

Mackenzie also volunteers at Live Active helping to teach Gymnastics and has been a volunteer helper at Kinross School nursery.


CONGRATULATIONS TO Kay and David Mitchell who are celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary.

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BLAIRINGONE WAR MEMORIAL TO STAY ACCESSIBLE TO ALL

A COLLABORATION BETWEEN Kinross-shire community organisations, a developer and PKC has ensured that the war memorial in Blairingone remains accessible to the public wishing to pay their respects and remember local people who served in the armed forces.

The memorial was previously located on the wall of the village's former church. With this building being sold for redevelopment, the structure was moved to a new area in the extension to Blairingone Cemetery.

Through joint working by the Council's Bereavement Services, Fossoway Community Development Trust, Fossoway and District Community Council, developers Profile Projects and landowner Johnny Stewart, arrangements were made to engage an experienced contractor to remove and relocate the memorial.

Funding from the Council and Profile Projects enabled these works to be carried out in March 2023, with a new grassed area, path and fencing around the memorial completed in May 2023.

On Wednesday 9 August, representatives from all the project's partners marked its completion.




Blairingone War Memorial – now located in Blairingone Cemetary extension

Cllr Dave Cuthbert said: 'I am delighted that the war memorial has been moved and would like to give special thanks to Mike Barnacle, who put a huge effort into getting the memorial moved, both as an elected member of Perth and Kinross Council and as a private individual.'

Chair of Fossoway Community Development Trust, Mike Barnacle commented: 'The relocation of the war memorial has been a long-sought project for the local community since the mid-2000's, and one I have pursued both whilst a local Councillor and subsequently after stepping down from that role in May 2022. Through continued discussions and joint working by all concerned, we have achieved a highly successful outcome which I am delighted to bear witness to today.'

Councillor Neil Freshwater added: 'The preservation of the memorial is extremely important and so it is great to see it relocated to a new location and preserved for the future. Congratulations to everyone for their efforts in achieving this and in particular to former councillor Mike Barnacle for his unwavering perseverance over many years.'

GLENFARG SHUTTLE GOES TO FIFE

GLENFARG COMMUNITY TRANSPORT is trialling two additions to the 55 bus service.

Until the end of September, Glenfarg Community Transport will be trialling an additional early morning run on the 55 bus and will also be trialling a Gateside Shuttle, which will connect the villages of Strathmiglo and Gateside to the 55 route at school times.

The first service from Glenfarg will now be 0710 and this will connect with the 0737 Ember E1 Service to Edinburgh. This will be under review at the end of September when Ember publishes their new timetables.

This provides a valuable link for commuters who are keen to reduce car usage and residents of Milnathort and Kinross will also be able to use the bus to get round to the Park & Ride.

In the morning the Gateside Shuttle will run Monday to Friday starting in Strathmiglo at 0805, calling in at Gateside at 0810 and connect with the 55 bus heading south at Mawcarse Crossroads at 0815, arriving at Loch Leven Community Campus at 0822.

The return service will run Monday-Thursday and depart the Campus at 1553, connect at Mawcarse with the re-

turn Gateside Shuttle at 1600, arriving in Gateside at 1605 and Strathmiglo at 1610.

Fares will be charged on the 55 bus sector but the Gateside Shuttle is free for the duration of the trial.

Anyone from the villages can travel $-\ 8$ passengers maximum.

Early September should see the go-live for the new website — *GlenfargCT.co.uk*.

This will have pages for the 55 bus and

the community bus with details of timetables for the 55 and a bookings calendar for the community bus.

A spokesperson said, 'There will be dedicated pages for walking and wheeling too, as we want to embrace Active Travel. Our existing presence on *Glenfarg.org* will continue until the new site is established.'

New Lid On The Block For Binross

MOST OF KINROSS-SHIRE should now have received their new grey lidded recycling bin, although it is not to be used until November.

The grey bin means that the contents of the blue-lidded bins will now be split into two recycling bins; paper and cardboard will continue to be recycled in the blue-lidded bins and plastic, cans and cartons will go into the grey lidded recycling bin.

The reasoning behind the change is:

- It brings PKC in line with the Charter for Household Recycling, which was designed to bring consistency to recycling services across Scotland.
- It will reduce contamination levels. Studies have shown

that splitting the recyclates over 2 containers brings down contamination levels, this means that materials collected are more likely to be recycled, as paper and cardboard which are easily contaminated by liquids or food remnants left on cans & plastics are kept separate and clean.

PKC have obtained £2.72m funding from Scottish Government via the Recycling Improvement Fund which is administered by Zero Waste Scotland to help with this scheme.

New collection calendars will be made available online in October 2023. Paper copies can be requested via the Customer Service Centre from October.

WHAT'S FOR WHICH BIN?

BLUE BINS WILL ACCEPT paper and cardboard only and the new grey-lidded recycling bins will accept plastics, cans and cartons.

The new grey-lidded bins will also accept two new materials, soft plastics and foils.

Soft plastics and foil have never been recycled at the kerbside before in Perth and Kinross. This is great news as these materials currently make up around 9% of your general waste bin by weight and even more by volume, due to the materials being so light.

SOFT PLASTICS include things like:

- Crisp packets
- Empty plastic bags
- Empty black bags
- Fruit nets
- Films
- Bread bags
- Sweet wrappers
- Cling film
- Bubble wrap
- Blister packs from medicine

FOIL includes things like:

- Pet food pouches
- Foil
- Foil trays

PLEASE REMEMBER: Despite black/plastic bags being included in the new grey bin, these items will still need to be placed in the bin individually.



CHANGE ON THE HIGH STREET

IT'S TIME FOR CHANGE in Kinross as two long-term presences in the town decide it's time to shut their doors for good.

Perhaps the most keenly-felt departure will be that of Pete Chan and his family who run **Mr Chan's** Chinese Restaurant, a fixture in Kinross for 36 years. 'It feels like 40!' Pete laughingly told the *Newsletter*. 'I was 19 when my Dad took it over – he was the chef.'

That was back in 1987 and Pete remembers the town centre as a very different place back

then, with lunchtime memories of seeing the Kinross High School children on the street in their smart purple jumpers and blazers, when the school was in its previous location.

There have been a few enquiries about the restaurant, he told us, and he hopes someone will take it over as a ready-made going concern. Pete says he has 'no plans to do anything but rest' when he gives up the restaurant, which at the time of printing



is about to close its doors for the last time. But, as he says, 'Never say never!'

The last few years have been challenging, with Brexit, the war in Ukraine, and problems with rising food prices and the cost of supplies. All hospitality ventures have had difficulty retaining staff but he hopes things will settle down in the next few years.

Pete is very touched by all those who have dropped in to wish him well.

He said, 'It is really very much appreciated. My heartfelt thanks to the local people who have supported me through the years.' He is frank about how much he will miss it, but he feels it is time for a change. Pete Chan and his family will be much missed and the *Newsletter* wishes them all the best for the future.

Cashmere at Lochleven is also going to be closing soon. This is very sad for Kinross shoppers who will miss the lovely gifts, cards and friendly staff, and who remember the wonderful annual Fash-

ion Show which was such fun. Shop staff commented, 'We would all like to thank you from the bottom of our hearts... it is because of you that the last 13 years have been such a joy.'

Readers will be relieved to hear that the closure of the retail shop is not a reflection of the overall business at the Mill, which is currently expanding under the ownership of Shanghai-based Zhejiang Xinao Textiles.

Tartan Kipper's An Odds-On Favourite!

'We'll also be holding regular evening workshops when participants can learn a craft while relaxing with a glass of wine.'


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LOCH LEVEN GATEWAY UPDATE



A SECOND DROP-IN consultation event for developers of the old BCA site took place on Wednesday 23 August 2023. Developers, including the architect and the engineer were all present to answer questions from the public about their revised plans, following the first public consultation events.

Plans to include a petrol station at the site have now been scrapped. The developers would be ready to proceed, but must wait for the PKC Flooding Team to finalise the flood defence strategy for the area. Flood defence works need to be completed before any building work can get underway. Graeme Reid, Construction Manager at LPSIM told us, 'The good news about the engagement and support from the local community is however tempered by the fact that we cannot at present move the project onto the planning stage until we see positive action from P&K Council in respect of them bringing forward their proposals for the flood defence scheme which is crucial to safeguard the future of Kinross. Our development is contingent upon PKC delivering their scheme within a realistic timeframe otherwise we will lose the strong support for the project we currently have from national retailers - they simply won't wait around forever.'

The target opening date for Loch Leven Gateway is currently set at January 2027.

Developers have taken on board comments made at the first consultation about drainage and have incorporated the use of raingardens into their design for the car park. Here are some of the questions and answers that followed the first public consultation event.

The existing road access to the Loch Leven pier is narrow and unattractive and there is no direct route through the develop-

ment site connecting with the Heritage Trail car park – can this be provided?

We are looking to provide direct pedestrian, cycle, vehicle and public transport access into the Heritage Trail car park. This will be subject to approval from Perth & Kinross Council (PKC) and the Heritage Trail car park owner.

What range of shops and facilities will be included?

This is a retail led development. Currently envisaged is a discount retailer with a garden centre, a discount and premium food retailer and a coffee based drive thru. Provision will be made for electric vehicle charging and cycle parking. A bus stop and local bus turning facility will be provided if an operator requires this. Provision has been made to include a future Phase 2 development land area which could act as a buffer between the commercial buildings and the Heritage Trail car park, potentially for a range of leisure related uses.

How has the access been considered?

We are considering access and traffic related issues in some detail as we discussed at the first consultation. The publicly adopted access road leading to the development site requires to be designed in accordance with road traffic regulations and to the approval of PKC. A landscape buffer is proposed to be introduced between the houses at 253 -267 High Street and a new re-aligned access road which will shift it away from the houses. Dedicated access and parking for the residential properties will be retained to the rear. A Travel Plan will be developed to look to encourage visitors and staff access to the site by sustainable means, and a Transport Assessment will be prepared to accompany the planning application.

Electric car charging is a good idea. How many charge points will be provided?

It is envisaged that a number of EV charging points, in discussion with the Council's transport team will be provided. This is likely to be equivalent to 10% of total car parking spaces.

What impact will the development proposals have on the Councils plans for constructing flood defence measures to protect homes and businesses in the future?

We have engaged with the PKC Flooding Team who will shortly publish their proposals for the flood defence strategy in order to ensure that our proposals align with theirs. Fundamental to the flood defence strategy is the construction of a flood defence wall on our land to the north side of the Queich Burn which would necessitate demolition of the existing buildings on the site and transfer of land to the Council. The proposals have been developed to take account of the proposed flood defence measures, with the information that the council have provided to date.

