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## The Restoration And Subsequent Decline Of Loch Leven

THIS LETTER IS IN response to the article in the January issue of the *Newsletter* about algal problems in Loch Leven, and most importantly about actions needed to restore the loch. The first thing to stress, is that it has already been done once

In 1990 the maximum depth in the loch at which rooted plants were growing was only 1.8m. After successive restoration efforts starting with elimination of the phosphorus input from Todd and Duncan by 1987, a 2008 (published in 2012) botanical study found rooted plants living at an astonishing depth of 4.3m [Dudley et al (2012) Changes in aquatic macrophyte communities in Loch Leven: evidence of recovery from eutrophication? Hydrobiologia, 681:49-57]. In researching an invited paper detailing the actions taken to achieve that amazing degree of restoration, I have been shocked to discover the decline since then; the depth at which rooted plants occur in the loch we are told, is now only about 2.5m.; almost halved.

So how has such a great deterioration from excellent quality been achieved? And what actions can be taken, once again, to restore the good quality? I was the new pollution control officer for the Forth River Purification Board in 1985, a year when by happy coincidence a true partnership effort delivered quantified comparative information on the relative importance of the various sources of phosphorus (P) – recognised in Loch Leven as the main nutrient that controls the algal growth. The validity of that scientific consensus, at least for Loch Leven, has been demonstrated by the restoration success: working hypothesis - to reduce P would reduce blooms (prediction of improvement); actions taken; subsequent measurement; predicted improvement occurred.

So, what has changed? Limited water quality sampling is not on its own the best way to assess the probability of cause and to indicate key sectors where increases may have occurred. There needs to be a parallel search for changes in the catchment, since 2008 (the culmination of post mid 1990s restorative actions). Have for example, inputs from agriculture increased to now exceed the quantities that were compatible with 4.3m of clear water for restored loch flora in 2008? That is implied in the "it's agriculture" statements reported in previous *Newsletters*, from meetings with SEPA, Nature Scot and Scottish Water. Casual discussions and a focus group a few years ago suggest not. But a proper assessment is surely needed now:

- Has there been a sustained increase in the number of livestock in the catchment since 2000s?
- Has there been a sustained shift to root crops such as potato at the expense of pasture or cereals?
- Are farmers increasing the quantity of chemical and/or other fertiliser over and above practices up to 2008?
- Have farmers ploughed up the landscape measures which were pioneered on a catchment scale for Loch Leven in 1990s? They were designed to go hand-inglove with sensible nutrient budgeting, farm waste management and improved good practice steading measures, and generally did so.

There is, however, one sector where such a change has been clearly identified. That is the size of the population of Kinross-shire, especially the town of Kinross and village of Milnathort. There are at least another two and half thousand people here since 2010, with real implications for the loch

quality. A basic aspect of pollution control is fairness and even handedness. It is an invidious situation where the urban input may continue to grow unchecked, with relaxed effluent discharge conditions, but farmers are told to take even more action. What's the point if there is no concerted action to reduce across all the inputs? Of fundamental importance, what is the target total external phosphorus load for the loch?

Last point please: there are routine, technical actions that can be taken by people employed to so do; learn from the past and get on with it. And you don't need more research, just a good professional knowledge of how improvements to the water environment can be and have been brought about. If there is not a serious change in direction soon, Loch Leven will sink from being a classic restoration success story and instead become a notorious case study in the failure to protect and enhance our water environment.

#### John Nicholson MP

OUR MP, MR JOHN Nicolson wrote a long article in the January *Newsletter* concerning his behaviour in the House of Commons. He had been referred to the parliamentary privileges committee after he shared the contents of a private letter from the Speaker.

Mr Nicolson was accused of a "clear breach" of parliamentary rules for tweeting details of the letter from Sir Lindsay Hoyle.

He correctly said that he was sent to the Privileges Committee for investigation by a group of Tory MP's, 100 Labour MP's and assorted Lib Dems and Ulster Unionists. The implication being that it was those opposed to the SNP making a political point.

But he did not tell you the whole story of the voting.

The fact is that MPs voted by 371 to 16 to refer him to the committee, a fairly conclusive majority.

The 16 of those who voted against his investigation were colleagues of Mr Nicolson as SNP MPs, but the party's remaining 28 MPs - including Mr Nicolson himself – did not take part in the vote. So, 27 MP's of his own party did not feel able to defend his actions.

Mr Nicolson was also in the news for giving evidence to a tribunal where Trans charity Mermaids has claimed that LGB Alliance should have their charitable status withdrawn. As Mr Nicolson is openly gay himself, it is surprising that he should give evidence to the detriment of a charity defending gay rights.

Perhaps it would be more useful for Mr Nicholson to concentrate his efforts on other matters – closer to home – that affect his constituents in Kinross.

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


#### **Accurate Graphs, Misleading Interpretations**

IN THE JANUARY *NEWSLETTER* 'Name and address supplied' took issue with the use of a non-zero origin of an axis in the Civic Trust's graph showing the population rise in Kinross-shire. As the anonymous complainant says, this is common practice. The intent was to illustrate the text of the article: a clear numerical rise in population of Kinross-shire since 2001, with a steeper rise in the second half of the data period. If the origin of the y-axis (not the x-axis as suggested by the complainant) is set at zero, this is more difficult to see, but the rise is nevertheless there.

What is misleading is the complainant's use of a relative term, 'moderate', to describe this increase, without any reference to a comparator to give it context. A rise of 1% per year over 20 years is actually one and a half times that of the other electoral wards of Perth & Kinross (0.68%), and two and a half times that for the whole of Scotland (0.41%).

The graph below shows a comparison in the percentage increases of population relative to the year 2010 between Kinross-shire, the rest of Perth & Kinross, and Scotland as a whole. The use of percentage growth allows comparison between areas, and makes using 0 as the origin for the y-axis appropriate. The data is taken from the Electoral Ward Population Estimates, Scotland, mid-2010 to mid-2021 published by the National Records of Scotland.



Readers may note that the rate of increase for Perth and Kinross (excluding Kinross-shire) has been steadily higher than that for the whole of Scotland (a fairly straight line), but that for Kinross-shire, this is accelerating (curving upwards). The effect is even more marked for the most recent five years, but as the data set reduces, the statistical reliability diminishes.

The undeniable fact is that for many years Kinross-shire has been undergoing an above-average increase in population. This is of particular concern due to the environmentally sensitive nature of this area.

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# **NEW WINDFARM FOR CARNBO?**

# **Up To 26 Turbines Proposed**

**PLANS ARE IN PREPARATION** for a new windfarm in Carnbo, which may see it become among one of the largest in Scotland. The project is described as having up to 26 turbines, each with a blade-to-tip height of up to 220m, plus associated infrastructure.


The proposal is bound to cause con-

troversy. Trudy Duffy, chair of the Fossoway and District Community Council, said 'FDCC have long been concerned about the cumulative visible impact of wind turbines in Kinross-shire, something that is seldom flagged up in planning applications.'

Details have not yet been finalised

but, if the installation were to utilise the latest super turbines, their height could reach up to 850ft — equal to 60 double-decker buses or twice the height of the Glasgow Tower!

A scoping report was undertaken in October 2022 and Brunt Hill Limited, an associated company of E Power





Limited (E Power) intends to submit an application for the construction, operation and decommissioning of the proposed wind farm approximately 4.5km north-west of Kinross. The site is within a commercial coniferous woodland plantation.

On 14 November 2022 the developers submitted a request for a scoping opinion from the Scottish Ministers. Fossoway and District Community Council (FDCC) were given the opportunity to respond to questions posed by Brunt Hill Ltd on the scoping document. They made the following points and requests (which you can see in more detail in the minutes of their last meeting on p46).

A summary of the points made by FDCC as the *Newsletter* understands them is as follows:

- Carnbo is not referred to as an adjacent impacted settlement and should be included as defined in P&K LDP2
- The proposed turbines are significantly taller than others in the area and will therefore be more intrusive and visible
- The developers should engage with Friends of the Ochils to establish important viewpoints
- Due to seasonal flora and fauna in the Ochils, an impact assessment should be carried out in the appropriate season under the guidance of NatureScot and the RSPB.
- Kinross-shire Civic Trust should be consulted on any cultural or heritage impact.
- The settlement will be significantly disrupted by increase in construction traffic and the developers should work closely with FDCC and the community to mitigate this.
- Friends of the Ochils and local rambling groups should be consulted on popular walking routes

 There is no mention of any local community benefit or creation of a fund (as proposed by the Scottish Government in their Onshore wind policy statement 2022).

Cllr Neil Freshwater said, A proposal of this scale needs careful consideration given its impact on Kinross-shire. I note the application is at the early scoping stage, thus details about transportation, access and community benefit are limited. This will likely form part of later discussions should the application progress.

The Scottish Government are committed to onshore wind as the lowest-cost new-build electricity generation in the UK.

The EIA Scoping Report says 'Scottish Government policy is very supportive of the changing need case for renewable energy in light of the climate emergency and recognises the vital role that onshore wind in particular has to play in decarbonising electricity supply whilst growing the economy.

'The Scottish Government has set ambitious targets for renewable energy generation and greenhouse gas emissions reduction. To meet those targets, new renewable energy projects must be developed where resources are present, environmental effects can be satisfactorily mitigated and social and economic contributions to local communities and/or regional programmes can be secured.

The Proposed Development will provide social and economic benefits to local communities and to the wider region for example through construction and operational employment and long-term economic investment.'

## PKC COUNCIL RENT INCREASE RECOMMENDED

A RECORD NUMBER OF PKC tenants have had their say on their rent level for 2023/24. A 2.2% rent increase is being recommended, following a consultation which gathered over 2600 responses. The proposal is to be considered at a meeting of the Housing and Social Wellbeing Committee on Wednesday 25 January.

PKC currently has the sixth lowest council rent level in Scotland. The Housing Revenue Account (HRA) faces several cost pressures over the next 12 months.

Each tenant was asked to vote on three different rent increase options. 33% of tenants responded - the biggest ever response to the survey. Over half (51%) said they preferred the 2.2% increase. This would allow new and increased in-

vestment in:

- Additional resources to help achieve a net-zero carbon emissions housing stock (£44,000).
- Buying back ex-Council properties
- Repairs and improvements
- Electrical Inspection Condition Reports (EICR)
- New fire sprinkler systems
- Continued funding for Digital, Financial and Social Inclusion
- Servicing and maintenance of emergency lighting
- Increased utility costs

A wide range of support measures have been put in place by the Housing Service, including a money and debt advice service through the Perth Citizens Advice Bureau and support through a bespoke service with SCARF, who provide free and impartial energy efficiency advice to council tenants.

Housing and Social Wellbeing Convener, Councillor Tom McEwan, said: 'The proposed increase in rent would give PKC an average rental figure of £75.23 per week compared to the projected Scottish local authority average of £80.41.

