### **Letter From The Editor**

THE CLOCKS HAVE just gone back and the nights are drawing in... it won't be long before we really feel as though winter is upon us. I recently discovered the origins of the phrase "It's blowing a hoolie,": it is supposedly derived from the Orkney word 'hoolan'. Hoolan describes a strong gale-force wind. They will be experts on that in Orkney! Hopefully we will not have to experience too many 'hoolies' in Kinross this winter.

We already know our Scottish climate is changing faster than scientists expected. A study by the James Hutton Institute in Aberdeen (www.hutton.ac.uk) found that Scotland has already experienced more winter rainfall than predicted for mid-century. February and April have become up to 60% wetter in the last 30 years compared with the previous three decades.





# **NEW PLANS, NEW BOATHOUSE!**



FIRST SIGHT ESTATES have lodged two planning applications; one to transform the Boathouse Restaurant on the pier and the other for a new Historic Environment Scotland office. The first application would see the Boathouse space turned into a bar, restaurant and events space. The plans include the creation of a fire pit

bothy, relocation of the public toilets and some outdoor seating.

The current owner of Kinross House, Donald Fothergill, is a director at First Site Estates.

A key part of the Heritage Trail, it has been out of use for several years and local residents are keen to see the building, which is currently inoperable as a restaurant, restored and opened again for use. The design statement indicates that the Boathouse would be fully inclusive to all, including being dog friendly, and 'available to the public seven days a week and at all times of day and evening'.

There will be further detailed wider consultations in relation to landscaping, interpretation and wayfinding signage at and around the Boathouse and heritage car park.

Kiran Fothergill, Chief Executive of First Sight Estates, said 'We are focused on working with local suppliers, producers and businesses to celebrate everything that is local and to create a desirable venue that establishes our own unique blend of food, drink, style and service.'

10.45am: Parade from church to War Memorial 10.55am: Act of Remembrance at War Memorial,



# He'll Be Here For The Big Light Switch On!

THIS YEAR'S CHRISTMAS LIGHTS switch-on in Kinross will take place on 30 November. Santa has confirmed his dates for visiting the shire – he will bring the sleigh that evening to enjoy the switching on of our Christmas lights by a special guest.

There will be a cash collection on the night: please give whatever you can afford. Light up Kinross are a small local charity who fundraise for and organise the switch on of the Christmas lights in Kinross. They will also be hosting their annual quiz in March.

A spokesperson from Light Up Kinross said: 'The Christmas Lights switch-on is on Saturday 30 November at 6pm at the car park by Greens. There will be lots of entertainment on the night, including a visit from Santa!'



Light up Kinross started in 1999 as a joint venture of Kinross Community Council and Kinross Traders Association. Each contributed 50% of the costs of 28 pole lights for the High St and Station Rd, along with tree lights on Avenue Road and Swansacre. In 2009 Light up Kinross set up as a charity to allow applications

for charitable funding.



# CAN THEY FIX IT? YES THEY CAN! THE REPAIR CAFE IS BACK...

ON 18 OCTOBER Martine Postma started the first repair café in Amsterdam. This year they celebrated a 15 year anniversary, with over 3000 repair cafes around the world!

The next repair café takes place on 16 November, 10am – 2pm at Kinross Church Centre on the High Street in Kinross.

The Kinross-shire Repair Café, which began last April, is part of the international movement and Scottish Sharing and Repair Network. So far, they have successfully repaired 47 items, saved nearly 40kg of waste (excluding bikes) and 113kg of CO2 emissions from landfills. And before you ask, yes, there is much more carbon saved because 80% of waste is incinerated and, for example, when you burn 1kg of plastic, 10kg of CO2 is emitted.

But it is not only about statistics. This achievement is only possible due to the amazing work of, currently, nine volunteers. They are involved in the repair café to benefit the local community and improve our environment. One of them reflected, 'Some people have a strong sentimental attachment to an item. This can sometimes be the last chance to save it. As a repairer I get huge satisfaction. We are not just helping save the environment, we are helping people re-es-



tablish lost memories and restore a link to a past life.'

All repairs are registered to monitor impact and for insurance purposes. Repairs are first-come first-served and are free, but you need to pay for new parts. Tea/coffee and biscuits are provided, along with a chat.

Our next Swap Shop (the last one for a

while) will be focused on Christmas and winter clothes. Come and take the opportunity to swap an outfit or a jumper.

Lastly, please remember that repairers are unpaid volunteers. If there are any problems please fill in the feedback form or contact the coordinator so that they can improve

their service. Please do not complain directly to the volunteers, who are only trying their best.

If you would like to help, please get in touch. At the next café there will be repairs of:

- Electronics and electric items (with PAT testing) make sure items can be opened
- Textiles (including soft toys)
- Broken household objects (smaller items you can carry)
- Bikes (please bring clean bikes)
- **NEW! Musical Instruments** guitars, string, brass and keyboards.

Unfortunately, repairs of wooden items or jewellery are no longer provided.

Your donations are appreciated and will help the Repair Cafe continue in 2025.

# **OUTRAGE AT FATAL DOG ATTACK**

HORRIFIED CONDEMNATION greeted the news that a dog was tragically killed in a savage attack by other dogs in the middle of Kinross Town Centre on Sunday 21 October. The community rallied round to show support for the injured parties and to express their shock, grief and sadness for those involved. Within hours, a crowdfunder had gone live to help raise money for the affected families and has raised £2800.

Two other dogs were injured and also needed veterinary attention after the incident. A woman also received minor injuries.

A Police Scotland spokesperson said: 'Around 2.30pm on Sunday we were called to a report of three dogs having been attacked by other dogs on High Street and Burns Begg Street, Kinross.

'One dog died and two others were injured and taken to the vet for treatment. A woman also suffered injuries when she fell and was treated at the scene for minor injuries. Officers are in attendance and enquiries are ongoing. There is no risk to the wider public."

Anyone with any information is asked to contact 101 quoting reference 1865 of 20 October, 2024.

In a futher update on the matter requested by the *Newsletter*, Police Scotland said, 'The four dogs have now been seized. To have them destroyed will be



a matter for the court. No one has been charged yet (this is a work in progress) however a report will be submitted to the Procurator Fiscal.'

Neighbours were quick to point out that they feel the attack could have been prevented as they first reported concerns six months ago.

Both Police Scotland and PKC were aware of issues relating to the three attacking dogs. The dogs involved in the weekend attack had also set upon anoth-

er dog just three days prior, on 17 October. Police made enquiries and PKC's dog warden was informed.

At a recent KCC meeting Cllr W Robertson said: "The many Kinross residents present were indeed very unhappy with the way the council has handled this situation.

'I was first contacted by a resident at the beginning of August about this issue and had a meeting on site with two local residents and the local housing officer and a representative from Community Greenspace.

'I was assured that steps were being taken to deal with the problems caused by the council's tenant. Since that time things have gone from bad to worse. The events at the weekend were the final straw for the neighbours of the property.'

Both Cllr Robertson and Cllr Cuthbert were meeting with the council's head of Housing on Thursday afternoon to address residents' concerns.

Cllr Neil Freshwater said: 'The dog attacks were truly horrific, and my thoughts are with those affected.

'That there were two separate incidents that led to human injury and death of a pet dog is both very sad and extremely concerning.'

# **KIRSTY'S A PIG SUCCESS!**



LOCAL KINROSS RESIDENT, Kirsty McCloskey (25), was diagnosed with a brain tumour in early 2020 and an emergency life-saving operation left her with significant balance, co-ordination, eyesight and facial palsy issues. It also took away her chosen nursing career.

A long, gruelling and expensive rehabilitation battle commenced to try to make the best of what she had and to regain as much of what she had lost.

This fantastic community raised a large amount of money in various ways, not least with the amazing Loch Leven 24, which was a continuous circuit of Loch Leven for 24 hours, mostly by bicycle, but also by walking and running, by five different teams from Kinross Otters, Kinross Colts, Kinross Tennis Club and two teams of friends associated with the McCloskey family. There were about 150 participants.

There was also an incredible fashion show, two superb band nights and many other quieter behind-the-scenes acts of kindness that will never be forgotten.

That rehabilitation battle continues to this day and will continue for a long time yet. Kirsty's family are so proud of how hard she has worked day in, day out and how she has retained her wonderful sense of humour. Still unable to work in the classic sense, Kirsty set about turning her love of all things pig into



a proper hobby. Floods of ideas flowed and PigsnThings was born.

She has many homemade and sourced pig-related products including wax melts, keyrings, pencil cases, body and lip scrubs, soaps, cards, toys and much more. Of particular note in her Christmas preparations are her very cute plushie 'pigs in blankets' with matching cards.

A proportion of all her sales go towards The Brain Tumour Charity and some of it towards her ongoing rehabilitation. Kirsty has been very busy promoting this new venture and can be found on Facebook (*Pigsn-Things*) and Instagram (*@Pigsnthingsco*) and at many of the local markets and fairs throughout Kinross-shire.



Now, since completing his introductory beekeepers course, he has achieved quite a level of success.

After gaining first place in the Scottish National Honey Show, Robert's handmade candles and local honey got him first place in the national awards held in Surrey, as well as a second place for his presentation about the Asian Hornet.

In the near future Robert will be presented with a trophy, something he is quite exited about as it's big and shiny!

Robert is supported locally by James Drysdale of Kinnesswood Farm who allows him access for keeping bees. Local businesses also support Robert by selling his multi-award winning 100% beeswax candles which he makes at home. Lochend Farmshop stated 'We are happy to support Robert in his venture and enjoy talking to him when he visits us at weekend to check what is needed for the next week.' Robert always enjoys a cup of tea and a cake at the farm shop while doing his own invoicing!

Kinnesswood shop said 'it has been an immense pleasure to support Robert. I look for-

ward to working with him and following his progress.' The shop donates profits from all candles sold to Kinnesswood in Bloom, and Robert visits the shop regularly after school with his pocket money.

