the UK Home Office offers no route for an Afghan asylum seeker appealing for sanctuary — even someone, like Elham, in imminent danger of death.

After months sheltered by distant family in Kabul, Elham managed to obtain an Afghan passport, and, in heavy disguise, fled across the border and on to Islamabad. For almost a year he tried desperately and fruitlessly to pursue his asylum claim with the UK Home Office. He describes hiding out in baking temperatures in a rented slum room. He spent his time improving his English and studying for a university entrance exam.

I was immensely moved by his diaries. And so, it seemed, were thousands of others who heard me read extracts in Parliament. A group got together and agreed to pay Elham's plane ticket to London. They agreed that, if he passed his university entrance exams, they'd cover his fees, accommodation, and living costs.

Elham visited me at the House of Commons last week. He got into the UK not as a LGBT asylum seeker fleeing for his life – that route has been closed by the UK Government. He's here as a paying student on a student visa. He dreams of a career as a foreign correspondent.

Elham's story is one of determination and courage. He misses his Mum and Dad, his siblings (and his Mum's home cooking). He worries desperately about their safety living under the Taliban. But he says he feels as if he has come home – to a country whose people have welcomed him and where gay people are able to express their love. As he puts it 'at long last I am free to be me'.

I can't wait to see the wonderful things this incredible young man is set to achieve.

THE ISSUE OF FIRE service cuts has dominated my inbox more than any other over the last few weeks. I would like to thank all of those across Perth and Kinross who have been in touch with me to raise their significant concerns



over the £11m worth of cuts that are facing the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service in 2023/24.

The cuts will have potentially devastating consequences for the local community. In Perth, this will mean a reduction within the workforce and will also affect the Aerial Rescue Pump which will operate at reduced capacity, leaving just two fire appliances that can pump water.

I am aware residents are furious at this decision. This is particularly the case given the recent fatal fires that have shocked the local community. Firefighters are right to state that this decision to reduce the capability of the service could lead to further lives being lost. It is dangerous for the public because there are fewer people available to respond to emergencies, but it is equally hazardous for the firefighters themselves who will have less resource responding to a fire and therefore fewer people watching each other in what are often extremely perilous situations.

While the Scottish Government claim that the allocation of resources is the operational consideration of the SFRS, it is the £36.5m budget shortfall over the next four years that has left the fire service with no other option but to make unwelcome cuts, thus reducing the service's capacity to react to future fire emergencies.

This may not have been as potentially devastating as it is now if the fire service had not already faced many years of underfunding and neglect which has taken a considerable toll. The number of firefighters has declined meaning safe crewing levels have not been reached, there are less resources available to service and maintenance vehicles leading to an increased risk of breakdown, and all of these contributing factors mean response times to incidents have been rising.

Nobody knows better than the firefighters on the ground how these decisions could impact on the efficiency and effectiveness of our local fire services. The Scottish Government must listen to these issues and provide better funding and resources to firefighters who undertake such a pivotal role as first responders.

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Police Box



Police Scotland has teamed up with a professional mountain biker to offer prevention advice as part of a campaign to reduce the number of bike thefts occurring in Scotland.

Scotty Laughland, who has competed across the world and creates mountain bike content on his social media channels, filmed a series of videos to discuss the impact bike theft had on him personally and professionally.

Scotty was joined by PC Graeme Scott to discuss the security measures the public can take to deter such crimes happening to them.

The 2020 Cycle Scotland Cycle Monitoring report showed that 45% of Scotland have access to a bike. Between April 2022 and March 2023, almost 4,000 bikes a year are reported stolen to Police Scotland.

In May 2022, Scotty himself became a victim of bike theft when his workshop in Stirlingshire was broken into and £50,000 worth of bikes, cycling equipment and tools were stolen from within.

Ahead of the UCI World Championship cycling events that will see thousands of professional cyclists and cycling enthusiasts visit Scotland, from Thursday, 3 August, three videos will be published on Police Scotland's social media channels over the course of the next three weeks to highlight to the public how they can safeguard their bikes and equipment.

Superintendent Claire Dobson from Police Scotland's Partnerships, Preventions and Community Wellbeing Division, said: 'We know that cycling is a popular form of exercise and transport in Scotland, bikes are also an attractive option for opportunistic criminals looking for an easy target to steal and subsequently profit from.

'We now also see high-value bikes being stolen to order by organised crime groups and it is absolutely essential that we equip the public with all the necessary advice and guidance they need to safeguard their bikes and cycling equipment.

'I am grateful to Scotty Laughland for working alongside us to create these videos and would urge not only Scotland's communities, but all of those visiting the country for the UCI World Championship cycling events, to view this content and our crime prevention advice to ensure they know how they can best secure their bikes and wherever they are stored.'

Scotty Laughland added: 'The impact of bike theft for myself and my family has been far reaching. I would advise anyone to take the advice offered by Police Scotland and ensure your bikes and equipment are secured at home, whilst travelling and during use.'

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BEE KIND TO BEES!