'We know that for many people finances are challenging. We have put in place a wide range of help and advice. Our Tenancy Sustainment Fund and Housing Locality Teams are available to support tenants. I would strongly encourage anyone struggling to pay their rent to contact us on 01738 476000.'

# New Funding Award For Kinross High School/Loch Leven Library

**LOCH LEVEN COMMUNITY LIBRARY** has been awarded a grant of £3700 for their project: 'I read for.... Change, understanding, empowerment'

It is one of a selection of school libraries across 10 local authorities in Scotland that have been awarded funding totalling £200,000 for projects focused on anti-racism, diversity, and racial equality. In 2022-23 18 initiatives across 10 local authorities will benefit from the School Library Improvement Fund grants.

Education Secretary Shirley-Anne Somerville said 'School libraries play a key role for young people by providing access to educational resources, supporting learning and helping to close the poverty-related attainment gap. The anti-racism focus of the projects will allow school libraries to engage with pupils on the importance of belonging, inclusion and social justice.'

Pamela Tulloch, Chief Executive of the Scottish Library and Information Council, said: 'We're particularly proud to award support to those advocating for anti-racism and anti-discrimination through this year's Fund and we can't wait to see these initiatives come to fruition.'

The project will involve skills like videography, sound record-

ing and film editing. Library staff will support pupils to learn how to use the technology. This approach allows the school and the library to work together.



# **GREEN LIGHT FOR SPEEDWATCH**

IN 2012, FOSSOWAY and District Community Council took part in the Community Speed Watch pilot. A group of volunteers were trained by police officers in the use of the speed-measuring equipment, and were out on the A977 coming into Crook of Devon. Maybe you saw them at the time. They said, 'It felt really good to do something!'

The results were good: speeds were down but that effect didn't last very long. Ever since they have requested a continuation but up till now this wasn't possible.

However, Police Scotland has given permission to start again. FDCC put in an application for the CIF and were awarded the monies needed for the radar equipment; the hi-viz jackets and traffic signs. Their intention is to make it a Kinross-shire wide project as so many CC areas are impacted by speeding.

For safety reasons, Police Scotland will approve the places where speed checks are allowed. It can only be done in 30mph or 40mph areas. The teams are not allowed to 'hide'. They must be in full vision and must have good sightlines. The weather should not be too bad, you'll be glad to know!

Teams of three go out, measure speeds, get the license plates of the cars



and send the collected information to Police Scotland. Offenders are not prosecuted but will get a letter with a warning. Fossoway CC thought that it could be a good idea to ask all the Primary Schools to let all the children write or draw a short letter about what speeding and unsafe roads mean for them. Offenders would get one of those (anonymous) letters with their warning letter. Persistent offenders may get a visit.

Trudy Duffy-Wigman from Fossoway and District Community Council said, 'Perhaps a rota could be drawn up so all the CC areas can get the equipment in turn. Experience shows that it is more beneficial if there is a rotation. Some people don't always realise that they are speeding, especially if they are familiar with the road. Movement and hi-viz clothing remind them they are in a built-up area.

'Before you can take part in a team, you need to undergo identity checks and police checks; this is a bit of work but once you're cleared, you're in. Interested?

'I hope it will be on the agenda of all Kinross-shire Community Councils in the coming months. They are best placed to coordinate this.'

# **Funding Boost for Fossoway Groups**

RECENT FUNDING awards from the Fossoway Community Benefit 'Hydro' Fund were made to Powmill SWI, which received a grant of £1000 towards purchase of presentation equipment, in-



cluding a digital projector and screen; and to Carnbo & District Community Hall Association, which received a grant of £1180 towards upgrading heating controls to improve efficiency and replacement of external wooden gates.

The Fossoway and District Community Council receives annual funding of £5000 from the Rumbling Bridge Community Hydro Society to be applied for community benefit within part or all of the Community Council Area, embracing the communities of Blairingone, Carnbo, Crook of Devon, Drum, Powmill and Rumbling Bridge.

Grant applications are welcome from local community groups that may be registered charities, unincorporated associations or non-constituted groups of residents coalescing around a common interest. Applicants must be able to provide evidence of the need for their project and demonstrate community benefit.

Pedestrian and emergency vehicular access to premises will be maintained.

The alternative route for vehicles is via A922 – A91 – A823 – A977

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
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FEARS THAT KINROSS MIGHT lose a much-loved local landmark were somewhat alleviated when ASSET (the Aero Space Kinross Scientific Educational Trust) unveiled their plans for a flight and space-themed visitor attraction at the Golf Ball in Balado.

The site, formerly known as RAF Balado Bridge, had previously been home to a Nato communications installation until its closure in 2006.

ASSET say the development will inspire and educate future generations in space exploration and flight, as well as create new employment and tourism opportunities for the local area.

At ASSET's recent AGM, architect Simon McGreachan of Sedgwick International UK showed plans (pictured) to re-use the existing buildings. If funding and investment plans come to fruition, Aero Space Kinross Community Interest Company hope to build a first-class venue for learning, cultural events, volunteering opportunities, corporate and academic exhibitions.

The venue will be home to interactive exhibits, a fully immersive 3D planetarium and will attract presentations from experts in the world of space exploration. Experts from Glasgow Science Centre with extensive design and installation experience will

assist in content design and the creation of exhibits and displays.

The centre would also showcase the latest technology developments of universities and aerospace corporates; content and displays will be continually refreshed from collaborations with corporate and academic sources.

#### Location

Having explored four different locations for the ASK venue, the ASSET board has chosen a location at Balado Bridge as the site that offers the most opportunity.

Known widely as 'The Golf Ball' the site offers great access from the major arterial route of the central belt, the M90, and is of sufficient size to support future expansion beyond the scope of this stage. Utilisation of existing buildings will help minimise carbon impacts as will a conversion of existing fossil fuel-based energy sources to renewables.

Architects and surveyors have prepared plans and submitted a pre-planning application which has been favourably reviewed by PKC.

If the Golf Ball site acquisition was to fall through, an alternative green-field agricultural site is available within the perimeter of the former RAF Balado Bridge WW2 aerodrome.

Also located close to, and with very good access to/from the M90, this is another attractive proposition where a new build development would be undertaken in stages. A development concept has been prepared for that site as a fall-back option.

#### **Spending Plans**

ASSET secured £120,000 of seed money from its community share offer in 2017 and used this to create more funding bids and awareness. As a result of this, they were awarded £1.6m of Tay Cities Deal Funding.

Once acquired, around £2m will be spent on renovating the buildings and the design/installation of content to create the visitor experience, along with all the services needed for a modern attraction.

#### **Investment**

ASSET's next stage for the Aero Space Kinross (ASK) fundraising campaign is an investment bond offer, through which they are hoping to raise £500,000 to take the project to the land purchase and construction stage.

An ASSET spokesperson said, 'With a minimum investment of £1000, UK investors can support this visionary educational initiative whilst receiving a potential tax-free return of 5%.'\*



Working with Ethex, the leading impact investing platform, the ASSET bond offer is now available to view and closes on 31 March 2023.

Chairman of ASSET, Alisdair Stewart, said: 'This a significant step in our journey to making our overall strategy to create the Aero Space Kinross science and space centre in the area, a reality. We see the educational link as a vitally important one and encourage young people in the area to study with a STEM career in mind.

'We would like to invite people to support our vision for the creation of a visitor attraction themed on flight and space exploration. We have now been awarded £1.6m of government economic funding and the proceeds of this bond offer will supplement the government funding to facilitate the acquisition of a site for the creation of the venue.

'Crucially, creation of the venue will enable us to considerably expand our activities in the sphere of play-based informal STEM education to inspire young people to become scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians of the future.'

Commenting on the project, Morven Lyon, Programme Manager of Community Shares Scotland added: 'Aero Space Kinross is an exciting and

ambitious prospect, unlike anything we have seen in Scotland previously. We're delighted to support a project which will not only engage and inspire young people in STEM related educational activities but that will also create jobs and benefit the wider local economy. The community bond offer is a pilot project for the Community Shares Scotland team and we hope

that it might inspire other communities across Scotland to consider financing their project this way.

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
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## cooking with sarah rankin

#### To serve four you will need:

1 bag frozen prawns
100g smoked salmon
Handful of breadcrumbs
2 roughly chopped spring onions
1 tin sweetcorn
2 tbsp plain flour
Salt and pepper

#### For the paste:

1 diced shallot
2 red chillies, minced
5cm piece ginger, grated
2 cloves garlic, minced
Bunch of coriander (stalks only, keep leaves for garnish)
Juice of 1 lime
2 tbsp fish sauce
1 tsp sugar
1 lemongrass stalk, bashed and diced
(or use lemongrass paste instead)

Whizz all the paste ingredients in a blender and place in a bowl with the fish, breadcrumbs, sweetcorn and spring onions. Gently mix with your hands. Add more breadcrumbs if the mix is too wet.

Shape into fishcakes and chill for 10 minutes. Dredge in seasoned flour and shallow fry in oil for around 4 minutes on each side. Serve with a green salad and a dip made from 1tbsp each of light soy sauce, fish sauce, rice wine vinegar and a teaspoon of chilli flakes, sesame seeds and sesame oil.


It's as easy as making a thai style paste (or cheating and buying one, I won't judge you), adding the fish of your choice, and frying.



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#### Councillor Willie Robertson

Kinross Town Centre: There are still things which aren't right about the shared space area in Kinross town centre and a recent consultation exercise has helped to highlight the issues. Following a walkabout on 13 January with Council



officers and the ward councillors the following was agreed;

- The Give Way signs and road markings at the exit from Burns Begg street will be reinstated
- Better signage will be considered to advice drivers driving through the town centre that they are in a shared space
- The parking situation in the town centre will be considered
- A possible new gateway into the shared space from the bottom end of the High Street will be looked at to slow vehicles down

Hopefully if some or all of these proposal come to fruition the town centre will become a much safer place for pedestrians and drivers alike.

Kinross-shire Local Committee: The recently formed Kinross-shire Local Committee is a pilot project to see if Perth and Kinross Council can be more effective by taking decisions locally. The committee comprises the four Kinross-shire ward councillors as well as representatives from each of our six community councils. The operation and effectiveness of the committee is being monitored and the first interim report was presented to ward councillors recently. The main findings/recommendations were;

- As soon as technology allows, that future meetings should be held in Loch Leven Community Campus. These meetings would be hybrid ones so that people could take part in the meeting on line
- The minutes of meetings should be published quickly
- Kinross-shire residents and community councils should be encouraged to put forward topics for discussion


**Potholes:** As usual the winter weather has led to an increase in the number of potholes. If you see one please either let me know about it or report it yourself through the following email address; clarence@pkc.gov.uk

Speedwatch: Fossoway Community Council have agreed to take the lead role in setting up a Speedwatch scheme for Kinross-shire. I am delighted that they have been successful in getting a grant through the Council's Community Investment Fund to buy the equipment required. It is hoped that each community council area will now gather a list of volunteers to monitor the speeds of traffic, so if you are concerned about speeding traffic where you live please get in touch and I will send you details of how to get involved. The information gathered by Speedwatch teams will be used by the police to identify speeding hotspots and used by the Council to direct resources to problem locations. When this idea was originally trialled in Fossoway it proved very effective in slowing the speeds in areas targeted.