In future Robert also has plans for the occasional pop-up shop in locations such as Loch Leven's Larder, and is looking to have an outlet in or around Kinross.

When asked what plans he has for beekeeping, Robert is looking to do presentations at his local club over the winter, and to start taking module exams in 2025 with the aim of becoming a member of Team Scotland (junior).

'I'd really like to be part of Team Scotland, which is for juniors, and have the opportunity to visit junior beekeepers in other countries. It would be great to travel!'

'I am really happy with all the help and support I get including Kinnesswood in Bloom. I met a TV celebrity but can't say who just yet as it will be on TV. I signed a special paper that said I can't mention it!

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# THE LONG WAIT IS NEARLY OVER!

WORK ON THE PLAYPARK at Davies Park is progressing well! The rubber surfacing work is now complete and turf edging to the area is due to be finished as this *Newsletter* goes to print. Grass matting to the zip line and thermoplastic markings (for the hopscotch and railway track) are due to be installed very soon.

Additional benches, with paving underneath, will also be added. Once the area is complete, the swing seats and moving parts will be added to the equipment bases and the site will be inspected by a registered safety inspection company, who will confirm everything is installed to the correct safety standards.

The site will then be handed over to PKC and officially opened.

The recycled benches from the original site will be relocated on the old railway line footpath.

One of the picnic benches visible on the photo is in a temporary location; it will be sited on the grass near the boundary of the play area.

While it is hoped that the park will be completed early in November, no one can account for the weather which can affect some installation work (e.g. thermoplastic markings) so please be patient.


# THE BARONY OF BURLEIGH

# **WARM SLEEP FOR ALL**



LOCAL CREATIVE WELLBEING organisation Generating Opportunity has launched a project to provide winter duvets to pensioners in Perth and Kinross and Fife, who are struggling financially to have a cosy night's sleep.

The Warm Sleep Project aims to help pensioners who may be worried about their heating bills and more likely to live and sleep in cold conditions — with negative impacts on their health and wellbeing.

Project Co-ordinator Linda Grant explains that local voluntary and community organisations, including older carers' groups, are being invited to help identify seniors who would benefit, to ensure that winter duvets and blankets reach those most in need.

'We aim to provide brand new winter duvets (13.5 Tog) and also new blankets, where required, through financial support from local Trusts and Foundations,' says Linda.

'We are not asking people to gift us quilts or blankets, because the cost of collecting them would be prohibitive. But we are asking community and voluntary organisations, as well as local

residents, to help us identify older people in need, especially in our more isolated rural areas.'

'As soon as we are made aware of the level of need, we will act to address that need as soon as we can and get warm duvets out to older members of our communities before the winter sets in. This is just a small gesture to let them know that their community cares about their comfort, health and wellbeing.'

**YOU MAY HAVE READ** about Joscelyne's Journey in previous *Newsletters* and how last year at 17 years of age Joscelyne was diagnosed with an extremely rare brain tumour, with the subsequent devastating news that her life expectancy was 12-18 months.

Ten months down the line from that diagnosis, it's a delight to share that she continues to be a beacon of positivity, despite the adversities thrown at her, her trial drugs having rather unpleasant side effects and the hardest aspect of living with constant uncertainty.

But as Joscelyne says, there is no point in wasting time worrying

and she has instead spent the summer (in between some cheeky wee holidays) studying to sit her first year University exams, which she missed whilst in surgery and recovering. Edinburgh University have been amazing enabling her to take extra credits this year, so she can still progress to the second year of her Astrophysics course and have even chosen her for an exceptionally rare award for her commitment to studies

Mum told us, 'It is aspects like this, as well as the amazing community of Kinross, that keep not just Joscelyne but us her family going, especially on the darker days.

'In the six months since launching her Just Giving Page to fund private treatment, we are beyond belief that over £100,000 has been raised. It still astounds us how much love and support is out there, so we personally wanted to say thank you to every one of the Kinross community (and beyond) for caring and to

everyone that has donated.

'Over the last couple of months, fundraising has included Aine breaking the Woman's World Record for most Burpee's in 24 hours, Joscelyne's godmother's ER gym in Falkirk completing the equivalent of 12 marathons in three hours, and I cannot forget the love that emanates from our own community. A special shout out of thanks to Alison from Kinross

Colts Ladies Football Team, Kirsty and Gillian for organised an outstanding Line Dancing fundraiser as well as Zoe, Tracy and Ruby for their stall at the Kinross Craft Market.'

'On 29 September, we held a massive fundraiser (well more of a party really) where over 180 family and friends (old and new) brought tickets to a black-tie event hosted by Balbirnie House Hotel. It's hard to sum up the day, the atmosphere or how well it went, but as someone said to me 'the whole room was filled with so much love, kindness and positivity'. There were stalls, raffles with donations from many local businesses, a ceilidh, photo booth, the fabulous Francesca Gray singing, and a disco as well as auctions both online and live.

'I hope some of the photos have captured the atmosphere where everyone came together to have fun as well as raising a whopping £16,903.

'Our heartfelt thanks to you all.'

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



'Most of the Winter Coat vouchers have already gone out, through referrals, supporting families to be able to buy warm winter clothing for their children. Winter comes early in Kinross-shire, so it was important to get those out. Thanks is due for their amazing

# CHURCH CELEBRATES MILESTONE ANNIVERSARY - AND A FOND FAREWELL TO RECTOR DAVID

**OCTOBER 2024 SAW TWO** significant events at St Paul's Scottish Episcopal Church on Muirs in Kinross.

St Paul's celebrated their 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the first service held here in 1874 on Sunday 6 October, 2024. They have also said a fond farewell to their Rector Rev David Mackenzie Mills who has served this church community for the past 11 years.

On 6 October at the morning Eucharist, which was conducted by the Rector, Bishop Ian Paton presided and preached. The church building had been beautifully dressed, with flowers by Maggie Strang Steel and Lizzie Montgomery. On this special occasion Bishop Ian thanked David for his ministry to the congregation of St Paul's and wished him well with his intended future contribution to the wider community of Kinross-shire.

In the evening, there was a celebratory Songs of Praise service organised by Rev Felicity Shaw. Welcomed by the sound of the bagpipes played by Nigel Kellett of Kinross and District Pipe Band, the church was filled to capacity for this uplifting celebration.

The interior of the building was atmospherically lit with fairy lights and the service was opened with music played by members of the Tullis Russell Community Band led by Denise Ward.

The Rector began with a prayer after which he played organ to accompany some of a series of hymns chosen and introduced by individual members of the church community. The band and the piper accompanied the rest and throughout the church was filled

This revealed that the congregation in 2024 were better behaved than some who attended the first church service at St Paul's in 1874! As reported in the Kinross-shire Advertiser, 'very unseemly conduct was displayed in the evening by a number of young persons rushing into the church some time before service and making a most indecent scramble for seats.'

All were delighted that so many who attended joined after the service in the meeting room to raise a celebratory glass and enjoy light refreshments and fellowship.

Organisers said, 'A huge thank you to everyone who came to join in the celebration and especially to Denise and the Tullis Russell musicians and to Nigel for the music which made this such an uplifting and memorable experience for all of us.

'At the time of writing our Church community plan to say their personal farewells to Rev David Mackenzie Mills after his final Eucharist Service at St Paul's on Wednesday 30 October.

David has seen many changes in his life since he and his wife Anita arrived in Kinross. Their two children were born here, and it has been a pleasure to see them grow and develop over the years. David is a man of great compassion and many talents. He is particularly gifted musically so singing has firmly remained a focus of our worship at St Paul's.

We all wish him well in his future ministry and intended contributions to the local community as he continues to live in the area.

# KINROSS PARISH CHURCH TO HOST PERTH PRESBYTERY FOR FIRST TIME

THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND'S Presbytery of Perth is holding its meeting on Saturday 2 November in Kinross Parish Church. It will be chaired by Kinross minister Rev Alan Reid, this year's Moderator of the Presbytery.


says: 'To have Presbytery meet at Kinross Parish Church, especially as Alan Reid is Moderator, will be a special event.'

# What's Locked In Your Past?

FOR OVER 15 YEARS, Sarah Smith has been helping individuals and families uncover their Scottish ancestry, breathing life into long-forgotten stories. Unlock your Past is based in Kinross and Sarah is the go-to expert for anyone curious about their ancestry or eager to learn more about their origins.

Sarah's journey into genealogy began with a personal quest to learn more about her own family history after the death of her father in 2002. 'I knew nothing beyond my grand-parents and didn't know how to begin. The internet is a great source but not everything is online'.

Sarah discovered after a few years' of research that her paternal great-grandfather had been in a hospital in England. She found the information from an indexed page on Ancestry. So, she travelled to Staffordshire and visited the archives. Once there, the case notes were waiting for her with a photo of her great-grandfather. 'There was an incredible sense of familiarity'.

That determination, combined with a knack for solving puzzles, led Sarah to immerse herself in genealogical research. "I knew that to become a professional genealogist, I needed formal qualifications. I enrolled in the University of Dundee's Master's programme in Family and Local Histo-

ry, and after five years of study, I graduated with distinction. I then gained accreditation from the Association of Scottish Genealogists and Researchers in Archives (ASGRA)."

One of the most exciting parts of Sarah's work is sharing new information with her clients. 'I often receive requests from overseas clients wanting to trace their Scottish roots, which can be as challenging as asking, "How long is a piece of string?"

One memorable case involved a client preparing for a trip to Scotland, hoping to discover the birthplace of his 4 x great-grandfather. He had some theories but lacked concrete evidence, so he

turned to Sarah for help. Through a process of elimination, the birthplaces that the client had identified were ruled out. Sarah then turned to her attention to his ancestor's neighbours in America, also Scottish, which led to a breakthrough. Two neighbours came from neighbouring farms near Milnathort. With further investigation, she identified the exact location of his ancestor's birthplace, also outside Milnathort.

'It's incredibly rewarding to help people discover not only their ancestors but also the stories behind them,' Sarah explains. 'Genealogy is like detective work, but instead of solving crimes, I'm solving family mysteries. With each new family I research, there's always a unique puzzle to tackle.'

