IT'S BEEN A WEEK of storms across the UK, and we've been lucky in Kinross to have had relatively mild wind, rain and snow compared to other areas. With the onset of climate change and more frequent extreme weather events come problems, and they don't only concern those who live in areas prone to flooding. For open bodies of water like Loch Leven, heavy rainfall can contribute to rising levels of phosphorus, leading to more harmful algal blooms. Parking at Greens

FIRSTLY, THANK YOU VERY much for those of you whom have reached out to us over the last few days and weeks, and for making us aware of your concerns and negative experience. I wanted to take this opportunity to publish a note from ourselves as widely as possible.

On a personal note, I am sorry to hear that so many people have received a parking ticket and certainly sympathise with this regard. Of course having been in the same position myself, it is certainly a substantial amount of money and absolutely not ideal.

I have been reviewing and looking into each and every complaint and feedback on this matter over the last few weeks, along with engaging in discussions with UKPC to try and understand exactly where we are and what options are available to ourselves, our customers and the local community. I have outlined my findings below.

We communicated extensively last year after acquisition of the store and car park in Kinross in relation to the introduction of parking management which has been carried out by a third party company, UKPC. The decision to give the contract to a third party company was as a result of significant repairs and maintenance required on the car park upon our acquisition into 5 figures. In addition, we received many complaints from customers of the Post Office and store being able to find park spaces whilst 'the same vehicles' were parked in the car parking and occupying both disabled and standard bays for the full day.

Having discussed these matters in great detail and certainly not taken lightly, the decision was made to give a contract to the third party company to manage the car park. Having taken on board feedback last year and in order to ensure the local community has a solution to park and visit other stores in the High Street, we asked UKPC to implement a cost effective pay & display solution (only applicable after the 30 minute free parking period) as oppose to a blanket ban on parking longer than this.

Further, we asked UKPC to ensure there was at least a 10 minute grace period (thereby making the actual free period 40 minutes) to ensure customers are not caught out. The new parking rules have been extensively communicated on our social media page, the Kinross-shire community Facebook page, car park signage as well as posters in store. I understand the Kinross-shire community newsletter is extremely important to our local community, rightly so given the fantastic asset it is, and I do regret that this method of communication was not used to further 'spread the word.' We will most certainly ensure all further important announcements, community or otherwise, are shared within the newsletter.

After taking your and other feedback on board, we have been liaising with UKPC to try and agree a further increase to the free parking period to make the car park more accessible, though we must stress that this decision does lie with UKPC. I can confirm we have formally requested the free parking period to be increased to 1 hour and will confirm the response from UKPC as soon as we hear back. In relation to the parking charges that you have already been issued unfortunately as this is manned by a third party company we do not have the ability to outright waive any parking tickets. However in an attempt to mitigate impact and after various discussions with UKPC over the last week or so, we have managed to agree the following:

- For a limited period, we have the ability to take on board your comments, collate these and put them forward to UKPC to try and obtain a waiver of the ticket. We must stress that the final decision is not within our control and we can only put forward your submissions on this. We would also suggest you separately submit an appeal to UKPC directly.
- If you have any issues with the signage on site, I would suggest you review the British Parking Association guidance at www.britishparking.co.uk and also visit www. knowyourparkingrights.org. If you feel any of this guidance has not been met by UKPC, you do have the ability to submit a complaint to the British Parking Association and I would suggest you do so.

We do hope that we can look forward to welcoming you back in store again and more significantly for you to continue to utilise the car park to visit ourselves, the Post Office and other local high street businesses.

Once again, I do sympathise with this fine and can ask you to understand the reasons that we took the decision to introduce car parking management in the first place, the mitigatory measures put in place and the steps we are now taking to try and minimise any impact on our valued customers and local community.


Taylor's Close Shave For Mum!

She left it for a few weeks thinking she had knocked it during the move or had picked up a running injury, but, eventually in October decided to get it checked out. An astute GP in the Orwell Medical Practice sent her for a CT scan, where she was told it was possibly cancer. It turned out she had a soft tissue sarcoma in her right thigh muscle. The muscle was removed in November, leaving her with triceps where most people had quads! She then had six weeks of daily radiotherapy, travelling to Edinburgh through the rain, hail, wind and snow.

SHOULD WE WORRY ABOUT

Concern grows over the rising phosphorus levels in Loch Leven and the corresponding increase in algal blooms.

THE LOCH LEVEN CATCHMENT Management Group (made up of representatives from organisations such as SEPA, Scottish Water, NatureScot, The UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology and other bodies who have special responsibility for looking after Loch Leven) met in January to discuss the management and health of Loch Leven.

At the meeting Linda May of UKCEH (The UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology) reported on Loch Leven water quality monitoring and climate change effects. She reported that in recent years phosphorus concentrations in the loch have been increasing and since 2018 we've seen the return of algal blooms in the summer.

Large new housing developments in the catchment are often thought to be the main cause, due to sewage discharges from the waste water treatment works. It was noted that there 'may be a correlation but that does not necessarily imply causation. '

Phosphorus levels are highest in the summer, whereas sewage is discharged all year round. So, it's more likely that the recycling of phosphorus in loch sediments with rising summer loch temperatures is the cause. When the loch temperature reaches 15-17°C this seems to trigger the release of phosphorus.

Across Scotland, climate change effects are being considered

under a research project looking at loch data and blooms. Possible mitigations include flushing the loch through a planned release of water at the sluice gate, ahead of any algal blooms forming. The timing of any flushing is likely to be critical. Climate change also brings new threats from the expansion in range of some invasive species such as roach, which are zooplankton feeders and could lead to less zooplankton in spring and therefore more algal blooms.




What Is Phosphorous? Why Could It Be Detrimental?

Phosphorus is a nutrient that plants and animals use for growth and development. While it is essential for plant and animal life, too much of it can cause a type of water pollution known as eutrophication, which occurs when the environment becomes excessively rich in nutrients. This process can happen naturally over time, as bodies of water age; however human activity can help accelerate the influx of nutrients and speed up the process.

Eutrophication can cause algal blooms. As extra nutrients enter the water, aquatic plants are able to flourish. Algae will bloom and prevent sunlight from reaching deeper plants, which will consequently die. Bacteria will begin to break down the decaying plants and this process will use up the available dissolved oxygen that remains in the water. When dissolved oxygen levels are low, fish and other life will not be able to survive.

Algal blooms can cause problems as they:

- Disrupt the normal functioning of an ecosystem;
- · Deplete dissolved oxygen levels;
- May block out sunlight preventing the survival of other photosynthetic organisms;
- Can produce toxins which are harmful to higher trophic levels and cause problems further along in the food chain;
- Cause a risk to human health from threat near to drinking water intakes;

Where Is The Excess Phosphorous Coming From?

Phosphorus occurs naturally in rocks and other mineral deposits. During the natural process of weathering, Phosphorus is released as phosphate ions which are soluble in water. The inorganic phosphate is then distributed through surrounding soil and water.

Phosphorus is a common constituent of fertiliser. Rainfall can cause varying amounts of phosphates to wash from farm soils into nearby water, a process known as diffuse pollution.

At the time of writing we have just experienced Storms Dudley and Eunice. Throughout the UK, we are seeing changes in rainfall patterns which are likely to result in increased mobilisation of Phosphorus from farmland, as well as the severity of storm sewage problems including intensive rainstorms, more rain, and more overflows.

While pollution from septic systems and sewers can cause excess phosphorous to occur in bodies of water, the

most prevalent urban source of nutrient pollution is human bodily waste.

Municipal and industrial sources are considered to be 'point sources' of nutrient pollution as they discharge nutrients directly into surface and ground water.

The Loch Leven Catchment Management Group

Cllr Willie Robertson noted his disappointment that the meeting was not attended by a representative of Scottish Water, who are responsible for the wastewater treatment plant. While this operates successfully most of the time, during heavy rain it is unable to cope and the excess is diverted into the loch. He is concerned that an increase in house-building will exacerbate the problem and is calling for tighter controls in terms of licensing.

Cllr Robertson and the other local councillors have written to Jo Green (acting CE of SEPA) asking for a review of the CAR licences for Loch Leven. Cllr Robertson says 'There appears to be growing instances of algal blooms, some toxic, which now seem to last for many months of the year. The water quality in the loch has been improving over the last

20 years but it now appears that these improvements have not only stalled but are now regressing. Evidence given to the Loch Leven Management Committee backs this up.' (Read the full letter to SEPA on p29.)

Independent Consultant Brian D'Arcy commented, 'The logic has always been that the best option for control and for minimising algal bloom risks is to reduce the phosphorus from external sources.

That has been shown, by excellent CEH research, to lead to reduced summer releases of phosphorus from loch sediments. That logic still applies. To suggest that because sediment release is a summer event means that inputs are no longer a concern is strange.

Reviewing the target total external load coming into the loch will be vital. It is more important than ever to reduce inputs. Actions across all contributing sectors need to be encouraged.'

While we can't say with certainty why Phosphorus levels are increasing, we do know that it is vital to keep their levels in bodies of water under check, because of the risk to human health and the cost to marine ecosystems.






GIACOPAZZI'S SCOOPS PRIZE

LINDISFARNE IN KINROSS!

'Chapter Five: Fifty Years of Fog'. Celebrate the anniversary of the band's pivotal LP at Kinross Backstage

FORMED IN NEW-CASTLE in 1969, Lindisfarne were hailed by the music business as 'a breath of fresh air' and 'the new Beatles'.

They toured the world, had many hit singles and albums and released the UK's biggest selling album in 1971, Fog on the Tyne. Their music is still played regularly on the radio, TV and at gigs throughout the UK.

Huge Upgrade For Cleish Primary?

PERTH AND KINROSS COUN-CIL are to explore an option

which could see a £3 million upgrade to Cleish primary school. In January a PKC committee was presented with options on how to improve the suitability and condition of the school.

Cleish Primary School lies within a conservation area.

Sheena Devlin, Executive director of education and children's services described the school as 'picture postcard pretty'.

The recommended option was put before PKC's lifelong learning committee on 31 January.

It would see the school's capacity drop from 64 to 50 pupils to 'facilitate short-term improvements'.

The favoured option to bring the school's condition – currently rated as poor – up to a better standard would see the mobile buildings replaced by one permanent stand-alone building.



The original school building would be refurbished. Cllr Callum Purves explains, 'This will essentially involve the old building being used for dining, office and staff accommodation, and as a multi-purpose space while the portacabins will be replaced with two new class-

rooms.'

Cllr Richard Watters added, 'I was delighted to see papers come forward to improve the school estate at Cleish. ... the council is also pursuing the possibility of purchasing new land to increase the currently limited play area.'

Independent councillor Xander McDade was worried about the school's capacity being reduced to 50 pupils.

He said: 'I think it limits the future for the school to be able to grow.

'Small school rolls can fluctuate a lot. It only takes a few families to move into an area to change that.'

He asked if options would be explored to be 'creative' with classrooms to provide a third classroom.

A user reference group will be formed with members of the community council, parent council, staff, pupils and local councillors.

Sheena Devlin gave a commitment – following Monday's meeting – there would be 'full involvement with parent council particularly in relation to future plans'.

She added: 'If the parent council are feeling they haven't been involved as they would like to have been then on behalf of the service I would like to say we are sorry they feel like that.

'We can guarantee that – as with all similar projects – this would mark the point for fuller engagement and involvement.'

Conservative convener Caroline Shiers moved to forward recommendations outlined in the council report to further explore design options and engage fully with the community.

Cllr Shiers agreed to incorporate an SNP amendment from Cllr Rebbeck for more detailed plans and definitive proposals to be brought before the appropriate council committee by the summer of 2024.

This was unanimously agreed.


but with a more open back to discourage any unsociable behaviour and so that the camera will be better able to record any incidents.

'The Loch Leven Walkathon takes place in the most beautiful setting and the good news is it's accessible for all.



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LOCAL AREA COMMITTEE PUTS THE BRAKE ON SPEED MANIACS

A 40MPH SPEED LIMIT trial is finally to be introduced on the busy A911 between Scotlandwell and Auchmuirbridge, notorious for blind summits and sharp corners. Previously the limit for this stretch of road was 60mph, with statistics from PKC showing that over 90 vehicles a day went at speeds over the 60mph.

Councillors and local residents have been fighting for speed reduction measures for some time. Parents are worried about vulnerable school-children standing by the edge of the road waiting for their bus, or trying to cross the road while traffic continually thunders past at high speeds.

