I agree with JHR Hampson [Letters, July 2024] that the present pricing structure for electricity in the UK is outrageous. But I absolutely do not believe that we should react to this by trying to stop wind farms. Instead we should be petitioning the new UK government to figure out urgently how the electricity pricing structure, which will be critical to our economic future, should be changed.

In addition, we should be installing solar panels on every new house built in Scotland and in the UK. I am usually disappointed, when looking at new housing developments, to see how few panels are installed. We need to do everything we can to avoid using nuclear power which leaves a terrible legacy to our children and grandchildren to look after the nuclear waste generated, and also poses a major accident threat which is orders of magnitude worse than any gas power station, gas plant or refinery.

### **New Fossoway Bus Service**

AFTER THE BEST part of a year campaigning to get improvements to the 202 Stagecoach Service we are pleased to confirm that, subject to Traffic Commissioner approval, following regular discussions between the Community Council, our elected Ward Councillors and PKC Transport, there will be a new bus service for Fossoway this year. With effect from 2 September award winning Glenfarg Community Transport Group will be taking over the route.

Full details of the new service will be published in due course,



but the intention is to provide an hourly service which will connect Tillicoultry to the 52 service on to Alloa and Stirling and in Kinross to the 55 service to Perth via the Community Campus.

We are really excited about this positive development for public transport in Fossoway and hope that everyone in the community will support this venture.

Glenfarg CTG will be making a pres-

entation on the new service before the start of our CC meeting on Tuesday 6 August at 7pm in Crook of Devon Hall to which all are welcome.

Our thanks to everyone involved and we look forward to the future service.



## GLENFARG BUS GOES FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

**GLENFARG COMMUNITY TRANSPORT'S** plan to take on the Kinross to Tillicoultry 202 bus service is now well advanced. The new service, which will be run as service 23, will start on Monday 2 September (subject to Traffic Commissioner approval) and provide eleven journeys per day in each direction. The reintroduction of the 23-route number is a nod to the service which ran for nine decades between Stirling and St Andrews, through West Kinross-shire, before it was withdrawn in 2021.

The 55 Bus won the Best Bus Service award at the Scottish Transport Awards in June because it had increased frequency, increased passenger numbers, improved passenger satisfaction and had demonstrated 'modal shift'. GCTG hope that this can be replicated on the 23 bus and indeed the two services will be totally connected. When the 55 arrives in Kinross from Perth/ Glenfarg, the same bus will run on as the 23 to Tillicoultry via Crook of Devon, Powmill, Blairingone and Dollar and these communities will be linked to the Campus, Milnathort, Glenfarg and Perth. On the return journey, the 23 will layover at the Park & Ride for 15 minutes to allow for a driver comfort stop and allow the potential for a quick supermarket visit for passengers before heading north as the 55. Eight journeys per day will operate to Perth via Glenfarg and the other three trips will terminate in Glenfarg. There will not be a break of service at lunch time the hourly service will operate throughout the day. Cash, credit cards and concession cards will be accepted on board.

The new service will allow connections with the 52 service to and from Stirling and Alloa in Tillicoultry, and the frequent mainline bus services at Kinross Park & Ride will make onward travel to the main cities possible. In Perth, connection will be possible with Stagecoach town and county services — Perth Royal Infirmary will be accessible with one easy connection at the Library or Mill Street.

A new low-floor 16-seat bus will arrive in August and the three buses will continually loop round the route with the first bus from Glenfarg via Kinross to Tillicoultry at 7am and the last bus arriving back in Glenfarg at 6.45pm. The first three months will operate as a pilot to make sure that the timings are correct and in October it is hoped to introduce a Booking App that will allow us to introduce some flexibility into the timetable (similar to the Ember services).

Glenfarg Community Transport Group is keen to emphasize that this is a community response to a transport problem and that the service is community led and owned. GCTG has been



working very closely with Fossoway Community Council and their Development Trust to design this service and will work very closely with the communities served. CCTG operates in a Public Social Partnership with Perth & Kinross Council and the bus services receive funding from the Council, Smarter Choices Smarter Places and several other initiatives. Work is ongoing through the Kinross-shire Transport Forum to work out ways of extending these benefits to other areas of the Shire.

Timetables will be on the website www.GlenfargCT.co.uk in late August and will be published in September's Kinross Newsletter.

### A LITTLE BIRDIE TOLD US...

THE NEW DRIVING RANGE on farmland at Burleigh Sands has been approved. The £3 million Burleigh Golf development will feature a 19-bay 300-yard driving field driving range with a cafe and golf shop, as well as putting and pitching green practice areas

It is expected to create 24 permanent jobs in addition to construction jobs. Parking for 47 vehicles is planned, as well as a covered space for 12 e-bikes. The plan is for the site to operate throughout the year from 9am to 9pm.

Planners had recommended councillors reject the application, saying it contravened the development plan, and that the loss of prime agricultural land and the potential impact on existing businesses were reasons to refuse. However, councillors spoke in favour of the development, arguing that the benefits outweighed the concerns. The application was approved by seven votes to six.

Almost 100 people attended the two consultation sessions held earlier this year, and feedback was largely positive. Most said it was appropriately sited and well designed. Locals also hailed the potential social, economic and community benefits, although some concerns were raised about the likely impacts on wildlife, traffic and flooding.

Roads investigations have concluded that 'the driving range is relatively small scale and will not be a major traffic generator.' The site is not deemed to be a flood risk either. The report says: 'Both Kinross and Milnathort Golf Clubs have been supportive of the driving range, which will operate in harmony with the golf clubs and not to their detriment.'

A spokesperson for the development said, 'We were delighted to learn that planning permission was granted for our proposed Burleigh Golf Centre. Detailed planning now starts in earnest with the hope of getting 'spades in the ground' before the end of the year.

'Our primary aim is to provide a top quality golf driving range to add to the recreational facilities in the local area but we aim to provide a much wider community benefit for walkers and cyclists, particularly those using the Loch Leven Heritage Trail.



'As a golf range, all 19 bays will be fitted with the world leading Toptracer ball-tracking technology with screens showing players instantly the direction and distance of every ball hit as well as a variety of practice drills, golf challenges and games. A key objective of the Burleigh Golf Centre team will be to encourage people of all ages (particularly children) who have never perhaps previously hit a golf ball to come and give it a try, with a number of golf professionals on hand to give tuition. If we are successful in encouraging more people to take up golf, local golf clubs such as Milnathort, Bishopshire, Kinross & Muckhart should benefit and we hope to work closely with them going forward.

'From the outset, we have been very aware of the location of the golf range being close to Loch Leven and we have always sought to minimise any potential impact. We were delighted that the PKC Planning Report quoted our Ecology and Landscaping plans as being an 'exemplar' with an estimated 52% Biodiversity Enhancement over the current site, thanks primarily to the wildflower meadows around the edges of the range, as well as some trees and a new pond.

Another core design aim was to make full use of solar power to make the facility energy positive for most of the year with a large array of panels on the roof. All equipment and machinery will be run off solar power with any surplus hopefully feeding into the grid. This includes robot mowers and ball-collectors criss-crossing the range 24/7. We also aim to install EV chargers in the car park offering heavily subsidised charging rates while you practice your golf and we are also in discussions to install

a secure covered e-bike cycle parking facility for a minimum of 12 cycles with e-bikes available for hire.

'Burleigh Golf Centre's location close to Burleigh Sands will hopefully also be of benefit to many in the local community who are not necessarily interested in golf. The TRACKS 2023 Visitor Survey reported that there now over 300,000 day visits to the Loch Leven Heritage Trail and that the most popular



place for people to join or leave the Heritage Trail (approx. 22%) was Burleigh Sands. Currently, there are no facilities (refreshments or toilets) at Burleigh Sands and only a small informal car park which is often full. Once Burleigh Golf Centre is open, visitors to Burleigh Sands and the Heritage Trail will be welcome to use the café and toilets and, to facilitate this, we will be constructing a new path as well as additional overflow car park for Burleigh Sands.'



### **MUIRS PAVILION COMPLETE**

THE KING GEORGE V Playing Field Management Committee is delighted that the major building extension works and refurbishment of the KGV's sports pavilion at the Muirs Playing Field in Kinross is now complete. A much-enjoyed gala dinner was held at the pavilion on 18 May to celebrate the opening of the new facilities.

The new ground floor extension has two team changing rooms with showers adding to the existing building's four. It also has a dedicated medical and physiotherapy room, a new referee's changing room and a non-binary changing room, both with their own showers. There are new toilets, one with accessibility access.

Upstairs, the house social area has been extended out over the new changing rooms, to provide a function space capable of accommodating larger functions and dinners of up to 120 people. It also provides viewing terraces overlooking the rugby and hockey pitches, and a large open terrace recreational space. A new accessibility toilet has also been added.

A new two-storey glazed frontage entrance atrium has been added enhancing the building's appearance and functionality, which houses a new accessibility lift giving wheelchair and pram access to the first-floor clubhouse social area.

The large extension to the car park will on match days and training days help relieve the traffic and parking congestion on the Muirs, especially near the junction with Springfield Road, and in neighbouring Muir Grove and Muirfield Grove.

A new sustainable urban drainage system (SUDS) hedgerow has been planted along the pitch-side edge of the car park to deal with rainwater run-off from the car park, and help prevent the water draining into the already overburdened sewage system.

The £400,000 project has been coordi-

nated by the KGV and funded by generous awards from several different national and local charities and organisations, including the Newsletter. It has also benefited from significant financial and much 'support in kind' from Kinross Rugby Football Club, who have taken a leading role in helping to deliver the project. In addition, the Kilted Christmas Tree Company kindly donated the machinery and manpower for the Project groundworks, and the Purvis Group generously donated the materials for the car park extension. The project benefited from the welcome advice and enthusiastic support of the four Kinross-shire Cllrs, who also arranged funding support from PKC.

Planning approval for the project was received just before lockdown but it wasn't until the spring of 2022 that the plans were dusted off and the project started in earnest. The foundations were laid in March 2023 and the major building works completed by December, with the internal work completed by this May.

From the outset the project aimed where practicable to use local trades and suppliers, and happily over 35 local businesses have supported it.

Moving forward, plans are in hand to install environmentally friendly heat pump and solar panel heating systems, and to improve the thermal insulation of the original building. There are also future plans to extend the

SUDS and habitat connectivity by including a small rewilding area and for the planting of new trees.