Sarah's work is also about preservation. 'So many stories are lost over time,' she says. 'I feel a responsibility to help families preserve these stories for future generations.' Whether she's creating detailed family trees, writing biographies of each generation, researching ancestral social histories, or simply answering questions, Sarah is passionate about helping people unlock their past.

For those starting their genealogical journey, Sarah offers simple advice: 'Start with what you know and be open to surprises.'

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# THE SCHELDT: THE FORGOTTEN BATTLE

The Battle of the Scheldt in October/ November 1944 is one of the greatest actions of the Second World War. Come with me now, to look at this often overlooked operation, and why it was so important for the final Allied Victory.

### **Background**

THE CITY OF Antwerp and its vital port was captured by British 2nd Army in early September 1944. While 21st Army Group's priority was then Operation Market Garden (Bridge Too Far), no sense of urgency was placed in securing the approaches to the port facilities there- ie down the River Scheldt Estuary – a fatal error – maybe Monty's biggest of the war.

Walcheren Island, at the western end of the Beveland Peninsula, overlooked the Scheldt Estuary, and was strongly garrisoned by the German 15th Army. They had emplaced strong concrete fortifications and large calibre guns, which made it impossible to transit vital merchant shipping, with combat supplies, down the waterway into Antwerp. Because of this delay, the remnants of the German 15th Army had been given the time to escape, and reinforce the island of Walcheren and the South Beveland Peninsula.

The First Canadian Army was tasked to open the Antwerp area, but in the meantime had also been detailed by Field Marshal Montgomery to capture the Channel ports of Boulogne, Dunkirk and Calais, to ease the logis-


tical concerns associated with drawing supplies from the Normandy beaches. The German tenacity in the Channel ports meant that the Allied supply lines would continue to extend, the further away the front line advanced.

On 9 October 1944, (yes, as late as that ) Montgomery issued a directive directing the Canadian Army, with support

from many Scottish soldiers in 52 Lowland Division, to give absolute priority to the clearing of the Scheldt estuary over any other offensive operations. Ten days later, the Allies began their approach to Walcheren Island along the isthmus.



The First Canadian Army spearheaded the Battle of the Scheldt. Approximately



135,000 Allied soldiers took part in the battle, the bulk of which were Canadians, with support from British (a lot of Scots), Polish, French, and American troops. Against them were arrayed nearly 90,000 battle-hardened German soldiers, well dug-in on Walcheren Island, and both shores of the Scheldt estu-

> ary. The waters were mined too. No Allied shipping could pass through.

## The Battle of the Scheldt Begins

THIS WOULD BE a grim, bloody battle, reminiscent of the grinding warfare that characterised the First World War: wire, fire, mud, and blood. Driving rain, heavy defences and landmines made the advance very difficult, when the offensive began in October 1944.

Operation Infatuate was the code name given to this Anglo-Canadian battle. The operation was part of the wider Battle of the Scheldt, and in-

volved two assault landings from the sea, by the 4th Special Service Brigade, and the 52nd (Lowland) Division. Meanwhile, the 2nd Canadian Infantry Division would force a crossing of the Walcheren Causeway.

#### Prelude

A THREE-PRONGED assault was planned with British Commandos and part of the 52nd (Lowland) Division landing at Westkapelle, in the west of the island, and at Flushing in the south. The 2nd Canadian Infantry Division was to cross by a water channel, close to the causeway in the east. However, it soon became clear that the tidal flats around the water channel were virtually impassable, leaving the Canadians with the hazardous option of a direct assault along the well-defended causeway — an exposed stretch 40 yards (37 m) wide and 1,500 yards (1,400 m) long. The Canadians established a bridgehead on the island, through which the British 52nd Lowland Division attempted to pass.





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The plan to flood the island by bombing breaches in the dykes was controversial from the start. The military advantages of flooding the interior of the island were questionable, as it hampered both attackers and defenders. The German defences were concentrated on the high-lying rim of the island; apart from the land-facing front in Flushing, there were no defensible positions inside the flooded area. The civilians living on the island were warned with leaflets dropped from planes to leave the area, but they had nowhere to go – shades of Gaza?


# **Long-Term After-Effects For The Civilians**

The Inundation Of Walcheren, with which Operation Infatuate started, had long-term after-effects for the civilian population. Twice a day, at high tide and ebb tide, the sea water streamed with force through the breaches in the sea dykes, widening and deepening them. As a consequence, areas that fell dry at low tide were inundated again at high tide. Only the areas that were normally above sea level, like the town and village centres, remained permanently dry. Other low-lying areas, on the other hand, remained permanently flooded. This played havoc with Walcheren agriculture, as valuable land was permanently spoiled by salination. Most of the livestock drowned.

The taking of the town of Flushing (Dutch: Vlissingen) was part of Operation Infatuate, with a main objective to clear the Dutch Island of Walcheren from the German invaders. The island was heavily fortified with a dense concentration of bunkers and strongpoints with heavy guns and artillery, manned by more than 10,000 soldiers of the German 15th Army.

Once No.4 Commando had successfully established a bridgehead, it was time for the 5th King's Own Scottish Borders (KOSB) to land on Uncle Beach in the afternoon,

The Allies had to place great reliance on Weasel and Buffalo amphibious landing craft.



together with the 7th and 9th Royal Scots.

# Push Into Flushing

NOW THE AIM was to take Flushing itself. By the end of the afternoon of 30 October, No. 4 Commando had reached most of its objectives and held most of the old part of the city.

The following day, the 4th and 5th KOSB fought their way through the streets further up to the north part of Flushing, while No. 4 Commando and the 7th and 9th Royal Scots cleaned out the German resistance along the coastline to the West, heading in the direction of Hotel Britannia, the German Command Headquarters. In this area, the Germans put up a fierce resistance. Large parts of the area were flooded, making it hard for the Allies to navigate, and forcing them to fight the enemy in waist deep water. From the 5 KOSB war history:

After three days of heavy fighting, Flushing fell into Allied hands around noon of 3rd November 1944. By the end of November

1944 after a massive

Battle situations are frequently described as 'fluid'. Flushing literally was a fluid battle; it was aquatic in more senses than one. It began with an amphibious assault and, as it developed, the infantry often had to go into action waist deep in icy water. The waters of the Scheldt, pouring through the gaps in the sea wall, converted some of the roads into fast flowing rivers with treacherous currents at high tide and the men of the rifle companies had to hold on to each other in a human chain at some of the whirlpool spots.

minesweeping operation of the Scheldt, the first cargoes were being unloaded at Antwerp. The way was now clear for the much needed port of Antwerp to get going, and be used as a proper and large port for Allies' supplies.

What shall we look at next ...? How about the Battle of the Bulge- 80 years on- the Ardennes offensive- the surprise attack by the Germans in December 1944 – it was brutal. It is a sobering reality, and testament to the scale of the struggle, to realise that the Battle of the Bulge accounted for approximately 10 percent of all American combat casualties in World War II – over 80,000.





## **Sewage Spills Into Loch Leven**

EVERYONE WILL BE aware of the growing problem of algal blooms in Loch Leven, many of which are toxic to animals and humans.



The majority of our drains in Milnathort and Kinross are combined, that is they carry both household sewage and road surface water. This means that in periods of heavy rainfall our waste water treatment plants can't cope with the levels of mixed sewage and flood water entering them. In such circumstances Scottish Water are licensed by SEPA to divert excess sewage and flood water untreated into Loch Leven.

I think this is a disgraceful situation but to date I have been unable to get either the Scottish Government or SEPA to do anything about it. Neither Scottish Water or SEPA kept any records of the number of times untreated sewage was discharged into Loch Leven.

I have managed to get Scottish Water to agree to fit monitors to the discharge pipes so we can find out how big a problem this is and measure both the frequency and volume of the untreated sewage discharges.

These monitors should be fitted by December this year. Let us hope this is only the first step in increasing the protections of Loch Leven. We must stop the dumping of untreated sewage into our waterways.



### **Ballingall Bridge A91**

I WAS ASKED earlier this year if the markings on the 'black and white' bridge could be repainted. This was an excellent suggestion given the number of accidents at this location. These works have now been completed and the bridge looks much better. The Council also repointed and repaired the masonry prior to the bridge being repainted.

#### **Pavement Weeds**

MANY OF OUR pavements were sprayed for weeds but this year it didn't happen until the beginning of October, which made it largely a waste of time and money. With cut backs in Council spending this situation will likely only get worse in years to come. I would encourage anyone who has a pavement outside their house to try and keep it weed free themselves. It would help to prevent our streets from looking neglected as many have been this year.



#### **Education And Learning**

I HAVE FOUND myself drawn into various aspects of Education and Learning within PKC. Not least because it takes the largest part of the budget for which we as Councillors have responsibility.



I will take this opportunity to talk a little about it.

#### **Parent Councils**

I SPENT SEVERAL years on what was Kinross High School Board in the early 2000's working to prove the old Kinross High School building was not fit for purpose going into the 21st century.

Whether this pressure had an impact, or whether it coincided with a change in Council and Scottish Government policy, I do not know, however, we did get a new campus incorporating Kinross High School which opened in March 2010.

For this reason, amongst many others, I hold the job of School Parent Councils in high regard. They are the ones who know most intimately what is happening with their children day to day. The Kinross High School Parent Council (KHSPC) has had a bumpy ride over recent years with two of the last Parent Councils resigning before the end of their tenure and at the recent AGM, nobody was prepared to stand as an office bearer.

The primary issue seems to be in understanding what engagement with parents means to Perth and Kinross Council Officers with responsibility for Secondary Schools.

Whether it means just telling them what is going on or whether it means enlisting their help, listening to their ideas, and working with them to devise solutions to what can be very significant problems in which they have a significant locus. Issues with phone use, bullying, treatment of Additional Support Needs pupils are examples requiring significant attention.