Previously, a 20mph zone in the middle of Portmoak was announced which kickstarted the campaign to prevent speeding cars. Vehicle activated warning signs were put in place by PKC to prevent dangerous driving on the A911. But both PKC's traffic and network team and Police Scotland had said they did not think a reduced speed limit would be appropriate as there was 'no evidence of excessive vehicle speeds or any significant accident history'. PKC's head of environment and consumer services Mark Butterworth said there was a 'big demand' for road safety schemes across Perth and Kinross, with approximately 800 schemes on the database.

The newly formed Kinross Local Area Committee had their first meeting on 20 January and have the power to make decisions regarding local issues devolved from PKC. Cllr Purves put forward a motion for a 40mph speed limit to be introduced from the buffer at Scotlandwell to the Fife boundary at Auchmuirbridge, Cllr Robertson seconded the motion and said local councillors



and Portmoak Community Council had lobbied hard for this 'year after year'. A keen cyclist, he added, 'If I am happy to cycle a road, I think it's safe. I've cycled nearly every road in Kinross-shire but I've never ever cycled this section.'

The committee agreed to implement the reduced speed limit 'as soon as practicably possible'. They will assess it as part of the Route Action Plan investigation, and can then decide whether or not to make it a permanent speed reduction.

New Leisure Plan For Powmill Quarry

The 39-acre Devonshaw Quarry site, also known as Powmill Quarry, has not been in commercial use for many years and now provides a well-hidden yet visually stunning location, combining a wealth of natural and man-made features including two crystal-clear lochans.



The site offers significant potential for environmentally sensitive tourism-based development, cleaning up and protecting its fragile ecosystem whilst making it a safe and accessible destination for visitors and holidaymakers alike.

YOUNG KENZIE MACLEAN, who is only 16 and was born in Kinross, is the only person from Kinross-shire to be a Steeplejack. Kenzie will soon to travel to the Steeplejack College in Kingslynne where he will learn the 'tricks of the trade'.

There is only one Steeplejack College in the world, and Kenzie needs to stay there for a month at a time, twice a year. This is a big challenge for such a young lad but Igoe Up Ltd, the company supporting Kenzie, have every faith in him, and as he says, he will get 'peace from his parents'.

So far Kenzie has been up 240ft high, right to the top of St Bryce Kirk in Kirk-caldy. Kinross's first Steeplejack has a very bright future ahead of him and hopefully he will be followed by more youngsters in the area who want to follow in his footsteps.

Managing Director Chris Igoe knew there was only one name for his Steeplejack company: Igoe Up. They



provide a range of specialist services including Steeplejack and rope access, high level building maintenance, power washing, gutter cleaning, stone restoration and roofing. They hold the highest safety accreditation in the UK; and pride themselves on their quality

workmanship, as well as keeping prices as fair as possible.

As Igoe Up continues to grow, it shares its profits through charitable donations, for the benefit of local communities.

Chris told the Newsletter, 'We in-



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vest our profits back into society by expanding our profile of charity works as a means of thanking the communities who invest in us. We have recently started a community fund for any work needing carried out on our local charity buildings. We have already completed phase 1 out of 4 on the Men's Shed building in Kinross, repairing slates and sandstone coping stones at no cost to make sure their money goes on more important things within the charity.'

Chris was employed as a General Foreman at one of the UKs leading Steeplejack companies when he moved to Kinross. He had worked his way through the ranks having gone straight into Steeplejacking from school, aged 16, just like Kenzie.

He has worked on some of the biggest and most famous buildings in Scotland, including St Magnus Cathedral in Orkney, Kinross Parish Church, Perth Cathedral and Edinburgh Castle and has over 25 years experience.

He says, 'The plan for the future is to grow the business slowly, making sure our biggest asset, our people, are skilled, confident and competent.'

What Is A Steeplejack?

A Steeplejack carries out repairs, maintenance and renovation work that is difficult for other trades to access —they work at height. This includes industrial chimneys, power station cooling towers, church spires, castles, high-rise buildings and bridges (or anything else with awkward access). The modern day Steeplejack uses ropes, ladders and access equipment to save clients money when compared to scaffolding or cherry pickers.

A steeplejack's work can involve many and varied tasks from making repairs to properties or demolishing chimneys; from installing lightning conductors and fitting aircraft warning lights to high level inspection. They are often asked to recommend solutions to architects, surveyors and engineers, or to provide health and safety assurances.





Rope access can be used for hardto-reach areas. Many companies offer rope access services, but they may not be qualified to undertake repairs at height, whereas a Steeplejack is.

The History Of Steeplejacking

Steeplejacking first came to exist in the sixteenth century, when steeplejacks

were travelling acrobats. They came with poles, ropes and fearlessness, which made them ideal for this type of work. To advertise their bravery and boldness, they would swing off the spire for villagers and townsfolk to gasp at. In many ways today, we still do make people stop and watch. Steeplejacks Early found there was more money to be made in performing repairs than somersaults; a change that remained with profession, the thankfully.

In the nineteenth century their work shifted to the more mundane and became less elegant. The Industrial Revolution brought massive mills and factories,

all steam-driven and fuelled by coal and their chimneys needed constant maintenance. The steeple climber was suddenly in regular demand, and some time around the 1860s they became known by a more-familiar title: Steeplejack. The name Steeplejack comes from the steeples that they worked on, and 'jack', for jack of all trades.

The new website will allow residents to keep up to date with climate change action across Perth and Kinross.



CHURCHES THREATENED WITH AX

BOLD NEW PLANS ARE to be discussed to reform the Church of Scotland in Perth and Kinross. Fourteen church buildings in the Perthshire area would be threatened with closure, including Cleish, Portmoak and Arngask churches.

The planning and development committee of the Presbytery of Perth has produced a draft plan to determine how limited resources should be allocated over a five-year period., with members of the presbytery being asked for their opinions. The presbytery has 45 church buildings and is asking their members to consider the possible closure of 14 of them within the five year plan.

Committee Convener Rev Allan Wilson said: 'We are at the beginning of a process to determine how limited resources should be allocated. It requires increased co-operation between congregations and the sharing of resources across existing parish boundaries.'

The draft plan suggests that some congregations could be united and others may be placed under presbytery guardianship to ensure that they continue to

The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland have instructed Presbyteries to reduce current staffing. For Perth, the number of Ministers of Word and Sacrament and Ministries Development Staff posts is to be reduced by 37 per cent.

The consultation will last for eight weeks, and a new plan must be agreed by December 31, 2022.

Looking to the future, Mr Wilson said the presbytery is committed to considering any proposal to buy a former church building and maintain it for community

New CHAS Jersey For 10th Year Of The Sportive Children's Hospices Across Scotland

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

A911 Speed Limit

The first meeting of the Kinross-shire Local Committee was held in January and included a discussion on the stretch of road between Scotlandwell and the border with Fife. As readers will recall, there have



been longstanding road safety concerns about the A911 that were brought into focus by the recent fatality.

We had been struggling to make progress on lowering the speed limit on this stretch because of the Council's rigid road safety policy. As this policy area had been devolved to the local committee, however, we were able to take a different approach from the rest of Perth and Kinross.

After hearing from local residents about their concerns, the

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Committee agreed to lower the speed limit to 40 mph along the stretch pending a full review as part of a Route Action Plan in the coming financial year. This will also examine other potential speed mitigation measures.

This is exactly the type of thing that the Kinross-shire Local Committee was designed to achieve. It has allowed us to make progress on an issue that seemed intractable. I am hopeful that we will be able to resolve similarly difficult issues as the pilot progresses in the months ahead.

Cleish Primary School

After many delays, there was some positive news about the future of Cleish Primary School following a meeting of the Council's Lifelong Learning Committee in January. The Council has committed to keeping the school open and to improving its condition and suitability.

A number of options were explored and the one that is to be progressed will retain two separate buildings on the site. This will essentially involve the old building being used for dining, office and staff accommodation, and as a multipurpose space while the portacabins will be replaced with two new classrooms.

While this is positive news, I was disappointed by the lack of consultation with the local community, including the parent council. The Council only held one meeting in advance of the paper being presented for decision. I have asked that the Council arranges a meeting as soon as possible so that the parent council and wider community can ask questions on the approach being taken.

Community Campus Access

I have been contacted by a number of community groups who have been concerned by the inability to make bookings at the community campus. Only some sports groups have been allowed to resume using the local facilities following the restrictions brought in as a result of the pandemic.

The Council has repeatedly stated that this is in line with COVID guidelines issued by the Scottish Government in relation to the use of school buildings rather than community venues. When the campus was created, replacing former venues like the town hall, however, the local community were promised that it would be fully open and accessible to the community and not just used as a school.

Given that other community venues are reopening, and gatherings of a larger scale are now taking place (with, where appropriate, mask wearing and social distancing), I am keen to see the community campus brought back into full use for community groups as soon as possible.

After a number of requests, the Council have now confirmed that they are looking to reopen campuses to community groups 'imminently'. I hope that, by the time you read this, they will be accessible again.

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RAISING THE STANDARD OF CHILDCARE

AS I WRITE, 'PARTYGATE' is all over the news. Every newspaper is headlining with it and my MP in-tray is filled with outrage from constituents and correspondents further afield.



It's hard to keep track of the detail. It's perhaps easier to ask on which nights Number 10 wasn't partying during the pandemic than on which nights it was. There were wine and cheese events in the Downing Street garden. There was a birthday party with cake, candles and a disappearing Chancellor of the Exchequer. And so much celebratory booze was being consumed the night before Prince Philip's funeral that staffers needed to go out with a suitcase to buy more.

Michael Gove says that we must now show "Christian forgiveness" towards the perpetrators – a carefully chosen phrase, surely, because he highlights both that sin has been committed, but also that no apology has been offered. For to receive forgiveness, repentance must first be offered up. And I see precious little repentance. Instead, there's a feverish desire to find scapegoats – depute heads must roll, as they used to say at the BBC.

Jacob Rees-Mogg is currently patrolling the tv studios telling us all, in his languid way, that we should stop "fussing about cake". Can he really be so tone-deaf? The public are not angry about someone randomly eating cake. It is rather what this particular cake represents – who was consuming it and when. Not for the first time in history, we have a cake that symbolises an out-of-touch regime, indulging itself while the people suffer.

I see these events through a very personal prism. March to June of 2020 are seared on my memory. My Mum had had a wee fall at home, went to hospital, and contracted a chest infection.

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She threw that off quickly. But doctors didn't want to discharge her home without physiotherapy so they sent her to a respite centre just as the country went into lockdown. I wasn't allowed to visit. The rules were quite clear. And, although I phoned every day, she lay alone, month after month without visitors. On the 27th May 2020, we "celebrated" her final birthday over FaceTime with a cake I'd sent in, and a nurse holding it up to the camera. My Mum, desperately lonely, stopped eating and drinking shortly afterwards and died in early June.

The public, I think, hate the weird, convoluted sentences constructed by the Prime Minister and his apologists suggesting that he would be terribly sorry if anyone happened to be upset by his possible presence at a party that he thought was a work event. Across the land, people endured terrible sacrifices. They're angry that rules that applied to us didn't appear to apply to our Westminster leaders. And, at the very least, they want a smirk-free acknowledgement of wrongdoing from Downing Street.

During the last month the Scottish Parliament marked World Cancer Day with a debate to which I contributed. It was a very personal speech and, if truth be told, I wasn't as ready for it as I thought I was. I focused on the experience of my



brother Andy through his diagnosis, treatment, palliative care and eventual death from a malignant brain tumour.

The cancer was diagnosed 15 years before it ended his life and for at least 13 of them, he lived every moment of it. It is not too many years ago that he wouldn't have survived more than 2 or 3 years at most. The care and attention of the team at the Beatson gave him – and us – precious time.

And when the time came, the care, respect and dignity he received at the Cornhill Hospice in Perth, was beyond words.

It is for those reasons that I plan to climb Kilimanjaro with a group of his friends later this year to raise funds for the Cornhill Hospice – as a tribute to Andy, and as a recognition of the utterly selfless, amazing work that the people who work there do. So, expect to hear more about that in the months ahead.

Of course, we can't just be thinking of cancer for that one day of the year and March happens to be the Awareness month for both Prostate Cancer and Ovarian Cancer. In both cases, the older you get, the more at risk you are and one of the symptoms to be aware of is changes in the way you go to the toilet. I would encourage everyone to find out more and speak to their doctor if they have any concerns.