The pavilion social area and changing rooms are open for use by the wider Kinross-shire community, for community and private groups and social activities. By agreement with the KGV, the administration and maintenance of the whole of the pavilion is under the stewardship of the Rugby Football Club. Enquiries regarding booking any of the facilities should be made directly to the Club at kinrossrugby@gmail.com. A small negotiable fee may be charged for the use of the facilities to cover operating costs.

The new improved and refurbished pavilion is a welcome addition to the community and sports facilities in Kinross-shire.

# FOSSOWAY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT TRUST



THE FOSSOWAY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT Trust has now been in existence for just over two years (https://fossowaytrust. com/). They aspire to be the shared voice of their community through their members' engagement with the community; facilitating a consultation exercise to understand the challenges and opportunities of the Fossoway Community.

At their May 2022 meeting they agreed some short-term projects with clearly attainable goals, and now can provide an update on their progress which is as follows:

- 1) We have received funding from PKC Vacant Property Fund and Scottish Land Fund to work with consultants to explore the purchase of old Blairingone School and School house. The work will provide an options appraisal, feasibility study and business plan along with architectural assessment/options/ sketches, architectural drawings for chosen option. This will enable the Trust to make a fully informed decision on the financial sustainability of the school buildings and hence enable us to decide if we should purchase the property. The project will run from July 2024 to January 2025.
- 2) The Trust has been working with the Fossoway Primary School pupils to design future options for the Waulkmill play park. The children produced creative designs and the competition winners received vouchers provided by the
  - Trust. We hope to display winning posters on our stand at the Fossoway Gathering on 7 September. We are also raising funds to buy tables and benches for the park.
- 3) We have received funding from PKC for community engagement and to produce a Community Action Plan which will then be used to develop our Local Place Plan which will inform PKC local Development Plan 3. A survey will be delivered to all Fossoway households in August followed by a drop in Community Event on 17 November in the Crook of Devon Village Hall (2-5pm) where we will share the findings and vote on priority projects. Your voice matters so please fill in the survey online or by hand!

- 4) We have set up a working group with representatives from all our Halls to see how we can work together.
- 5) PKC have agreed to clean and upgrade the Crook of Devon War Memorial.
- 6) Discussions are ongoing with PKC regarding leasing the ground for a car park south of the Church cemetery extension in Crook of Devon.

We have active working groups progressing our longer-term projects:

- 1) Improve access to Rumbling Bridge gorge and replace lost footbridge over the Devon.
- Improve community transport, where we are working with Glenfarg Community Transport Group (https://glenfargct. co.uk/).

### MORE ROADWORKS IN PIPELINE

**ORIGINALLY SCHEDULED TO** start on 15 July, roadworks for A922 Muirs and B996 High Street, Kinross were delayed to allow more time for the works at Springfield Road to be completed, in order to avoid the two sets running concurrently.


This new set of roadworks is necessary for SGN gas mains installation works and is estimated to last for 12 weeks.

The works will affect parking and loading on 'A922 Muirs, Kinross from its junction with Loch Leven Community Campus (311618, 703569) to its junction with the B996 High Street (311807, 702641), a distance of 966.38 metres or thereby' and 'B996 High Street, Kinross from its junction with the A922 Muirs (311809, 702639) to its junction with Bell Gardens (311854, 702525), a distance of 121.55 metres or thereby.' (see map).

There will be traffic lights on the Muirs at the junction with Springfield Road when Springfield Road is still closed, however it is hoped that the works to the rest of the Muirs/High Street will be done after Springfield Road has been opened again to minimise disruption.

The works on the Muirs and High Street will be completed in phases, so there will not be a total road closure.

After suggestions from our local councillors to the roads department about the impact on local businesses and concerns about traffic flow, it is hoped that the works will begin at the North End of the Muirs working down towards the High Street, to avoid traffic congestion at the Burleigh Road junction which will be busy when the school term resumes again on Wednesday 14 August.

### **SARAH RANKIN COOKS**

I'M VERY EXCITED to be back at the Kinross Show on 10 August, doing a cooking demonstration with Perthshire Game. We'll be giving you some tips on purchasing, preparing and enjoying venison and I'll be sharing our recipes from the day in my September column.

In the meantime, just like our two days of summer, the elderflowers have now disappeared. Before their demise, I managed to make a stock of cordial I used as a basis for cocktails, sorbets, ice creams and even the odd sponge cake. But don't worry if you've missed them, their berries are starting to appear and make a fabulous ingredient too.

Elderberries are a superfood. High in antioxidants, they are generally believed to have health benefits, and have been



shown to improve heart health and reduce symptoms of colds and flu. You'll see a lot of preparations in health food shops containing elderberry extract.

Elderberries appear in the late summer

after the tiny, fragrant white flowers have died off. They grow in clusters of small, almost black, shiny pearls. You'll see them growing in hedgerows all around Kinross-shire. I collect the berries in bunches, wash them gently in cold water, and then remove the berries by dragging a fork along each stem. This is time-consuming, but by far the best way to prepare them without the kitchen looking as though a murder has taken place. You can get rid of the unripe berries by covering with cold water, the green berries will rise to the top and can be skimmed off. Drain the water away before using and do not eat the berries raw. This is an ingredient that requires cooking, as not doing so can cause some unpleasant stomach upsets.


### **ELDERBERRIES**

YOU WILL NEED: 500g elderberries caster sugar 1 star anise Juice of 1 lemon

### **ELDERBERRY SYRUP**

PLACE THE BERRIES in a pan with the star anise, and just cover with cold water. Bring up to a boil and turn down to a simmer for 20 minutes. Allow to cool and strain. Measure the amount of liquid you have and add an equal amount of caster sugar. Warm again and add the lemon juice and simmer for 10 minutes. Leave to cool. The resulting syrup can be used as a cough linctus, a drizzle for ice cream or as a mixer in cocktails.





### **ELDERBERRY SORBET**

TO MAKE A SORBET in an ice cream machine, churn for 45 -60 minutes. Or you can pour into a plastic container and pop into the freezer overnight. If you take it out a couple of times and break it up well with a fork during that process, the end result will be smoother.

### **ELDERBERRY MOJITO**

TO MAKE A FABULOUS Elderberry Mojito, add mint leaves to a tall glass and muddle with a teaspoon of granulated sugar. Add 50ml of white rum, drizzle over 25ml of elderberry syrup, and top with soda water and crushed ice.

# WORLD SCOUT JAMBOREE ...ONE YEAR ON!

IT'S HARD TO BELIEVE that a year ago I was in South Korea living an adventure like no other. I wanted to take this opportunity to share with you some of my experiences (good and bad) and to thank everyone who made it possible.

I am Heidi Sharples from 2nd Dollar Scout Group, and I was very fortunate to be selected to go to the 25th World Scout Jamboree – it had promised to be action packed, a whole new cultural experience and have opportunities to meet lots of people from different countries and cultures.

Before I got to travel, I had two year's worth of fundraising which everyone in the community of Kinross very generously supported me with – they bought cakes, came on one of my walks (pictured below), let me look after their pets, attended car boot sales, and bought raffle tickets to name just a few things. Alongside fundraising I attended four training camps with my fellow scouts – we were to be Unit 5 – the Kilted Kelpies.

The plan was to travel to Seoul via Amsterdam and spend 7 days in the capital acclimatising and soaking up the culture. Then we were to spend the next 11 days on a massive camp site with 43,000 other scouting participants from 158 countries.

#### What Happened In Reality

SOUTH KOREA HAD the hottest summer they had experienced for 5 years and just before we flew out had torrential flooding. Scouts, being scouts, were not put off and planned to sleep on plastic crates and dig trenches around their tents to manage the situation. The days spent in Seoul were hot, fun and we were all highly anticipating the camp to come. Highlights included visiting the Demilitarised zone (DMZ – the armed border between South and North Korea), eating the best Korean BBQ foods, going into the biggest library I've ever seen and meeting other people from a range of

countries around the capital all wearing their unique neckers.

The day to go to camp was not to be – the camp site was not ready so there was a delay of 24 hours (a bit concerning, and we should







have seen the signs!). We eventually arrived a day later than expected after a bus journey of four hours. We were able to attend the brilliant opening ceremony which showcased the best of South Korea (K-Pop bands, taekwondo performances and drones). The







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President of Korea was present, and so was none other than Bear Grylls (who gave an impressive motivational speech).

The next day was fun, and, as it was so hot (in excess of 47°C and 97% humidity) we got to spend time in the water where there were massive floats. This helped to cool us off before the evening activities of preparing food and meeting with other scouts around the camp site.

The next day everything changed - the weather was getting hotter, the sanitation wasn't coping with demand, the food was lacking and so many people got heat stroke the medical facilities couldn't cope.

The very sad decision was made for the UK, USA, and Singapore to leave the next day in a hopeful attempt that the resources available will be sufficient for the remaining participants. Who knew that three days later a typhoon was set to crash into the campsite - so now EVERYONE had to be evacuated and fast. All the British Scouts had been accommodated back in Seoul in hotels and were able to continue to experience the rich and diverse culture.

I came back, not necessarily with the experience I was hoping for but with a new gained confidence, knowing I can handle challenges and can independently manage miles away from the comfort at home. I have remained in the Scouting movement by volunteering to help with the Scouts on a weekly basis and becoming an Explorer scout. By the time you read this I will have completed my next adventure: a two-

week Jamborette at Blair Atholl with a whole new group of people.





#### **Perth and Kinross Wonder Mix**

AS PART OF our ongoing commitment to tackling the climate and biodiversity crisis, we are taking forward the Grow Wild for Perth and Kinross initiative to create more space for nature by letting grass and native plants grow and flower.

To support this, the Council's Westbank Nursery has been developing Wonder Mix, a mixture of native shrubs and herbaceous plants, grown in-house at the Nursery from locally produced seed and cuttings.

Community organisations can then use the plants and seeds in local green spaces to support native wildlife to flourish and, at the same time, do their part to contribute to an improved environment for everyone to enjoy and benefit from.