**Sunnypark To The Heritage Trail Path:** I am aware of the erosion of the path through Mary's Gate on the Sunnypark to the Heritage trail. NatureScot have kindly volunteered to repair it.

Loch Leven Pollution: My motion which went before Perth and Kinross Council in December asking the leader of the Council to write to the Scottish government environment minister was passed unanimously. It was seconded by Cllr. Dave Cuthbert and strongly supported by Cllrs Neil Freshwater and Richard Watters. The motion asked the environment minister to instruct SEPA to introduce much tighter controls on the discharge of untreated sewage into the loch by Scottish Water and also for a limit to be set on the amount of phosphorous discharged into Loch Leven. Currently there is no limit and I think that this is a major factor in the rise in algal blooms and reduction in water quality in the loch. Hopefully this request from Perth and Kinross Council will encourage our environment minister to take action.



WARM GREETINGS TO ALL readers as we begin a new year. As an avid cyclist, I often embark on a picturesque route that starts from my home near Cleish and takes me through Aldie Hill, Powmill and towards Knockhill before returning to Cleish via the



Hardiston road. I was particularly pleased to read Stuart Thomson's feature in January's *Newsletter*, which shed light on the history of the Carleith Cairn. As I pass by the mysterious wall encircling the trees, I often contemplate its potential mystical significance, only to dismiss it as mundane agricultural infrastructure. It was truly fascinating to discover its actual origins as a Bronze Age settlement.

#### Speed reduction at Carnbo

Recently, I discussed the prioritisation of road projects in Kinross-shire and the involvement of community councils. One of the most pressing concerns is the need for speed reduction measures in Carnbo. Community and ward councillors met with



road officers this month to address this issue, given the urgent nature of the problem and the strong feelings of residents. There has been some confusion regarding the status of the project. I want to clarify that the speed reductions will be implemented, but the legal process to obtain a Traffic Order has not yet been completed. This is due, in part, to staffing shortages within the council. Although this is a frustrating situation, we now have a better understanding of the steps that need to be taken. Unfortunately, there are many competing priorities across Perth & Kinross, so fast-tracking is not an option. I am aware that this is a source of frustration for residents and I apologise for the lack of a firm deadline. Due to the nature of the legal process, which includes consultation and response to possible objections and queries, it is not possible to provide a definite timeline. However, it is estimated that new signage could be in place by mid-summer at the earliest, but it could take longer. However, I am hopeful that 2023 will be the year in which this issue is finally resolved.

#### **Kinross-shire Local Committee pilot**

An interim report has been released on the findings of an evaluation of the pilot Kinross-shire Local Committee, which aims to devolve powers from Perth to Kinross-shire communities. While it may seem early to conduct an evaluation given that the committee was only established last year, the report is largely positive and acknowledges that it is too soon to fully measure the impact of the committee. The report also highlights the positive contributions of the committee and identifies areas for improvement. I am confident that the committee will continue to make good progress this year.

#### **Traffic on Kinross High Street**

I joined a walkabout with council roads officers and ward councillors to address traffic issues in Kinross, particularly around the shared-use area near the old Town Hall. During the walkabout, it was agreed that the signage at the Burns-Begg St junction must be improved to better advise drivers coming from the loch to give way at the High Street, as it is not immediately clear. The council will also explore additional options, such as making the High Street one-way or pedestrianising the Town Hall area, and look at ways to encourage increased use of the town centre 'bypass'.

#### Loch Leven pollution debated in council

I was happy to speak in a debate in the council chamber last month in support of a motion lodged by fellow ward Councillors Willie Robertson and Dave Cuthbert, regarding the ongoing issue of sewage entering Loch Leven. The motion was passed, and the council leader will now write to the Scottish Government's environment minister asking for urgent action.

RESIDENTS OF KINROSS-SHIRE have suffered more that most from numerous public transport reductions over the last few years. Kinross-shire's rural villages are more isolated than ever, and the substantial reduction of the frequency of Kinross bus services to Perth and Edinburgh has rightly frustrated local people.



Several Kinross businesses are no longer receiving customers from outside the town in the numbers they once expected, and with planning currently under consideration for a new retail park and the population of Kinross expected to grow considerably, good transport links are more needed than ever. Links to Perth and Edinburgh are also a necessity for healthcare, education, and commuters travelling to the cities for work, and that is why I both contacted Stagecoach and First Bus on behalf of constituents and began a petition seeking to reinstate the more frequent timetable of the X56 service.

I am, however, delighted at the news that volunteers in Glenfarg – a village particularly isolated following the reduction of the X56 – have taken it upon themselves to launch a free bus service for the community. The mini bus runs each Thursday on a timetable which will take passengers into Kinross and other nearby locations including the Loch Leven Larder. The volunteers are also seeking to expand their operation further to take residents into Perth and other destinations. This has been particularly well received among the elderly who otherwise would have no alternative mode of transport.

I commend the selfless act of the small number of volunteers that have made this possible and hope this strong community spirit will inspire similar initiatives elsewhere in Kinross-shire.

# ALL ACROSS THE CONSTITUENCY there are folk who take initiative and work together to tackle problems that they have noticed in their communities, and as the local MSP I have the privilege to highlight positive examples of beneficial community work by introducing a Motion in Parliament. One such example



is the Glenfarg Transport Group's volunteer-led bus service that is providing transport for rural and elderly residents in response to withdrawals of Stagecoach bus services in the village of Glenfarg.

Their team of nine volunteer drivers plans on running buses every Thursday through the back roads and making stops along the way from the village to Glenfarg Community Centre, allowing people opportunities to socialise, or to visit the library and shops in Kinross. My motion congratulates and commends the group for their successful project, and encourages parliamentarians to wish them every success in their fundraising efforts and future plans. I am pleased to report that their good work has received support from MSPs across the political divide, right across Scotland.

Readers will be aware that I visited Loch Leven last month alongside Councillor Richard Watters prior to a multi-agency meeting involving the Scottish Environment Protection Agency, Scottish Water, Perth and Kinross Council and NatureScot that discussed ongoing issues relating to the algae bloom problem. I fully share and appreciate the concerns of our local community that would like to see better conditions at the Loch, and it is my understanding that the situation can and will be improved.


I have invited the Scottish Government's Minister for Environment and Land Reform Mairi McAllan to visit the site and to learn first hand about the algae problem, as well as the science based solutions to cleaning up the Loch. I expect the Minister will make a visit in the near future.

My office is regularly updated by the stakeholders and I will be encouraging all parties to continue to work closely and cooperatively as we tackle this issue together.

Constituents expressing fear and pressure from the cost of living arrived more frequently in my email inbox than any other issue throughout 2022, and as we enter 2023 this will continue to be the main focus of my work. It is a scandal that in a country as rich in resources as Scotland, and in my constituency of Perthshire South and Kinross-shire, which is considered as an affluent part of that country, that people experience difficulties that cause insecurity.





**SOME OF YOU MAY** have noticed that when I'm out and about I'm hirplin a bit. And for the last few weeks, I've been using a stick. I have succumbed to that widespread Scottish curse, arthritis.





I took his advice. I followed a mostly sensible diet, drank moderately, and hit the gym frequently. And to be honest, I pretty much forgot about the diagnosis. But a few years back, a steady pain seemed to be seeping into the bones of my legs and up my spine. It got worse and worse. And I complicated matters with a gym injury.

A London NHS pain clinic advised me I might have to live with it. And I self-medicated with painkillers with disastrous results. Last year on holiday I contracted sepsis and had a very close call. I have much to thank the Spanish NHS for, not least the doctor who looked after me in A & E – Angel, and my recovery nurse – Jesus. Well, it was Madrid.

Back home and several scans later I got some definitive results after an MRI scan. I have advanced arthritis in both hips. Bone rubbing against bone. It's extremely sore and my new painkiller regime scarcely scratches the surface.

I know I'm not alone. I have much to thank my Mum for but suspect this is inherited from her side of the family. She had arthritis as did my granny. Estimates suggest 1.5 million people live with varying degrees of the condition in Scotland. And our damp climate doesn't help.

I am now on the waiting list for a double hip replacement. I had my first surgeon consultation before Christmas. Dr Happy warned me of the dangers, including the possibility that one leg might end up shorter than the other. He didn't put me off. I know he needs to explain worst-case scenarios.

I've become one of those tedious people who, when asked, 'how are you?' gives a truthful answer. But as a result, I've found myself in a lot of arthritis conversations. Everyone I've spoken to has had an operation or knows someone who has. Everyone tells me the procedure has incredible success rates and is transformative. The surgeon tells me that the scar will be so small that it won't affect my Speedo line.

Anyway, I'm not letting any of this hold me back. My constituency and Commons staff have been wonderful as have staff in the airports and stations I travel through each week for work. I'll keep you updated on the progress. But the thing I'm most looking forward to is a long walk on the hills.

#### **DOMESTIC ABUSE**

Is That Me is our latest campaign to tackle domestic abuse. With 80% of incidents involving a male perpetrator and female victim, the campaign looks to encourage young men to reflect on the way they treat their partners and look to change their attitudes and behaviour.

#### What is Abusive Behaviour?

Abusive behaviour can be physical, verbal, sexual, psychological or financial. It can include:

- Threatening your partner
- · Calling them names
- Controlling what they do, where they go and who they speak to
- Not allowing them to see their friends and family
- Accusing them of cheating
- Stalking them by continually checking up on them
- Sharing, or threatening to share, intimate images of your partner
- Hitting, kicking, punching or throwing objects at them
- Rape, forcing your partner into sexual acts they don't want to do
- Keeping money from them or demanding their money Domestic abuse is the general term for this type of behaviour but it doesn't matter if you are boyfriend and girlfriend living separately, living together, married or even ex-boyfriend and ex-girlfriend. If you are abusive in person or online to someone you are, or have been in a relationship with, it will

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


ENERGY TO HEAT OUR homes and businesses is a universal need which we all pay for through our pockets and collectively through impact on our environment. The CATCH Team is investigating ways to reduce these rising costs through community action for Kinross and Milnathort. Our core idea is to use centralised heat pumps to convert low level heat energy from Loch Leven into hot water piped through a heat network to properties. This is well proven sustainable technology, aiming to lower our heating bills and our impact on the environment through carbon reduction and by cooling the loch which could benefit its ecology. We want to achieve this as a community effort, not least to benefit from economies of scale.

energy tariffs will help us. Investing in renewable power generation will reduce running costs.