There is no doubt there is much more that we can and must do in trying to deal with all kinds of cancer and some of the ground-breaking work done here in Scotland is fabulous. The new early diagnosis centres are to be welcomed and the sooner they can be rolled out across the country, the better, because early diagnosis is so important.

The elective treatment unit that is being built at the PRI will be transformational in allowing patients to be treated more quickly and effectively, right across Tayside. And, again, the sooner that is completed, the better.

March is also the start of spring, the time of the year for new growth and new beginnings. This March is, almost unbelievably, the second anniversary of when Covid first started to impact on our lives. It is difficult, on a fine spring day, not to have a positive outlook – and it would appear that, in terms of the pandemic, that positive outlook is now justified. Here's hoping.

HAVING CAMPAIGNED TO ENSURE that Cleish Primary School did not follow the fate of Blairingone Primary School—which the Tory/Lib Dem administration voted to close—I was delighted to see papers come forward to improve the school estate at Cleish.



The proposal in the papers brought before the Education Committee is to reduce the capacity of the Cleish school to 50 pupils (there are currently 42 pupils attending), to demolish the old cabins, to build two new classrooms, and to refurbish the old traditional building to create a dining room, shared space, and an administrative area. Council is also pursuing the possibility of purchasing new land to increase the currently limited play area.

The original paper said that more detailed proposals would be brought before the committee in four years. In response, the SNP group proposed an amendment to reduce that time to two years—and that was incorporated into the main motion.

It is important—as part of the Council's commitments to reach net zero—that any new public buildings in Perth and Kinross are built to Passivhaus standards and that any refurbished buildings are made as close to close to Passivhaus standards as possible. So the rebuilding and refurbishing of Cleish Primary School should fit within these standards.

Following on from the recent Tory and Lib Dem decision to shift school meals to frozen meals, some recent investigations have discovered that around 230,000 foil trays are being sent to landfill from Perth and Kinross Schools each year. Concerns have been raised about the environmental impact of this. The PKC waste service manager has agreed to meet with all the relevant parties around the use of single-use items within schools.

It was a privilege to participate in the first Local Area Committee for Kinross-shire earlier this year, debating and voting on papers that have a direct relevance and interest to our local constituents.

Following on from the report last year about Child Poverty in Kinross-shire, I am really concerned about the effect that the sudden dramatic rise in the cost of living is having within our communities. I am concerned both for the people who are currently struggling and for the many more people within our communities who will get drawn into the poverty trap as costs continue to increase. With Broke Not Broken, our local foodbank, also highlighting the strains they have been facing over the past few months, I have asked them to give an update to the Action Partnership on the stresses felt by those in the organisation.

As the Covid Pandemic broke out, we witnessed an amazing reaction from people in Kinross-shire, with a wide range of groups forming and getting actively involved in protecting our communities. During this time, the Action Partnership provided timely and key funding to enable community groups to respond to the pandemic, safeguarding our communities. As we see poverty levels rise and other challenges face our communities, it is essential that we ensure our Action Partnerships are funded to help address inequalities within the area.

KINROSS NEWSLETTER READERS will have been concerned by the very recent February statistics which show a decrease in the number of local police officers in Scotland. The national decrease of 643 officers across Scotland translates into the loss of 35 local police officers across Tayside. This means the total number is down from 968 in 2013 to 933 now.



In particular, residents of Kinross-shire will be worried about the impact this will have on police trying to do their best to cope with rising level of rural crime, including dirty camping around Loch Leven, fly-tipping, and deer and fish poaching, all of which increased during the pandemic. Councillor Callum Purves last year requested that Perth and Kinross Council's Ranger Service patrol the area around Loch Leven more closely and I have heard this had a very positive effect in reducing the levels of rural crime. I am pleased that the ranger service will be making a return in the spring and summer of 2022 so that everyone can continue to enjoy what rural Kinross-shire has to offer.



Residents of Kinross will also be aware of the two recent breakins, the first on Broom Road, and the second nearby the following day — The police confirmed that the thief has been arrested and charged. In a separate case, I was shown evidence of a car stolen from Cleish and driven to Lathro Park in Kinross where it was subsequently burned (pic above). I am aware that the recent spate of crime in Kinross-shire is of great concern locally and I will be looking to urgently raise these concerns with the police.

My conversations with police in Tayside show how determined they are to do a good job, to keep our communities safer and to tackle crime across Perth and Kinross but they also tell us about the pressure they are facing, especially when it comes to staffing. I will continue to raise the matter of cuts to Police Scotland in the Scottish Parliament.

LOCH LEVEN: I voiced my concerns about Loch Leven in last months newsletter. We can't afford to allow this, our most important asset, to deteriorate. Algal blooms many which are poisonous to humans and animals are become



increasingly more common. As a result of this I have written to SEPA asking for them to consider introducing tighter controls in the amounts of phosphorous they permit to be discharged into our loch.

I am pleased that my fellow ward councillors have agreed to have their names added to the letter. Please see the full letter below;

Dear Ms Green,

We are contacting you because of the increasing level of concern in Kinross-shire regarding the water quality in Loch Leven.

There appears to be growing instances of algal blooms, some of which are toxic, which now seem to last for many months of the year. The water quality in the loch has been improving over the last 20 years but it now appears that these improvements have not only stalled but are now regressing. Evidence given to the Loch Leven Catchment Management Committee backs this up. As you will be aware Loch Leven plays a vital part in our local economy being a major tourist attraction and leisure destination. It is a Special Protection Area, RAMSAR site and National Nature Reserve of international importance.

Phosphorus (P) input into Loch Leven is the main source of the nutrients which cause algal blooms. There are limits set for the amount of P permitted to be discharged by our Waste Water Treatment Plants (WWTP) but these limits were set many years ago. The original standard set in 1990s for a maximum of 2mg/L total phosphorus still applies at Milnathort WWTP, but in 2007 the limit for Kinross was changed to a new value of 3mg/L soluble reactive P (equivalent to a permitted deterioration to approximately 4mg/l TP). Since then the amounts of treated sewage entering Loch Leven has risen substantially due to the levels of development which has increased the P loading in the loch. Meanwhile, accepted discharge limits of less than 2mg/L are now being set in the UK and elsewhere and we believe that the inputs to the loch here should be in line with best practice in other parts of the world.

On top of this Milnathort and Kinross have combined sewerage systems. In periods of heavy rainfall the sewers and WWTPs can't handle the flows and are forced to divert the excess untreated combined sewage and stormwater directly into Loch Leven.

Perth & Kinross Council are about to review our Local Development Plan. Before allocating more housing locally in this new LDP it is important for decision makers to be aware of the impact further development will have on the health of Loch Leven.

Currently there is no limit in the total weight of P entering Loch Leven, just a condition limiting the concentration. We would like this changed with a total weight limit being added in a bid to reduce the current P load from these sources entering Loch Leven. This would greatly help in protecting the loch from creeping deterioration in future. We note that SEPA already has planned work for the agricultural inputs to the loch; it

is the town inputs which seem to be moving in the opposite direction.

We would be grateful if you could consider this request for a review of the CAR licence conditions for the Kinross and Milnathort treated sewage effluent discharges. We also request that the CAR Licences for the overflows from the sewerage networks are reviewed, adding a requirement for quantification of the frequency and duration of the overflow episodes and routine reporting that data to SEPA. Such actions will help us reduce the P loading of Loch Leven and help to reverse the deterioration in water quality we are experiencing. With climate change exacerbating the impacts of inputs, these reviews to bring inputs in line with current accepted best practice are even more urgent. Loch Leven is a very important local and international asset which we all have a duty to protect and enhance.

ROAD WORKS: Persimmon Homes are planning to lay new sewers at the southern end of Milnathort and Auld Mart Road. These road works are down to last for at least six weeks and will cause massive inconvenience to local people. The works in Auld Mart Road are due to begin on the 21st February and will last for five weeks. The works between Auld Mart Road and Dalwhamie Street on the main road will start on the 28th. March are planned to last nine weeks. I will be doing my best to limit the disruption for local people.

GALLOWHILL ROAD: Residents of Gallowhill Road are very concerned about the number of heavy good vehicles using Gallowhill Road to access the Persimmon Phase 2 site. I have contacted the Council to see what action can be taken to stop site traffic using the southern end of Gallowhill Road. This road has very narrow pavements in places and is very well used by pedestrians and cyclists.

DANGEROUS TREES: I am regularly contacted by people concerned about trees on Council-owned land which have become overgrown and dangerous. The Council has no budget for tree work so tend to do nothing to address concerns expressed. I have asked for money to be allocated in this years Council budget to allow at least some work to be carried out on problem trees. I already have experience of a tree reported to me, on which the Council refused to take action, falling onto the house of the person who had voiced concerns about it. I don't want this to happen to any other resident.

I CHAIRED THE FIRST historic meeting of the Kinross-shire Local Committee of PKC on 20 January 2022, which I had hoped would be in public in Kinross-shire but COVID restrictions did not allow that. We had a full attendance of Elected



Kinross-shire Ward members and the appointed representatives of the six Community Councils in the Ward.

We noted the 'pilot' Scheme of Administration agreed by PKC last October after long discussions between local members and Officers to agree an acceptable scheme. We have an agreed Evaluation Brief for the "Pilot" scheme and it is up to the Committee to demonstrate in the next 12 months that the "model" is making a difference for Kinross-shire.

We discussed the Report on the PKC-wide 20 mph Speed Limit Trial presented to the Environment Committee on 27 October 2021 which featured a village straddling an A class road, i.e. Kinnesswood. The Traffic Order for a 20 mph limit here to be permanent was approved but it was noted that further measures other than the speed limit would need to be considered through further consultation in Kinnesswood.

We had a deputation from residents living along the A911 east of Scotlandwell on the Report into further road safety measures to address speed of vehicles at this locus. Despite the report not advising a reduced speed limit at this stage but referencing the Route Action Plan for the A911 currently being worked on, Councillor Purves moved that we should introduce a 40 mph limit between Scotlandwell and Auchmuirbridge and all local members agreed this course of action. Further mitigation measures would follow as part of the Route Action Plan.

We agreed the Report on the former Blairingone Primary School that I had asked for. It was noted that the school had been declared surplus to requirements contrary to the wishes of three local members in June 2019 and that there are currently no facilities in the village itself. It would cost in excess of £30,000 to bring the premises back to a useable condition, if the community is interested in the future lease or purchase from PKC. I am currently involved in trying to establish a Fossoway and Muckhart Community Development Trust that could be in a position to progress this and we have been given another year from the Trust being established to gauge public support for retention of the buildings for community use, as opposed to sale to a third party.

I appraised the Committee on the background to "discussion on making a recommendation to PKC on engaging with neighbouring local authorities and the Scottish Government on the principle and funding of proposals to improve co-ordination of planning and management in the Lomond and Ochil Hills, including the extension of the Lomond Hills Regional Park to Lochleven and the

establishment of an Ochil Hills Regional Park". Background to this was a document "Ochil Hills - a special place" updated in 2016 which support of Friends of the Ochils; a briefing note on the "Coordination of Planning and Management in the Ochil Hills" from 2019 following participation of Friends of the Ochils in the 2019 "Review of Regional Parks" organised by the Scottish Campaign for National Parks and APRS (I am a member of the Council for Rural Scotland) and finally an email from APRS on the new Shared Policy Programme of August 2021 coalition agreement between the Scottish Government and the Green Party re National and Regional Parks. The whole purpose of this potential Motion to PKC was to kickstart the process of engagement needed to further discussion on the benefits and funding available for improved management, possibly including establishment of an Ochils Regional Park, as soon as possible. This may also address the loss of the Local Landscape Area for Rumbling Bridge Gorge. There was strong support from Portmoak CC for pursuing this Motion and the whole Committee endorsed that approach.

The Kinross Town Centre Regeneration Scheme Report summarised previous consultations and agreement on the design and development of public realm improvements in Kinross Town Centre and recommended further action on traffic management and signage to improve the Scheme through further reviews of data, surveys and consultation with the community in Kinross following representations from local members and the CC. It was agreed to bring a report back to a future Committee after all this had been done.