### Davies Park and Well Green Playpark Upgrades

THESE TWO PLAYPARKS have been due to be upgraded for some time. The works have been delayed as the Scottish Government has set aside funding to help



pay for playpark upgrades across Scotland, which, whilst being a good thing, the knock-on effect has been that the contractors who normally do this work have been inundated with requests for quotes. This has meant that prices have increased, so the Council is now looking to get local contractors involved in quoting for the work. Because of tendering rules, this has meant that the quotes must be "quality scored", thereby leading to a delay. I will keep the pressure on!

#### **Tayside Contracts**

AT THE MOST recent Perth and Kinross Council meeting, I was appointed as the Council's lead on the work done by Tayside Contracts in the area.

Tayside Contracts does a lot of different works for the Council, including road repairs, construction work, street cleaning, school meals, road crossing patrols, facilities management, janitorial staff, plus many other things. It is an interesting company in that it is not only part of Perth and Kinross Council but is also part of Angus and Dundee City Councils.

With the tightness of budgets across all the Councils, we are now looking to update the way that the Councils work together with a view to finding efficiencies and savings. I also want to see improvements to the work done in Kinross-shire, which does not appear to have the same quality of work done to it as places like Perth. For example, pothole filling in Kinross-shire appears to consist of chucking in some fill and tramping it down, whereas Perth has the potholes cut out and filled properly. I don't think this will be an easy appointment!

#### **Additional Support Needs**

I SAID LAST month that I would write a fuller piece this month on Additional Support Needs and the work I am doing at the Council to improve things. This work is ongoing, so I will not update you this month, but will revisit it shortly.

### Planning (again)

I have written a few times about planning and my concerns at the way it works in Scotland. In essence, it is my view that local democracy is being undermined by the regulations attached to the planning process. I have noted the comments from members of the public concerning the refusal by the Council of the ALDI application and the approval of the golf-driving range application. I am bound by a code of conduct, which prevents me commenting on officer's decisions, so I will not do so. All I can say is that officers must interpret planning law when reaching their decisions, in addition to this, as a member of the planning committee, I am bound by additional rules, so for example the code of conduct states that I will not 'in advance of the decision-making meeting, attempt to influence employees to adopt a particular position'. I find this very challenging.

What I will say is that Kinross-shire needs a discount store.

#### **Road Conditions in Crook of Devon**

I HAVE RECEIVED complaints about the state of some of the roads in Crook of Devon, particularly Waulkmill and the surrounding access routes. I paid a visit for a walkabout, and the roads and



infrastructure do seem to be in poor condition, much worse than in many other areas. In addition to the usual potholes, the road surfacing is decaying at the edges in parts, and the walls are also crumbling. I have raised this issue with PKC to see if something can be done to upgrade the roads. I believe it is beyond repair and in need of a full upgrade, but I have asked officers for their views.





### **Speeding at Mawcarse**

AN ISSUE THAT has arisen is speeding along the B919 at Mawcarse. Residents have reported vehicles driving too fast. The current limit is 40 mph. Areas like this will not automatically be included in the national 20 mph rollout, but the council is currently reviewing settlements like this to see if they should be included. Sometimes in these situations, it can be a case of people driving too fast, which is a police matter, and in other cases, they are following the speed limit, but the limit is deemed too high by residents. Nonetheless, I will raise this with the road safety team at PKC to see what options there might be. I have also raised it with the local police to see if speed monitoring might be an option for this stretch of road.

### Speeding on Hatchbank Road

SIMILARLY, ALONG Hatchbank Road between Gairneybank and Carsegour, I have received complaints of speeding and suggestions about making this road a walking/cycling-friendly road. I use this road quite frequently and know it well. I will raise this with the PKC road safety team with a view to reviewing the signage and speeds.

#### **Kinross-shire Transport Forum**

I ATTENDED A productive meeting of the Transport Forum at the community campus a few weeks ago. It was great to have representatives from the public, PKC staff, and community councils to discuss Kinross-shire-wide transport issues. We heard directly from local residents about their needs, and there was really constructive dialogue about how some areas, such as Cleish and Portmoak, might be able to adopt some of the systems that have been used in Glenfarg for their community transport. I also raised a concern about the limited taxi provision in the area.

#### Mill Street

the street, I fully agree with this assessment. I will be arranging a site visit with Council officers to see what can be done to greatly improve the visual appearance of Mill Street (pictured).





### **Back Loan, Milnathort**

THERE WAS A recent request for double yellow lines to be installed on the narrowest section of Back Loan. This has been asked for before but was rejected by the majority of local householders. I put out a street letter to find out what residents views are now to the proposal for double yellow lines. The response was overwhelmingly against their introduction. People felt that cars parked in the street helped to slow traffic and also that parking availability was already at a premium in the village centre.

### **Pavement Parking**

THE INTRODUCTION of the national ban on pavement parking will be rolled out in Perth & Kinross this autumn. Council officers have been carrying out assessments of all the streets throughout Perth & Kinross to see what the likely impact of this new legislation will be. If there are streets which become impassible for through vehicles when people park on the road rather than partly on the pavement then it is likely double yellow lines will be considered to prevent parking altogether. I think this should be the last resort. The majority of narrow streets are residential and it is important that residents have access to places to park.

WITH THE SCOTTISH Parliament now in recess it is time for MSPs to spend much more time in their constituencies and regional areas, supporting local events and the agricultural shows.

That said, the recent General Election also provided plenty opportunity to meet

our constituents and to listen to their concerns and that includes so many people across our rural communities who often feel a bit left out of mainstream politics. Safe to say, that during extensive visits to our smaller villages, hamlets and farms, I gained significant insight into the main issues facing rural dwellers.

One recurrent theme was the state of grass verges. Perth and Kinross Council has taken the decision to reduce the frequency of grass cutting which, as many will have noticed, has led to a surge of long grass alongside roads. Many constituents commented that, as part of the council 'Grow Wild' scheme, several of our green spaces and parks have faced the same neglect. The scheme is advertised as seeking to boost biodiversity but sometimes that achieves very little other than making our villages and hamlets look a complete mess. And local people who care and take pride in their community are very concerned that the value of their properties will have diminished, putting off potential house buyers.

Aside from the visual aspect, it was also put to me that such neglect encourages vermin in our streets and inviting ticks into areas where children are playing and where dogs are being walked.

I would invite readers who have been affected by this change to share with me their views on the matter.

At the time of writing, parliament is just about to break up for summer recess, which will give me more time to explore even more of these new areas.



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

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# LORD KELVIN

### WINNING WAYS

RECENTLY I HAVE re-read, and listened to - courtesy of the Libby App, free audio books from the library - the wonderful Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus. This book has been a bestseller for a few years now, and has at its heart an intriguing main character, who is an uncompromising chemist. Life throws her a few curved balls, and she ends up hosting a cooking programme called 'Supper at Six'. However, she will not compromise her belief that cooking is chemistry, hence the title of the book. This makes her character unpopular with the producers, but very popular with her fans.

I have often thought that a little knowledge of chemistry would help, when my non-cooking husband boils potatoes and spaghetti in small pans, and is surprised when they boil over. 'Water expands when heated,' I say, 'Simple chemistry my dear!' The sarcastic advice usually flies well over his head. I was minimally interested in chemistry at school, and loved mucking about with experiments and Bunsen burners.

That school was in the North West end of Glasgow and not far from Glasgow University. If you know that part of Glasgow, you will know that you can't go far without hearing the word Kelvin. River Kelvin, Kelvinside, Kelvin Hall, Kelvin College ... on and on it goes.

I was delighted to read the other day about Lord Kelvin for whom the bicentenary has just passed. There is a simple plaque to him in Westminster Abbey, where he rests, next to Sir Isaac Newton.


Kelvin was a very clever chap. He was born in 1824 in Ireland, one of seven children. His mother died when he was six, and his father a Glaswegian, moved the family back to Glasgow. Kelvin attended Glasgow University when he was only 10. After graduating, he spent time in Cambridge and Paris, returning to a Professorship in Glasgow, where he worked for 53 years. He is best known for inventing the international system of absolute temperature. The Kelvin Scale bears his name. He retired at 75, and returned to the University as a student, becoming the oldest student

to enrol there, always questing more knowledge. Interestingly, he was wrong about lots of ideas. He thought the idea of x-rays was nonsense, that heavy machines would never get off the

ground, and that the idea of radio was just a dream. However, his house was the first house in Glasgow to be lit completely by electricity and he was the main player in the laying of the transatlantic cable between Ireland and Newfoundland. Queen Victoria and President Buchanan were the first heads of state to speak through that cable. Lord Kelvin was a busy traveller, as he crossed the Atlantic 50 times in pursuit of laying that cable at a cost of millions of pounds. was the only way progress can be made.

He was a non-stop inventor, seeker and student, but also What can we learn from a mostly forgotten person, who has actually had an enormous unacknowledged impact on our lives. His name caught my attention, and I was delighted to discover his extraordinary non fiction life, unlike Elzabeth Zott, the highly entertaining fictional heroine of Lessons in Chemistry. Both fascinating characters in their own way.

# Fossoway Community Council Extraordinary General Meeting, July 2024

**Present At The Meeting** on 9 July were: CCllrs S Bruce-Jones, T Lamb, and N Marchant (Chair); Assoc CCllr C Farquhar; Cllr R Watters; 24 members of the public (MoP) (18 from Fossoway District and 6 outside of Fossoway District).

**Apologies:** CCIIr A Cheape, A Carter, G Pye; CIIr D Cuthbert, N Freshwater, W Robertson

CCIIr Marchant thanked everyone for coming to this EGM which has been called to consult and agree response to the Brunt Hill wind farm planning application. Special thanks to the CC who have reviewed application along with Cameron Brown and Kaye Williamson.

The CC has an agreed extension to the deadline for comments to 26 July 2024.

The CC have received copies of 22 objections sent via email; 14 from Fossoway District, 3 outside of Fossoway District and 5 location unknown.

CCIIr Marchant pointed out that the CC is apolitical and asked everyone to respect this.