- Community and stakeholder engagement is vital. The project can only work with wide support. We are very encouraged by those we have spoken to already. Thank you to those who have already expressed interest.
- Our focus is now twofold: the commissioning of a full Feasibility Study, and community and stakeholder engagement. To frame the Study in the best way will require a further improvement in our understanding of the project potential, in particular the environmental impact on the Loch and its tributaries, impact on the

Since our last Newsletter article we have engaged with you our community, PKC, SEPA, Nature Scotland, among others, and looked closely at similar projects. We have had particularly valuable input from Ramboll a company with long experience of planning and implement-



ing this type of project. While firmly still a work in progress, and with challenges to overcome, we are confident that this project can be successful. Our main learning points to date are:

- The Loch represents the biggest heat source opportunity and we are looking at drawing heat from the Queich burns to minimise infrastructure in the Loch itself. There are other energy sources we are investigating such as electricity from solar, wind and hydro, heat generated by the ice rink and sewage works. Making use of energy storage will be important.
- The economic picture, whilst challenging, looks feasible in principle. The Scottish Government have a Heat Network Fund to help with capital cost and a support program for local heat projects (LHEES) which is implemented through PKC. We have had useful engagement with Cllr. Richard Watters Convenor of the Climate Change Committee. Operating costs and revenue are complex moving targets making it difficult to look ahead, but anticipated trends in

towns, the economics, and the influence of businesses and landowners. We will also need to source finance for the Study. There are some key organisations involved that we need to bring further on board nationally, regionally and locally. Our engagement locally will widen and deepen. We continue to work on these and more. We are a small team and always looking for anyone else who could help.

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# LOCH LEVEN'S RESTORATION: SEWAGE TREATMENT MATTERS!

Recently interesting correspondence in the Newsletter's letters page has arisen regarding the ongoing pollution of Loch Leven, in particular with regard to the growth of the population, which seems likely to be affecting the loch.

Here environmental consultant Brian D'Arcy explains how, in an earlier pollution period, very effective action was taken for sewage treatment as one of the focal points for actions to restore the loch. Can the same sort of effort be made now?

# Improving The Effluent Quality Of A Municipal Sewage Treatment Works

AN ASTOUNDING DEGREE OF improvement in the ecological quality of Loch Leven was achieved by reducing phosphorus inputs to the loch, starting in the mid-1980s, and continuing with further improvements at the sewage treatment works in Kinross and Milnathort through the mid-1990s. In addition the small village of Kinnesswood was taken out of the catchment by a new sewer to connect with the Leven Valley Sewer, and another new sewer was laid to collect scattered properties in Drum and drain them to the treatment works at Crook of Devon (also outwith the loch catchment). There was, of course, also a sustained programme of work with farmers and other businesses across the catchment – but that's for another article.

#### **The Improvement Process**

In the UK and most developed countries, wherever a town exists there is a sewer system and a sewage treatment plant (STW). Very often that means there is a need for capital expenditure to up-grade very old or now overloaded infrastructure to meet environmental standards. That means there has

to be a process whereby priorities can be agreed between the environmental regulator, in our case Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA) and the water utility (Scottish Water). The water utility has a capital programme and agrees a spending plan, for example a 5-year rolling plan. That allows for capital works to try and meet the environmental and other performance requirements. The capital spending programme also has to cover sewer infrastructure (including SUDS in Scotland) and drinking water treatment plants and supply networks.

Figure 1 aims to show simplistically how the process, overseen by government, allows pollution control agencies and water utilities to work together to improve the quality of treated sewage effluent discharged to the water environment.

There are several (at least) key considerations influencing the outcome of the process:

- Current compliance with current licence conditions
- Appropriateness of current licence conditions (environmental standards and accepted best practice limits change with advances in environmental science and in treatment technology)
- Availability of space for extensions, land-owners and local objections, radical alternative considerations such as relocation, etc.
- Development pressure (including from central government and planning authority) requiring increased capacity.

The only situation when a discharge licence might be re-

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laxed, would be where a review by SEPA with a discharger agrees that the effluent is likely to remain in breach of discharge conditions until the capital programme funds are released and new infrastructure can be completed. In such a situation, a temporary relaxation might be granted, but underpinned in the reviewed discharge licence by a condition specifying a firm date whereby new, tighter limits will come into force.

Figure 2 below shows how in Kinross we have moved from being at the forefront of best practice [the first town in Scotland to have a phosphorus (P) limit, the Forth River Purifi1992. Current positions by contrast simply don't make sense.

The last point in this little story is overall, how much P should be allowed to enter the loch from its catchment and still expect good water quality? A maximum external load should be established for the loch. To that end, flow limit needs to be linked more directly to the effluent concentration, specifying a maximum P load from Kinross. A licence review will usually seek a revised flow limit, allowing for some new development. That is why the maximum permitted concentration needs to come down. Indefinite population growth precludes achievement of effective best practice,




Figure 2. Phosphorus limits set for Kinross STW and comparable water industry values in use in 2020 (FRPB limit was best practice 30 years ago). \*NB the 2007 SEPA licence set a limit on Soluble Reactive Phosphorus (at 3mg/L), which is a proportion of the Total Phosphorus value (about 75%, Kinross data), so equivalent to about 4mg/L TP.

cation Board (FRPB) applying the output from an EU Workshop, of 2mg/L Total Phosphorus (TP) in a discharge licence review completed in 1993, following the 'scum Saturday' algal blooms of 1992]. The accepted best practice limit on P in treated sewage effluent has changed over the subsequent thirty years, with the advances in P-removal technology. Several water utilities in England are currently working to stands of 1mg/L or lower.

No one seems able to say why the limit on Kinross was raised, not reduced, in 2007. The best outcome now is for SEPA to sit down with Scottish Water and seek a timescale to get back to a new best practice discharge limit (for example 1mg/L TP). Until Scottish Water can meet such a condition, they are entitled to object to more development – but only if SEPA initiates the request for improvement. What might be needed on the ground to enable compliance with a current best practice limit? It depends on the technical options. Importantly, informal conversation indicates there could be space available by reducing the land-take of the plantation around the works in Kinross. But the first thing is to formerly initiate interest in doing this. The process is in essence a simple, routine part of a pollution prevention officer's working life. But it would also be really helpful if other interested parties would get in line and back this basic function they all clamoured for back in and as we are seeing just now, can cancel out earlier progress from that source.

## Kinross-shire Cricket Club 1853 - 1918

THE EARLIEST RECORDS OF Kinross Cricket Club can be found in article in the Fife Herald stating that on the 27th April 1853 a meeting was held at the Salutation Hotel to establish a cricket club in Kinross. Local landowner, Mr W B Constable was the chair and is regarded as the inspiration and founder of the club. While the club was established and had over 30 members, it was three years before they played the first official game. This was against Edinburgh Franklin and was played at Burntisland Links. At that time there was a direct ferry from Leith (where Edinburgh Franklin were based) to Burntisland and it is assumed that this was

the most central location for the match as Kinross did not have a ground of their own to play on. The scores are not recorded but it is noted that Kinross lost the game by a significant margin!

By 1861 Kinross Cricket Club was listed in the Fife & Kinross Parochial Directory with William Briggs Constable named as Club Captain and George Bogie as Secretary. The club had a strong link with Dollar Academy as William Briggs Constable's children attended the school and played cricket for both the school and Kinross teams. One of his sons, Andrew, was a keen cricketer and captained the 1st XI team towards the end of the 1800's before building a successful legal career, becoming Solicitor General and a judge of the Court of Session with the courtesy title Lord Constable.

The 1860s also saw the development of a thriving junior's section. The club did not have a regular home ground and played matches at various locations throughout Kinross. These included the 'town green' directly across from the Green Hotel, Kinross House, Tallyhill Park and any available flat field that could be found.

Cricket became a very popular summer sport and new clubs were formed across the local area. These included Maryburgh, Milnathort, Blairadam, Strathmiglo, and Lochgelly. Additional fixtures were regularly played against Dollar, Falkland and Broomhall (Charleston). Interestingly, these three clubs are also a regular part of the 2020s fixtures list. In 1884 Kinross Cricket





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Club merged with Thistle Cricket Club based in Milnathort and changed its name to Kinross-shire Cricket Club.

Over the next 20 years cricket continued to grow and the club built a solid reputation. The first record of significant silverware being won was in 1898 when the club won the Fife and Kinross Cricket League Cup title. This win gave the club temporary stewardship of a large ornate silver trophy. This was displayed in the shop window of Kinross watchmaker, Mr Harkness.

By the early 1900s the club had a significant membership comprising players and social supporters. The club hosted regular summer dances, musical concerts and had many local dignitaries on its committee. Most local businesses had links with the club either as players or financial supporters. In 1904 the club had moved to a permanent home in the heart of Kinross at Beeches Park which now houses the Montgomery golf course club-house. The club played matches across Kinross-shire, Fife and as far away as Edinburgh, St Andrews and Dundee. At a time before telephone or email, players were informed of their selection for matches by means of a club postcard. Pictured are both sides of a selection postcard which was sent to a Mr John Morgan who lived in Falkland.

During this period the club had two senior teams and a junior team. The club was highly regarded in the wider cricket circles and the club boosted players from as far away has Edinburgh, Cupar and Dundee. A news article in the *Kinross Advertiser* of 25 September 1909 provides an insight into the club structure and the successes on the field.

KINROSS-SHIRE CLUB. The annual general meeting of the Kinross-shire Cricket Club was held in the MacIntosh Institute, Kinross, on Friday evening last, when there was a good turnout of members. Mr D. M. Hutchison occupied the chair. The Secretary gave a report of the season's workings, which was considered satisfactory. The following office-bearers for the ensuing season were then elected, viz.:—Hon. Presidents—Sir C. E. Adam, Bart.; Sir Basil Montgomery, Bart.; M. C. Anderson, Esq. Hon. Vice-Presidents—J. A. Clyde, Esq., K.C., M.P.; J. J. Moubray, Esq.; N. B. Constable, Esq. President—Dr Oswald. Vice-President—Basil Montgomery, Esq. Captain—D. M. Hutchison. Vice-Captain J. G. McGregor. Secretary and treasurer-R.

Teller. Committee—J. Morgan, D. McIntosh, R. Wilson, T. Leckie, J. R.. Stephenson, R. Moodie, W. Bruce. 2nd XL—Captain—W. Watters. Vice-Captain—J. Chalmers. Secretary—J. I. Imrie. During the season 20 matches were played, of which 11 were won, 6 lost, and 3 drawn. The table below shows the averages for the season:

## Fossoway Memories



SINCE THE DECEMBER LAUNCH a new Facebook group has nearly 300 members, sharing their photos and amazing stories. The Newsletter is pleased to share some with you!

