A Land Of Ice And Fire?

THIS DESCRIPTION IS commonly used for Iceland, but could equally be used for our beautiful land as the processes that have forged and shaped it have been ice and fire.

The lava flows that made the Ochils, and the volcanoes that formed the Lomonds were then sculpted by ice and meltwater from the ice age that also created Loch Leven. As well as the ice forming valleys, cols and the loch, the huge water volumes and debris formed deep channels (as at Glen Queich, the unique hanging valley of Keerie Glen, Corb Glen and the valley of the Water of May). A dam of ice and glacial debris blocked the River Devon near Crook of Devon, so it had to flow west forming the impressive Rumbling Bridge Gorge and Cauldron Linn waterfall*.

The deep glacial meltwater valley of Glen Queich has protection as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) due to the rare flora that thrive in its unusual ecosystem but is particularly vulnerable.

The current proposals for two adjacent wind farms, Brunt Hill and Craighead, will have a profound impact on the landscape. It is, however, very difficult to visualise the scale of these developments. With 22 and 16 turbines and proposed turbine heights of 220 and 200 metres respectively (722 and 656 feet), they are so high that, to protect aviation, warning lights are mandatory. Based on the current submissions the average height above Loch Leven for the Brunt Hill turbine tips is 481 metres (1578 feet). The Craighead turbines are slightly lower, with an average height of 451 m (1480 feet). Both wind farms would therefore be higher than West Lomond which is 412 metres (1352 feet) above Loch Leven. They would overshadow the Lomond Hills and Ochils dominating the landscape for many miles around.

Such changes might be acceptable if the rewards in progress towards net zero are substantial. Unfortunately, due to an inadequate electricity distribution system (the National Grid) it is unlikely that this will be the case.

The National Grid did not evolve to take electricity from the widely dispersed but relatively small sources of electricity that wind farms represent. When the wind is blowing across Scotland current electricity production from existing wind farms may be too much for the ageing National Grid to accept and some must stop supplying electricity. To compensate them they are paid for the electricity they would have otherwise supplied (constraint payments). Some wind farms have periods when they are paid not to produce over 50% of their potential output.**

The National Grid must then buy the electricity needed from other sources (often gas fired generators). So, it ends up paying twice for the electricity it needs. These costs, borne by the consumer, are substantial and rising. They were £143 million in 2021 and £227 million in 2022.*** Unless action is rapidly taken to improve the National Grid, building more wind farms in Scotland will inevitably mean these costs increase, renewable electricity will not be produced, and the aim of net zero will be frustrated.

The solution is to increase the capacity of the grid very rapidly (especially the interconnections between Scotland, where most wind farms are, and England and Wales, where most electricity is needed).

Additionally, both more local electricity storage is needed (as batteries or pumped water storage (as happens at Cruachan Pow-

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er Station)), as are ways to utilise excess electricity (for example, in the production of green hydrogen by electrolysis).

Until both the Scottish and UK Governments stop virtue signalling and urgently address these engineering and technological issues, electricity costs to consumers will needlessly increase, progress to net zero will be frustrated and much of Scotland's stunning landscape will become "A Land of Ice, Fire and White Elephants"

Graveyard

THE GRAVEYARD AT ORWELL Church in Milnathort is full, and recently a Milnathort man, who was born and lived most of his life (a local character) was taken to the cemetery in Kinross because the Milnathort one was full. It was a shock to the local community.

The local Councillors have been trying for a few years for PKC to expand the graveyard at Orwell. The obvious place is the field north of the present graveyards at Orwell Church. It is facing the wooded motorway, and the wall at the south of the field marches with the present graveyards. The field belongs to Tillywhalley, the property of the Ferrand Trust.

The Parish of Orwell has blossomed in population with the building the last Local Plan allowing the farm buildings converted etc, and the present plan expanding the village of Milnathort. But there are many villagers who have parents, grandparents, relatives and friends buried at Orwell, and wish to be near them when their time comes.

Although friendly with Kinross the two towns have different traditions and it does not seem right that Milnathort folk should be buried in Kinross away from their roots and relatives.

Please email or write to Perth and Kinross Council, your Councillors for Kinross-shire Ward and Milnathort Community Council, or even better email all of them to show your concern. The contacts are iat the back of the Newsletter (p95). Please do find the time to address this urgent matter.

Thank you – from a Milnathort person won has lived 74 of her 80 years in Kinross-shire, whose grandparents are buried at Orwell, whose parents married and daughter married there, and whose family all live in the parish of Orwell which serves Milnathort, and has for over 400 years.

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Battle Of The Graphs

I HAVE BEEN ENJOYING the 'battle of the graphs' in the letters page over the last few months, so I thought I would add another graph and more data into the debate about the effects of the growth of the Kinross area population over the last 20 years.

In particular, I want to follow up on the Schools Capacity section of Cllr Cuthbert's 'Can Kinross Cope' article (*December Newsletter 2022*), where Councillor Cuthbert said he struggled with council officers' assessment that they 'do not foresee any pressure on the occupancy of any Kinross area schools within the next 5 years', given that there has been a lot of house building over recent years.

The annual school census data for all Scotland's schools is available on Scottish government websites, with the data going back to 2002. Each school takes a census each September. I have collated the data

for Kinross area schools, and summarised the data in the graph shown here.

Looking at the data and the graphs we can see:

- Despite the large increase in the Kinross area population since 2002, the number of pupils at each Kinross area school is roughly the same in 2022 as it was 20 years ago in 2002.
- All the graphs show a decline in pupil numbers over the most recent few years.

Looking at the primary schools we see:

- Kinross Primary School's pupil numbers peaked at 487 in 2003, was 459 in 2022, and has decreased by 4.8% since 2002.
- Milnathort Primary School peaked at 227 pupils in 2020, was 212 in 2022, and has increased by 6% from 2002 to 2022.
- Across all Kinross area primary schools, the pupil numbers have dropped from 1110 in 2002, to 987 in 2022, a decrease of 11% over 20 years.


Looking at Kinross High School we see:

- The pupil number in 2022 is exactly the same as it was in 2002 at 927 pupils.
- The pupil number peaked in 2016 at 1054 pupils, and has decreased by 127 since then.

In summary, I think this data supports the council officers' view that there is no issue with Kinross area school capacities expected over next 5 years, as the historical school census data shows that the increase in the area's population has not lead to an increase in the pupil population, and the most recent data shows the school population actually going in a downwards direction.

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PLAN TO SAVE DAVIES PARK

Community Purchase Planned

WHAT CAN LOCAL residents do when a muchloved park is threatened because it provides the access route to a field that a house-builder wants to develop?

Eleven years ago development of the field north west of Davies Park was made much less likely when campaigning by Kinross Action Group contributed to the site being removed as a housing zone from the first Local Development Plan. However, Local Development Plans change every five years and in any case there is nothing to stop a developer applying to build houses on a non-zoned site, as Miller Homes appear to be doing.



The planning system is heavily weighted in favour of developers; they can appeal to the Scottish Government if the local authority refuses them permission. Objectors to a planning proposal have no right of appeal if the decision doesn't go their way.

Campaigning clearly hasn't been fully effective so something more permanent is needed to safeguard the park for future generations.

Kinross Action Group has been looking at two options. One is to get a change in the deeds to prevent it being sold or its use changed. This involves an organisation called 'Fields in Trust'. This

approach has hit a temporary buffer but it is the group's intention to add this to the second option – that of buying the land the park sits on.

They intend to use legislation which enables communities to buy assets belonging to public bodies and are launching a new organisation to take forward this transfer. It has been a long journey to get to this point but they are now confident that they have persuaded the Council to continue to maintain the park. The exact terms are yet to be resolved. The new organisation will also be able to seek funding to make the park better – putting in place the bigger vision for the park's future from

last year's consultation.

So, what do they need from the community to help get this project over the line into reality?

Firstly there will be opportunities to express your support, both as an individual and through any organisation you are a member of as the project progresses. They are also looking for volunteers to come on board to help establish the new organisation. There is to be a public meeting at Millbridge Hall, on Tuesday 4 April at 7.30pm. Vandalism At Phoenix Hide

SADLY THERE HAS BEEN another incident involving anti-social behaviour from teenagers at the Phoenix Hide. It is particularly sad to see this vandalism, given that the Phoenix was recently constructed to replace the previous hide, destroyed in an arson attack.

Simon Ritchie, Nature Reserve Officer at Loch Leven, told the *Newsletter* 'Unfortunately, on the evening of Saturday 18 March, we had an anti-social behaviour incident at the newly built Phoenix Hide. The hide was used by a large group of teenagers, and the result was a large amount of litter, smashed bottles and vandalism along the trail. The teenagers were also seen climbing over the top of the Phoenix Hide.

'Along the trail, some of the willow hurdles have been smashed and litter was strewed along the shoreline of the Loch. It is certainly a saddening situation, given the importance of this com-



munity-built building. Again, I want to thank the community of Kinross for their support and offer of help. Fortunately, the CCTV system that we installed when the hide was re-built has captured all of this and the matter is now in the hands of the police.'







NATIONAL AWARD FOR SUDS

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE KINROSS-SHIRE CIVIC TRUST who recently received the UK 2022 Susdrain 'Community SUDS' Award for their raingardens project.

This national award for an innovative approach to sustainable drainage was handed over at the AK Bell Library by members of the local community, elected members and staff from PKC and Depute Provost Andrew Parrott.

The award will be displayed for all to see at the library and honours the 'Kinross Raingardens Challenge' which has brought together a wide range of partners to promote a variety of sustainable urban drainage (SuDS) features.

As featured in previous editions of the *Kinross Newsletter*, Raingardens are 'planted areas designed to accept rainfall runoff' and they enhance not just individual properties but also entire housing schemes and industrial estates. The idea was launched in 2019, seeking to enhance or create 20 raingarden features in 2020. The target was substantially exceeded, despite the pandemic.

Brian D'Arcy, Trust member said: 'The new Kinross Raingardens Trail runs along Junction Road and will extend down to

join the Loch Leven Heritage Trail. The Kinross Park and Ride is a point of entry for visitors to Kinross and is the start of the Trail. It needed to look good. Replacing the central grassy area with sowings of local wildflower seeds, plant plugs and wildflower turf not only restored the drainage but also created a feast for bumblebees and other pollinating insects.'

Norma Smith, of Kinnesswood in Bloom, volunteers at Portmoak Primary school, where a raised bed raingarden was retrofitted. She explained, 'The children learned about water management, flooding, combined sewers and climate change, as well as using rainfall to grow plants. It's popular and has enhanced the school activities'.

Brian continued: 'At the Park and Ride we welcomed help from children and staff at Kinross Primary, as well as Kinross in Bloom volunteers.' Depute Provost Andrew Parrott said: 'This is a fantastic achievement for the community in Kinross-shire.' Tayside Biodiversity Partnership Co-ordinator, Catherine Lloyd, said 'There is still much to do. Volunteers will still be needed to keep the raingardens, wildflower plantings and SuDS ponds in good heart.'

IS YOUR BIN UP TO SCRATCH?

THE STICK TO THE Six Recycling Campaign, aimed at reducing the amount of contamination in blue bins is entering its next phase. Bin monitoring is scheduled to take place in Kinross-shire beginning on Monday 27 March. PKC Waste Services Team is planning information stalls and community talks (details on www.pkc.gov.uk/sticktothesix).

Recycling Assistants will accompany bin crews on blue bin day. Contaminated bins will be left unemptied and



tagged. It will then be the responsibility of the householder to remove the contamination from their bin before their

next blue bin collection day, or arrange for a chargeable collection to clear heavily contaminated bins.

Recycling Assistants will conduct doorstep engagement with residents in poorly performing areas to answer questions, provide information and encourage participation. 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BIG BUS IS GETTING BIGGER!

HOT ON THE HEELS of their successful Thursday service, Glenfarg Community Transport Group have announced that from 1 April, they will be operating the 55 bus service between Glenfarg and Kinross six days a week – with up to 10 journeys per day in each direction.

The charity has entered into a Public Social Partnership with Perth and Kinross Council to make this possible and has received a generous donation from Smarter Choices Smarter Places to help set the service up.

Taking the 55 bus service over following the retiral of the Earnside Coaches team,

the Community Group realise they have a hard act to follow. The first three months of the service will be on an interim pilot basis to allow the trialling of some innovative transport ideas, and the service will be implemented in full on 1 July.

In the meantime, the Group are looking to recruit several permanent part-time and full-time salaried drivers to add to their team of volunteer drivers, who are continuing to deliver social, cultural, and sporting outings for the community.

A PEEK INSIDE THE GOLF BALL

THE NEWSLETTER WAS PRIVILEGED to be among the special guests invited by Aerospace Kinross (ASK) to take a look inside the iconic ex-Ministry of Defence complex at Balado, which they hope to purchase and turn into a exciting new visitor centre.

Being inside the Golf Ball, as it is known locally, is a strangely eerie experience. Too small to be described as cavernous, too large to be roomy, the technical term is a radome – a 'structure protecting radar equipment and made from material transparent to radio waves'.