I have been supporting KHSPC to enable an appropriate role for them in School Improvement Plans. I strongly value the intelligence and expertise parents can bring to the running of a school and the need for them as parents and partners to be involved in a better education for all young people.

I have asked officers to find a solution to this as a key priority going forward.

#### **Additional Support Needs**

I HAVE WHAT has been the harrowing privilege of more than a handful of parents outlining details of their experiences in trying to work with schools in obtaining an appropriate educational experience for their young people with additional support needs (ASN).

I would be counted as one of these children if I was at school today and my own dyslexia had been recognised. Sensitivity to lighting, noise levels and crowds of people are no joke for the neurodivergent.

The impact of this can be such that their nervous systems are overwhelmed which can result in a stress response that it is difficult for them and those around them to manage. If the reasons for them being overwhelmed are not recognised or managed properly then



these young people can be labelled as difficult and problematic which is a label they may live with for the rest of their lives. This does not even start to describe the impact on them receiving an appropriate education.

I have been working to highlight to officers the full impact of not adequately assessing and meeting this challenge. I have no doubt the solutions are expensive, but it is not good enough to make these young people suffer, just because some of us grown-ups do not rise to the challenge.

I was most interested in a podcast with Dr Johnny Graham, a child and adolescent consultant psychiatrist with NHS Tayside. He talks about where we are in understanding neurodivergence and diagnosis. You can find it on CAMHS Conversations podcasts. It is a complicated and fascinating subject, but the main thrust is that we may not all thrive in the same kinds of environment and that does not make us deficient or (in my view) disabled.

Realising that girls were not even being diagnosed with autism until 2008 and autism and ADHD were not viewed as potentially concurrent until 2014 might help in understanding why so much catch up is taking place. There is much that is positive that can be derived from a proper conversation about this, not least avoiding cohorts of young people being laid aside and possibly ending up in institutions like prisons, which has historically been the case. The neurodivergent have many gifts to offer but I will leave a longer treatise on that for another time.

One final point on this, is that if we get the environment right for neurodivergent children, then it will benefit all children. After all, trying to work or study in a frenetic, noisy environment does not work well for most of us.

## **Education Scotland And Evaluation Of Schools In P&K**

A RECENT INSPECTION by Education Scotland at Perth Academy unveiled disappointing results and this followed disappointing results from three other secondary schools in the authority area.

As a member of the Council's education committee, I investigated the "Quality Indictor" scores awarded to secondary schools in Perth and Kinross, in their "self-evaluation" reports.

This indicated that most assessed their performance as "Satisfactory" in most of the categories.

Education Scotland's definition of "Satisfactory" is: "An evaluation of satisfactory means that the strengths within this aspect of the service's work just outweigh the weaknesses. It indicates that service users have access to a basic level of provision. It represents a standard where the strengths have a positive impact on service users' experiences. However, while the weaknesses are not important enough to have a substantially adverse impact, they do constrain the overall quality of service users' experiences. It implies the organisation needs to take action to address areas of weakness by building on its strengths.", i.e. it is a scraped pass.

I have asked repeatedly for a report to come to committee, identifying the areas for each school where an assessment was "Satisfactory" or lower, with an explanation of how these were to be raised to a standard of "Good" or better.

To date, I have not been successful in getting this report, but I will continue to press on it.



IN MY LAST Kinross Newsletter column, I provided readers with an update to the Eljamel and NHS Tayside scandal, one year on from the momentous public inquiry announcement. Having now attended the first meeting of the Eljamel Public Inquiry at the Apex City Quay Hotel in Dundee at the



beginning of October, I wish to inform readers of my initial reactions.

The meeting was the first opportunity to lay out the draft terms of reference and to hear from the inquiry board. The addresses from both Lord Weir and Jamie Dawson KC were very reassuring and compassionate, as they outlined their responsibilities in relation to the inquiry. We now know the inquiry will be undertaken in Edinburgh but will also be broadcast for those unable to make the journey.

It was also announced that the public inquiry would be provisionally named the 'The Eljamel Inquiry'. We were assured by the board that the short title does not mean the inquiry's scope will be any more limited, but rather that Eljamel is the common factor linking all the issues, and it is his name that this scandal has frequently been attributed to in the media. Neither the draft terms of reference nor the inquiry name is set in stone however, and I welcome the openness and willingness of the board to engage with patients and amend based on their feedback.

It is important to note that public inquiries are not common events and in my 17 years in Parliament I have never previously been involved in any. Governments are naturally hesitant to sanction them because they mean facing hard truths, asking difficult questions and holding those responsible for failings to account. All the while, shocking revelations are exposed to the watchful eye of the media and public. Likewise, they will almost certainly result in recommendations – sometimes costly – that forces change on the established order.

I am adamant in the case of the Eljamel inquiry that positive outcomes will be achieved; that proper safeguards will be introduced, ensuring a rogue surgeon can never again operate unchecked and that the wellbeing of patients always comes first.

Prior to the public meeting, I also held a pre-inquiry meeting, alongside Willie Rennie MSP, with many of the former patients, carers and family members. It was important to thank the efforts of all thus far, to answer any concerns that patients may have and stress that the political side of the campaign will be on their side all the way as we seek justice. It was a very emotional meeting at times with many patients sharing their harrowing accounts of Eljamel's butchery and the lack of support they received from NHS Tayside in the aftermath.

After many delays, I am glad that the wheels are now in motion for the one-to-one clinical reviews which are essential for gaining evidence required for the public inquiry. For some, including Pat Kelly and Jules Rose, this has been a decade-long campaign to get to this point; where they can finally get answers to the many questions that have haunted them for so many years.

TEMPERATURES HAVE certainly dropped since my last column, serving as a harsh reminder that winter is well on its way.

Readers will likely know by now that the UK Government has scrapped the Winter Fuel Payment for pensioners who are not on pension credit.



I have received countless emails from older constituents who are worried about their energy bills as a result of this, and I think it goes without saying that I voted against the measure in parliament.

But with an estimated 880,000 eligible households in the UK currently missing out on Pension Credit, I would like to take this opportunity to remind readers to check your eligibility if you think you may qualify.

As a rule of thumb:

- If you're single with total weekly income under £218 you're likely to get it. If you have a weekly income of under £235 then you may get it.
- If you're a couple, both of pension age, with total weekly income under £333 you're likely to get it. If you have a weekly income of under £350 then you may get it.

However, this isn't blanket criteria, so it's important to check. You can do so at: www.gov.uk/pension-credit/eligibility.

I have had several visits to Kinross and Kinross-shire since my last column, the first being to Sinclair Cycles, an e-bike and repair centre on the banks of Loch Leven. This is a dynamic small business with all sorts of affordable bikes for customers to choose from.

Cycling is just about the best mode of active and environmentally friendly travel, and with so much stunning scenery on your doorstep, Kinross-shire is a great place to do it.

I was really impressed by Mark's commitment to ensuring that cycling is made more accessible and affordable for all. For anyone looking to buy a bike or get one repaired, I would recommend paying them a visit.

Another visit was to Kinross Activity Centre. I was blown away by this facility and the range of activities on offer, from archery, to laser clay shooting, to axe throwing, to rifle shooting.

There is currently no water access on the loch until April. This means no kayaks, paddleboards, swimmers or any variation on those! This is to protect the massive population of wintering wildfowl. We must do everything we can to protect them from any disturbance. Thank you in advance for your co-operation.

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AUTUMN IS DEFINITELY here and I'm delighted. Cooler weather is the perfect opportunity to cosy up with hearty dinners and warming drinks.

This Heather Honey Old Fashioned is my favourite autumn/winter tipple. Warming and soothing, but still smooth, I use Benromach

Contrasts which is my current dram of choice, but you can use whatever you like.

Something with a bit of peat really will make all the difference. Even if you aren't into those medicinal flavours, the honey mellows it out and blends beautifully with the smoky, saltiness of the whisky.



# HEATHER HONEY OLD FASHIONED

#### **SERVES 2**

2 tbsp heather honey
1 cinnamon stick
1 star anise
100ml boiling water
100ml peated malt whisky
Few drops Angostura bitters
1 orange



Add the honey, 2 slices of orange, star anise, cinnamon stick to the water and bring to a simmer and melt the honey. Leave to infuse for 10 minutes.

Strain the liquid equally into two heavy crystal whisky glass. Add a few drops of bitters and 50mls of whisky into each glass. Cut two fresh slices of orange and drop half into each glass. Carefully peel a section of orange peel (a veg peeler is great for this), leaving as much pith behind as you can, and twist that over each glass so that the orange oil sprays over the drink. Enjoy by a roaring fire.



Now it's time to return from a magical weekend. Fingers crossed that the return will be less stressful. Certainly Edinburgh Airport won't be quite so full.


Chicago, Chicago, you lived up to and exceeded every expectation. Every good reason to be proud of yourself. Thanks for the memory, I'll be back.

#### **Community Police Report**

Between 27 August and 10 September around 50 fence posts were stolen from a farm in the Rumbling Bridge area – under investigation.

#### **Traffic Statistics**

The Kinross Community Policing Team have been carrying out speed checks in Powmill following complaints of speeding after track days at Knockhill. Roads Policing officers have been carrying out patrols in the area, mainly on the A977 at Crook of Devon and have charged drivers for driving whilst using a mobile phone and driving without a seatbelt.

MoPs reported several incidences of children from the school riding bicycles around the school and development site being nearly hit by contractor's and farm vehicles. #### **Matters Arising**

Craighead Windfarm (search for 24/01193/FLM at: https://planningapps.pkc.gov.uk/online-applications/)

The CC's Draft response was discussed - the Fossoway and District CC objects to the planning application on the following grounds: Impact on the landscape (which must consider the cumulative effect with Brunthill); detrimental impact on our local economy especially businesses that rely on access to the Ochils (£150,000 per year on the Gliding Centre); mitigation measures described in the application do not satisfactorily answer objections we have made during the consultation with the developers – e.g. traffic plans, proposed site access, etc. A vote was taken on the draft response:

CCllrs: four agree with the objection; one is neutral.