Fossoway is rich in historical and legendry stories and who better to bring them to

life than the families that lived in them past and present.

This is just one of many stories to come from the group members giving an insight to life in bygone days. Campbell Dobie Jnr now lives in Australia, but here he tells of his family who lived at Rumbling Bridge Smithy.

'The Dobie family have been blacksmiths for some time, back to around 1575 in fact. My great grandfather Gilbert Dobie had several businesses in and around Newburn, Fife plus the Smithy at Rumbling Bridge. He had eight children, five of them boys who all worked for him in his various blacksmith/wheelwright shops. In 1907 Gilbert Fenton Dobie was

the blacksmith at Rumbling Bridge Smithy. He was married in June 1908 and his residence is noted on the marriage certificate as The Smithy House Rumbling Bridge. Gilbert returned to Fife to be replaced by his

twin brother John sometime around 1909. (Gilbert had been ill and died in 1910.)

In January 1910 John Fenton Dobie married Isabella Allen Paterson. Interestingly, as well as being the blacksmith, he also was the agent for Raleigh Cycles. I remember the large green enamel sign advertising Raleigh Cycles on the gable end of the house in the 1950s.

In the 1911 census, as well as John, his wife Isabella and 5-month-old daughter Catherine there was an employee called Thomas Hastie. He was also a blacksmith living in The Smithy Bothy. John remained at Rumbling Bridge smithy until around 1925.

In 1919 a second brother, David Fenton Dobie died, this

prompted his father Gilbert Sr (my Great Grandfather) to contact his youngest son Campbell who had emigrated to New Zealand and ask him to return to Scotland to help and take over one of the blacksmith businesses. At first he managed the Fife Smithy, but in 1925 he took over the Rumbling Bridge Smithy from his older brother John.

By 1951 The Blair Hill Estate had decided to auction the Rumbling Bridge Smithy property, my Father Campbell L Dobie purchased it for £350. In 1950-60 the business had evolved to include, aside from the smithy, a taxi service, a petrol station, the Raleigh Cycles agency and a carpentry workshop. My

father also ran his truck contracting business from the Smithy house at that time. Campbell Snr (my grandfather) remained living at the smithy house until his death in 1975.'

Some of the community have their own memories of The Rumbling Bridge Smithy.

'I remember my dad stopping for fuel and the attendant pumping the handle to fuel the car in the 60s'

'Fuel was 4½d per gallon; this equated to 1½ pence per litre. How times have changed!'

'My late Dad told me to take the horses from Craigton Farm to get new horseshoes fitted, I remember the smell when he burnt them on its feet'.

### CERVICAL CANCER PREVENTION WEEK

**CERVICAL CANCER PREVENTION** is a UK-wide initiative led by Jo's Cervical Cancer Trust. The aim is to highlight the importance of cervical screening and how attending a screening invitation can help to prevent cervical cancer.

Cervical screening is routinely offered to anyone with a cervix in Scotland between the ages of 25 and 64 every 5 years. You may be recalled more often depending on your test results. You will no longer be invited for cervical screening after the age of 65 unless results from previous screenings showed changes that need to be monitored. If the results from previous screenings showed any change, you will be offered screening

until you are aged 70.

#### Do I Need Cervical Screening?

YOU SHOULD CONTINUE to have regular cervical screening, even if you:

- haven't been sexually active for a long time
- have been through the menopause
- have had the HPV vaccination
- have had a subtotal hysterectomy the removal of your womb (uterus) but you still have a cervix
- are a lesbian or bisexual HPV can be passed on through other forms of sexual activity

You might not need screening if you:

• have had a total hysterectomy

(removal of both womb and cervix)

- are pregnant
- have given birth in the last 12 weeks
- have never been sexually active (as there's less risk of you having HPV)

If you get an invitation and aren't sure that you need cervical screening, speak to your nurse or GP.

Please take up your invitation to attend your cervical screening test. It saves lives. If you have received an invitation letter, please call our Reception Team on 01577 862112 and ask for an appointment for a smear test. ## TWO MICHAELS AND A MARATHON GIRL

#### Winning Ways

'MICHAEL' IS THE kind of guy you might find annoying. He is always in a good mood and always has something positive to sav.

When someone would ask him how he was doing, he would reply, 'If I were any better, I would be twins!' He was a natural motivator. If an employee was having a bad day, Michael was there telling the employee how to look on the positive side of the situation.

Seeing this style really made me curious, so one day I went up to Michael and asked him, 'I don't get it! You can't be a positive person all of the time. How do you do it?'

Michael replied, 'Each morning I wake up and say to myself, you have two choices today. You can choose to be in a good mood or you can choose to be in a bad mood. I choose to be in a good mood. Each time something bad happens, I can choose to be a victim or I can choose to learn from it. I choose to learn from it. Every time someone comes to me complaining, I can choose to accept their complaining, or I can point out the positive side of life. I choose the positive side of life.

'Yeah, right, it's not that easy,' I protested. 'Yes, it is,' Michael said. 'Life is all about choices. When you cut away all the junk, every situation is a choice. You choose how you react to situations. You choose how people affect your mood. You choose to be in a good mood or bad mood. The bottom line: It's your choice how you live your life.'

I reflected on what Michael said. We lost touch, but I often thought about him when I made a choice about life instead of reacting to it.

Several years later, I heard that Michael was involved in a serious accident, falling some 60 feet from a communications tower. After18 hours of surgery, and weeks of intensive care, Michael was released from the hospital with rods placed in his back.

I saw Michael about six months after the accident. When I asked him how he was, he replied. 'If I were any better, I'd be twins. Want to see my scars?'

I declined to see his wounds, but I did ask him what had gone through his mind as the accident took place.

'The first thing that went through my mind was the wellbeing of my soon to be born daughter,' Michael replied. 'Then, as I lay on the ground, I remembered that I had two choices: I could choose to live or I could choose to die. I chose to live.'

'Weren't you scared? Did you lose consciousness?' I asked.

Michael continued, '... the paramedics were great. They kept telling me I was going to be fine. But when they wheeled me into the Accident and Emergency Department and I saw the expressions on the faces of the doctors and nurses, I got really scared. In their eyes, I read, 'He's a dead man. I knew I needed to take action.' 'What did you do?' I asked.

'Well, there was a big burly nurse shouting questions at me,' said Michael. 'She asked if I was allergic to anything. 'Yes, I replied.' The doctors and nurses stopped working as they waited for my reply. I took a deep breath and yelled, 'Gravity!'

Over their laughter, I told them, 'I am choosing to live. Operate on me as if I am alive, not dead.'

Michael lived, thanks to the skill of his doctors, but also because of his amazing attitude. I learned from him that every day we have the choice to live fully. Attitude, after all, is everything.

Therefore, do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own. After all today is the tomorrow you worried about yesterday.

Another Michael I want to mention is Michael Watson. Do you remember the scene all those years ago, when he was a young man in peak condition, preparing for a championship fight with Chris Eubank. He would never have thought that that night he would be fighting for his life, after a big knock down, with doctors thinking he would never walk again, even if he lived. Michael was in a coma for weeks on end, endured many operations, and fought his way back through rehabilitation. Later, he set out to walk the Marathon Course to raise money for people who are brain injured. It took Paula Radcliffe 2 hours and 15 minutes and it took Michael seven days! Both completed in record times, and personal bests. Both had different goals and dreams on very different levels, and both achieved their dreams, with the help of others, and a huge amount of determination and self-belief. I believe that Paula Radcliffe was an amazing champion because her defeats and failures were so public. It must be heart breaking to be fourth at the Olympics. Did that stop Paula? No way. She learned that she just had to do things differently, if she wanted to achieve her dreams.

These are three stories of inspirational people who knew they had more to give and were determined to give it. They knew that whatever is happening there is always a choice to make. What kind of choices are you going to make this week?

## Milnathort and Orwell Community Council

#### **News from the December Meeting**

**Present** at the meeting held on 8 December were CCllrs M Thomson N Bingham, A Macrae, K Heneghan, P Britton, A Wanless, PC Samson, PS Craig, Cllrs N Freshwater and D Cuthbert and 2 MoP.

**Apologies** were received from CCllrs A Ward, W Robertson and R Watters.

#### **Police Update**

PC Samson was present at the meeting and updated the meeting with the following information.

#### **Crimes Of Note**

Section 38 Criminal Justice and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2010 (threatening & abusive behaviour)

Section 90 Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 (Police assault)

1 x reported to the Procurator Fiscal

#### **Traffic Statistics**

Community officers are aware of regular areas where there are complaints about speeding in and around Milnathort. These are all on our speeding matrix and we will continue to make efforts to carry out speed checks across the area during our patrols.

Traffic units from Perth have also been carrying out regular speed checks in the area and have issued tickets over the last month for speeding and various other road traffic offences.

PS Craig referenced the road traffic accident at the roundabout at New Road and South Street in November and gave the attendees a chance to ask any questions. There were none directly asked and comments were made that no speed reduction methods would have avoided that accident. The Speedwatch campaign was mentioned with reference to the funding being sought by Fossoway CC. PC Samson offered to share the link for those wishing to volunteer to support this campaign and that a number of the CC who wish to volunteer will complete initially as a trial to help avoid issues with future volunteer completion that appears to be a common problem. Neill asked if they had any leaflets or information that can be shared. PC Samson responded that he will look to see what they have and to possibly speak to Fossoway CC to see if they have anything that can be shared.

#### **CC** Business

#### Update on damaged wall along from Burleigh Castle.

Kevin updated that he had written to the landowner with regards the wall at Burleigh.

Malcolm mentioned that it looked like the cracks on the Burleigh Bridge had changed in size.

It was raised by Audrey that the lid on the dog bin at path at the old trainline in Auld Mart Road was broken and that the fencing/safety railing at the entrance to Auld Mart Road is in need of repair. Cllr Freshwater took the action to speak with PKC on both items. Audrey will send photos of both to Cllr Freshwater.

#### **Cemetery Provision**

A question was asked about the future cemetery provision needs for the Kinross-shire area as there appeared to be no space within Milnathort cemetery, and through discussion with the PKC councillors it appears that there is a need to increase cemetery provision through the whole of the Kinross-shire area and that there were ongoing plans to increase the provision at the Kinross North Cemetery.

#### **Loch Level Pollution**

Cllr Cuthbert updated the meeting on a meeting on this subject attended by all the Kinross-shire PKC councillors with Scottish Water, SEPA, NatureScot, Assistants from Jim Fairlies MSP's office and PKC officers. There was a lot of full and frank discussion on the topic, however Scottish Water or SEPA could not quantify the amount of sewage that is discharged into the loch when there are high levels of rainfall. They acknowledged that there is monitoring equipment, however could not confirm what was being monitored. They have been asked to provide more data and detail on the size of the issue at the next meeting in April.