Cllr Marchant detailed the process that the CC had used to draft our response, which was:-

 Information from the Fossoway and District Wind Farm survey that was delivered to all 959 households in November 2023. The report was shared with the community in January 2024 and is published on our website

- Reports from the Big Place Conversations that took place in Powmill, Carnbo, Crook of Devon Village Halls in Summer 2023
- Guidance from Planning Aid Scotland on what are considered meaningful objections
- As a result of analysis of all these factors the FDCC intends to object to the application
- We have only included comments where we have an evidence base to support the statements
- We have focused on the following areas for basing our objection: -
  - Objection Landscape Contravenes Scottish Government Onshore wind turbines planning advice 28 May 2014 (PAN), NPF4 Policy 11 e) ii & xiii. and PKC Policy 33 (a)
  - o Objection Inadequate mitigation
    - · Traffic and Noise
    - Wildlife and Environment
    - Safeguarding Local Cultural Heritage
    - No Assessment on Impact to Local Businesses

MoPs were then given time to read the proposed response after which there was an in-depth discussion of the presented paper. A series of amendments were agreed with the MoPs who supported the objection to the Brunt Hill wind farm planning application. The CC agreed to revise the paper and submit it to the ECU on behalf of Fossoway District.

# Kinross Community Council News from the June Meeting

**Present At The Meeting** on 25 June were: CCllrs L McKay, S Wells, W Freeman, C Willsher, P Chan and K Spain, Cllrs D Cuthbert and W Robertson, six MoP and minute-taker Mrs C Aird.

**Apologies:** CCllrs B West, E Leslie, T Stewart, Cllrs R Watters and N Freshwater.

### **Matters Arising**

Cllr Robertson advised that he had met with representatives from Tracks and PKC with regard to the creation of a safe walking/cycle route next to the A91 and commented that this would not be considered until there was safe access across the bridge. Both organisations are looking at options for this. Discussion around the parking at the tennis courts/Station Road would be deferred until the next meeting.

The issues with regard to the marquee at the Green Hotel had been resolved after CCllr McKay, CCllr Willsher and the chair of the resident's association had met with the owner. While there had been a few minor incidents following the meeting, these had been dealt with quickly. Members were aware that a licensing application had been submitted to PKC.

HM King's Portrait – suggestions were requested for a suitable place to hang the portrait with a member of the public suggesting either the Day Centre or the fountain.

### **Kinross Town Centre**

CCIIr McKay commented that the bollards were now back in place in the High Street, although it was commented that a member of the public had witnessed someone crash into a bollard, although it was not badly damaged.

Cllr Cuthbert suggested that the CC issue a questionnaire to residents asking for suggestions of what they would like to see in the centre of town. CCllr Mckay advised that she had recently spoken to visitors who had advised her that they had never seen the town look so bad.

The issue with the street sweeper should be resolved now.

A member of the public raised the issue of traffic calming at the opposite end of the High Street and Cllr Cuthbert advised that this had previously been investigated but would result in bus stops being moved.

A member of the public raised concerns with regard to the two vans parked at Koronkas and was advised by Cllr Robertson that this had issue had previously been reported to PKC due to sight issues. One van had previously been removed a number

of years ago but had quickly been replaced by another. CCIIr Wells suggested a compulsory purchase order be raised to purchase the land but was advised that residents had a right of way to use the land to access their property.

It was noted that the parking restrictions beyond the Indian restaurant had been removed, and CCIIr Wells wished to place on record her thanks to the Councillors.

A member of the public raised concerns about the lack of parking in the High Street area, advising that they had received a fine of more than £100 for parking in Greens and commented that if people cannot get parked, then they will go elsewhere for their shopping.

### KCCNL

CCIIr Freeman advised that the following grants had been awarded by KCCNL at their recent meeting:

Kinross Writing Group £200 Kinross High School £1250 Fossoway Horticultural Society £500

### **Brunt Hill Wind Farm**

CCIIr Mckay advised that KCC had received a number of emails objecting to the proposed wind farm at Brunt Hill and following a conversation with concerned residents the previous weekend, had asked for the item to be discussed at the meeting. She opened the meeting to the members of the public who were present for this item.

A member of the public advised that this was a national application and whilst the proposals had been around since 2023, many local people are unaware of the proposals. There had been no strategic notification or consultation regarding the impact of the wind farm and they were present to discuss the matter further and see what could be done. The concerned residents advised that Milnathort and Fossoway Community Councils have both contacted PKC to request an extension to the deadline for submitting comments, with Portmoak CC advising that they had not been included in the consultation. Cllr Robertson advised that he had attended Portmoak CC meeting earlier in the month where they had voted to object to the proposals, due to the visual effect on the area.

It was agreed that the proposals would affect everyone and CCIIr Mckay confirmed that CC members had not received a lot of information on the proposals but having discussed the matter between themselves, had agreed that they were happy to request an extension, or submit an objection. CCIIr Willsher commented that he had not found anyone in favour of the development and did not think there was enough room for both this proposed development as well as the Craighead development. The proposal for a wind farm was a good one, but just not in the proposed location and he was happy to support an objection.

Cllr Cuthbert commented that the DPEA had asked to take three applications at the one time (this proposal, Craighead and Windburn) and reporters would look at the designation of things in the area before deciding. He also commented that Mike Barnacle had written a letter a few days ago expressing concern and he would forward this to CCllr Willsher.

A member of the public also raised concerns with regard to 'flickering' when the sun sets as well as when the red aviation lights are lit as well as the adverse impacts on tourism, community health and wellbeing, ecology, to name but a few. Cllr Cuthbert advised members of the public that any letters of objection need to be unique – two very good letters of objection are better than 200 repeated letters.

In response to a question from CCIIr Freeman with regard to Craighead Wind Farm, a member of the public advised that the turbines would be the same size as Brunt Hill, but there would be less of them.

In response to a question from a member of the public about who else they could gather support from, or speak to about the proposals, ward Councillors advised them to speak to Debbie Flaherty (ECU), Gillian Martin, MSPS/MPs.

A member of the public also advised that they had written to the land owners (Archbishop of York and Archbishop of Canterbury) expressing their concerns.

KCC members took a vote to determine whether to submit an objection and this was agreed. It was agreed that if CCIIr Willsher could gather enough information to submit an objection by the deadline of 28 June, he would do so, otherwise he would request an extension to the deadline in order to submit an objection.

### **Planning Matters**

### **Applications Received**

24/00740/FLL change of use and alterations to agricultural building and flat to form a dwellinghouse at Coach House, Lethangie, Kinross. Members noted this application and expressed surprise at this due to the building being listed.

### **Applications Determined**

24/00568/FLL installation of replacement door at 158 High Street, Kinross, approved.

23/01349/FLL part change of use and alterations to building to form 10 short-term let accommodation units at 54 - 56 High Street, Kinross, approved.

### **Other Planning Matters**

Cllr Robertson raised a concern with regard to the land at the bottom of the High Street where a fence had been erected and which subsequently blocked access to the old railway line and to which PKC had not been able to enforce the decision. Cllr Cuthbert suggested that KCC write to PKC asking them to reinforce the decision to remove the fence at the lorry park.

### **Reports from PKC Councillors**

**Clir Cuthbert** advised that a meeting of the Kinross-shire Community Transport Forum was arranged for Thursday where the change of policy with regard to minibuses would be discussed. This was an open meeting and anyone who wished to attend should contact Clir Cuthbert direct.

**Clir Robertson** highlighted drainage issues which had been caused by the recent heavy rain, including two drains in Station Road which had seized closed. He asked residents to report any issues with drains in the town to PKC or the councillors know.

Cllr Robertson also advised that he had received several complaints with regard to hedges/bushes growing over payments and therefore increasing problems for prams/ wheelchairs/visibly challenged and asked residents to cut back any bushes as soon as possible. CCllr Willsher advised he had previously reported this problem to PKC but nothing

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had been done. He was asked to re-report the issue and copy Cllrs Cuthbert and Robertson into the email. A member of the public also highlighted an issue with excess water just after Balado Bridge at Turfhills and suggested that diverts needed to be cut into the grass in order to release this. Cllr Robertson agreed to report this.

CCIIr Mckay commented on the height of the grass at junctions (specifically mentioned Gairneybank) and asked if PKC could arrange to cut this back, as it was difficult to see vehicles, particularly motorbikes. CIIr Robertson advised that PKC had taken a decision to only cut grass verges twice a year and in response to a question from CCIIr Freeman, confirmed that members of the public could cut the verges, if they so wished. A member of the public asked if PKC had any say on core paths and how do they ensure that these will be maintained (at the proposed wind farm). CIIr Robertson advised that residents should write to PKC (copying in CIIrs Cuthbert and Robertson) — it was agreed that the CC would write to PKC.

### **Reports from CC Representatives**

CCIIr Freeman asked if there was an update on The Boat House re-opening and was advised that it had been purchased by Kinross House with a view to reopening next year.

CCIIr Mckay reported that she had spoken to the owners of Kinross House to ask if they would open the gardens to the public but they had declined to do so.

CCIIr Wells asked if the new sign at the Premier Store was appropriate (colours of sign) given it was in a conservation area and was advised to check with PKC Planning Department. A similar question was raised about Greens and it was agreed that CCIIr Wells would check re planning.

CCIIr Wells also asked for clarity on who was responsible for removing the obsolete brown tourist signs, e.g., at the Boat House and the Cashmere Factory. Cllr Robertson suggested writing to PKC, copying in himself and Cllr Cuthbert, and it was agreed that CCIIr Wells write to Cllr Robertson who would forward the correspondence to PKC.

CCIIr Mckay also questioned whether PKC would be painting the zigzags at the primary school during the summer holidays and was advised that this was unlikely as PKC are prioritising work on the A93/A94.

### **Licensing Applications**

Members were advised that the beer tent had applied for a permanent licence, although this had not been discussed at the Board. It was agreed that more details on the application were required.

The next meeting of Kinross CC will be held on Tuesday 27 August 2024 at 7.30pm in the Masonic Hall. All are welcome to attend.



# Portmoak Community Council News from the June Meeting

**Present At The Meeting** held on 11 June were Cllrs W Robertson; Cllrs A Miller, D Morris, A Davidson, S McGregor, K Donaldson, D Paterson; Mark Craig Police Liaison and Ashley; and 1 MoP.