MoPs: seven agree with the objection; one supports wind farm in general; one is neutral with conditions.

Therefore, the draft response as presented to the meeting will be submitted.

#### **Community Development Trust (CDT)**

The Survey is now complete and there were over 250 responses. The results will be used to create the Community Action Plan and inform both LDP3 and our new Local Place Plan. The analysis of the responses will be shared at a Community Dropin Event between 2pm and 5pm on 17 November in Crook of Devon Village Hall, where the community will vote on priority projects for consideration by the Trust.

Development of LDP3 The PKC Economy and Infrastructure Committee will review the timetable for LDP3 at their meeting on 21 Oct. Currently they are in the evidence gathering phase for submission to Scottish Government gateway review. LPPs will need to be registered with PKC by 31 Jan 2025 to be considered in LDP3. As part of the LDP3 process PKC will seek input from developers and landowners on sites for development and consider what sites in LDP2 have and haven't been developed.

# Road Safety In FDCC Area Including A977 Mitigation Measures

#### Road Improvement Projects in Ward & Kinross-shire:

The CC has re-sent our prioritised list of road improvements to PKC as there appears to be a difference between their current list and our agreed priorities.

#### **Potholes**

Cllr Freshwater had received complaints about Waulkmill and the state of the road surface at the last meeting, so he did a walkabout. It is particularly bad, both the road and some of the roadside walls etc. He has raised this with both PKC's housing (walls) and roads departments regarding the condition and both have agreed to follow it up.

#### Roadworks

U221 Gelvan Moor Road in Carnbo: the end date for closure is now 12 October 2024.

Amey is undertaking surfacing improvements on the M90 northbound carriageway to the north of Milnathort from Friday 4 October to Tuesday 8 October: there will be overnight road closures between 7.30pm and 6.30am each night. Diversions

will be in place leaving the M90 at J8 then following the A91 and A912 to re-join at J9.

Craigend Road (U223) in Powmill will be closed from its junction with the A977 for its entire length from the 21st October 2024 for a period of ten days for surface patching.

**20mph Limits:** Cllr Cuthbert reported that local Councillors will be briefed later this month and proposals will then be made public.

Pavement Parking Ban will start to be deployed in November. Fossoway area transport – 23 bus service & Community Bus

The new 23 bus service, run by Glenfarg Community Transport Group, began on 2 September. The service is developing well and the drivers are reporting an uptake of people. There is a review meeting with PKC and Glenfarg on 9 October. MoP reports that no one will engage with them, emails are unanswered, planning conditions are ignored, etc. The CC reiterated that Safer Communities is the route for engagement and Planning Enforcement for breaches of planning conditions.

#### **Crook Moss Travellers Site**

CCIIr Cheape spotted an abandoned vehicle near the site. This has been reported to the Police.

#### Warm Space Fund

PKC's Community Learning & Development Group has announced the return of the Warm Welcome Fund, aimed at supporting community groups and organisations with the provision of warm spaces during the winter period. Tracey Ramsay will be co-ordinating a workshop at the LLCC on 16 October to discuss applications. Any queries to TRamsay@pkc. gov.uk or CLD@pkc.gov.uk. CCllr Lamb is intending to attend the workshop to apply for funding for events at Moubray Hall, Powmill.

#### **New Business**

#### **Kinross and Glenfarg Stronger Communities**

The Perth and Kinross HSCP General Practice Premises Public Survey took place in September and October 2023. Based on the consultation findings, the Primary Care Team are implementing an action plan to improve primary care premises across Perth & Kinross. #### **Moubray Hall**

Repairs are need to the Hall, which is a Category C listed building. The Hall is owned by the Community and SWI manage it on behalf of the Community. CCIIr Marchant will arrange a discussion with the Powmill SWI and the CDT to understand how ownership/management of the Hall and upgrades can be progressed.

#### **Seamab Defibrillators**

Seamab School have advised the CC that they have had two defibrillators fitted: One mounted to the rear of the existing school building, at the side of the big courtyard gates; One fitted to the side of the first house on the right as you enter their Care Campus on Naemoor Road, near to Lendrick Muir. Access codes will be provided to a 999 call.

A MoP asked how to get one, CCIIr Bruce-Jones advised that the best thing is to contact Kinross First Responders for information about what to purchase and to get training in their use: https://www.facebook.com/KinrossFR

#### **Community Noticeboards**

The CC has been advised that many of our community noticeboards are in a poor state of repair. The CC will see if the CDT can raise monies for repairs.

#### Consultations

The significant workload associated with the wind farm applications means that the CC will not be responding to any consultations before December 2024.

Boundaries Scotland Consultation: The CC has been advised of proposed constituencies and provisional proposals changes. CCllr Pye said that he had briefly examined this document and didn't believe there is anything that affects our area. https://boundaries.scot/sites/default/files/SPReview2\_Further/Booklet\_Regions.pdf

#### CC Business – meetings attended

CCllr Marchant – 12 September Planning Users Forum CCllr Williamson – OS webinar 24 September & 25 September Sustainability Group

CCllrs Bruce-Jones & Williamson – 25 September Sustainability Group

#### **Councillors' reports**

Cllr Cuthbert: PKC are starting to look at Budget as there is a £1M overspend this year. He advised that CC looks at spending the remaining A977 mitigation money in case it's impacted. He attended a briefing from the Health and Social Care Partnership which revealed that that there is no NHS Dentist anywhere in Kinross-shire which he's going to look into.

Cllr Robertson: Attended a meeting of the Scrutiny Committee that produced massive reports which must have cost a fortune to create — surely this could be reduced? A report about homeless people shows 165 families on the waiting list at the end of September. The average time to move people out of temporary accommodation across Scotland is 278 days, and although it's only 65 days in PKC this is still too long.

Cllr Robertson reminded landowners that hedges at pavement/road edges should be cut back. A MoP asked who was responsible for the Rumbling Bridge path? Cllr Robertson said that if he was sent a picture of the location, he would arrange for the hedges to be trimmed by PKC.

#### **Planning Matters**

Local Place Plan CCllr Williamson joined a webinar in Sept with the Ordnance Survey (OS) which was also attended by quite a few members of other CCs. Many sought more training on the software package we have been asked to use. OS were quick to recognise this need but it's not clear when they may be able to provide it. Meanwhile, CCllr Williamson will reach out to Planning Aid Scotland and see if they can possibly help.

CCIIr Marchant received advice on preparation of the LPP

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at the Planning User's Forum: The LPP should be a series of settlement maps with future requirements plotted on them; The focus should be on affordable housing needs, active travel opportunities, tourism, protecting natural assets, responding to climate change, and improving or making better use of assets; The CC should take the opportunity to engage with landowners and developers.

Approved, no CC comment. 23/01794/FLL Change of use, alterations and extension to sawmill to form dwelling house and formation of vehicular access at Land 40 metres south-east of 1 Nursery Cottages, Solsgirth, Dollar. Approved, no CC comment.

#### **Local Review Board**

23/01275/FLL – Erection of 5 holiday accommodation units, a managers accommodation unit and workshop/garage, formation of vehicular, parking areas, landscaping and associated works, land 150 metres north west of Barnhill Farm, Powmill, Dollar.

The CC has submitted the following additional comment: We strongly believe that additional holiday accommodation is not required in this locality following the approval of 124 holiday accommodation units at Whinstone Quarry, Devonshaw, Powmill (23/00491/FLM) which is in very close proximity to this application. In addition, access to this location is via rural single-track roads which are predominantly used by our farming community; without passing places access will be problematic.

23/01619/FLL – Formation of access track, erection of stables, siting of caravan, and associated works (temporary period) (in part retrospect), land 250 metres north of The Farmhouse, Easter Muirhead Farm, Blairingone, Dollar.

The CC had objected and our objection on the grounds of road access will be passed to the LRB. Insufficient information has been presented by the applicant to demonstrate the proposal accords with LDP2 Policy 53E Water Supply and the proposed development will not prejudice existing users of the private

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water supplies serving the area. It should be noted that an alternative planning application for the same area minus the onsite caravan is awaiting a decision: 24/00974/FLL. The CC will not make any additional comment.

#### **Planning and Placemaking Committee October 2024**

There following applications from our area will be discussed: 23/01313/FLL Erection of 7 dwelling houses, formation of vehicular access, landscaping and associated works, land east of Honeysuckle Cottage, Cambo.

#### **Boundary Map**

Due to Cllr R Watters absence, no update was available with regard to the possibility of an up-to-date CC boundary map being available.

#### **Old Cleish Road Development**

A member of the public, who had attended the August meeting, advised that the residents affected by the proposed development had met to discuss their concerns, following the advice from the CC at the last meeting. Residents had mixed opinions with regard to submitting conditions to be placed on the applicant as this may be seen as accepting the work. The member of the public had, however, submitted an email to PKC outlining conditions that they would like to see imposed on the landowner. They had subsequently received a response from Mark Dunlop who advised that he (Mr Dunlop) did not think it appropriate for the CC to be recommending conditions be submitted as the proposed development was not their

CCIIr Mckay commented that there was no point in the CC being in existence if that was the case, and they are also concerned with the work currently being undertaken.

The member of the public also commented that the flood defence scheme also appeared to be confusing the situation. The member of the public enquired as to how the meeting between Mr Dunlop and the landowner (on 12 August) had gone but there was no information available. The member of the public advised he had a list of approx. 11 concerns which he would leave with the CC. CCIIr Mckay requested CCIIr Willsher to contact Mr Dunlop to request a site visit as soon as possible with members of the CC, Councillors and residents.

#### **Refuse-Bin Straps**

CCIIr P Chan advised that although the library had few straps left in stock, they were unlikely to replace these and suggested residents should order similar straps from Amazon.

It was agreed to raise this at the next meeting with the Councillors.

#### **CC** Insurance

CCIlr Freeman confirmed that this had been dealt with.