The dome is a former MoD/NATO communications base, whose official address was Balado Bridge. Construction began in 1985. It is 60ft in diameter and is dominated by the inclusion of a 50ft satellite dish. The surrounding buildings included staff facilities, generator housings and various pieces of mysterious MoD surveillance equipment, once almost certainly subject to the Official Secrets Act, now long gone.

For around 30 years it listened in to signals from around the globe – some friendly, others rather less so – until it was deemed surplus to requirements, decommissioned and finally put up for sale in 2006.

Bought by entrepreneur Bob Ferguson in the wake of the RBS bank crash ('I bought it to safeguard my cash!'), who originally envisaged holding on to it for six years before selling it. Various planning hurdles, now overcome, turned his six-

year sprint into a fourteen year marathon, during which there was much interest in the structure, but with no concrete offers of purchase.

Enter Aerospace Kinross, headed by Alastair Stewart, with a plan to repurpose the existing site to make use of the current buildings, including the satellite dish, and convert the site into a space museum and educational centre.

The plan has been met with universal local approval. Councillor Willie Robertson said, 'I really hope they are successful and that in the near future everyone can have the opportunity to visit this iconic landmark.'

ASK has been running for 10 years and has been doing projects about space exploration and aviation with schools all around the country. They have secured £1.9m funding for the Balado project so far, including £1.6m through the Tay Cities Deal. In their final push for funding they have raised nearly £88k and have every hope of reaching their final target of £100k.

Councillor Neil Freshwater commented, 'As well as being a great addition for jobs and tourism I believe the centre would add to Kinross-shire's growth in aviation, with the expanding Balado Airfield next door and the gliding school at Portmoak. Not to mention the model airplane club, hot air ballooning locally, and flying schools nearby at Scone, Dundee and Glenrothes.'

Please note that there is minimal post photograph adjustment.'



One stallholder commented, 'It Guest Of Honour: was very well supported with over 70 stalls and was well attended'.



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cooking with sarah rankin

You will need:

(Serves 4)

1 high welfare free-range pork tenderloin 1 pack (6 slices) prosciutto

1 clove garlic

Handful beetroot tops, washed and roughly chopped Handful chopped soft herbs like chives, flat leaf parsley and basil

50g chopped walnuts

50g hard cheese

150ml extra virgin olive oil

Sea salt and black pepper

75g breadcrumbs

1 tin tomato pulp

1/2 finely chopped onion

250g frozen peas

50ml single cream

I SLIT THE LOIN lengthwise down the centre, leaving an inch or so at each end, without cutting right through, making a pocket along the whole length.

I had some beetroot tops which I washed and chopped finely and added to various bits of left over herbs I had in the fridge or in my windowsill herb pots (chives, flat leaf parsley and basil - but any soft herb would work, or indeed the beetroot tops on their own) and mashed them in a mortar and pestle with 1 clove of garlic, a little sea salt, a few walnuts and some good quality extra virgin olive oil. You really have to do this by hand, using a blender will bruise the herbs too much and leave you with a sludgy green soup. You'll keep the chunky texture when you do it by hand. I added a handful of grated Corra Linn sheep's cheese, but Parmesan or Grana Padano would work too. I set a couple of tablespoons of the pesto aside and added some breadcrumbs to the mix to help it hold together and stuffed the pocket well.

I then laid the 6 slices from a pack of prosciutto, overlapping slightly, on a sheet of cling film and tightly rolled around the fillet to keep in the filling. I chilled it for 30 minutes, removed the cling film and seared the whole thing in a hot frying pan until browned on all sides.

Cook in the oven at 170°C for 15–20 minutes, or until the internal temperature is 63°C. This will ensure that the meat is cooked, but still juicy. Leave to rest for 5 minutes before cutting into thick slices.

Fry off the onion in olive oil until softened and add the tomato pulp, I used Mutti Polpa. Cook down for a few minutes and add in the reserved pesto. Season with lots of black pepper and a little salt – the prosciutto on the pork will be salty so take care not to overdo it – and add the frozen peas. Cook for a further minute or two and add the cream.

I served this with a 15 hour potato, the recipe for which is going out in my next newsletter! Enjoy and support local!




& Roamin' Free Range Pork honesty shop, at their family farm, Hardiston near Cleish, and dug it out of the freezer for a bit of a mid-week treat this week. Arngask do the same thing, with a different breed of pigs and their pork products, eggs and preserves are absolutely worth checking out too. I trimmed off the sinewy silver skin. This is connective tissue, which unlike fat, will cause the meat to tense and toughen and won't render away. It's worth spending a bit of time doing this, the end results are always the better for it

PHOSPHATES IN WATER: As many of you will know I am trying to get action taken to reduce the amount of phosphate being discharged into Loch Leven in order to reverse the decline in water quality we have all witnessed and the resultant



algal blooms. I was surprised to learn that it is normal practice for Scottish Water to actually add phosphates to our drinking water! The reason for this is to reduce the risk of lead poisoning from old lead water pipes in houses. Surely it would be a wiser idea for the Scottish government to launch a scheme to eliminate lead piping from domestic properties? It should be a national priority. Scottish Water shouldn't have to add phosphates to our drinking water. Especially when we know the damaging effects phosphates have on our environment, especially lochs like Loch Leven. A letter has been sent to Mairi McAllan MSP, Minister for Environment, Biodiversity and Land Reform asking for this to be considered. I have suggested that a five year target should be set and that grants should be made available to help householders with the removal of lead water piping from their homes.

CEMETERY PROVISION: As I mentioned in last months' Newsletter the cemetery at Orwell Church is now full. The cemetery at Portmoak is also at capacity. I am working with my ward councillor colleagues and the Council's Bereavement Service (BS) to see what can be done to address this situation. In the case of Orwell there is land north of the existing cemetery which could be used though the BS say that the ground conditions there are not suitable. I have queried this and am waiting for a detailed response as to why the area of ground between the existing cemetery and the M90 can't be considered for use as a cemetery extension. I have always thought that every parish should have its own cemetery so that people can have their loved ones interred near to where they have lived.

UPGRADE OF JUNCTION 7 ON THE M90: People are again asking why junction 7 at Milnathort can't be upgraded to a fully integrated junction. I enquired about this previously as I was aware of the number of houses allocated in the local plan for Milnathort and Kinross. I thought by doing this it would greatly reduce the through traffic in Milnathort and north Kinross. It would also allow for the commercial land on Stirling Road between the builders merchants and the M90 to be developed. When I contacted Transport Scotland and the Scottish government asking for such an upgrade to be considered I was told the following;

- Junction 7 is too close to junction 6 at Kinross and would require a clover leaf design to meet current motorway standards. Simple on/off slips would not be acceptable.
- Transport Scotland did not see the upgrade of junction 7 as a priority and therefore would not support it. They would not allocate any funding even to produce a design brief.
- However they would not object to an upgrade should a developer or someone else be prepared to pay for it.
 So although I and many others think that many benefits



would result from the upgrade of junction 7 it is very, very unlikely to happen. So it seems we will have to learn to live with all southbound traffic having to travel through Kinross to reach the M90 which is very disappointing given the number of new houses that have been and are being built in north Kinross and Milnathort.

AERO SPACE KINROSS (ASK): I, along with my ward councillor colleagues were invited Aero Space Kinross to see around former NATO the communications base at Balado. ASK have drawn up exciting plans to convert the 'golf ball' into a space museum and educational centre. Having seen inside the facility and viewed their plans I really hope they are successful and that in the near future everyone can have the opportunity to visit this iconic



landmark. The photo shows the inside of the building giving a glimpse inside the dome and the huge satellite dish which is still housed there.



WEDNESDAY 1 MARCH was budget day at the Council.

This was the culmination of a long process. It started in November last year when officers produced their preliminary executive summary. This forecast a



gap between what the Council received and what it spent as a negative £30 million per annum. This meant there would need to be big cuts in spending if the Council was to achieve a balanced budget.

Thankfully, the Scottish Government shook the magic money tree and through a change in accounting policy, they made it possible for the Council to find approximately £31 million in their accounts (albeit, this could only be spent once).

The Council adopted this change of policy in February, so, at this time, officers produced a new set of proposals to balance the books, taking £17 million of the magic money in 23-24 and £7 million for the next two years, thereby reducing the cuts needing to be made. However, it should be noted that this money will need to be repaid in the future.

Putting this into context, the Council had a Net budget in 2023-24 of £417m, split roughly into: Education £213m, Health & Social Care £75m, Capital Financing costs £14m, Tayside Joint Valuation Board £1.5m, Housing & Environment £71m, Other services £42.5m.

Many of these services are protected, so for example teacher numbers could not be reduced.

Background

The way the budget works is that officers put forward their view on the financial pressures facing the council and then come forward with savings they would suggest making to balance the books

The role of Councillors is to take a view on the proposed pressures and savings and either accept them or reject them. They then identify other savings proposals and put forward other spending proposals.

In December, I started carrying out a deep dive exercise into the Council's finances. The aim being to better understand how the Council spends its £440 million budget and to better understand the proposals being put forward by officers for savings.

I did this with several other Councillors and it has been a very interesting and illuminating exercise, albeit, an exhausting and sometimes confusing one!

On Budget Day, the Independent Group of which I play an active part, rejected 35 cuts put forward by officers, proposed 23 new savings and put forward 29 new spending proposals (many of which were spend to save).

To pick out just a few of these:

Road Safety is a big issue in Kinross-shire. The population has grown roughly 20% over the last 10 years. This has brought pressure onto local infrastructure. On top of this, the road safety team have seen staff leave over the last year and they haven't been allowed to replace them. The saving proposed by officers was to make this situation permanent. The Independent group rejected the proposed cuts and put forward a proposal to increase the Road Safety team budget. Thankfully, these proposals were partially incorporated into the final budget motion. So, hopefully we will see more road safety issues being brought to a successful conclusion.

School Based Music Instruction is hugely important for many children and for some, makes school life something to look forward to. Officers proposed cutting this budget and cutting the subsidy for music camps. As far as I was concerned, cutting it was not an option. Thankfully, the proposal was rejected.

Officers proposed closing campuses at the end of the school day, i.e. they wanted to turn them into schools. Personally, I found this proposal to be astonishing. Loch Leven Community Campus is one of the last Council owned assets in Kinross-shire! Again, this proposal was rejected.

Officers proposed cutting winter maintenance. This service is already patchy in Kinross-shire and cutting it could have left people stuck in their homes for weeks on end. This saving proposal was also rejected.

Local bus services in Kinross-shire were under real threat, with the 202 and 55 routes listed as being likely to be cut. I and Councillor Watters worked with the Leader of the Council on this and he kindly included £165,000 funding specifically for these services. This has allowed the Glenfarg Public Transport Group to start working on a partnership agreement with the Council to provide the 55 service and to take on a school run as part of this. In the wider scheme of things, we accepted the pressure of cost increases on public transport (£237,000) and agreed to the £525,000 per annum increase in expenditure on buses. Bus services are essential for people to be able to get to and from work and to access services. The Council Leader took the same view and these were both included in the final motion.

Whilst not listed as a savings proposal, the popular Kinrossshire Local Committee required funding to ensure that it would continue. Thankfully, monies were added for this purpose.

The Community Investment Fund (CIF) is a fund allocated in each ward by a CIF panel. Funding has been awarded to numerous local groups, like Community Councils, Broke Not Broken, Village Hall Associations, Transport Groups, you name it. The Independent Group put forward a proposal for £400,000 to be made available in 2023-24. The Council Leader also had this in his budget, so it was incorporated into the Budget.


As I have said, the Independent Group put forward 23 new saving proposals. Whilst most of these were not incorporated into the final motion, it is quite possible that some of these may get worked up over the next year or two into concrete proposals.

Capital Budget

In the Capital Budget, I asked for several items including, Additional Core Paths, Cemetery Extension Funding, Additional money for the A977 Mitigation Measures, Monies for the acquisition of Land for Affordable Housing in rural areas and an E-bike pilot scheme for Kinross-shire.

In the end, only the A977 Mitigation Measures got additional funding of £350,000. Hopefully we will soon now see the works completed, especially given that the Road Safety Team cuts have been reversed and the money is now available to complete all the works identified in 2017, when I managed to negotiate monies for the A977 for the first time!

Aerospace Kinross at Balado

It was fascinating to visit the inside of 'golf ball' at Balado which is the proposed site of the Aerospace Kinross (ASK) visitor centre. The plan is to repurpose the existing site, making use of the current



buildings including the mesmerising satellite dish (a work of art in its own right) which is inside the 'radome' (the technical name for the golf ball). ASK has been running for 10 years and have been doing some wonderful STEM projects with schools all around the country, looking into space exploration and aviation. As many readers will know, it's been a long-term ambition of ASK to build a centre in Kinross and they have secured some £1.9m funding so far, including £1.6m from the UK government through the Tay Cities Deal. In a final push for funding, ASK is now opening a bond to allow people to invest. To date they have raised nearly £88K, but you can find out more at www.ethex.org.uk/invest/asset.