Finally, I asked the Committee to agree the Agenda note in relation to the meeting of the Kinross Common Good Fund Committee that met in December 2021 to assess applications from Light Up Kinross and Kinross-shire Move Greener Organisation (KMGO) and to homologate the decisions made. Normally Common Good applications are within the remit of our new Local Committee but we had not met when these applications needed to be determined.

In summary, I thought our first meeting went well with good engagement from CC representatives. Provisionally, we have a next meeting scheduled for 24 March, hopefully in public!

I finally note that there will be Elections for PKC in early May 2022 and I would ask readers to consider only voting for candidates that are committed to the principle of the Area Committee that Councillor Purves and I have pushed so hard for and wish to see as a permanent feature of PKC committee structures going forward.

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County Lines Drug Dealing

COUNTY LINES REFERS TO gangs and organised criminal networks which export illegal drugs into suburban, rural and coastal areas, using dedicated mobile phone lines or 'deal' line.

The crime sees County Lines gangs exploit children and vulnerable adults to move drugs and money.

The gangs move into a rural or suburban area for a short time, taking over the home of a vulnerable person where they set up a base.

Many of those taken advantage of by these gangs have been forced to carry out criminal activity by threats, grooming and extortion and can be described as modern day slaves.

Spot The Signs And Report Concerns

Have you noticed:

- A child or young person (sometimes as young as 12), during school hours or unusual hours (e.g. early in the morning, late at night)? They might be in a shopping centre or high street, or on public transport.
- A child or young person who seems unfamiliar with the local area?
- A child or young person being approached or intimidated by a controlling peer or group?
- A child or vulnerable person who is deliberately avoiding authority figures such as police officers or security guards?
- More people calling at a local address than normal?
 Sometimes at unsociable hours?
- Suspicious vehicles or people at an address?
- A neighbour has not been seen for a while?

If you see something concerning either a young or vulnerable person that doesn't feel right, or looks suspicious, you can report your concerns 100% anonymously to the charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or contact Police Scotland direct.

Kinross' Champion Angler

Archibald Eric Carradale Campbell 13 March 1934 – 11 January 2021

KNOWN TO EVERYONE AS ERIC, he was born in Kinross on 13th March 1934 to Archibald Campbell who had a grocers shop in Kinross and Cecilia Baillie Campbell (nee Hendry) a clerkess.

Eric had 3 older sisters – Kate, Nettie and Bessie and 1 younger sister Edith.

Losing both parents at a young age, his father when he was 4yrs old and his mother when he was 9yrs old meant Eric was brought up by his older sisters Kate and Bessie.


When Eric was just a boy, he caught his first trout from the South Queich burn which runs into Loch Leven using a branch, a piece of string and a bent nail as a hook with a worm on it. And so began a lifelong passion for angling which led to a distinguished fishing career.

1946 – 1949, Eric went to Perth Academy 1949 – 1954, Mining Surveyors Apprenticeship

1954 – 1964, Colliery Surveyor, gaining a Home Office Mine Surveyors Certificate, plus a City & Guilds Of London Institute in Mine Surveying (First Class) in 1955

1964 - 1977, Colliery Planner

1977 – 1985, Surveyor Project Planner 1985 – 1989, Senior Scottish Planning Engineer in Surveying Department.



After working for the National Coal Board during the day, Eric would work as a Boatman on Loch Leven in the evenings and at weekends. This was before outboard motors were used so there were two Boatmen, one on the front oar and one on the rear oar, there could be one or two anglers per boat. At this time, catches of 100 trout per boat in the evenings could


sometimes be obtained.

Eric started competition angling in 1955 when 21 years of age. By 1982 he had fished in 304 club competitions winning 97 of them. Fishing for two clubs C.I.S.W.O. and Tullibole, each club could hold 12 competitions per year. The winner obtained points and at the end of the year, the person with the most points was the club champion. Up until 1982, Eric had been club champion on 28 occasions.

The club champion then represented their club fishing in the Scottish National Trout Fly Fishing Championship which is the oldest National Trout Fly Fishing Competition in the world. It was started on 1st July 1880. 375 – 400 competitors fish in eliminatory heats then 2 semi finals then the final.

Eric won the Scottish National Trout Fly Fishing Championship twice, first in 1970 and again in 1985. He also won the Loch Leven Championship twice, a competition which was held at the end of the year for the anglers who had fished Loch Leven the most that season. This was an invitation event; the only angler guaranteed to fish it was the winner of the Scottish National.

Eric represented Scotland on 31 occasions, 27 times in the Home Internationals which are normally held twice a year between Scotland, England, Ireland and Wales, a record which still stands today.



One International is fished in the spring/summer and one in the autumn, with each country taking its turn to host the event.

In the summer of 1977 he was Scotland International Team Manager fishing Grafham Water in England, he won the Brown Bowl which is presented to the angler with the top catch from the 4 countries, he would also win the Phoenix Silver Salver which is awarded to the top Scottish angler. In the autumn International the same year, fishing at Loch Leven he again won the Phoenix Silver Salver as he was the top Scottish angler, the first time this has ever been done.

In 1984 Eric was again the Scottish International Team manager whilst fishing at Llyn Brenig in Wales.

Later that year he won the Loch Leven Championship and for good measure, he also won the prize for the heaviest fish caught that day, a fish of 4lbs 2oz.

He also represented Scotland in the European Championships and World Championships for trout fly fishing for which he was Scottish team captain and team manager. Eric was a founding member of the Scottish Anglers National Association, of which he was president.

Eric's legacy continues today through the annual Youth International Fly Fishing Competition which he was instrumental in starting.

The exhibition can currently be seen at the Kinross (Marshall) Museum.

Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month

EACH YEAR 7400 WOMEN are diagnosed with ovarian cancer in the UK, but most women are still unaware of the symptoms to look out for. Target Ovarian Cancer is a UK charity which works to improve early diagnosis. It also funds life-saving research and provides support to women with ovarian cancer. Their awareness campaign this month is aimed at increasing knowledge amongst women of the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer. Ovarian cancer cannot be detected by the smear test, so it is essential for women to know more about it so that they can raise any concerns as soon as possible with their GP or practice nurse.

The symptoms of ovarian cancer are frequent (they usually happen more than 12 times per month) and persistent. They include:

- Persistent bloating not bloating that comes and goes
- Feeling full quickly and/or loss of appetite
- Pelvic or abdominal pain (that's your tummy and below)
- Urinary symptoms (needing to wee more urgently or more often than usual).
- Occasionally there can be other symptoms:
- Changes in bowel habit (eg diarrhoea or constipation)
- Extreme fatigue (feeling very tired)
- Unexplained weight loss
- Any bleeding after the menopause should always be investigated by a GP

THE POVERTY MYTH

This is the first of a monthly column by Joyce Horsman, Principal Solicitor at Dundee Law Centre (www.dundeelaw.org). She lives in Kinross-shire and is the Assistant Editor of the Newsletter.

THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC has taught us many lessons; arguably the most important is that anything can happen and nothing in this life is certain. Any of us can be afflicted by health conditions, mental illness, redundancy and the financial pressures these events can bring. Many of us naively think that, if the worst should happen, the state will step in; protect us and fund us. Make sure we are warm, safe and fed in our darkest hours. Others also live in the comfortable ignorance that 'it won't happen to me'.

Unfortunately, it is not that simple. The law sets out various eligibility criteria for both welfare benefits and housing; and it may not be what you expect.

That said, there is a lot of assistance and protection out there; you have to know what you are entitled to and where to go for assistance. In a society where the need for food banks is increasing on a quarterly basis, it is arguably time for us to wake up and realise that poverty is something which can, and does, affect us all.

The Department for Work and Pensions has traditionally been the provider of state benefits such as Income Support, Jobseekers Allowance and, more recently, Universal Credit. There are different categories within the Universal Credit system. For example, some people qualify for 'limited capability for work' (LCW)or 'limited capability for work and work related activity' (LCWRA). Not only are these terms a bit of a tongue twister, it is not entirely clear who qualifies and who

does not. Many initial decisions are overturned at Tribunal stage and only the lucky few who have access to adequate legal advice and representation venture that far. It is the same with Personal Independence Payment ('PIP'); there are categories for daily living and mobility activities and then there are different rates which are assessed against a range of 'descriptors' which are set down in legislation.



Add into the mix the fact that the recently formed Social Security Scotland (SSS) is taking over some welfare benefit provision in Scotland on a piecemeal and trial basis, it is no wonder that people get confused! All this is before you consider the whole access to justice issue and the fact that many claimants struggle with literacy issues and digital exclusion.

This introductory article is one in a series that aims to highlight that we should not turn a blind eye to those who are struggling financially, usually through no fault of their own, and who cannot access the welfare benefits system which we are all vaguely aware of. We all know about food banks and most of us lament their necessity in modern day society. However, the problem is deeper, more complex and needs to be addressed. The first step is awareness and I hope this short piece has at least made you think.

My Mother's Hands

Winning Ways by Jo Middlemiss

I COME FROM A big family. I am one of eight children - five boys and three girls. My parents were both doctors, so it was a very busy home. If you were to have seen my parents, you might think they were a mis-match. My father was 40 when they married, and my mother was only 28. My father was bald, short and inclined to plumpness, and my mother was tall, slim and elegant. They were very, very fond of each other, and a terrific team. Children generally take after their parents, and we were no different, but I got my father's genes, apart from the baldness, and to tell the truth, I'd rather have had my mother's.

Consequently, all of my life I have persuaded myself that I was nothing like my mother, when suddenly, the other day, when I was bashing something out on the keyboard, I saw my mother's hands. After she died, I inherited her engagement ring, which I wear with great joy and pride. And here it was on my finger, something that I have been familiar with every day of my life. Now,

sometimes I look in the mirror and there she is again, smiling at me. Or I meet a cousin

after a long absence, and she says, 'You look just like your mother.' It is so funny to hear, because it's something that I have never ever thought.

But back to hands — her hands. When she was very old — she lived until she was 97 — I used to spend a lot of time caring for her, and that entailed looking after her hands and feet. In contemplating those hands, which were still elegant, but a bit stiff and knobbly with arthritis, I got to thinking about all the things those hands had done. Caring for her ever-increasing brood, washing, ironing, cooking (the best cake and scone maker I'll ever know), gardening, driving and playing golf.

As I said, she was a doctor, and after we were all at school, she went back to work as a school doctor, and would be in and out of schools all over Glasgow, examining and inoculating hundreds of children. She loved those days. These musings have somehow brought back to me great memories and appreciation of my mother, and all the wonderful,



thoughtful and selfless things she did for myself and my siblings.

I know that it is not everyone's story, but if we do have the great good fortune to have had great parenting, then it is something to be rejoiced in, and celebrated. I am still the smallest in the family, and I would be as plump as my Dad if I didn't watch out, but I have realised after all these years that I am truly grateful to take after my Mum, in many of the ways that matter, and that feels very good.

Other Planning Matters

Complaint from Mr R Caldow re application 21/01729/FLL

The CC had received an email of complaint from Mr Caldow in respect of application 21/01729/FLL which had been discussed at the October 2021 meeting. In his email, Mr Caldow advised that this application had been the second submission of the same application this year, with the earlier submission have been refused on a number of grounds. Mr Caldow believed that the members of KCC who were present at the October

2021 meeting had not been provided with the full information in respect of this application and had agreed that there had been no reason to refuse the application.

Mr Caldow has therefore asked KCC to debate the application again, which he believes is a breach of the Development Plan (2019) and withdraw their letter of support until deliberations had been concluded.

In response to Mr Caldow's email, CCllr Colliar advised that minutes of a meeting do not, and cannot, reflect the whole discussion on a particular subject and confirmed that Milnathort CC had previously refused to support the application. CCIIr Colliar noted that Mr Caldow claimed that the application was contrary to the Development Plan (2019) but on checking, there had been no specific policies against that plan, and on checking the application itself, there had been no objectives submitted from anyone, including Mr Caldow.

It was agreed that the decision taken at the October CC meeting would stand.

Proposed Sale of Private Parking Area to Owner of Myre Cottage, Smith Street, Kinross

CCIIr W Freeman advised that PKC had emailed the CC to advise of the Council's proposal to sell a small area of ground held on Common Good to the owner of Myre Cottage, Smith Street, Kinross. The area was 82 square metres and would allow the owner of the property access to the 2 existing and established access gates to the property and for parking directly in front of the property windows.

There is no existing community use of the area in question and it is utilised as a small private parking area and for the owner of the cottage to take access to their property.