IMAGINE A NICE WARM summer's day (hard to imagine, given the weather at the time of writing) in Kinross. You might hear the low buzzing of bees, getting louder and louder, and when you look up you see thousands of bees flying, as if it was a scene from a movie, Alternatively, you might discover not just one or two bees in your garden, but thousands of them in the shape of a rugby ball. They could be on a tree, on a gatepost, in the roof of your shed or even on your bird table/bird box. They are honey bees looking for their new home.

While we are coming to the end of swarm season (April-September), with the unusual weather we have been having honey bees will wait for a break in the showers before they leave their colony to look for an alternative home.

Swarming is the only way that a honeybee colony reproduces. As a democratic colony they will decide to make a new queen, and just before the new queen hatches, the old queen takes off with about a third to a half of her workers (female bees) and drones (male bees). This wee gang of up to 30,000 are off to set up a colony in a new location. The remaining house bees will stay with the new queen, taking care of the original colony.

This tends to happen because the hive has become overcrowded. The colony may be running out of room in their original hive because they are doing very well raising their young, collecting pollen and honey stores, or it could be just simply that the

queen needs to reproduce her DNA. The queen and her workers are trying to find a new permanent home, usually part of a tree or other dark enclosure with a small entrance that they can defend. While resting, the swarm may choose an odd location like

on the seat of your bicycle, or on top of your car. But they are only visiting temporarily, so there will be no comb in the swarm. While in their temporary lodgings, scout bees will go and find a better home for the colony to move too. This will be somewhere



they can start to make comb and the queen will restart laying her eggs.

If you are confronted with a buzzing ball of bees don't panic! Bees that have swarmed are full of honey and are usually docile. In addition, they do not have a home to defend, or any honey stores for anyone to take. They are likely to move on in a day or two at the most.

Swarming bees are in a high-risk state and sadly only have a few days to find a home before they die of hunger and exposure. They don't like swarming in the rain, or being without a permanent home when it goes cold.

Staying huddled together in the shape of a rugby ball keeps the queen warm. Once the scout bees return to the swarm, they will vote on the most suitable place to move to, the swarm will then depart and fly as a group to their new home.

However, sometimes they choose to occu-

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py buildings, structures that can be hazardous to themselves as well as causing damage to properties.

The best course of action is for you to do nothing, but if you do have a honey bee swarm contact a local beekeeper. Even though the bees are in a mellow mood, it is sensible to keep your distance. Ensure children and pets stay indoors. Most bees only sting if they feel threatened, for example, you start swatting them or accidently disturb them. Remember, these vital pollinators need care at this point! It can be difficult and expensive to remove them, so having a beekeeper capture the swarm before it has the chance to take up permanent residence is good preventative practice.

Here in Kinross, Cloverlea Apiaries (*The Friendly Bee Company*) will do their best to help you. Just contact Karen or Tracy on 07958 657541. They have over 17 years' experience in breeding and keeping honey bees, and have developed their business based on their love and passion of Scottish Native and Near Native Honey Bees. As well as making delicious honey up at their farm near the Path of Condie, they use the bees wax to produce beautiful handmade products including hand poured candles, beeswax furniture polish and natural cosmetics. You can usually find them at the Kinross Farmers' Market and they will be there in August so find them and have a chat!

A reputable beekeeper will remove a swarm in one of three ways: by putting a bee box right next to the swarm and allowing them to move in on their own, by bumping the swarm into a small box, or by using a bee vac and sucking them up. The beekeeper will then take the bees to a remote apiary location to assess them for disease.

So, if you see or hear the buzzing of bees....... Check! Are they Bumblebees (Solitary Bees) rather than honey bees? If so, just leave them alone. In fact, if you do have a solitary bee nest in your garden, either tree bumbles, bumble bees, or masonry bees, historically it was seen as lucky. They are valuable pollinators and some are even endangered.

Over the past few years, we have lost a number of species of solitary bees, that we will never get back. So, please do not

destroy their nest, block their entrance holes, or call pest control unless its critical. Solitary bees will die out naturally in late summer/autumn, therefore there is no need to do anything. Just consider yourself lucky and leave them bee!



Good Decisions, Skilful Incisions and Happy Endings

RECENTLY, I WAS REFLECTING on something that happened quite a few years ago. Two of my brothers were celebrating their silver wedding anniversaries, and the great tribe was meeting up for a seriously happy and joyful event. All the arrangements were made, and we had only to turn up.

When I got down to Glasgow, there was a message to say that my Mother, that stalwart head of the clan, had been taken ill, and couldn't come to the party. I had only talked to her in the morning; she'd had her hair and nails done (first time ever for the nails) and was really excited. Our first instinct was to minimise it — too much excitement or a 'past its sell

by date' yogurt in the fridge.

Unfortunately, we were all wrong. On tearing across Glasgow to see her, we discovered that she was in real pain, and there were none of the usual symptoms of a tummy bug. However, the situation was deceptive, because she looked so pretty with her hair and nails looking gorgeous, and the party lipstick in place. The night wore on and the pain did not subside. I knew the party was in full swing, and decided to wait until morning before calling in the experts.