### **Matters Arising**

Kinross-shire Committee update, and Kinross-shire Active Travel Master Plan: Cllr D Morris had produced a very concise and detailed document in reply to the Kinross-shire Active Travel Master Plan to be incorporated into the master plan. D Morris clarified that for the previous meeting in March the Chair and Vice-Chair had been unable to connect as the wrong contact email address had been circulated. The essence of the work Dave had done was to clarify there should be offroad routes all the way around Loch Leven with appropriate mitigations e.g. Kinnesswood in certain areas as a top priority e.g. a crossing at the Kinnesswood Village Shop. Looking at Transport Scotland are proposing a new Aviemore to Carrbridge walking and cycling route and this was very much the direction of funding for active travel. Questions will be fielded to ARUP via D Morris. Final document will come before KLC in August. Chair thanked D Morris for his clarity and knowledge and time in preparing the information. Query on whether the response should be circulated to Portmoak Community at this stage, but it was felt at this stage that PCC could field a response to ARUP with cc to Cllrs. Cllrs asked D Morris to resend his comments and response to ARUP as the files had been blocked by PKC IT restrictions due to the size.

Road Safety Action Update: Speedwatch campaign has been live for a couple of weeks, MOCC coordinating that. Allan at MOCC reports uptake has been quite slow. The Facebook website address is as follows for updates and information <a href="https://www.facebook.com/profile.php?id=61558727684719">https://www.facebook.com/profile.php?id=61558727684719</a> and if interested in volunteering please email <a href="mailto:speedwatch.ks@gmail.com">speedwatch.ks@gmail.com</a>. Once volunteers are registered MOCC are prepared to come and do a presentation at the village hall to explain next steps.

In terms of recent road safety anecdotally there appears to be a great number of motorbikes travelling the A911 often at high speed.

Minuted items from May 24 PCC meeting included requests for school road crossings and whether or not to petition PKC to address these. Obviously, there are other road safety items recently confirmed as priorities to PKC and as yet unactioned, so new requests need to sit alongside the existing items and be prioritised accordingly.

**Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path:** Chair had met onsite with Cllr W Robertson and Dave Stubbs (Greenspace, PKC), and Nick Mainprize (TRACKS) and looked at options for feasibility study for the path. There is some movement

forward with this feasibility study which will give access to supplementary funding. Chair has issued notification to all the relevant land owners to appraise them of the feasibility study. Nick and Dave agreed to look at funding streams for the study and PCC are happy to tap into their expertise on this front. Cllr W Robertson agreed this was a good synopsis of the meeting, positive of finding a way forward. Chair felt that some traction had been gained. Feel sure that the Community would support any movement forward. PCC to await updates and hopefully have some news for July PCC meeting.

Play Facilities at Scotlandwell Green: The Chair had seized the opportunity at meeting with N Mainprize to discuss this item. N Mainprize was apologetic for the situation and for the delays that had been caused and the upset for the gala arrangements. This was felt to have been unavoidable at the time. The reasons for delay had been minuted at the June PCC meeting. Everyone has been very patient. No update on the dates for work starting. Concerns to avoid the same delays happening again in 2024 or 2025 due to excessive wet weather.

Portmoak Church – The Future For The Church And Car Park: The Chair had seen correspondence relayed to PCC from Kinnesswood Development Trust (KDT): the Community right to buy application has been approved by Scottish Government ministers in the last weeks. KDT will try to get an indicative valuation on the site once the gala arrangements were finished. Start funding applications soon. KDT may try to agree a reduced purchase of the part of the car park to allow parking for any future owners of the church building.

**Sustainability Group Meeting:** the Secretary was due to attend a Renewables Sustainability Group (RSG) meeting on 19/06/24. No update until July PCC meeting.

The Vice-Chair emphasised the need to not mix up the Planning with the entirely separate project to combine information and expertise within the RSG. Planning discussions for Windfarm applications have to be kept completely separate. The RSG is a collective of affected CCs who are pooling resource and knowledge to be best prepared if planning is granted for windfarm projects, and as such the RSG was a completely neutral group. Some local CCs have experience of involvement with wind farm projects in recent years and there was a wealth of knowledge and information that could be shared to ensure preparation for the best outcomes for all affected communities, if planning was granted and funds made available for community benefit. Each CC could represent its community in objection against or in support of the windfarms through the Planning process. Individuals could also object or support directly within the planning framework.

Scotlandwell Footpath Between Wellside Park & The Green: W Robertson had clarified that there is a meeting onsite on 25/06/24 to discuss SUDS provision and if all is ok then PKC will adopt Wellside Park road. The Chair felt this was a positive outcome. Regarding the footpath that is not being maintained by PKC: a small amount of extension work has been done but this does not demonstrate ownership, adoption or responsibility. It appears the path may be under ownership of some or all the Wellside residents. Residents have held off on repairs to date awaiting clarification on this point, but now it seems the responsibility is not that of PKC, but it may be a cooperative cost to do the upgrade. Cllr D Paterson commented that many non-residents of Wellside Park and suggested that other residents or funding streams could potentially contribute to some extent. Residents should be able to use the access to the park. The Chair suggested that Scottish Water should ensure that ironworks are well maintained along paths. Cllr W Robertson suggested in other circumstances Scottish Water have a precedent with upgrading ironworks on private paths. Cllr Robertson felt it would be useful for affected Wellside Park residents to contact Scottish Water to request assistance on

this issue. Preplanning had suggested that if road was adopted then the path would be adopted, however, later missive docs later when houses were transferred have shown that the path is non-adopted.

### **New Matters**

Arnot reservoir Woodland creation, Scottish Water: PCC had communicated with Bell Ingram to invite them to attend the PCC June meeting. PCC were in principle in support of the application, particularly the native broadleaf planting. Planting to take place towards the end of 2024. No comments from PCC. Vice-Chair queried why PCC were being consulted, the Secretary clarified that Bell Ingram had informed that the 1-hectare project was a Scottish Water was part of net-zero initiative being part funded by the Forestry Grant scheme and were contacting PCC as part of the stakeholder process. Secretary to email Bell Ingram to say PCC were in principle in support of the project.

### Reports

### **Police Reports**

Mark Craig and Ashleigh Duncan from Police Scotland provided an update. There had been some anti-social behaviour from campers at Loch Leven Sluice house with damage to garden hedging. Dangerous driving on B9097 6/6/24 involving a single car overturned in a field and the driver charged. Also an accident in Scotlandwell on 3/6/24 with an RTC and a car on its roof, no one was significantly injured. Police apologised for being unable to attend the gala day but there had been a lot on that day that had prohibited their attendance. The Chair asked if any traffic speed monitoring provision had been made in the Bowhouse area as discussed in May PCC meeting? M Craig confirmed that there was a large patrol matrix in the area but could not confirm if the local officer patrols had been out and about around Portmoak, though they do get out to Portmoak when they can. D Paterson raised an issue regarding cyclists from clubs travelling in large clustered groups, sometimes 5 cyclists abreast, between Ballingry and Scotlandwell and the obstacle they posed when travelling then slowly up the hill from Scotlandwell. M Craig highlighted cyclists are entitled to use the road and to form a pelaton, but must adhere to the rules of the road and groups should not be impacting the other side of the road and traffic approaching. M Craig suggested if specific clubs could be identified and relayed through the police liaison, he would be amenable to having a conversation with the club concerned. The Chair validated D Paterson's comments having also seen large groups of cyclists as described which were difficult to pass.

### **Planning**

### **New Applications**

### 24/00716/ECU36 Windfarm at Brunt Hill

Up to 18 turbines, 10 up to 200m tip height and 8 up to 185m tip height and includes a battery energy storage system (up to 50MW) and ancillary infrastructure including foundations, crane hardstandings, met mast and aviation lights, substation and control building.

The Chair outlined the application details. The Vice-Chair had provided a detailed response in objection to the application. The Chair expressed reservations about the height of the turbines and the siting and as such his support was waning for such on-shore turbine projects. The Ochils were becoming saturated with turbines. The Chair did not think he could wholeheartedly support this project, but as a Community

Council it was necessary to represent the Community. Two objections had been received regarding the Brunthill application. The Chair considered onshore wind turbines were a short term fix, and were great when they were working and generating, but only had a 25yr lifetime. The Brunthill turbines would ideally be sited offshore. If we are to go forward need to decide as a CC whether we are going to oppose the application or not and invited comment. Secretary felt that though there was an energy crisis such huge turbines were best sited offshore like the huge off-shore windfarm on the coast of East Sussex in Brighton. Also with consideration to the transmission of power, infrastructure would almost inevitably go through Portmoak to Westfield for power storage and transmission to other parts of the UK. Flicker was a legitimate complaint that would also affect a large number of properties across Portmoak. Cllr K Donaldson referenced the turbine height at Westfield is just over 110m, so the Bruntfield ones would be almost twice their height. Cllr D Paterson was similarly in basic opposition, the height was unsafe from a small aircraft height and shouldn't be allowed on-shore requested that the Vice-Chair include this also in any comment. Cllr A Davidson gueried the PKC criteria for valid objections, and thought that safety was one of those, but possibly not visual impact. The Vice-Chair thought that visual impact and cumulative effect in an area would be considered as objections. Also, that the project was extraneous and not needed in the context of the 420GW waiting to be connected to the grid from existing windfarm projects. The Vice Chair thought there existed in terms of ScotGov policy a general presumption in favour of windfarms, but instead there ought to be a general presumption in favour of smaller wind-turbines of up to 50m for communities and farms. The Chair commented that small scale windfarms are not generally supported due to lack of grid connections. Large energy companies were in the position to bring forward the large scale projects such as Brunthill and the infrastructure for transmission into the grid. Agreement on representation to place an Objection to this project on behalf of PCC and Portmoak Community.

### **Existing Applications**

24/00525/FLL Part change of use agricultural building to dog breeding facility, land 40 metres north east of Glenheart Farm, Glenlomond, Kinross.

PCC has considered the previous application Ref. No: 24/00525/FLL for a dog exercise facility which was approved, but this was an additional application for a dog breeding facility. The comment date was past, and the application approved. A Davidson had received comments from residents regarding noise from barking dogs. Secretary to query dates of application with PKC Planning.

Cllr D Morris raised another issue with regard to the location, and reports of aggressive behaviour from the landowner to people using the farms tracks for access. Made comment with regard to Land reform legislation: if owner does not want people to go through the farm, a diversionary path and signage should be created. Planning Officer should be made aware of this requirement for future applications.

### **Planning Decisions**

**Progress with Developments:** Westfield Community Liaison Committee: no update. Next meeting in July 24.

Westfield Paths Feasibility Study: Cllr D Morris has wrapped this detail into the ARUP response. Additionally included in ARUP response was the requirement for an off-road route along B9097 per the Westfield Feasibility Study.