It was agreed that PKC's email would be circulated to members but after discussion, it was agreed that CCIIr H Phillips would write to PKC opposing the application.

Reports from PKC Councillors

Cllr Purves advised that the first meeting of the Kinross-shire Local Committee had been held last week and he hoped that this would continue to grow, demonstrating that local decisions affecting the area were being taken appropriately. Budgets are yet to be announced, and while it was noted that local government would receive an increase in their budgets, this had proved not to be the case.

CCIIr Mckay reported that there needed to be funding spent on parks as she felt these were not safe, both in terms of the condition of the equipment and the surrounding areas.

Reports From CC Representatives

CCIIr Colliar

KCC Accounts: CCllr Colliar enquired as to the whereabouts of the current accounts as these were required to be submitted to PKC by 28 February 2022. It was believed that the Accounts were currently with Ross McConnell and CCllr Colliar would contact him to confirm this.

Christmas Deliveries: CCllr Colliar advised he had been contacted by a resident complaining about the lack of street signs in the area and the issues this was causing with the number of extra deliveries being made in the run up to Christmas. CCllr Colliar had spoken to all the Councillors but both Cllrs Purves and Robertson had responded to advise that they would visit the particular area to see the issue for themselves. CCllr Colliar would contact them again for an update

CCIIr Mckay advised that a number of delivery drivers had been from without the area and therefore were struggling to find addresses. She also highlighted an issue with Bughton Road and Wilson Court, where signs were covered by hedges. Kinross-shire Local Committee: The first meeting had been held last week and while it had been quite successful, there had been very little discussion with regard to Kinross with most discussion focusing on Scotlandwell and Kinneswood, especially the 40mph speed limit to join up with the Fife side. However, the committee had confirmed that the review of Kinross High Street was underway and they would look at the potholes in Kinross. It was noted that the sign about the Provost's Lamp had been erected but there was a planter in front of it, which may restrict access to residents with mobility issues. CCllr Colliar agreed to contact Kinross in Bloom to see if this could be moved. He also advised that there was still some funding available and whilst this should be returned to KiB, there were suggestions of incorporating a bench or 2 larger single seats into the area, and possibly some paving.

Light Up Kinross: It was noted that there had been ten new lights erected at Christmas

Drainage at Springfield Road/junction with The Muirs: It was noted that this required to be fixed as flooding was now becoming an issue. CCIIr Mckay advised she had previously reported this, along with the requirement to fix the pavement in the area.

CCIIr H Phillips

Parking at Greens

She had received a number of complaints in respect of the new parking arrangements at Greens - signage is not visible, narrow entrance, pay machine not visible, short duration (45 mins) and a number of complaints letters would be issued in the next edition of the Newsletter.

CC members agreed with the complaints and it was suggested that CCIIr Phillips write to the owners (Greens) highlighting these issues CCIIr Colliar is to provide the correct email address.

CCIIr W Freeman

Partnership/Website

CCIIr Freeman suggested that a meeting be arranged to discuss the new website, which was still at the drawing stage. CCllr Colliar disagreed with this saying that the CC had previously decided to go ahead with the Newsletter website and withdraw from using the Kinross.cc website.

After discussion, it was agreed that the CC would stand by the decision made at a previous meeting.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be on 22 March 2022 at 7.30pm.

Approved following brief discussion. Cllr Calum Purves said that he and the other ward councillors were no longer receiving CC minutes, which Chairman Malcolm Thomson promised to rectify.

Police Matters

There were no police in attendance, which, it was hoped, indicated that there had been no incidents of concern in Milnathort.

Advice from PKC about changes to waste collection dates over the festive period.

Notification about PKC's £400,000 Health and Wellbeing Fund, set up to provide support during COVID-19. Applications close on March 31, 2022. Noted following brief discussion.

Traffic notice advising of BT repair works in Victoria Avenue on January 17, 2022. Noted.

Speedwatch

CCIIr Andrea Ward advised that she had carried out a survey via the Milnathort Neighbours Facebook page to ascertain people's views on speeding in the village. Fifty-eight people completed the survey and 21 of those expressed an interest in finding out more about becoming a Speedwatch volunteer. There was widespread concern about pedestrian safety, particularly in South Street, New Road, Stirling Road and Burleigh Road, where speeders were frequently observed, sometimes even leaving the road altogether. Speedwatch is a police-led initiative and they would provide training. Cllr Purves said that Cllr Robertson had been leading this project and hoped to see it rolled out throughout Kinross-shire, although volunteers wouldn't necessarily operate in their own villages. Following discussion, it was agreed that CCIIr Ward would forward the information she'd obtained to all four ward councillors.

Responding to a question from a member of the public about 20mph zones, Cllr Purves said that five villages across Perth and Kinross – including Kinnesswood – had had 20mph zones set up on a trial basis, but they hadn't made a great deal of difference in terms of speeding traffic unless other mitigation measures were in place. He advised that this was an issue that had now been devolved to Kinross-shire.

Core Paths

The chairman reported that the landowner at Hattonburn Farm had asked for the core path there to be relocated as walkers were straying onto his land. It was eventually agreed that the path would remain *in situ* but that it would be maintained by the CC's own core paths group so that there was no doubt as to its location.

Vacancies

The CC was still without a treasurer or secretary and it was agreed that a concerted effort should be made to fill these posts. It is also hoped that younger people will be encouraged to join the CC and, after discussion, it was agreed to invest in a large advert in the Newsletter and to contact Kinross Community Council in the hope of joining forces to attract young members.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Purves advised that the inaugural meeting of the Kinrossshire Committee was scheduled for 18 January and he thanked the CC chairman for forwarding input from MCC.

News from the January Meeting

Apologies were received from CCllr Craig Williams and CCllr Michelle Kirkbright.

Secretary and treasurer CCIIr Malcolm Thomson, chairman, advised that these two positions had now been filled.

Police Matters

Wildlife crime: CCllr Andrea Ward will circulate the Commander's Bulletin on wildlife crime to other CC members and publicise it on social media.

Parking on 'H' white lines: A number of complaints have been received about this and there is confusion about whether it is illegal or advisory. 'H' white lines are those with a bar at each end, such as the one in Church Street, but there are concerns that parking on them could obstruct access for emergency vehicles. CCllr Ward has spoken to the police, who say that anyone seen parking on them should be reported via 101.

Correspondence:

Email from PKC inviting CCs to comment on its strategic tourism plan. CCIIr Ward will circulate.

Email regarding PKC housing strategy team consultation. CCllr Ward will share the appropriate link.

Notification from Scottish Civic Trust about its annual 'My Place' award scheme for 2022. CCllr Ward will share the information with the public.

Letter from a local resident about foil container recycling. There used to be a facility in Back Loan but Ba'hill is now being considered.

Parking on 'H' white lines: A number of complaints have been received about this, particularly in relation to Church Street and Wester Loan. PKCllr Willie Robertson said that the roads department had contacted him to say that a gritter had been unable to access Wester Loan one morning and he had written to the police to ask if they would speak to the vehicle owners concerned. He was not in favour of installing yellow lines as this measure would lead to its own problems but they may be used as a last resort.

Core Paths

Kevin Heneghan reported that the Core Paths group had been given funding by PKC to buy its own petrol strimmer for cutting back bushes. Kevin advised that he had spoken to one landowner who was happy for benches to be located on his land.

Kinross-shire Fund: The Fund's advisory committee is looking for a member from MCC. After a brief discussion, it was agreed that Phil Britton will take on the role, as he is shortly to be coopted on to the CC.

Traffic Issues

Speeding and road safety

Following discussion, it was agreed that Cllr Purves will arrange a site visit with PKC road safety officers, to be attended by CCllr Ward, to get advice about appropriate mitigation measures. The issue is also to be discussed at the first meeting of the Kinross-shire Committee. CCllr Ward also agreed to send a list

Loch Leven

Cllr Robertson advised that he had attended a meeting of the Loch Leven Catchment Management Group, at which the effects of phosphorus on the health of the water was discussed. This can lead to the formation of blue-green algae, which is toxic to animals and humans. He noted his disappointment that the meeting was not attended by a representative of Scottish Water, who are responsible for the wastewater treatment plant. While this operates successfully most of the time, during heavy rain it is unable to cope and the excess is diverted into the loch. He was concerned that an increase in house-building will exacerbate the problem and is calling for tighter controls in terms of licensing. There followed a discussion in which CC members expressed their dismay at the apparent lack of input by the environmental agency NatureScot (formerly Scottish Natural Heritage).

Queen's Platinum Jubilee

A member of the public asked if there were any plans to mark this occasion, perhaps by presenting each Milnathort Primary School pupil with a commemorative coin. After discussion, it was agreed that PKClIrs Robertson and Purves will look at funding options and report back.

News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 10 February were M Thomson (chairman); P Britton (treasurer); E Rougvie (secretary); A Ward, F Brooks, N Bingham, A Macrae, K Heneghan (associate member); Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters, and one member of the public.

Undernutrition Grant Scheme



year of the decade. The last census happened in 2011. Information gathered provides government and councils with information on Scottish households which helps decisions to be made on services. In Scotland, the National Records of Scotland (NRS) is responsible for the census. Noted.

Events for CCs: Draft National Planning Framework online events during February and March. PKC passed on the following from the Scottish Government Planning and Architecture Division: NPF4 Consultation Events: Registration is now open for Draft NPF4 online events during February and March, facilitated by Kevin Murray Associates (KMA) and PAS. The purpose of the informal, interactive sessions is to raise awareness and share views about the Draft NPF4, in order to inform and support the preparation of responses to the consultation, which closes on March 31, 2022. Noted following discussion.

Managed for Wildlife Trials Consultation

The Managed for Wildlife Trials public consultation was due to be launched on 7 February via https://consult.pkc.gov.uk/communities/managed-for-wildlife/ The consultation includes a survey with a story map which shows all the sites and areas within the trials in an easy to view and understand format and includes a short video explaining the trials. It invites people to suggest additional sites for future consideration and to get actively involved. The consultation will be open until the end of the growing season in September/October.

Local Place Plans

Local Place Plans offer communities the opportunity to develop proposals for their local area, expressing their aspirations and ambitions for future change. Legislation on the preparation, submission and registration of Local Place Plans came into force on January 22, 2022. The secretary advised that Charlotte Giacopazzi had offered to form a sub- group to plan events to mark the occasion of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in June. Following discussion, the

secretary agreed to flag this up on social media. Funding will be made available from PKC but the amount won't be known until after its budget meeting on 23 February.

Core Paths Group

PKC were to be commended for the speed with which a fallen tree had been removed from the path alongside the golf course following the recent storm.

A meeting had been arranged with Alistair McLeod of Greenspace to discuss what could be done about the depressions in the local paths, which were becoming very muddy.

Kevin and Malcolm are to visit Birnie Loch Nature Reserve to look at the various types of benches there before deciding which would be the most suitable for Milnathort. They will be installed on the core paths not owned by PKC and, following discussion, it was agreed that Kevin would pursue the idea of acquiring sponsorship and look at the possibility of installing a bench to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Purves had attended the first meeting of Kinross-shire Local Committee along with Malcolm Thomson, which had been successful in that decisions could be taken about long-standing issues that PKC had either been unable or unwilling to deal with. For example, the committee's devolved powers allowed it to lower the speed limit on the road from Scotlandwell to its border with Fife, which has been a matter of concern for some time.

As the council's block grant had been reduced, decisions will be taken at the budget meeting on 23 February as to where cuts could be made.

Cllr Robertson advised that there was potential for significant traffic disruption due to forthcoming work by Persimmon Homes to re-lay the sewers from Lathro and link them into the sewerage system. This will involve digging up Auld Mart Road and part of South Street. Work will begin on 21 February and 28 March respectively and will last for a total of 11 weeks. Residents of the affected areas have been informed by letter and there may be scope for Lathro residents to claim compensation as a result of the well-documented sewerage issues in the first phase of the development.

Cllr Roberston has written to SEPA to request that tighter controls are placed on the amount of phosphorus going into Loch Leven, as the water quality is deteriorating. The letter has been signed by all four ward councillors. He was supported by Cllr Watters, who said that scientists were currently investigating ways of preventing the growth of algae. Following discussion, it was agreed to await the response from SEPA, which, it was hoped, would be positive.