The next day everything deteriorated rapidly, and she was whisked into hospital for a fairly major operation, to remove her gall bladder, containing a mighty, golf-ball-sized stone. The skilful surgeon had not seen one like it in 10 years. As we don't like to be ordinary in anything, the proud stone was sitting in splendour on her bedside table. The situation was caught just in the nick of time. The surgeon performed the operation using a keyhole technique, which took him four hours, because the traditional operation would have been far harder for her to recover from. Our gratitude to him was unbounded.

The whole episode made us all think. I know not all families are like ours, and we have certainly had our ups and downs, but when you think about losing someone you love so much, it really does hurt like a physical pain. As a coach, I spend a lot of time getting people to try to reframe their hurting thoughts. When we are sad and worried and hurting, it is almost impossible to be effective. All weekend I was drifting about uselessly, wondering what was happening, desperate to phone, but not wanting to pester. Being calm one moment, weeping the next, followed by great waves of relief on hearing the news of a good result. It made me think about all the people who don't get good results, who wait endlessly for a runaway child, or the poor boat people trying to find safety and sanctuary and a new life, or people who really don't have anyone to rally round when the going gets tough.

As usual, when I had acknowledged my sadness, not trying to be too British holding it back, I asked myself, 'What is there here for me to learn?' I had been thinking a lot recently about the word 'key'. It is used so often as a metaphor for finding solutions

to problems. We talk about key decisions, key words and key elements. I have been working on key words for helping people unlock the closed doors of their minds — the closed doors that stop them from doing all the things they dream about, but think that they are not clever enough, rich enough, bold enough or pretty enough. Or, perhaps they think they are too old or too fat or too poor or too stupid, or even too clever to live the life they long for.

I turned all these ideas over with my mother, and she thought it was a wonderful coincidence that she had had keyhole surgery and this was another key that I could think about.

You never know when circumstances around your loved ones are going to change, so don't put off telling people you love that you love them. If you feel like doing a loving thing just do it, even if you get rebuffed or rejected. 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



Kinross Open Spaces Action Group

CCIIr L Mckay welcomed members of the group to the meeting and invited Mr David West to address the audience. A briefing note had been circulated to attendees prior to the meeting.

Mr West advised that the group had asked to attend to set out their proposal for Davies Park, allowing members to become acquainted with the proposal. The group aim to secure the future of Davies Park for use by the community, and background information on the history of the park.

Mr West advised three developers had, over time, applied for planning permission for residential developments but had been refused each time. On the first application, a PKC officer had recommended a road to be built through the park but through the action of the Councillors that was ceased. A second attempt was made by bypassing the LDP process through an appeal to the Reporter. The third attempt commenced in 2022 with a PAN from Miller Homes stating their intention apply for planning permission.

Despite assurances, PKC and Councillors are unable to guarantee

that a future Council will not approve an application and through community ownership using a Community Asset Transfer, this would stop the threat allowing the park to remain in the ownership of the community, and also guarantee this through a Fields in Trust status.

Through their ownership, the group are keen to enhance and develop the area through such things as a pump track and also plan to enhance the ground at Lochburn Park which is currently an open space (a consultation will be issued to determine what the residents would like to see this ground become). The group also plan to share their knowledge and skills to enable transfers to other local groups and others planning similar CATs.

The group, who are set up as a Scottish Community Interest Organisation (SCIO) have been working extensively with various PKC departments to make a case to allow purchase of the land which PKC would continue to manage via a lease, and a business plan has been drawn up showing how the group will be sustainable and has also identified a number of charitable funding sources for possible improvements.

Mr West went on to advise that current issues include convincing PKC officers that the approach is the correct one to take and have also identified an anomaly in the way PKC seeks money for repairs and maintenance of equipment purchased for Council-owned parks, this is based on the formula used to calculate the amount to be paid.

Mr West closed by thanking the Community Council for their time and in response to a question from Cllr D Cuthbert, advised that he would like the Community Council to confirm their agreement to the plan and also to endorse this.

CCllr Mckay thanked Mr West for his presentation and asked whether cutting off Lochburn Park would save Davies Park. Mr West advised that it was the group's intention to own the two parks. Cllr McKay then asked how residents and visitors would gain access to which Mr West stated that it would depend on what the parks were being used for, but there is no intention to put a road through either park. CCllr Mckay also enquired as to who would take on the ownership after 10 years and was advised that the group currently consists of 140 members and they would be constantly recruiting new members and see no issues with regard to this.

In response to Cllr Watters comment regarding the old railway line path which was also vulnerable and could give direct access into a field, he went on to suggest that potential developers could build an underpass to which Mr West advised that PKC only own the path from GS Brown's land, they do not own the whole path. Cllr Cuthbert went on to ask if the path could be taken as far as



Community Council News

Torridon Place and Mr West confirmed that the group would be happy to discuss this matter and would also welcome any thoughts on this.

In response to a question regarding the timeframe for a decision being made by the Community Council, Mr West advised that the process takes around 6-8 weeks to complete (currently at the week 6 point). Cllr Cuthbert also asked what would happen if the Community Council did not endorse the plan to which Mr West advised that the decision would likely be questioned but he did not feel that community engagement would be affected.

CCIIr Mckay stated she had asked representatives from PKC to attend the meeting — they all declined but said they would be interested in hearing about the plans.