#### Stronger Together Meeting - 29 August

CCIIr K Spain had been due to attend this meeting on behalf of CC but it was unclear as to whether she had done so, following her resignation. It was agreed that CCIIr Mckay would contact the group to get an update.



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#### **Planning Matters**

#### **Planning Applications Received**

24/01321/FLL alterations and extension to dwellinghouse at 20 Gallowhill Road, Kinross.

#### **Other Planning Matters**

23/00005/PAN mixed use development comprising the erection of retail units including garden centre (Class 1a), cafe/ restaurant (Class 3) with drive-through, a petrol filling station and formation of landscaping, infrastructure and associated works at former British Car Auctions, Kinross.

This is the application for the retail units at the BCA site and while the majority of the town thought this was a good thing to have, there were some residents with concerns, particularly regarding how work can be carried out when planning permission had not been granted yet. CCllr Freeman made comment to an email received from a nearby resident who had raised this issue.

There was also concern regarding the flood defence work and both CCIIr Mckay and CCIIr Freeman confirmed that while negotiations are ongoing, work will be completed when the building work commences.

Those present were advised that the agents would be attending the October meeting to give an update.

24/01193/FLM erection of 8 turbine windfarm and associated works at land 1.5km north east of Earnieside Farmhouse, Dunning Glen, Dollar (Craighead windfarm).

A member of the public advised that while this application had been submitted, they had raised concerns with PKC in March 2024 as the information in the application with regard to access to the site was incorrect. CCllr S Wells commented that an application could be submitted, even if the land were not owned by those submitting the application.

The members of the public had met with PKC planners advising that they would not be consenting to access to the land, which would be gained via the road to Brackety Farm and Earnieside Farm. It was noted that the owners of Earnieside Farm have given their consent as the proposed wind farm is on their land). It was noted that the owners of Brackety Farm had also not received a neighbour notification from PKC regarding this application, or the one at Brunt Hill.

CCIIr Freeman enquired as to whether the proposed wind farm at Brunt Hill would affect the member of the public, but

CCIIr Freeman thanked the members of the public for raising this matter with them and after discussion it was agreed that CCIIr Willsher would submit an objection on behalf of the CC. 24/00716/ECU36 development comprising 18 turbines (of which 10 wind turbines have a ground to blade tip height up to 200 metres and 8 wind turbines have a ground to blade tip height up to 185m) and battery energy storage system (BESS) at Brunt Hill Farm. The CC had objected.

#### Reports from CC representatives

CCIIr Freeman advised that £26,529.68 in grants had been awarded to approximately 16 organisations via the Community Investment Fund.

#### **Licensing Applications**

No applications had been received. It was also noted that there had been no application from the Premier Stores submitted.

#### Correspondence

Kinross Fun Fair – an email had been received from a resident who wished to raise their objection to any future decision to allow the fun fair to use Market Park. The resident lived adjacent to the park and wished to complain about the disruption to their day to day lives while the fun fair was in town, particularly the noise (screaming of those on the rides),

flashing lights and the disruption to the use of their TV and radio during the time the fair was in town.

The resident had raised this particular issue with the fun fair staff who advised that the Council had given permission and they did not believe the issue was down to a power surge as they used their own generators.

CCIIr Mckay advised that she had spoken with a number of people in the community. None had raised any concerns. In fact, the fair was a welcome distraction to the daily struggles faced by residents. She also advised that if the resident subscribed to Sky Glass, there had been a major outage which had been reported and this may have been the issue.

In discussing the email, it was agreed that the fair had been held on private land and with the appropriate permissions granted by PKC. As such, the issues raised were not in the jurisdiction of the CC and CCIIr Willsher was asked to respond on behalf of the CC.

**Proposed Pharmacy at 145 High Street** – it was noted that the proposed pharmacy had been approved by the PKC planning department.

Remembrance Parade – an email had been received from Police Scotland (Tayside Operations and Events Planning) with regard to the Parade. CCIIr Freeman confirmed he had responded.

**Concerns** – a resident living in the High Street has sent an email raising a number of concerns, for example, demolition work, no communications about the works being issued, noise levels, drilling test holes, house shaking, at the BCA site. The resident also advised that they had been trying to contact BCA with regard to overgrown vegetation which is encroaching into their garden without success. They also raised a concern about an apparent increase in HGVs and tractors using the High Street, travelling at excess speeds with no regard to pedestrians and residents. The resident states they have seen a number of near misses recently and feels that the High Street is not structurally sound to deal with this type of traffic. They suggest that the road becomes a one-way street as soon as possible with adequate crossings and paths being repaired as their current state is making it difficult for those with buggies and wheelchairs to use, with some having to use the road.

In discussing the email, members agreed that the resident should contact the land owners and not BCA with regard to the work which is being carried out at the moment.

With regard to the traffic issues in the High Street, it was agreed to discuss this at the next meeting when, hopefully, the Councillors would be in attendance.

Unauthorised Development At Old Cleish Road, Kinross — an email had been received with regard to the unauthorised development on open land and right of way at Old Cleish Road. The resident had contacted PKC with regard to the work currently being undertaken on the land as well as vehicles also using the roadway, particularly around HGVs using the road as

Police Scotland had been contacted with regard to the second point following some unsavoury incidents including damage to cars

A member of the public commented that the landowner was not adhering to the conditions set out by PKC or those contained in the Local Development Plan.

#### **News from the September Meeting**

#### **Police Matters**

From 8 August 2024 (last report) there have been approximately 42 calls to police from the Milnathort area and 12 crimes recorded on police systems.

12/08/2024 Drink driving (Dalqueich Bridge, Dalqueich) 1 x charged and reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

26/08/2024 Fail to report accident to Police (unclassified road near Middleton) 1 x charged and reported to the Procurator Fiscal 28/08/2024 Theft of cement and fence posts (Websters, Milnathort). Subject to live investigation.

#### **Road Traffic Matters**

PCs Samson and Duncan have been carrying out regular checks at Milnathort Primary School at drop off and pick up times as a result of speeding and parking complaints, since the schools have returned. To date, it has been busy with cars however no illegal parking or vehicles speeding have been observed.

On 11 August 2024, local officers from Kinross were on mobile patrol on the A91 just outside of Milnathort when they had cause to stop a vehicle. After checks it was discovered the driver did not have insurance and they were reported to the Procurator Fiscal.



#### **Actions From Previous Meeting**

Replacement gate from Lathro park to South Street – The procurement for the replacement gate at the South Street entrance is still ongoing, however PKC will not progress until the path etc are adopted by PKC from Persimmon.

Kevin raised that it had previously been agreed on what type of gate would be fitted, and Cllr Watters added that all parties i.e. Persimmon/PKC had agreed that providing a gate was part of the development. Kevin added that a number of residents have asked about the status of the gate due to safety concerns for children and dogs. He continued by asking the PKC councillors how we progress this as it seems to be in a stalemate.

Cllr Watters took an action to follow up with PKC on what can be done whether as an interim fix or something more permanent.

#### Milnathort / Kinross Boundary

It was raised at the previous CC meeting that the boundary line for Milnathort no longer includes parts of the Auld Mart estate. It was minuted that the MOCC request PKC to restore the original boundary and would be seeking agreement from KCC to do the same. Neill raised this with KCC who agreed and minuted it in their last meeting.

Cllr Watters will raise with PKC to make the necessary changes to the CC boundary.

#### **Roads**

A922 SOUTH STREET - MILNATHORT (KY13 9XB)

Scottish Water Ironworks - temporary traffic regulation order effective from 9 December 2024 for a period of two days.

The order will temporarily prohibit all vehicles from parking and loading on both sides of the A922 South Street, Milnathort from its junction with the private access to the property 108, South Street (311835, 704294) to a point 60 metres South on the A922 South Street (311806, 704242), a distance of 60 metres or thereby.



#### **South Street Zebra Markings**

Several members of the public have raised concerns regarding the lack of visibility afforded to vehicles approaching this particular crossing. The zig zag markings are a number of feet away from the kerb, allowing cars to legally park next to the pavement. This is making visibility difficult to pedestrians trying to see if there is any oncoming traffic and for oncoming traffic's ability to see whether there are pedestrians about to cross.

There are also two private dwellings access whose visibility can be minimised when vehicles are parked between the zig zag and the pavement.

It is requested that consideration be given to re-positioning the road markings so increasing the visibility of traffic approaching the crossing and making the crossing safer for pedestrians.

Cllr Watters took an action to raise with PKC roads department in this regard.

There has been a request on several occasions to place a crossing on Stirling Road. There is provision to implement one road crossing improvement in Milnathort, and the CC were asked to decide on whether the zebra crossing at South Street should be upgraded to a puffin crossing or a new crossing at Stirling Road be created. The CC were disappointed that both improvements couldn't be accommodated. Although the discussion leaned towards a new crossing at Stirling Road, the CC decided to wait until the next CC meeting in October to make a decision and invite all residents to get in touch or attend the October meeting to voice their opinions.

#### **Milnathort Primary School**

Laura will shortly be moving to Australia, with Tuesday 17 September, her last day at MPS. She expressed her thanks to the CCllrs for all their support both to her and to the school in her time in charge, and introduced the new temporary head teacher – Lyndsey Budge.

Road safety concerns – There has been some unsafe driving activity, and behaviour by drivers at school drop off and pick up. The local community police officers have been very responsive and have been at the school drop off and pick up on a number of days to help improve driving safety.

As part of the Safer Routes to school initiative the Chair of Kinross trishaws, visited and presented to the school children, and discussed a potential bike bus for pupils to travel safely to school.

MPS are working with our business partner Sainsbury's. They will be sponsoring the 'Wellbeing Wednesdays and the tuckshop'. The school has had a visit regarding the Fairtrade initiative, and CCllr Kevin Heneghan has been visiting the school to present on the local community. Laura thanked Kevin again for all his support in visiting the school.

The Nursery are planning an Intergenerational event, which will include a cake and craft event.



The P4 and P7s will be attending the Dundee Discovery film festival to watch a French film.