As well as being a great addition for jobs and tourism I believe the centre would add to Kinross-shire's growth in aviation, with the expanding Balado Airfield next door and the gliding school at Portmoak. Not to mention the model airplane club, hot air ballooning locally, and flying schools nearby at Scone, Dundee and Glenrothes.

Illegal Parking In Kinross

I had a number of complaints about dangerous parking in Kinross town, including an incident of a van parked on a double yellow line and blocking access to the roundabout by the pharmacy. This is particularly dangerous because it can force traffic to risk entering the roundabout on the wrong side of the road. I have spoken with the Kinross police who have been very obliging in following up with those involved and will continue to monitor illegal parking.



Kinross High Parent Council

I was disappointed to learn that the committee of the parent council at the high school had chosen to resign. The parent council had been working through a number of concerns that they had, and have been putting in a lot of good work to try and address them. It is concerning that they did not feel able to stay in post. I have written, on behalf of all Kinross-shire councillors, to the director of education at Perth & Kinross Council, requesting a meeting to ensure that any underlying issues are addressed.

Fibre Broadband

Progress seems to being made on the 'not spots' that are still awaiting high speed fibre in rural areas, but with frustrations. Residents of Maryburgh and rural Milnathort are frustrated because although they are now part of the national R100 roll-out programme, they can no longer take control of things and use broadband vouchers to do a community scheme, and will have to wait. Residents of Hatchbank have also been in touch wondering when they will get connected. Thankfully it does appear that some progress is being made, with ducting have been complete for Hatchbank to Caresgour, and pylons are now in place for the Boreland to Cockairney Feus area. I am led to believe that the final stage of connecting is imminent so hopefully we will see some progress around the Cleish area very soon, but I will continue to monitor and press for completion of the parts which are still slow to progress.

IN EARLY MARCH, the Council voted on an exceptionally challenging budget.

One element that helped alleviate some of the pressure on the Council's revenue budget was the 'Service Concession Arrangement' which will help



contribute £17 million to the 2023/24 Revenue Budget. While this has not solved everything, the consequences of not having it would have been catastrophic on council services.

Given that we as the SNP, are a minority administration, we committed to reach across the chamber to ensure that the Council collectively, as the democratically elected members of Perth and Kinross Council, deliver the best outcomes for our people, for our businesses, and for the area as a whole—within the budget setting process.

The budget also reflected the priorities within the Council's new Corporate Plan and supports many of the proposals we have already committed to since taking over the administration last May.

As our first priority, tackling poverty, we are committing over £800,000 to tackling poverty. This will see the creation of a child poverty fund, a small grants fund and further funding for Warm Spaces, given the success of the current programme.

We also provided a further investment of more than £3.25 million to protect the most vulnerable across Perth and Kinross.

Tackling climate change and supporting sustainable places both stay a clear commitment for the SNP administration. To reflect this, we additionally committed £75,000 to support community projects enhancing biodiversity in our open spaces.

Reinforcing our commitment to climate change, we are also investing £250,000 to provide EV charging points at car parks in our rural locations.

Reducing the Council's carbon footprint is another key action within our climate change strategy. We are committed to support this with funding of £2 million for decarbonisation projects, including energy efficiency and energy generation measures. This will be funded by the savings and income realised moving forward. A big thanks to Cllr Liz Barrett and Cllr Dave Cuthbert for helping to get this over the line.

As part of adapting to climate-change 'storm events' the budget allocates £50,000 to provide an enhanced severe-weather service.

The budget also seeks to further support the local economy, and as such, it adds £300,000 into this priority. This includes funding for Growbiz to expand coverage and more funding for the highly successful Adapt Your Property scheme.

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young people to achieve their full potential, we decided against £870,000 of savings. This will maintain primary school swimming, music instruction, central groups, and music camps as well as educational psychology services.

Recognising the tough time our young people have had in recent years, the budget provides £100,000 for additional study support this Easter. This means that all secondary schools in Perth and Kinross will be open for senior pupils in the period before their exams.

Given the success of the virtual campus across secondary schools, the budget invests £61,000 to expand the course choice by a further 5 subjects from August 2024.

Recognising the value of our local communities being involved in local decision making and the need to address inequalities within the council area, we have allocated £600,000 to the Community Investment Fund and Local Area Partnerships for the next financial year.

The Kinross-shire local committee will be funded for a further £40,000 towards its ongoing work, while the review of community engagement is taking place.

In collaboration with other local councillors in Kinross-shire, extra funding has been assigned to maintain the much-needed Services 55 and 202 for Glenfarg and West Kinross-shire.

Additional funding of £2 million has been made available to enhance the local road network across the Council area.

In setting the Council tax, we needed to strike a balance between the inflationary pressures facing the Council and the financial pressures on households. This budget's careful and considered approach has allowed us to restrict the Council Tax increase to 3.9%. This is the lowest Council tax increase in Scotland and one of the lowest in the UK.

The budget invests in our children and families, it invests in our economic wellbeing, it invests in our communities, it invests in climate change, and in our infrastructure. It also minimises the financial impact on all our households with a Council Tax rise significantly below inflation.

ON SATURDAY 6 MAY, the Coronation of King Charles III and his wife, Camilla, will take place in Westminster Abbey. A Coronation is an event which increasingly few of us will ever have witnessed. I often hear mention from older residents



who recall the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II when having a television at home was rare and many who recall the purchase of a TV for the occasion. The black and white footage still emphasises the solemnity and pageantry of the rituals that are centuries old. There is much symbolism and importance to the event, and I am sure for many of us it will be something we will want to watch, and the streets of London will be lined with those wanting to be part of this important moment in our nation's history.

At the centre of the Coronation will be the Coronation Stone which we know as the Stone of Scone or the Stone of Destiny, which has been used for centuries in the inauguration of monarchs. The Stone has been in Edinburgh Castle since 1996 and is visited by millions of people each year. The Stone will leave Scotland for the Coronation in May and will have a central role in Westminster Abbey. The Stone will of course then, in due course, form a central part of the new Perth Museum in the redeveloped City Hall. It is very much hoped that it will attract visitors from all over the world to come to Perth to visit the new museum and to then spend time, and money, in other parts of Perth and Kinross which will bring a very welcome boost to the economy. The fact that it will have been the focus of an event broadcast around the world so soon before it is due to be placed in Perth is very significant and will bring a boost.

With the Coronation on the Saturday, Sunday 7 May is an opportunity for communities to get together and celebrate with lunches, street parties and the Coronation Concert at Windsor Castle. I understand that Perth and Kinross Council can offer advice to anyone looking to arrange a local event who may wish a local road closure or similar. On Monday 8 May the day is being marked as The Big Help Out. The idea of a day when communities can come together, on a Bank Holiday, and arrange volunteer events such as litter picks, community tidy ups or similar events is fantastic. We saw the spirit of community across Perth and Kinross during COVID when people got together to ensure those who needed support got it and it would be a great opportunity for community groups to promote what they do and encourage people to get involved. I WAS DELIGHTED TO raise a motion in Parliament to congratulate Kinross-shire athlete Laura Muir on yet another fantastic achievement following her Gold medal victory at the 1500m event at the European Indoor Championships 2023 held in Istanbul on 4 March. This was the fifth gold medal of Laura's career at



the European Indoor Championships and establishes her as the most decorated athlete from the UK at the biennial track and field competition.

The motion received wide support from across party political lines with my MSP colleagues in agreement that when including recent gold medals at the 2022 Commonwealth Games and European Championships that Laura is one of Scotland's greatest ever athletes and an inspiration to young girls looking to participate in any sport, demonstrating that hard work and determination can deliver the rewards of international success. Parliament wishes Laura all the best for the future, including for the season ahead.

The celebrations of Laura Muir's accomplishments were well timed as Parliament brought into sharp focus female role models during a week focused upon gender based political issues, tying into International Women's Day on 8 March 2023.

I spoke on the subject of 'Women and Girls Safety on Public Transport in Scotland' following a new report from the Scottish Government based upon interviews with women between the ages of 14 and 86 in Scotland, revealing that each had at least one negative experience with harassment and unwanted attention when using public transport.

My comments focused on the need for men to change their attitudes and behaviours – not by becoming saviours or protectors. Women don't need knights in shining armour, but to be given the respect of their privacy, their dignity, their personal space and their right to live their lives as they choose, without fear of intimidation, harassment or even worse.

I accept that we have to have the safety measures right now to protect women and girls but we have to as men change the culture and attitude, so as to change the reality for women and girls in this country.

I believe that the Scottish Government should full heartedly consider ideas to make these changes, and I was therefore pleased to hear that a consultation has been launched on draft reforms that would create five new laws to provide police and prosecutors with new powers to tackle the effects of misogyny.

The proposals are based on recommendations made by a Working Group on Misogyny led by Baroness Helena Kennedy KC, and would expand current laws to include threatening, abusive or sexual behaviour directed towards women or girls because of their gender. Baroness Kennedy's research demonstrated that such incidences cause feelings of degradation, humiliation or distress.

I believe that the potential criminal law reforms will have a significant impact on addressing society's and particularly men's tolerance of misogyny and I will be asking the Justice Minister in Parliament what lessons can be learned from other countries about their experiences with this issue. The consultation is open from 8 March to 2 June 2023 and the Government is keen to hear from girls and women about what they think should be included in law. The Consultation paper is available on the Scottish Government's website.

FEBRUARY WAS LGBT HISTORY month and the other day I made a wee video to celebrate. It's gone viral, with 300,000 views. It seems to have struck a chord with those who watched. And some of the comments viewers posted have certainly struck a chord with me.



I was born in the 1960s when homosexuality was illegal. I always knew I was gay. But everything I heard as a child about being gay was relentlessly negative. We were taught that we would lead a lonely life of relentless promiscuity. And of course at school 'gay' was the worst of insults.

I came from a religious family and I used to pray not to be gay. But of course the prayers didn't – couldn't – work. We are born gay or straight. No one chooses their sexual orientation. We have been gay and straight since the dawn of time and in every civilisation whether tolerant or intolerant. People have found same sex love despite the cruelest persecution and the most horrific punishments. Who'd have chosen to be gay in Nazi Germany or today's Afghanistan?

By the 1990s being gay had become a little easier. But still not easy. You could be sacked for being gay with no legal redress. If you were twenty one and your boyfriend was 20 – and under the then age of consent – you could end up with a criminal record for 'underage sex'. Just imagine how that would have affected your life opportunities. If you were gay you could be refused admission to the civil service, and investigated by the police if in the military and expelled without just cause. You were 'bad for morale' no matter how discreet your relationship had been. Sacked for hiding your identity and sacked for being open about your identity, LGBT people just couldn't win.

When clause 28 hysteria descended on Scotland the tabloids screamed about 'gay lessons in schools' and some religious leaders sought, shamefully, to conflate homosexuality with paedophilia.

I was lucky. I had a loving family, good friends, and a stable relationship too. But many kids grew up in very different circumstances. Gay boys have long accounted for the highest percentage of suicides in the country. Many have always ended up homeless when thrown out by their families.

So I'm pleased our Holyrood Parliament has done so much to make things better. Scotland now has gay marriage, an equal age of consent, LGBT inclusive education in schools, and the recently passed Gender Recognition Act which aims to make life a little easier for trans people. Scotland regularly now ranks amongst the most socially liberal countries in the world.

And while most of recognise that religious minorities are free to hold controversial views, most of us recognise too that they should not be able to impose those views on the rest of us. We live in a secular society. And that the tens of thousands of people who watched my wee video seemed, overwhelmingly, to think was a very good thing.

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This is defined as:

Any crime which is perceived by the victim or any other person as being motivated (wholly or partly) by malice or ill will towards a social group.

There are five groups or protected characteristics covered by the hate crime legislation.

- Disability
- Race
- Religion or belief
- Sexual Orientation
- Transgender Identity.

If someone targets you, or someone else, because of a dislike or prejudice of your disability, race, religion, sexual orientation or transgender identity then you should report this to the police as a hate crime.

The person experiencing the hate crime does not always need to be in one of these groups.

We would look at why the act or offence was committed. We also look at the perception of the people involved.

Police Scotland treats all hate crimes and incidents seriously. We want you to report these types of incidents to us.

Why are hate crimes different?

Hates crimes can have a huge impact on people. They have been targeted because of who they are, or who the offender thinks they are. The attack is very personal.

What Can You Do About Hate Crimes Or Incidents?

If you've experienced a hate crime or incident please report it to us.

You can also report hate crimes or incidents even if it wasn't directed at you. For example, you could be a friend, neighbour, family member, support worker or a passer-by.

You should tell the police if you think it happened because of disability, race, religion, sexual orientation or transgender identity.

It may even be a combination of these things. This is important as it lets us know it is a hate crime or incident.

If something happens and you are not sure if it is a crime please remember if it feels wrong report it and let us help.

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KINROSS-SHIRE CRICKET CLUB 2000-2023 – A CONCLUSION



AS KINROSS-SHIRE CRICKET CLUB approaches its 170th anniversary we can bring the club's history up to date and complete a fascinating story that started back in Salutation Hotel in April 1853. During the winter of 2004/05 three of the 1st XI players underwent coach-training programmes with Cricket Scotland. By the start of the 2005 season the club had three fully qualified coaches and through the kindness of the Lords Taverner's charity the first bag of junior coaching equipment.