A member of the public advised that the land is all currently owned by PKC but the group are not aware of any conditions to the deeds, at which point Cllr Watters advised that he was enquiring with the legal team about this but would need to withdraw from any future discussions due to a conflict of interest. CCllr C Collins enquired as to what was to stop a developer going direct to the Reporter and having any objections overruled, to which Mr West replied, nothing.

CCIIr Mckay asked if PKC had agreed to take over maintenance of the parks should the group take over ownership and Mr West advised that it would be up to the Councillors/Scottish Government to decide this. he also stated that a number of parks across PKC are maintained by PKC but not owned by them.

CCIIr W Freeman enquired as to whether there were any tree protection orders (TPOs) which could be applied for but he was advised that this would not stop developers.

With regard to funding, CCllr Mckay enquired what would happen if funding ran out and Mr West advised that any application will be asked for the group to be treated the same as any developer, e.g., £1000 per year x 15 years. He did not expect there to be any issues with funding. CCllr Mckay then went on to comment that people say they will providing funding but when it comes to it, they change their minds and as such, asked if this would delay the park going through. CCllr E Leslie asked if it was intended to charge for the use of the pump track once it was built, with CCllr Mckay asking if the track would be closed to people living outwith the area. Mr West confirmed that there would be no charge for the use of the pump track and it would be open to anyone.

CCIIr Mckay thanked Mr West and the group for attending the meeting. She advised that she would like to garner opinions from PKC officers before deciding what action to take. CCIIr Mckay confirmed that the CC would be in touch as soon as a decision had been made.

In a separate discussion, it was noted that the play park required repairs, with the chute having been removed, fencing lying all over the park and railway sleeper steps not being replaced.

Matters Arising

Parking Restrictions

Cllr Watters advised that PKC had agreed to all suggestions made by the Community Council and would forward the email from PKC to CCllr Mckay.

It was confirmed that the hedges on Gallowhill Road had been cut and the area was now looking tidier. An email regarding land registry would be forwarded to the Community Council.

Goal Posts at Myre Park: Cllr Cuthbert confirmed that he had arranged to speak to representatives from the Colts and would feed back to a future meeting.

July meeting: CCllr H Phillips confirmed that Mr M Ruskell MSP had been invited to the July meeting to discuss concerns about Loch Leven. HGVs in Gallowhill Road: A member of the public confirmed that the number of HGVs using Gallowhill Road had reduced but not stopped.

Kinross Town Centre

Cllr Cuthbert confirmed that the owner of the Clock Tower had been located and therefore an email had been sent requesting the clock be repaired and maintained appropriately.



Planning Matters

Applications Received

23/00917/FLL alterations and partial reroofing to dwellinghouse, Middle Balado House, Balado, Kinross.

23/00911/FLL erection of a dwellinghouse and associated works (revised design) at land 20 metres North West Of Tillyochie Farm Cottage, Balado. It was noted that a bat survey would be required to be undertaken at this property.

23/00794/FLL erection of replacement boundary fence and gate at land north west of Old Cleish Road, Kinross. CCIIr M Wilson advised that it would appear that a photograph included in the application was not of the area of concern. A high gate/fence had already been installed and it was agreed that an objection be submitted to PKC. The deadline for any comments had been extended to Monday 3 July 2023.

23/00842/LAW erection of replacement extension (proposed) at



10 Mcbain Place, Kinross.

23/00762/FLL erection of office/workshop building, formation of parking area, hardstanding and associated works at land north of Macduff Place Kinross. Members were advised that letters had been issued to properties to one side of the street. It was commented that the land would be used for the repair of agricultural machinery and it was expected that if approved, planners would be restrictions on opening hours and noise levels.

Applications Determined

23/00728/FLL alterations and extension to dwellinghouse at 17 Alexander Drive, Kinross, approved.

23/00625/FLL Change of use of agricultural land to storage and distribution (class 6), siting of 54 storage containers, formation of vehicular access and associated works at Land 250 Metres South Of Jetrigg, Kinross, withdrawn.

23/00590/LAW erection of a garden studio (proposed), 3 Hopefield Place, Kinross, approved.

23/00202/FLL change of use of and alterations to workshop/ restaurant/offices to form restaurant with function room/ ancillary hot food takeaway/offices, erection of workshop/store, installation of replacement decking, fence and canopies over outdoor seating area at Loch Leven Fisheries, Pier Road, Kinross, approved.

23/00613/FLL extension to dwellinghouse, 4 Renton, Drive, Kinross, approved.

Reports from PKC Councillors

Cllr W Robertson

Advised he had received a number of complaints regarding barking dogs. He asked the community to be aware of the noise levels and to report any incidents.

He raised the issue of the loss of the NHS dental service in the town advising that the dental practice in the town was now private. He has written to the dental practices but had no response and to NHS Tayside who have advised that funding is available for employing dentists. He will update a future meeting.

Whilst disappointed that the practice was now private, he reminded the community that it was important to continue oral treatment, advising that the closest NHS practice was in Coupar Angus but there was also an emergency service available at Broxden.