Some discussion on what may be a cause of the increase in pollution and the increase in phosphate level that is responsible for the increase in algae is the increase in number of houses, the run off of water from surrounding farms and climate change.

Cllr Freshwater commented that there was no acknowledgement from Scottish Water that there was a problem, which may be due to the lack of evidence and data from their monitoring equipment.

Scottish Water admit that raw sewage is entering the loch, possibly at an increased level and the options to combat this are potentially expensive.

Discussion in the meeting highlighted that we should first understand what the problem is, the size of it and then have future discussions on the solutions and costs once we are in a position to know how to combat it and not avoid the discussion because it may be expensive in the future.

The community council took an action to reach out to all other Kinross-shire Community Councils to establish a working group of one member each to determine what we can do to raise awareness and to determine what we can do as a community to get the answers we require.

#### Core Paths

Kevin Heneghan gave the following update:

Jobs for the winter months include replacing and erecting new waymarkers. A priority is to waymark the core path at Hattonburn where the path has been clearly left by the farmer. It's important that the path is clearly marked so people will use it and not walk on the field. Another winter job is infilling depressions on the core paths. We'll obtain infill materials and hire a whacker plate to compress the infill to form a smooth surface. We did this successfully earlier this year and will repeat the process where needed.

There are a couple of areas where bushes need to be cut back, particularly on the path linking the old Arlary railtrack to the east edge of the Community Woodland Core Paths and we'll tackle these at the beginning of next year.

#### Laura Mui

Congratulations to Laura Muir, for winning the Female Athlete of the Year 2022 at the Scottish Sports Awards.

Thanks to Laura and the staff and pupils of Milnathort Primary School for turning out on an in-service day, to unveil Laura's plaque and road sign, Muir Way at Pacehill, it made a number of papers including the *Courier*, the *Times* and others.

#### Community Council News

Also thanks again to the staff and pupils of Milnathort Primary school who helped to plant the 30 tree samplings in Tillywhally woods. The pupils are now using the woods to help support their outdoor learning.

#### **Comments And Questions From The Floor**

An audience member asked what was happening with the parking at Burleigh Sands and specifically around those paying for parking so they can camp on the loch side, this will obviously encourage this behaviour. This appears to be contrary to what the public would like to see, where there needs to be a reduction in camping due to the mess and litter left behind. The CC contacted NatureScot about this at the time but do not believe there has been a reply at this time so will check for an update.

#### **Councillors' Reports**

**Clir Cuthbert:** there has been a briefing from a developer with regards to the BCA site in Kinross. They can develop a space/building to accommodate 3 large stores and a drive through. Some retailer names were mentioned however this is in the early stages and no planning application has been submitted. It is dependent on the flood defence improvement at the Cleish which has gained Scottish Government approval, there was also a request to add a path/road to the loch.

The next meeting of Milnathort and Orwell Community Council will be held on 9 February 2023 at 7.30pm.

#### **Police Report**

Since 4 October 2022 there have been 18 calls to the police from the Fossoway area and two crimes recorded on police systems.

Police Scotland has issued guidance in relation to housebreakings and security advice as we come into the winter months: https://www.scotland.police.uk/advice-and-information/your-home/your-house/

Police Scotland has also seen a rise in frauds via different messaging platforms whereby the suspect contacts the victim pretending to be a family member and asking for money because their phone is broken.

The community policing team held 'Coffee with a Cop' on Saturday 15 October in the Crook of Devon Church Hall. There were several people from the community passing by with questions. Police Scotland and the CC will repeat this but a regular feature is difficult to fit in with work schedules.

#### **Pop-up Copper**

These are cardboard cutouts of police to be used as a deterrent to speeding. If communities would like one they need one lead person who will take it out every morning and in at night. The cardboard cut-outs need to be strengthened with some wood, and the structure needs to be chained to a lamp post or similar. CCllr Bruce-Jones reported that there has been a good response to this idea from both Drum and Rumbling Bridge residents.

Each community needs to fundraise for their own cut-out: the cost is just under £100 plus the cost of wood, a padlock and chain. The CC could combine the orders to reduce delivery costs.

Cllr Cuthbert has spoken to a senior Police Officer and suggested that it would make sense for the Police to hold a stock of these and lend them to communities.

From the Commander's Report: At some point between the hours of 5am on Thursday 6 and 4pm on Sunday 9 October, a Santa Cruz Mountain Bike, a Trek Hybrid E-bike and an Orbea Hybrid E-bike were stolen from a property in Mossend Green, Powmill.

#### **Matters Arising**

#### **Fossoway Area Transport**

CCIIr Duffy attended the Kinross-shire Transport Forum Group meeting, chaired by CIIr Cuthbert. We are very fortunate to have two bus experts on this group. The north-south route is now well serviced in Kinross; it is east to west we need to improve; the 202 extended to Loch Leven Community Campus, timetables that suit commuters, bus service on A91 and to Glenfarg. CIIr Cuthbert explains that the contracts are being negotiated for next year, with tender documents being prepared now. The Group has prepared two new documents which have input to the process. Currently school bus and public transport are separate contracts but it seems like there could be gains by combining the two.

### Road Safety In FDCC Area (Including A977 Mitigation And Carnbo)

PKC have provided the CC with a list of outstanding work in Kinross-shire. Rather than attempting to prioritise these items individually, CCllr Marchant proposed that we decide what things are important – safety, infrastructure (e.g. footpaths to bus stops, safe crossing points, etc.) and apply these criteria to all the jobs. This would help to create fairer relative priorities with other communities in Kinross-shire.

A Carnbo resident pointed out that there are no paths in Carnbo from one end to the other.

A MoP expressed concern that won't be enough money to carry out all these schemes, and this was already a concern for members of the CC, however Cllr Robertson had assured CCllr Duffy Trudy that the money for all these things is already in place and ring-fenced.

There was discussion about the need for a pedestrian crossing in Carnbo, but opinions varied about it whether it should be like the one in Blairingone that stays on red if the approaching vehicle is exceeding the speed limit.

#### **Noise Disturbance At**

#### **Fossoway Primary School Play Areas**

There are plans to schedule another meeting to discuss next steps and progress. All relevant local stakeholders will be invited. There is no date for this meeting yet.

Head teacher Paula reported back to this CC that the basketball hoop has been taken down. We now wait to see if this helps.

#### **Community Speed Watch**

The CC has applied to the Community Investment Fund to purchase speed-measuring equipment. More volunteers are needed to make effective use of this. When this scheme was operated in the past it did have some effect on driver behaviour. A team of three people are needed to operate the equipment.

CCIIr Marchant pointed out that this will help create an evidence base that could encourage the Police to attend.

#### **Road Adoptions**

Cllr Cuthbert has consulted PKC's highways department and the question about Drum is now resolved.

#### Access to Cash in Kinross-shire

CCIIr Marchant has received the following feedback from Bank of Scotland:

Bank of Scotland ran a three month pilot of Community Banker at the start of the year in Millbridge Hall. They attended

on a weekly basis for 12 sessions offering banking support (basic account enquiries, education and support of other banking channels) and supporting some businesses. Thirty one customers used the service; nine used the service more than once. The service was also run in three other Scottish locations, but Kinross was suspended as it received the fewest customers. Perhaps it wasn't publicised well enough.

The mobile branch visits fortnightly for three hours with a colleague to support customers with cash and banking queries. Around 200 customers used it in 2021, nine of which are regular users, with the majority of users also using our Perth branch.

We conclude that we're not going to get one bank to establish a physical branch again, so CCIIr Marchant is now working on establishing a combined bank instead.

#### **Ditch Management Scheme Drum**

The CC had previously asked PKC if they could coordinate ditch clearance across all the villages, but no reply as yet. Scottish Water has suggested that they may help with funding if a coordinated scheme could be established.

CCIIr Bruce-Jones reported that there has been some positive response from land owners in Drum with regards to a coordinated plan in Drum, but not so much in other areas.

#### **Crook and Drum Growing Together**

The group received a grant from the Nature Restoration Fund. Last weekend the orchard area was tidied up and native bulbs planted with a group of 10 volunteers and three children Fruit trees will go in in February/ March.

#### **Blairingone War Memorial**

It appears that this could be about to happen!

#### **Community Council Business - Meetings attended**

CCIIr Marchant attended Kinross-shire and Glenfarg Stronger Communities on 1 November. Broke not Broken advised of the PKC Cost of Living Fund that organisations can apply for to run activities in local spaces, such as coffee and a chat craft events. In addition to getting members of our communities together this can also provide a cosy space during the winter. A copy of the timetable for the Advice Hub in Kinross was also shared and will be posted on our Facebook page and Community Notice Boards.

The PKC Planning representative advised that they would start

to engage with communities on LDP3 in May-July 2023 and that CCs should receive communication regarding this shortly. The CC stressed that this is an opportunity for communities to influence the future direction of developments.

The next Kinrossshire area committee meeting will be at the end of this month, the full agenda is not yet available but road safety will be included.

CCIIr Duffy attended the Kinross-shire transport Forum group meeting.

#### **P&K Councillors' Reports**

**Clir Cuthbert:** There is a £25M black hole in the budget-Discussions are beginning now. A Poverty Action Task Force has just been formed by PKC. Clir Cuthbert is a member.

#### Correspondence

PKC's Leadership Team, including the Chief Executive, will hold their regular meeting in Kinross in December. The CC has been invited to attend – CCIIr Marchant will accept the invitation.

#### **AOCB**

A MoP reported that Seamab School's car park has large floodlights which appear to be on all the time, which is wasting power and affecting other properties. The CC will write to the School.

A MoP asked the CC if they were aware of how the equivalent to the Government Energy Bill Relief payment for consumers who don't have mains gas will be paid. After the meeting it was found that the Government's intention is that £100 will be paid via the consumer's electricity bill. No timing for this payment has yet been announced.

The next meeting of Fossoway Community Council will be held on 7 February 2023 at 7.30pm at Carnbo Village Hall..

## Kinross Community Council News from the November Meeting

#### **Police Report**

PC B Samson was unable to attend the meeting but had forwarded a report. CCIIr W Freeman advised that there had been a number of driving-related incidents (drink driving, driving without a licence, driving without valid insurance and riding without a crash helmet (2 people reported to the procurator fiscal) and 2 thefts by house-breaking, both of which were still subject to live investigation.

The meeting was advised that Community Officers are aware of regular areas where there are complaints about speeding in and around Kinross. These have all been added to our speeding matrix and Officers will continue to make efforts to carry out speed checks across the area during patrols. Traffic units from Perth have also been carrying out regular speed checks in the area and have issued tickets over the last month for speeding and various other road traffic offences.

#### **Matters Arising**

#### **Kinross Town Centre**

CCIIr L Mckay advised that the cobbles in the High Street were sinking, and that the bollard outside the opticians was still to be replaced. It was also noted that a walk around the town centre would be arranged for January.