How will delivery vehicles get access as the High Street is unsuitable for larger vehicles?

Delivery vehicles will avoid the town centre by taking access via Junction Road and Clashburn Road. This will also apply to construction traffic for both the council's flood defence works and the new gateway development.

Phase 2 is an area which will be developed at a later date, and local people can comment on what they would like to see in this area.

KINROSS RESIDENTS ARE BEING urged to check their electoral registration details or risk losing their chance to vote. The Electoral Registration Officer has already written to households to check that the electoral register is up-to-date, and to identify any residents who are currently missing.

If you have been asked to respond, there are instructions in the letters already sent on how to provide details of changes. If these households fail to respond, an employee of the Electoral Registration Officer will be obliged to visit over the next few weeks to ask for the details to be provided.

Recent home movers in particular are urged to check their details. Electoral Commission research has found that recent home movers are less likely to be registered than those who have lived at the same address for a long time.

If you are not registered to vote, make sure you provide the necessary information to your Electoral Registration Officer when asked and register to vote online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.





The recent summer performance of Shakespeare's 'The Merchant of Venice' was a great hit. The young cast breathed life into their


characters, impressing the audience with their poise and commitment. Under Moira's guidance, the children have honed their acting abilities, showcasing remarkable growth.


With a local focus it became clear this way of distribution wasn't necessary. They are now published on a dedicated 'Conversations from the Shire' channel on YouTube.


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
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TULLIBOLE CASTLE LIGHTS UP!

As always there are a number of simple measures that can be put in place to disrupt and prevent criminal activity around your property.

- Reduce access by replacing unused gates and entrances with a permanent fence or other barrier; secure all gates with good padlocks and repair fencing promptly to prevent/restrict any future unauthorised access.
- Park vehicles as close to your premises as possible, preferably out of sight of nearby roads
- Remove keys when not in use
- Fit wheel clamps and/or locking posts or consider an alarm
- Park larger vehicles in front of access doors to prevent easy access
- Mark or customise your property so that it's easily identifiable. This can deter thieves and assist recovery if

they are stolen. CESAR is the nationally recognised marking scheme. Marked vehicles are 4 times less likely to be stolen and 6 times more likely to be identified. This can have a beneficial impact on your insurance premiums.

If we can make it difficult for organised

crime gangs to target our communities then they will quickly look elsewhere for easier prey.


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WIND FARM REPORTS ON UPDATES

Galileo's Community Offering

Galileo is committed to developing projects that deliver substantial and tangible long-term benefits locally, fostering strong community relations.

If consented, significant funding will be distributed to the local community over the lifetime of Craighead Wind Farm, in addition to creating employment and providing opportunities for local businesses in areas such as construction and hospitality.



REPRESENTATIVES FROM GALILEO, who are proposing the Craighead Wind farm development, recently attended Fossoway and Kinross CC meetings to provide an update. The number of turbines has been reduced from 12 to 10 but they will still be the same height – up to 200m.

The combined output will still be over 50MW so a Section 36 Application will be made to the Scottish Government. The actual build is likely to be around five years away. Landscape topography, viewpoint photos, bird surveys, archaeological walk over and peat probing are now complete, and ecological studies almost complete. Noise assessment is in progress. All studies should be complete by October 2023.

After public feedback, the original detail for a Community Wealth Fund is now under consideration. A large majority of those consulted stated a preference for a discount on their electricity bill, for the period of the wind farm's existence.

The following are under discussion: A £100k construction period disruption fund; sums to discount electricity costs for properties within 5km from the turbines – this would cover over 600 properties.

Payments would be annual, on a sliding scale based on distance. 1.5km would receive £1.4k; 2km - £1.2k; 2.5km - £1k; 3km - £800; 3.5km - £600; 4km - £400 and 5km - £200.

There will also be an offer of purchasing up to 10% ownership of the scheme although details can't be defined until the final design is complete. Further consultation events are planned for October.

THE DEDICATION OF TWO LADIES in agriculture has been recognised with the presentation of Royal Highland And Agriculture Society (RHASS) long service certificates at Kinross Show.

Catherine Hunter and Rena Borthwick were both employed by the Cattle Information Service as milk recorders. Catherine, who received a certificate for 48 years in the role, worked primarily in Perthshire and Kinross. She explained there were many early starts on the round – and some late finishes too as the milk recording is carried out during milking times.

Initially the service concentrated on recording yields and butterfat of individual cows, but developed to provide information on protein and cell count, it now includes monitoring the health status of the herd.

Rena who was presented with a certificate for 39 years service, travelled to farms across Kinross-shire and Fife and said it was a busy but enjoyable role with the information obtained from the recording being a valuable management tool for the milk producers. Both ladies finally hung up their wellingtons and retired in May.

RHASS run the award scheme to recognise the long service of employees who have been in full-time employment in Scotland within the rural, agricultural and support service industries.





You will need:

SERVES 2

Four grouse breasts
2 tbsp butter
1 tbsp thyme leaves, chopped

2 whole beetroot, peeled and quartered

10 damsons

1 star anise

Olive oil

2 tbsp port

1 tbsp sherry vinegar

1 tbsp caster sugar

METHOD

Roast the beetroot in olive oil in the oven at 200°c/180°c fan/Gas 6 for around 20 minutes or until tender. While this cooks, place the damsons in a pan with a little water, the star anise, port, sherry vinegar and sugar. Cook gently and once they have popped, fish out the pits.

Cook down for around 6 – 8 minutes and set aside.

Heat an ovenproof frying pan to a high heat with oil, butter and thyme and add the seasoned breasts. Cook for 2 minutes on each side, basting with the butter throughout.

Leave to rest for 5 minutes. Add the roasted beetroot to the damsons and spoon over the grouse breasts. Remember to remove the star anise. Serve with game chips or if you're cheating, a handful of good quality ready salted crisps.

GROUSE SEASON is here.

BY THE TIME THE end of August rolls around, regardless of what the weather's doing, I am ready for rich game dishes, red wine and jumpers. Given that the Glorious 12th has kicked off the game season proper, I have a super simple and deliciously tasty recipe for you.

If you are lucky enough to know people who shoot, you may well be able to get hold of grouse from them. If not, our local butchers will doubtless be able to source some for you. Failing that, there a several online outlets who stock it. Just ensure you are purchasing a young bird, as older, frozen specimens are really only good for long, slow stewing.

I managed to pick up some damsons locally which I made into a fruity sauce, a perfect foil for the iron rich taste of the grouse.

If you are getting it fresh from the moors, you will need to set aside some admin time. I find the garage is the best place. If not, you can pluck the

birds inside a bin bag to ensure you won't be finding feathers in your kitchen for the next six months. Just be careful around the breast as the skin is very fragile and ideally you want to keep that in place to protect the breast meat while cooking. I pluck the whole bird so I can keep the carcass for making stock and the remaining meat for bon bons or pies. But it is possible to just pluck and use the breasts, discarding the rest. There are lots of videos online that can help you.

Pigeon has no season, is plentiful and is often more readily available, so would work just as well if grouse proves hard to come by.

For this recipe you will need two grouse breasts per person.

Citizens Advice Bureau: I was recently sent a report from our local Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) detailing its work in Kinross-shire. The CAB do amazing work helping people struggling to cope with issues that can often seem overwhelming. Please see an excerpt of the report below.



We are seeing increasing numbers of clients who are in work or previously 'getting by' but for whom the cost of living crisis is tipping them into a level of poverty. One client, married with three children aged 16 and under, approached us for debt advice as increasing outgoings attributed to the cost of living crisis left her struggling to keep up repayment plans for debts totalling £4,900. A commercial debt solutions company had advised a Trust Deed but she wanted more information before committing to this. Both she and her husband work and the client stopped claiming tax credit when she moved to full time hours, thinking this was the correct thing to do. In fact, our benefits check confirmed that she is entitled to Universal Credit and also eligible to claim Scottish Child Payments for her two youngest children, which she had been unaware of. We also confirmed the household's eligibility for the £900 Cost of Living payment and that their daughter, who receives DLA, would receive a Disability Cost of Living payment. The client was relieved that we were able to increase her monthly income by £885 meaning she was able to keep servicing her debt in the manner she preferred, rather than signing up to a Trust Deed. This case highlights the complexity of the benefits system, misconceptions about access to benefits when employed and the increasing prevalence of Trust Deeds being suggested as a primary means of dealing with debt, often when they are not the most suitable method for the individual.


The main issues raised recently are; Benefits assistance – 32% Debt advice – 21%, Charitable support – 13%, Utilities advice – 9% Relationship advice – 6%.

Pedestrian Crossings: There are plans in place to upgrade both the Zebra crossing in Milnathort at South Street and New Road to Puffin ones which will be very welcome. A resident in South Street has suggested that all our crossings should be raised to slow traffic crossing over them. I think this is a really good idea especially in areas with speeding issues such as South Street and Springfield Road and I have written to the Council suggesting this be done. I would welcome people's comments on this.

Kirkgate Viewpoint: When is a viewpoint not a viewpoint? When it is blocked by vegetation. There was a visit recently by the board and senior management team from Paths for All who helped fund the recent Loch Leven Heritage Trail upgrade from the Kirkgate Park to Loch Leven's Larder. They were very impressed with the resurfaced path but were disappointed that they couldn't enjoy the view of the loch and castle from the Kirkgate viewpoint because of the overgrown beech hedge. I contacted NatureScot and they have now cut the hedge back enabling visitors and path users alike to enjoy what is a spectacular view.

Craighead Wind Farm

I attended Fossoway and Kinross community councils where Galileo (who are looking at developing wind farm at Craighead in Fossoway) presented an



update. The number of potential turbines has been reduced to a maximum of ten. They are also looking at a scheme which could provide discounted energy bills to houses most affected. So any houses within a 5km radius could receive a contribution from £200 - £1400 yearly depending on how close they are to the turbines. This will be in addition to a further community contribution.

Fly-Tipped Asbestos Finally Removed

The asbestos that had been dumped by Baleave Farm on the Old Cleish Road has finally been removed. I first reported this in early May but to no avail and my request seemed to have vanished. However, following pressure from myself and another resident, the asbestos roofing material has been removed by the Council. The council are usually quite good at responding to requests. There is an online platform that allows residents to report flytipping and other issues such as dead animals and pin-point the location on a map (Google search 'report fly tipping' for the link).

Visit to Loch Leven Mill

I had a very interesting visit to Todd & Duncan to see the fascinating operation. The mill is the largest producer of cashmere yarn in the UK, and large employer in the area. I was sorry to learn of the closure of the retail outlet, but understand this is not a reflection of the overall business which is currently expanding under the ownership of Zhejiang Xinao Textiles based in Shanhgai. It was good to speak with Todd & Duncan's managing director Bruce Cameron who provided a tour of the facilities.