Cllr D Cuthbert

Commented on the enforcement order served on Kinross Beer Garden (23/00196/ALUNDV) and the subsequent petition. Cllr Cuthbert advised that a planning application had been made in March 2022 (22/00386/FLL) and subsequently withdrawn, hence the enforcement order. However, the Green Hotel had been advised to submit a planning application and as such, the enforcement order would be suspended meantime.

Cllr R Watters

Advised that responsibility for the Common Good Fund (CGF) had been given to Kinross Local Committee (KLC). As such there is a mismatch between who is responsible for the Fund in that this is legally a Kinross Fund which was originally set up to cover the Kinross burgh with representatives including Councillors along with a KCC member, whereas the KLC representatives cover the whole of Kinross-shire and Glenfarg.

Cllr Watters enquired if the preference was for KLC to remain responsible for the Fund or whether there should be a request to reconstitute the Kinross CGF in line with other CGFs in the PKC area.

In response, Cllr Cuthbert advised that there would be a development day arranged for the near future and that was the place to discuss this issue. The development day would also allow schemes of delegation to be discussed and updated and taken to the PKC meeting on 30 August 2023.

It was agreed that KCC would discuss outwith this meeting with Cllr Watters submitting an amendment on KCC's behalf.

A member of the public asked what type of support groups get from PKC, e.g., financial representatives, secretariate officers, and was advised that the KLC was a proper committee of PKC. He also asked whether the CC had received notification of a consultation by PKC re the Common Good Fund and assets. Community Councillors were unaware of the consultation and would check back. Cllr Cuthbert advised that the Chain of Office for the Provost, along with the Provost's chair, pictures etc.

It was agreed that CCIIr Mckay would review the consultation on the PKC website and report back.

Cllr N Freshwater

Advised he had not received a response about the fly tipping on Old Cleish Road (asbestos) and would chase this up.

Two sets of VAS were ready to be placed in Gairneybank/ Gairneybridge, and volunteers had also been recruited to the speed watch campaign.

Reports From CC Representatives

CCIIr L Mckay

Raised an issue re 'private parking' signs on the fence at Millbridge Hall car park, advising that these were unofficial and therefore could not be enforced.

Requested that Councillors investigate the fence at the suds pond in Market Park and asked for a letter to be sent to Greenspace requesting that slabs be fitted to several areas in Kirkgate Park where people had had barbeques in the recent good weather and left scorch marks on the grass. She also raised an issue with the traffic lights at the end of Gallowhill Road and was advised to write to Clarence.

Members were also advised of staffing issues at the Post Office in Greens, which is because of a delay in training staff.

Licensing Applications

An application has been received from Premier Convenience, who are looking to take over the Baillies site at 83 High Street and have applied for a licence to sell alcohol.

Correspondence

Lack of Child Care Facilities

An email had been received from a concerned resident about the lack of services for families, e.g., childminders, nurseries etc. and it was recognised that this stemmed from the lack of infrastructure when approving planning permission for residential developments.

The same resident had also raised concerns about play park equipment not being replaced and Cllr Freshwater agreed to follow this up with PKC.

Police

Officer Comments

Traffic Statistics

Community officers are aware of regular areas where there are complaints about speeding in and around Milnathort. These are all on our speeding matrix and we will continue to make efforts to carry out speed checks across the area during our patrols.

Over the last month local officers from Kinross have been carrying out speed checks across the Kinross area. This included checks in Milnathort (as posted on our social media). During checks in the Milnathort area, drivers have been issued tickets for speeding offences. Regular speed checks will continue to be carried out.



Speedwatch Volunteers

Thanks to the several volunteers that have come forward already, if you wish to get involved in Speedwatch please get in touch.

We will be organising an information session in July/August with the Police and Trudy Duffy from the Fossoway CC, who has secured the funding for the equipment. We will then discuss what is required to be done, i.e. forms to fill out, training to be had and discuss the schedule. Volunteers do not need to Speedwatch in their own communities if they so wish.

Matters Arising

Local Cemetery Provision

The Kinross Local Committee discussed the lack of local cemetery provision with an officer from the PKC bereavement officer. The land north of the current cemetery which has previously been discussed as a possible expansion from the current cemetery, it is owned by a trust and is run by someone that lives in London. Cllr Robertson will try and contact them to discuss the opportunity to use this land and is grateful to Neill and the MOCC for their support in raising this matter.

Loch Leven Pollution

Visibility on the loch is currently very good with about 4.2m visibility, and no or a low number of Algol blooms compared to this time last year.

Scottish water have committed to installing the monitoring equipment with regards to sewage discharge by 2025.

Actions From Previous Meetings

Damaged wall at Burleigh: Kevin will explore Tayside contracts or other dry wall experts. It was suggested that we ask Perth college whether they can use the wall as a teaching exercise. Kevin to follow up on this.

Footbridge at Lathro/new path in need of repair/damaged gate:

Cllr Richard Watters commented that PKC officers have visited and discussed with Persimmon who will install a new bridge crossing, fix the path and make improvements to prevent flooding.

Persimmon agreed to add a feature gate at South Street, but have asked for us to help decide on the type of gate. Kevin will provide some input on the replacement gate.