With regard to the street lights, Cllr Robertson reported that he had been advised that these were at the correct illumination and that lighting should improve now that the leaves had fallen from trees.

With regard to the letter to SEPA in respect of the Loch, Cllr Robertson advised that he had not yet received a response.

Members were advised that CCIIr Mckay was still trying to contact the Lodge with regards to the sound equipment and an update would be given at a future meeting.

Minutes of the meetings are now uploaded onto Facebook and the website.

The issue of the removal of the trees at the Green Hotel had been reported.

Members were advised that a PKC officer had advised that the wall at the Green is required to be repaired and the owner would be responsible for doing so.

Complaints continue to be received with regard to Burns Begg Street.

Cllr Robertson had recently attended a coffee morning at the sheltered housing complex to discuss the concerns they had raised previously.

The issue of a crossing being introduced in the High Street, down from the chip shop, had been raised but members felt that this would take away too many parking spaces, thereby causing other issues.

CCIIr Mckay raised the issue of parking at Millbridge Hall, with car owners parking where spaces do not exist, causing further issues with entering and exiting.

#### **Speedwatch Campaign**

Cllr Robertson advised that Fossoway CC were happy to act as coordinators for the campaign and while a funding application had been made to the Community Investment Fund for equipment, there was now a need for volunteers to come forward. CCllr Phillips advised that there was an article in the next edition of the *Newsletter* on the campaign. Teams of 3 are required to monitor vehicle speeds in the locality by recording the date/time/speed/registration number using a speed gun. This information would then be handed over to the police and if speeds were deemed to be excessive, the police would speak to the relevant drivers. One member of the audience volunteered.

#### **Road Safety Issues**

CCllr Mckay asked for an update on the vehicle activation signs. Cllrs Robertson and Cuthbert had circulated the list of road safety issues for the area and asked for the CC to review this and send comments back ASAP to Cllr Cuthbert and the Councillors.

It was noted that the list contained over 800 issues and that some of these works had been delayed due to staff issues at PKC. Cllr Cuthbert also suggested that the issue at the Sycamores be near the top of the list.

CCIIr Mckay advised that the path in Springfield Road had been repaired but was now in a worse state than it was previously. Cllr Robertson agreed to look at the path and report to PKC.

Cllr Cuthbert advised that the above planning application had not yet been discussed by PKC and whilst there was a meeting scheduled for the following day, the application was not on the agenda.

22/00005/PREAPM Davies Park, Springfield Road, Kinross, KY13 8BA – covered earlier in the meeting.

It was noted that a public meeting had been arranged for 25 January 2023 at 7pm in the Parish Church where a presentation on the application, the work done and responses from government bodies would be given.

Members were also advised that there was a meeting with James Gardner (PKC Community Empowerment Officer) arranged for 14 December to discuss community ownership and KCC were invited to attend – CCIIr Leslie agreed to attend and provide an update to the next meeting.

CCIIr Mckay commented that she had been advised that community ownership would impact the available funding for the parks and while this was agreed with, CIIr Cuthbert commented that while it would be worth exploring, everyone needed to be aware of the implications. In response to a question from the public, CCIIr Mckay advised that funding applications had not been submitted due to manpower issues, and she again confirmed that PKC wished all work to be completed at the same time. Work is estimated to cost around £200,000.

A member of the public advised that an environmental impact assessment had been carried out and PKC had confirmed that Miller Homes were appealing the decision made, with the DPEA to respond to the Department of Environmental Appeals. Ward Councillors have arranged to meet with Scottish Water on 6 December to discuss issues, and an update will be given at a future meeting. It was agreed that everyone needed to write to DPEA to express their concerns if Miller Homes were given permission to build on the site and CCIIr Phillips is to link in with the various groups to write letters.

#### **Reports from PKC Councillors**

**Clir D Cuthbert** advised that a consultation from the Boundary Commission had been issued and responses were to be submitted by 5 December 2022, commenting that the population of Kinrossshire had increased by around 21.8% over the last 10 years.

It was noted that there continued to be difficulties obtaining appointments with GPs and dental practices, and ClIr D Cuthbert had raised these issues with the Integrated Joint Board. School capacity was also causing concern (81% at Kinross within 5 years, Milnathort at 114%, and Cleish joining up with Kinross for around 2 years) and he had raised his concerns with the PKC Chief Executive, asking for the numbers to be verified.

**Clir Cuthbert** also reminded everyone that the festive street market was being held on Saturday.

Members were advised that the BCA looked to be changing hands, and a meeting was arranged for 30 November (being held by Zoom) with the CC. It was also noted that The Boat House had been sold.

### Matters Arising

#### **Road Safety**

In the absence of D McKeown, Senior Technician, Communities, M Butterworth advised that a written update on road safety in Kinross-shire would be provided to members of the committee following the meeting.

Post agenda note: Information regarding road safety schemes mentioned at committee was circulated to members from D McKeown

The lowering of the speed limit at Carnbo, from 40mph to 30mph, was identified as a community priority at the Ward meeting with the Kinross-shire Councillors. We are currently working on the creation of this Traffic Regulation Order. It is anticipated that this will come into effect from April 2023.

There are also three outstanding projects from the A977 Mitigation Measures programme in the vicinity of Crook of Devon/Drum. The two priority projects, agreed with the local Councillors and Fossoway Community Council, were the signalisation of the school Road junction and the realignment of the A977/B9097 junction. The traffic signals were installed at School Road but there is still work to be done to complete the footway links. The junction realignment project still must be designed and costed. To date, we have not had the staff resources to progress either of these schemes as resources

have been directed to other priorities of work. It is hoped that these can be delivered in the next financial year.

Upon completion of these two projects, and provided funding was still available, the third project was to be undertaken. This involves the signalisation of the Drum crossroads, the removal of the Puffin crossing (as a pedestrian phase would be incorporated within the traffic signals) and a reduction of the speed limit from 40mph to 30mph.

#### **Blairingone Primary School**

L Haxton, Community Planning and Policy Team Leader, provided a verbal update on Blairingone Primary School. He advised that the Development Trust were given access to the former primary school building for a community development session on the 19 November 2022 which seemed to be a success. There was submitted a request by the Development Trust to register as a charity in October 2022 and by early 2023 the Development Trust should have the legal status that they require to submit a Community Asset Transfer. It was agreed at the first meeting of the Kinross-shire Local Committee that a review would be undertaken after 12 months. L Haxton confirmed that an update would be brought back to the February 2023 Committee.

### The Proposals Of The Boundary Commission For Scotland

The approved emerging motion that was submitted to Council on 9 November 2022 regarding the Proposals of The Boundary Commission for Scotland be brought to Committee for noting.

#### Resolved:

(i) The contents of the motion, be noted.

(ii) The Convener of the Kinross-shire Local Committee write to the Boundary Commission regarding the proposals announced on 8 November 2022, expressing members objection to the Scotlandwell area of the Kinross-shire ward being included in the proposed Glenrothes constituency and that this area should instead be included in the Perth and Loch Leven constituency.

#### Catch - Loch Leven

There was slide based presentation by D Cairns, on CATCH – Loch Leven (Climate Change Through Community Heating) (Appendix 1). Members questions were answered, and the Convener thanked D Cairns for his informative presentation.

Members suggested a combined approach from the local community and the PKC to look at future funding and resourcing to protect Loch Leven.

Committee noted the position.

#### Supply And Demand For Serviced Employment Land In The Kinross Ward

There was submitted a report by Head of Cultural and Community Services (22/290) providing information to Committee on the current situation regarding the supply and demand of serviced employment land in the Kinross area; and (2) covering progress the Council is making in relation to developing its own existing employment land.

#### **Resolved:**

The contents of Report 22/290, be observed.

#### Kinross Common Good Fund Applications For Finance Assistance – November 2022


Members of the Kinross-shire Local Committee were contacted via email, and the following decisions were agreed:

#### Tues 14 March, Devilla Forest, Kincardine


A delightful walk on paths and tracks through the mainly Scots pine forest.





Our first climate café of 2023 welcomed David Cairns who presented a very interesting seminar on the CATCH Loch Leven project to capture heat from Loch Leven. The project is at its initial stage of gathering information to support the idea of this relatively novel sustainable energy source.

David started his talk with a detailed analysis of temperature and flow data for the South Queich tributary, one of the locations considered for a heat exchanger. This tributary on the edges of Kinross contributes about 29 million m³ each year; about one quarter of all loch water. Looking at heat demand in Kinross, large users like companies or public sector require between 0.2 and 3.5 GWhr per year and small users (i.e. private homes) use between 0.01 and 0.02 GWhr. The total demand estimated for Kinross and Milnathort would be in the region of 27 GWhr, while the analysis of water temperature and flow in South Queich indicates a potential of 70 GWhr that could be harvest-ed with a heat water pump.

CATCH Loch Leven proposes a sustainable district heating



system, which is very popular in Denmark and Poland. The system is described in detail in the feature on pp35-37.

Once successful, this sustainable heating system would reduce local carbon dioxide emissions by 10000 tonnes, a huge step towards a net zero carbon future.

Our next guest in February is Ana de Miguel, PKC Waste Reduction Officer. She will revisit our group to present a talk on the best ways to recycle that minimise landfill waste, which is linked to our Council Tax. The next meeting is on Monday 6 February at 7pm in Loch Leven Library. All welcome.

We would like to express our sincere gratitude to the staff of Loch Leven library for their continuing support and hosting of our meetings. Great thanks to KLEO who continue to support our group and local zero waste retailer Sansaar for their support.












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## Portmoak Community Woodland Group

## Lomond Antique and Collectors Club



On Wednesday 11 January Dr Martin Hepworth gave us a talk called, 'The Assassination of President Garfield'. James Garfield, born in 1831 in almost abject poverty, rose to the highest position in the land. His father died whilst James was only two years old and he was brought up in a poor shack, contracting malaria at an early age. He undertook work as a school janitor in order to get an education and, aged 23, gained entrance to Williams College becoming school president at 26 and thereafter a professor of mathematics and classics.

Elected to the Senate in 1859, his early career was interrupted by the Civil War where Garfield rose quickly to the rank of General and displayed superior battle tactics to his opponents at the Battle of Middle Creek in 1862.

Garfield attended the Republican Convention of 1880, not as a leadership candidate but to nominate a colleague. Following a messy and protracted series of ballots, Garfield eventually emerged with 399 votes to become the Republican Presidential candidate and on 2 November 1880 and was elected as the twentieth President of the United States. Garfield had not campaigned for any of the elected offices he held including the final one.