CC Membership

The chairman reported that Allan Macrae and Phil Britton had





officially been co-opted on to the CC, and that Freda Brooks and Neill Bingham were awaiting validation. He expressed his thanks to Phil Britton and Liz Rougvie for taking on the roles of treasurer and secretary respectively.

The chairman also wished to record his gratitude to Craig Williams, who was stepping down after many years' service to the CC, including a lengthy spell as chairman.

AOCB

Neill Bingham noted that Fossoway Community Council were looking for a minute-taker, possibly a school pupil taking modern studies. It was agreed that Malcolm would contact Fossoway CC to find out what the feedback had been as MOCC is also keen to attract young people.

The next meeting of Milnathort and Orwell Community Council will be held at 7pm on Thursday, 10 March, 2022. It is hoped that meetings can be resumed in the Town Hall as work on the sound system is nearing completion. Members of the public are invited to attend.

Fossoway and District Community Council

News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting on 1 February 2022 were CCllrs S Bruce-Jones, T Duffy, C Farquhar, N Marchant and G Pye; Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson and R Watters.

Apologies: CCllrs A Cheape, F Hansraj-Jackson and G Mudie; Cllr M Barnacle; PC A Mitchinson.

Matters Arising

Community Council Membership: CCIIr Carol Farquhar tendered her resignation from the CC, but was then adopted as an Associate Members to continue her special relationship with the residents of Crook Moss. The appropriate time having elapsed, CCIIr Marchant is now a full member of the CC.

Police Report

There were no incidents to note in our area since the last CC Meeting from the Commander's Reports received via Perth and Kinross Community Watch. CCllr Duffy will make contact again as we need feedback and information on the Community Speedwatch Project.

Matters Arising

Access to Cash in Kinross-shire: Cllr Purves updated that Bank of Scotland have progressed the community project with the opening of a Community Hub at Millbridge Hall, Kinross. Details will be published in the Kinross Newsletter and on social media channels. CCllr Marchant advised that the CC will continue to be proactive on the subject of access to cash as feedback from users of mobile banking was that they were

feeling uncomfortable about doing large transactions online or in a open location.

Community Development Trust: CCllr Duffy reported on a public meeting held in Crook of Devon. Unfortunately it was not well attended by the public and only three members of the Steering Committee were available to attend. There has been discussion about possibly combining with Muckhart CDT. The view of CCllrs present was that this was not an avenue to pursue as it was different local authority areas, there was a risk that outlying area of the CC would miss out and need to get local commitment. All CCllrs present voted to recommend that Fossoway CDT is maintained as a separate identity.

CCIIr Marchant emphasised the need to communicate aims and objectives to the Fossoway community and need to secure funding for leafleting. Need to get a commitment locally and identify suitable projects.

Fossoway Area Transport/DRT: The new bus service 202, operated by Bay Travel, is now up and running, from Tillicoultry to Kinross. Cllr Watters explained that a review of the usage of this service will be taken shortly after the trial period. Bay Travel are currently using hired in buses and drivers and unlikely to invest in vehicles for a short term contract. It was agreed that the CC would take the lead in communicating with other CCs on the route to promote the use of this service, possibly by posting the schedule on Noticeboards, Facebook, via the schools, etc. Since travel is now free for young people this may be an incentive for increased use as for example there are just over 400 young people in Fossoway alone.

A977 Mitigation Measures: Cllr Purves has made an application to request speed measuring lines to the west of Crook of Devon and east of Drum, but this has not been done yet. He will follow up. CCllr Mudie has expressed concerns about the realignment plans for the B9097 and A977 junction and if there could be a better use of resources. However as the work has already been agreed and budgeted it will go ahead. Crook Moss Travellers Site: CCllr Farquhar updated that there

appears to be more derelict caravans and damage caused by storms is not being cleared. CCllr Marchant confirmed that there have been four Enforcement Notices served on the site which appear to have been ignored and that none have been followed through by Planning. Requested information on the process. Cllr Robertson explained that whilst the Council could issue further Enforcement Notices if residents appealed it is likely to go to Scottish Government and be overturned. It was very difficult in these particular circumstances for an Enforcement Notice to be upheld. Cllr Robertson agreed to write to Planning. Advised that CC should write to P&KC Chief Executive directly with our concerns about the process.

Speeding in Carnbo: Cllr Purves said that he hadn't received any response to the proposal to extend the 40mph buffers

further out of the village. It will be progressed through the Transport Committee

Flooding in Drum: CCIIr BruceJones been in contact with several Drum residents to hear views on how flooding issues can be addressed. The main concern was what implications being assessed as Flood Vulnerable would have on residents and how can it be done. They supported the proposal that a flood assessment for sites and neighbouring areas be a requirement for any planning application in Drum

Community Speedwatch: A Facebook post has been created, asking for suggested locations and volunteers.

Kinross-shire Area Committee (previously known as the Kinross Forum): CCllr Bruce-Jones reported on the 20th January meeting that was held online. This was a successful meeting attended by representatives of all Kinross-shire CCs. Presentations were made with papers submitted by Council Officers on the 20mph Speed Limit Trial, Issue of Speed Mitigation measures on the A911 East of Scotlandwell, Options for a Community led solution for the former Blairingone Primary School, Coordination of Planning and Management in the Lomond and Ochill Hills and Future Development of Kinross Town Centre. Next meeting will be in March but it is hoped to have an interim meeting of CCs before then. Items for discussion are welcome from all CCs.

Devonshaw Whinstone Quarry: CCllr Marchant reported that the owners have been in contact with the CC and have suggested we meet them onsite to discuss their proposals. They have asked for our availability weeks commencing 14th and 21 February.

Rumbling Bridge Gorge Bridge: The flood risk survey has been completed. We are awaiting quotes for the otter and tree surveys.

Possible Adoption of Spur of U241 Road, Drum: It was confirmed that if the road is adopted by the Council, it remains a public right of way.

New Business

Local Review Board: The minutes, and hence decisions, from the LRB are very hard to obtain. Can Local Councillors get anything done about this? Cllr Robertson offered to write to Planners and suggested that the CC write directly to Planning and the Chief Executive.

Crook & Drum Growing Together: Permission has been granted to start planning and planting a Community Orchard in conjunction with St Serf's Church on land beside the cemetery.

Community Council Business:

Minutes Secretary: The search for a volunteer continues, but with no candidates. In the interim the CC members will continue to undertake the task in rotation.

Enforcement Issues

20/00809/FLL Craigton Farm Lane – An Enforcement Notice has been issued, requiring the caravans and hardstanding to be removed and some fencing to be lowered.

20/00972/FLL Erection of two dwelling houses and garages at Land 100 metres southwest of Easter Muirhead Blairingone (enforcement ref: 21/00236/PLACON) - The agent has been in contact with Transport Planning regarding the widening of the road

Crook Moss: The new Enforcement Officer notes that four Breach of Condition Notices, a Temporary Stop Notice, an Enforcement Notice and an Amenity Notice have been issued at this site.

Site visits by Planning: Cllr Duffy expressed concern that CCllrs were being asked to visit sites and obtain evidence in relation to planning issues. Uncomfortable with this situation and keen that Planning site visits were fully recommenced.

AOCB

CCIIr Duffy formally thanked CCIIr Farquarson for her dedicated work on and support for the Community Council over the years. We will welcome her continued presence and input as an Associate Member and she wil always be welcome at CC Meetings.

Portmoak Community Council News from the February Meeting

Present at the meeting held on 8 February were Cllrs C Purves, W Robertson, R Watters; CCllrs A Miller (Chair), D Morris (Vice-Chair), A Davidson (Treasurer), S McGregor (Secretary), K Donaldson, S Forde, D Paterson, G Smith and five members of the Public.

Matters Arising

Official Co-option of Graham Smith to Portmoak Community Council.

The completed signed Documents were confirmed as received at PKC. The Chair raised a Motion to co-opt Graham Smith. Proposed: S Forde. Seconded: A Davidson and D Morris

Kinross-shire Committee - update following first meeting

The Chair had attended the first Kinross-shire Committee (KC) meeting. Application to extend the speed limit 40mph from Scotlandwell and Bowhouse: CCllrs and Cllrs had discussed the issue and residents representing Bowhouse had attended and made a deputation. The KC had voted in favour of implementing the speed restriction. Cllr Purves confirmed the instruction from KC to PKC officials had been made to implement the speed restriction. Speed measuring will be implemented

afterwards. Changes to road markings, signage and footpaths will also be reviewed. There will be a consultation period to monitor and review, but it was a huge positive for Portmoak Community and the Bowhouse residents.

20mph Speed restrictions in Kinnesswood: following the trial period these will now become permanent. There are approx. 800 areas flagged for speed restrictions in P&K, with 20mph speed trials in a number of other locations also. The Chair had requested info. Regarding the amount of PKC budget allocated to Kinrosshire and regarding the costs the various speed mitigation measures cost. This request was deemed appropriate so that an assessment of realistic spend and delivery within the area could be assessed. PKC confirmed they would supply the information. Cllr C Purves highlighted that PKC had committed informally to the Route Action in the past, but this was formalised at the KC meeting.

KC Planning & Matters Arising: Cllr CPurves raised intention to get all CCllrs and Cllrs together to identify priorities and main focus and plan for the next 10 months, rather than an ad hoc approach. The Chair asked if any of the Cllrs wanted to raise anything. D Morris noted that he could not pick out the main issues from the existing KC documentation, and any person not sitting on the committee would have reason to ask what is the purpose of the committee? Cllr C Purves said this was a fair comment. Key themes should have been discussed, but there had not been time in advance of the first meeting, hence the suggestion to have another meeting as noted previously to plan the next 10 months. The Chair suggested a short online meeting of the CC members within the coming month to rationalise ideas at a time /date to be arranged.

Creation of Regional Park: Many of the other Kinross-shire CC had shown strong support for a Regional Park extension of the Lomond Hills Park into Kinross-shire. There was a general agreement to put a motion to PKC at a future date. The Chair highlighted that strong support for the Regional Park also gave impetus to look at other issues like pollution into the loch, and farming methods. W Robertson commented that the KC gives all CCs direct input into what is discussed and a much greater degree of power, but it is not up to Cllrs, it is up to the CCs to bring issues to the KC.

Road Safety Action Update

The requested data on the Scotlandwell 20mph limit trial was still outstanding. Cllr C Purves read a statement from PKC roads explaining that analysis is being undertaken on the data for all the 20mph trials across PKC which were installed under emergency rules. Once all the data is collected it will be shared with the relevant CCs.

Roads & Signage Damage: A member of the public raised the issue of a sunken manhole on the southbound exit from Kinnesswood. The materials surrounding the manhole were reported to be severely degraded and a potential risk was raised. CIIr S Forde also raised the issue of the northbound speed signage into Scotlandwell having been subject to storm damage and was lying at the side of the road.

Footpath from Scotlandwell to the Church: The Chair apologised that the proposed on-site meeting among PCC members was still outstanding due to availability of members

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and restrictions of dark evenings to view the layouts properly. The PCC agreed to arrange the onsite meeting now that light afternoons and evenings was becoming more favourable.

B9097 Poor Road Surface: Cllr Robertson had raised the issue of the surface of the B9097 to the Perth and Kinross Council Road Maintenance Partnership, who had replied. Two surface dressing schemes had been carried out over the last three years with the most recent one being carried out on the section between Findatie and the B920 junction. Patching works and resetting of gullys had also been completed along this section of the B9097. The current overall condition of the South Loch section of the B9097 did not give immediate concerns. Looking forward to PKC Roads capital works programme over the next three years, there is a section of the B9097 due for resurfacing on the section that runs from the M90 to the A977. A survey of the South Loch section of the B9097 will determine if structural patching works need to be carried out in the 2022-23 financial year and / or any resurfacing works need to be programmed into the threeyear rolling programme of capital works.