Access thru Fleming Court is outside the plans, so Cllr Watters will speak to the farmer/landowner if they can leave the gate open to help those travelling back and forth to the primary school.

Hillcrest own the houses and therefore the fences that are next to the field, Cllr will explore with them whether they will put a gate in the fence.

Correspondence

A resident from the new Springfield estate at Curlers Close, suggested there be a path from the new estate to the main road at Carrs Billington. Kevin mentioned that there is already a core path along the field across the burn, however it may not be obvious as it could be overgrown.

Stewart and Smart

A member of the public is concerned about the change to the Stewart and Smart ie the one way system, suggesting this is causing bottle necks, and parking on the pavement.

The feeling by those present in the meeting was that this change in priority has reduced the queuing and congestion and that the community council will write to Stewart and Smart to ask their opinion and for any comment.

Roads

The council is proposing an extension to the current 20 mph zones along South Street and Stirling Road.

Milnathort Primary School Update

As Laura was not present there was no update this week, however Neill and Allan both attended the School Fayre, this was the first time the Community Council attended and we managed to get a few volunteers, for the core path and speedwatch.

Core Paths Update

Kevin detailed that the core path group were out flailing and that there were more than six volunteers that came out to help.

Waymarking will be started soon.

Mini Digger Squad

This new initiative will be started with some of the younger residents and support by the primary school, more info to follow in following meetings.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Robertson

A Trax application will be submitted for a new foot/cycle bridge at the junction of the A91 and road up to Stronachie.

Cllr Watters

The council will now be employing two different grass cutting policies, to help with the nature biodiversity crisis, depending on what is best for the area the grass will either just be mowed, or the grass with be cut and lifted.

PKC was an early adopter of the electric car chargers, they are getting old and starting to fail, so require replacing. Funding will primarily be sought from Scottish Government with some required from the private sector, to replace and increase the number of chargers however it will all be owned and managed by PKC.

Roll out will start next year with an additional 80 small chargers located at the street side.

All income will be used to fund future upgrades and expansions in the future network.

Any Other Matters

Neill thanked all the volunteers that came out to help at the weekend helping the core path group. Cllr Robertson remarked 'it's incredible what this group does for the community'.

Kevin wrote to PKC/Trax about the quad bike on the core path, after a resident complained. Unfortunately, the response was lukewarm. Kevin had requested to put up some signs to notify quad and motor bikes were not permitted on the paths. The police did say that they will increase their patrols on bicycle on those paths.

The community council would like to give a big thanks to Milnathort in Bloom, the village looks great with all their additions.

The next meeting (second Thursday of each month) will be held on 10 August 2023, 7.30pm at Milnathort Town Hall





CATCH-LochLeven District Heating

The initial assesment from the District-Heating company commissioned by the Scottish Government CARES project has been published, and is available to view on our website (CATCH-LochLeven.org). It is positive, and allows us to proceed to the next stage – a more comprehensive review to include recommendations for our next steps, and potential funding sources. This second project is already underway.

It has become clear that funding for District Heating systems will be allocated initially to large-scale, concentrated housing in cities. This could mean that more rural places like Kinross and Milnathort will be considered later. However it could be that our project becomes a 'model' for others, and because of that we could get special treatment – we're working to make that more likely! 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

We have continued to enjoy the trips to the Bo'ness steam train this month and we would highly recommend a visit. We have been very lucky with the weather on the days we have gone.



The barge trips for the summer months are still going strong they are just wonderful and relaxing, the scenery and wildlife along the

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

Alice has been a club member for 12 years and reflects on what motivated her to join KADAC in the first place.








Kinross Beavers

Orchids in Portmoak Moss

It's been a great few weeks for watching stuff grow; most stuff, anyway.

Many of the apple trees in Portmoak Community Orchard are groaning with fruit, there are loads of creamy-green hazel nuts on the neighbouring bushes and there's been a good display of orchids alongside the path across Portmoak Moss.

We've asked Woodland Trust Scotland, who own the sites, to hold off strimming the Moss path until after the orchids have flowered. Path tidying is done under contract but we hope it can be delayed.

Not so welcome has been the appearance of the highly invasive plant, Himalayan Balsam, in ditches close to the Moss. So far, after a concerted effort of 'Him Bal bashing', it hasn't come back in huge numbers but it's highly invasive and we'll have to keep on top of it.

Also, it's uncomfortable to watch the birch taking another growth spurt on the peat dome in the Moss, as it means more hard work – pulling it out! The good news is that on the extensive areas where we've put in a lot of effort there's not much birch regeneration.

We'll be back on the case soon, with help from three teams of volunteers. First we have a day with the Bog Squad and the Lothians Conservation Volunteers, then staff from SEPA (the Scottish Environment Protection Agency) will be doing a session as part of a company volunteering programme.

It's all to do with restoring the raised peat bog - a habitat that's getting a lot of attention in the news, now that there's a stronger focus on climate change and the role of peat bogs in storing carbon.

While nature's been doing its bit, members of the Portmoak Community Woodland Group have been tackling one or two other tasks, such as removing tree guards from Kilmagad Wood and taking them off the hill. The trees have outgrown them and it's now WTS policy not to use plastic. Help yourself, if you come across a stack and have some young trees needing protection.