By working closely with the cricket development officer employed by Perth & Kinross Council and visiting local primary schools within 12 months junior membership had grown to over 90 children. At the end of the 2005 season the club played its first junior match with an under 13 game against Edinburgh Carlton. Incredibly, Kinross-shire won and embarked on an 8-year run of Scottish Cup successes.

In 2006 the club won its first National Championship title when the U13s lifted the MCC "Spirit of Cricket" Scottish Championship. The enthusiasm for junior cricket helped grow senior numbers and in the same season the 1st XI competed for the first time in the "Dukes" Strathmore & Perthshire Division 3 League with the team eventually coming runner's up.

Over the winter period between 2006/07 the club successfully applied for a grant from sportscotland to build a pavilion and artificial wicket within the grounds of Kinross House. The artificial wicket was installed in May 2007 and the pavilion followed quickly in April. The pavilion was officially opened by Sir David Montgomery on 7th July 2007. The U13 team was named Perth & Kinross Sports Council Team of the Year and the club tasted further playing success as both the U13's and U15's won their respective Scottish National titles. At the end of the year club head coach, John Ross was named Perth & Kinross Coach of the Year and the club was named Cricket Scotland Junior Club of the Year.

In 2008, The 1st XI won their first title claiming the Strathmore & Perthshire Union Division 3 champion's trophy and the club em-

barked on a three-year period of unprecedented achievement both on and off the field. The continued interest in the game saw the formation of the Kinross Ladies & Girls section of the club. Coaching levels had grown to 25 ECB qualified coaches and over 120 juniors regularly attended weekly training.

At the start of the 2009 season, the club was approached to host an International Cricket Council European Junior fixture when Guernsey played Denmark in July. The match brought the club international recognition and press interest.

The story of a small rural cricket club run by parents achieving so much in such a short time saw the club named as the 2009 Wisden Cricketer "Club of the Year". The club was then caught up in a whirlwind of press coverage which saw Kinross feature on the leading pages of all the major National newspapers, Scottish TV and international sports magazines. The U13 and U15 teams again made Scottish Cup finals day and the 1st XI won the Division 2 title with an unbeaten season.

The Women's and Girls teams worked at their game during the winter and in April 2010 they were asked to play in the Scottish Universities Women's tournament when one of the teams pulled out the day before the start. The lady's team had never played in a fully competitive match and some trepidation they travelled down to Galashiels for the tournament. Any fears that they were not up the event were soon dismissed as they won their first game and quickly progressed to the final against Edinburgh University, the tournament favourites. In a close-run match Kinross came out on top and much to the surprise of Cricket Scotland were named 2010 Universities Champions. Two weeks later the Kinross Ladies played in the Scottish Women's Championships in Perth and again lifted the Silverware as undisputed Scottish Women's Champions. Not to be outdone, the senior men also won their third consecutive league title winning the Division 1 title.

As the club moved towards 2011 they received the unsettling news that Kinross House, and therefore the home ground, was for

sale. By April it was confirmed that the 2011 season would be the clubs last at Kinross House.

The clubs' plight came to the attention of local farmer, Rob Niven and he made contact with the offer of converting his barley field behind Loch Leven's Larder into a cricket ground. The club immediately took up the offer and work started to plant grass and prepare the field for the 2013 season. The new hope brought the focus back to the club and the juniors again made Scottish Cup finals day and the 1st XI finished a very respectable 4th on the Division 1 table.

At the end of April 2013, the club hosted its first match at the Loch Leven's Larder cricket ground when a Kinross-shire XI played and beat the Scotland Wildcats Women's International Team. With few facilities but huge enthusiasm the club started to rebuild and were lifted when the juniors made their 7th appearance in the Scottish Cup finals in 8 years. The 1st XI finished 3rd in Division 1 and juniors numbers continued to climb back to their previous levels.

The club was honoured to be selected to host a touring Australian School from Brisbane when they played a P&K U16 select side which boasted 5 Kinross-shire players. The match was dominated by the Aussie's until the Kinross-shire bowlers effected the most dramatic upset of the Aussies tour as they bowled out the last 6 wickets for only 11 runs and won the game by 6 runs.

The club continued to flourish and was regarded as a showcase club in Scotland. Over six-year period 16 Kinross-shire juniors progressed to play for Scotland age group teams in both youth and girls cricket.

The COVID pandemic impacted cricket in much the same way as all other teams sports. For two years there was no cricket of any form and the club face the very real threat of closure. In 2021, Cricket Scotland lifted their band on games and several trail games were played by the seniors. Junior cricket was completely severely impacted as many rural cricket clubs simply had no juniors and no matches could be played. The situation continued to improve, and a full seniors fixtures list was played in 2022.

As we have seen in previous issues, Kinross-shire Cricket Club has had a long running history and the past 20 years have been a fitting culmination of all the effort by volunteers to maintain a rural soports club. This century has seen the club win 5 Scottish National titles, 5 league titles, produce 16 international players, build two new cricket grounds and , for a brief period becoem the most famous Scottish Cricket club on the worlds stage. The 2023 season has a full fixtures list of seniors games and the plan is to restart junior cricket as the season progresses.

The first 170 years of cricket in Kinross has been completed. Let's look forward to the next 170 years!



SOCKING IT TO ETHIOPIA

IN OCTOBER 2022, we had a catch up visit to our much beloved Bucamma clinic, a nine bone shaking hours drive to Southern Ethiopia, after a 2½ year gap, because of Covid and political unrest in Europe and Ethiopia. Despite all these difficulties EMP has not stood still, and I am just back after a nearly month long visit this past February.

Thanks to a generous and anonymous donation, we have been able to build an impressive Podoconiosis Shelter and treatment centre. This building has been named St James' Podoconiosis Clinic. There, the poorest of the poor come to have their diseased feet cared for, and where they are also taught the very simple protocol of foot care and protection. We emphasise five key points:

- Soak
- Scrub with soap
- Massage and movement
- Socks
- Shoes

We are aware that nightly compression and elevated legs will also speed up the reversal of the illness, and so we are conducting research with a small number of patients – by measuring the swollen legs weekly, and teaching them to apply the compression bandages at night.

How I wish that many more people could see and hear the people who are benefiting from this treatment. It is so very humbling, but the best thing is the obvious improvement in the majority of the feet. Indeed we had a sort of graduation ceremony where men and women paid tribute to the system, and told their stories of improvement. They have also become their own teachers which is hugely gratifying for us. It was great fun delivering the hundreds of socks donated by the good folk of Kinross. Every pair was distributed and gratefully received. As an aside, I think that the graduates will miss their treatment as there is a sort of 'Spa' element to it all, as 50 people at a time sit quietly chatting whilst their feet soak!

The majority of patients simply come and go, but there are always a few who need treatment for wounds, fungal infections or chronically swollen legs. There is ongoing need for soap, disinfectant, massage cream, socks and shoes, and so we are seeking another funding stream for these necessary provisions. This is not even considering the need for the washing area to be cleaned and sanitised after every session, plus the staff dedicated to the care of the patients.

One of the main purposes of this last visit was to deliver the funds for and oversee the completion of the Podoconiosis



Clinic. This has been achieved but it has felt quite pressured. We wanted the building to have more than one purpose and that too has been achieved.

Now we have treatment rooms for both Podo patients and Uterine Vaginal Prolapse (UVP) Mothers. We have secured funding from Festival Medical Services for the women to be medically cared for, whilst they await their surgical repair. This is a fantastic contribution, as we at EMP have to concentrate on fundraising for the continuous payment of salaries.

As the Podo building is now completed, we feel free to embark on the construction of a new Labour Suite. The present one is adequate but dark and cramped, and rapidly becoming unfit for purpose. We have two exceedingly professional young male midwives, who are part of the planning process along with senior management. The old building will then be repurposed for antenatal treatment and social gatherings.

Our time here is not all work although the work is hard.

By our standards the weather is beautiful although the farmers all long for rain. Maureen's nephew accompanied us this time and he lived and worked among the younger members of staff. He is a qualified doctor with some time to spare. His skill and expertise were invaluable during the busy clinics, but also has a great love of sport. There have been massive football matches and long runs through the country side. The distribution of football strips and caps has been a highlight.

As ever we have seen babies born and heartbreaking scenarios of abject poverty and despair. Our ability to complain

about anything in our lives is once again reduced to a pipsqueak. Our saddest moment came on our last but one day. The electricity this year seems to have been very poor and when it comes back it surges, causing problems with computers and fridges etc. On this sad day a power surge caused a fire within one of the family houses. Of course there is no 999, no Fire Brigade and no water hydrants. The house with its dry walls and wooden and tin roof was completely gutted. What a sight is was to see an old, newly widowed, gentleman sitting outside the wreck of his home whilst friends and neighbours tried with small water containers to rescue something, anything of his possessions. As family members arrived, the level of high wailing escalated. It was an extraordinary and humbling scene to witness.

I have to be honest, there are moments of high hilarity and never more at my attempts at the Amharic language. One of the nuns kindly told me that it was like listening to a baby learning to speak, one word at a time. Still I believe it's good for my old brain, so I shall continue. Also it gives them great pleasure to dress us up in their festive clothes, while they stay in their normal kit. We do anything to please!

Then as ever comes the tortuous drive back to Addis Ababa and the long haul back to Scotland, to another world, our world of plenty, even if it doesn't seem that way.

Long may we be strong enough and resilient enough to carry on our connection with our many friends in The Buccama Health Centre.

Fossoway Memories



CROOK OF DEVON HAS many treasures, but this one is a little unusual and rare, a HEARSE HOUSE, there are very few now left in Scotland. Very little is know about it except that it was built of stone in 1882, long after the Fossoway St Serf's and Devonside Church in whose churchyard it is located. (The church was built in 1729 and remodelled in 1806).

We are not sure of a date on when it would last have been occupied by the village hearse. But what we do know is an occasion in December 1887 when the Village Hearse was used for the funeral of a well-known local farmer. Matthew Dykes who farmed at Hilton of Aldie.

He was injured by a bull in an open farm, his right hip joint was damaged. He lay in the Edinburgh Infirmary for some months,

brought home and a few months later died at only 42 years of age, leaving behind a wife Jessie and three very young boys who attended the Fossoway School.

In December 1887 the horse-drawn hearse travelled the three miles from the farm to Crook of Devon Railway Station and then onto Strathaven for a family burial.

The cost of the funeral was:

£4.0s.0d	for Mr George Ellis the Undertaker	
£0.7s.0d	for the use of the village Hearse	
£6.8s.3d	being cost of the	

railway & other funeral expenses.

FOSSOWAY HAD LOTS OF mills - Waulk, Lint, Manufacturing of Pot Barley, several for corn/meal and also sawmills. This one has replaced by a garage, café, caravan park and then by houses, but the memories certainly live on. This is the Sawmill near the Cleish Road at Crook of Devon. It was originally owned by the Ellis Family with Frank Swindley in charge. Here are a couple of memories from two children that lived in the community at the time.

I remember the sawmill, I went and sat watching the steam engine that ran the sawmill. Frank cut me a block of wood into a bridge for me to play with my cars, my dad used to get sawdust for the rabbits we had.

There was a massive steam engine at the end nearest the road, there was an old Fordson Tractor belt driven, which powered the Stenner bandsaw, at one time it certainly would have been steam powered. The men sat and made their tea in front of the steam engine around a wood burning brazier.

KEEP AN EYE ON YOUR BOWELS!

BOWEL CANCER IS A major public health problem in Scotland. The Scottish Bowel Screening Programme invites men and women aged between 50 and 74 to take part in screening every two years. Bowel screening aims to find cancer at an early stage when treatment is likely to be more effective. Bowel screening is the only screening programme where the test is completed at home.

• The simpler bowel screening test is likely to overcome a process barrier for those who found the gFOBT test difficult or unhygienic to complete.

News from the February Meeting

Matters Arising

Windfarm Application - Craighead Farm

Galileo are performing a scoping exercise on the potential to erect 12 turbines, at 200m high, at Craighead farm. There is still a lot of work for Galileo to do before they put forward an application. If successful there is the possibility of a community payback fund that would be available to neighbouring/impacted communities, this could potentially be approx. £360k. Their timescale is to be operation in 2027, their application is likely to be in spring 2024. There are currently two windfarm applications, both are in the early stages, and will go before the Scottish Government for assessment, this Craighead application is not submitted, and Neill will invite the developer to the next CC meeting in March.

Damaged Wall At Burleigh

Awaiting a response from the landowner (Kevin)

Lathro Footbridge/Repairs On New Path/Damaged Gate

Council officer has been struggling to get replies from Persimmon and has now passed the issue to the council enforcement officer to follow up with.

Damaged Wall At Back Loan

Council had remarked they would not return the wall to how it previously looked but to reshape to avoid vehicle damaging in future and this would be complete by end 2022

Broken Service Cover At Burleigh Road

Council officers have reported it to Scottish Hydro.