**Paths Group Update:** lots of strimming around the area, particularly in Stephens Field. Application has been made for funding for the drain project at the top of the Cobbles.

# Glenfarg Community Council News from the July Meeting

**Present At The Meeting** held on 1 July were: CCllrs Fraser, Pilmer, Christie, Ponton, Macleod, Smart, Cllrs Watters, Robertson, Cuthbert and Freshwater, VHC Chair Macpherson and five MoP.

**Apologies:** CCllr Murray, Police Scotland PC Samson.

### **Police Report**

In PC Samson's absence CCllr Pilmer advised on the following since the beginning of March: 25 calls and zero crimes reported.

### **Traffic Statistics**

Community officers are aware of complaints about speeding. These have been added to the Speeding Matrix and Police Scotland will make every effort to carry out speed checks across the area during their patrols.

### **Action Points**

### **CCIIr Pilmer** reported that:

Letter to a member of the public (MoP). Regarding concerns (raised by letter) related to the parking on Main Street that had occurred in relation to an Event at Arngask Farm. Measures for a future event are to be managed by Tayside Contracts. Reaffirmed the point about the Observation Mirror to the VHC. The MoP replied with another letter regarding events held within the grounds of the Village Hall and Wallace Park about concerns relating to Public Liability insurance for past and future events. Also Licensing for Alcohol sales is a matter of protocol too by all event organisers. Additionally, there was a further suggestion about HMRC tax matters being adhered to of which all parties that I contacted were adamant that all points are dealt with and all matters for organised events were taken seriously and scrupulously adhered to. I replied to the MoP stating that matters were adhered to.

Public notification of events was another topic and I stated how the events are publicised and that it was not a duty for the CC to advertise unless asked specifically.

Speed of vehicles as raised by a MoP: I wrote to and received confirmation back from PKC that the current VAS position is to be reviewed by PKC with the practical relocation towards the entrance point for the village's southern entrance/exit. No date was given as to when the PKC work will be conducted by PKC, although it is planned to take place in 2024 now.

**Gazebos:** Visit to farm storage building took place. Photos supplied to CCllrs of items condition. Tennis Group do not want them. Other Village member of events does not want them. Q. Scrap them, how? A further meeting is to be arranged with the Farm owner to review items by the GCC CCllrs.

Greenbank Rd: I wrote to PKC Housing and an investigation

### Community Council News

WRT to remedial action was to take place. Also, Cllr Robertson became involved and asked that he be kept up to date with matters. Vehicles have been removed from the public highway and a tidying up of the properties have taken/is to take place. PKC Housing to engage with the present householders to improve matters.

**Flooding:** To be answered in Agenda item 6. MoP's letter and photographs. Plus, I have reported the blocked drain at Hilton Junction and remedial work is to happen.

**Speed Watch Campaign Letter:** Still to be issued looking for other volunteers. Carried over to next meeting.

**Village Newsletter:** Editor Position was advertised on Facebook with no enquiries. A further action is to be raised to readvertise the post and to ask for additional reporting help.

### **CCIIr Fraser** reported that:

**The Tree Stump:** In the River Farg adjacent to the Village Pond has not been removed by PKC (Greenspace team) presently. He will raise the matter accordingly again.

Raised the matter of sourcing replacement defibrillators batteries. Had been completed by him and that he was awaiting their receipt for installation. It was noted further that the batteries are long life and not recharged. It is only the LED lighting and alarm for the box that are mains powered.

Further discussion took place about a training day for First Aid offered by Saline First Responders and that there should be scope for additional defibrillators in the village. Scottish Water could help with funding. The understanding of costs suggested a sum of £1500 per unit.

### Meetings – Virtual and Public

CCIIr Ponton stated that she and CCIIr Pilmer had attended a Sustainability Group meeting in late June with local CCs at Fossoway Village Hall. The meeting included a presentation by Galileo about the Craigend Wind Farm and the most recent amendments to turbine numbers and size. The result of which means that it's to go through PKC Planning now. There was a further discussion about encompassing CCs further to the west as in Tillicoultry/Clackmannanshire. This was agreed as they too could be/would be beneficiaries of/for Community funding. A further discussion took place about another intended Planning Application concerning Brunt Hill which is a much larger scaled project and the impending route for the feeding of power - perhaps to Westfield, Fife. The scale of this project is causing concern and already CCs and members of the public have objected.

CCIIr Fraser and Smart reported that they had attended a Community Transport Forum meeting. Plans to have a dedicated focus group working together for community transport and to look at a five-year plan were mentioned.

CCIIr Fraser reported about the Scottish Water & GCC Liaison Group meeting. Refer to the attached addendum. It was noted that Scottish Water have been asked to/agreed to look at Speed Count down Markers at the Southern exit/entrance to the village and a VAS sign. They are to start attending the Coffee Mornings once ancillary works start in October 2024 with the full works commencing from January 2025. The Air Curtain Module is planned by Scottish Water to be transported via Milnathort although no firmed date was given. A contact name and phone number were requested by CCIIr Fraser to enable a future discussion with a landowner about a proposed path in a field. He asked CCIIr Pilmer to assist with contact details.

### **Flooding Issues**

CCIIr Christie reported that work conducted revealed that at least 80% drainage efficiency was achieved in the Greenbank area. However, as a result of debris building up again this has appeared to have dropped back to 20%. A local villager

conducted a walk around visit of the area with CCllr Christie at the Avenue, unfortunately a large drainage pipe has been covered over with concrete rendering it inoperative. It was noted that ditch/ditches were overgrown and required cleaning. And that more favourable drier weather would be required for PKC to carry out further remedial work.

Drains in Greenbank Road are to be requested to be cleaned out by PKC via PKC Cllr Robertson's contacts in the relevant department and it was emphasised that MyPKC website reporting on line should be used to report PKC drainage infrastructure faults.

The discussion was led by a member of the public who had supplied photographs to PKC Cllrs and CCllrs. The discussion led to PKC financial cutbacks that were occurring that in turn filter down to practical drain/gully cleaning activities being conducted. Collectively, the PKC Cllrs agreed that it is in all their supported CCs interests to seek additional funding to have the matters rectified. The member of the public raised the matter of a written response from a CCllr. CCllr Pilmer replied by way of a correction stating that it was his response as a member of the public and not from the GCC.

### Village Inn Update

In the absence of representatives of the Village Inn group and VH Trustees Subgroup the VH Trustees Chair, Bill Macpherson, advised that matters are progressing with the Subgroup working together to progress the improved facility project. Funding is the challenge as it stands. Those in attendance at this evening's meeting supported the progress to date.

### **Glenfarg Transport Group**

CCIIr Smart reported that the GTG is an award-winning enterprise and is continuing to be going from strength to strength and recently had a public usage more than 1000 passenger journeys in a week amounting to a huge increase in passenger movements. A new 16-seater community bus has been acquired to add to the present fleet. Funding is always prevalent, and sources are being sought continuously by the CTG as is an Active & Sustainable Travel plan. Discussion took place about the fuel usage for the buses such as hydrogen was the way forward. It was noted by those present that there could be a link with waste to energy from the Binn Group disposal site however, this is some way in the future if at all. PKC may have plans for hydrogen-powered vehicles although it's early days yet for those.

Travel routes for the 55 are being retimed for September to link up with other bus services in the area and that the CTG has been awarded the 202 route taking in Kinross-shire West towards Tillicoultry. This route will be renamed the 23 with more details to follow. Update at next GCC meeting by the CTG.

A new CTG booking service for external visit activities and or pick ups is being looked at rather than the present conundrum. A new 65 Service is to be introduced by Stagecoach although actual plans were not available for the meeting.

The School Transport contract is a long term one and this will be revisited by the CTG in the future.

### **Binn Wind Farm topic**

Foundation Scotland's Malcolm Jack wrote to the GCC and stated that the Binn Wind Farm Turbine community fund would not see any money paid out this year and that it could be some time in 2025 before it is.

### **AOCB**

**Village Newsletter:** CCIIr Christie reported that the *Glenfarg Newsletter*'s position of Editor remains unfilled. It is an essential matter of urgency for the post to be filled therefore, the post is to be readvertised along with an additional further request for reporters.

**Dog Incident:** CCIIr Pilmer raised the matter of a reported dog incident, involving leashed and unleashed dogs, to him. He is to place a note about the topic onto social media.

Wallace Park: overgrowing grass at fitness location and weeds. Discussion with action already taken related to rewilding/grass not cut back/weeds out of control in Wallace Park following an initial letter to Cllrs and CCllrs by a member of the public. Cllr Watters whose many remits also include this topic acted for the matter to be resolved. However, the outstanding matter of a bank of coarse nettles/thistles/weeds as raised by another member of the public is still to be addressed. It was suggested that a walk around be organised with Friends of Wallace Park (FoWP), MoP and GCC CCllrs to check to see if there is anything else that requires to be done by end and report back to PKC for further action possibly via Cllr Watters and MyPKC if required.

101 Police/111 NHS Calls and unusual referral to Fife: A member of the public raised the matter that calls had been made to 101 and 111 in both instances and that they had been referred to Fife. CCllr Smart (GP) explained that historically

Glenfarg came under the Kinross & Fife framework for NHS out of hours response and that this may still be the case, as discussed. However, it was noted that the postcode isn't the factor and that you can request Perth.

The 101 Police Call being relayed to Police in Fife is unusual. In the absence of the Community Police Officer it was agreed to contact him for advice.

Abandoned Vehicles Perceived: Any that may be present in the village were urged to be made known to PKC through MyPKC. PKC will place a letter onto the vehicle alerting to whoever what will take place and that the vehicle will be removed. The topic moved on to parking on Main street near the Village Hall Car Park entrance/exit from Main Street. It was agreed by those present that road markings to give safe entrance and exit are required on the carriageway as a solution. This is to be explored further by the GCC CCllrs. It was suggested that a viewing mirror be placed on the opposite side of the car park entrance however, Cllr Roberston advised the CCllrs that this mirror was, probably, not acceptable to PKC unless it was located on private land. Hence the need for road markings.

Condition of Social Housing at present: A long and protracted discussion with many comments took place concerning Social Housing and the issues that were giving cause for concern. The Cllrs were united with their response that Social Housing has its own written guidelines for tenants and that it must be adhered to. Cllr Robertson has been in touch with Housing team for the area requesting that more requires to be done. It was stressed that a let's work together approach is taken to resolve all matters for the benefit of residents in this small community.