There's lots coming up in the autumn including our ever-popular apple day, which will be on the afternoon of Sunday, 1 October. More details to come next month but please 'save the day'.

Fair Trade in Kinross-shire

Ten Principles of Fair Trade

Most of you will recognise the Fair Trade Mark, but there is another sign from the World Fair Trade

Organisation which can be used for craft items and this means that the product meets the Ten Principles of Fair Trade. Here are the first three:

- 1. Reducing poverty by making producers economically independent 2. Involving producers in important decision making
- 3. Trading fairly with concern for the well-being of the producers

If you think this sounds like something you would support, please buy Fair Trade goods in the shops or at our Farmers' Market stall and you will know you are making a difference to the world we live in.

Moveable structures that are to be in position for more than 28 days require planning permission. That is in addition to any licensing requirements etc.

The Trust and Planning Comments

The Trust examines the Kinross-shire planning applications on PKC's weekly planning lists but rarely comments. Any comments are founded on local or national planning policies. In the year to 31 March 2022 there were 167 Kinross-shire planning applications. The Trust objected to 12, which is just 7% of applications.

Raingardens Update

The Trust would like to thank the Kinross Community Council Newsletter Limited charitable fund for the award of a grant

of £1000 towards the cost of signage for the Raingardens Trail.

The Trail begins at Kinross Park and Ride and heads down through the West Kinross employment estate. We made comments on a couple of applications for the employment site in recent months encouraging the applicants to use raingardens (areas of vegetation designed to accept rainfall) as a method

of dealing with surface water drainage and to increase planting for biodiversity.

Following the public exhibition in June, the Trust submitted

comments to the developers which included suggestions regarding

the layout of the site and encouragement to adopt raingardens

technology in dealing with surface water drainage. This would

make the retail park a great addition to the Raingardens Trail.


Apologies to all who have been so loval to us in the past, we tried to let as many of our friends and volunteers as possible know, but we welcomed everyone back as soon as we were opened.

Class 15 of the Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) (Scotland) Order 1992 (as amended) allows 'The use of land (other than a building or land within the curtilage of a building) for any purpose, except as a caravan site, on not more than 28 days in total in any calendar year, and the erection or placing of moveable structures on the land for the purposes of that use.

In other words, moveable structures such as marquees can be in situ for 28 days without the need for planning permission. However, the operator is still required to comply with any licensing, building standards, fire safety and statutory nuisance legislation that's applicable.

Advice on Blue-green Algae (cyanobacteria)

Why it is important to be aware of them

Blue green algae pose risks to public and animal health when they form blooms and sourse in freshwaters in warm summer months. They produce toxins that may cause skin rashes and more severe symptoms

and more severe symptoms if swallowed. Dogs are at risk if they drink the water, or lick their coat after swimming, with severe symptoms requiring very rapid vet treatment.

Potential health effects

- Eye irritations
- Vomiting and diarrhoea
- Fever and pains in muscles and joints

Keep safe around a bloom

- away from the water Keep dogs on a lead
- Carry a bottle of water for your dog to drink and use it to wash off

If you, or your pet, become unwell after contact with water that may be contaminated with blue-green algae, we'd recommend you seek immediate medical or veterinary advice.

How can I recognise a blue-green algae bloom? Blue-green algae first develop as small green particles of 1-2 mm [1]. If the bloom continues it can develop into more obvious green water surface [2-3]

How can you report a bloom?

Use the Bioomin' Algae ann to report a bloom. You also contact your local lepartment if you suspect a foom and public warning signs re absent.

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

AS WE MAKE OUR way into August, there is the annual debate over whether this is still summer or the start of autumn already - there is some disagreement in the nature world and at Loch Leven NNR!

The insect life is still a-buzz at this time of year, with fresh looking butterflies and bees. The azure, common blue and blue-tailed damselflies on our wetter areas of the reserve are joined by the emerald damselfly. This is one of the best looking damselflies in my opinion with its metallic green and blue body (although this can be subtle from far away)! There should also be dragonflies at the ponds as well at this time of year - look out for the bright red colour of the common darter.

Speaking of insects, August is the best time to see our newly found population of purple hairstreak butterflies. These butterflies are often overlooked as they fly high up in the canopies of oak trees, and only really fly in the evenings. As they do fly so high up, the purple colouration is sometimes hard to spot and may look black or silver to the eye.

This new population is just over the bridge at the River Leven, so it's worth having a look on a warm evening. If you want to learn more, we have a purple hairstreak walk coming up as well on 8 August. We will be joined by butterfly experts, and our fingers are crossed for sightings of these butterflies, so if that interests you then email LochLeven_NNR@nature.scot to book a place.

August is also the best time of year to spot an osprey (or multiple) at Loch Leven NNR. Depending on the year we could see multiple individuals feeding on the loch at once in August.

You may be lucky to spot one with a large fish as it catches it with its massive talons – they are very adept at fishing! You may even spot one sitting on Green Isle at Burleigh!