Speeding at Gairney Bank and Cleish

As I noted last week, the Vehicle Active Signs (VAS) were now live at Cleish. Unfortunately, there are still reports of speeding by both locals and visitors. The council advises me that they will monitor the speeds of the new VAS sites to see if behaviours are changing. I am also aware that one of the four VAS signs planned for the Gairney Bank/Gairneybridge has not yet been installed (south bound into Gairneybank) so I have followed up to find out why. It was reported at Kinross Community Council this month that the police have been doing speed patrols at Gairney Bank following problems there, which I had previously reported to the community policing team.

Recycling

Deliveries of the new, fourth wheelie bin started last week. These will have grey lids. The decision to go for a fourth bin was made before I became a councillor,



however, following discussions with officers, I am in favour of this new initiative. As it has now also been confirmed soft plastics and foil can be put into the new grey bin once the new recycling service begins in November (exact dates to follow). Apparently, these items make up around 9% of general household waste but have never been recycled at kerbside before. Soft plastics include items such as crisp packets, bread bags, cling film, sweetie



wrappers and more. Foil items that can be recycled include tin foil and foil trays.

I have been told that Perth & Kinross Council obtained £2.72m funding from Scottish Government for the capital costs of the Service Change.

Road Safety Issues

Mitigation A977 Measures: Back in 2017. Councillor Barnacle and managed to get the money into Council's budget towards improving the safety of the A977.

Several road safety improvements were funded by this money, however, partly because of the covid pandemic, some of the projects were delayed. When I was elected last year, I discovered that due to inflationary pressures the remaining funding would not be sufficient to deliver all the projects. So, at this year's budget meeting, I negotiated an additional £350,000 to ensure delivery of the outstanding projects. I am pleased to see that the first of these projects, requested by residents, is now being worked on. This is in Crook of Devon, where a new path to a bus stop and a controlled crossing, are being built. The next project due to be delivered will be the signalisation of the Drum junction.

Kinros-shire Local Committee

Kinross-shire's Local committee had a development session on 2 August, which was well attended and productive. One of the outcomes was a decision on meeting dates. These have now been pencilled in, as follows:

- 23 November 2023
- 15 February 2024
- 16 May 2024
- 15 August 2024
- 21st November 2024

Meetings will be in the Loch Leven Campus, starting at 5pm and will be both open to the public and watchable online. Agendas and details of how to attend will be given nearer the time.

The 55 and 202 Bus Services

Perth and Kinross Council carry out a re-tendering exercise for all their bus services every five years. This tendering exercise was due to be carried out early this year, however, it was delayed until after the Council's budget setting meeting due to the steep rise in costs following the effects of the energy crisis caused by the invasion of the Ukraine by Russia. Thankfully, the council voted to allocate more money to bus services generally. To ensure the continuation of the 55 and 202 bus routes, Councillor Watters and I managed to get a specific provision of £165,000 for these routes. This should allow them to keep going for the foreseeable future.

However, I was hugely disappointed to hear that the service being delivered by Stagecoach on the 202 route which goes from Kinross to Tillicoultry had been very poor, with buses not turning up and breaking down. Officers are very aware of the situation and are monitoring it closely. The interesting thing is that the 55 service, which goes from Glenfarg to Kinross is now being operated by the Glenfarg Community Transport Group. This has been going from strength to strength, with increasing passenger numbers and the group have adjusted the route slightly to allow residents of Gateside to take the bus to and from Kinross High school before and after school opening and closing times. Well done, guys.

Needless to say, I am trying to see if the 202-bus route can be taken on by the Glenfarg Community Transport Group, or indeed if the Fossoway community could establish their own transport group.

Old Cleish Road, Kinross

Gates and a fence have been erected at the bottom of Old Cleish road, preventing access to a regularly used pathway along the old railway line. The developer has submitted a planning application (in retrospect). I have had several residents complain about not being able to use the path and officers are seeking to get the gates opened, ahead of the planning application being decided.

Blairingone War Memorial

After years of persistent work, former Councillor Mike Barnacle managed to arrange for the Blairingone war memorial to be moved. I want to congratulate him for achieving this. He had to show dogged determination in getting it done.

The war memorial used to be on the wall of Blairingone Church, however, after the church was sold and developed into residential accommodation, it was felt that it should be moved to a different location, so that visitors could access it, without disturbing the residents. It has now been moved to a new area in the extension to Blairingone Cemetery. Well done, Mike!

Kinross Common Good Fund

Common Good funds in Scotland originated in the fifteenth century and are the assets and income of former burghs, including Kinross. They represent a substantial portfolio of land, property, and



investments, and by law, they continue to exist for the common good of the inhabitants of the former burghs to which they relate. The Common Good Act 1491, which remains in force, requires that this property be observed and kept for the common good of the town.

The Kinross Common Good Fund contains £160,000 that is ring-fenced, with the interest earned during the financial year used to fund applications. There is also some land in Kinross that is listed in the 'Common Good Land Register' which can be found at https://arcg.is/09HmK40.

This fund was originally administered through the 'Kinross Common Good' committee, which included all the ward councillors, the leader and depute leader of the council, and a non-voting member from the Kinross Community Council. All the other Common Good funds within Perth & Kinross council area are still administered through this structure with the exception that the convener of the 'Finance and Resources' committee replaces the depute leader. However, when the Kinross Local Committee was set up, the responsibility for the fund was passed to the new committee, and the original committee closed. I have raised my concerns with council officers over several months and consulted with the Kinross Community Council regarding the need to change the council's Scheme of Administration and reinstate the Kinross Common Good Fund committee. This will ensure that the committee represents the geographic extent covered by the legal constraints on the fund's use. With these changes due to go before the full council on 30 August 30, I am hopeful that this anomaly will be corrected.

The Common Good Funds help finance projects that provide community benefits for individuals or groups of people residing in the former Kinross burgh. As a general rule, the Committee has safeguarded the capital in the fund and only disbursed grants from the generated interest. Applications can be made here: https://www.pkc.gov.uk/article/15346/Community-grants.

Community Banking Hub

The 'Which Group' in their latest update on banking in the UK notes that 5,575 branches across Scotland, England, Wales, and Northern Ireland have closed since 2015, at a rate of 54 each month. Scotland is the first part of the UK to see over half of its banks close, with 597 out of 1,040 branches closing and a further 33 set to close soon. Something we can all relate to in Kinross-shire.

Following the Bank of Scotland's decision in January 2020 to close the last bank in Kinross-shire, in the subsequent March Edition of the Newsletter, one of the potential solutions I raised was having a banking hub in Kinross. This followed Pete Wishart MP raising the issue at the Scottish Select Committee in Westminster. At the time, the calls fell on deaf ears, and we are now left without any bank in the area.

Recently, a number of Banking Hubs have opened throughout the UK, with one recently opening in Carnoustie. They offer personal and business banking services, including the ability to talk to a Community Banker from the Royal Bank of Scotland, Virgin Money, Bank of Scotland, TSB, and Santander staff, who are each available for one day a week, bringing shared banking services to the communities they serve. Most of the hubs are being set up to replace banks due to close, where all the banks in Kinross have already closed. However, I have written to Cash Access UK to see if there is scope to open up a Community Banking Hub in Kinross.

I have recently written to SEPA to find out how their planned 2023 farm visits went and to see what work was done to ensure that agriculture is playing its role in helping to clear up the loch. I look forward to continuing to work with all stakeholders to see improvements at Loch Leven.

LAST WEEK MY FRIEND and staffer Irene Hamilton died. I hope Irene knew how loved she was. The outpouring of sadness and appreciation in the days following her death have been extraordinary — a testament to her life and how she lived it.



I first met Irene at a hustings for parliamentary candidates in 2017. I immediately knew there was something special about the wee woman with the dancing eyes and one arm, the other lost to cancer a decade before. "Better go work the room and talk to folk who're more interesting than me" she said. I stayed put.

Once Irene decided she was on your side, there was no fiercer ally. She was soon at the core of my campaign team, dispensing tea, sickly sweet cakes, and wry commentary. When I won, she wanted to know whether there would be a party and what music we'd play. "No YMCA now. I know the gays like YMCA. But I canna do that dance" she said, demonstrating her one armed version.

Irene was a doughty political campaigner with a deep commitment to our country's independence. She'd been a councillor, elected in her beloved Clackmannanshire, and remembered as a tenacious hard worker, determined to help her constituents however tough their cases were to resolve.

In her spare time she loved to walk. She adored the Lowlands' countryside and loved to photograph it, taking beautifully composed shots wherever she went. Nae sma feat wi ane airm. She loved gin (her own version mixed at home to a secret recipe) and she loved good conversation. She was, as we've all seen over these past months, extraordinarily brave.

Irene didn't have an easy life. She'd lived in America and had escaped an abusive relationship to return home with her much loved son. But just as life looked as if it might be working out, she was diagnosed with cancer - Hodgkin lymphoma — which robbed her of an arm, and left her face marked by lumps. She thought sacrificing the arm had saved her life, and initially she was given the all clear. But two years ago she complained of pain, and surgeons operated once more, removing a section of her spine and replacing it with what she called her "bionic spring". It was cutting edge technology but it didn't work, and eventually she was told nothing more could be done. She chose to go home, where she lay in bed welcoming a stream of visitors. Cards lined the room, proudly displayed amongst them one from First Minister Humza Yousaf, and another from Nicola Sturgeon, both with tender messages.

Irene was irresistibly funny with a sharp intelligence, the blackest sense of humour, and an infectious giggle - her "Mutley snigger" as she called it. I went to see her shortly before she died. She was propped up in bed, her devoted, irascible cat Indy taking up most of her pillow. "Well John, look at me" she said. "Just living the dream." We both laughed. She was and is unforgettable.

IN THE MIDDLE OF the summer, volunteer rescuers across the Nevis Range warned that the large increase in the number of rescue call-outs is putting these volunteers under considerable strain.



It is good news, post pandemic, that so many people want to experience Scotland's magnificent mountain grandeur. It is not good news that too many of them are ill-prepared for their adventures.

The mountain rescue teams cite poor equipment and, in some cases, inability to use the equipment they do have, lack of awareness of the changeability of mountain weather and poor fitness levels. They are rightly making a very strong plea for people to think carefully about their expeditions before they set off and to listen to the experts whether that be the Mountain Weather Information Service (www.mwis.org.uk), mountain guides or the advice issued by several key outdoor groups.

Regrettably accidents in the mountains do happen - even sometimes involving some of the most experienced mountaineers - but there is a lot we can each do to minimise the risks we take and ease the pressures on our rescue services.