Marshall Place Damaged Fence. Raised with council officers again. Loch Leven Pollution

The CC held a zoom meeting with Dr Linda May, to discuss the issue and she was able to take the CC through the detail of the historical issues with the loch and the monitoring that is ongoing. She shared it was not a simple problem to be solved, there is a lot of ifs and buts with regard "if we try and fix one problem" how will it impact something else in the lock as it is a complex biological and environmental system, and we really need to know the impacts of any one fix. Lack of wind is a factor, also the public not taking notice of the notices with regards to green algae. When performing a survey they observed kids picking up the algae and throwing it at each other.

A potential solution to the green algae build up is to open the sluice gate and refresh the loch water, the last time this was done was 4 years ago, but there is a reluctance to do this.

There has been monitoring of the loch since 1977.

An example of an 'if/but' scenario is that when rainbow trout were introduced to the loch, they would eat the water fleas that in turn used to keep the algae down. Green algae is a worldwide issue and the high instance can be attributed to global warming. The MOCC will meet with local resident Brian Darcy who previously worked with SEPA, with the intention of inviting him to a future MOCC. Dr Linda May normally attends the Climate Café. The next one is on 4 April.

Burleigh Parking Question from the floor:

Q. It was previously asked about the notification on the Burleigh carpark that was encouraging overnight camping in the car park, what is the policy for this?

A. Nature Scot previously provided a response:

'We are monitoring the use of overnight users around the reserve. I get regular communications regarding mostly campers at Burleigh. 'We record negative/anti-social behaviour where we can.

'We've recently had a meeting regarding Burleigh as a camp site and what levers we have to reduce the activities down here. We are awaiting the outcome of this. These decisions are done at a national level so we can deliver a strong message.

"Regarding camper vans there has already been some concern that they take up too much space and add to human waste problem that we are already seeing.

'We will continue to monitor the situation but if you can encourage folk to report issues we don't see that might help our decision making. Campervans can simply be discouraged by putting in a metal arch in and this has been spoken about.'

It was remarked that communal campsites in Europe often provide the necessary facilities, and maybe this is an option that should be looked at locally if there is no way to stop the mess associated with campers. The Green Space Rangers are currently being recruited for this year and the MOCC will look at inviting them to a future MOCC.

Road Policing Day Of Action

Officers from the Roads Policing Department recently engaged in a day of action around Loch Leven. Enforcement was carried out in areas including Kinross, Milnathort, Portmoak, Scotlandwell, Crook of Devon and Gairneybank. In total, 21 vehicles were stopped with warnings issued for the following:

4 for speeding

2 for light defects

1 number plate offence

In addition one driver was reported for having no insurance and

A. We will see what we can arrange.

Coffee With A Cop

The MOCC will look at arranging a session in a local coffee shop in the near future where members of the public can meet and informally chat with a local PC.

Milnathort Primary School (provided by Laura in advance) Milnathort Primary continues to work with our Community Police Officers who have carried out spot checks re. parking during dropoff/ collection times on several occasions. They have checked in with the school again too which has been appreciated. I hope to invite the Officers in to school to support our JRSOs (see below). I have noted concerns re. parking in the School Newsletter.

To involve the pupils, the school is now taking part in the Junior Road Safety Officers programme (JRSOs). Our P5 children have taken the lead, promoting the initiative throughout the school.

The school has also signed up to Living Streets which is an initiative promoting safer routes to school and encouraging families to walk to school rather than using vehicles (when possible).

I have contacted the authority to receive support in reviewing the School's Travel Plan.

Councillors' Reports

Richard Watters

Milnathort Surface Water Flood Scheme: Funded by the Scottish Government, the recommendation to separate all the mixed drains ie drainage water from sewage is probably not feasible from a cost perspective, however they are looking at reducing the sudden flood water that triggers raw sewage discharge into lochs and rivers by, either, adding storage tanks, to hold the flood water, or to direct the flood water straight into the rivers. There is a proposed cost that is already funded to proceed however there is no start date on these works yet.

It is likely to be behind schedule due to lack of staff.

Budget: the council has a huge deficit, but a change in financing to potentially release £30 million by changing the time the council needs to repay loans on the council estate from 20/25 years to 50 years. This still requires Scottish Government and Westminster Treasury approval. This change will help to release some revenue budget.

Presentation Of Plans For Seamab School

There was a short presentation to discuss plans for the new school building at Seamab as the current school doesn't meet building standards and wasn't purpose built. It will therefore need to be replaced with the new school, the old one then being knocked down

The models shown have been approved by planners as they fit into their environment and will house a similar number of children with no significant changes to the design of classrooms. The new building will also be more energy efficient

The new building will include a large indoor play area which the current building does not provide. This new indoor hall will also



benefit the local community and can be used outside of school hours terms for meetings and activities such as badminton, football, cubs, brownies etc.

The build is due to start in a year or so, once sufficient funding has been secured, and the anticipated build time is 18 months. Once the start date has been confirmed, plans will be shared with the community with the aim to complete the build during school holidays to minimise disruption. Matters Arising

Road Safety in FDCC Area (Including A977 Mitigation and Carnbo) The TRO process in Carnbo has started!

The A977 School Road junction works are to recommence 7th August 2023 for approx. 3 weeks. There are three remaining major road schemes on the A977 Mitigation Measures list:

School Road/Station Road traffic signals (partially completed and due to start again on 7 August 2023) which will be funded from the remaining A977 budget (£190,000).

Drum crossroads signalisation, anticipated to be in the region of £150,000 to deliver (from capital funding)

A977/B9097 junction realignment is anticipated to be in the region of £200,000 to deliver. This may not be necessary, depending on the outcome of the previous 2 projects. This money is earmarked for the A977 so if it's not used on this project, it can be used elsewhere

We are very grateful to our PKC councillors, especially Cllr Cuthbert for ensuring that funding has been made available for these mitigation measures

Cut-Out Cops

Communities can fundraise for cut out cops (£85 per cut out cop) and they also have to be responsible for putting these out and taking them in again.

The FDCC can organise purchasing of these (anyone interested can email FDCC at: fossoway.cc@gmail.com there is money in the CIF available.

Community Speedwatch

Volunteers are needed for community speedwatch - teams of three people are required to operate the equipment. Volunteers should email <code>fossoway.cc@gmail.com</code> to register their interest. Once there are three teams of volunteers, the process can begin Carnbo have their traffic survey lines in place, however it was noted these are only heading towards Kinross and they are still needed at the other end of the village

An MoP noted that speeding is rife in Powmill, as it's a more rural location than some of the other villages and police don't appear to be carrying out speed monitoring in these areas. It was suggested that Powmill village can ask for traffic survey lines etc to monitor speeds, and in the meantime use lampposts, signage, fencing, walls, flowers etc to clearly demarcate where the village starts.

It was noted that there are sections of the A977 that fluctuate between 30, 40 and 60mph. Cllr Robertson noted that there need to be physical measures to ensure that speed limits are being followed and that average speed cameras are not an option for the A977. He also reiterated that any additional budget available in the A977 mitigation project will be used for whichever village has been identified to have the greatest need

Windfarms

Last month Gallileo attended the meeting in Carnbo to discuss their plans for the Craighead wind farm. They have submitted their scoping opinion paper and plans to Scottish Government and asked the FDCC to also submit comments by 20 March.

FDCC will put together comments in line with the submission for Brunthill windfarm, highlighting relevant groups to include in any discussions and will make this available on the FDCC Facebook page (available from www.facebook.com/fossoway). There is no need to have a Facebook account to access the FDCC Facebook page.

Fossoway Area Transport

PKC has secured funding for the 202 bus for this year despite other budget cuts and inflationary pressures

We are grateful for the efforts of the PKC councillors to ensure these buses have been funded

Crook Moss Travellers Site

Assoc. CCIIr Farquhar has lost touch with her previous contact and is going to find a new contact on the site to liaise with

Consultations

There are four consultations open for the public to comment on: Your Police 2022-2023: https://consult.scotland.police.uk/strategy-insight-and-innovation/your-police-2022-2023/ Closes 31st March 2023. The CC has responded, but individuals should comment too. The consensus is that the Police are resource constrained but do what they can well.

Scottish Government Draft Energy Strategy and Just Transition https://consult.gov.scot/energy-and-climate-changedirectorate/energy-strategy-and-just-transition-plan/. Closes 4th April 2023. This outlines The Scottish Government's vision for Scotland's energy system to 2045 and a route map of ambitions and actions to transform the way Scotland generates, transports and uses energy. The strategy includes sections on offshore, onshore, wind farms, hydrogen, solar, wave and tidal, bioenergy and hydro and details how each will grow and contribute to achieving the targets set by the Government. However, it is clear that onshore windfarms do and are expected to continue in the near term to provide the most energy. The strategy refers to NPF4 which provides a supportive planning framework for onshore windfarms. The draft strategy supports ongoing research on the possible impact of all sources of energy on the environment in particular peat deposits and marine environment. There are 66 questions in the consultation paper the vast majority of which are not really relevant to our community and hence the CC has decided not to respond.

SEPA stakeholders survey: Closes 17th March. This survey aims to find out how SEPA is viewed amongst stakeholders to inform their work on regulation and flooding services. The FDCC has responded.

PKC Consultation: Common Good Asset Register. Under the terms of the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015, every Local Authority in Scotland is duty bound to prepare and publish a comprehensive register of all Common Good assets within their ownership. Common Good assets are the heritable (land and buildings) and moveable (paintings, furniture, etc.) property that belonged to the former Burghs of Scotland. Common Good assets are owned by the local authority, although administered separately from other local authority funds for accounting purposes. There are no assets in our district hence there is no need for a response.

New Business

Recycling And Waste Management

PKC will be auditing the blue bins in Kinross-shire the week of 23rd March to check what people are putting in their recycling (blue) bin. This is to find out common items that people are trying to recycle (that are not in the 6 items allowed) and to provide leaflets and information to the community on how to recycle effectively

PKC note that if the recycling bins are contaminated with items that they should not have, the waste management company imposes hefty fines on PKC. If the community can be encouraged to reduce contaminating recycling bins, and thereby avoid PKC being fined by waste management, this can save a significant amount of money (these fines are reflected in council tax) that can then be used elsewhere

Kinross-shire Local Committee Meeting 16 February 2023 Wind Farms

A verbal report was provided by PKC Development Manager of the position relating to Brunthill and Craighead Farm Wind Farm and process that will apply. At this stage PKC have not been formally notified but as both will be Section 36 Applications PKC will be a Statutory Consultee. PKC will look at applications separately and each on its own merits but will look at cumulative impact.

All the CCs should submit their own comments on the scoping documents and any objections or calls for mitigation measures through Energy Consents Unit. CCs present proposed that we should work together on this as all CCs will be impacted although agreed Fossoway likely to be most affected. Requested that it come within remit of KLC however advised that this may not be possible and they will take legal advice.

Road Safety

Community Grant of £30,000 awarded to King George V Playing Field in Kinross for improvements to Rugby Club

Evaluation Report

Interim report favourable but with recommendations to try to increase engagement with CCs. Full Draft Report due in May. Clarified that Committee has to operate within Framework of Council Regulations and Procedures. The group has evolved over the last year, in favourable ways that have enabled progress to be made on a variety of projects.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Watters reported from the PKC budget that although the aim was to ensure that funding cuts don't impact the provision of core services and try to protect jobs, many budget cuts will mean staff leaving who will not be replaced. PKC have agreed a 3.9% increase in council tax. Biodiversity is another key issue- there is some funding for EV charging; we need to work with private sector, but the private sector are likely to be less interested in rural areas. Decarbonisation of buildings is another priority, there are temperature and energy controls in schools and other public buildings; as these are centrally controlled, there are savings being made. Increased funding to improve energy efficiencies further. There is a planned Council wide litter picking day at the end of the month (with time off in lieu for PKC officers) which can be shared with local bloom groups and the community.

Cllr Robertson reported on old equipment in Live Active gyms which need replacing. There are plans to downsize in terms of buildings owned by the council, as large offices are no longer required in light of hybrid working. There have been reports of litter on B9097, council staff try to tidy this regularly.

Cllr Cuthbert also discussed a focus on minimising the impact of budget cuts on communities and reducing waste. Funding has been guaranteed for the Kinross-shire area committee to continue for another year. Due to the ongoing budget pressures, there will be a regular process looking at aligning budgets and spending to find areas where savings can be made. The road safety team budget should have more resource to deliver projects.

22/01974/FLL. Siting of temporary accommodation unit and erection of carport/store (in retrospect) Land 245 Metres Southwest Of Craigton House Rumbling Bridge Kinross. This was a condition that was part of 22/0541/FLL – see 22/02032/FLL. The FDCC didn't comment.

22/02080/FLL. Erection of a garage/ancillary accommodation building. Duanbrig, Naemoor Road, Crook Of Devon, Kinross.

This application is for a separate building adjacent to the cottage which is a garage which is dug into the sloping grounds with a ground floor 2 bed cottage. FDCC will not submit a comment on this.

23/00090/FLL Alterations to dwellinghouse, St Thomas Cottage Crook Of Devon Kinross.