Bowhouse Bus Laybys: Cllr C Purves and the CC had received a paper circulated by the Developer at Land 50 Metres West Of Wester Bowhouse Leslie under planning Ref. No: 20/00231/ FLL re: the bus lay-bys at Bowhouse. In brief, some years ago, RTK original developers were to install a bus layby on the West bound side of the A911, but this had not been done and the building firm had subsequently gone out of business. In years since then, on the opposite side of the road, the farmer has created a widened field entrance which has created a space that school children can stand back from road and the residents were satisfied with this solution at present for children waiting for the school bus. One of the criteria of the planning of the two new houses at Bowhouse was to create a new stance on the Eastbound side of the road. This is now considered to be superfluous. The Developer commented that the tarmac at the entrance to the development will suffice as a bus layby on the East bound side once the development is finished. The Developer intends to submit a request to planners to remove that conditional criteria from their planning permission. Cllr D Paterson commented that he felt a bus stop was advised to allow a bus to pull off to avoid a hazard of traffic coming from behind round the corner and over the blind summit. The Developer replied that the tarmac will allow the bus to pull safely off the road. The Chair thanked the developer for his communication to PCC and it is up to PKC Planning to decide on



any request to remove the condition, however the Chair raised reservations regarding deviation from current development planning conditions for the benefit of all current and future Bowhouse residents.

Glenlomond sewage, and Water Supply to Glenlomond and Wester Balgedie: Cllr A Davidson explained the reason why there was a small core of retired residents looking after the sewage plant, was because the nursing home had previously maintained the sewage plant but this had stopped when the home was demolished. The village committee had submitted a FOI request concerning how many of similarly maintained plants had been adopted by Scottish Water, suspecting that many had been taken on already. It was suggested if this turned out to be the case, that there was a significant precedent for the Glenlomond site to follow. Some professional analysis of the current sewage system had shown that all the surface water is not flowing into the sewage system, this is good news as the system should not become overwhelmed and this has provided some reassurance and peace of mind to the villagers. R Watters commented that the partial or total adoption of the sewage system would be great news. Cllr Davidson also advised there is a new developer was in the process of taking over the nursing home site. It was also advised that part of the site upon which nothing can be built, the developers have removed mature bushes and wild habitat, which has upset residents. Cllr A Davidson asked the Cllrs if there was any recourse for enforcement by PKC regarding these actions. Cllr D Morris suggested that a local Glenlomond Development Trust could apply for assistance to acquire the land.

The Chair declared a potential 'Conflict of Interest' and that he would not be able to take part in any further discussions regarding the development of the former nursing home site, due to professional engagements related to engineering consultation. The Chair requested if the Vice-Chair could pick up on any further discussions concerning the development at Glenlomond, and ClIr D Morris agreed.

Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path: This item had been covered under Road Safety. PCC members will meet to walk the area and identify a best option for a route.

Kinross-shire Community Investment Fund – second round open for applications: The 2021/2022 Community Investment Fund had opened for a limited second round of applications on 10 January 2022. Some projects had not used all the funds granted to them and so there was still £16,013 available for Kinross-shire. New Matters

Wester Balgedie Farm development: Correspondence had been received by the Secretary and Kinross Civic Trust, from the Developer at Wester Balgedie Farm. PCC were encouraged that a developer had approached the CC in advance of

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submitting planning and expressed encouragement to other developers to do similar and engage the community in advance of submitting planning. The Developer had offered to meet to show plans to PCC and /or the Community. The consensus was that a public meeting would be preferred. The Secretary to reach out to the Developer to arrange this as soon as possible. At time of meeting no planning application had been submitted, but residents had reported some actions occurring at the site that appeared to be outside those permitted within a Conservation area, such as demolishing some old stone walls and a tree being taken down. The Secretary had reported the commencement of work to the PKC Planning Enforcement Officer, who had confirmed the developer could take down the metal barn which was dangerous. Some residents had expressed concern about safety at the site. There are concerns that there are discrepancies between what the Planning Enforcement Officer has stated, and the open line of approach that has appears to have been taken by the developer. Cllr W Robertson confirmed that consent is required to do most things within a Conservation Area, including tree felling. PCC are concerned that due process is not being followed correctly, given this is also a sensitive historic layout at Wester Balgedie

Police Report

Community Speed Watch program: Cllr W Robertson had heard from a number of CCs confirming they would like to be involved. Some volunteer names have been submitted to the police. The Police are awaiting response from all CCs before putting a program together. Cllr W Robertson hoped to have a more significant update in March. PCC Secretary is still collecting volunteer names if any local residents would like to be part of the Speedwatch team.

A follow up to a previous actionable point was requested by the Chair who had requested ClIrs approach The Planning Officer for information regarding the reasons the Planning application had been withdrawn. The Officer had confirmed the reason was due to the representation made in opposition, and it appeared likely that the application was going to be refused. ClIr Watters indicated that Sean Paton thought the application would probably be resubmitted.

Planning Decisions

Progress with Developments

Westfield Community Liaison Committee: 16/02/22. Cllr K Donaldson confirmed work has commenced on the site. Site offices are being set up, and roads and infrastructure are being created. There have been some variations submitted, due to the design and build company that have taken over. The Chair

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asked if there were any items that PCC should be aware of or items for consideration. K Donaldson thought the main item was to ensure lorries and large vehicle traffic travelled into the site along the B9097 from the motorway, but some large lorries had been seen coming in the C50 from Glenrothes.

Paths Group update: Maintenance of the Orwell Arlary Core path MTHT/127, A911 west of Orwell to Cycle route east of Arlary. Cllr D Morris had sent some documents to Cllr W Robertson on this item. D Morris and Ann MacIntyre had a virtual meeting with D Stubbs about the maintenance of the core path between Glenlomond and Glenvale scheduled for 9 Feb.

Treasurer CC Accounts: no change to January 2022 accounts:

General Account: £700.00

Michael Bruce Way Account: £1,523.00

Councillors' Reports

W Robertson: Complaint from residents of Cobbles about runoff damaging the road. The problem areas have been repaired. Also, the burn is needing some attention at the point it is piped down through the village, where it often blocks and overflows down the Cobbles. Potholes have been filled on A911 between Milnathort and W Balgedie.

R Watters: returned to the subject of Affordable Housing (AH). M Barnacle had received a response from the Chief Executive. On the H54 plot: the letter stated that the developer had met with PKC, explaining their intention to provide self-build plots as contribution to AH. This was one item that had been covered in the letter. This was considered an interesting and extremely contentious response from the C Executive specifically in respect of H54. The Chair did not accept the answer from the CE, citing self-build plots are not an option, where the purchase cost was potentially way beyond the cost of the average house-buyer and would certainly not fulfil the principles or ethos of AH. Cllr R Watters said there is not guidance or framework for how this would work, as self-build plots were not something that had been explored much to date in P&K. Cllr W Robertson highlighted a self-build scheme at Crook of Devon. Scripture Union had donated a plot of land to people who were renting, PKC agreed planning to build 8 houses, the residents were able to obtain the money to build as the land had been acquired. The Chair re-iterated opposition to such a scheme on H54, advising it was highly unlikely to meet any definition of affordability in specific relation to this site and would significantly oppose any such proposal.

08/02/22 meeting the Chair extended his apologies in advance that he would not be able to attend. The Vice-Chair thought he would be available to Chair the meeting.

Kinross and District Art Club




After retiring, I joined KADAC where I still enjoy painting and the great camaraderie.'

Despite the restrictions and winter season, there has been plenty going on in Kinnesswood. The school finally got the shed in place and John is working hard building



shelves and fitting it out before the equipment is moved in. We recently had a meeting after school with Caroline, the teacher in charge of outdoor activities. We were able to tick off those which were completed and decide on other tasks for the childrens' learning missions. It made such a difference to talk in person, show her where plants like the buddleia bush are, and point out how much can be taken off the willow. Remote gardening is difficult but not impossible. We were also able to allocate tasks which Kinnesswood in Bloom can do after school hours. We washed down the sides of the polytunnel ready for the new season and gave it a tidy up. It is great to see how well it is standing after the recent gales.

Thanks to funding we have received recently from the Climate Festival, we now have a compost tumbler. It did take several hours to build but is now ready to go and we have left laminated instructions for the staff and pupils to follow. The children are choosing vegetable and flower seeds to plant in the raised beds and polytunnel.

More funding came from the Community Investment Fund and we are waiting for delivery of a trolley mounted powered waterer. Since there is no water supply in the school grounds except for a water butt, this will make life much easier for everyone, especially watering the polytunnel. We first saw one of these being used by another group in the Beautiful Scotland newsletter and thought 'we need one of those'!

Our big coral reef went to COP 26 and hopefully has been passed on to a school or care home. The small one was revamped and installed in the bus shelter along with the other artwork. We continue to recycle batteries, stamps and glasses but are now collecting blister packs rather than ink cartridges as they were too difficult to recycle.

The bus shelter also became a pop-up shop recently when Karen had some road safety bits and pieces to recycle. Torches, scrapers and chamois proved to be very popular and everything went in a week. It made a change from a pop-up vegetable box.

Carol and John have started to plan our work parties. One of our first tasks was to remove a tree and ivy which was blown down in the recent gales.

Like other groups, we are taking part in adding to the Queen's Jubilee Canopy. Two trees were planted in the picture garden and are marked on the canopy map. If anyone else has

Supplied by Kinnesswood in Bloom

Smoked Haddock and Mushroom Traybake

Ingredients

3 med potatoes (450g approx), very thinly sliced 200 ml fish or vegetable stock

1 tbsp olive oil

2 onions sliced

75g crème fraiche

280 g smoked haddock, skin and bones removed

140g chopped mushrooms

50g butter, chopped into pieces

3 sprigs of thyme, keaves only

50g bread made into breadcrumbs

25g parmesan, finely grated

Method

Heat oven to 180°C. Cook the potatoes gently in the stock for 8-10 minutes. Remove when tender and reserve the stock. Heat the oil in a frying pan and cook the onions for about 8 minutes till golden brown.

Spread them over a shallow ovenproof dish about 26cm square and arrange the potatoes neatly on top. Season well and pour over the stock. Spoon the crème fraiche over the potatoes in an even layer. Lay the haddock on top then scatter over the mushrooms and chopped up butter. Cover with foil and put in the oven for 8 minutes..

Portmoak Community Woodland Group

We've had a good start to 2022 with volunteers from the government agency, NatureScot, putting in a brilliant day's work to help restore the Portmoak Moss peat bog.

The squad, consisting of their regular 'Wednesday volunteer team' and three members of staff, pulled out birch saplings from the centre of the peat dome, where the trees dry out the peat and prevent the spread of sphagnum moss. Sphagnum is the plant that comes in a wonderful array of colours, from pinks and reds to acid greens, but which eventually

fades and rots down to create more dark brown peat.

Back to January and it was a rather different Wednesday for the team, who generally work in the Loch Leven National Nature Reserve carrying out jobs like path clearance and meadow management. They are used to pulling out the highly invasive flower, Himalayan Balsam, but the tough roots of birch offered a new challenge. It was tough work and sometimes involved sawing round the base of individual trees to loosen the root ball.

Neil Mitchell, Reserve Manager, said: 'We don't normally get to work on a bog and it's nice to do something to help one of our neighbours.'

Those neighbours, the Portmoak Community Woodland Group, were truly grateful! Some members of our group make a regular habit of pulling out saplings and that is making a difference, but it is so encouraging to see how much can be achieved when a lot of folk get stuck in for the day.

Michael McGinnes, who organised the event, said that the NatureScot volunteers had covered over 90% of the area we were trying to clear, in the latest phase of the restoration work. They cleared nearly 3000 square metres of quite difficult terrain, with many larger birch trees. That area has now been completed by members of the Portmoak group.

Now we are looking forward to the return of the Lothians Conservation Volunteers to clear another area of the bog in April. They last joined us in November and have become true friends of the Moss. One of the most visible signs of success will be a good display of another bog-loving plant, cotton grass. Is it too early to dream of early summer and sunlight shining through the cotton wool blooms?

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

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

The level of the grass central strips, which have bulked up over the years such that rainfall cannot drain off the car park surfaces, will be lowered and in part replaced with plants and seeds to create three semi-natural raingarden wildflower features. A single barrier for each of the raingardens will prevent cars being driven across the new raingardens. There will be a mosaic of turf and bare soil seedbeds, until the seedlings come up and the new vegetation becomes established.

Kinross-shire Climate Café

On 7 February climate café met in Milnathort Town Hall to discuss green transport. At the meeting we welcomed two guest speakers.

First, Malcolm McFarlaine from Kinross-shire Move Greener Organisation (KMOG) presented a very informative talk about local green transport solutions that not only help environment, but promote health and wellbeing. Move Greener Organisation focuses on three aspects of movement – car travel, cycling and walking. As car travel is the largest transport contributor to climate change, KMGO have organised and financially supported the launch of car sharing in Kinross through an agreement with Enterprise Rent-a-Car last year. A hybrid car (soon to be replaced by an electric car) is now available in Kinross for anyone who would like to support this scheme. To register for car share go to www. movegreener.org/car-share.