MOCC wish to thank Laura for all her support and help in her time as MPS Head Teacher and we wish her all the best in Australia. We welcome, Lyndsey the new temporary head teacher and wish her the best of luck in her role and look forward to continuing our work and support of MPS.

#### **Core Paths Update**

Milnathort Core Paths Group have again been busy over the past weeks. We've again flailed the Core Paths at Burleigh Castle, the Paths through the woodlands at Burleigh, the Path at the side of Milnathort golf course leading up to the A911 including the short section to The Stackyard and the link Path between Arlary rail track and the start of the Core Path leading to Burleigh Castle. The Paths at Hattonburn and Tillywhally Woods will be cut over the next week or so. We've also cut back branches that were dangerously overhanging the Paths.

This was the last big cut of this year, although we'll be going to the Stirling Road and Bacon Factory fields after they've been harvested to re-establish the Core Paths there. The landowner and farmer have already agreed to this, they were previously unaware these were Core Paths.

Although growth will slow down or cease during the winter, there are still plenty jobs to do to keep the Core Path Group husy.

Cllr Cuthbert – added his thanks to Kevin and Core Path Group for all the work they do.

24/00923/FLL Installation of ground-mounted solar array and associated works, land 70 metres south west of Craigow, Milnathort, approve the application

### Large Planning Applications Windfarms

A lively discussion was held not only on the Craighead application to PKC that was recently submitted but also on the previous Brunthill Farm submission to the Energy Consensus Unit. A number of residents were negative in their approach towards the CC, for not objecting to the BruntHill windfarm as a number of the other Kinross-shire CCs had done. A question was raised regarding a perceived potential conflict of interest with one member of the CC, with regards to the involvement with the Sustainability Group and also whether any CCllrs had been employed by an energy supplier.

It was clarified that none of the CCIIrs are or have been employed by any companies involved in either of the recent windfarm developments and hence did not feel the need to raise any potential conflict of interest.

With regards the Sustainability Group involvement, MOCC have only one CCllr as a representative in this group. The group is made up of CC representatives from all other Kinross-shire CCs, even those that objected to the Brunthill windfarm. There are also a couple of CCs from outwith the Kinross-shire area represented. The purpose of the Sustainability Group is not to be involved in any planning discussions or to pressure any CC either way. The purpose is to think about the future, if any of these windfarms or other large developments or other forms of renewable energy go ahead, how do we manage any community funds as a group. To help lessen the pain across each CC by sharing the burden and to speak with one collective voice. It is early days, and nothing is guaranteed, however it is better to be prepared and to have a plan and not use it, than to have no plan when we need one.

Following a healthy debate and discussion the points raised

by those present for and against the proposed Craighead windfarm development were summarised as:

- Access route: One of the access routes is across land they do not own, and the owner made a point to say they would never sell it to them and were not happy it was listed in the planning application. Cllr Cuthbert confirmed that planning applications do not need to own property/building/land that is detailed in their application
- Noise and vibration from the turning blades
- Visual impact of the proposed development given the height of the turbines.
- Flickering lights: During sunlight and in the night the turning blades will cause a light flickering effect that can be problematic for some people
- **Cumulative effect:** All the above will be magnified if both windfarms are progressed.
- Energy production: We need these to help with energy production, to help with high energy prices and to ensure we can produce the energy we need onsite.

All of the above points and those suggested mitigations will form the basis of the response from MOCC to the planning application and all present were thanked for their input to allow a planning response to be made.

It was acknowledged by all that the CC have a duty to represent the views of both sides of any proposed developments and planning application whether it be by attendance at meetings or via other contact with the CC.

**Clir Watters:** Active travel master plan — Kinross-shire has its own plan due to missing out on the national plan. It was present to and approved at the recent Kinross-shire Local Committee. #### **Crime Prevention & Police Report**

These showed a common disregard for the speed limit, and the details were passed to the police.

#### **Co-opting a New Councillor**

As agreed at the previous CC meeting a new CCIIrs (Jes Bunce from Keltybridge) was formally co-opted on to the CC.

#### **Broadband Update**

#### **Blairadam Area**

Keltybridge now has 100% coverage for Full Fibre Broadband with every house able to order a Fibre to the Premise (FTTP) service. This includes The Tabernacle Hall which had a fibre service installed during September.

There are three properties in the wider Blairadam area which are still not fibre enabled. These properties are on the Western side of the M90 motorway and are covered by the Scottish Government R100 Programme which is due to be completed by June 2026.

These properties are notionally covered by Voneus which took over from Broadway in the area, this means that these properties are considered to have a 'superfast' broadband connection available even though the Voneus website states that the company is not able to actually deliver that service.

#### **Drainage**

#### Keltybridge

On-going problem with sewage leaking onto the main road near to the entrance to Middleton Park, and directly adjacent to the place where the school buses pick-up and drop-off. We had an update from PKC Environmental Health that they had attended the site and needed to engage a drainage contractor to identify the source of the leak, but did not expect that work to happen in the near future. Cllr Freshwater took an action to escalate this issue with the PKC Environmental Health department, as little visible progress has been made in resolving this issue since it was originally reported to PKC Environmental Health.

#### **Financial Update**

The accounts are being prepared for the end of year audit.

#### **Planning**

The following planning applications have been added or updated since the previous CC meeting.

#### **Applications Pending**

24/00703/IPL Residential development (in principle) land 140 metres north-east of The Bungalow, Benarty Road, Kelty. This is the second application for this site, after the first application was refused.

24/00938/FLL Formation of seven residential caravan pitches each with ancillary facilities building, septic tank, ancillary touring pitches, vehicle parking and access, erection of one stable building and associated works, land 180 metres north of Hawthorn Wood, Benarty Road, Kelty. The CC has objected.

24/01233/FLL Erection of a dwellinghouse, land 20 metres south of Hillview, Kinnaird, Blairadam, Kelty. This is the second application for this site, after the first application was refused. The CC has objected.

#### **Applications Approved**

24/00734/FLL Change of use of land to form extension to garden ground, 8 Abbot's Wynd Keltybridge, Kelty. Approved, but permitted development rights have been removed from the section of land that lies out with the village boundary.

#### **Applications Withdrawn**

24/01089/PNF Formation of forestry track and upgrading of existing track, land 780 metres south of 1 West Mains, Cleish.

#### **Planning Enforcements**

Site North of 31 Keltybridge. Referred to Planning Enforcement due the lack of compliance with conditions specified in the planning approval for 29 & 31 Keltybridge

24/00123/LAND Land adversely affecting amenity, Blairfordel Farm, Kelty. Enforcement Notice Issued.

#### **Tree Preservation Orders**

No progress so far from PKC in relation to tree preservation orders in relation to the woodland at Nivingston House.

#### **Blairforge Planning Enforcement**

Attendees again expressed concern that the multiple planning violations at Blairfordel Farm are not being enforced despite subject to a Planning Enforcement Notice (24/00123/LAND).

Concerns were again raised in relation to the enforcement of planning decisions by PKC, and in particular the lack of progress on enforcement of the planning violations at Blairfordel Farm which appears to be leading to the unconstrained growth of a settlement where there are increasing numbers of structures without planning consent.

Concerns were again raised about the perceived lack of equal treatment of residents by Perth & Kinross Planning Enforcement. The commonly held view still being that Planning Enforcement discriminate against lawful settlements by aggressively pursuing 'soft' targets for planning violations while allowing more 'difficult' cases like Blairfordel Farm to go unchallenged. Such an approach makes a mockery of the planning process in Perth and Kinross where individuals are apparently able to ignore planning regulations with impunity.

Residents of Blairforge who attended the meeting raised serious concerns about the lack of support from PKC during the planning mediation process with some Blairforge residents reporting being intimidated and no longer feeling safe in their own homes.

It was again highlighted that PKC Planning had been aware of these planning violations from very early on in the illegal development of this site, and the lack of early effective enforcement by PKC Planning Enforcement has directly resulted in the sprawling illegal development that we now see.

There seems to be little that the residents Blairforge can do in this situation to ensure that PKC Planning Enforcement is applied in an unbiased manner.

#### **Wind Turbines**

Two applications have been submitted in the local area, with one going to the Scottish Government because it is over 50MW in size, and the other going to PKC because it is below the 50MW threshold. **Sustainability Group** — Representatives from the CC will attend the next Sustainability Group meeting at Glenfarg.

#### **Local Place Plan**

The CC is seeking funding to help with the development of a Local Place Plan to cover Cleish and Blairadam.



The Local Place Plan needs to be completed by the end of 2024, and given the importance of this plan in making known the wishes of the residents of Cleish and Blairadam as part of the wider PKC Local Area Plan.

#### Village Updates

#### Blairadam

Roads: Concerns about visibility at the Junction at Blairforge due to growth on the verges – previous work did not clear the vegetation far enough back to ensure a safe level of visibility at this junction.

Notice Boards: The CC has requested the assistance of the Kinross Men's Shed to help refurbish the noticeboards in Keltybridge and Blairforge, both of which are in need of repair.

Pavement Parking: There is an on-going problem with vehicles parking on the pavements in Keltybridge and forcing pedestrians to walk on the roads.

PKC is currently reviewing how the Scotland-wide ban on pavement parking will be enforced in our area.

Speeding: There have been multiple reports by residents of vehicles speeding through the 20mph zone in Maryburgh.

#### Cleish

Cleish School: Still outstanding work regarding the agreed replacement of the sign at the school with one more in keeping with the local area.

It is not clear what the timescale is for this work as a Listed Building Consent application to cover this work has still not been received. Junction of the B9097 & B996

The road markings at this junction are in a very poor state of repair meaning that traffic at the junction cannot easily see where the edge of the junction is – particularly in the dark.

The overgrown verges are impeding visibility in both directions at this junction, particularly overgrown broom bushes which are blocking sightlines.

The next meeting of Cleish and Blairadam CC will take place on Monday 2 December at the Cleish Village Hall.



#### **Kinross Probus Club**

We enjoyed a presentation by Roy Johnstone on Women Pilots of the Air Transport Auxiliary (ATA) in The Second World War.