Here are just some of the reminders: make sure you are carrying appropriate mountaineering clothing and spare kit – even on a warm day a casualty can very quickly lose heat, particularly in windy conditions or if it starts raining. If navigating by GPS/mobile phone, also carry a physical map and compass and know how to use them in case the technology fails. Carry a first aid kit, because help can often be hours, if not days, away if you have no signal to alert your location. Check the weather before setting off and be prepared to call off the hike if the forecast has changed to unsafe conditions such as strong wind. And study the map prior to ascending the mountain to ensure you are following a safe route which avoids crags and exposed sections as much as possible.

Mountain rescue teams in Scotland are outstanding. We are so lucky to have them especially as their financing is tight and their workload increasing. They often put themselves in danger in appalling conditions to help us. We must help them too.














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ONLINE WEBCAM EXTORTION

Webcam Extortion is a term given to demands made for monies or other favours which involve the use of a chat application, the internet and a webcam.

Webcam Extortion can happen when people establish new online relationships with people they don't know. After a period of time victims are enticed to reveal personal information or undertake compromising activity. The victim is then threatened, being warned that images or personal information will be made public unless favours are undertaken or money is paid.

This type of criminality can affect young and old, male and female alike. If you find yourself the victim of such a scam then the first thing to do is not to panic. You have already taken the first big step by recognising you are the 'victim' in this and that you may require support to help you through this difficult time. The Police will take your case seriously, will deal with it in confidence, and will not make judgements on your behaviour.

Do NOT pay. Some victims who have paid what the offenders have demanded hear no more about it, many others who have paid have then continued to receive further and often increasing demands. In some cases even when the demands have been met the offenders will still go on to post the videos anyway.

Do NOT communicate further with the offenders. Obtain screen shots of any communication. Deactivate your Facebook account and use the online reporting process to report the matter to Skype, WhatsApp, YouTube etc. to have any video blocked and to set up an alert in case the video resurfaces. Deactivating the Facebook account rather than shutting it down will ensure data is preserved and will assist law enforcement in obtaining evidence. The account can also be reactivated at any time ensuring online memories are not lost forever.

In general once they're blocked, the offenders can't contact you. If they are unable to do so then they can't threaten you or make demands, so they tend to move on fairly quickly. However, they may try to utilise other contact routes that they are aware of, so be mindful of all sites where communication has been made or you are linked to.

If you have already paid, check to see if the money has been collected. If it has, and if you are able, then make a note of where it was collected from. If it hasn't, then you can cancel the payment - and the sooner you do that the better.

If the victim is under the age of 18 please encourage them to talk to an adult they can trust. It may feel like there is no way out, but there are professionals who can help. Victims of any age can get help from:



D-DAY 80 – LEADERS

Next in the series leading up to next year's D Day landings – their 80th anniversary – let's look at who was at the top of the D Day 1944 (Op Overlord) planning and some of the leaders. First off, refresh your memory of what we are talking about:

STARTING IN THE EARLY light of 6 June 1944 and continuing throughout the day, thousands of Allied troops poured onto the beaches of Normandy. More than 150,000 troops, nearly 12,000 aircraft and 7,000 naval vessels were involved in the vast operation, codenamed Overlord.

The Supreme Allied Commander, General Dwight D. Eisenhower of the US Army, had a heavy responsibility. He prepared a statement to be issued if the invasion failed, saying: 'if any blame or fault attaches to the attempt it is mine alone.'

The landings took place at five points along the Normandy coast, US troops landed at the western-most beaches, code-



named 'Utah' and 'Omaha'. British troops went ashore at 'Gold' and 'Sword' beaches, and Canadian troops at 'Juno'.

Four of the beaches were secured fairly quickly, with relatively few casualties; but Omaha was more heavily defended. It was there that the greatest loss of Allied life occurred. Despite these losses, by the end of the day it was clear that the landings had been an overall success.

Let's choose a few key leaders to look at. First off, a British political leader, then in later articles we'll look at some of the key commanders lower down the chain.

Naturally, first up must be our own Prime Minister- the irascible, talented, powerful, genius, charismatic lion of a man, who got us through the war by sheer personality, will, determination to win, fearlessness and guts, though at times he drove his staff demented, and could be very rude and badly behaved to people:

WINSTON CHURCHILL

LEADERSHIP IN WARTIME is difficult work. There are thrilling emotional highs and devastating lows. It requires sacrifice, commitment, and foresight. Churchill, along with other military leaders, was able to accomplish that in the run up to D-Day. The plan was difficult. It would require great commitment and even greater sacrifice. Lives, countries, ideologies, and futures were on the line. He had to be restrained from going in on the first wave!

Winston Churchill became Britain's prime minister on 10 May 1940. As he was later to write: 'I felt...that all my past life had been but a preparation for this hour and for this trial'.

Crucially, he rallied the nation in defiance of Hitler. In the words of Labour politician Hugh Dalton, Churchill was 'the only man we have for this hour'. This view was shared by the overwhelming majority of the British people.

Less obviously, Churchill made planning and decision-mak-

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




ing – both political and military – simpler and more efficient. His force of personality was instrumental in cementing the 'Big Three' Alliance with Britain's powerful allies, Russia and the United States. His unbounded energy and determination meant that he was not always easy to work with. But, as Field Marshal Sir Alan Brooke wrote, 'It is worth all these difficulties to have the privilege to work with such a man'.

Churchill's wartime speeches were a great inspiration to the embattled British.

'....I would say to the House, that I have nothing to offer but blood, toil, tears and sweat. We have before us an ordeal of the most grievous kind. We have before us many, many long months of struggle and of suffering. You ask, what is our policy? I will say: it is to wage war, by sea, land and air, with all our might, and with all the strength that God can give us; to wage war against a monstrous tyranny, never surpassed in the dark, lamentable catalogue of human crime. That is our policy. You ask, what is our aim? I can answer in one word: it is victory, victory at all costs, victory in spite of all terror, victory, however long and hard the road may be; for without victory, there is no survival.'





Preparations for D-Day

He threw himself into the planning of Op Overlord and set up an ongoing series of meetings with Supreme Headquarters and the British Chiefs of Staff, over which he regularly presided. These were always attended by either Eisenhower, or his chief of staff General Walter Bedell Smith. Churchill was especially taken by the Mulberry project – more on this in later articles – a floating man made harbour- but he was also keen to make the most of Allied air power which, by the beginning of 1944, had become overwhelming. Churchill never fully lost his apprehension about the invasion, however, and underwent great fluctuation of mood as D-Day approached.

D-Day: Allied Invasion of Normandy

Churchill was determined to be actively involved in the Normandy invasion and hoped to cross the Channel on D-Day itself (6 June 1944) or at least on D-Day+1.

His desire caused unnecessary consternation until he was effectively vetoed by the King, who told Churchill that, as head of all three services, he (the King) ought to go too. Churchill expected an Allied death toll of 20,000 on D-Day, but he was proved to be pessimistic, because less than 8000 died in the whole of June.

He made his first visit to Normandy on 12 June to visit General Montgomery, whose HQ was then about five miles inland. That evening, as he was returning to London, the first V-1 flying bombs were launched.

In a longer visit to Normandy on 22–23 July, Churchill went to Cherbourg and Arromanches, where he saw the Mulberry Harbour.

Words as weapons

'Let us therefore brace ourselves to our duties, and so bear ourselves, that if the British Empire and its Commonwealth last for a thousand years, men will still say, "This was their finest hour."

He reached out to the people and he not only made them believe that winning the war was possible, but he also convinced them that they were right to trust in him because in the end, he would lead them to victory. And that's exactly what he did. On 8 May 1945, Churchill stood above a buoyant crowd in London having given another signature speech.

'We may allow ourselves a brief period of rejoicing. Today is Victory in Europe Day.'

When you have finished blaming the oven, the flour and the baking tray, you might just come to the conclusion that a new recipe is required. That idea would come to us very quickly. It would be so obvious. Yet, when it comes to living our lives, changing the recipe rarely seems to be the obvious solution.

I spoke to a woman the other day who had spilt up from two husbands for exactly the same reason. Another I know has tried every faddy diet in the world, but has never made the connection between her extra weight and her lifestyle. We justify not changing our habits by saying: 'That's just the way I am.' But is it?

I recently heard the story of a man in his thirties travelling on the underground in Glasgow. It was early in the morning, and people were pretty subdued, reading their newspapers and thinking about the up coming day. The man's three children were running wild on the Tube, screaming and chasing each other around. One businessman couldn't contain his irritation any longer. 'Excuse me. Could you please make some effort to control your children? They are completely out of order.' The intrusion shook the young man out of his reverie. 'I'm so sorry,' he said. 'But their Mum has just died in the hospital, and I have no idea how I'm going to tell them, or what to do next. I was in another world.' The businessman was overwhelmed with embarrassment, sympathy and confusion. He tells this story against himself, and now believes in the mantra- 'Curious not Critical.'

In conclusion, if you feel as if you are repeatedly bumping your head, stop and ask yourself, 'Might there be a better way of coming down the stairs?'

WORLD SUICIDE PREVENTION DAY

World Suicide Prevention Day is on 10 September.

EVERY YEAR, organisations and communities around the world come together to raise awareness of how we can create a world where fewer people die by suicide. This World Suicide Prevention Day, they're highlighting the importance of the language we use when we talk about suicide, especially when asking someone you're worried about if they're suicidal. When we use our words carefully we can create a safe environment for people to open up.

HOW TO START A CONVERSATION

JUST BEING THERE to listen and showing you care can help. Here are some tips on how to open up a conversation with someone you're worried about:

- Choose a good time, and somewhere without distractions
- Use open questions that need more than a yes/no answer
- 'How are things, I've noticed you don't seem quite yourself?'
- Listen well. 'How's that making you feel?'
- Avoid giving your view of what's wrong, or what they should do It's normal to feel anxious about asking someone if they're suicidal, but it could save someone's life. Try and avoid saying things like 'you're not thinking of doing something stupid are you?'. Being patient and showing you care builds trust and helps someone to open up. You could ask:



- Have you thought about ending your life?
- Are you saying that you want to die?
- Are you thinking of ending your life because you want to be dead, or is it because you want the situation you're in or the way you feel to stop?