Malcolm also talked about the electric bike sharing scheme to be launched this year. Electric bikes have become recently "the thing" as they open up cycling to all groups and abilities. Cost might be prohibitive to many, so KMGO e-bike sharing facility is an exciting progress in the local active travel. In addition to this KMGO have also plans to provide extensive information on local walking routes (maps and details).

Our second speaker, Kirsteen Ross, presented a passionate talk about wonderful local Cycling Without Age charity (known as trishaws). Kirsteen started trishaws to enable her mum to enjoy getting out and experience cycling, after she learnt about such an initiative in Copenhagen. This soon developed into a regular event for many other older people. Trishaws required lots of fundraising due to high cost for the electric specialized bikes, but Kirsteen was soon joined by a group of volunteers which helped to extend this service to many different people including families and disabled people. We learned about all positive social aspects of Cycling Without

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
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

Kinross and District Probus Club

The Paddle Steamer Waverley, presented by Ken Blacklock, 2 February 2022



Launched in 1947 after the original Waverley was sunk at Dunkirk, the new Steamer weighed in at 693 tonnes and was 240 feet long. She had a capacity of 1450 when built but, as regulations changed, this was reduced to 920. She remained in service on the Clyde until she was eventually laid up in Greenock by its operator Cal-Mac in 1974. That could have been the end of the Waverley but, thanks to the Preservation Society, she was rescued when they bought her for £1.

Ken had an ongoing association with the Waverley throughout his maritime engineering career and his involvement grew until he was finally appointed Chief Engineer. The Society set about restoring the ship and quickly realised that it was not going to be financially viable to only have a summer season sailing in the Clyde; adventures further afield would have to be found. Hitting the rocks at Gantock off Dunoon in 1977 didn't help, so a plan was put in place to ensure the financial future of the vessel.

In 1978 the Waverley sailed down to Liverpool and, in the following couple of years, down to Bristol and London. By extending the season and seeking out new markets in the south the Waverley became a major attraction.

It's a constant job keeping a vessel like the Waverley operational and Ken had his work cut out to make sure she was sea worthy and also that she met current environmental regulations. Investment in new and improved boilers in 1981 and again in 2001 and 2019 have kept the Waverley operational. Her new challenge however is finding trained and experienced engineers and Ken plays a key part in ensuring the Waverley and her crew are fit for purpose. For Ken it's been a lifelong association and one that isn't going to end anytime soon.

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




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Kinross in Bloom

The photo is of my present guide dog pup visiting Sainsbury's. She is five months old. She said 'hello' to the collection dogs and everyone heard her!



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

Matches had to be relocated for the first time in over 30 years as Bell's Sports Centre coaching hall was unavailable due to national badminton and table tennis championships.

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





Nature Comes Back To Life

spring is officially Here, although it might not feel like it! March can go either way — a warm, sunny introduction into the delights of spring or a wet, cold wintery month, it's pretty much a gamble! It is also a crucial month for the wildlife of Loch Leven NNR. Birds are pairing up all around — the ducks on the loch are courting and starting to think about nesting. Some birds will already be nesting, including herons and crossbills! The swans are setting up their territories and the mornings are accompanied by the early stages of the dawn chorus.

One of my early spring milestones is the sound of the first singing skylark. This beautiful song is one of the best songs in nature in my opinion. The complex song is full of rolling notes, whistles and chirrups at an extremely face pace, as they are singing they often display as well. They beat their wings extremely fast (12 times per second) as they rise vertically to heights of 60 metres. The saying 'up with the lark' comes from the early-rising of the skylark. This bird is known to rise early and is often one of the first birds that you hear if you are out at dawn. In Northern Europe, the long days mean that this bird is often herd singing at 3am - I guess the early bird does catch the worm!

When the weather turns milder, March is often the time I spot my first butterfly of the year. Normally, the first butterflies are ones that have over-wintered and hibernated – often looking a bit worse for wear. The usual first butterflies are the small-tortoiseshell or peacock, if you are lucky you may stumble across a comma. In March, they are often seen scampering around looking for any sources of nectar. In March these tend to be daffodils, snowdrops, lesser celandine, willow catkins or winter aconites.



As well as the butterflies, the bees also make a first appearance in March. Queen bumblebees awake from their hibernation after spending the entire winter underground. They have spent the winter using their stored energy and are now on the move for nectar while looking for a suitable nest site. Since moving to Kinross, the bumblebee I see most in early spring is the tree bumblebee. Tree bumblebee was first recorded in the UK in 2001 and was first recorded in Scotland in 2013. It has been marching northwards and is now a common sight in spring here.

Some of our long-awaited 'summer migrants' will be arriving during the course of the month. Look out for the

first osprey, sand martin and swallow! I cannot wait to see these much loved and iconic birds again over the loch. Look out for regular 'migrant updates' on our social media.

Latest wildlife highlights from the reserve include; a stoat in ermine, one wintering green sandpiper, two shorteared owls, three ravens, 300 pochard, 18 pintail and two kingfisher from the Burleigh hide.

servation organisations to help save curlews by providing good quality habitats at sites where curlew can thrive.

Other highlights this month have included regular sightings of kestrel, buzzard, peregrine, and a ring tail (female or juvenile) hen harrier. Short eared owls have also been seen sporadically around the wetlands and hillside path. Around the visitor centre and feeders, we have had some lovely sightings of treecreeper and goldcrest, as well as bullfinch amongst the regulars. Jays and sparrowhawks have been spotted around the feeders, and great spotted woodpecker has been heard 'drumming' from the car park.

On the reserve we have been using a big machine called a spoil spreader to open up some of our ditches and wetter areas. This helps to spread the soil away and creates lots of exposed mud for waders to feed. Our wonderful volunteer team have also been preparing the reserve for the breeding season by raising the flood pipes. This will hold back water from the wetlands and provide a larger area for birds to nest and raise their chicks. They have also been working on the island and rafts in front of the hides to make them suitable for nesting birds and give our visitors a great view of the nesting gull colony. We must also say a massive thank you to them for the tremendous job of replacing our pond dipping decking area with plaswood, made from recycled plastic.

The café is currently closed on Mondays and Tuesdays until further notice due to staff shortages. We hope to increase our capacity and get back open seven days a week soon, so watch this space! IT HAS BEEN ANOTHER great month for wildlife at RSPB Scotland Loch Leven. Such a mild January has kept the Wetland Trail from freezing over and maintained our wader numbers at good levels. Regular sightings of teal, wigeon, mallard, mute swan, whooper swan and gadwall have been reported.

A regular flock of around 150 curlews have been seen too, which is fantastic as these birds are in serious decline across the UK. Numbers of breeding pairs have halved since the mid-90s in the UK, and the UK hosts around a quarter of the total global breeding population, so it's really important to have places like Loch Leven for them to live. The RSPB is working hard with farmers, crofters, land-managers, and other con-

Gambolling On The Spring Lambs

OUR FIRST LAMBS ARE due just about when this *Newsletter* is published. By 1 March we should have a couple of newborns and hopefully by about the 10th most of the 100 ewes in our early lot will have lambed. The delivery window looks to be short; it will be a fast and furious few days for us all. With a third of this group expecting triplets we have had to feed treacle for the first time in a number of years and will be scrubbing up the automatic pet lamb feeder in readiness to take some of these lambs into our care.

We made a decision to spread out the rest of lambing in 2022, so a further 250 ewes are due from 9 of April, 200 gimmers (first time mums) from the 20th and the final 190 will lamb outside from about 8 May. It's an extended season and there are a number of reasons we thought we'd try it this way. Probably the biggest driver is grass growth, our traditional system of lambing the earlies in March, followed by remainder during the first two weeks of April was putting a lot of pressure on the grass causing us to rely more and more concentrate feeding and fertiliser to get the grass growing. Our neighbours lamb a little later which is more in tune with the natural growth for this area so it seems to make sense to go this way and let the power of nature in the form of increased sunlight and warmer days help the grass grow.

Tied in closely with new approach is the second reason for the change which is the rising cost of fertiliser. John mentioned the hike in prices in his last *Newsletter* column, since natural gas is a key component for producing ammonium nitrate, the current high cost is linked to the increased gas price. With this year's supply of fertiliser costing two and a half times more per tonne than last year, we have bought less and are going to try to apply it strategically in order to feed the same number of mouths throughout the summer. We are fortunate that due to regular applications of dung, our soils have good levels of Phosphate and Potassium. I've



also been applying regular limestone annually meaning the land is sitting at a reasonable pH level, hopefully laying a good foundation for grass growth without the need for as much top up from a bag. The last compelling reason is workload and with my poor health we are hoping a slow and steady approach might make it easier for my son to continue sheep farming in a more sustainable fashion for both livestock, land and shepherd.

Talking about sustainability, we carried out our first carbon audit last week and it revealed that 13 tonnes of CO2 equivalent is produced on our sheep farm in the agricultural processes that take place to keep the ewes and rear the homebred lambs plus some calves that we buy in.

The calculations suggest that we produce 26 tonnes of live-stock, 21,600kg of Scotch lamb that went straight into the food chain and 4400 kg of beef that went to other farms for fattening. That's at least 2200 people fed with our nutritious Scotch lamb with a further potential of another 600 plus meals from the beef animals once they are finished. I'll let you draw your own conclusion on the carbon cost of the production but to set it in context, my research tells me a family car produces about 2.2 tonnes, a return flight to New York produces 968 kg per passenger and the Formula One circuit generates an eye-watering 256,000 tonnes per season.

If we are lucky we will have a new winning formula for our farm, come through the season in one piece and reduce our small emissions slightly to do our bit for the environment.

A Chilli Spring

Greetings fellow gardeners! Well, that was a wet and windy winter wasn't it... and it's not over yet. As I sit here writing, trying to summon thoughts of spring, it's snowing... big fat disks of the stuff falling from the sky. So, I'll do my best with the first gardening column of 2022. Here goes.

What have I done so far this year? Well, I've got all my seeds for the year ahead, which I'll start sowing in mid-March in the heated propagator. I think I mentioned at the tail-end of last year that I was going to try to grow all my hanging basket plants from seed this year — well I have all the seeds, so we'll see how it goes. For those who are interested, I have: Swan River Daisy, Bidens, Diascia, Petunia Wave and Bacopa, and I'll chuck some over-wintered Begonias in the middle.

I've also sown my chilli seeds on a wee heat mat in the kitchen. Chillies have a long growing season and as we have fairly short summers in Scotland, the sooner you can get them growing, the better. They're an inch or so tall now so I've removed them from the heat mat and they're on the kitchen windowsill waiting for me to get my act together and pot them up. I'll keep them in the kitchen until probably the end of March

when I'll put in the greenhouse, with the heater on.

And that's all I've done gardening-wise so far this year... apart from wandering around the garden between rain and snow showers thinking about everything that needs done!

When it starts to warm up a wee bit, or stops snowing and blowing a gale, I'll be tidying up my pots and borders to take out any of last year's bedding plants and cut back all the perennials. It doesn't take that long and really makes such a difference to the tidiness; I just need to get around to it!

As I said, all my seeds for my baskets and borders will be started around mid-March in the propagator. You can use just about anything to sow seeds in – yoghurt pots, egg cartons, old meat and veg trays – as long as you can get a couple of inches of compost in it and poke holes in the bottom for drainage, it'll do as a seed tray. Three quarters fill your chosen container with compost, throw some seeds in and sprinkle some compost or vermiculite over the seeds. Put the container in a poly bag or cover with cling film and place somewhere warm and light to germinate. Once the seedlings have their first



set of true leaves (usually the second set of leaves), prick out into trays or cells of compost to grow on.

I'll also be starting my over-wintered Begonias off around mid-March. I've kept them in the back bedroom in paper bags over the winter and by mid-March they should start to sprout. These will be gently pressed into trays of compost (discarding any really soft corms) with the concave side up – the rounded, hairy side is the roots and should be placed downwards. They'll be water two or three times a week – I usually water around them to wet the compost, if water collects in the corm there's a danger of them rotting, and we don't want that!

So, from not knowing what to write about a wee while ago while looking out the window at the snow, it seems there's quite a bit to do! I shall leave you for this month and wish you happy and fruitful gardening — if the weather ever lets up!