Proposal is to replace the existing porch to create a covered area. FDCC will not submit a comment on this

23/00114/FLL Change of use of agricultural land to form extension to garden ground and erection of a replacement dwellinghouse Westfield Of Dalqueich Farm Cottage Carnbo Kinross KY13 ONT FDCC has submitted a neutral comment regarding the size of the dwelling house and sought confirmation on the type of land that will be incorporated into the garden.

23/00173/IPL Residential development (in principle) at 30 Metres North West Of County Fabrics The Water Mill, Crook Of Devon Kinross. The proposal is for 2 x 4 bedroom houses to be built in the existing car park of County Fabrics. The planning statement states that County Fabrics has outgrown the building and will relocate locally. It is inferred that the old mill will be converted into flats but this is not included in this in principle planning application. Style of new houses will be in keeping with the Mill. FDCC will not submit a comment on this

23/00259/FLL Erection of 29 dwellinghouses and associated works (phase 1 - allocated site H53) at Land 80 Metres North West Of Huize Baahock Powmill Dollar. The proposed development is to be completed in the following phases:

Phase 1: proposal for 29 Houses, comprising of 22 dwellings for Kera Scotland Ltd and 7 affordable dwellings for Kingdom Housing Association Ltd.

Phase 2: proposal for 17 Houses at a later stage due to restrictions in the LDP. This phase is not included in this application. However, the phase has been drawn up as part of the masterplan.

There will also be developer contributions paid for adoption of new Public Open Space and a contribution towards maintenance and future upgrade of the existing Powmill play area. This was confirmed by the Pre-Application advice 22/00052/PREAPP, received on 25 October 2022.

Foul drainage from the Phase 1 site area will drain to the mains sewer to the east. A pre-development enquiry to Scottish Water has confirmed there is sufficient capacity at the local water treatment works and wastewater treatment works for the number of dwellings proposed to connect to the mains sewer.

All plots will be connected to the mains water supply. Because of the current decoupling from fossil fuels and imminent phasing out of gas boilers in 2024, the plots will not be connected to mains gas. All properties will be connected to the grid and supplement their power usage with use of renewable technologies. The Kera plots will use Solar PV arrays and Air Source Heat Pumps. The Kingdom Housing Association plots will also use Solar PV arrays and Air Source Heat Pumps. All services will be carried throughout the site, within services margins in, or adjacent to, the proposed road.

Discussions around this application included questions and comments from the MoP present including relocating the recycling point, capacity of Fossoway primary school, provision of connective walkways, environmental impact assessment, water run-off, activities for children of all ages, timescales/timelines and mitigation of the impact of disturbance to the community during construction. These comments and questions have been noted and included in a neutral response from FDCC to PKC planning, and which will also be available on the FDCC Facebook page. FDCC support the

development of this site as per the adopted LDP2 and find it encouraging that the developer will deliver affordable housing alongside housing that is similar in character to adjacent properties. Everyone is welcome to submit any comments and concerns directly as all comments will be included in discussions by PKC.

FDCC will submit a neutral comment as per above before the 25th March 2023

Planning Decisions

22/02032/FLL Alterations and extension to dwellinghouse and formation of steps and planters 1 Mossend Green, Powmill, Dollar. Approved. The FDCC had made no comment.

22/01976/FLL Formation of access track (in retrospect) at Land 360 metres south west of Craigton House, Rumbling Bridge.

Approved. The FDCC objected on grounds that conditions associated with the prior application (22/00541/FLL) had not been met. However, PKC informed us that our objection was not material and was a matter for enforcement.

22/02064/FLL Erection of 2 dwellinghouses | Land 15 Metres North West Of Ivy Cottage Gartwhinzean Road Powmill

Application refused, in line with Policies 1 & 17; close proximity of windows to neighbours (>9m); back garden should have depth of 9m to avoid overlooking – it's only 7m and insufficient off-street parking – there should be 2 places per house. FDCC had objected 22/01695/FLL Erection of 2 holiday accommodation units Land 15 Metres North West Of Ivy Cottage Gartwhinzean Road Powmill Approved – FDCC had made no comment.

Kinross Community Council News from the February Meeting

Present At The Meeting on 28 February were: CCllrs L McKay, (Chair), W Freeman E Leslie, T Stewart, M Wilson and C Collins, Cllr D Cuthbert, 3 Members of the Public, PC B Samson, minute-taker Mrs C Aird

Apologies: CCllr H Phillips, Cllr N Freshwater, Cllr W Robertson and Cllr R Watters.

Police Report

PC B Samson was in attendance at the meeting. He advised that since the January meeting, there had been 88 calls with 16 crimes being reported.

Community officers were aware of regular areas where there are complaints about speeding in and around Kinross. These have all been added to the speeding matrix and officers will continue to make efforts to conduct speed checks across the area during our patrols. Traffic units have also been carrying out regular speed checks in the area and have issued tickets over the last month for speeding and various other road traffic offences including a driver being cautioned and charged for having no MOT and no insurance in Montgomery Way, Kinross.

Those present were reminded that security advice had been left at previous meetings and PC Samson advised that he had more leaflets which he would leave for anyone who was interested.

Craighead Wind Farm, Carnbo

CCIIr Mckay welcomed Alex Orr, Orbit Communications and Jason Morin and Molly Lynch from Galileo who were attending the update on the proposed wind farm at Craighead, Carnbo.

Mr Orr advised that a scoping application had recently been

submitted, with environmental impact surveys being undertaken between 2022 and 2023.

Galileo develop large-scale renewable energy projects in multiple European countries and plans for a wind farm development of turbines at Craighead Farm, Carnbo. These plans for up to twelve turbines, at a height of 200 m (subject to scoping) with a total installed capacity of up to 72 MW. The turbines annual output will be in the region of 165,000 MWh with 70,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions saved with a projected life span of 50 years. The site has been chosen due to potential power to over 47,000 homes, which could boost the local economy and because there are no environmental designations on the site. Further information on the company can be found at https://galileogreenenergy.uk/

The company has submitted the proposals for the wind farm development against the backdrop of the devastating impacts of a climate emergency where renewable energy can assist in addressing this by replacing fossil fuels and helping to dramatically cut our greenhouse gas emissions. As the windiest country in the UK, Scotland is the UK's onshore wind powerhouse, with an ambitious climate change target for Scotland of net zero emissions by 2045.

If consented, it is proposed that the wind farm would deliver a significant community benefits package which could be worth approximately £360,000 every year to the community (split proportionately between CC areas) over the lifetime of the wind farm, dependent on its ultimate capacity.

In response to a question from CCIIr Wilson, the room were advised that the cables be for these turbines would preferably be underground but Scottish Power would have the final say on that matter. It was also noted that dependent on the size of the project, there may be pylons and substations required.

Mr Morin, in response to a question about the height of the turbines, advised that these would not be the biggest ones in operation but the higher the height, the bigger the power outage would be. Blades would be transported in sections, dependent on the site accessibility and height of the turbines. Access to the site would be via A91, with a road assessment being undertaken before and after the works. It would be a condition of the contract that the company repair any damage to the roads.

The lifespan of the farm is proposed to be 50 years but realistically turbines only last 25–40 years, dependent on the technology used and warranty, and would be replaced as and when necessary.

Moving onto shared ownership, which is seen as any structure which involves a community group as a financial partner over the lifetime of a renewable energy project, Mr Morin advised that this could be anywhere between 1% and 10% of the project but would involve a group being set up (advice available/provided by Scottish Government, specialist organisations and advisors) and those who join would be offered a discounted price for energy.

A briefing note on the proposals, details of the Galileo community offering and also details on shared ownership will be forwarded to the CC for anyone who is interested.

The CC thanked everyone for attending and asked to be kept updated as plans progress.



Matters Arising

Road Safety Issues: VAS would be put into Gallowhill Road and Springfield Road.

Bathing Site: a meeting is to be arranged.

Kinross-shire Fund: CCIIr Freeman is to be the CC representative

on the group.

CC Bank Account: changes had been made to the account in respect of the new Treasurer and funding had been received from PKC. CCIIr Leslie advised that she had received invoices, receipts and reports from the previous Treasurer and asked if it would be acceptable to put these into the archive storage at LLCC. This was agreed.

Kinross Town Centre

The CC were advised that there was a potential to paint lines at the junction at Burns Begg Street but that the road surface would need to be looked at. PKC Officers have been tasked to look at this and an update will be given at a future meeting.

In respect of Avenue Road, CCIIr Mckay asked if PKC could be asked to re-paint the signs in respect of the resident's parking. CIIr Cuthbert agreed to speak to PKC.

New Applications

22/02181/FLL erection of an office/workshop building, formation of car park and associated works at land 150 metres northwest of Unit C, Kinross Business Park, Clashburn Close, Bridgend Industrial Estate, Kinross.

23/00015/FLL erection of a garage at 61 Sutherland Drive, Kinross 22/01881/FLL erection of a replacement dwelling house, garage, boundary wall, gates and associated works at land 20 metres east of 27 Curate Wynd, Kinross.

22/02230/FLL installation of replacement windows at Glen Luke, 3 High Street, Kinross

It was noted that the proposed replacement windows were of uPVC material which did not meet the conditions of properties in a conversation area. Cllr Cuthbert advised that PKC planning officers pick this up in their discussions at the next Planning Committee meeting.

22/02196/LAW siting of two caravans and a storage container (existing) at Queich Place, Kinross

Members were advised that these caravans had been sited at the location for more than 10 years and that previously no planning permission was required however the owner has now been advised that this is no longer the case, hence the application.

Decided Applications

22/01763/FLL erection of a dwellinghouse (revised design) at land 110 metres south east of Beaufield, Balado, refused.

Reports From PKC Councillors

Cllr D Cuthbert

KLC: a meeting had been held recently at LLCC where there had been presentations on the proposed wind farms at Brunt Hill and Carnbo, and discussions around road safety, the sale of Blairingone Primary School, and funding allocated to King George V pavilion.

PKC Budget: PKC were meeting the next day to discuss the budget for 2023/24 and it was noted that there was a large funding shortfall, in all Council areas.

Reports From Community Councillors

CCIIr E Leslie

CC meeting had been held recently where members were advised that use of the campus was beginning to increase. Those present at the meeting had been shown a dashboard which highlighted what the campus was being used for. The next meeting is scheduled for 18 May.

She highlighted the issues around the current service provided by the dental practice and the apparent move to being a private practice from June, although children under 15 years will still be treated on the NHS.

Laptops/iPads: CCIIr Leslie asked when the schools were likely to receive the laptops/ipads, promised by Scottish Government as part of the digital learning strategy, as the Parent Council were now being asked to fund these.

CCIIr C Collins

Recently attending the Light Up Kinross meeting and while there was not a lot discussed, he asked for suggestions on areas that the group could focus on. It was noted that there was a need to encourage and maximise the work of the group, with members suggesting a platform for CHAS residents to be able to see Santa.

CCIIr L Mckay

Town Hall clock has stopped working and the factor appears to have disappeared. Cllr D Cuthbert agreed to look into the matter. Davies Park Update – a budget was still available for replacement of equipment on a like for like basis. It was agreed that this should be pushed ahead, and PKC would be contacted for this to happen. It was agreed that Cllr Cuthbert would be copied into the email. CCIIr Mckay advised that she had been invited to a meeting arranged by the Action Group from "No Road In The Park" and whilst they had said CCIIr Mckay had been invited, unfortunately this wasn't the case - she only discovered the meeting was taking place during a conversation with the PKC Greenspace and Community Empowerment Officer who had contacted her to ask if she would be attending. CCIIr Mckay advised the Officer that she did not know anything about the meeting and since this conversation was taking place the day before the meeting, CCIIr Mckay thought it was best to not attend as not a CC plan.

AOCB

Vandalised Trees

Cllr D Cuthbert is to follow this up but suggested that residents repair any incidents as much as they could.

Ccs Working Together

Neil Bingham, Chair of Milnathort CC, introduced himself to those present. There was a brief discussion around local CCs meeting on a quarterly basis, and it was agreed that CCllr McKay and Mr Bingham would discuss this further, with other CC Chairs.

Traffic Lights at LLCC

A member of the public queried why traffic lights at the Campus had been suggested when a roundabout would be a better solution. They were advised that the traffic lights were a condition of the planning permission for Persimmon Homes.

Litter Picking

A member of the public advised that she participated in the group litter picking in the area and advised that the group were always looking for more volunteers.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be held on 25 April 2023 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall. All are welcome to attend.

Portmoak Community Council News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting on 14 February were Cllrs D Cuthbert, N Freshwater; Cllrs A Miller (Chair), D Morris), A Davidson, D Paterson, K Donaldson and 2 members of the public.

Apologies: Cllr W Robertson, Cllr S McGregor.

Matters Arising

Kinross-shire Local Committee Update:

The Chair offered his apologies that he had been unable to attend the last meeting of the KLC. Cllr D Cuthbert gave an update: plan to hold next KLC meeting in person at the Loch Leven Community Campus. Agenda for next meeting includes more value topics: will include a road safety update; an evaluation report on Kinross-shire Local Committee itself and a proposed change of format to be discussed at the meeting; and a briefing from the Planning Office on the wind turbines proposed in the Ochils. On the latter Wind Turbine: in essence have not seen one of these applications before as does not come via the normal planning channels. Handled by the Scottish Reporters Unit (SRU) covered by Electricity Act. SRU will attend to brief the meeting.