The language we use matters. Remember these dos and don'ts:

- Don't share or repost anything that talks about suicide or self-harm in an unsafe way online
- Do report content you think might be harmful
- Do post sources of support and share stories of hope and recovery
- Don't mention the method or location of a suicide; there's evidence that this can lead to further suicides
- If you're worried about someone, do ask if they're feeling suicidal, and help them get the support they need
- Don't use language that could come across as judgmental. For example, 'don't do anything stupid'
- Don't say committed suicide. 'Committed' suggests suicide is illegal, which it isn't
- Do say took his/her/their own life or died by suicide

Community Council News

The Community Council News is based on draft minutes of local CC meetings. Full draft minutes are posted on local websites and notice boards. Please note, the Community Council News is not a verbatim reproduction of CC minutes. Where there are two months' worth of reports, there will be a considerable amount of editing.

Kinross Community Council News from the July Meeting

Present on 25 July were CCIIrs L McKay, (Chair), CCIIr W Freeman, CCIIr C Collins, CCIIr E Leslie, CCIIr T Stewart, CCIIr S Wells and CCIIr M Wilson. CIIrs D Cuthbert, N Freshwater, W Robertson, R Watters four members of the public and minute-taker Mrs C Aird.

Apologies: Police Scotland, CCllr H Phillips, Cllrs W Robertson, and N Freshwater.

CCIIr L Mckay welcomed everyone to the July meeting of the Community Council and introduced CCIIr Sharon Wells who has been co-opted onto the Community Council.

Police Scotland Report

Due to annual leave, Police Scotland had not submitted a report, but members were advised of a Mercedes A Class car being stolen recently.

Matters Arising

Parking Restrictions

Cllr Watters apologised for not forwarding the email from PKC to CCllr Mckay and confirmed he would do so as soon as possible.

Gallowhill Road

KCC members confirmed that the hedges had been cut back. Cllr Watters advised that a meeting with PKC officers had been arranged for 4 August to discuss concerns over safe routes to schools and an update will be given at a future meeting. He also advised that he had been looking at old maps of the area and it appeared that the hedges were placed on boundaries. PKC officers are therefore looking to confirm land ownership and if KCC felt that this was a safety issue, they should advise PKC of this, asking for this to be reviewed/rectified as soon as possible. It was agreed that the discussion at the meeting was enough to allow Cllr Watters to advise PKC of this.

Common Good Fund (CGF) Scheme of Delegation

It was confirmed that KCC members had discussed this item outwith the meeting and had agreed that an amendment should submitted for consideration by PKC.

Cllr Cuthbert advised that he had met with officers earlier that day and invited KCC to send a representative to a meeting on 2 August where developments in the local area would be discussed. An update from the meeting will be given at a future date.

VAS

CCIIr L Mckay raised an issue regarding the new VAS in Springfield Road and in Gairneybank. These were obstructed by trees and were not as visible as the older style. CIIr Watters agreed to raise this issue with PKC.

Concerns re GP Services

CCIIr Mckay advised that several residents had been in contact raising concerns about the lack of availability of both GP and dental services in the town. It was noted that residents were having to travel outwith the town, especially for dental appointments, and CIIr Watters suggested residents raise these concerns in the 'Big Place' conversation. CCIIr E Leslie agreed to post this information on the CC Facebook page, and it was also agreed that the CC would write to Jim Fairlie, MSP.

Kinross Town Centre

There was no update given but members noted that a new shop had opened in the High Street earlier that day, The Kind Pantry. CCIIr S Wells enquired as to whether there was an onus on shop owners to maintain properties, highlighting a number of shops with dirty windows. CIIr Cuthbert did not believe there was an onus unless it was a safety issue or a danger to pedestrians. CCIIr Mckay agreed to contact the owner specifically mentioned during the discussion.

Members were also advised that representatives of the organisation looking to purchase the BCA site had met with flooding officers and had also attended the Milnathort CC meeting the previous night.

Planning Matters

Planning Applications received

23/01148/FLL installation of replacement sludge thickening system comprising containerised packaged plant, thickened sludge pump, sludge break tank, wash water and concentrate poly kiosks, tank fed eyebath and associated works at Kinross North Wastewater Treatment Works, Kinross.

23/01039/FLL alterations and formation of balcony at Applegarth, Sunnypark, Kinross.

23/00919/FLL erection of 3 light industrial units (classes 4, 5 and 6), and a member only retail club unit, Anchorpoint House, Clashburn Close, Bridgend Industrial Estate, Kinross.

Members discussed this application and agreed that an objection should be submitted. However, they were advised by a member of the public that the closing date for doing so had now passed and were therefore unable to do so.

23/00916/FLL erection of a dwellinghouse and garage with ancillary accommodation unit at land 30 metres northwest of Hawthorn House, Gairney Bank, Kinross.

23/01070/FLL siting of an above ground fuel tank and associated works at The Control Tower, Balado Airfield, Milnathort, Kinross.

Planning Applications determined

23/00728/FLL alterations and extension to dwellinghouse at 17 Alexander Drive, Kinross, approved.

23/00946/LAW extension to dwellinghouse (proposed) at 16 Levenbridge Place, Kinross, approved.

23/00593/FLL erection of a dwellinghouse at land 20 metres southwest of Braeside House, Hatchbank Road, Gairney Bank, Kinross, refused.


23/00625/FLL change of use of agricultural land to storage and distribution (class 6), siting of 54 storage containers, formation of vehicular access and associated works at land 250 metres south of Jetrigg, Kinross, withdrawn.

23/00842/LAW erection of replacement extension (proposed) at 10 McBain Place, Kinross, refused.

23/00648/LBC installation of replacement windows at 1st Floor 111 High Street, Kinross, approved.

Other Planning Matters

23/00794/FLL erection of replacement boundary fence and gate at land northwest of Old Cleish Road, Kinross.



Community Council News

Concern was raised about the erection of the fence and gate at the yard. While a pre-planning application had been made, no decision had been made by PKC, but the works had been completed. There was concern about this work as it blocks access to the railway path and Cllr Cuthbert confirmed that he would raise this matter with PKC Officers.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr D Cuthbert: A number of issues had been raised regarding the KHS parent council and as such, the members had resigned *en mass*. Cllr Cuthbert had been elected to the new parent council and was now working with parents to get a new council in place and the constitution rewritten. CCllr Mckay raised an issue relating to refunds for locker keys, which should be returned when the keys are returned, but this had not been happening. Funds were automatically donated to the school charity unless a refund was specifically requested. Cllr Cuthbert agreed to investigate this.

Cllr Cuthbert advised that he had met with representatives from Kinross Colts recently following complaints. He advised that the Colts now have around 500 members and were therefore training every night of the week. Due to this, they understood that their current training facilities were not fit for purpose and are looking for alternative pitches. They are in discussion with LHCC to determine whether they could use the pitches there and it has been agreed that one of the rugby pitches could be converted to an all-weather football pitch, with moveable posts (and nets left in situ). Cllr Cuthbert had also asked LHCC to investigate whether a 5G (astroturf) pitch could be provided and used, specifically by the Colts. It was also suggested that the LDP needs to look at all local facilities.

Clir R Watters: Members were advised that he is working with Persimmon Homes to get the play park repaired, noting that Section 42 of the planning conditions for Persimmon supercede the 2019 conditions. A new bridge is to be put in place to the west of the current bridge.

Reports from CC representatives

CClir E Leslie: Reported that VAS in Gallowhill Road were not active/working, and the traffic lights at the end of Gallowhill Road/The Muirs also obscured by trees and were therefore not visible. It was confirmed that this issue had been reported to PKC but that it needs to be followed up.

CCIIr M Wilson: Advised that funding was being sourced for the old RAF station at Balado and although the target had not yet been met, a planning application would be submitted in due course. In response to this, CCIIr Collins asked what could be done to direct visitors to the facility to come into Kinross with CIIr Watters advised he had requested PKC officers to undertake tourism as part of the Big Conversation, with Kinross Partnership leading on this work.

CCIIr C Collins: Light up Kinross AGM was taking place the following evening, Wednesday 26 July at 7.30 pm.

CCIIr L Mckay: Advised that representatives of Craigend Wind Farm had requested to attend the August meeting and she had agreed to this.

Plans for Davies Park play park had been received and these looked good, with it being open in Spring 2024, although this was to be confirmed. It was noted that the climbing frame would not be replaced. It was agreed that the plans would be shared.

A member of the public asked if there was any update from discussions with PKC and CCIIr Mckay advised that there was no update due to a number of people being on holiday.

AOCB

Trees in Broom Road

A member of the public raised concerns regarding overhanging trees in Broom Road which were being hit by vehicles resulting in branches being left on the ground. They also raised concerns about the roots of the trees damaging their property (wall and tarmac). While they had written to PKC, they had received an unsatisfactory response and asked whether the Councillors could do anything to help. Cllr Watters agreed to raise the issue with

PKC and spoke to the member of the public after the meeting.

HGVs in Gallowhill Road

Members were advised that the number of HGVs using Gallowhill Road had reduced but not stopped. A member of the public advised that they had received an email advising that penalty notices had been given to contractors who continued to use Gallowhill Road to reach the Lathro Estate and in some cases, contracts had been removed. They are happy with this course of action but will wait to see what happens once the workers return after their summer break.

The next meeting of Kinross Community Council will be held on Tuesday 26 September 2023 at 7.30pm.

Milnathort and Orwell Community Council

The July minutes were not available at the time of printing. The next meeting (second Thursday of each month) will be held on 14 September 2023, 7.30pm at Milnathort Town Hall

Fossoway Community Council News from the August Meeting

Present on 1 August were (CCllrs) S Bruce-Jones, A Cheape, G Pye and N Marchant (Chair); Cllrs D Cuthbert, N Freshwater and W Robertson and 11 members of the public (MoP);

Apologies: Cllr Richard Watters; CCllr Trudy Duffy; Assoc. CCllr Carol Farquar.

Declarations of interest: CCIIr Pye declared an interest in Planning Application 23/00925/FLL.

Police Report

Apologies from PC Ben Samson as he is on leave. Incidents to note: RTA at Drum crossroads involving rental car driven by overseas driver on the wrong side of the road; the vehicle was moved off road. Crook Moss site incidents: A DPD driver was attacked whilst delivering to the site – Police were informed; a brick was thrown through the passenger window of a car passing the entrance to site. Fire brigade were in attendance one night last week.

A MoP asked what could be done about abandoned cars; the Police had affixed a notice to one – this is so that they don't get multiple reports. There was some discussion about what can be done about abandoned vehicles on private land, it was recognised that the Police would check the last registered owner and contact them.

Matters Arising

Wind Farms: Representatives from Galileo who are proposing the Craighead Wind farm attended the meeting and provided an update on their plans. The number of turbines has been reduced from 12 to 10 but they will still be the same height – up to 200m. The combined output will still be over 50MW so a Section 36 Application will be made to the Scottish Government, probably in spring 2024 – but may change. The actual build is likely to be about five years away. Landscape topography, viewpoint photos,



bird surveys, archaeological walk over and peat probing are done. Ecological studies are almost complete. Noise assessment is in progress this month. All studies are expected to be complete by October 2023.