Enter Mr Charles Guiteau. Guiteau was a deluded individual with significant mental health issues. A failed lawyer and evangelist with unrealisable political aspirations, he was present at Baltimore and Potomac Station on 2 July 1881 when Garfield arrived to purchase train tickets. Guiteau fired two shots at Garfield, one of which entered his chest on the right side and crossed his body to the left. Garfield was attended by Dr William Bliss who assumed command of the patient and dismissed other doctors who wished to be involved. With almost no attempt at sterilisation of either instruments or

the wound, Garfield developed sepsis and, over a period of 9 weeks, saw his body weight drop from 210lbs to 130lbs before succumbing to infection. He died on 19 September 19 1881 and had been in office for just 6 months. The incident caused Alexander Graham Bell (inventor of the telephone) to produce a metal detector. He was permitted to use his machine to identify the location of the bullet, but Bliss would only permit access to the right side of Garfield's body and the bullet was not identified.

Garfield's Vice President, Chester Arthur, was sworn in as President. Guiteau was imprisoned and duly executed. 20,000 members of the public applied for tickets to witness the execution but only 250 attended. Bliss billed Con-gress for his fees, was denied the full amount, and did not practice medicine thereafter.


Garfield was an ardent campaigner for racial equality and support for the poor. It is to be imagined what a full term as President may have achieved.

You won't be surprised to hear that December was a busy month for us.

BROKE NOT BROKEN

On 5 December we held our annual community Christmas hamper pack. Each hamper was filled with Christmas treats and an envelope of vouchers for the household to access local bakers, butchers and supermarkets. Members of the community came with their families and between them made up over 200 hampers. Our volunteers deliv-ered them all over the course of that week. Many thanks to The Green Hotel, Sandy Baird, Winton's Fine Foods, Hunter's Butchers, Baynes Bakers and everyone who mucked in on the day.

December continued to be challenging as referrals increased and we continue to break records for parcels being delivered week after week. Volunteers continue to step up and give their time and energy, doing it all with a smile on their faces.

Looking back at 2022 there are some distressing figures. A 245% increase in food bank usage from the start of the year to the end. Spending over £20,000 in energy payments. £90,000 spent in supermarket vouchers across all projects. The last week of November saw us supporting almost 200 local people.


However, as Christmas approached, the amount of people donating money to us began to increase. People were donating to us instead of buying cards or presents or donating winter fuel payments or cost of living energy payments if they felt they didn't need them. These donations are incredibly important to us as they give us some flexibility that restricted funding sometimes cannot give. As we compile our annual report and accounts for 2021-22 we know that over a quarter of our income comes from private individuals making donation, so thanks to everyone who was able to do that.

Thanks also to all those who visited our stall at both the winter festival in Kinross and the Milnathort school fair as well as those who gave generously to the Rotary Santa Sleigh when it came through Kinross. We received food donations from everywhere, with some notably huge ones from Kinross Primary and High Schools and Amey. In some cases, our drop off point had to be emptied more than once a day to keep on top of it.





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

In the January *Newsletter*, local councillors and others reported on a meeting with representatives of organisations such as Scottish Water, SEPA and the Centre for Ecology and Hydrology to discuss the condition of the loch. Apparently SEPA states that the deterioration in water quality is not due to increased housing but there was no clear explanation of what the evidence is to support this assertion. The lack of record keeping by Scottish Water is unacceptable.

As reported in our last column, Miller Homes appealed to the Scottish Government over the need for an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for their proposed 160-house development north west of the Davies Park, Kinross. 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
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### Kinross Volleyball

The year 2023 is a special year for our local volleyball club when in August 1983 the club's men's team made their first venture into Europe to play in the Knack Roeselare annual tournament (pictured below).

Our local TSB bank provided t-shirts for the team. Each of the six members paid £35 for the weekend, leaving Kinross at 11pm on the Thursday, driving to Felixstowe for the early morning crossing to Zeebrugge.

The team then drove to Roeselare where they set up their tent for the weekend competition which featured over 200 teams. Following the two days of competition the team then drove back to Zeebrugge for the last crossing to Felixstowe and the drive north, arriving back in Kinross at 7 am, just in time for work.

Monday evening training sessions have resumed on Monday evenings (8pm till 9.45pm)at the Campus large games' hall after the festive break. The men's team are currently lying in joint second place in the Perth District Recreational League and in sixth position in the Perth District Premier League.

The Kinross High School team lie in tenth place in the Recreational League having been beset by player availability problems.

Teacher strikes have affected a couple of the Wednesday volleyball sessions but attendance has been good. There will be a 'GO' volleyball promotion (Girls Only) over January and early February to attract younger girls in S1 and S2 to the sport.

There is also an opportunity for senior High School pupils to sign up to 'coach volleyball' through the PKC Active Schools' Aspiring Coaches programme. This scheme is free and open to all S4 & S5 pupils. consisting of a 3-day coaching conference taking place during the normal school day.

Participants will be awarded a Level 1 coaching qualification and can apply as from 1 February.



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### NatureScot Loch Leven NNR





FEBRUARY IS AN EXCITING month at Loch Leven NNR. We are approaching spring, we've nearly made it through the dark, cold months! The wildlife at Loch Leven NNR are gearing up for spring too. The ducks are looking pristine at the moment, some species will be thinking of pairing up already. Mallard are known for their pairing, courting and even copulation in late winter! We have roughly 32 breeding pairs of mute swan on the loch, and pairs will now be holding territories. February is a great time to observe Swan behaviour: #SwanWars is better than any soap I've watched! Look out for territorial males (cobs) chasing off intruding birds with plenty of wing flapping, territorial v-shaped postured birds dancing around each other and sizing each other up. They are fantastic to watch!

We also start to see the first flowers of the year in February. Look out for lesser celandine (*Ficaria verna*), primrose (*Primula vulgaris*), wood anemone (*Anemone nemorosa*) and snowdrops (*Galanthus sp.*) as you travel around the Reserve. Some birds will start singing in February, listen out for great tit, robin and if you are very lucky crossbill! Crossbill can start nesting in February and can be heard singing from the top of conifer trees.

Observing wildfowl in February can be very rewarding and interesting! When watching various duck species, look out for their courtship displays. Mallard can be seen head-bopping from the Pier at the Boathouse. Goldeneye can be watched from Burleigh Beach doing their mad courtship. Drake goldeneye throw their heads right back onto their back then throw it forward to attract females — I wonder what the females think when they see them do this bizarre display!

One bird that will be nesting in February is the mighty grey heron. You normally see these birds fishing solitary on river banks and lochs. However, come early spring these birds nest in colonies, and we have a colony of birds on Castle Island. These large birds nest right at the top of pine trees and we have seen more than 30 pairs on Castle Island in the past. The safety of the island is a preferred place to nest and we monitor these pre-historic birds throughout the breeding season. Herons have been studied in the UK since 1928 through the British Trust for Ornithology 'Heronries Census' and this is the longest running single species survey in the world! In Feb-

ruary, most birds are making repairs on their nest, courting with their partners and maybe even think about laying eggs! Latest wildlife highlights around the reserve include: a beautiful male hen harrier, twite, plenty of feeding siskin and bullfinch around Burleigh, three little egret, kingfisher and brown hare at Orwell.

Spring is just around the corner, we will soon see the first returning migrants, the first butterflies and bumblebees and feel a little warmth in the sun. Let's enjoy the final month of meteorological winter and take it all in before spring arrives!

AS WE MOVE INTO 2023, we are excited to see what the New Year brings. It has been a great start with the flood having now defrosted and we have started seeing nice numbers of teal, wigeon, and a family of whooper swans. The little egrets have also been seen dotted about across the reserve. In the woodlands, the red squirrels have been making a welcome appearance, cheekily whizzing around the visitor area. The first goose count of the year saw 2904 pink-footed geese roosting and feeding across the loch which is generally what you'd expect for this time of year but amazing to see nonetheless. We should see a build in numbers over the coming months as they start to make their way north again to breed.

Our fantastic volunteers have been working hard improving the path up the hill replacing some of the damaged steps. Before Christmas, they were planting some spring bulbs in the hope we start seeing some lovely pops of colour in a few months' time. We have also had work parties in to help clear scrub to improve the priority fen habitat. The work parties have also helped with clearing viewpoints along the heritage trail so there is now a lovely view onto the reserve from some of the benches along the path.

With the breeding season fast upon us, we've been busy improving the habitat for the return of the lapwing and other waders. During the icy weather we spent some time cutting the thick rush creating feeding and nesting areas. The cows have also been doing a great job of keeping the preferred nesting areas free of thick vegetation. The reserve is

looking very beautiful with all the ditches and pools full to the brim. Keep an eye out for feeding redshank and snipe along the ditch edges.

In the world of events, we are looking forward to our first Optics Weekend of the year on Saturday 4 and Sunday 5 February, 10am-4pm daily. If you are looking to purchase a new set of binoculars or telescope, why not come and have a chat to our experts who will help ensure you are getting a product that works best for you?

We also have our Fun Fact February Trail taking place on 15-19 February, 10am- 4pm daily. Can you uncover all the hidden facts around the reserve? No booking required, just pop in and pick up your trail sheet for only £2!

# **Muck and Magic**

**EVEN THOUGH WE ARE** just two weeks into the new year as I write this article there is already a noticeable increase in the daylight hours, which is always a very welcome change to note. The clear, crisp few days we are having at the moment help the sun show its face from behind the clouds and lift spirits although at the same time it fairly lowers temperatures. It's always welcome to have a bit of frost mid-winter as it helps to kill pathogens and defines the move from one growing season to the next. Also, it's good for plants to have a period of dormancy in preparation for bursting into life in spring.

Although we have been cursing the amount of rain which has fallen over the last couple of months, I think that we should be grateful that it hasn't fallen as snow because the whole country would have ground to a halt as a result. The cold frosty days make the fields clean and crisp for the sheep here

at Backward Farm and we have started feeding them silage to keep their bellies full as their supply of grass to graze has dwindled. The tups have been taken out from among the ewes and are resting in their current bachelor pad (which is a field as far away from the ewes as possible). The ewes are due to be pregnancy scanned in early February and the results of this will set the tone for the year ahead for the sheep enterprise in particular and the farm as a whole. I am hoping for a better result than last year but we will just have to wait and see. The ewes are in good condition, and we have some good quality silage to feed them so we should be able to minimise the amount of feed that we will need to buy in for them.

The pigs have been making the most of the wet conditions, digging up their paddocks at an impressive rate, with only the frost in early December and again just now slowing down their work rate briefly. As far as the cattle are concerned, it's mid winter clean out time for a couple of the batches. The deep litter bedding method we use, where we keep adding clean straw on top of itself for the cattle to lie on means that the level of dung gradually builds up until the time comes when it gets too deep so we have to clear the whole lot out and start again from floor level. We have to do this two or three times over the winter and it plays a very important role in the cycle of nutrition and fertility of the land, as this dung is spread back on the fields to help grow the following years crops. A classic example of the muck and magic aspect of modern farming which has been practiced since the dawn of time - or maybe even longer!

Keep on diggin' that dung!