The ATA was a British civilian organisation set up at the start of The Second World War with headquarters at White

the start of The Second World War with headquarters at White Waltham Airfield in Berkshire. It was set up in recognition that fighter planes had to be in the right place at the right time and

vital combat pilots could not be spared to do this crucial job. The ATA ferried new, repaired and damaged military aircraft between factories, assembly plants, transatlantic delivery points, maintenance units (MUs), scrapyards, and active service squadrons and airfields. It also flew service personnel on urgent duty from one place to another.

Many would think it was a job for men only but, in fact, the ATA had around 168 female pilots. Although these women were not actually allowed to fight, they still had an important role to play.

With new aircraft constantly being built and damaged ones being repaired, pilots were needed to ferry them between the factories and various UK airfields. Along with their male colleagues, these women transported some 309,000 aircraft throughout the course of the war.

The women were often thrown in at the deep end. They could be asked to fly any one of over 147 different types of aircraft, without seeing it beforehand and with minimal written instructions. To qualify they had to be experienced and qualified pilots, although a training programme was developed with pilots qualifying in stages for the different types of aircraft.

During the Battle of Britain, women were restricted to flying training and communication aircraft such as the Airspeed Oxford. That would change later on in the war, when female pilots were allowed to fly the iconic Spitfires and Hurricanes. In 1943, the women were awarded equal pay with their male colleagues, one of the first instances in the UK.

At the time the female pilots had to overcome all sorts of prejudices, they even had to get special permission to wear flying suits rather than skirts.

This is a Second World War story that few people know about, but it's true to say Britain could not have fought and won the Battle in the Air without the ATA.

Norma (with additional help from Mrs Baird, eco coordinator of Portmoak Primary School) has produced a leaflet to help other groups, particularly schools, to set up their own growing projects. This will be available, along with the recorded footage made earlier this year.

Our plans for the Michael Bruce Cottage garden took a step forward with a consultation to look at the plans and take note of suggestions. Around a dozen people turned up to meet Charlie Hardman, the Take a Pride in Perthshire project adviser. The responses were very positive and there was useful feedback from the attendees. Unfortunately, we didn't get the winter season started last month as our speaker was taken ill and could not make it. Hopefully she will be able to present her talk at a later date.







He was born and grew up in Lochgelly where his father was a miner. Although Jim was keen to become a footballer from an early age, his father persuaded him to stay on at school to sit his highers.

Jim started to play football at seventeen but had a bad leg break at twenty and had to give up playing. At twenty-four he was managing Kelty Hearts, at twenty-five managing Cowdenbeath and at twenty-seven the Dunfermline Youth team. He took over the Dunfermline team whilst still in his twenties. Over the years he was also at Livingstone, Inverness and Montrose, before returning to Dunfermline. He managed the teams so successfully that had there were six promotions up through the leagues, four to the top and his teams played in three cup finals.

He met his wife whilst they were both taking part in Kelty Musical Society productions. Later on he went back on stage playing in pantomimes at various different Scottish theatres.

His wife, Mary, died on their 30<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary and afterwards he became involved in fundraising in her memory. The first achievement was an ambulance, but amongst other things, the trust has also built a school in Nigeria, provided a temperature control suite for babies born in hospital in Kirkcaldy and young people from Fife have been funded to go to America for sporting involvement.

Jim Leishman was approached by former Prime Minister Gordon Brown, asking him to consider becoming a Fife Councillor. He refused to begin with but came round to the idea and was elected to a seat in Dunfermline. Days after being elected a councillor he was chosen as Provost of Fife which he has been ever since, the longest serving Provost in Scotland. The Provost role takes him all over the world representing and promoting Fife.

After questions from the members, Ian Russel gave the vote of thanks for a talk much enjoyed by the members..

Two senior boys have completed Active Schools Friday after school sessions at Kinross Primary School and, after the October break, will commence sessions at Fossoway Primary School.


The Active Schools secondary volleyball sessions at Kinross High School resume after the October break with the usual Wednesday lunchtime and after school sessions.



The reserve is full of the sounds of pink-footed geese (on our goose count at the start of October the team counted 11,537 on the loch!) and whooper swans. We've also had great views of great white egrets, barnacle geese and lots of ducks including teal, goldeneye and wigeon.

The red squirrels have been very active in October too, and have provided a good source of entertainment on our live camera. If you're planning a visit to us and would like to see Red Squirrels, the Leafy Loop is the best place to spot them.

And speaking of the Leafy Loop, we're delighted to say that we have a new Sky Bench on this trail. It's a great place to take a moment to relax and see nature from a different perspective, whether that's watching the trees move in the breeze or watching the clouds drift by.

If you're thinking about your Christmas shopping, make sure to pop by for some stress-free shopping. # **MAN'S BEST FRIEND**



I FOLLOW A FARMER on YouTube from Ayrshire, his name is Cammy Wilson. His channel is called The Sheep Game and it has 392,000 followers. Cammy has a young family who feature in the films about working with sheep alongside a lot of shearing videos that people love. In the way that is common online nowadays it seems nothing in his life is sacred. Last month he cheerfully delivered an update from a hospital bed after his hernia operation. He discloses prices, costs and lots of other things many farmers keep to themselves. He's happy to share it all, including his mistakes. Even an accidental bash of his pick up on a strainer post makes good content and keeps his audience amused and interested.

Last week however a post popped up on my Facebook page that sent a shiver down my spine. This time, it wasn't a funny accident. It was a huge error that he made which impacted his sheepdog. He decided to share the story but it did come with a warning so be warned. Unfortunately, he tied Spot, the sheepdog to the back of the pick-up and after walking round some land he returned to the vehicle and drove away. Are you feeling like I did? Goosebumps bumped up through my arms and shoulders and then spread inwards, tightening up my chest and landing hard in the pit of my stomach. Despite quickly confirming he had travelled only a few hundred yards I was still feeling Spot's terror and pain and Cammy's shame as he spoke. He drove straight to the vet, Spot was sedated, his paws bandaged and kept in overnight, he was both unlucky and lucky in the way that it could have been much worse.

I've had a few of my own experiences with farm dogs over the years, the first being when I was only six or seven in the byre at Torr Farm. Dad gave me a bowl of food for the new sheepdog. Whin ate if fast then slipped off the lead and out of the byre. He disappeared on my watch and I had that sinking feeling in my stomach for three days until he was found many miles away in Glen Fruin.

During my middle year studying agriculture, I applied for a job on a livestock farm near Keith. By this time, I had a wee bit of experience and my new boss said I would be allowed to work with the 800 Shetland ewes on my own if I had a working Collie to bring with me. Of course, I didn't have a dog of my own but I said I did as I was so desperate to get the job that came with its own cottage. A friend of a friend loaned me Maid, she came from a farm in the Fintry hills and was so clever that I hardly had to give her a command. Maid made me look really good, gathering up Shetlands from all corners of the farm and bringing them along the road. One snowy day we had someone else helping so instead of walking with the sheep I was in the Landrover. Maid got confused and whilst looking for me ran under the wheel. It was pretty much an instant death for her that left me distraught as well as annoyed and ashamed. All day I insisted on keeping going with my jobs and in the evening, I took a spade up to the woods to bury her. I was 19 when that happened and until now, I have only shared this with a few people. Sadly, there have been other accidents over the years. Kim broke her leg on the tractor step before lambing one year and in 2017 Tib got her hind quarters and tail crushed whilst working in the fields. It was tough losing her but this time I had my family around me and the vet explained it happens a lot as the dogs are just so eager to work and farms are such dangerous places.

But back to Cammy and his decision to share it all. As he said himself, he couldn't try to hide it as that would feel like he wasn't being honest with his online community. So, he owned up to his mistake and told the story which as you can imagine resulted in hundreds of comments. Some people unfollowed him immediately but it looks like many of his followers were very understanding and displayed great empathy for the situation. They just wanted to know if Spot was okay and gave Cammy their support, by telling him mistakes happen. I admire Cammy's approach and his honesty encouraged me to share my stories of the tougher parts of my farming life with you all. Here's a picture of me and Maid in 1994.

# **GEESE GALORE**



AS WE ARE WELL into autumn now, we hope everyone has been enjoying the spectacle that the pink-footed geese provide, especially at dawn and dusk as they leave the roost. We conduct goose counts throughout autumn and winter to get an idea of how many are on the loch, and numbers can peak to between 15 and 20,000. This time of year we can also see plenty of thrushes such as blackbirds, redwing and fieldfare enjoying berries on rowan and gelder rose trees. Although the berries seemed to have arrived earlier this year so we hope there's still plenty for them.

Like last year we will be hosting our free wreath making event in our workshop, on 5 December. We use natural resources from around the reserve, and have expert help come along, as well as providing a lovely warm cup of mulled wine (non-alcoholic) and a mince pie, and playing Christmas tunes to get ourselves in the festive spirit. Last year we were fully booked, so if you want to reserve a spot, please email lochleven\_nnr@nature.scot. We have slots from 5pm-6.30pm, 6:30pm-8pm and 8pm-9:30pm.

Into November we will still have one of our seasonal reserve officers Stuart working on the reserve, so please say hi if you see him about, and keep an eye on our socials to check for any events we might be hosting.

We will also be reinstating our festive character trail that we had up last year at Burleigh which was a big hit! And this year we will be incorporating a quiz into the trail.

Along with our fabulous team of volunteers, we have recently been busy keeping the trail tidy, so there has been lots of grass cutting and loping back thorny foliage. We've also been cutting and lifting the vegetation on our meadows. This is an essential task to ensure we continue to get lots of lovely wildflowers and a wider diversity of species growing. If we allow more rank vegetation to grow and die, when they decompose, they release

too many nutrients into the soil, making it a less desirable for certain species. Our new hide along the trail towards Cavelstone also has a new meadow. So far it is mainly grass with a few other species dotted around in it, but with a continued management, we hope that in a few years' time we have another lovely wild-flower meadow.