A Community Wealth Fund of £5k/MW i.e. £300k/year is proposed to be created. Since the majority of the site is in the Fossoway CC area, this CC and its constituents will provide the major input on how the monies would be distributed. Galileo have put forward the following ideas for discussion: A £100k construction period disruption fund; sums to discount electricity costs for properties within 5km from the turbines — this would cover over 600 properties. Payments per year would be on a sliding scale based on distance: 1.5km - £1.4k; 2km - £1.2k; 2.5km - £1k; 3km - £800; 3.5km - £600; 4km - £400 and 5km - £200. The 3km band would cover most of Carnbo and the total payments would be £200k/year. There is still plenty of time to modify these proposals before the site is completed. The CC needs input from the public on what is best for Fossoway so we can present that.

There will also be an offer of purchasing up to 10% ownership of the scheme although details can't be defined until final design done

Further consultation events will take place at Carnbo Village Hall on 28 August between 3.30 and 7.30pm and at Dunning Village Hall on 31 August at the same time. There will probably be further events in October.

A MoP asked about the access route for construction – the plan is to use the existing track that leaves the main road between the Village hall and the village itself. Galileo agreed to produce a detailed map of the proposed route at the August events. A MoP asked why such big turbines are proposed – Because all manufacturers are in Europe and they only make big machines. Galileo are intending to apply for a 40 year lifetime as warranties are longer due to technology improvements.

Mike Barnacle pointed out that the 2005 application at Mellock Hill was refused on public enquiry, and asked if it would be better to create more offshore turbines than industrialise the landscape? Galileo replied that National policy has now changed in favour of energy policy at the expense of everything else.

The CC has received an invitation to attend a closed meeting with other CCs to discuss and decide on a joint response, and a similar invitation to a meeting organised by Friends of the Ochils also looking to formulate a joint response. Mike Barnacle explained that the latter meeting has a focus on changing Local and Government policy rather than individual schemes.

Representatives from the proposed Brunthill Windfarm will be attending the Sept CC meeting.

Community Development Trust

Mike Barnacle reported that the on the future of Blairingone School was in favour of an Asset Transfer, initially a (peppercorn) lease and ultimately a purchase; an application has been submitted and a business plan is being prepared. Cllr Robertson asked if there was an identified use for Blairingone School. A MoP asked if someone would be living in the house. They would if a deal was done and any tenant would pay rent to the CDT.

Formal legal status of the Trust has been achieved and a bank account is being opened.

Local Place Plans:

The final face-to-face event was held on 11 June in Moubray Hall, Powmill and was well attended. Information gathering is now complete and early findings will be presented at the Fossoway Gathering where the CDT will have a stall. A final report and any other relevant data will be provided to the CC and CDT by PKC before the end of September. The next phase is Finding Solutions (September – October) which will lead into creating the Local Place Plan.

Road Safety in FDCC Area (Including A977 Mitigation and Carnbo):

All residents in Crook of Devon have received a letter regarding the installation of traffic lights on the A977 at School Road starting on 7 August for a period of four weeks. Temporary traffic lights will be used over this period. This is part of the agreed A977 mitigation strategy. A new footpath will be created to join up with the new lights. Mike Barnacle asked whether the path was going in front of or behind the War Memorial, in the context of a possible future path behind the hall, but no-one was sure of the detailed plans. A MoP asked if both sets of lights are staying and will they be linked – they will both remain for now, but it's not normal to link them.

Carnbo Speed Limits: Lots of TROs for several areas were combined in one batch and as some have been objected to, they all have to wait until the meeting in September to be approved; thereby delaying Carnbo's even further. A MoP noted that a new notice has appeared in Carnbo stating that the Covid measures created a temporary 30mph limit which will now be made permanent. This is news to local residents! Cllr Robertson said it must be wrong and Cllr Freshwater will ask about it. Cllr Cuthbert agreed to request an update from Road Safety.

Fossoway Area Transport incl. Transport Group: There is a new scheme to provide grant funding for consortia (including Community Transport Groups) to fund the acquisition of Net-Zero vehicles. Glenfarg CC have experience of this type of scheme.

New Business

Footpaths: There has been a request from local residents to maintain the footpath between Drum and Aldie Road – work has recently been done by Rhoderick Moncreiff. A local Core Paths group needs to be setup for Fossoway, and there is some interest from Drum residents. Cllr Robertson visited Crook of Devon and assessed the footway that has been the topic of complaints. Images were taken and reported to PKC showing overhanging trees and tree roots now pushing up the surface which is not good for prams, wheelchairs etc. The relevant landowner has been advised of his responsibility and he has given assurances it will be addressed. Cllr Robertson also advised with root damage to surface these trees would be at risk of having to be felled which he was in agreement with. MoP asked about path between Rumbling Bridge car park and the Nursing Home – Cllr Robertson will take some pictures and report it.

Drum residents have asked for a path along B9097.

Bus Service: CCllr Lamb reported that the 202 service had been taken over by Stagecoach and the quality of the service has deteriorated dramatically with multiple breakdowns and late arrivals. PKC's Margaret Roy has been informed and agreed to contact Stagecoach – who promised to improve things. This is very disappointing as the service was beginning to gain momentum with users. One good thing is that the buses now have tracking equipment.

Fossoway Gathering: Saturday 2 Sept. The Committee is looking for volunteers to help set up – one or two hours.

Local Area Committee: The next Local area committee - meeting is on Wednesday 2 August. The intention is to discuss and review the committee's remit and what future topics and issues would be dealt with.

Fly Tipping: CCIIr Duffy noted an instance of fly-tipping on

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the unmarked road between the B9097 and the A977 in the wooded area near the B9097. This had been reported to PKC who responded that it was on private ground and hence was the responsibility of the landowner.

Alessia Palmieri: Congratulations to Alessia, of Fossoway Tennis Club, who has won Development Coach of the year at the 2023 LTA Tennis Awards, thereby putting Fossoway on the tennis map. Mike Barnacle reported that the tennis club would like to expand by leasing Waulkmill Park; however they are struggling to get any movement from PKC's Greenspace department.

Warm Welcome Fund: This fund (previously known as the Cost of Living Community Fund) provides monies for organisations to create events enabling local residents to meet in a warm environment. There's a new process for applications and PKC has issued an Invitation to attend a workshop covering Kinross shire on 22 August from 6 to 8pm at the Community Campus. Questions to Karen Evans, Locality Team Leader at CLD@pkc.gov.uk.

PKC Consultations

The Developer Contributions and Affordable Housing Supplementary Guidance: FDCC intends to submit the following comments on 3 August: The CC supports the change of splitting contributions and affordable housing into two sections and annual review of rates. The CC is disappointed that that a more innovative alternative has not been considered to develop affordable housing in rural locations.

Consultation on introducing a Short-Term Let Control Area for parts of Perth and Kinross to help address these impacts and pressures Fossoway is not included in the communities covered so the CC will not make any comment.

Review of Scheme of Establishment of Community Councils. Deadline is 25 August – The CC will prepare a response.

Scottish Government Consultations

Scottish Gov planning guidance on Local Living and 20-Minute Neighbourhoods.

Fossoway and District Community Council has submitted the following comments: 'We welcome the recognition that rural communities like us will find it challenging to meet the 20 min neighbourhood proposal. We suggest that cross local authority planning of local transport is encouraged, and encourage the development of local rural hubs where mobile services come to us. We welcome the idea of supporting the growth of local businesses for local employment and would encourage Scottish Ministers when reviewing new LDPs insist that this is included to ensure the future sustainability of our rural communities.'

New National Parks – nomination process and draft appraisal framework: consultation

The framework for the nomination and designation of a new National Park in Scotland is comprehensive. Nominations for new National Parks opened on 11 May 2023 and will close on 11 October 2023. Registration of a note of interest can be made by emailing NationalParks@gov.scot. Consultation closes on 4 August 2023.

This consultation is about the new approach to local development planning forming part of the Government's work on reform of the planning system and implementation of the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019. **Closes 13 September.**

Enhancing the accessibility, adaptability and usability of Scotland's homes: consultation

Sets out proposed updates to Part 1 of the Housing for Varying Needs design guide and to building standards and guidance. Closes 19 October

News from the July Meeting

Present on 11 July were Cllrs R Watters, N Freshwater, CCllrs A Miller, A Davidson, S McGregor, K Donaldson, D Paterson, and one member of the public.

Matters Arising:

Kinross-shire Committee Update:

The Vice-Chair had attended most recent KLC meeting on behalf of PCC. The Cllrs confirmed no agenda was currently in place for next meeting, but it was expected the KLC Development Day on 02/08/23 would assist to generate agenda items. Cllrs had seen a draft of the report from the external assessment consultant assessing the KLC pilot scheme. The report was challenging, not overly negative, but in proportion and the Cllrs suggested this was to be expected. The assessment report will be made publicly available. Both PKC Officers and Cllrs were keen to have report before the scheduled Development Day. It was felt the Committee faced challenges to identify its direction of focus and the degree of devolution of decision making. The Cllrs were keen to hear from CCs in respect of their ideas in these areas. PCC members reiterated their support of the KLC, particularly in light of the interest of other PKC Wards to create their own similar Local Committees. An example of a Kinross-shire wide issue was 'Loch Leven Water Quality in Catchment' where all CCs could work together. The Cllrs observed the hybrid meetings have been more productive to the output from each meeting.

Road Safety Action Update

At the May 23 meeting, attendees had discussed items on the Road Safety Priority List supplied from PKC Roads Team and agreed changes to the list. These had also included items upon which it was believed further clarification was required. The Chair had communicated these changes to the Cllrs and to D McEown at PKC Roads. The Secretary had reached out to the other Ward 8 CCs with regard to consolidating and prioritising a comprehensive Kinross-shire Road priority list in advance of a KLC meeting and this effort would continue. Cllrs confirmed that the extension of the 40mph speed limit from Scotlandwell to Bowhouse will be completed before the 'end of the summer'.

In respect of the Community Speedwatch campaign, it was agreed PCC will complete another social media outreach to the

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Community to confirm volunteers. Fossoway CC were understood to have been leading previously with this campaign but this was understood to now lie with Milnathort CC who are leading with training. D Paterson raised issue of doing speed checks outside business hours. Cllrs confirmed their understanding that speedwatch activities were permitted to take place within daylight hours only. Chair and Secretary will continue to coordinate with other CCs. The Chair asked if the equipment cost could potentially be raised from a local fund e.g. Westfield fund. Cllrs confirmed that the speedwatch enterprise is currently fully funded and that relevant equipment has already been purchased.