The discussion moved forward to the issue of Phosphate addition to drinking water within the Loch Leven Catchment area also of relevance to KLC. In the absence of Cllr W Robertson the Chair queried if 1. this item was on the KLC agenda and 2. had a reply been received from ScotGov Minister following W Robertson's

letter? ClIr D Cuthbert replied there nothing on agenda as yet, but confirmed the process that the four ClIrs are following is to hold meetings with relevant organisations including Scottish Water, SEPA, NatureScot, Environment Scotland, and PKC.

In principle these meetings involved the four Cllrs trying to put pressure on Scottish Water, who are responsible for discharge to Loch Leven, and SEPA who are the regulators. Currently there is no requirement for Scottish Water to limit discharge, and to the best of the Cllrs' knowledge there is no monitoring equipment in place so the volumes of and severity of pollutants in the discharge are unknown. Once some facts are clarified then Cllrs will start involving the other relevant parties such as local CC members. If there are phosphates being discharged then PKC Planning will become involved as there will have to be some forward planning as to the impact on Loch Leven. Cllrs intend to keep the CCs abreast of what is happening.

The Chair thanked Cllr D Cuthbert for his update, intimating that D Morris had been attending the KLC and had raised the need to keep local CC's informed, as they had not been invited to attend the other meetings held with relevant bodies or yet been appraised of the discussions or outcomes. PCC hoped a level of communication with the KLC and CCs could be maintained. Cllr D Morris agreed he would try to attend the next KLC meeting, but commented that the last 3 meetings he had tried to attend he had not been able to participate, only view and listen to proceedings, his attendance had also not been noted in minutes. This was thought to be likely to be IT permissions. Cllr D Cuthbert has asked Officers to doublecheck access rights for all relevant participants. D Morris disagreed with the principle that CCs should not attend the meetings until facts were clarified. D Morris drew attention to the Kinross Newsletter article by Brian D'Arcy explaining the pollution issues; he had been involved in the 1990s to reduce Loch Leven pollution, and at that time the loch clarity had become very good, but had deteriorated since. This needed to be investigated and probed and mitigation measures put in place. It was presumed the issues were largely due to sewage overflow and agricultural pollution.

Cllr D Cuthbert said the causes were unclear or if other factors were present such as global warming causing release of phosphates from sediment.

Road Safety Action Update:

The Chair updated: there was an undertaking of PCC and Cllrs to look at the Road Safety issues with the Head of the Roads Dept. The list that was supplied by PKC Roads for items pertaining to the Portmoak area had caused confusion, some were easily recognised priorities, other priorities were missing, and some items seemed irrelevant or outdated. PCC members had found it very difficult to prioritise the items assigned to Portmoak. It was felt it would be useful to request a teams meeting with Daryl McEown to discuss all items.

Scotlandwell To Portmoak Church Path: Cllr W Robertson had emailed the Roads Dept. simply asking for a comment in principle for the proposed route plan and the mitigations needed in lieu of this. This is a high priority issue, and no reply has been received. Cllr D Morris agreed that this was a fair comment from the Chair, and that a complete list of priority items for both Roads and Greenspace Paths needed to be produced so the two can be dealt with in conjunction. D Morris intended to try to speak with Roads Dept. in next couple of weeks. D Morris also cited the A911 Route Action Plan, intended to address all the issues in a considered plan but not yet circulated. The Chair emphasised PCCs wish to have a constructive conversation with Roads Dept. so that needless projects could be shelved and money spent wisely.

West Bowhouse 40mph Speed Restriction: this was an actionable item from the last PCC meeting. Also item had been approved by vote by the KLC in 2022. No action has been taken, though it was included in the PKC Roads list for prioritisation. Other discussion has taken place regarding moving some of the temporary special Covid projects speed restrictions that were put in place but the Bowhouse speed restriction had been voted on by the KLC and was a priority item. The Chair flagged that this item has been in the pipeline for a year, and had been


definitely voted for at KLC level, it was basically signage that should be quickly actionable. A resident of Bowhouse spoke briefly reiterating that the road configuration at Bowhouse meant that traffic exiting and entering the housing, and children crossing the road to catch the school bus, did so across a 60mph speed limit preceded by a blind summit. The Chair agreed to pick up with D McEown.

D Cuthbert commented that that Road Safety team were under huge pressure, with a recruitment freeze and a deficit of dept employees. The permanent implementation of Covid emergency speed restrictions were time critical to produce TPROs by a certain dates. The Road Project priority list was discussed: D Cuthbert thought the list useful for providing a starting point for clearing off irrelevant items and adding priority items. He agreed a conversation with Daryl McEown would be helpful to this end. He hoped that an allocation for new staff to the Roads Safety Team would be included in the forthcoming budget to address the lack of resources.

Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path

The Chair reiterated the need for the Roads Safety Team to provide comment and agreement in principle on the route plan provided by the PCC. D Cuthbert confirmed this item had been raised a number of times and that the aforementioned lack of resource affected this project.

Phosphate Addition To Drinking Water Within Loch Leven Catchment Area: KLC Update. DCuthbert added that Cllrs had attended meetings with environmental agencies, certain elements had been dismissive of the urgency of this issue regarding drinking water, the priority was Loch Leven. It was proving difficult to convince the agencies that drinking water quality was an issue. The Chair commented that in terms of building and development Kinross was well ahead of its allocation. Some evidence showed a direct correlation between development and pollution in Loch Leven over recent years. It would be simple for the Planning Dept to restrict further damage by restricting development in the Loch Leven Catchment area. Within PKC the Planning Dept could restrict multiple and/or large planning

applications unless developers contribute to upgrading the existing sewage treatment systems to be fit for purpose. PKC need to take responsibility for their part on this. The developer contribution to the existing sewage system is inadequate.

New Matters

Portmoak Cemetery Maintenance: a complaint had been lodged regarding debris, soil and foliage clippings that had been left in the cemetery on and around gravestones. This had been raised to the relevant PKC dept, and the Chair was pleased to be able to report that he had been to the cemetery and the debris had been tidied up.

Big Place Conversation: Kinross-shire & Glenfarg, PKC Planning: PCC had received information on this PKC Initiative to have conversations with communities across P&K about their towns and villages and how they envisage the future. Intended to contribute to strategy for the future re: housing, all aspects of transport, green spaces etc. PKC intend to hold consultations around May-July within Kinross-shire and Glenfarg. The Chair invited comment from Cllrs: DCuthbert confirmed this was to do with LDP3. This item would be brought to the KLC. D Cuthbert thought it was a worthwhile exercise and encouraged members of the public to attend and contribute.

King's Coronation Events Funding: Correspondence had been sent to PCC from Jamie Montgomery regarding funding available for events being organised around the celebration of the King's Coronation, particularly the Coronation Big Lunch. Financial support is available, local community organisations may be interested. Timescales are tight: can take up to 10weeks for funding to be approved.

Brunt Hill Windfarm

K Smith, Development Management and Building Standards Service Manager provided a verbal update on the process of Brunt Hill Windfarm development. He advised that if an application would be received, the Developer (Energy Consents Unit) would issue a consultation to Perth and Kinross Council to the proposals of the application and the Council as the Planning Authority would be a consultee. The initial stages of scoping and pre-consultation with the Scottish Government and Energy Consents Unit are underway and he confirmed that Perth and Kinross Council are not formally involved at this stage. K Smith advised that a briefing note had been issued to all ward members providing background information on the process.

The Convener suggested that Kinross-shire Community Councils contact the Developer for further community engagement and consultation. Members requested that an update be brought back to a future Committee meeting.

Road Safety Update

There was a report by Executive Director (Communities) (23/55) advising members of progress on the various road safety concerns raised about the public road network in Ward 8 raised with officers prior to the meeting.

Resolved:







Climate Action Through Community Heating (CATCH-Lochleven)

The Scottish Government funding for a pre-feasibility study (through their Community and Renewal Energy Scheme – CARES) has taken a little longer than expected, but is proceeding through the approval process. Meanwhile, we are scoping the full feasibility study outline and searching for potential funders for that. The technical solution for a district heating system is also evolving, as well as the Loch itself. It may be beneficial to extract heat from the tributaries, from the local sewage plants (we are talking to Scottish Water), and also looking at heat-storage from summer to winter using 'pit storage' which is an insulated pool of water.

Furthermore, solar farms could potentially contribute low-cost electricity to the project.

The reduction in wildflower meadows has been highlighted by the latest David Attenborough TV programme. There has been a reduction of 97% since the Second World War. We hope to produce a board which will provide information about some of the local wildflowers for folk to identify. Susdrain Award Presentation

Representatives of the Trust, Kinnesswood in Bloom and Tayside Biodiversity Partnership met with Perth & Kinross Councillors, staff and the Depute Provost on 10 March at the A K Bell Library in Perth to celebrate the Kinross Raingardens Challenge winning the Ciria Susdrain Community SuDS Award in 2022.

The Raingardens Challenge promotes a variety of sustainable drainage (SuDS) features. Raingardens are planted areas designed to accept rainfall runoff and enhance the environment as well as helping to prevent flooding. Examples are the reexcavated grassy area at the Kinross Park & Ride planted with wildflowers, and a retrofitted raised bed raingarden at Portmoak Primary School.

Although Kinross-shire Civic Trust was the named recipient of the Susdrain award, it was with support from SEPA, Perth & Kinross Council and the Scottish Government. The gathering was an opportunity to present Council representatives with a certificate recording the Trust's appreciation of the local authority's support.

Brian D'Arcy, Trust member, gave a slideshow and talk about the Raingardens project, including an update on the latest phase.

Raingardens Update

In March, work took place at Junction Road where land is set aside as part of the flood risk management for south Kinross. The work involved restoring existing wetlands and creating new ponds. This is increasing the capacity of the area to accept flood water, but is also providing an opportunity to enrich the biodiversity of the landscape. Frogs and other amphibians will benefit. Wetland plants will regenerate and enhance interest. Please enjoy as the modified landscape slowly matures but be aware of the wetter areas. The main new pond will have a maximum depth of one metre in the centre.

This work is funded by the Scottish Government's Nature Restoration Fund, administered here by Perth & Kinross Council, supported by Tayside Biodiversity Partnership and Kinross-shire Civic Trust.

The Trust is seeking funds to purchase interpretation signage for this part of the Raingardens Trail.

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
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The coffee bar has been very busy recently and, as well as our regulars, it has been nice to see visitors to the area coming in and enjoying the service.




February continued to be a very busy month following a successful January and we have enjoyed welcoming old and new friends to our coffee mornings on Tuesdays and Saturdays.

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

On 7 March we had a really good meeting with Kara MacKay (the Founder of Sansaar, a local company selling sustainable and zero-waste products). There are many choices of eco-friendly products online and on the high street now, but which ones are good or indeed truly sustainable and eco-friendly?

Kara's presentation gave us some good insight into what to consider when making those choices. Companies today are expected to conform to the UN sustainable development goals and aim towards net-zero economy. However, there is currently no monitoring system to check all the claims of sustainability and recycled/compostable labelling etc. Also, many claims are not true, resulting in green-washing, which confuses an average shopper. There are some sites that list all legitimate companies, but an annual membership fee is required to obtain the access. This excludes many people, or at least puts them off.

The talk was very interesting and was followed by a good discussion. It was very encouraging to see 20 people attending despite adverse weather. This means it is a very important issue to many of us.



Portmoak Community Woodland Group

An Easter event to look forward to and, with luck, a good harvest later in the year. It's a creative time for Portmoak Community Woodland Group.

In a change from some of our normal winter work, instead of pulling trees out of the Moss, we've been tending the living ones in the orchard. 'Hoorah', I hear you shout, 'looking after them, not destroying them'!

Of course, there is a reason for pulling them out. We have to control birch saplings on the peat bog or we would lose all the wonderful sphagnum moss. However, the Portmoak Community Orchard, in Kilmagad Wood, is a different story. Back in 2011/12 we planted 100 fruit trees and every winter, while they're dormant, we have to prune them to keep them healthy and ensure a good crop in the autumn.

Actually, we did a rough count last year and found that there were no longer as many as 100 trees. A few had succumbed to damage by roe deer. Others had been outcompeted by some of the native woodland trees, especially hazel. So, while we were out there, with the loppers and secateurs, we also took the opportunity to plant six more apple trees.

Dave and Louise Batchelor (pictured) were 'volunteered' into the job of clambering over the fence of our new compound to carry out the work of digging, planting and staking. The Woodland Trust Scotland have kindly built it, to protect the young trees from the deer without the need for plastic tree guards (now against their policy). Apparently, deer aren't keen to jump into a confined space.

We bought the trees (all species that grow well in Scotland) from Andrew Lear, aka 'appletreeman', who helped us plant the orchard. As ever we are grateful to those who have donated

money at events, like Apple Day, to pay for them.