Elsewhere in the bird world, wader numbers are starting to build

SUMMER LOVIN'

AS WE BEGIN TO move towards the end of our peak breeding season, it's crazy to think we are already past the halfway mark of 2023 but, what a success it has been so far! This year we had a total of 20 lapwing chicks fledged alongside two redshank, three snipe and at least 60 gull chicks.

Things are starting to quieten down on the reserve now that the gulls have moved on, but we are still seeing some great sightings of marsh harrier, great crested grebe, and shoveler. Out with the world of birds, with the reopening of our bumblebee meadow for the season, we have been seeing a variety of butterflies, damselflies and bumblebees in the meadow including sightings of ringlets, meadow browns, and a four-spotted chaser.

Our reserve volunteers have been hard at work to help us through the current breeding season by carrying out thermal imaging surveys to check for any night-time predation, as well as helping us to begin preparations already for next year's breeding season. They have been undertaking the gruelling job of removing ragwort to prevent the livestock eating them and working on the more pleasant development of our plant nursery so that we can get a greater variety of wildflowers around the reserve. They have also been looking out for small pearl-bordered fritillary which they managed to find along with species such as the scallop shell moth.

In the world of events, we have had a very busy summer so far with a whole host of new events for the summer holidays but, worry not, there are still plenty of events to come! At the beginning of August, we have more of our Discovering Ponds (1 and 15 August) and Discovering Minibeasts (10 August) sessions along with our final Woodland Warriors session (2 August) where we will be looking at orienteering. Our Big Wild Summer Prehistoric Trail continues every day right up until 20 August, simply pick up your trail sheets for just £2 each from the Visitors Centre.

On Friday 4 August, we are very excited for the return of the Festival Players Theatre group who will be performing Shakespeare's The Twelfth Night this year and on Saturday 5 August we have an exciting new family event; Big Wild Pyjama party. Farming



TAPS 'AFF!

WE LIVE IN A country where the climate is classified by as being temperate which means that we can expect to avoid the extremes. Not too hot, too cold, too wet or dry. It also means that the weather can be very changeable and unpredictable, which gives us, as a nation plenty to talk about (or complain about) and this is particularly true about farmers, and with good reason. The wrong weather at the wrong time can have a huge affect on a farm business, ranging from poor germination of crops or poor quality feed for animals being produced to increased costs of producing fresh produce such as fruit and vegetables and a burden on the welfare of our animals

A few weeks ago we were basking in temperatures into the twenties of degrees Celsius – real 'taps aff' conditions, but of course it was too hot for some, and grass and other crops in fields with shallow or sandy soils started to die off. The thought of experiencing the 40 plus degrees Celsius currently baking southern Europe, here in Scotland is unimaginable. Similarly, although we generally think we get our fair share of rain in this country, it generally pales into insignificance when you see mass flooding causing devastation around the world.

But, with climate locally and globally apparently becoming more volatile, the role of us, as farmers in helping to mitigate its effects has never been more important. Extreme weather events (as well as wars) can have a global effect on the supply of food so it surely makes sense to produce as much as we can within these shores.

It is the most basic of endeavours as producing food for the nation which gives the vast majority of farmers the drive to get out of bed in the morning (or middle of the night). Land management and active farming play a vital part in limiting the risk of wildfires and flooding, and this land management usually has the bonus of producing food and providing employment and keeping the heart in communities, particularly in remote areas.

We, as farmers often feel that we are being held responsible for all the problems associated with climate change and that removing livestock farming in particular from the equation will solve everything but I don't think that there is any logic in this view. Far from being the problem, we are an integral part of the solution providing food security, employment, biodiversity and environmental sustainability as well as recreation from our carefully managed countryside.

Anyway, here at backward farm at the moment, it has been very frustrating few weeks as it decided to start raining just as we were about to make most of our silage and hay for the winter. We have made some reasonably dry silage but haven't managed hay yet.

The rain was quite welcome at first as conditions were getting pretty dry, but the novelty has worn off now! The sheep have all been shorn apart from the rams, who will be relieved of their fleeces in the next day or so.

The cattle were enjoying basking in the sunshine of May and June, but the rain has helped to freshen the grass supply, and the pigs are enjoying the slightly softer conditions allowing them to root more and they are not needing as much water carted out to them.

As far as I am concerned if there wasn't any more rain until after Kinross show that would be just grand. Oh, the joys of a temperate climate!

You've still got time to sow some biennials for next year (grow this year to flower next year). I've got some Sweet Williams on the go, and they'll be ready to pot up soon. These are brilliant for cutting – they smell lovely and last for ages in a vase.

I'm also starting to think about bulbs for next year – if I don't think about and order them now then I'll forget what I want... and I'll miss out on any early bird dis-

counts. I love tulips, I think they're lovely and colourful and give a fantastic display. The only problem is that they only really last for one year. And they're not cheap. I've decided to compromise though (it's amazing how the brain works to justify what you really want to do) and I'm going to order some double tulips for the large pots at the front of the house. They'll only last a year, BUT I'm going to order some 'naturalising' tulips to put in the garden, which will last for years and multiply over time. See? I'm sure if I think about this approach enough, I'll make myself believe I'm saving money in the long run.

Well, it looks like I've run out of space again, so time to say adieu and enjoy your time in the garden... between the showers!