Scotlandwell to Portmoak Church Path

Chair was pleased to report that he had managed to correspond with all of the landowners that were impacted by the proposed route of path, which had been previously ratified by Cllrs and Cllrs. The Chair confirmed he had been able to meet the landowner of the southern section of the proposed route. In subsequent correspondence with the landowner, the Chair had outlined the route plan and also the requirement for extra space for the cemetery. The discussions were reported to have been frank but positive. The Chair undertook to follow up within the month.. The Chair had also had issued correspondence to the Session Clerk of Portmoak Church with regard to the section of the path route that crossed the Church land and also the current Woodland Trust representative for the area, who owned the remainder of the upper route section. There had been a request from a member of public to scrape back the path from Kinneston to Scotlandwell and re-establish the original width of the footpath. Cllr W Robertson had raised the request to PKC. The Chair had asked Cllr W Robertson if the Scotlandwell to Church existing footway could also be scraped back to its original configuration to assist with road user safety, given the indefinite status or timeframe for the replacement path completion.

Play Facilities at Scotlandwell Green

The Chair requested if an update was available in respect of the replacement of the Scotlandwell play facilities. Cllr D Cuthbert had confirmed to other Cllrs that the improvements were in pipeline but had no confirmed date. Cllr R Watters suggested that PCC create a log of tasks that the Cllrs need to pick up to keep items in focus.

Loch Leven Water Quality in Catchment Area

A meeting arranged by NFUS at which SEPA and Scottish Water, NatureScot, the Centre for Hydrology, the farming community, and local CCs would attend. The PCC will have someone in attendance at this meeting. This is one of the key issues that Chair believes should be on KLC agenda. Talking about the overall Loch Leven water quality, drivers that come up are Development, sewage treatment issues, and climate warming, making the shallow loch waters warmer. There was feeling that the main contribution possibly came from local development and outdated or over capacity treatment systems. Cllr R Watters pointed out clarity in Loch has recently been exceptional, but there are fluctuations that are unaccountable. The Farming Union are doing a lot to promote good practise in farming and a lot of encouraging work is going on in respect of sewage attenuation and flooding overflow. Cllrs advised there is currently work going on at PKC to look at surface water mitigation and manage it before it reaches the existing historic combined sewage system. Existing permissions that SEPA allocated to Scottish Water dated 2007 regarding sewage discharge are considered out of date and SEPA should be encouraged to review the permissions and licenses. It was agreed Scottish Water require to upgrade their sewage treatment processes and facilities. The Chair pointed out that Scottish Water are supposed to monitor capacity in alignment with development and planning but also improve insfrastructure where required.

New Matters

The Big Place Conversation, PKC Consultation and Meeting held on 19/06/23: PKC had held a consultation meeting in June to encourage local communities to engage with the development of the next Local Development Plan and identify their concerns

and suggest ideas. The meeting had been well attended by local people. The consultation continues and the Community are encouraged to complete the online survey at PKC website https:// consult.pkc.gov.uk/communities/bigplaceconversation/ (scroll to bottom of page) and give their views about the local area and their thoughts and priorities.

Windfarm Action Group: Milnathort CC had reached out to all Kinross-shire CC's looking to create a Windfarm Action Group including representatives from each of the Kinross-shire CCs. PCC will circulate to members and put forward a representative.

Portmoak Church - The Future For The Church And Car Park: The Chair had been contacted by Portmoak Woodland Group to enquire whether PCC could request Portmoak Church trustees possiblyhold a public meeting to discuss the time lines for the eventual closure/sale of the church and to invite discussion as to what might be done with the church building, and associated facilities. It was felt that it would be preferential if the Church and grounds could be retained for community use, although specific future uses required to be discussed and examined. The cemetery grounds are managed by PKC, while the Church carpark is an invaluable parking facility for the local community for events at Portmoak Hall and for other local events, and for people visiting and walking in the area. Cllr N Freshwater highlighted that Cleish is going through similar dialogue with the Community and have set up a 'right to buy' company. It was thought that the CC could potentially register an interest with the Trustees and a right to buy under the original 2003 act. The CC to investigate options and to try and organise a public engagement meeting with the Church and its Trustees, which may generate some positive ideas. It was felt this should be held in the Church to raise awareness.

Electoral Commission Annual Canvass across Angus and Perth & Kinross July 2023: PKC had requested help from PCC to circulate a press release regarding the Annual Canvass. Individuals may be contacted directly and it was hoped the press release would help people to understand the canvass was not a scam. The Secretary had circulated the Press release to subscribers and on Portmoak Community Facebook.

Progress with Developments: Westfield Community Liaison Committee:

N Freshwater confirmed that PKC have appointed a new member of team at PKC who will additionally look at Westfield roads issues. Hopeful that the requested signage will be actioned soon. Westfield Paths Feasibility Study: Cllr D Morris was not in attendance and so there was no update on this.

Treasurer CC Accounts:

The Treasurer was pleased to confirm that finally the PCC accounts are with the Credit Union. Thanks to the members of the previous PCC for their ongoing assistance over years to make the migration.

£625.94 Michael Bruce Account: £1677.24

Councillors' Reports:

The Chair expressed thanks to Cllrs in engaging with Planners regarding the Kinross Beer Garden which had been subject to an Enforcement notice. It was clear from the Public support that this facility is well supported in the Community areas.

N Freshwater: Grey bins are on the way for cardboard recycling. There was a query on the frequency of collections and if the frequency of collection would decrease. The Cllrs agreed to look into this.

R Watters: highlighted the Nature Restoration fund, for which applications close on 20/08/23. The Fund a wide remit and may be an option for applications locally with regard to Loch Leven Catchment area and phosphate mitigation.

R Watters had spoken to Kinross Partnership about having an event with a special theme around tourism which would allow people to contribute around that specific element of the LDP.

Traffic units have been carrying out speed checks in the area and have issued several tickets since the last meeting.

Broadband Update

Cleish Area

Update provided by Cllr Freshwater

The June 2024 rollout date seems to be a bit of a red herring as progress does still appear to be being made at several sites. It is understood that some houses on Hatchbank Rd (also 'June 2024') have already been able to sign up to fibre services. A similar situation exists in Tillyrie with the same date, but actual progress. Andrew Mitchell has been as helpful as ever but agrees the 'next few months' is the best timeline, and you can check for planned Openreach works on www.roadworksscotland.org and when the property on www.broadbandchecker.btwholesale.com has 'WBC FTTP' listed it is essentially live. So, whilst June 2024 seems to remain the official date, it is an extremely liberal estimation and things are moving quicker.

In addition, complaints were received of road debris being dumped in the ditches, on the Watergate-Carsegour stretch, suspected to be Morrisons/Openreach. This is a flood risk area as we know. Openreach have been responsive and there have been complaints for elsewhere too. Cllr Freshwater visited last weekend and there were still some pieces remaining, but Openreach have today said they will visit the site to remove.

Blairadam Area

There are still 16 properties which are not yet enabled, so the Community Fibre Partnership will continue to work to get Keltybridge and Blairadam to 100% coverage.

Openreach are still in the process of producing a detailed quotation for the project and creating a formal offer which it is hoped will be available in 2-3 weeks' time, and which will include the exact costs for the project.

It is hoped that we can move ahead with the final phase of fibre broadband in Keltybridge in the near future, as it includes the installation of fibre to the Tabernacle Hall which would allow future CC Meetings to be held in Keltybridge.

Financial Update

Hall fees for the last three CC meetings have now been paid, along with the WordPress fee for the CC web site (https://cleishandblairadam.org.uk). This leaves a current balance of £447.90

The annual subscription for Zoom is due for renewal – the CC Secretary will investigate alternatives and costs.

Keltybridge: Kinross County Sign: Keltybridge may have the only remaining Kinross County signs and there was a suggestion that this should be cleaned and preserved. The owner of the land where the sign is located has been contacted and is supportive of keeping the sign and of restoring it. The Councillors are also supportive of the cleaning and longer preservation this sign.

Keltybridge: Fly-tipping on the Maryburgh road. Reports of fly tipping on the Maryburgh road, these were very quickly removed by PKC once the issues had been reported. It was suggested that the use of CCTV cameras may be an option if the problem continues. Cllr Robertson will investigate the options for this.

Keltybridge: Condition of Pavements & Parking on Pavements: Ongoing problems with parking on the pavement in Keltybridge, and the collapsed pavements in Keltybridge. Cllr Robertson will look again at what options there are to address this.

Keltybridge: Dog Poo Bin: The Keltybridge Dog Poo bin on the Sawmill Road had degraded and fallen off the post. This has now been replaced with a new bin.

Cleish

Cleish Primary School – An initial phase of work is being carried out before the main project; this consists of the addition of an inside toilet facility.

The CC expressed concern that no planning applications have been submitted for the work being carried out on Cleish School, which is particularly concerning as the school is a listed building. CC Chair to contact Cllr Freshwater for clarification.



Portmoak Community Woodland Group

Apple thinning, birch pulling and Himalayan Balsam bashing; that just about sums up our recent activity in the community woodlands. We have been doing those kinds of tasks (with some valuable help from other volunteers) while a contractor, employed by the Woodland Trust Scotland, has been tidying paths and removing broken steps and fencing.

Now we are all set for one of our most popular events of the year, Portmoak Apple Day, which takes place in the community orchard in Kilmagad Wood on Sunday 1 October at 2-4pm. We will be pleased to welcome back Andrew Lear, aka Appletreeman, to identify any apples you bring along (remember to include a twig and leaves). We will be pressing apples to turn them into juice; that includes those in the orchard and any from your garden. There will also be home-baking and children's games.

As part of the preparation, we thinned out some of the crop in the orchard to ensure that the remaining fruit grows to a good size.

Then we turned our attention to the highly invasive plant, Himalayan Balsam which, once again, was appearing in various ditches around Portmoak Moss. Scottish Water very helpfully let us into their pumping station beside the Moss entrance where we dealt with plants 'as high as an elephant's eye'.

It was lovely to get the help of the Lothians Conservation volunteers and The Bog Squad in the middle of August, when we returned to pulling birch saplings out of Portmoak Moss as part of the ongoing peat bog restoration project. Both groups have become real friends of the Moss. That was the first time they have come on the same day and it was really encouraging to see the impact of a joint effort.

Our next visitors will be from the Scottish Environment Protection Agency. They will also be pulling birch as part of a workplace volunteering scheme.

All these activities are planned at our meetings at 7.30pm on the third Tuesday of each month in The Well Inn, Scotlandwell. We are always pleased to see new faces.



Broke not Broken

Goodbye Summer!