**Binn Wood:** The GCC discussed the generous offer of Binn Wood as a legacy to the Community. Cllr Robertson was most helpful with his advice relating to a similar topic at Kinnesswood. He is to forward the details of a contact to CCllr Pilmer for him to engage with for advice about the offer. The wood could be an asset to the community and that CCllr Fraser asked CCllr Pilmer to contact Ms C. Grant with our thoughts/comments.

The next meeting of Glenfarg CC will be held on Monday 2 September 2024.

### **Crime Prevention & Police Report**

From 22nd April 2024 (last CC meeting) there have been 26 calls to Police from the Cleish and Blairadam area and 4 crimes recorded on Police systems.

23/04/2024 - 24/04/2024: Theft of motor vehicle (Templeton, Cleish) Steal a Ford Transit Connect van via true key. This crime is subject to live investigation

11/06/2024: Theft by housebreaking (Mawmill, Cleish) – Intruders used metal ladder to scale onto first floor roof enter the building via skylight and into communal bathroom, once within enter various room ransacking each in turn, taking items from each before egressing via rear porch door leaving it ajar. This crime is subject to live investigation.

### **Community Council News**

### **Traffic Update**

Roads Policing officers have been carrying out speed checks on the M90 at junction 5 which has resulted in drivers being reported for speeding, no insurance and dangerous driving offences.

### **Co-opting a New Councillor**

With the decision of Margaret Traylor to step down from the role of CC Treasurer later this year, the membership of the CC would drop below the minimum number of members needed, so the CC has decided to co-opt an additional member to the CC.

The meeting unanimously agreed to co-opt a new member Jes Bunce of Keltybridge to the Community. The co-option paperwork will now be submitted to PKC's Community Council team and the new member will officially be co-opted at the next Community Council meeting in September.

### **Broadband Update**

### **Keltybridge Area**

The final phase to connect the remaining 13 properties in the Blairadam area is progressing well, with 6 of the remaining properties already connected. Openreach has committed to complete the remaining work by September this year. The Tabernacle Hall now has an installed Fibre Broadband line and although this is yet to be activated by Openreach it is hoped that it will be commissioned in time for the next Community Council meeting which is due to be held at the Tabernacle Hall in September.

### **Drainage**

### Cleish

There are on-going flooding problems in Cleish, and in particular into the cemetery. This flooding appears to be linked to a drainage problem in the fields to the South of the main road through Cleish.

### Keltybridge

The road gully has now been repaired and is draining as expected, however Keltybridge is still experiencing intermittent problems with sewage flowing onto the road near Middleton Park. Scottish Water have attended the scene and confirmed that the problem is not related to their sewers. The problem has been raised with PKC Environmental Services, but we are still awaiting a response.

### Planning

Under the new guidance, an objection by the Community Council automatically refers an application to the Planning Committee; otherwise, it requires six objections from separate households to refer an application.

### **Applications Pending**

24/00941/FLL Erection of 5 dwellinghouses formation of vehicular access and associated works at land 90 metres north of Nivingston House, Cleish.

Representatives of the Community Council will meet with the developer to discuss this application.

24/00734/FLL Change of use of land to form extension to garden ground at 8 Abbot's Wynd, Keltybridge, Kelty.

The Community Council has raised concerns about this application given that the ground lies outside the settlement boundary of the village. The CC is requesting that no development should be allowed on this land beyond the conversion to garden space.

24/00703/IPL Residential development (in principle) - land 140 metres north east of the bungalow, Benarty Road, Kelty.

### **Applications Approved**

24/00513/FLL Extension to dwellinghouse,4 Middleton Park Keltybridge, Kelty.

### **Planning Enforcement**

PKC Planning Enforcement has been referred to the PKC Scrutiny Committee because of apparent disparities in how the Enforcement Team operates and how it chooses to enforce particular cases.

The Planning Enforcement Charter will be reviewed by the Scrutiny Committee in September, and this will be the opportunity to provide input into the way in which the Planning Enforcement Team operates. ### Village Updates

### Blairadam

Attendees expressed concern that the multiple planning violations at Blairfordel Farm are not being enforced despite





already subject to a Planning Enforcement Notice (24/00123/LAND).

Cllr Freshwater noted that the Planning Enforcement team have entered into a mediation process with the residents who are impacted by the enforcement notice.

Concerns were again raised in relation to the enforcement of planning decisions, and in particular the lack of progress on enforcement of the planning violations at Blairfordel Farm which appears to be leading to the unconstrained growth of a settlement where there are increasing numbers of structures without planning consent.

In addition, concerns were again raised about the perceived lack of equal treatment of residents by Perth & Kinross Planning Enforcement. The commonly held view still being that Planning Enforcement discriminate against lawful settlements by aggressively pursuing 'soft' targets for planning violations while allowing more 'difficult' cases like Blairfordel Farm to go unchallenged. Such an approach makes a mockery of the planning process in Perth and Kinross where individuals are apparently able to ignore planning regulations with impunity.

It was noted also that the conditions of planning consent for Numbers 29 & 31 Keltybridge have not yet been fulfilled. Specifically in relation to the restoration and re-wilding of the area of land to the North of 31 Keltybridge where a condition was included in the planning consent.

The CC agreed to again write to PKC Planning Enforcement to request that they investigate why the developer has not complied with the conditions in the planning consent.

Cllr Freshwater raised the question of cleaning and maintaining the historic 'County of Kinross' sign which is at the entrance to Keltybridge village.

CC member agreed to contact the owner of the land where the sign is located to confirm that they are amenable to the sign being cleaned and maintained.

### Cleish

Verges around the village need to be cut to improve visibility.

Thanks to Cllr Watters recommendation the Community Payback Team visited Cleish and painted the railings at the cemetery, and benches in the village.

The new school sign has still not been removed and replaced, despite agreement with PKC to do so.

### **Any Other Business**

Local Place Plan: With the deadline for submission approaching, it was suggested that the CC takes the lead in helping to develop a Local Place Plan for the Cleish and Blairadam area. As noted in previous CC meetings, creating a Local Place Plan for Cleish & Blairadam, which reflect the views of the community is the most effective way that a local community can express their vision for the future of their local area as the council is required to take into account any existing Local Place Plan when looking at planning applications, and when they develop the next Local Development Plan.

The Local Place Plan for Cleish and Blairadam would need to be submitted by September 2024 to be considered as part of the next PKC Local Development Plan which will run from 2027 to 2037.

The next meeting of Cleish and Blairadam Community Council will take place on Monday 16 September, at 7.30pm in the Keltybridge Tabernacle Hall.

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
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# **Clubs & Community Groups**



# Climate Action Through Community Heating – CATCH-Lochleven

We continue to make steady progress towards our vision of a community-based transition to clean heat for our properties. Current government policy implies that the majority of our properties would need to invest in fabric upgrades and new heat pumps, but there is a path to a less costly and fairer transition by implementing district heating with centralised energy generation. PKC already have a limited heat network zone designated in Kinross, and we are pushing to have this extended. Our engagement with PKC on this is encouraging. A step by step approach will be required.

We are already working on the modelling for the potential phases. A lot has been done on the energy supply side, but we need to do more to understand demand. A key data set that we are short of is current energy usage for heating. You can help us by agreeing to share your energy bill information (treated sensitively and anonymously). Please get in touch if you as a household or business would like to help. It is even better if you are on a smart meter because very valuable data is easily obtained. We can help you to do this. ### **Broke not Broken**

Summer is a busy time for lots of families; keeping kids entertained, balancing work and family time, planning what is needed for the next school term. The same goes for Broke Not Broken. We balance the need to manage our family and work lives and plan for the year ahead. As well as the ongoing high usage of the food bank over summer, we also try to balance that with addressing additional needs of families on a low income who do not have access to any childcare support locally over the summer holidays.

Our Tuesday Trips have been an immense success over past years. This year we were concerned due to a massive drop in funding for Food in Holidays Funding from Perth and Kinross Council that we may to be able to continue them. However, thanks to our Development Officer Hannah's hard work in sourcing other funding streams, we have managed to offer 6 trips over the summer for up to 100 people each week, offering breakfast lunch AND a snack as well as transport and entry tickets. Venues include Camperdown Park, Dalkeith Country Park, Briarlands Farm, Craigtoun Park, Active Kids and Almondvalley, and destinations have been developed with families input. These trips are a huge amount of hard work to organise and take a lot of time planning and delivering, and we are as ever thankful to our great volunteers who help us on these.

Summer also means additional costs for many families that we support, or have supported, over the past years. The Scottish Government have committed to a 'Cash First' approach to move towards ending the need for food banks across Scotland. As part of the eight local authorities are involved in various pilot projects with funding. Unfortunately, Perth and Kinross are not part of this pilot, but Broke Not Broken are running our own pilot scheme over the summer, to identify and support households who are not eligible for free school meals and, therefore, do not get the financial element of this support over summer. We identified 46 families and will be giving them the financial support they would get if eligible for this payment, and will evaluate the impact of this and present to PKC and Scottish Government at the end of the year. We need to push for the support these families need if we are going to address ongoing in-work poverty and child poverty across Scotland.

The third strand of our summer work comes through from our School Uniform bank. We are delighted that a relationship with the Loch Leven Community Campus has meant that we are now able to run the project during the summer from the campus premises. This is a much more spacious, accessible space, and we are really pleased at this partnership going forward. We remain eternally indebted to Kinross Colts for all their support up to know in hosting us and

this project for the past few years. Our army of volunteers have been so busy organising kind and generous donations to make up over 120 uniform packs for children across Kinrossshire

We do also have one more new project, and it is very much a one off. Over Covid-19 and subsequent years a tranche of local children missed out on swimming lessons they would have received as part of their primary school education. These free lessons for many are their only opportunity to learn this life skill, and as we live near to a large body of water it is crucial they get access to this. With Live Active and local schools and funding from the Local Action Partnership we are supporting specific children to attend a week of intensive swim lessons to bridge the gap left over covid.

Funding support has been as important as ever, and over the past month or two we have continued funding support from the Arthur Margaret Thompson trust, Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro Project, The Toy Trust, Arnold Clark Community Trust and Springfield Homes.