We won't get a crop off them this year as they're too young, but fingers crossed for plenty of apples, pear and plums from our established trees. We did our best to cut out any dead, diseased or damaged wood from them; all we need now is a good spring and summer, without untimely frosts, to ensure plenty of fruit for Apple Day, planned for 1 October.

Long before that, we'll be having an Easter event for children in Kilmagad Wood, where there are plenty of slopes for egg rolling. It's on Saturday 8 April, starting at 3.30pm. Please bring your painted eggs and there will be prizes for the best decorated and the fastest rolling. In case you haven't been before, it's across the road from Portmoak kirk car park.

Lomond Antique and Collectors Club

Our March talk was entitled, 'Edinburgh-The Walled City: The case of the Capital' by Graeme Cruickshank, a noted historian and author.

The 'old' city of Edinburgh has (or had) three distinctive walls built in the 15th, 16th and 17th centuries with the primary purpose of providing defensive structures for the city. The first, the King's Wall, stretched from the Castle to Tweeddale Court and was constructed during the reigns of James 2nd (1430 to 1460) and James 3rd (1460 to 1488) primarily to protect against English invasion. With the Castle on one side and the Nor' Loch on another the wall defended the other two sides. Notably, the Nor' Loch occupied what now forms Princes Street gardens and much of Waverley Station. In addition to providing protection against invasion the walls offered toll and customs barriers for revenue gathering, a mechanism for sealing the city against

infections like the plague and an ability to impose curfew. A plaque in Johnson Terrace dates the wall to the year 1450. Small sections of the original wall remain between High Street, Cowgate and Castle Wind and a small section at Tweeddale Court. It was decreed by James 3rd that no housing should be erected against the King's wall to ensure it offered maximum protection to the city and its defenders.

The Flodden Wall (named after the Battle of Flodden in year 1513) was created in response to further fear of invasion from the south. This wall, using rough stones, was 4 feet thick and 26 feet high and construction lasted from 1508 to 1560. The wall contained six gates or 'portes' with West Port, now renamed as the complete street, featuring at the wedding of James 6th and Anne of Denmark in 1594. The Flodden Tower still exists today with original 'gun loops' and an 'embrasure'. The embrasure offered a widening of the aperture on the inside of the wall to allow a soldier to extend the field of aim at possible invaders. The Flodden Tower also features a crenelated parapet offering some protection for the defending troops. A section of the original wall can still be seen in Greyfriars Kirkyard where a series of very elaborate gravestones have been erected against the wall. At several places along the wall 's length attempts have been made to mark the original structure but, sadly, some historical inaccuracies have occurred. The Flodden Wall reaches its end point at roughly the place currently occupied by Waverley Station's platform seven.

The third and most recent of the three city walls is the Telfer Wall dating from the year 1620 and named for John Taillefer, the city's master mason. This wall, serving the prestige of George Heriot's School, and the interests of the City Fathers of the day more than the need for city defence, joins the Flodden Wall at one point and shows the difference in building style and construction between the two.

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 12 April and the subject is 'The Lost Country Houses of Perthshire' by David Robertson.






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

SPRING IS TRULY HERE now! April is a month of nesting birds, flowering plants, emerging insects and warmer weather. Much of the waterfowl at Loch Leven will be nesting. April is peak month for nesting mallard and greylag goose. We will be conducting our annual duck nest surveys at the end of the month. Loch Leven is internationally important for breeding ducks and we have a dataset going back to the 1960s, and this data is so valuable in understanding trends and population status of various waterfowl species, not only at Loch Leven but globally! Every nest is individually identified, GPS marked and the size of clutch is recorded. This is quite unique having this detailed dataset going back 50 years. Loch Leven is one of the most studied sites in the UK. Our Duck Nest Survey is completed by walking the whole of St Serfs Island and recording all of the nests that we find. It takes us 3-4 days depending on weather, but it is a milestone of our calendar year and one we all look forward to conducting.

Osprey are back in good numbers, we are seeing individuals fishing regularly, this will only become more regular as the months progress. Look out for hirundines over the loch, this includes swallows, sand martins and house martins. The arrivals of the hirundines coincide with hatching flies. Loch Leven is well known for the amount of flies that hatch. These flies tend to annoy people as they walk and cycle along the trail, but they are an all-you-can-eat buffet for hungry migratory birds. You may not like them but they are extremely important and a vital part of the Loch Leven ecosystem!

Butterflies will be on the wing; look out for small tortoiseshell, peacock and red admiral butterflies in the earlier days of the month. As April progresses, look out for green-veined white butterflies (pictured). These white butterflies are the first of the cabbage white family of butterflies to emerge in Scotland. They like damp places with lush vegetation, and can be told apart by other cabbage whites by the dark green veins that are obvious on their underwing.

Other migratory birds arrive from Africa during the month of April. Blackcap, sedge warbler, garden warbler and willow warbler can all be heard around the Loch. The dawn chorus can be spectacular at this time of year, especially at the end of the month where we reach the peak. Look out on our social media as we will be running a dawn chorus at the start of May and booking is essential.

Latest wildlife highlights from the reserve include; drake smew, weasel, seven whooper swan, green sandpiper, badgers, displaying buzzards and nuthatches.

Nature On The Move



AS WE BEGIN TO move further in to spring, it's amazing to hear all the different birds singing around the reserve and see the bright burst of colour continuing to sprout up through the brown and greens. This month we have had an amazing sighting of a white-tailed eagle flying along the hills towards Cleish. Our noisy pink-footed geese are beginning their journey back north and shortly we will be seeing ospreys starting to appear again as they also migrate north. We have also had sightings of a lot of our usual suspects such as pintail, whooper swans and scaup, as well as high numbers of wigeon and golden eye.

Our reserve team have been busy as always, continuing their work to prepare for the breeding season as our lapwings have gradually started making their way back to the reserve and making themselves at home again. From brush cutting to literally measuring grass and water levels to ensure they are the perfect conditions; the work just never stops. Of course, we could not have done all of this without the help of our volunteers who have been supporting this work in addition to seeding our wildflower meadow and putting up new swallow boxes around the hides.

In the visitor centre, we are ecstatic to have our brand-new wildlife cameras installed which will give our visitors great views of wildlife across the reserve. We are now able to watch red squirrels and woodpeckers up close feeding on the nut

feeder in the woodland and there are more cameras to come yet!

We are pleased to welcome some new members of staff to our catering team and look forward to reopening again seven days a week for the Easter holidays. We hope to continue to be open on the Mondays and Tuesdays as soon as possible following on from the holidays but please keep an eye on our social media and website pages for any changes.

In the world of events, our Big Wild Easter trail starts from Saturday 1 – Sunday 16 April. Pick up your trail sheet for only £2 from the Visitors' Centre and follow the trail to build your own nest. A good nest might just find an egg in it...

We are also looking forward to the start of our Nature Tots events for this year. Join us on Friday 14 April for a journey through spring using our senses. Starting with a story, we will then take part in a range of hands-on, nature-based activities to uncover the magic of the woodlands in springtime. Farming



IN LIKE A LAMB, out like a lion, or vice-versa, is the saying that accompanies the month of March and the weather which can be expected. If the month starts with quite quiet pleasant weather (like a lamb), the chances are it will deteriorate and bite us at the end of the month (like a lion). So it started dry and settled but cold, but things changed to very wet and with a hint of snow in the second week, so I suppose we'll just have to hope that the 'lion' part is out the way – we will know by the time you are reading this. We are due to start lambing in the first week of April, so hopefully the conditions will be lamb-like by then. The ewes were pregnancy scanned at the beginning of February and we were generally quite pleased with the results, and they have been divided into batches according to how many lambs they are expecting. The ewes expecting two lambs are now receiving some concentrate feeding to help supply their energy demand and the ones expecting three lambs are being fed a bit more. All the ewes have been given special pre-lambing mineral 'lick' tubs which contain molasses and a blend of vitamins and minerals to help promote the health of the ewe and her developing lambs. Hopefully the grass will start growing soon and reduce the reliance on silage, which has been fed to the ewes since January.

Conditions had dried sufficiently to allow us to get on with some field work at the beginning of March. I was able to spread some dung onto the fields and made a start to some ploughing, although this past week's rain has halted progress on that front

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for the time being. It would be good to get some more fieldwork done before lambing starts, however, so that everything doesn't have to be done at once.

The pigs have been enjoying the softer conditions of winter but their paddocks have been drier through February into March and feeding them has been easier. They have also been better contained in their allocated areas more recently, which is good as they were running a bit wild and free for a while at the end of the year, roamin' and rootin' where they shouldn't have been. A new super powered electric fence unit seems to be doing the trick of gaining the pigs' respect of their fences.

On the cattle front, we have had some new arrivals here at Backward Farm in the form of some Kerry cattle (pictured). Ian has had a few Dexter cattle for a couple of years now but it has proved difficult to grow the herd with animals of suitable quality and from appropriate areas of the country with a good disease status. The Dexter and Kerry cattle share the same ancestry in Ireland, but when the country was split the south retained the Kerry name while they developed into Dexters in the north. The Dexters have probably been exported and commercialised more widely and become more of a beef breed while the Kerry seems to have retained more of the dairy influence. So when an opportunity came up to buy a batch from the north of Scotland, Ian and Kerry thought it was worth a go as the beef should be the same quality as the Dexter. As they say, time will tell, but it certainly follows the trend of having slightly different breeds and species on the farm.

Spring Has Sprung!

SPRING HAS SPRUNG! Allegedly. It always amazes me that no matter how cold or rainy it is, the Snowdrops, Crocuses and Daffodils make their appearance and remind us that the days will get longer and warmer, no matter what.

I've been busy since last month and feeling quite smug with myself – about some things anyway. The Begonia corms have been liberated from the back bedroom and planted up in the propagator to do their thing... can you believe I had to defrost the compost first? Never had to knocks chunks of ice out of it before, every day's a school day I guess. They're now doing well and sprouting away in trays of multi-purpose compost. Once they have a few leaves on them I'll pot them into bigger pots and place in the greenhouse until it's time to harden them off to go outside.

Chillis and Carnations are also doing well. These were grown from seed and despite my 'problems' with the seed compost, they seem to be doing OK. I had to give up on the Brachyscome and Snapdragon seedlings though, I was just finding it too difficult not to over or under water them and they ended up keeling over and giving up. Hey ho.

Despite my unfamiliarity with seed compost, I'm still persevering with it. I actually





saw a great tip on using it and that's to mix it with perlite or vermiculite to lighten it up a bit and stop it going 'solid' on the surface. That's what I've started doing and you can be sure that I'll let you know if it works... or not.

I'll be sowing my bedding plant seeds probably before the end of March. It might be a little early but I'm an impatient kind of person. Sweet Peas have already been sown (according to some Facebook groups, I was late!) into empty toilet roll tubes and put in the greenhouse, they shouldn't need heat apparently. As soon as they've got a few leaves on them, they'll go into the cold frame until they get planted out.

A couple of pointers on sowing seeds that I've picked up over the years. I find seed packets quite confusing when they talk about the depth to sow the seeds, like you're going to be there with a tape measure... well you might be, and if you are, I

salute you! I'm not that scientific about it. If the seeds are large, such as Sunflowers or Sweet Peas, then cover them well with compost. If they're teeny, like dust (seed packets tell you to sow them on the surface and that makes me nervous), just sprinkle some vermiculite or compost over the top of them, works for me.

I use mini propagators within a heated propagator for my seeds. You absolutely don't have to do that. An empty egg box or meat tray (with holes in the bottom) filled with compost and placed inside a freezer bag or covered in cling film on a sunny window ledge will do just as well. Once the seedlings start to emerge, remove the bag and grow on until you have 2-4 leaves on each seedling. We'll cover potting on seedlings next time.

So, I will leave you to enjoy the lengthening days and sowing seeds to enjoy later in the year and I'll see you next time. I love spring!



Advice on Blue-green Algae (cyanobacteria)

Why it is important to be aware of them

Blue-green algae pose risks to public and animal health when they form blooms and scums in they form blooms and scums in readvaters in warm summer month. They produce toxins, that may cause skin rashes and more severe symptoms if swallowed, Dogs are at risk if they drink the water, or lick their coat after swimming, with severe symptoms requiring very rapid vet treatment.

effects

- Skin rashes
- Eye irritations
- Vomiting and diarrhoea
- Fever and pains in muscles and joints

Keep safe around a bloom

- Keep children and dogs away from the water
- Keep dogs on a lead
- Carry a bottle of water for your dog to drink and use it to wash off

If you, or your pet, become unwell after contact with water that may be contaminated with blue-green algae, we'd recommend you seek immediate medical or veterinary advice.

How can I recognise a blue-green algae bloom?

Blue-green algae first develop as small green particles of 1-2 mm [1]. If the bloom continues it can develop into more obvious green or turquoite wispy soum on the water surface [2-3].

How can you report a bloom?

Use the Bloomin' Algae app Ose the Bloomar Algae app to report a bloom. You can also contact your local authority environmental health department if you suspect a bloom and public warning signs are absent.