As summer comes to an end and all the kids go back to school we can take a breath to look back on the projects our volunteers and staff have worked so hard to run to support households in our community.

Our school uniform bank was hard work but we delivered over 125 parcels to support children across Kinross-shire with a new school bag, preloved school clothes and vouchers. Funded by Perth and Kinross Council, ASDA and our private donors, each pack was worth £70. Our open day was also very successful supporting 38 adults and 43 children. We remain grateful to Kinross Colts for putting up with us taking over their pavilion for a couple of weeks to get the parcels sort and distributed. And we couldn't do it with the dignity we need to without the hard work and donated time and services of Loch Leven Laundry, who wash and press all the donated uniforms for free.

Our Tuesday Trips went ahead every week of the school holidays to a range of locations including Deep Sea World, St Andrews, Royal Botanic Gardens Edinburgh, Scottish Deer Centre. We took 392 people on these trips in total over the summer.



It is worth mentioning that we pay for everything on these trips, nothing is donated to us. We pay Heaven Scent and Baynes for the food, we pay Hamish Gordon for the coaches and we pay for any entry tickets. We thank all these companies for working with us and being so flexible when plans and numbers fluctuate at the last minute.

When people don't turn up or cancel last minute, we call our waiting lists to try and get as much value out of the spend as possible. The weather this summer was, shall we say challenging? Some trips had to be changed at the last minute and we thank our amazing volunteers and staff for putting in time and effort above and beyond to make sure everything went as smoothly as possible. On average each seat costs £15.50-£30 depending on entry costs, so if a family of 4 pull out last minute or just don't turn up that's a cost of about £100. This summer we got funding from Arthur Margaret Thompson Trust and Perth and Kinross council.

Feedback from the trip included:

'With being on a low income its helped me and my son to go and do stuff on the trips with not costing too much'

'It means I can get out and to different places that I wouldn't go otherwise'

'We enjoyed being able to go out and spend time together as a family'

'Made more affordable and we really had such good time on our 3 trips'

Food bank use continues to increase. Comparing the last 3 months of 2023 with 2022 we have seen an 111% increase in food bank usage. We delivered 540 parcels over that time across Kinrossshire. We continue to buy in food to meet this demand at an average cost of £600 per week and we distribute supermarket vouchers at a cost of £400 per week. We are grateful to Arthur Margaret Thompson Trust for continuing to contribute toward this cost, as well as those who are able to donate regularly through direct debits and standing orders.

Fuel payments are steady over the summer months at a cost of almost £600, and we have spent almost £8000 since January 2023 on referred support with gas and electric costs.

And so we start to look forward to winter. Projects that will be coming up include our Winter Coat project (clothing vouchers for children, referred to us for this support) Winter Warmers packs (packs of slow cookers veg and vouchers), Tuesday Trips over the October holidays and on to our Christmas projects.

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

Pinkies and Pintails



SEPTEMBER IS ONE OF the best times of year to visit Loch Leven NNR. As we move into autumn, we are graced by the return of our wintering wildfowl to the loch. Numbers of ducks and other waterbirds will continue to increase this month as we reach peak numbers towards the end of this month and into October. This month we can expect to see numbers of around 7000 tufted duck, 2000 coot, 4000 teal, 2000 wigeon among hundreds of mute swan, pochard and pintail. Maybe even a few winter rarities will arrive this month as well. For all the latest wildfowl numbers and sightings then make sure to follow us on Facebook and Instagram (@LochLevenNNR).

Among these thousands of waterbirds, September is also the month where our wintering population of pink-footed geese will arrive at Loch Leven. They are expected to touch down in the first couple of weeks of September and their numbers will also continue to build – even to about 20,000 at peak! These 'pinkies' have travelled from Iceland and Greenland to winter in the UK – that 800 mile flight is no easy task, especially for a juvenile goose. Loch Leven is lucky enough to hold nearly 10% of the world's population of pinkies! Listen out for their 'wink-wink' calls overhead and their V-shaped skeins as they descend over Loch Leven NNR this month.

Towards the end of the month we will also expect to see our first whooper swans – another iconic species to winter at Loch Leven. I always look forward to their honking calls and bright yellow bills – there's just something special about these birds!

Due to this increase in duck, swan and geese numbers, this month we ask for no water access on the loch at any time – that includes paddleboards, kayaks and swimmers – and this will remain in place until April. These large numbers of birds need our protection if Loch Leven is to remain a haven for them over winter and we want to avoid as much unnecessary movement as possible so they can save their energy. These birds have travelled a long way and we want to protect this important wintering population!

As summer gives way to autumn, this month we will expect to see our last swallows and sand martins as they prepare to return to Africa. Insect life will also be a bit more tucked away this month, but there are still butterflies and moths on the wing in September, amongst other insects such as bumblebees. Look out for red admiral and comma butterflies when out and about on the trail.

There's lots going on here in September, and as I said it is a great time to visit the reserve. Remember to keep an eye on our social media (Facebook, Instagram and Wordpress blog: @LochLevenNNR) for all the latest events and wildlife sightings!

Insect Action

WE'VE HAD A BUSY summer period this year across the board and it's crazy that it's soon going to be autumn. Out on the reserve we have started seeing some incredible sightings of osprey who come and feed on the loch, in addition to the usual suspects like curlew, coot, sedge warblers, goldcrest and marsh harriers. We have also had some fantastic insect action with species such as field cuckoo bumblebees, marmalade and batman hoverflies, garden tiger moths, comma butterflies, azure hawkers, emerald damselflies, and a six-spotted ladybird. If you have had any cool sightings at the reserve, do share them with us on our Facebook page @RSPBTaysideFife or speak to the team on site and we will get them added to our daily sightings board.

Our team and the fantastic volunteers have been hard at work managing vegetation in preparation for the pink-footed geese who will be returning around September to feed and roost on the reserve. They have also been carrying out water vole surveys to see what they have been getting up to and identify whether there are any on site.

With the summer holidays sadly over and children heading back to school, we're excited for the restart of our Schools on Reserve programmes. Farming

Flaxing The Muscles

OUR OLDEST DINOSAUR EMERGED from hibernation early this year, the Claas Dominator 98 (combine) peeked out from its cave as the sun came out in the third week of August. It roared up the Aldie road to help a neighbour harvest some winter oats that had ripened well and were ready to cut.

A quick service beforehand revealed the drum belt was perished on the old relic but replacing this took Andrew just 45 minutes meaning the 33 year old machine got straight to work and cut the crop with relative ease. It was the first time we had been asked to combine on this farm so not having a break down on the first day really helped to make it look like we have things under control. Winter oats means that the crop is sown before winter so these oats were sown last September, they had fared well, were of excellent quality and will make a great feed for the sheep on the farm over the winter. However the remainder of our own harvest at home, mainly the acreage that was planted in the spring is not looking like it will produce such a uniform yield. This problem can be seen across Kinross-shire with fields that would usually be completely golden still having large patches of green dotted through them. It's due to the prolonged dry spell at sowing time, some of the seeds took much longer to germinate thus many fields of spring barley, oats and wheat have plants growing at different rates and these will not ripen at the same time, it will give the maltsters and brewers a headache and penalties will be applied for the small grains.

We are so used to the landscape provided by these crops, the season follows a similar pattern each year and I think we probably take the appearance of it all a bit for granted. A recent trip to Kinross Museum to view their farming exhibition educated me to what the fields in Kinross-shire looked like in days gone by. I hadn't realised that Flax was a very popular crop during the late seventeenth and early eighteenth century. It was grown in a rotation with feeding crops so many fields in this area would resemble a meadow, as the delicate pale blue petals appeared on the green stems during mid summer. Unbelievably, there was also a mill here to process the stems into linen. If you pop down to Kinross Museum you can read all about it and see a beautiful piece of locally grown cloth that has survived to showcase the lovely fabric that could be produced. I'm going to take our

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
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daughter. She gave up buying fast fashion a few years ago now and is good at trying to live in an eco-friendly way. I know she will be fascinated to learn more about growing textile crops in Scotland. It seems we sometimes need to look back to move forward as our ancestors were adept at sustainable living and surviving on what we could produce locally.

The Farming exhibition will run at Kinross Museum (beside the library) until next year.

Redcurrant Rush

WELL, AFTER AN INITIAL hot spell in June, what a rubbish summer it's been. I haven't known day to day, whether to water or drain — dry and windy followed by torrential rain — thanks, jet-stream. But the humidity! I've looked like a scarecrow for at least three months now and have decided to accept the fact that my hair will be permanently frizzy.

Because of the crazy weather, I've sometime been lulled into a false sense of security regarding the watering of baskets and pots: 'There's been 17 torrential rain showers today, I'll not bother watering.' Then the next day everything is drooping, so I water them, and they become waterlogged. Big sighs all round. I'm sure everyone's in the same boat this year, hey things would be boring if it was always perfect, eh?



Enough of the moaning. Despite the weather, things haven't been too bad around the garden and some plants even seem to have enjoyed the unpredictability of it all. I've had a bumper crop of strawberries, raspberries and redcurrants (though what you do with all those redcurrants is a mystery – the hens have been well spoiled!).

The begonias (top right) have done really well and have bloomed for absolutely ages. Nemesia has bloomed non-stop since June and the hydrangea bush (in a very large pot) hasn't had so many flowers on it like, ever.

There have of course been some casualties, plants that like things a bit more stable. The lilies were fine, but I don't think there were as many, and they didn't flower as long as in previous years. And some of the annuals like petunias, weren't as showy as they should have been. But hey, those redcurrants, eh?



So, what is there to look forward to in the month of September? Well, the sweet williams (below right) I grew from seed are doing well and I'll put them outside in the cold frame for over winter and plant them out in the spring. I'll probably plant them into bigger pots at some point—I'll keep an eye on them to determine when that will be.

They'll be a mix of colours so they will brighten up a few spots in the garden in early summer next year, as well as being a brilliant, fragrant cut flower.

I'm looking forward to getting some bulbs delivered in the next few weeks (tulips, tete a tete and alliums) and I think I know where they're going, so I'll need to clear out some pots of annuals to provide homes for them. And plant them, mustn't forget that part... yep, I have previously discovered old, sprouting bags of bulbs in the garage.

I also see much weeding, tearing up of spent plants and composting in my near future. This will be in addition to rooting around (on a rare dry day) to look for seeds to save for next year. I'll dry out

the seed heads and store the seeds in paper bags to whip out in the spring, whereupon the joy and heartache of another season will begin.

Next month will be my final article before the darkness of winter sets in and I think I'll do a 'round up of the year, winners and losers, movers and shakers' kind of thing. So whatever you're doing between now and then, enjoy it but probably take a brolly!