There was a meeting in the Michael Bruce Garden on Wednesday 26 June to go over the plans we had received, firm up ideas, and find some creative solutions to problems. It was a very positive meeting, helped by coffee and Shelagh's buttery shortbread. It is great to move on to the next stage.

We sent out an appeal to villagers in early June to let them know that we were to be visited by a BBC crew as part of a new gardening programme. Folk really rose to the occasion, cutting back hedges, mowing lawns and putting out pots. John, Rory and a few others repainted our tubs and the grass verges were all looking great. We cannot really say too much

about the programme, or put up our pictures on media yet, but we will share more when we know when it will be broadcast.

We can say that there was considerable excitement among the gardeners in the village when Monty Don arrived as part of the film crew. Monty was very easy to talk to and gave us free advice about our vegetables. We were pleased that we were doing the right thing with the vine in the polytunnel. They did quite a lot of filming at the school and the children really responded well. He did like the little model figures like the Mad Hatter's Tea Party and was going to send a picture of Mary Berry to his good friend Mary! After nearly a day of filming our bit will be five minutes at most.

Thank you all for your work to make the village look so good for the BBC. Sorry folks but we will be asking you to do it again for the Beautiful Scotland judges on 31 July. We know you will rise to the occasion.

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


### Kinross Camera Club

### Local Development Plan 3

There is currently an opportunity for members of the public, community groups etc to have their say on an early stage of the next Local Development Plan (LDP).

The way that LDPs are prepared has changed following the Planning Scotland Act (2019). The gathering of evidence is the first key stage in the preparation of the next Plan and will involve production of an 'Evidence Report'.

The Evidence Report will be approved by the Council before being submitted to Scottish Ministers for a 'Gatecheck'. This will involve a Scottish Government Reporter checking that the evidence is sufficient to provide a sound basis for preparing the Proposed Plan.

Prior to finalising the Evidence Report, PKC is consulting with stakeholders and interested parties.

There are 30 'topic papers' on PKC's Consultation Hub at: *consult. pkc.gov.uk/communities/topicpapers/* 

The topic papers include: Homes; Tackling Climate & Nature Crisis; Biodiversity & Natural Places; Flood Risk & Water Management; Rural Development & Homes; Play, Recreation & Sport; Tourism and many more.

Interested parties are invited to read whichever topic papers interest them and fill in a survey.

The topic paper consultation is open until Sunday 18 August 2024.

The Evidence Report is expected to be submitted to the Scottish Government in late 2024. The Gatecheck will take place in late 2024/early 2025. The Proposed Plan will be prepared throughout 2025. There will be a consultation on the Proposed Plan in 2026. LDP3 is expected to be adopted in 2027 and will be valid for 10 years.

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

# Come On Down!

**AS WE HEAD INTO** August and the school holidays across the UK are in full swing, we hope everyone visiting the Loch has a fantastic time! Our Discovery Day will be held in Kirkgate Park on Saturday 17 August so please come along! There will be lots of stalls from neighbouring groups, plenty of activities for all ages and face painting! We will also be hosting other events throughout the month so keep an eye on our socials and for posters.

Our wildflower meadows at Burleigh and Kirkgate are full of life, as are most of the verges along the Heritage Trail path. The most common things we are spotting are meadow brown and ringlet butterflies, and we've also started spotting burnet moths, whose stripy caterpillars love ragwort plants. If you're around Leven Mouth keep an eye out for speckled wood butterflies, or if you're along the shoreline or by Burleigh ponds keep your eyes peeled for damselflies. Purple hairstreak butterflies should be emerging, and can be seen around the oak trees at Leven mouth so keep an eye out for them.

Burleigh Sands is a very popular part of the reserve, especially for wild camping, and unfortunately we are continuously dealing with people not following SOAC and ignoring our signage on responsible access. We have recently had an incident of people stripping trees of bark and sawing off branches to light fires on vegetation leaving scorch marks, right beside our 'No Fires' signs. Loch Leven is a National Nature Reserve, and is a SPA (Special Protected Area) and SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) for a wide range of breeding and overwintering birds, as well as plants and insects, and the general loch itself, and because of these we take extra precautions to ensure the Loch is looked after. If you are planning on visiting Loch Leven please follow our signage and check both SOAC and our own local guidance. No open fires, BBQ's or fire bowls, please use a camping stove.

Most of the breeding birds around the loch now have young! If you're lucky you might spot mallard, gadwall or tufted duck broods along the shoreline of the loch, as well as our mute swan broods which are getting big! Please remember if accessing the water only launch from Burleigh Sands and Kirkgate beach, keep 200m away from the shoreline and don't land on any islands.

The dreaded Himalayan balsam continues to be at the core of our vegetation management. This invasive plant can be found all around the loch, and is now flowering. Once it passes this stage its seed pods explode, which is how it is so good at spreading. If you do see any around the reserve please pull it out or break it in half.

IT'S BEEN A BUSY time at the reserve, and we've had some great wildlife sightings since our last column, including osprey, otter and regular sightings of marsh harrier. A particular highlight has been seeing and hearing green woodpecker in our woodland. We've watched swallow chicks and blue tit chicks fledge, which was a joy to see. With the wildflowers in bloom, we've seen lots of insects on the reserve, including chimney sweeper moths, small copper butterflies and lots of bumblebees (including blaeberry bumblebee). In our moth trap we've seen peach blossom, beautiful golden y and light emerald moths, to name a few.

We're always keen to hear what people have seen when visiting the reserve, so do let us know on our Instagram (*rspblochleven*) and Facebook pages, or pop in and let one of the team know.

Our café has been busy serving up delicious food and drink and is open every day 10am- 4pm (last orders at 3pm) for soup, hot filled rolls, toasties, baked potatoes and sweet treats. We have a

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kid's menu, and lots of vegan options too. In our shop, we stock a great range of gifts, bird food and feeders, and have our Optics Weekends on the first weekend of each month, the next ones coming up are 3 & 4 August and 31 Aug & 1 September. These are a great opportunity to learn about the range of binoculars and telescopes we have in stock, and our knowledgeable staff will be on hand to choose the perfect pair for you.

## **Farming**



**I'LL START THIS** month's article with a few lines on the big topic of conversation, the number one question on everyone's lips, the answer to which affects people across the country from the average person in the street to farmers across the land.

The question in question is, of course, what has happened to summer?

I think it must have gone on holiday and forgotten to return or maybe it's languishing in a warehouse with lost luggage waiting to be delivered back to us.

It's not that the weather has been particularly bad, as there certainly have been some nice days, or at least parts of days but it just seems to have been, up until now, at least very changeable and unpredictable with a distinct lack of sunshine, and damp, but not wet, as such. Difficult to describe without using language totally unsuitable for printing in a respectable family publication such as our esteemed *Newsletter*, but I suppose that's nothing new about the Scottish weather.

Here, at backward farm we are just trying to roll with the punches and make the most of things.

We actually managed to get some (hopefully) quite good hay baled which was more a result of good luck than good judgement, but a wee bit of luck can go a long way, and it was very welcome.

We have re-seeded a couple of fields with some new grass seed to help boost the productivity of the farm and it should also help to reduce our carbon footprint, which is an important factor at the moment, although how carbon emissions are measured is a huge bone of contention as there seem to be as many different ways of measuring this as there are days in the week (or is that days in the year).

It is certainly a complicated issue which is in constant danger of being hi-jacked by over simplistic, lazy arguments which make big headlines but fail to tackle the real problems and take into account the whole picture. The science involved is in its infancy and it will be interesting to see how it develops.

Meanwhile, in the world of backward farm the ewes have not yet been sheared and in general I think they will have been quite glad of their fleeces up until now, although it is a job which could do with being done. The pigs seem to be enjoying the non-descript weather as it hasn't been too hot for them but ground conditions are pretty dry.

Most of their paddocks have a good bit of greenery growing in them which will stand them in good stead going into the winter. The cattle have a plentiful supply of grass although the quality hasn't been as consistently good as I would have liked but at least their bellies are full.

Our two fields of barley which is grown to feed the pigs and some of the cattle is looking fairly well but it would greatly benefit from some sunshine to swell the grains sooner rather that later, to help us have some good quality feed going forward. Fingers crossed.

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# Gardening

WELL... ONE MONTH of 'summer' left until we're officially in autumn. It's not been great, has it? The jet stream has been stuck to the south of us, drawing the weather from the north, hence a pretty rotten summer. I'm hoping this isn't a taste of things to come, but we can't be sure. Anyway, this isn't an article about the perils of climate change, I'm supposed to be talking about gardening (though it's good to have a moan about the weather), so here goes.

Things have not been going well, overall. I have a couple of cut flower beds at the back of the garden. At this time of year, they're usually bursting at the seams and I don't have enough vases to keep up with the blooms. Apart from stalwarts like calendula and sweet williams, everything else is kind of stuck at a height of about three inches and nowhere near flowering stage. Luckily, I have some perennials that are providing some colour in the house, it's obviously not the year for wall-to-wall annuals... or maybe it's just me!

In other news... the hanging baskets (which I've had problems with the last few years) are doing really well. They might be enjoying the cooler weather or I've been more diligent with feeding and watering, I don't know... but I'm taking it as a win. They're filling out nicely and are very colourful, long may it continue.

My pots are also doing well, so maybe it's just the stuff in the garden (apart from the weeds) that's not particularly liking the weather, who knows? The plants that enjoy a cooler climate are going great guns, like clematis and begonias. My clematis (right) has been flowering for weeks now and there are plenty more buds to come.

So, what's on the cards for August? I think a forced, extended weeding session may be in order. Though I try to do some weeding here and there, as soon as I turn my back, more appear, so a concerted effort is required.

Watering and feeding continues to be important, as does deadheading, as a way to extend the flowering life of your plants. As






a general rule, my baskets get watered daily and the pots maybe twice a week. Feeding once a week.

Also, have a wander around the garden and make notes on what's worked well and what hasn't (seriously, take notes, because you won't remember by

next year). Note what should be split up and replanted, or moved, tidied up, or just removed completely. I have a lovely canterbury bells (above) that's been there for years, and spread, that really needs to be thinned out... who knows, I may get around to it this year! The most important thing of all though, is to enjoy your garden, enjoy the fresh air and wildlife, and try to relax a little. Until next time!






